

K. S. "Bud" ADAMS, Jr. President - Owner

The name Kenneth Stanley Adams, Jr. has been synonymous with sports and diversified business interests in the Southwest for over twenty years.

One of the conceivers and founders of the American Football League back in 1959, Bud Adams had played a major role in bringing big league sports to the city of Houston and the Gulf Coast area.

As sole owner of the Houston Oilers since the team's inception, Adams has seen his team win two AFL cham-

pionships and four division titles since 1960.

Although professional football has been the dominant force in Adams' sports endeavors, he was a stockholder in the Houston Sports Association and worked diligently to bring major league baseball to Houston. He also fielded a basketball team — Ada Oilers — in the powerful National Industrial Basketball League and has been involved in professional boxing at various times.

Sports and football in particular, is only one of his many successful endeavors. On February 22, 1946, Bud Adams started his business career in Houston after serving 3 years

in the Navy Air Corp during World War II.

On June 3, 1947, his company was incorporated under the laws of the State of Delaware, as Ada Oil Company. Through an exchange offer effective March 31, 1974, Ada Resources, Inc. was formed.

Today, Bud Adams is the owner of Bud Adams Enterprises, and president and chairman of Ada Resources, Inc.

- the keystone of Adams' interests.

Adams heads a business complex of 15 companies engaged in the oil business, farming and ranching, automobile sales, real estate, securities and several other related interests. He just recently opened a 26-story Doctors Center, the first phase of one of the finest medical complexes in the Southwest.

One of Adams' farming interests is the River Garden Farms Company, one of the largest irrigated farms in the United States, located in the Sacramento River Valley of California.

Born in Bartlesville, Oklahoma, Adams attended grade and junior high schools in that city and later went to Culver Military Academy, where he won letters in football, basketball and baseball.

Majoring in petroleum engineering, Adams attended his first year of college at Menlo College in Menlo Park, California. He won letters in football and rugby.

In 1941, Adams transferred to the University of Kansas to continue his studies in petroleum engineering. He also lettered in football and was a member of Sigma Chi Frater-

nity

While at Kansas, Adams joined the Naval Reserve and in 1944 was selected for Officer Midshipman School and was later commissioned an ensign in the U. S. Naval Reserve. After further training, Adams joined a Pacific Fleet Carrier Aircraft Service Unit, where he was an engineering officer at an aviation repair installation.

Following V-J Day, Adams was sent to a Naval Air Station in Norman, Oklahoma, and later to Washington, D. C. as an aide to the Commanding Officer of the U. S. Navy's Congressional Liaison Office. He was later honorably dis-

charged in 1946.

After his discharge, Adams moved to Houston, entered the oil business and became one of the city's leading sports

figures.

In recognition of his knowledge and experience, Adams was named to the board of trustees of the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. He participates in a wide variety of civic and charitable activities and has been honored as Houston's "Salesman of the Year", "Sportsman of the Year", and "Westerner of the Year."

O. A. PHILLIPS Head Coach — General Manager

O. A. "Bum" Phillips began his coaching career at Class A Nederland High School in 1950 as B-team coach. Since then he has made himself one of the most respected coaches in the game, and he now has ascended to the highest level of his profession as head coach of the Houston Oilers.

Born in Orange, Texas, Phillips played high school football at Beaumont French under the late Elbert Pickell, who also gave Bum his first job at Nederland. Since then, Phillips has worked for such coaching greats as Bear Bryant, Bill

Yeoman, Hayden Fry, and Sid Gillman.

Phillips compiled a good record in Texas high school coaching at Nederland, Port Neches, Amarillo, and Jackson-ville from 1950 to 1961. One year during that stint, 1957, he coached under the Bear at Texas A&M, but chose to stay close to him and went back to the high school ranks when Bryant moved to Alabama.

In 1962, Phillips was the head football coach at UT-El Paso (then Texas Western), but he again chose to return to the high school ranks after one season. In 1965, Phillips was named defensive coordinator at the University of Houston, where he gained coaching fame for his defensive strategy.

Bum remained at Houston until 1967, when he received his first call into professional football, from Sid Gillman. Gillman, then head coach at San Diego, brought Phillips in as defensive coordinator and he stayed there until 1971, when Sid stepped down as head coach.

Phillips was defensive coordinator at SMU in 1972, when the Mustangs had the best defensive record in the Southwest Conference. He moved on to Oklahoma State in 1973 in a similar capacity before receiving another call from Gillman.

He was named defensive coordinator of the Oilers in March of 1974 and his defensive team became the main

ingredient in Houston's turnaround season.

"You've got to move if you want to be a head coach at the highest level," said Phillips. "You can't wait a year or the job might not be there. Moving around has been tough on my family, and I hate to move, but I wanted to be a head coach in pro football. This is where I always wanted to be, at the best level."

Phillips and his wife, Helen, have three children at home — Dee Jean, 18, Andrea, 16, and Kim Ann, 9. The Phillips' also have two married daughters, Susan Reeves of Orange and Cicely Springer of Houston. Bum's only son, Wade, is an assistant coach with the Houston Oilers. Coach Phillips and Helen have two grandchildren.

THE 1976 OILERS

Only two teams - Pittsburgh and Cincinnati - managed to beat Coach Bum Phillips' initial Houston Oilers team in 1975 but it was enough to bump the Oilers into third place in the Central Division of the American Football Conference with a 10 - 4 - 0 record.

A victory in either of the four games with Pitt or Cincy might well have put the Oilers in the playoffs but still Phillips' warriors have come a long way since 1973. Houston started its turnaround in '74 by winning six of its last eight games to finish with a 7 - 7 - 0 mark.

"Overall we've got to be better simply because of maturity throughout the team," said Phillips about the 1976 Oilers. "Offensively, we should really be more mature since we had a lot of people who were inexperienced in '75."

"We've added depth at wide receiver, tight end and in the offensive line," added Phillips. "The addition of John Hadl will give us possibly the finest one-two depth at quar-terback in the business and John is a tremendous leader. The young offensive linemen have talent and will either make it or push the backup people now into being better football players. Otis Taylor can really be a plus for the offense.

"Maturity will be the biggest thing in the offensive line," explained Phillips. "Tackle Greg Sampson will be starting his third season and the guards - Ron Saul and Ed Fisher played together for the first time last year. Saul managed to escape injuries for the first time in his career and Fisher had never played guard before."

"Carl Mauck really gave us a lift at center, not only with his spirited play but also as a team leader," added Phillips. "He really took charge of the offensive line after we got him in a trade with San Diego. And Don Hardeman should be a better back in '76 but will have to avoid those injuries

he encountered in '75."

The defense speaks for itself. It was number one in the AFC against the rush and everybody is back plus all-pro cornerback Ken Ellis, who the Oilers got in a trade with Green Bay, Ellis and Hadl came from Green Bay in a trade for quarterback Lynn Dickey. Also veteran people like Mike Weger and Tim Rossovich have to give the defense

added strength.

"Everybody is back. We've added Ken Ellis. And it will be the third year that this defensive group has been playing the three-man front," said Phillips. "All those factors have to make our defensive outlook very bright. The defensive unit is still very young and has a lot to learn. We expect excellent competition from several positions in '76. Our linebacking has to be the strongest part of our defense and the entire group is young. Steve Kiner, Gregg Bingham, Ted Washington and Robert Brazile are really still learning to play their positions."

"Ellis will have to give us more strength at cornerback and a physically fit Bubba Smith will be a shot-in-the-arm to the defensive line," added Phillips. "It will be hard for many of the new players to break into the defensive unit but that's what makes a good football team - great com-

petition for positions."

THE OFFENSE BY POSITIONS:

OFFENSIVE LINE

Center Carl Mauck came to the Oilers in a trade in '75 with San Diego and he was a solidifying force in the offensive line. Not only a tremendous competitor but a superb leader, Mauck was the ring leader of the line which showed tremendous improvement in '75 The 6-5, 250-pound, eight-year vet from Southern Illinois anchored the offensive line which cut quarterback sacks from 33 in '74 to 27 in '75 and produced an improved ground game,

With the loss of backup center Fred Hoaglin through the ex-pansion draft, the Oilers must find another deep snapper. Hoaglin was one of the best in the NFL. Behind Mauck there will be veteran Ronnie Carroll (6-3, 265), who has played both defensive end and offensive guard during his career with the Oilers. He was injured early in '75 and did not play but will be moved to center in '76. Also there's Ricky Seeker (6-3, 245), a 17th round draft choice in

'75 from Texas A&M back for another shot.

Last year's two starting guards — Ron Saul (6-2, 255) and Ed Fisher (6-3, 250) — performed well, especially since it was practically their rookie season at the position. Saul, a seven-year vet, was unable to play a full season until '75 due to injury and Fisher had been moved from defensive end. Conway Hayman (6-3, 262) played well as the backup and could even be moved to tackle in '76. There's a couple of dandy rookie guards on hand to challenge the veterans in Grambling's Bobby Simon (6-3, 252) and Oklahoma State's Larry Harris (6-3, 274). Also Kevin Hunt, the five-year vet from Doane, might be moved from tackle to guard to take advantage of his abilities. Hunt (6-5, 260) played well helping rockle systems. tage of his abilities. Hunt (6-5, 260) played well behind tackle starters Greg Sampson and Elbert Drungo in '75.

Sampson (6-6, 265) begins his third season at offensive tackle and should really begin to develop the consistency needed to rank with the top offensive tackles in the NFL. Drungo (6-4, 265) has been one of the more consistent tackles in the AFC for the past few seasons. There is another crop of good looking rookie hopefuls at tackle in Todd Simonsen (6-4, 287) of South Dakota State, Larry Bell (6-2, 291) of East Texas State and John Reimer (6-3, 265) of

Wisconsin.

TIGHT END

Tight end has to be stronger in '76, mainly because of the quality people battling for the position. Starter Mack Alston (6-3, 230) returns from a good season in '75 although he was slowed at times with nagging injuries. John Sawyer (6-2, 230) had a good rookie season but missed the final six games with a knee injury but should be ready in '76.

Veteran help could come from Larry Mialik (6-2, 230), a fiveyear vet who was signed as a free agent. Mialik was a starter for Atlanta but was injured and wasn't protected. Also there's the Oilers' top draft choice - Mike Barber (6-2, 235) from Louisiana Tech. Barber has the speed to play either wide receiver or tight end

and has outstanding potential.

WIDE RECEIVER

You have to start with Ken Burrough (6-4, 210), the only receiver in the NFL to catch passes for 1,000 yards. The Texas Southern great grabbed 53 passes for 1,053 yards and eight TD's in '76 for his finest year. His catches went for an average of 20.1 yards per catch. There's little doubt that Burrough is the equal of any wide receiver in the NFL and the seven-year pro has to head the list when it comes to deep threats.

The other starter is little Billy Johnson. Billy "White Shoes" has captured the hearts of the NFL fans in two short years, not only with thrilling punt and kickoff returns, but with his pass receiving as well. "White Shoes" tied the all-time NFL record for TD's by returns with four in '76 and missed a record-setting fifth by one yard against San Francisco. Billy caught 37 passes for 393 yards and one TD in '76. His punt returns for TD's were 52 yards against Detroit, 83 yards against Miami and 63 yards against Cincinnati. His kickoff return for 81 yards against Cleveland went all the way for a TD. Johnson is the tallest 5-9, 170-pounder in the NFL.

There is some excellent talent returning in addition to Burrough and Johnson, headed by second-year pro Emmett Edwards (6-1, 187), Jim Beirne (6-2, 208), and Nat Hawkins (6-1, 190), along with Billy Parks (6-1, 190). Also the rookie contingent is outstanding with Steve Largent (5-11, 184) from Tulsa, Dan O'Rourke (5-10, 194) from Colorado State and speedster Allen Mischer (6-2, 175) from Louisiana State. Free agent Melvin Baker (6-0, 182), an eighth round draft choice of Miami in '74, could be a threat with his speed.

Edwards should be vastly improved over his rookie year and the former Kansas great has excellent potential to become a solid wide receiver. Edwards has 9.3 speed in the 100. Veteran Beirne has recovered from an ankle injury and appears to have regained his quickness, thus making him a valuable asset both as a receiver and a

special teams performer.

Largent, who is in the top eight students academically at Tulsa, reminds Oiler coaches of another Tulsa great, Howard Twilley, except he has better size and speed. Largent runs great patterns, has superb hands and is a fierce competitor. O'Rourke has great speed as does Mischer, who could be a surprise although he only participated in track at LSU.

An off-season trade brought twelve-year veteran wide receiver Otis Taylor to the Oilers and his vast experience and tremendous abilities have to be an asset to the receiver corps. It will give the Oilers another big target (6-3, 215). The former Prairie View great missed all but one game last year, with Kansas City, but his damaged knee has fully recovered. Also veteran Mike Montgomery, injured in '74 after having a superb game against St. Louis with nine catches for 179 yards, is back after sitting out the '75 campaign.

QUARTERBACKS

With the addition of veteran John Hadl, quarterback has to be one of the strongest positions for the Oilers. Dan Pastorini proved in '75 that he could win football games and Hadl has proven over the past fourteen years that he is a winning quarterback. The two make for a perfect situation. Both Pastorini and Hadl have tremendous leadership qualities and great attitudes.

Pastorini had his most productive season with fourteen TD passes and 2,053 yards through the air in '75. Hadl finished the '75 season as the third most productive passer in NFL history and the fifteen-year vet from Kansas ranks fourth in the NFL with 237 TD

passes.

As Coach Phillips puts it — "We've got a proven quarterback (Pastorini) and another quarterback (Hadl) who will compete and that makes for a great situation. Both are concerned with the success of the team and will do anything it takes for the betterment of the team."

In addition to Pastorini and Hadl, there are also two other quarterback hopefuls on hand in veteran Charles Napper (6-1, 195) and rookie Steve Kincanon, a 6-4, 228-pounder from Humboldt State with a strong arm.

Coleman had his finest season as a pro, leading the team in rushing with 790 yards, five touchdowns and a fine 4.5 average per carry. Willis added 420 yards but was hampered by nagging injuries early in the year. Rookie Don Hardeman picked up 648 yards, scored five TD's and had a 3.9 average per carry but still hasn't proven himself over the long haul. Hardeman (6-2, 235) was one of Houston's two number one picks in '75 but was slowed by injuries.

Veterans Willie Rodgers (6-1, 210) and Tank Holmes (5-9, 220) have worked hard in the off-season and should have a good year in 76. Free agents James Ford (6-1, 220) and Robert Hunt (6-2, 205) could add depth as could former University of Houston fullback Jim Strong (6-0, 218). Strong has played with San Francisco and New

Orleans.

Rookie Alvin (Skip) Walker of Texas A&M is the lone draft choice and is a solid running back, The 5-9, 184-pounder was Texas A&M's fastest back, catches the ball well and is also a return specialist. Veteran Warren McVea signed as a Free Agent and could give the Oilers excellent outside speed.

THE DEFENSE BY POSITIONS:

DEFENSIVE LINE

Last year's top six performers are still around headed by starters Elvin Bethea, Curley Culp and Tody Smith. Bethea and Culp were both All-Pro and played in the Pro Bowl game as did offensive players Ken Burrough, Billy Johnson and Dan Pastorini. Tody Smith, although plagued by nagging injuries, had perhaps his finest season in '75.

Culp, the burly middle guard, was named NFL's top defensive player by the NEA and won the George Halas Trophy for the honor. Bethea (6-2, 260) had his finest season as an Oiler, and along with Culp (6-1, 265) and Tody Smith (6-5, 250) will be beginning their third year as the ramrods of Phillips' three-man defensive line and the success has been overwhelming. Since Culp joined the club in a trade with Kansas City in '74, the Oilers have won 16 games and lost but six.

But the beauty of the situation is that when Phillips goes with the second unit of Bubba Smith (6-7, 265), John Little (6-3, 250), and Jim White (6-4, 255), it is just as effective. Bubba Smith could be back to his old self in '76 since it appears that it will really be the first year in the last four seasons that he will be physically ready to

play a season.

With the six veterans returning, things don't look too promising for three newcomers although there is good talent in the trio. Albert Burton (6-5, 270) was a late cut by Dallas in '75, Mike Walker (6-4, 235) played excellent ball in Canada and Carter Campbell (6-3, 250) has played with two other NFL teams. It should make for excellent competition.

Linebacking might well be the strongest position on the squad with four outstanding performers on hand. In Gregg Bingham, Steve Kiner, Ted Washington and Robert Brazile, the NFL's defensive Rookie of the Year in '75, Phillips has one of the best foursomes in the NFL and they are all young.

It'll be the second year for the group as a unit and the maturity factor could be amazing. Bingham (6-1, 230) has started every game since his rookie year and teams with Kiner (6-1, 220) to make things tough in the middle. Washington (6-1, 245) and Brazile (6-4, 240) have that rare ingredient that makes the four linebacker system so successful - size of defensive ends and speed of linebackers.

Behind the starters are excellent players in Ted Thompson (6-1, 220) who has upped his value to the team by working double duty as a punter and kicker, Duane Benson (6-2, 225), the old pro of the backers with ten years experience, and Guy Roberts (6-1, 220). Like the starters, the backup men have excellent quickness and speed.

Newcomers Art Stringer (6-1, 223) of Ball State, Mike Lemon (6-2, 220) of Kansas and Claude Johnson (6-0, 230) of Florida A&M

all have fine potential but unfortunately are coming into a "loaded"

Add to this a formidable group, eight-year veteran Tim Rossovich (6-4, 240) and the linebacking corps becomes even more awe-some in '76. Rossovich was in the WFL in '75 after going from Philadelphia to San Diego in '74. His vast experience should be a valuable asset to the Oiler defenses.

DEFENSIVE SECONDARY

With everybody from the '75 unit back plus All-Pro Ken Ellis on hand, the Oilers' defensive secondary has to be stronger. Cornerback Willie Alexander (6-3, 190) and Zeke Moore (6-3, 195) did good jobs in '75 and rookie Greg Stemrick (5-11, 185) developed fast. This trio along with Ellis should give the Oilers their strongest cornerback situation in years.

Alexander, who lacks the burning speed of some cornerbacks, makes up for it with savvy and had possibly his finest season in '75. Alexander displayed outstanding consistency throughout '75. Moore, the ten-year vet, was not quite as consistent but has more experience than anyone in the Oiler secondary. Ellis (5-10, 190) starts his seventh year and has all the credentials to really give the

Oiler secondary a boost.

The Oilers added veteran strong safety Mike Weger, the eight-year vet who played out his option with Detroit and signed with Houston as a free agent. The mere presence of Weger and Ken Ellis have to improve the Oiler secondary tremendously simply from the experience standpoint alone. Weger (6-2, 200) should be an excellent steadying influence on Houston's younger defensive backs like

C. L. Whittington and Willie Germany,

The safeties are Willie Germany (6-0, 192) and C. L. Whittington (6-1, 200) with veteran Bob Atkins (6-4, 210) as the backup. Whittington should really come into his own in '76 after going through a learning process in '75. The third-year pro from Prairie View has it all but just needs the experience to become one of the outstanding free safeties in the NFL. Germany played in his first year as a starter at strong safety in '75. There are two free agent safeties who have played with other NFL teams on hand in Ken Pope (6-0, 205) from Oklahoma, and Preston Anderson (6-1, 180) from Rice, Leading prospect in the secondary looks like a young rookie from Cheyney State by the name of Bobby Byers. Byers (6-1, 185) has tremendous athletic ability but is from a small school and consequently lacks experience.

Butler kicked quite well considering a slight pull during the early part of the season. Ted Thompson is also a punter and place kicker, a chore he did while in college at Southern Methodist, while Butler and quarterback John Hadl can also punt if needed. Free agent rookie Terry Magee from Nicholls State will be in for a look-see also. Magee is both a place kicker and punter.

Potent Washington running game was held to only 58 yards. The Skins had another field goal but elected to take a penalty and the Oilers intercepted on the next play.

AT HOUSTON (20) MIAMI (19) - November 16 - A spectacular seven-vard run by Ronnie Coleman with just over one minute left in the ball game gave the Houston Oilers a thrilling 20-19 triumph over the Miami Dolphins before a standing-room-only crowd of 51,755 in the Astrodome. Coleman took a pitchout around the right end, broke at least five tackles and plunged into the end zone to cap one of the most thrilling games in Oiler history.

Houston took a 6 - 0 lead on Skip Butler field goals of 43 and 25 yards but Miami tied it in the second quarter on a 26-yard pass from Bob Griese to Jim Mandich. Bubba Smith blocked the extra point. Billy Johnson tied the all-time NPL record for touchdowns by returns when he rammed a Dolphin punt back 83 yards for a score in the third quarter to give the Oilers a 13 - 6 lead. It was Johnson's fourth (three on punts and one on a kickoff) return for a TD in '75.

Miami scored late in the third quarter to tie it at 13-13 and then went ahead, 19-13, with 2:52 gone in the fourth quarter. Greg Sampson and Bubba Smith blocked the extra point. 

Set new records for returns including 90-yard TD gallop with punt. Oilers had five players — Curley Culp, Elvin Bethea, Ken Burrough, Dan Pastorini and Billy Johnson. Pastorini passed 64 yards to Burrough for AFC score.

January 30 — Oiler assistant coach Sam Boghosian resigns to accept coaching position with expansion team Seattle.

February 4 — Oiler assistant Larry Peccatiello resigns to accept coaching position with expansion team Seattle.

February 10 — Wade Phillips, son of Head Coach Bum Phillips, named to Oiler coaching staff as linebacker coach. Phillips had been an assistant at University of Kansas.

March 15 — Veteran coach Ken McCullough named offensive line coach by Bum Phillips, McCullough had been coaching in Canada for the past five seasons.

April 1 — Oilers lose Fred Hoaglin, Mark Cotney and Jesse O'Neal in NFL expansion draft.

April 2 — Oilers trade quarterback Lynn Dickey to Green Bay for quarterback John Hadl, cornerback Ken Ellis, draft choices and cash. One of the biggest trades in Houston Oiler history.

April 9 — Oilers make Mike Barber of Louisiana Tech their number one pick in the 1976 college draft. Oilers did not have first round selection, so Barber was picked in 2nd round or 48th player in draft selected. Barber is a tight end.

June 1 — Oilers acquire veteran wide receiver Otis Taylor from Kansas City for future draft choice.

June 20 — Oilers sign veteran safety Mike Weger, who played out his option with Detroit after eight seasons.



HOUSTON OILERS' 1976 RADIO NETWORK

Ron Franklin and Ron Stone rejoined forces in 1974 to give the Houston Oilers the finest broadcasting team in the National Football League. And in 1976, things will be bigger and better with the expansion of the Oiler network.

KTRH Radio has taken over as the originating station and in addition to the 50,000-watt Houston based station, the Oilers will have two other 50,000-watt stations — WOAI in San Antonio and KWKH in Shreveport, Louisiana, on the network along with WRR in Dallas. It will be the finest broadcasting setup in Houston Oilers' history.

Franklin, Sports Director of KHOU-TV, Channel 11, the CBS affiliate in Houston, and Stone, anchorman for KPRC-TV news, Channel 2, the NBC affiliate in Houston, formerly worked together at Channel 11 when Stone was anchorman on the news there. Both served apprenticeships in Tul-

sa before coming to Houston.

With Franklin providing the play-by-play commentary and Stone doing the color announcing and locker room shows, Oilers' fans have come to recognize the dynamic duo as one of the finest in the NFL. Franklin, who is really into sports, especially the Oilers, has come into his own as one of the finest play-by-play commentators in the country. Stone, known more for his news prowess, although he has broadcast sports events all over the Southwest, is the witty, more objective of the duo, and together they form a great combination of play calling and objectivity.

The Astrodome

The Astrodome is more than a Stadium - it's a way of treating eople. Sparkling like a rare jewel on a one-time Houston swamp,

ne Astrodome is the Taj Mahal of all stadia.

This colossal amphitheatre, built at a cost of \$38,000,000, is ocated seven miles from downtown Houston, and is served by a dius of roads making it easily the most accessible stadium in the orld.

It's the first all-purpose, weather-free, combined sports stadium nd convention hall and is etched 208 feet against the Texas sky. he Astrodome is tall enough to contain the 18-story Shamrock-litton Hotel in Houston, or the Atlantic City Convention Hall, or le San Francisco Cow Palace with room to spare.

The patrons of the Astrodome sit in almost regal splendor, in

The patrons of the Astrodome sit in almost regal splendor, in lush-type opera seats, protected overhead by a permanent transicent roof with 4,596 plastic skylights and in a temperature of 72

egrees controlled by 6,600 tons of air conditioning

The Astrodome has 45,000 seats for baseball, 50,000 for footall, 60,000 for conventions and 66,000 for boxing matches. The

strodome attracts more than 4 million persons annually.

The Astrodome has the world's largest electrical scoreboard and eatures all pertinent sports information plus an electrical show that asts over 40 seconds when the home team scores. The scoreboard is daptable to all spectator sports and is 474 feet long and four stories igh, and weighs 300 tons.

Built at a cost of \$2 million, the scoreboard has 50,000 electric ght bulbs and is controlled by a 25-ft. console board in the press

ox, operated by a staff of six technicians and a producer.

There is parking for 30,000 cars and eight traffic arteries radiate

om the circular stadium in every direction.

The Astrodome is the nation's only stadium with lights connuously around the perimeter of the structure. There are 1,906 tandard floodlights of 1,500 watts each, mounted on a catwalk ircling the inner rim of the dome, 145 feet above the playing field.

Restaurant facilities in the Astrodome surpass anything ever beore incorporated in any stadium in the world. There are five seprate restaurants, exclusive of the concession stands, capable of andling 3,280 persons at one sitting. Two of the five are private lubs and the other three are open to the general public. In addition here are 49 concession stands, clearly marked and evenly distibuted on the six seating levels of the stadium.
