HARRISON, NJ – Gotham FC is set to face off against the Washington Spirit at home at Red Bull Arena on April 19 (7:30 p.m. ET, Paramount+) to kick off the club's highly-anticipated first match of the 2023 UKG NWSL Challenge Cup.

In 2022, Gotham FC finished third place in the East grouping of the competition after earning a total of six points with a 1-3-2 (W-D-L) record. This year, the club has its sights set on a Challenge Cup championship after coming close to winning it all in the two prior years of the tournament.

QUICK HITS

2022 CHALLENGE CUP

Gotham FC closed the 2022 Challenge Cup with a 1-3-2 (six points) record to finish third in the East grouping.

GOTHAM FC CHALLENGE CUP LEADERS

Midfielder Nahomi Kawasumi tallied a goal against Washington Spirit in 2022, making her the fifth player to record two career goals in the Challenge Cup. Kawasumi joined forwards Midge Purce, Paige Monaghan, Carli Lloyd and Évelyne Viens in the

record book, who are all past or present players with Gotham FC.

GOTHAM FC CHALLENGE CUP HISTORY

Gotham FC advanced out of group play in each of the first two Challenge Cup tournaments, appearing in the semifinals in 2020 before falling in penalties to the Portland Thorns in 2021, making Gotham FC the tournament's runner-up.

Gotham FC topped the North Carolina Courage, 4-3, in the 2021 Challenge Cup. North Carolina was the only team to score on Gotham in the group stage that year.

Gotham FC has a 5-6-6 (W-D-L) record in Challenge Cup history, with a 2-3-2 home record and 3-3-4 record on the road.

2023 - CLOSING THE GAP

UKG will double the prize pool for the 2023 UKG NWSL Challenge Cup, bringing the first-ever million-dollar prize pool to U.S. professional women's soccer.

In tandem with the tournament kickoff, UKG and the NWSL are launching a co-branded "Challenge Accepted" campaign which emphasizes the unwavering support for equity both on and off the field.

HEAD-TO-HEAD

In 32 matches between Gotham FC and the Washington Spirit in all competitions, Gotham FC is 10-8-14 against the Washington Spirit. Gotham FC is looking to pick up their first win against the club since June 2022 (L, 1-0).

JUAN CARLOS AMORÓS HEAD COACH

Juan Carlos Amorós was named Gotham FC head coach on November 1, 2022. The 38-year-old Amorós, who last season led the Houston Dash as their interim head coach to a fourth-place finish and the team's first-ever NWSL playoff appearance, has been signed by Gotham FC to a three-year contract.

Amorós brings a wealth of experience across global soccer to Gotham FC, having served as a head coach of clubs in the top leagues in Spain, England, and the U.S. Prior to his stint in Houston, Amorós was coach of Real Betis Féminas from 2021 - 22 and led them to a club-record unbeaten streak in Spain's top division.

Before Real Betis, Amorós enjoyed enormous success as a coach in England. Over five years, he helped lead Tottenham Hotspur FC Women from the third tier in England to the FA Women's Super League. In 2019, Tottenham was promoted to the Super League after finishing second in the second-division FA Women's Championship League. He earned Manager of the Year honors that season, and won the same honor while coaching Tottenham Hotspur in the third-division FA Women's National League.

In the 2022 NWSL season, Amorós began his tenure as interim head coach of the Houston Dash on July 16 with a 4-1 win over Chicago. He led Houston to a 6-3-2 record as the club earned the first playoff berth in its nine-year history.

Amorós holds a UEFA PRO license - the highest-level UEFA license attainable - and received a diploma in Football Management from the League Managers Association Institute of Leadership and High Performance. He has also participated in elite coaching courses with the Royal Spanish Football Federation, and in 2018 earned a Master of Business Administration from Autonomous University of Madrid.

Jen Lalor Assistant coach

Jen Lalor joined Gotham FC in 2023. In addition to her duties as assistant coach, Lalor also will play an integral role for Gotham FC with the club's player development pipeline. Lalor won the bronze medal with the USWNT at the FIFA Women's World Cup in 1995 and played professionally in Japan, Denmark and Sweden. She also played in the first women's professional league in the U.S. (Women's United Soccer Association) with the New York Power and San Diego Spirit. At Santa Clara University, Lalor was the first women's soccer player in school history to earn a full athletic scholarship and was later inducted into the SCU Athletic Hall of Fame. Lalor has worked extensively at U.S. Soccer in the youth national team system as a coach, scout, technical advisor, and club development manager. As a head coach, she has led two teams to national championships: San Diego SeaLions of the WPSL in 2013, and Albion SC San Diego U16 in 2022.



Shaun Harris Assistant coach

Prior to joining the staff of Gotham FC in 2023, Shaun Harris spent the last twelve seasons with Tottenham Hotspur, including years when Amorós was Head Coach of the women's team. As a senior member of the staff within the club's Global Football Development team, he traveled around the world to deliver coaching education and player development programs and help implement coaching curriculums within national football associations. More recently, as lead technical coach, Harris played an integral role in helping Tottenham Hotspur Women reach fifth place in the table in 2021-22, their highest-ever finish in the Women's Super League.

Ak Lakani assistant coach

Ak Lakhani joined Gotham FC in 2023 from the Jamaican Football Federation, where he was the head of United Kingdom recruitment for the Women's U17, U20 and Senior Women's national team. He is also the assistant coach of the Jamaican Women's National Team that will compete in the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup, and was assistant coach when the team won the bronze medal at the 2022 Concacaf Women's Championship in Mexico. Lakhani was part of Amorós' coaching staff during his successful tenure at Tottenham Hotspur Women's FC when the club earned back-to-back promotions. He has also worked at Tottenham Hotspur Academy and Leyton Orient Academy, and he was one of 150 coaches in the UK to be awarded a Medal from Prince William for "Outstanding Contribution to Football."



Adrián Benítez Jiménez

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH

Prior to joining Gotham FC in 2023, Adrián Benítez Jiménez was Head of Performance for Real Betis in Spain's First Division women's league (Liga F) – where he worked with Amorós, a former head coach of Real Betis – and as rehabilitation coach at Real Betis Academy. Among his previous roles, Jiménez was a fitness coach and Academy strength and conditioning coach at Córdoba FC and Marcet Football Academy, and he has also worked with Girona, Real Betis' men's team, Atlético de Madrid Academy, the Argentinian Men's National Team, Basel FC, Granada FC, RCD Mallorca, and Cádiz FC.



Jesús Botello Hermosa Head of tactical analysis

Jesús Botello Hermosa joined Gotham FC in 2023 after previously serving as an assistant coach with Real Betis, where his focus was on tactical analysis and designing of game strategies. It was during his time with Real Betis that he worked with Amorós as the club became a competitive force in LIGA F. Botello Hermosa has also served as head of tactical analysis for CD Ronda in Spain, was co-founder and a professor of Sports Management and Sports Scouting at the Royal Football Federation, and was a professor in High Performance in football as well as a coach educator for the Royal Spanish Federation. Botello Hermosa has worked in the broadcasting industry as a La Liga analyst for Mass Media and Real Betis TV, and he is an author of books on tactical analysis.



Phillip Congleton HEAD OF SPORTS SCIENCE

Phillip Congleton has been with Gotham FC since 2020. Prior to joining the club, Congleton served as High Performance Coach for the women's soccer team at James Madison University while earning his Master of Science in Exercise Physiology. His duties included interpreting health analytics and video analysis to monitor players' physical performance during games and training sessions. Congleton used this data to implement training, return-to-play, injury prevention and recovery protocols designed to enhance player performance. He was also a Strength and Conditioning Coach for Mary Baldwin University Women's Soccer Team in 2017.

Congleton received his Bachelor of Science Integrative Biology in 2014 from Christopher Newport University. He holds a USSF D Coaching License and is recognized by the National Strength and Conditioning Association as a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist.

Brody Sams joined Gotham FC as Goalkeeper Coach in Feb 2022. In this role, Sams works closely with goalkeepers Michelle Betos, Hensley Hancuff, Mandy Haught, and Abby Smith.

Prior to working in the U.S., the Australian native spent nine years coaching across all levels in Australia, primarily with the professional club Brisbane Roar. Sams has worked in both the women's and men's game, from the youth to senior levels.



ERIN MORTON

HEAD OF MEDICAL/PHYSICAL THERAPIST

Erin Morton, PT, DPT, Cert. DN, EMT joined Gotham FC in February 2022. A native of Connecticut, Morton returns to the Northeast after several stops on the west coast and the state of Georgia.

Morton spent one year as the Director of Sports Performance at the Millsaps Training Facility in Cairo, Georgia. Prior to that, she worked for PRISM Physical Therapy in Las Vegas after completing a clinical rotation at the UFC Performance Institute where she rehabbed UFC fighters, WNBA players, and Olympians. She also completed clinical rotations on Oahu, where she rehabbed elite college and high school athletes and military personnel, and in Salt Lake City where she gained experience working in an interdisciplinary team of healthcare professionals.

Morton received her Emergency Medical Technician certification during her junior year of high school and went on to earn a Bachelor's degree in Health Sciences in three years from Quinnipiac University where she played NCAA Division I golf. She relocated to San Diego county to attend University of St. Augustine's Doctor of Physical Therapy program where she graduated with High Honors.



PROFESSIONAL

2022: Betos signed with Gotham FC in January 2022, and went on to start in all 14 of the matches she appeared in, making 60 saves throughout the season. 2021: Betos wore the captain's armband in Racing Louisville FC's inaugural season where she appeared in 20 matches, logged a league-leading 95 saves and a 4-11-5 record. Betos earned NWSL Save of the Week honors twice, was named NWSL Player of the Week and was recognized on Team of the Month as well. She registered a season-high of 11 saves and earned a shutout in the club's first-ever win. 2018-20: Betos appeared in 12 matches with OL Reign before being selected by Racing Louisville FC in the 2020 NWSL Expansion Draft. 2015-16: In first full season with Portland, she had a standout campaign starting 14 matches. She became the first goalkeeper to score a goal in the NWSL and went on to earn the 2015 NWSL Goalkeeper of the Year honors. 2014: Betos was traded to Portland Thorns FC in exchange for the thirty-fourth pick in the 2014 NWSL College Draft. 2013: She made seven appearances with Seattle Reign FC before being traded to Portland in 2014. 2012: Betos signed with the New York Fury in the Women's Premier Soccer League Elite for the 2012 season. She went on to sign with Apollon Limassol in the UEFA Women's Champions League for the 2012-2013 season. She made five appearances for the team, totaling 450 minutes. 2011: Betos signed with Boston Aztec, a part of the Women's Premier Soccer League. 2010: Betos signed with Club Atlético River Plate Women for their 2010 season. 2009: Betos began her professional career with Atlanta Silverbacks in the W-League and was the 2009 W-League Goalkeeper of the Year.

COLLEGE

Betos played for the University of Georgia from 2006-09. She had 49 wins, which is still tied for the most in school history. She ended her collegiate career with 316 saves and 26 shutouts, ranking her third all-time for saves and second in shutouts at Georgia. She was named the team's Defensive Most Valuable Player and named to the SEC All-Freshman Team.

PROFESSIONAL

2022: Dorsey appeared in 21 matches and had one assist during the 2022 regular season. She started in all five matches that she appeared in during the 2022 NWSL Challenge Cup. 2021: She made 21 appearances, including 19 starts throughout the season. Dorsey also had two assists.
2020: During the 2020 season she made eight appearances, with an 88% passing success rate. 2019: She scored two goals in her 23 appearances this season. 2018: Dorsey was drafted by Sky Blue FC as the 5th overall pick in the 2018 NWSL College Draft. She was named the 2018 NWSL Rookie of the Year with four goals, one assist in 13 appearances.

COLLEGE

Dorsey played for Duke University from 2014-17. She started in 47 out of the 48 matches she appeared in. She scored 21 goals and had 17 assists throughout her collegiate career. Dorsey placed in Duke Women's Soccer record books by finishing tied for fourth in goals (60), placing fifth in shot percentage (.152), sixth in points (171), tied for sixth in assists (51) and ninth in shots (396).
