K. S. "Bud" ADAMS, Jr. President - Owner

The name Kenneth Stanley Adams, Jr. has been synonymous with sports and diversified business interests in the Southwest for over twenty years.

One of the conceivers and founders of the American Football League back in 1959, Bud Adams had played a major role in bringing big league sports to the city of Houston and the Gulf Coast area.

As sole owner of the Houston Oilers since the team's inception, Adams has seen his team win two AFL championships and four division titles since 1960.

Although professional football has been the dominant force in Adams' sports endeavors, he was a stockholder in the Houston Sports Association and worked diligently to bring major league baseball to Houston. He also fielded a basketball team – Ada Oilers – in the powerful National Industrial Basketball League and has been involved in professional boxing at various times.

Sports and football in particular, is only one of his many successful endeavors. On February 22, 1946, Bud Adams started his business career in Houston after serving 3 years in the Navy Air Corp during World War II.

On June 3, 1947, his company was incorporated under the laws of the State of Delaware, as Ada Oil Company. Through an exchange offer effective March 31, 1974, Ada Resources, Inc. was formed. Today, Bud Adams is chairman of Bud Adams Enterprises, and chairman of Ada Resources, Inc. – the keystone of Adams' interest.

Adams heads a business complex of 15 companies engaged in the oil business, farming and ranching, automobile sales, real estate, securities and several other related interests.

One of Adams' farming interests is the River Garden Farms Company, one of the largest irrigated farms in the United States, located in the Sacramento River Valley of California.

Born in Bartlesville, Oklahoma, Adams attended grade and junior high schools in that city and later went to Culver Military Academy, where he won letters in football, basketball and baseball.

Majoring in petroleum engineering, Adams attended his first year of college at Menlo College in Menlo Park, California. He won letters in football and rugby.

In 1941, Adams transferred to the University of Kansas to continue his studies in petroleum engineering. He also lettered in football and was a member of Sigma Chi Fraternity.

While at Kansas, Adams joined the Naval Reserve and in 1944 was selected for Officer Midshipman School and was later commissioned an ensign in the U.S. Naval Reserve. After further training, Adams joined a Pacific Fleet Carrier Aircraft Service Unit, where he was an engineering officer at an aviation repair installation.

Following V-J Day, Adams was sent to a Naval Air Station in Norman, Oklahoma, and later to Washington, D.C. as an aide to the Commanding Officer of the U.S. Navy's Congressional Liaison Office. He was later honorably discharged in 1946.

After his discharge, Adams moved to Houston, entered the oil business and became one of the city's leading sports figures.

In recognition of his knowledge and experience, Adams was name to the board of trustees of the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. He participates in a wide variety of civic and charitable activities and is currently serving as 1978 Campaign Chairman of the Texas Gulf Coast Chapter of the Leukemia Society of America. He also has been honored as Houston's "Salesman of the Year", "Sportsman of the Year", and "Westerner of the Year."

#### O.A. PHILLIPS

#### Head Coach - General Manager

In January of 1975, O.A. "Bum" Phillips was named the Head Coach and General Manager of the Houston Oilers. At the time he was an "unknown" to football fans throughout the nation, but was hardly "unknown" to the men in the coaching fraternity.

And, now Burn isn't an "unknown" to anyone.

His Houston Oilers made a run at the Pittsburgh Steelers in the AFC Central Division in his first season, and on the way they captured the imagination of fans around the country who were pulling for Bum and his hustling football team.

The Oilers didn't quite make it to the playoffs in 1975the 10-4 record marked the first time since the playoffs were initiated that ten wins didn't qualify a team-but the Oilers came of age, and Bum became the toast of the NFL.

Who is this man who won the hearts of his players and the admiration of fans everywhere?

Paul "Bear" Bryant says of Bum, "He has a keen football mind, knows how to deal with and motivate people, and has a great deal of football imagination." Darrell Royal calls him "a coach's coach whose defensive innovations have spread throughout the country." Hayden Fry says, "He is a great teacher because he takes into consideration the mental and physical limitations of each individual player and then motivates them to perform well above their capabilities. He cares for his players as if they were his own children."

And, University of Houston coach Bill Yeoman said, "Bum's extreme professional qualifications and dedication to the game are unequaled."

The crew-cut, folksy, sit-a-spell coach of the Oilers sluffs off the credit for success. "It's the people who play the game and the assistant coaches who get them ready. That is what wins football games," Bum declares.

It is rather ironic that if Bum had not had a squabble with a supervisor at his refinery job, following a three year tour of combat with the Marines in World War II, the Oilers might not be blessed with his talents today.

When told to donate to a certain charity, Bum declined, asking instead to be able to donate to another charity. He was told no, so Bum said, "In that case, tell the man at the gate to have my check ready. I'm leaving."

Newly married, 21-years old, equipped with a high school diploma and untrained for anything but jungle warfare, Bum left the plant wondering what he was going to do.

"My idea of a permanent job was to hire on at a refinery and work there until I retired. That's what just about everyone else in our part of the country did after high school." "I had no idea what to do after I quit. I just climbed into my pickup and started driving home.

"On the way I passed Lamar College (now Lamar University). There were some people practicing football. I stopped to watch, and the coach came over and asked me if I was interested in trying out. I told him I was just watching."

The coach persuaded Phillips to try out, then talked him into accepting a scholarship.

"I really wasn't that interested," Bum recalls. "I figured it would be something to do until I got a good job."

That was 32 years ago and Bum, now 53, has risen to the top level of the coaching profession. Opposing coaches wish Bum had made the donation.

Bum-the nickname was bestowed on him by his younger sister Edrina whose attempts to say brother emerged as "Bumble" and later, when her vocabulary improved, to "Bum"-doesn't care about images. He is just himself.

He wears cowboy boots, western style clothes, is a super countrywestern music lover, but that isn't anything new just because he is now in the limelight. He's always been that way.

He hates to lose, but the few times it happens, he takes the blame. He loves to win, but after every Oiler win, he refuses the credit, giving it instead to his staff and players.

Bum loves his family, his life, and his job. His wife Helen is the mother of Bum's six children. Two are still at home, Andrea, 18; and Kim Ann, 11. Daughter Dee Jean, 20, is a sophomore at Sam Houston State University. They have three married children, Susan Reeves of Orange, Cicely Springer of Houston, and son Wade, an assistant coach with the Oilers.

Bum says he learned to appreciate life during the war.

"You'd talk to someone one day, and he'd be dead the next. Maybe even the same day."

"Somebody didn't walk up to you and say, 'Oh, so-and -so's dead,' either. You'd see the fellow. I hope people today don't have to see death to appreciate life."

Oh yeah, there is one thing we forgot to tell you about Bum.

He's a real softie. Anytime his two year old grand-daughter Tracy can't get what she wants from her parents Laurie and Wade Phillips, she knows just where to go—and like grandpa, she's got one heckuva winning percentage.

Appointed additional duties and title of General Manager on February 14, 1977 succeeding Sid Gillman in both capacities.... Named defensive coordinator of the Houston Oilers March 7, 1974 .... Was defensive coordinator of the San Diego Chargers, 1967-71.

**COLLEGE:** Head coach at University of Texas at El Paso 1962... Defensive coordinator at University of Houston 1965-67... Assistant coach at Texas A&M 1957... Defensive coordinator at Southern Methodist University 1972... Defensive coordinator at Oklahoma State University 1973.

**PERSONAL:** Born September 29, 1923 in Orange, Texas . . . . Played high school football at Beaumont French High School . . . . Played college football at Lamar Junior College and Stephen F. Austin State University . . . Combat veteran of the U.S. Marine Corps during World War II . . . . Coached high school football at Nederland, Texas, Port Neches, Texas, Amarillo, Texas and Jacksonville, Texas . . . . Voted Texas Pro Coach of the Year in 1975 . . . . He and his wife Helen are the parents of six children, two married daughters, Susan Reeves of Orange, Texas and Cicely Springer of Houston, and one married son, Wade, defensive line coach with the Oilers. Daughters Dee Jean, 20, is a sophomore at Sam Houston State University, with Andrea, 18, and Kim Ann, 11, at home.

# ED BILES Defensive Coordinator

**PROFESSIONAL:** Initiated NFL career with New Orleans Saints in 1969 as Administrative Coordinator under head coach Tom Fears.... The following season he was named defensive backfield coach.... In 1971 Biles joined the New York Jets as an assistant coach, '72 and '73 he coached the Jets defensive backs working under Weeb Ewbank .... In February, 1974,

Biles came to the Houston Oilers as a defensive assistant, the following year head coach Bum Phillips named Biles defensive coordinator. . . Tutoed safety Burgess Owens with the Jets to a first team berth on the All-NFL Rookie team . . . . Has played a big role in the development of free agent Ted Washington who is rated among the top linebackers in pro ball . . . . As defensive coordinator with the Oilers, Houston's defense finished the 1975 season first in the National Football League in rushing defense with allowing just 3.4 yards a play . . . . The Oilers finished 8th in the NFL in passing defense in 1976 allowing just 137 yards a game . . . . The club finished 4th in the NFL in quarterback sacks in 1975 with 45, and 3rd in 1976 with 50, both club records . . . . Three Oiler players have won all-pro honors under Biles in the past two campaigns, outside linebacker Robert Brazile, middle guard Curley Culp, and defensive end Elvin Bethea.

**COLLEGE:** Began his collegiate coaching career as Freshmen coach at Xavier of Ohio in 1956 . . . . Served as an assistant until 1962 when he was named to the head coaching post . . . Compiled an overall 40-27-3 record . . . . Named Catholic Coach of the Year in 1965 after Xavier finished with an 8-2 record . . . . While at Xavier, he coached future NFL greats Dan Abramowicz, WR, and OG John Shinners, the Saints 1st draft choice in '69 and presently playing with the Cincinnati Bengals. . . . Guided Xavier University's Freshman team to a four year 16-4 record including a pair of unbeaten and untied campaigns.

**PERSONAL:** .... Born in Glendale, Ohio .... Four sport standout at Reading High in Reading, Ohio .... Football, baseball, basketball and track .... Attended Miami University on an athletic scholarship .... Played under Ara Parseghian and was a teammate with John McVay present head coach of the New York Giants .... While at Miami he served as baseball coach and as a graduate assistant football coach .... Has lectured at numerous clinics throughout the nation .... Enjoys golf .... Married to the former Jackie Price of Covington, Kentucky ..... Four children; Jim, Jay, Mike and Sharon .... Resides in Missouri City, Texas.

# KEN SHIPP

Offensive Coordinator PROFESSIONAL: Started NFL career with St. Louis Cardinals in 1968 as quarterback and receivers coach under head coach Charlie Winner . . . Highly instrumental in developing QB Jim Hart, the most proficient passer in St. Louis history and worked closely with receivers Jackie Smith and John Gilliam . . . After three seasons in St. Louis, 1968-

69-70, Shipp joined the New Orleans Saints as QB and receivers coach under J.D. Roberts . . . . Tutored Archie Manning his first two years in the NFL . . . . Manning finished second in the League in yards gained passing his second season . . . In 1973, Shipp joined the New York Jets as QB and receivers coach under Weeb Ewbank . . . In 1974 new head coach Charlie Winner named Shipp his offensive coordinator . . . . Shipp served as head coach of the Jets for the final five games of the 1975 season . . . . With New York he worked very closely with Joe Namath and receivers Rich Caster and Jerome Barkum . . . . In 1976 he moved to the Detroit Lions where he was the offensive coordinator and QB and receivers coach under Rick Forzano . . . . Shipp coached in the Canadian Football League for one year, 1959-60, at Montreal under Perry Moss as QB and receivers coach . . . . In January 1977, Houston coach Bum Phillips named Shipp offensive coordinator for the Oilers.

coordinator for the Oilers. COLLEGE: Began college coaching career at Middle Tennessee in 1951 as receivers coach . . . . Moved to Trinity in 1953 and served as receivers coach through 1957 .... In 1958, he tutored the receivers at Florida State, working with Tony Romeo before he joined the New England Patriots and became one of the AFL's standout tight ends .... In 1961 Shipp joined the staff at Tulsa, where he recruited Howard Twilley from Galena Park High in Houston and assisted in the acquisition of QB Jerry Rhome . . . . Twilley and Rhome established a complete new slate of NCAA passsing records, led the Hurricanes to the Missouri Valley Conference Title in 1962 and the Bluebonnet Bowl Title in '64 . . . . In 1963 Shipp served as QB and receivers coach at South Carolina working with QB Dan Reeves who later became an All-Pro running back and is presently an assistant coach with the Dallas Cowboys .... In 1968 and 70 Shipp coached the QB's and receivers at Miami, Florida, working under Charlie Tate . . . . He was with Miami in '68 when they were ranked Number 1 in the nation through most of the season and played in the Blue Bonnet Bowl . . . . The following year Miami went on to win the Liberty Bowl.

**PERSONAL:** .... Born in Murfreesboro, Tennessee .... Played football and baseball at Central High in Murfreesboro .... Attended Middle Tennessee State University on an athletic scholarship .... Hobbies: golf, tennis and swimming.... Resides in Quail Valley, Texas.

and a half with the Philadelphia Eagles and one half season with the Minnesota Vikings . . . Best season was '63, completed 91 of 186 for 1213 yards and 10 TD's . . . . Finished career with a 42.2 yard punting average . . . . Throughout career always had his best games against the Dallas Cowboys . . . . Served as Vice President of the Players Association and was team rep for 11 years . . . . Served on the Executive Committee which negotiated the first collective bargaining agreement between the players and the NFL.

**COLLEGE:** A three sport standout at Rice . . . All-American QB, seeded second on the golf team behind Jay Riviere and a three year starter on the basketball team . . . . Played QB and DB for three years . . . Shared QB duties with Frank Ryan . . . . Teammates included WR Buddy Dial and OT J.D. Smith . . . . Tutored under coach Jess Neely . . . Named football MVP by teammates and Houston Post MVP . . . . Captain in College All-Star game . . . . Played in '58 Hula Bowl against Pro's, intercepted one pass against idol Tobin Rote . . . . Recently inducted into the Rice Hall of Fame.





## GAME 4 - HOUSTON 27, PITTSBURGH 10 October 9, 1977 at THE ASTRODOME

The Houston Oilers came to play, and in what turned out to be the "Pain Bowl" took over first place in the American Football Con-ference Central Division with a 27-10 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Three quarterbacks, Houston's Dan Pastorini, and Pittsburgh's Terry Bradshaw and Mike Kruczek, all departed the scene before the game was completed. Pastorini suffered a badly sprained right ankle, Bradshaw a fractured left wrist, and Kruczek a right shoulder seperation in the hard-hitting battle.

In all, the Houston defense intercepted six Pittsburgh passes, four off the arm of Bradshaw, and recovered three fumbles, one returned for a touchdown by cornerback Greg Stemrick, while offensively Pastorini hit Billy Johnson for a 51-yard bomb, Billy's first reception of the season, and running back Ronnie Coleman con-nected with Ken Burrough for 44 yards and a score on a halfback pass. Kicker Toni Fritsch added a pair of field goals. After spotting Houston a 7-0 lead on the Coleman to Burrough con-nection, Pittsburgh took a 10-7 halftime lead on a one-yard run by Bocky Bleier that canned a seven play 82-yard drive and a 27-yard

Rocky Bleier that capped a seven play 82-yard drive and a 27-yard Roy Gerela field goal. But, Houston got the lead back on the Pastorini to Johnson score in the third quarter, added seven more points with the Stemrick fumble recovery and closed out the scoring with the last of Fritsch's two field goals.

The win gave Houston a 3-1 season slate and sole possession of first place in the AFC Central while the loss evened Pittsburgh's record at 2-2.

#### GAME 14 - HOUSTON 21, CINCINNATI 16 December 18, at THE ASTRODOME

The Houston Oilers became the Houston Spollers in the final game of the season, beating Cincinnati 21-16, winning second place in the AFC Central Division and avenging an earlier loss to Cincinnati, and the victory also denied the Bengals a trip to the playoffs as represenatives of the AFC Central Division. Cincinnati got the game's first break by recovering a punt that had touched a Houston player on the Oilers' 26-yard line, and moved to Houston six in four plays, but the Oilers stiffened and Cincinnati had to settle for a 28-yard field goal by Chris Bahr with 10:51 left in the opening a 28-yard field goal by Ghits ban with 10-17 fet in the opening period. Tom Dempsey's 27-yard field goal gave the Oilers a 18-13 lead with 9:06 left and a 26-yard Dempsey boot with 6:05 made it 21-13. #### **1978 PLAYING RULE PROPOSALS PASSED**

- Whenever the ball is carried across the line of scrimmage, no legal forward pass can be thrown. 1.
- Clarified the unsportsmanlike conduct rule to include forms of taunting or baiting by players towards opponents as violations at any time during a game. 2.
- Further clarified pass blocking rule interpretation to permit extended arms and open hands. 3
- Permitted defenders to maintain contact on receivers in a five-yard zone beyond the line of scrimmage, but restricted their contact on receivers beyond that point. 4.
- Legalized double touch of a forward pass and made it illegal to bat a pass in flight forward toward opponent's goal line. 5.
- Clarifified officials right not to stop the clock, or if stopped, to run 10 seconds off the clock during the last two minutes of a half when a team deliberately attempts to conserve time. 6.
- Stipulated that a 15-yard penalty be assessed during a down involving a double foul without change of possession when one foul carries a penalty of 15 yards and the other only 5. 7.
- Reduced penalty for intentional grounding in the field of play from a loss of down and 15, to loss of down and ten, and assessed a penalty of a safety when passer illegally grounds the ball in the end zone. 8.
- Reduced 15 yard penalties to 10 yards for all fouls except those involving unnecessary roughness, unsportsmanlike con-duct, personal fouls, disqualification or palpably unfair acts. 9.
- 10. Eliminated hurdling as a foul.
- During last two minutes of a half, placed responsibility on de-fensive team to line up properly when referee signals ready for play after offensive team is set in position. 11.
- 12. Increased crew of game officials from six to seven.
