





K.S. "BUD" ADAMS, JR.

Owner/Chairman of the Board/President



One of Texas' premier business leaders, K.S. "Bud" Adams, Jr., brought professional sports to the Gulf Coast when he founded the Houston Oilers football team. The hard-working and aggressive Adams helped co-found the American Football League (AFL) on August 3, 1959, when the Oilers and the Dallas Texans became the first two major league sports franchises in the state of Texas.

Adams' first love, his Houston Oilers, is a team rich in tradition and pride. The Oilers have been in the playoffs a total of 15 times during their 36-year history, and Adams was the leading force in performing miracles during the early years of the AFL. Adams currently serves on the NFL's Finance Committee and Audit-Sub Committee as well as the Realignment, Hall of Fame and International Committees, and is one of eight Trustees to the NFL Trust.

Adams' Oilers were the dominant team during the early 1960's, winning championships in 1960 and 1961, finishing second in 1962, and making the playoffs in 1967, 1969, 1978, 1979, 1980, 1987, 1988, 1989, 1990, 1991, 1992 and 1993. In fact, the Oilers' streak of seven consecutive playoff appearances (1987-93) was the longest streak in the NFL during that time span. In 1991, Adams' Oilers captured their first-ever AFC Central Division Championship, and the club was a repeat champion in '93.

Over the last year, Adams has led the NFL into the Mid-South region, the last untapped resource without a major professional sport. His planned relocation of the Oilers to Nashville, Tennessee, for the '98 season represents the League's first movement into that region and the state of Tennessee. "It is without a doubt the toughest decision I've ever had to make. Change is difficult. I've lived in Houston for 50 years, worked in the same building for 36 years, and kissed the same woman good night for 50 years. So, this has not been easy," said Adams.

Adams' interest in sports was first displayed while at Culver Military Academy where he earned letters in football, basketball and baseball. Upon graduation from Culver, Adams attended Menlo College (CA), lettering in both rugby and football. Adams then transferred to the engineering school at the University of Kansas where he also lettered in football for the Jayhawks. During his days at KU, Adams began his loyal affiliation with Sigma Chi fraternity.

Adams, a native of Bartlesville, Oklahoma, served in the U.S. Naval Reserve during World War II and was stationed aboard a PAC-Fleet carrier unit where he served as an aviation engineering offi-'96 Houston Oilers, cer. Prior to his discharge in 1946, Lt. jg. Adams served as an aide in the U.S. Navy's Congressional Liaison Office in Washington.

Truly a "man for all seasons," Adams has parlayed a 1946 chance stop in Houston, resulting from fog which grounded his plane, into a highly successful and diversified business empire which ranks him among the prominent businessmen in the country.

Adams incorporated ADA Oil Company, which was a forerunner of the publicly-held American Stock Exchange-listed Adams Resources & Energy, Inc., an energy company engaged in oil and gas exploration, crude oil marketing, intrastate and interstate petrochemical trucking, and wholesale and retail marketing of petroleum products. Adams' diverse business interests include extensive farming and ranching in California and Texas, cattle breeding, cattle feeding, real estate, automobile dealerships and leasing, a travel agency, western art, and Indian artifacts.

During his early business career, Adams was an avid sponsor of amatcur and AAU teams in basketball and softball. His ADA Oilers were a perennial power in the National Industrial Basketball League in the '50s, capturing third place in the national AAU tournament in 1956. His interest in sports has been further manifested by past ownership participation in professional baseball, basketball and boxing.

The unknown side of Bud Adams is his charitable and philanthropic activities that are most often anonymous. In 1995, Adams created and funded the Bill "Mojo" Lackey Memorial Award in honor of the Oilers' longtime equipment assistant who passed away during the season. The annual \$10,000 award (selected by committee) goes to the Oilers employee who most exemplifies the characteristics of "Mojo"; hard work, dedication and loyalty. Last season's recipient was Paul "Hoss" Noska, who donated the award to Houston's Ronald McDonald House. Adams also donated \$5,200 to a little league football team, the Southwest Rangers, that needed funds for uniforms, proper equipment and trophies.

Very active in national, state and local programs, Adams is on the Board of Directors of the Cherokee Indian National Historical Society; the Board of Governors of the Sigma Chi Fraternity Foundation; the Board of Trustees of the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio; the Board of Directors of the Boy Scouts of America, Sam Houston Area Council; the Board of Directors of The Hundred Club of Houston; the Board of Trustees of the Culver Educational Foundation; and is a Lifetime Director of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Adams also spearheaded the drive for construction and operation of the Houston Ronald McDonald House.

Adams has received numerous awards through the years. He was inducted into the Culver Academy's Athletic Hall of Fame in the inaugural class in May of 1994. In June 1991, he was given the Order of Constantine from Sigma Chi, which is the highest honor that fraternity can bestow. In February 1990, he was given Sigma Chi Foundation's Semi-Centennial Award. In January of 1988, he received the prestigious "Golden Buckle Award" by the Greater Houston Convention and Visitor's Bureau, symbolizing "outstanding promotion of Houston as a premier destination." In addition, in October 1987, Adams was recognized with the Distinguished American Award, presented jointly by the Houston Chapter of the National Football Hall of Fame and the Houston Athletic Committee (Chamber of Commerce). Other noteworthy honors bestowed upon Adams in the past have included "Houston Salesman of the Year" in 1960 from the Houston Sales Association, "Mr. Sportsman" in 1961 by the Interfaith Charity Group; "Significant Sig" in 1963 by Sigma Chi Fraternity: "Westerner of the Year" in 1969 by the Houston Farm and Ranch Club; "Distinguished Alumnus" in 1980 from the California Community and Junior College Association; Culver Military Academy's "Man of the Year" in 1981; Financial World Magazine's 1981 "Outstanding Chief Executive Officer;" and "King Capon" in 1983 from Bill Williams' annual Capon Charity Dinner. On Jan. 27, 1994, Floyd Reese was named Executive Vice-President/General Manager for the Oilers. In his two-and-a-half year tenure, Reese has overseen an overhaul of the squad he inherited in Jan. of '94. Of the 53 players then on the roster, only 12 remained heading into training camp in '96. "The single-toughest thing I've faced since becoming the General Manager," said Reese, "was the salary cap situation we were in prior to '94. No team has had to rebuild the way we have due to our salary structure and seven-year run in the playoffs (1987-93). We're part way there, hopefully we can complete the task."

Reese is responsible for all aspects of the Oilers' football operations, including player personnel, scouting and contract negotiations. Reese has spent the last 22 years in professional football, working with four different organizations in capacities ranging from strength and conditioning, to his present position of Executive Vice-President/General Manger.

Reese aided in Jeff Fisher's selection as the 15th head coach of the Oilers and the selection of his coaching staff, and coordinated all aspects of the team's National Football League draft and free agency. Prior to the 1994 season, he served as Houston's Assistant General Manager since 1990. Before joining the Oilers' front office, Reese served as Houston's linebackers coach for four years.

A native of Springfield, Missouri, Reese played linebacker at UCLA from 1966-69, and one season (1970) as a defensive lineman in the CFL. Reese began his coaching career at Liberty Union High In Brentwood, California. He then returned to his alma mater in Westwood as an assistant coach, remaining with the Bruins from 1971-73. Reese ended the collegiate coaching portion of his career with one season at Georgia Tech in 1974.

From 1975-77, Reese was the strength and conditioning coach for the Detroit Lions, Reese then joined the San Francisco 49ers for one season (1978), before being added to Bud Grant's staff as linebackers and special teams coach for the Minnesota Vikings in 1979. He served that role until 1984 when he was elevated to Defensive Coordinator under then-Head Coach Les Steckel. Under Grant in '85, he reassumed the duties of linebackers coach.

Reese is a member of both the UCLA Athletic Hall of Fame and the Liberty Union High Hall of Fame. Born Aug. 8, 1948, Floyd and his wife Sally (4/3/71) have two sons, Jeremy (9/19/76) and Sean (5/16/80), and reside in Sugar Land, Texas.

### **MIKE McCLURE**

**Executive Vice-President/Administration** 



Mike McClure's tenure with the Houston Oilers is spread over ten years, 1979-1981 and 1989-1996. In those ten seasons, the Oilers have qualified for the playoffs eight times.

He's one of a handful of people who've served in top level executive capacities in three major professional sports (NFL, MLB, NBA).

McClure reports directly to Oilers' owner K.S. "Bud" Adams, Jr., and is responsible for the non-football business operations of the franchise. He has negotiated long-term local radio and television contracts for the Oilers and spearheaded the Oilers' training camp move to San Antonio's Trinity University.

Much of McClure's responsibilities fall in the area of strategic planning, and he has been Adam's point man on the Oilers relocation to Nashville, Tennessee for the 1998 season. McClure served as the club's chief negotiator while organizing and overseeing suite sales (110 sold as of June) and PSL sales (46,000 as of June). He also negotiated new radio and television contracts to start in '98.

Following six years in private business, McClure entered the sports field in 1970 as Director of the Big Ten Conference Service Bureau. In 1973, he joined the NBA's Chicago Bulls as Director of Public Relations and Marketing.

In 1979, McClure joined the Oilers as Vice-President of Marketing and Public Relations. He conceived and administered the Oilers' "Luv Ya Blue!" promotion which has been hailed as one of the most successful in sports history.

McClure went to the Chicago White Sox in 1981 as Vice-President of Marketing and in 1983 the White Sox became the first baseball team in Chicago history to draw 2 million fans. In 1983 and 1986, he was honored by Major League Baseball with the coveted Team Marketing Excellence Award and is the only two-time recipient.

He was elevated to Senior Vice-President of Marketing and Broadcasting in 1987 and played a key role in the planning and construction of the new Comiskey Park. He also served on the Board of Directors of Major League Baseball Properties.

McClure has received numerous professional and community awards, is a Significant Sig of Sigma Chi Fraternity, and serves on the Alumni Board of Trustees of his alma mater, DePauw University in Greencastle, Indiana. He was recently inducted into the Hall of Fame of Morgan Park Academy in Chicago.

Mike and his wife, Brenda, have two grown sons (Michael 29, Matthew 26) and reside in Sugar Land, Texas.

**THOMAS S. SMITH** Executive Assistant to the Owner/ Chairman of the Board/President



Thomas S. Smith currently serves as the Executive Vice-President and Chief Operating Officer of KSA Industries, the parent company of the Houston Oilers. In addition to that post, Smith is also the Executive Assistant to K.S. "Bud" Adams, Jr. Smith is involved with the long-range planning for the Oilers' organization and his responsibilities include serving as a liaison in the club's day-to-day operation for Adams. He is also on the Board of Directors of Adams Resources and Energy, Inc. In addition, he takes an active part in helping guide Adams' many business ventures, including his oil and gas investments, automobile dealerships, and farming and ranching interests.

Most recently, Smith has worked closely with the Kansas Citybased Architecture and Engineering firm HOK in the planning and development of a stadium and practice facility in Nashville, Tennessee.

A native of Houston, Smith has been with KSA Industries since 1974, and is a graduate of the University of Texas with a B.B.A. in finance. He worked in banking after graduating and prior to joining KSA Industries.

Among his other activities, Smith is a past president and currently on the Board of Directors of the Houston Ronald McDonald House. He is presently helping coordinate a \$10 million expansion of its (Houston Ronald McDonald House) existing program within the city of Houston. Smith also serves on the Board of Directors of the Red Cross and the Post Oak YMCA, and works closely with the Post Oak Little League. In addition, he is a past chairman of the Steering Committee for the Texas Children's Development Council and is on the Board of Trustees of the Kinkaid School Endowment Fund. Previously, Smith was chapter chairman and a member of the Board of Directors and the Executive Committee for the March of Dimes and served more than 10 years in various capacities for the March of Dimes. In 1986, Smith was the recipient of the Freedom Foundation Certificate of Merit, an annual award presented by a national committee to those who best exemplify citizenship, community awareness and are actively involved in their communities.

Tommy and his wife, Susie, reside in Houston with their son. Stuart, and daughter, Nancy.

MIKE HOLOVAK Vice-President/Player Personnel & Scouting



On Jan. 27, 1994. Mike Holovak was named Vice-President/Player Personnel and Scouting for the Oilers after serving five seasons as the club's Executive Vice-President/General Manager (named GM 2/2/89, Exec. VP 7/2/89). Long regarded as one of the top personnel men in the National Football League, Holovak is a veteran with more than 40 years in football administration, including 36 in the professional ranks. Known for his honesty and integrity, Holovak joined the Oilers on Feb. 15, 1981, and previously held positions within the club that included Director of Player Personnel and Assistant General Manager.

Holovak was an All-America football player for Boston College, playing for the Eagles from 1940-42 (co-captain in '42). In the Jan. 1, 1943, Orange Bowl game, he set a record for the highest rushing average in that game with a 15.8-yard mark on ten carries for 158 yards. BC lost that Orange Bowl to Alabama 37-21, but Holovak scored three touchdowns (65, 34, 2 yds.). In Jan. of 1984, he was inducted into the prestigious Orange Bowl Hall of Honor. Holovak was also inducted into the National Collegiate Hall of Fame in 1983 as well as being inducted into the State of Pennsylvania Hall of Fame in Hershey, PA.

Following his collegiate career. Holovak was drafted in the first round by the Los Angeles Rams, but first served in the Navy until 1946. He played for the Rams in '46 before being traded to the Chicago Bears. In two seasons with the Bears (1947-48) under Head Coach George Halas, Holovak played fullback and linebacker.

Holovak retired from pro football in '49 to become the junior varsity coach at Boston College. From 1951-59 he was BC's head coach, posting a 49-29-3 record during his tenure. When the new American Football League was formed. Holovak was one of the first employees hired by the Boston Patriots, becoming their Director of Player Personnel in 1959, Elevated to head coach after the fifth game in 1961, Holovak then guided the Patriots to the AFI. Eastern Division title, posting a 7-1-1 record in the final nine games.

In 1964, Holovak assumed the Patriots' General Manager's duties along with his head coaching job. With a 52-46-9 record, he remains the winningest coach in Patriots' history. He left the Pats in 1968 to join the San Francisco 49ers, and has also been associated with the Oakland Raiders (1971) and the New York Jets (1972-76). He served as the Jets' head coach for one game in '76 following the departure of Lou Holtz. Holovak returned to the Patriots as a personnel assistant in 1977 before being promoted to Director of College Scouting the following year.

A native of Lansford, PA, Mike and his wife, Pauline, live in Sarasota, Florida. They have two grown daughters, Michele and Cindy. 96 Houston Oilers **DON MacLACHLAN** Senior Vice-President/Marketing & Broadcasting

On Feb. 1, 1991, the Oilers named Don MacLachlan as team's Vice-President/Marketing and Broadcasting. He was promoted to Senior Vice-President on Sept. 2, 1993. MacLachlan joined the Oilers from Northwestern University where he served as Associate Athletic Director for Public Affairs.

In his present position, MacLachlan is responsible for overseeing the daily operations of the Oilers' marketing, broadcasting, ticket office, and public relations departments, as well as overseeing all aspects of game day operations and presentation at Oiler home games. In addition to working closely in continuing the Oilers' marketing efforts, MacLachlan is the primary liaison between the Oilers radio (KTRH) and television rightsholders.

At Northwestern, MacLachlan was responsible for coordinating and negotiating all radio and TV contracts, preparing sales proposals while securing corporate sponsorships, coordinating game management, preparing revenue projections and developing the Wildcats' marketing plan.

Prior to his promotion to Associate Athletic Director in 1988, MacLachlan served from 1985-88 as NU's Assistant Athletic Director. In that role, he supervised Northwestern's ticket office, sports information office, and sales and promotions. From 1981-85, MacLachlan was the Wildcats' Athletic Ticket Manager, handling all phases of the school's ticket operations, including distribution, advertising, sales, accounting and printing. He joined Northwestern in 1978 as their Assistant Sports Information Director and also assumed the duties of Head Men's Golf Coach the following year.

The 40-year-old MacLachlan is a native of Bloomfield Hills. Michigan, and is a graduate of the University of Michigan. He and his wife, Kathy, have two daughters, Shannon (3/12/89) and Kelly (10/8/93). The family resides in Sugar Land, Texas.

### **STEVE UNDERWOOD**

Vice-President/General Counsel



On March 6, 1992, Steve Underwood joined the Oilers in the newly created position of Vice-President/General Counsel. In his post, Underwood handles a myriad of legal functions, including involvement in player contracts, promotional and corporate contracts and litigation. He also serves as General Counsel for KSA Industries, K.S. "Bud" Adams, Jr.'s private holding company.

Prior to joining the Oilers, Underwood was an attorney for the Houston firm of Caldwell and Hurst since 1977. For his entire tenure there, Underwood served as the Oilers' primary counsel.

From 1981-85, Underwood also served as a part-time business law/real estate instructor at San Jacinto Junior College. He also worked in that same capacity at Baytown's Lee College from 1980-81. Underwood is a member of the Houston Bar Association, licensed attorney in the U.S. Federal Court system, and member of the Entertainment and Sports Law Section of the State Bar of Texas. Underwood was issued a special citation in 1990 by a student society at Texas Southern University's College of Law for his "educational contribution to the college."



# **JEFF FISHER**

Head Coach



Jeff Fisher became the Oilers' 15th head coach officially on Jan. 5, 1995, after closing his first campaign with the Oilers as Head Coach/Defensive Coordinator. He was elevated to that title after Jack Pardee was relieved of his duties on Nov. 14, 1994.

In his first 22 games as head coach, the Oilers have an 8-14 record, including eight wins in their last 17 games. Fisher, as he did as interim head coach for the last six games of '94, has managed to keep the team focused and improving. He, with the help of Floyd Reese, has pieced together a veteran coaching staff. "I think both Floyd and I want the same thing with my staff — teachers," said Fisher, "To rebuild today, you need players contributing much sooner than later. The only way to accomplish that is to teach and that's what we do here."

And the Oilers learned, improving their number of wins by five games from '94 to '95. Offensively, the club surrendered 33 fewer sacks (32 in '95), and converted 43.4% of their third-down opportunitics (seventh in the NFL). Defensively, the club improved its overall rank from ninth to fifth and recorded 21 interceptions versus 14 in '94. But, more importantly, the Oilers established themselves in four categories that Fisher had earmarked before the season: the team reduced its number of penalties from 115 to 98, improved their turnover ratio from -16 to even, increased time of possession from 29:06 to 32:12 (first in NFL), and forced 38 total turnovers (third in NFL). "To win in this league, it is my belief that you have to control the clock, force more turnovers than you make, commit less penalties than your opponent, and make big plays," said Fisher. "When you accomplish all four of those things your not going to lose, when you accomplish three you're going to win 75% of the time, if you satisfy two of the four you've got a 50-50 shot, and with one of the four a 25% chance. It's that simple."

Fisher originally joined the Oilers Feb. 9, 1994, after spending two seasons as the defensive backs coach for the San Francisco 49ers. Fisher's hiring was a perfect fit for the Oilers who were looking for a young, aggressive coach who had experience in the "46" defense. Fisher had worked with the "46" for several years with former Houston Defensive Coordinator Buddy Ryan. Fisher took over a defense that achieved dominant status in 1993, but had lost several key components to free agency. In 1993, the Oilers led the NFL in sacks (52), interceptions (26), run defense (79.6 yards per game), opponent third down efficiency (30.8%) and defensive touchdowns (6). Houston's 43 takeaways ranked second in the league behind Buffalo's 47. Fisher's challenge was in his ability to mix in the necessary new players with the returning veterans, while still maintaining a high level of performance.

Although the Oilers defense suffered some set backs and the olfense struggled throughout the year, Fisher was able to keep the defensive unit together while improving their overall NFL defensive ranking from 14th to ninth, no easy task considering the offense had fallen from third to 26th. In his first off-season as a head coach, Fisher assembled a staff of veteran coaches with proven track records. Already possessing a keen understanding and solid knowledge on the defensive side of the ball, his first hire was Offensive Coordinator Jerry Rhome. Fisher then added Les Steckel (wide receivers/tight ends) and Sherman Smith (running backs), while reassigning Dick Coury. "I have studied offenses for a long time, and have never liked facing a Jerry Rhome style offense — now that's not a problem," said Fisher prior to the '95 season.

Fisher also added Steve Sidwell (defensive coordinator) and Rod Perry (defensive backs) to his defensive staff while tabbing Russ Purnell as special teams coach and retaining Gregg Williams (linebackers). This past off-season, after losing offensive line coach Larry Beightol to the Dolphins, Fisher grabbed long-time NFL assistant Warren "Rennie" Simmons to handle offensive line duties, and then added Alan Lowry, who Fisher coached with at San Francisco, as defensive assistant/quality control coach. "Having a solid staff that has a nice blend, of not only coaching experience but playing experience, is important with the way the game is going in the 90's," said Fisher.

The staff Fisher has put together has a combined-total of 136 years of coaching experience in the National Football League alone, and has taken part in a total of 62-playoff seasons and 11 Super Bowls.

Prior to working for San Francisco, the 38-year-old Fisher served as defensive coordinator for the Rams for the 1991 season. From 1986-90, he was an assistant coach for Ryan with the Eagles, holding the title of Defensive Backs Coach from 1986-88 before becoming the NFL's youngest defensive coordinator. In 1989, under Fisher's tutelage, the Eagle "D" ranked first in the NFL in interceptions (30) and sacks (62). The following season, Philly's defense paced the league in rushing defense and ranked second in sacks.

From 1981-85, Fisher was a cornerback for the Chicago Bears after being a seventh-round draft choice from USC. He missed the Bears' '85 Super Bowl season, spending the year on injured reserve with an ankle injury that prematurely ended his playing career. During that season, Fisher assisted Ryan as an "unofficial" coach as the Bears ultimately defeated the New England Patriots in Super Bowl XX. Overall, Fisher played in 49 games for the Bears and had five interceptions, while also returning punts and kickoffs. He remains the Bears' all-time leader in punt return yards/season (509, 1981); punt returns/season (58, 1984); and punt returns/game (8,





12.16.84). Fisher's 88-yard punt return for a touchdown in 1981 (9/20/81 vs. Buccancers) was the longest PR by a Bear in 39 years.

As a collegian, Fisher played for John Robinson in a star-studded defensive backfield that included Ronnie Lott, Dennis Smith and Jocy Browner. Current Oiler center Bruce Matthews was also one of Fisher's USC teammates. Fisher's career statistics included five interceptions and 108 tackles. He also served as the Trojans' backup placekicker and was a PAC-10 All-Academic selection in 1980.

Fisher, a native of Culver City, California, was a high school All-America wide receiver at Taft High in Woodland Hills (CA). Jeff and his wife, Juli, have three children, sons, Brandon (6/19/87) and Trenton (6/19/92), and daughter Tara (1/27/89).



Coury joined the Oilers as offensive coordinator Fcb. 8, 1994, and this season will mark his second as offensive assistant passing game after making the switch prior to last season. In '95, Coury's primary function was working with the tight ends and H-backs in the Oilers' new offensive system. He was an instrumental part in helping the Oilers officially switch from the "Run 'N Shoot" to a more conventional offense at the end of the '94 campaign.

A veteran NFL coach, Coury brings a wealth of solid experience to Houston. He came to the Oilers after spending the 1993 season coaching tight ends for the Minnesota Vikings. From 1991-92, Coury was the offensive coordinator for the New England Patriots after spending 1986-90 coaching quarterbacks for the Los Angeles Rams. While with the Rams, Coury tutored QB Jim Everett who enjoyed his most productive seasons. While Coury was with the Rams, Everett twice led the league in touchdown passes while also becoming the first quarterback in Rams' annals to throw for over 4,000 yards.


Coury was a head coach in all three years of the United States Football League's existence as the boss of the Breakers. That franchise spent '83 in Boston before relocating to New Orleans in '84 and to Portland in '85. He was named USFL Coach of the Year in 1983. Coury got the opportunity to be a USFL head coach after spending six seasons (1976-81) as wide receivers coach for the Philadelphia Eagles under Head Coach Dick Vermeil. The '81 Eagles squad advanced to the Super Bowl. In 1975, Coury was the linebackers coach for the San Diego Chargers.

Coury got his first professional head coaching post in 1974 when he served as Head Coach/President of Operations for the Portland Storm of the World Football League. Coury went to the Storm after tutoring wide receivers for the Denver Broncos from 1972-73.

From 1970-71, Coury was the head coach for Cal State Fullerton's new program, leading the Titans to a pair of winning records and a bowl appearance. Prior to assuming that job, Coury was John McKay's defensive coordinator at USC from 1967-69 as the Trojans earned a Rose Bowl berth in each of those seasons and captured the national championship in '67. Coury began his coaching career as the head coach at Mater Dei High School in Santa Ana, California where he posted a nine-year record of 96-9-3. Coury earned his degree from Notre Dame. He was born in Athens. Ohio. Dick and his

wife, Bonnie, have seven children, including sons, Mike (10/1/54), Rick (6/6/56), Steve (7/3/57), Rob (10/14/58) and Tim (10/29/63), and daughters, Catherine (5/1/60) and Linda (3/7/62).



Alan Lowry joined the Oilers in the capacity of defensive assistant/quality control on March 26, 1996. Lowry, 45, will be responsible for defensive quality control while assisting the defensive positional coaches. Lowry will break-down film of Oiler opponents and picce together coaching reports on their offensive tendencies as well as monitoring the Oilers' defensive tendencies. Lowry joins the Oilers after a four-year stint with the San Francisco 49ers (1992-95) where he served as special teams coach.

Lowry's coaching career started at Virginia Tech (1974) after finishing a SWC playing career as an All-SWC defensive back and quarterback. The following season he moved to Wyoming (1975). He spent one season (1976) in the Dallas Cowboys scouting department before returning to the University of Texas (1977-81) for five seasons as the defensive backs coach.

Prior to joining the 49ers. Lowry spent nine seasons with the Dallas Cowboys (1982-90). He originally joined the Cowboys in '82 as their special teams coach before shifting to receivers (1988-90). In 1991, he served as the special teams/tight ends coach for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Lowry, a native of Miami, Oklahoma, resides in Houston with his wife, Donna. The couple has two daughters, Marta (8/22/83) and Lindsay (4/3/88).



Mike Munchak, who joined the Oilers front office prior to the '94 campaign, will assist the offensive coaching staff and provide quality control. He will be responsible for breaking down film of Oiler opponents and compiling coaching reports on their defensive tendencies.


As with last season, Munchak will continue to work on special projects for Executive Vice-President/General Manager Floyd Reese in addition to his other duties.

Munchak joined the Oilers front office after a stellar 12-year playing career (1982-93) at left guard after being selected in the first round of the '82 NFL Draft out of Penn State. He retired on July 21. 1994, after setting a club mark with nine Pro Bowl selections (seven as starter) and finishing fourth on the Oilers' all-time games

played list with 159. He had his #63 jersey retired last Nov. 6, marking only the fourth jersey in Oiler history to be retired (Earl Campbell's #34, Jim Norton's #43 and Elvin Bethea's #65 are the others).


Rex Norris joined the Oilers' staff on Feb. 14, 1995, after spending the '94 season with the Denver Broncos in the same capacity. Prior to joining the Broncos, Norris handled defensive line duties at the University of Texas from 1992-93.

Norris enters his 32nd season of coaching in 1996, including his sixth season in the NFL. He also worked in the NFL from 1985-87, when he served as the defensive line coach of the Detroit Lions.

After stints at Carrolton Turner High and Navarro Junior College, Norris joined Texas A&M in 1972 before moving to Oklahoma as a key assistant to Barry Switzer for 11 seasons (1973-83). During his stay at Oklahoma, he coached the defensive line (last three as assistant head coach), helping shape players such as Tony Casillas and LeRoy Selmon, as well as producing seven First-Team All-Americans and helping lead the Sooners to eight bowl appearances.

Prior to joining the Lions, Norris spent 1984 as an assistant coach at Arizona State. He returned to the college ranks in 1988-89 as defensive line coach at Florida. From 1990-91, Norris coached the defensive line at the University of Tennessee before moving to Texas in '92.

Norris, who was born in Tipton, Indiana, was raised in San Angelo, Texas, and was a Junior College All-American at San Angelo J.C. before completing his playing career at East Texas State in 1962. Rex and his wife, Melinda, have four children, Rex Jr., Whitney Rae Gohlke, Nolan Watson and Amanda Watson. The couple resides in Sugar Land, Texas.



Rod Perry joined the Oilers staff on Jan. 17, 1995. He took over a secondary that's interception rate dropped in 1994. And guided the unit, despite significant injuries, to a 19-interception season. The unit had dipped to just 14 thefts in '94. Perry also helped CB



Prior to coming to the Oilers, Perry spent three seasons with the Los Angeles Rams (1992-94) as the team's secondary coach. Prior to joining the Rams, Perry served with the Seattle Seahawks (1989-91) in the same capacity. Both Perry's previous professional stints were served under Head Coach Chuck Knox. In his NFL coaching past, Perry has helped shape the careers of Todd Lyght, Patrick Hunter, Dewayne Harper and Eugene Robinson. Perry Joined the Seahawks after coaching four years at the collegiate level, two years at Fresno State (1987-88), and one each at Fresno City College (1986) and Columbia University (1985).

As a player, Perry was an All-Big Eight selection as a senior at the University of Colorado. He spent eight seasons as a defensive back for the Rams (1975-82) and is a member of the Rams' 40th Anniversary All-Time Team. Russ Purnell joined the Oilers staff on Jan. 27, 1995, as special teams coach after spending nine seasons (1986-94) with the Seattle Seahawks, including three (1992-94) as special teams/tight ends coach. Under Purnell's direction the Oilers coverage teams continued to excel, finishing 11th in the league on punt coverage and fifth on kickoff returns. His special teams were among the upper eachelon for three seasons and led the AFC (second in NFL) in kickoff coverage by allowing opponents to start drives at their own 25.5-yard line in 1994.



Jerry Rhome was named offensive coordinator on Jan. 15, 1995. after spending one season as wide receivers coach for the Minnesota Vikings. Under his direction, the Oilers offense improved in several areas, including sacks allowed (65 in '94 to 32 in '95) and third-down efficiency (43.4 percent, seventh in NFL). The Oilers also finished first in the NFL in time of possession with a 32:12 mark. More importantly, Rhome's role last year also included the tutaledge of quarterback Steve McNair. Rhome worked for 45 minutes after every practice during the regular season preparing McNair for his eventual debut. While Rhome was with the Vikings, Minnesota had the most prolific receiving tandem in league history (207 total receptions) as wide receiver Cris Carter set an NFL record with 122 receptions and receiver Jake Reed caught a career-high 85.


Prior to coaching with the Vikings, Rhome spent four seasons (1990-93) as the offensive coordinator of the then-Phoenix Cardinals. In 1993, Phoenix finished in the top three in the NFC in total offense (352.8 yards), average gain per play (5.2 yards), third down efficiency (46.2%), sacks per play (.06) and time of possession (31:54). Before coming to Phoenix, Rhome served as quarterbacks coach in Dallas (1989) and as offensive coordinator in San Diego (1988).

Rhome began his NFL coaching career with the expansion Scattle Seahawks (1976-1982), including the last five years as the team's offensive coordinator. From 1983-87, Rhome served as quarterbacks coach for the Washington Redskins before joining the Chargers in '88. Prior to joining the Seahawks, Rhome served as offensive coordinator at the University of Tulsa (1973-74) and had a hand in the early development of Hall-of-Fame receiver Steve Largent.

Known as a top developer of talent, especially quarterbacks, Rhome has coached such NFL signal callers as Jim Zorn and Dave Krieg (Seattle, 1976-82); Joe Theismann, Doug Williams and Mark Rypien (Washington, 1983-87); Troy Aikman (Dallas, 1989); and Steve Beuerlein (Phoenix, 1990-93).

Rhome is a former Oiler quarterback, having played in Houston in 1970 during an eight-year NFL career. Originally drafted by the Dallas Cowboys and the New York Jets, he played for the Cowboys (1965-68), the Cleveland Browns (1969), Oilers (1970) and the Los Angeles Rams (1971-72). He played collegiately at Southern Methodist (1960-61) and Tulsa (1963-64). In 1964, Rhome was the Heisman Trophy runner-up and Walter Camp Trophy recipient after breaking 17 NCAA passing records.

Rhome ia a native of Dallas and carned All-America honors at Sunset High. Jerry and his wife, Sharon, have two daughters. Shannon and Nicole, and one son, Brett. The couple resides in Missouri City, Texas.



Steve Sidwell was named defensive coordinator by Jeff Fisher on Feb. 10, 1995, after spending nine seasons with the New Orleans Saints in the same capacity.

In his first season in Houston, Sidwell helped the Oilers defensive unit improve from ninth ('94) to a defensive ranking of fifth in '95. The Oilers' defense also finished third in the NFL (led AFC) in takeaways with 38 (21 interceptions, 17 fumble recoveries).

Under his direction (1986-94), the Saints defense was one of the best in the league as they led the NFL in points allowed (1991-92), rush defense (1989) and pass defense (1992-93). Before coming to the Oilers, Sidwell spent one month with the Green Bay Packers as linebackers coach.

With the addition of Sidwell, the Oilers are planning to mesh two different defensive philosophies. "Steve is an experienced coach who has directed a defense over the last nine years that has been one of the best in the NFL." Oilers Head Coach Jeff Fisher said. "He brings in another philosophy that we can eventually add to our defensive scheme to increase the productivity of our defensive unit. The wealth of new ideas he brings is valuable because defenses in the NFL are constantly changing."





Warren "Rennie" Simmons joined the Oilers on March 26, 1996, after spending one season at the University of Vanderbilt. Simmons, entering his 15th NFL season, will take over an offensive line that improved in sacks allowed from 65 in '94 to 32 in '95 and sent two players (G Bruce Matthews and C Mark Stepnoski) to the NFL's Pro Bowl.

Simmons originally began his NFL coaching career with the Washington Redskins in 1981. He served the Skins' as tight ends coach (1981-89) and offensive line coach (1990-91), before becoming the receivers coach from 1992-93. During his two-year stint as an offensive line coach, the Redskins allowed just 31 sacks, including a club-record and NFL-leading nine en route to Super Bowl XXVI. Simmons also had a one-year stint with the L.A. Rams (1994).

Simmons began his coaching career at California State-Fullerton (1974-78) and Cerritos Junior College (1978-80) before joining the Redskins. He played center at San Diego State (1961-65).

Born on February 25, 1942 in Poughkeepsie. New York, Rennie grew up in Santa Fe, California, and attended Santa Fe High with Joe Gibbs. Rennie and his wife, Carol, have two children. Rod, and Karen. They reside in Houston, Texas.

Sherman Smith was named to the position of running backs coach on Feb. 14, 1995, after spending three seasons in the college ranks, coaching for the Fighting Illini of Illinois. With the Oilers, Smith oversaw the development of rookie runner Rodney Thomas. Thomas gained 947 yards and caught 39 passes in the Oilers' new offensive system. In '96, he will add Heisman Trophy winner Eddie George and veteran Ronnic Harmon to his group.

At Illinois, Smith served as tight ends coach from 1992-93 and added running backs to his title in '94.

Smith, an all-star player for Miami University (Ohio) and with the NFL's Seattle Seahawks, moved to the University of Illinois after coaching the running backs at his alma mater for two seasons (1990-91).

After joining the Seahawks as a second-round draft choice in 1976, Smith went on to play nine years in the NFL. Of those nine seasons, seven (1976-82) were under then-Scattle offensive coordinator and present Oiler Offensive Coordinator Jerry Rhome. Smith led a fledgling Seahawk team in rushing in each of his first four seasons, finishing his Seattle tenure with 3,429 yards and 28 touch-



downs on 810 attempts. He still ranks among the all-time rushers in Seahawks' history. Smith concluded his NFL playing career with the San Diego Chargers (1983-84).

As a collegian, Smith lettered four seasons (1972-75) as a quarterback at Miami (Ohio). He started in his final three campaigns, leading the Redskins to the Mid-American Conference crown in each year while compiling a 33-1-1 record.

After retiring from the Chargers in 1984 with a knee injury, Smith began teaching in the Northwest where he coached and taught at Redmond Junior High before returning to the college level as a coach in '90.

A Native of Youngstown, Ohio, he and his wife, Sharon, have two children, daughter, Shavonne (2/1/80), and son, Sherman (2/1/82). The couple resides in Missouri City, Texas.



Les Steckel was added to the Oilers staff as wide receivers/tight ends coach on Jan. 24, 1995, after spending two seasons serving with the Denver Broncos in the same capacity.

In his first season with the Oflers, he aided in the development of third-round choice Chris Sanders, who recorded 35 catches for 823 yards, a league-leading 23.5 yards-per-catch average and nine touchdowns. Sanders produced 12 catches of at least 35 yards or more (a franchise record) and had three multi-touchdown games.

In his two years with the Broncos (1993-94), tight end Shannon Sharpe caught 168 passes (81 in '93, 87 in '94) for 2,005 yards (995 in '93, 1,010 in '94). Sharpe's 87 receptions in '94 was the third highest total in Broncos' history, and two of his three consecutive Pro Bowl selections came while under the direction of Steckel. Sharpe also recorded his first 1,000-yard receiving season.


Prior to his work with the Broncos, Steckel was the offensive coordinator at the University of Colorado (1991-92). Steckel took a year off from football in 1990 after serving as offensive coordinator at Brown University in '89. From 1985-88, Steckel coached the quarterbacks and wide receivers for the New England Patriots, playing a key role in the Patriots' '85 Super Bowl run. 


Steve Watterson is recognized as one of the top strength and rehabilitation experts in the NFL. In 1992, Watterson received the biggest honor of his career when he was named Professional Strength and Conditioning Coach of the Year. Watterson has been instrumental in helping to develop and implement various strength and conditioning programs with the Oilers and directs the Oilers' successful off-season conditioning program. Watterson joined the Oilers in 1986 as Strength and Conditioning Coordinator before becoming an assistant coach in those areas prior to the 1988 season.





Born Nov. 6, 1955, in San Gabriel, California, Rich and his wife, M'Lissa, have one son, Bill (20).



HALL OF FAME OILERS

Four former Oilers have achieved the ultimate honor in their sport-induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton,

Ohio. The distinguished foursome includes George Blanda (inducted in 1981), Ken Houston (inducted in 1986), Earl Campbell (inducted in 1991) and Charlie Joiner (inducted in 1996).

Blanda played quarterback and was the placekicker for the Oilers from 1960-66 during an NFL-record 26-year career (Bears 1949, Colts 1950, Bears 1950-58, Raiders 1967-75). His NFL career records include most games (340), most points (2,002), most PATs (943) and second in most field goals (335). As an Oiler, Blanda led the team to back-toback AFL championships in '60 and '61. He was the team's lead-



ing passer and scorer in each of his seven Oiler seasons. Blanda's 36 touchdown passes in 1961 stood as an NFL record for 23 years.



Included among his Oiler records are most points (596) and most PATs (299).

Houston is considered one of the finest safeties in NFL history. Originally a ninth round draft choice from Prairie View (threetime national champions), he played 14 seasons, including 1967-72 for the Oilers and 1973-80 for the Redskins. He finished his career with 49 interceptions before retiring to pursue a coaching career. In 14 seasons, Houston achieved Pro Bowl status an amazing 12 consecutive times (1968-69 AFL, 1970-79 NFL), including five selections as an Oiler and seven as a Redskin. At one

point in his career, Houston played in 183 consecutive games. He still holds NFL records for most interceptions returned for a touch-

down in a career (9), in a season (4, 1971), and in a game (tied-2, vs. San Diego 12/19/71).

Campbell came to Houston as the first player selected in the 1978 NFL draft after having won the 1977 Heisman Trophy at the University of Texas (he was later selected as the Southwest Conference's Offensive Player of the Decade for the 1970's). Campbell played eight NFL seasons (6 1/2 for Houston, 1 1/2 for New Orleans) from 1978-85 and ranked as the seventh leading rusher in league history with 9,407 yards. In addition, he was eighth alltime in NFL annals in both rushing touchdowns (74) and at-

tempts (2,187). Known as "The Tyler Rose," he led the league in rushing in each of his first three seasons, winning the NFL's Most Valuable Player award in each of those years. Campbell's string of four consecutive 1,000-yard seasons, beginning with his rookie year, was interrupted by the strike-shortened nine-game season in 1982. However, he posted his fifth 1,000-yard effort the following season. During his career, Campbell was selected to five Pro Bowls (1978-81, 1983). Campbell holds virtually every Oiler rushing record including most yards in a career (8.574) and in a season (1,934 in '80). His 19 rushing touchdowns in 1979 was the third highest single-season total in NFL history while that 1,934 yards in '80 was also the third best in the league record book. One of Campbell's highest honors occurred when he was officially designated as a Texas Legend by the State Legislature. Davy Crockett, Sam Hous-

ton and Stephen F. Austin are the only others to achieve that highranking honor, and Campbell is the only designee in this century.

Joiner began his 18-year career (1969-86) as a fourth-round draft choice of the Oilers in 1969. He recorded 82 receptions for 1,480 yards and 12 touchdowns before moving on to the Cincinnati Bengals in a trade during the 1972 season. Joiner was then traded to the San Diego Chargers in 1976, and went on to collect 750 career receptions for 12,146 yards and 65 touchdowns. He stands fifth on the NFL's all-time list for receptions and receiving yards. As an Oiler, Joiner led the




1971 squad in receiving yards (681) and touchdown receptions (7). He was also the Oilers hig-play receiver in '71, recording five of the team's nine longest plays from scrimmage.

# **RETIRED JERSEYS**

In the 36-year history of the Houston Oilers, only four players have had the distinction of having their jersey number retired. That honor belongs only to #43, Jim Norton: #65, Elvin Bethea: #34. Earl Campbell; and #63, Mike Munchak.

Norton played nine seasons for the Oilers (1960-68) as a safety



and as a punter, establishing team records at both positions. As a rookie from the University of Idaho, Norton was a member of the Oilers' 1960 AFL Championship team. A four-time league all-star, he holds the Oiler record for most interceptions in a career with 45. Also an accomplished punter, Norton is tops in club history with 519 career punts for a 42.3-yard career average and a long kick of 79 yards (11/22/64 vs. Kansas City).

Bethea joined the Oilers in 1968 after an outstanding career at North Carolina A&T. He started at defensive end in the opener in '68 and didn't miss a game until breaking his arm in November.

1977. That streak of 135 consecutive games played stands second in team history. An eighttime Pro Bowler (1970, 1972-76, 1978-80), Bethea also holds the Oiler records for most games played (210) and most seasons played (16, 1968-83). Bethea led the team in quarterback sacks six times, including a career-best mark of 17 in 1973. The Oilers honored him with an "Elvin Bethea Appreciation Night" on August 4, 1983.

Campbell, whose achievements are profiled in the "Hall of Fame Oilers" section on the previous page, was honored by having his number retired at ceremonies on August 13, 1987.



Munchak joined the Oilers as a first-round draft pick in '82 out of Penn State. He was the first offensive lineman taken in the entire



draft and the eighth overall selection. Munchak won the starting left guard position as a rookie and went on to play in 12 campaigns (1982-93) and 159 games (156 starts) for the Oilers. He is third on the team's all-time list for seasons played and ranks fifth in games played. Munchak became a fixture on an offensive line that helped the Oilers to seven consecutive playoff appearances (1987-93). One of the premier guards in the National Football League, Munchak was selected to NFL's "Team of the Decade" for the 1980's and was chosen in 1989 to Oilers' 30th Anniversary "Dream Team." He also holds the Oiler record for Pro Bowl selections with nine (seven as starter).

Munchak announced his retirement on July 21, 1994, and on the same day, K.S. "Bud" Adams, Jr. announced that jersey #63 would

be retired on "Mike Munchak Appreciation Day" on Nov. 6, 1994.

Norton, Bethea, Campbell and Munchak's jerseys are permanently displayed at the team's training facility and serve as a constant reminder of their tremendous contributions to the community and to the team.

Campbell was honored by having his number #34 retired at ceremonies on August 13, 1987.

## **1995 GAME SUMMARIES**

## GAME #1 HOUSTON 10, JACKSONVILLE 3

JACKSONVILLE, SEPT. 3-The Oilers defeated the Jacksonville Jaguars 10-3 in front of 72,363 fans at Jacksonville's Municipal Stadium. The Ollers wasted no time, taking the opening kickoff of their '95 season and promptly piecing together a 13-play, 78-yard scoring drive culminating with a 4-yard touchdown pass from QB Chris Chandler to WR Haywood Jeffires and an Oilers 7-0 lead. On the first play of the Oilers' next drive, Chandler suffered a bruised left shoulder. Although he played the remainder of the half, he was replaced by Will Furrer to open the second half. Following Jacksonville's second punt of the third quarter, the Oilers gained possession on their 40-yard line and marched 59 yards on nine plays before settling for a K Al Del Greco 19-yard offering and a 10-0 lead with 5:22 remaining in the third quarter. The field goal marked the 12th consecutive for Del Greco and set a team record, surpassing Florian Kempl's 1983 mark of 11. The big play on the drive was a 32-yard scamper by Oiler rookie RB Rodney Thomas on 3rd-and-3 from the Jaguars' 39-yard line. The Jaguars were able to close within seven points when K Mike Hollis capped an 11-play, 66-yard drive with a 26-yard field goal cutting the Oilers lead to 10-3. The Jaguars started three drives over the final 11 minutes, but were forced to punt twice, CB Darryll Lewis intercepted Mark Brunell's pass on the first play of Jaguars' last drive to seal the victory.

## GAME #7 CHICAGO 35, HOUSTON 32

## GAME #9

### HOUSTON 37, CLEVELAND 10

**CLEVELAND**, NOV. 5—The Oilers defeated the Cleveland Browns 37:10 in front of 57,881 fans at Cleveland Stadium. After forcing the Oilers to punt on their first possession, the Browns opened the game's scoring when they marched 76 yards in 12 plays, which culminated in a QB Eric Zeier-to-WR Andre Rison 4-yard pass and a Browns' 7-0 lead. The Oilers responded with a ten-play, 19-yard drive that resulted in a KAI Del Greco 44-yard field goal. After the Browns' Matt Stover missed short from 50 yards out, the Oilers used 4-52 to move 58 yards before QB Chris Chandler ran two yards for a touch-

down on the ninth play of the drive. Leading 10-7, the Houston defense forced a WR Michael Jackson fumble (forced by LB Joe Bowden, recovered by S Blaine Bishop) and took possession on Houston's 43-yard line. Chandler guided the Oilers offense to a touchdown when he hit WR Haywood Jeffires from 23 yards away to cap a seven-play, 57-yard drive and gave the Oilers a 17-7 halftime lead. The Browns took the second half kickoff and marched 60 yards in eight plays before settling for a Stover 20-yard field goal, cutting the Houston advantage to 17-10. However, on the Oilers ensuing drive, they used just four plays to move 66 yards capped by a Chandler 15-yard pass to WR Malcolm Seabron to give Houston a 24-10 lead. On the Browns next possession, DE Kenny Davidson intercepted a Zeier



pass intended for RB Ernest Byner. With the Oilers taking over at the Browns' 49-yard line, they used four plays to move 21 yards before settling for a Del Greco 45-yarder and a 27-10 lead. Cleveland's next possession ended on it's third play with CB Darryll Lewis picking off Zeier and returning it 25 yards to the Cleveland 30. ## GAME #10 CINCINNATI 32, HOUSTON 25

### GAME #11 KANSAS CITY 20, HOUSTON 13

### GAME #14 DETROIT 24, HOUSTON 17

HOUSTON, DEC. 10—The Oilers were defeated by the Detroit Lions 24-17 in front of 35.842 fans at Houston's Astrodome. The Lions got on the board first when QB Scott Mitchell found WR Herman Moore for a 13-yard score and a Lions 7-0 lead in the first quarter. On the Oilers ensuing drive, the team marched 57 yards on nine plays before QB Chris Chandler connected

with WR Haywood Jeffires for a 9-yard score on the team's tenth play of the drive, tying the game at 7-7 with 14:55 left in the first half. Three series later, the Lions capitalized on an Oilers' turnover (RB Rodney Thomas fumble) and moved 23 yards in eight plays, capping the drive with a K Jason Hanson 36yard field goal, giving the Lions a 10-7 lead with 1-14 remaining in the half. On the Oilers' next play from scrimmage, Chandler was sacked by LB Antonio London and fumbled (recovered by CB Ryan McNeil), Detroit took over at the Oilers' 9-yard line; and on the next play, RB Barry Sanders ran off-tackle to the right side for the Lions' second touchdown and a 17-7 halftime lead. In the second half, after both teams had exchanged three scoreless drives, the Oilers took possession on their 24-yard line following a S Chuck Cecil interception. Rookie Steve McNair, who had replaced Chandler at quarterback to start the second half, led the Oilers on an eight-play, 46-yard drive that resulted in a 47-yard field goal by K M Del Greco, cutting the Detroit lead to 17-10 with 15 seconds left in the third quarter. The Lions responded with a fiveplay, 67-yard drive that resulted in a Mitchell-to-Moore hookup from 14 yards out and a 24-10 Lions lead. After both teams exchanged turnovers, Houston took possession at their 41-yard line. Five plays later, McNair found WR Chris Sanders up the right sideline for a 39-yard touchdown, cutting the Oiler deficit to 24-17 with 8:47 left in the game. On the ensuing kickoff, CB Steve Jackson forced an Allen Williams fumble (recovered by CB Tomur Barnes) and the Oilers took over at the Lions' 39-yard line. However, McNair was intercepted (LB Mike Johnson) after the club had moved to the 4-yard line. The Otlers mustered one last drive in which they marched 50 yards in five plays to the Lions' 12, a McNair pass fell incomplete in the end zone as time expired.

### **GAME #16** HOUSTON 28, BUFFALO 17

ORCHARD PARK, DEC. 24-The Oilers defeated the Buffalo Bills 28-17 in front of 45,253 fans at Buffalo's Rich Stadium. After a scoreless first quarter. Buffalo took control of the ball at their own 12-yard line with 14:05 left in the second stanza. January 15—Oiler LB George Webster named to Pro Football Hall of Fame's All-Time AFL defensive unit. The three-year Oiler veteran was youngest player named to the team.

June 30—Oiler veterans join NFL Players Association strike. Owners bar veterans from training camps. Dispute revolved around pension plan.

July 14—Oilers open training camp at Schreiner Institute in Kerrville, Texas with only rookies reporting.

August 3-Veterans report to training camp after settlement of NFL-NFLPA pension dispute.

August 29—Oilers defeat Dallas Cowboys 37-21 in Astrodome as Jerry LeVias scores three touchdowns in game.

November 1—Oiler Head Coach Wally Lemm, who led Oilers to AFL title in 1961 and to Eastern Division title in 1967, announces he will retire at the end of 1970 season.

#### 1971

January 21-Oller owner K.S. "Bud" Adams, Jr., names Ed Hughes to be the sixth head coach in Oller history.

January 26—Oilers trade RB Hoyle Granger, T Terry Stoepel and DE Charles Blossom to New Orleans for DT Dave Rowe and WR Ken Burrough.

**August 28**—Oiler T John Matuszak tries to jump his contract and sign, with World Football League Houston Texans. Ollers obtain temporary restraining order and present it to Matuszak at Texans' game with New York Stars. Matuszak is put on inactive list until trial.

September 5—Oilers and WFI. Texans meet in court over John Matuszak dispute.

September 9—State District Judge Arthur Lesher grants temporary injunction against John Matuszak playing for any other team than Oilers until further court hearings. Matuszak remains on inactive list.

**September 15**—Oilers open regular season with 21-14 win over San Diego, Houston's first regular season home victory since October 1, 1972.

**October 22**—Oilers trade John Matuszak and No. 3 draft choice to Kansas City for Curley Culp and draft choice, ending court battle.

**December 15**—Oilers defeat Cleveland for first time in history, 28-24, and complete a 7-7 season, the best in Houston since 1968.

#### 1975

January 25-O.A. "Bum" Phillips named Oiler head coach by Sid Gillman who says he will remain in single role as general manager.

February 14—Sid Gillman leaves Oilers as general manager by mutual consent with owner "Bud" Adams. Bum Phillips adds title of general manager to head coaching duties.

September 21—Oilers open 1975 NFI, season with 7-0 win over New England Patriots, Only TD was fumble return for score by Offers' Willie Germany in first quarter.

October 12-Houston scores its first win in history at Cleveland with 40-10 triumph.

October 19—Oilers come from behind to defeat Washington 13-10 in Astrodome for first win ever over NFC team.

November 16—Oilers get 20-19 win over Miami as Billy Johnson ties all-time pro record for return TDs in one season (4).

**December 21**—Oilers close out finest season since 1962 with 21-10 win over Cleveland, giving Bum Phillips a 10-4-0 record in his first year as a head coach. Oilers set a new home attendance record, averaging 48,000 in seven home games.

#### 1976

February 10—Wade Phillips, son of Head Coach Bum Phillips, named to Oiler coaching staff as LB coach. Phillips had been an assistant at University of Kansas.

April 1—Offers lose Fred Hoaglin. Mark Cotney and Jesse O'Neal in NFL expansion draft.

April 2—Oilers trade QB Lynn Dickey to Green Bay for QB John Hadl, CB Ken Ellis, draft choices and cash.

#### 1977

January 14—Head Coach and General Manager Bum Phillips announces the appointment of Ken Shipp as offensive coordinator with King Hill becoming receiver coach and the appointment of Jue Bugel as offensive line coach.

February 2-Pat Peppler is named assistant general manager.

**October 9**—Oilers march into first place in the AFC Central Division after whipping Pittsburgh 27-10 at the Astrodome, but lose Dan Pastorini to an ankle and back injury.

November 13—Oakland holds off Oilers 54-29 as Houston DE Elvin Bethea suffers a broken arm after playing in 135 consecutive games, a team record.

#### 1978

January 7—Owner K.S. "Bud" Adams, Jr., announces the appointment of Ladd K. Herzeg as Senior Vice-President and Chief Administrative Officer of the Houston Oilers.

January 24-Curley Culp. Ken Burrough. Billy Johnson and Robert Brazile play for AFC on Pro Bowl team.

April 15—Offers announce a long-term contract with Texas State Network to air Offer games.

April 24—Oilers trade three draft picks and TE Jimmie Giles to Tampa Bay for rights to 1978 number one draft selection in order to choose Texas All-America and Heisman Trophy winner Earl Campbell.

**October 23**—Houston ends Pittsburgh's seven-game win streak with Monday night victory over the Steelers, 21-17. It marks Houston's first win ever on Monday Night Football.

November 12—Houston comes from 23-0 deficit to capture 26-23 win over New England Patriots.

November 20—Earl Campbell rushes for a touchdowns against Miami Dolphins in Oilers' 35-30 victory. Campbell's two Monday night appearances net him 7 of his 13 season TDs.

**November 26**—Earl Campbell gains 100 yards rushing vs. Cincinnati before home crowd to tie NFL record for most 100-yard games by a rookie – 7 (ties Franco Harris and Don Woods). Also breaks Oiler single season records for most yards rushing (Hoyle Granger, 1,194 yards in 1967) and most rushing attempts (Charlie Tolar, 224 yards in 1962).

December 10-Houston captures 17-12 decision over New Orleans Saints to clinch berth in AFC Wild Card game versus Miami

December 24—Houston wins first playoff game since 1961 by defeating Miami 17-9 in the Orange Bowl.

December 31-Ollers continue playoff march with 31-14 win against New England before 61,297 chilled fans in Foxboro, Mass.

#### 1979

January 7—Houston playoff dreams end as Pittsburgh takes 34-5 victory in AFC Championship Game. Oilers welcomed by 50,000 loyal fans in the Astrodome as radio station KILT sponsors homecoming.

January 30-Earl Campbell, Elvin Bethea, Robert Brazile and Curley Culp represent Houston in the Pro Bowl in Los Angeles.

August 3—Oiler T Greg Sampson undergoes brain surgery which signals the end to a promising career.

December 10—Before national television audience, Houston deleats division nemesis Pittsburgh 20-17, giving Oilers spot in 1979 playoffs.

**December 17**—Several Ollers lock up individual titles: Earl Campbell is NFL rushing champion for the second consecutive year; Mike Reinfeldt captures the crown for most interceptions in NFL with 12; Toni Fritsch is the most accurate field goal kicker, connecting on 21-25 attempts; and Jesse Baker leads the AFC in QB sacks with 15 1/2.

**December 23**—In first playoff game played in Houston since 1962, Oilers defeat Denver Broncos 13-7. Key offensive players Earl Campbell. Dan Pastorini and Ken Burrough are all injured, and their status for the following game versus San Dicgo is questionable.

**December 29**—Oilers defeat San Diego 17-14 without injured Earl Campbell. Dan Pastorini and Ken Burrough. Backup QB Gifford Nielsen plays conservative offense as Rob Carpenter, who was injured earlier in the week and was on crutches the night before the game, gains 67 yards rushing in his best effort of the season. The big star of the game is S Vernon Perry as he intercepts an NFL-record four passes in a playoff game.

#### 1980

January 6—In a rematch of the 1978 AFC Championship Game, the Steelers win 27-13 in a game that saw a controversial call keep Mike Renfro from scoring what would have been tying score late in third quarter.

**January** 7—In the wee hours of the morning, the Oilers return from Pittsburgh to an excited throng of 70,000 people at the Astrodome.

January 28-Six Oilers represent Houston in the Pro Bowl RB Earl Campbell, T Leon Gray, PK Toni Fritsch, LB Robert Brazile, S Mike Reinfeldt and DE Elvin Bethea

**September 15**—Before the largest stadium crowd to ever witness an Oilers' game (80,243). Houston defeats the Browns in Cleveland Stadium 16-T. The game was also televised before a national audience on Monday Night Football.

**October 14**—Oilers acquire All-Pro TE Dave Casper from Oakland for undisclosed draft picks.

**October 19**—Earl Campbell becomes only the second RB in the history of the Oiler franchise to rush for over 200 yards in a single game when he leads the Oilers to a 21-14 triumph over Tampa Bay with 206 yards. Club rushing record for single game is 216 yards by Billy Cannon (Dec. 10, 1961 vs. New York Titans)

**October 26**—Earl Campbell ties NFI. record for most consecutive 200yard games rushing (two) with 202 yards vs. Cincinnati in the Astrodome. Campbell now shares record with O.J. Simpson (Buffalo, 1973, 1976). Oilers defeat Bengals 23-3.

**December 4**—Houston's defense shuts out the Pittsburgh Steelers 6-0. Toni Fritsch provides all the points the Oilers need with two field goals. This marked the third evening prime time win of the season for the Oilers as the game was played in the Astrodome before a sell-out crowd and a national television audience. It marked the first shutout registered by the Oilers since a 17-0 win over the Chicago Bears. (November 6, 1977).

**December 21**—Otlers elinch third playoff spot in as many years with 20-16 victory over the Minnesota Vikings in the Astrodome. Earl Campbell sets NFL record by rushing for over 200 yards in single game four times in one season. He finishes season with 1,934 yards, second highest total in NFL history behind O.J. Simpson's 2,003 yards in 1975. The Oilers must wait until the final game of the season to see who their playoff opponent will be, as their 11-5 record equals that of division foe Cleveland, but Oilers become Wild Card participant due to tie-breaker procedures.

**December 28**—Oilers season comes to an end with disappointing AFC. Wild Card loss at the hands of the eventual Super Bowl champion Oakland Raiders. The loss marks the third consecutive year that the Oilers have been eliminated from the playoff picture by the eventual Super Bowl champions (Pittsburgh Steelers in both 1978 and 1979).

**December 31**—K.S. "Bud" Adams Jr., relieves Bum Phillips of his duties as Head Coach and General Manager. Ladd K. Herzeg is promoted from post of Senior Vice-President/Chief Administrative Officer to the position of Executive Vice-President and General Manager of the Oilers.

#### 1981

January 3-Oilers announce the selection of Ed Biles as their new head coach. Biles had been Oilers' defensive coordinator since 1975.

February 8—Dick Nolan, former Head Coach for the New Orleans Saints and the San Francisco 49ers, is named defensive coordinator.

February 15—Mike Holovak is named as Assistant General Manager by the Oilers.

September 6—Oilers defeat Rams at season opener at Los Angeles 27-20 as rookie Willie Tullis returns kickoff 95 yards for score in final minute of game. Win gives Ed Biles his first as head coach of NFL club.

#### 1982

January 19—Former All-Pro S Ken Houston returns to Oilers as defensive assistant assigned to work with the DBs. Houston had been All-Pro performer before being traded to Redskins where he retired following 1980 season.

January 31—Oilers open 2.5 million dollar training facility less than two miles from Astrodome, Owner-President K.S. "Bud" Adams, Jr., provides funds for what must be considered one of top facilities in the NFL.

**February 3**—Oilers announce new three-year contract with Mutual Broadcasting System for radio rights to Houston's games. KTRH-AM in Houston will serve as flagship station.

March 18—Oilers announce that head coach Ed Biles has been given a contract extension. Terms of the contract were not released.

April 28—Oilers select Penn State G Mike Munchak in first round of NFL draft. It is the first number one choice in the draft that Oilers have had since Earl Campbell was selected in first round in 1978.

May 3—Computer added to Oilers lineup to assist club with player personnel, college scouting, ticket and business operations as well as many other functions within the organization.

September 17—Oilers acquire QB Archie Manning from New Orleans Saints in one-for-one swap for T Leon Gray.

September 20-NFL Players Association strike announced.

November 16-Settlement of 57-day player strike announced by NFL-Management Council and NFL Players Association.

January 2—Oilers fall to Cincinnati Bengals 35-27 to conclude 1982 regular season play. This game was re-scheduled from November 14 (canceled due to players' strike).

January 25—Chuck Studley joins Oilers as defensive coordinator after successful stints with San Francisco 49ers (Super Bowl champs following '81 season) and Cincinnati Bengals.

**February 1**—Oilers perennial All-Pro DE Elvin Bethea decides not to retire following 1982 season and will return for his 16th year in the NFL, all with the Oilers.

**February 2**—Oilers announce promotion of Mike Holovak from Assistant General Manager to VP/Player Personnel. Holovak's contract with the club is extended through the 1986 season.

April 6—Jerry Trupiano, Wally Lemm (former Oilers Head Coach) and John O'Reilly named to Oilers radio broadcast team. KTRH in Houston will again serve as the flagship station for the Oilers/Mutual Radio Network.

April 23—The Oilers announce trade of their second pick in first round to Los Angeles Rams for the third pick overall in draft. Oilers receive Rams' fourth round choice in 1983 and fourth round choice in 1984 for moving down one notch in first round.

April 24—The Oilers announce their second trade in as many days involving Oilers' first-round draft pick. Oilers trade third choice overall in first round to Scattle for ninth choice overall in first round plus Scahawks' second and third round picks in 1983 (combining trades of April 24-25, Oilers moved from second position in first round to ninth and acquired Seahawks' second and third round choice in 1983 and Rams' fourth round choice in 1983 and 1984, a total of four additional picks).

April 26—Oilers select T Bruce Matthews from USC in round one of NFL draft with the ninth choice in the round. Also, for first time since 1969, the Oilers had each of their choices through the first nine rounds.

August 4—In preseason opener, ceremonies honoring Elvin Bethea's sixteen years with the club occur at halftime. Bethea's jersey, #65, will be retired at the conclusion of the season.

October 10-Head Coach Ed Biles resigns after 2 1/2 years as head coach.

October 11-The Oilers appoint Defensive Coordinator Chuck Studley as interim head coach.

October 20-Oilers trade QB Archie Manning and TE Dave Casper to Minnesota for second and fourth round picks in 1984 draft.

December 18—Offers close season with 20-10 loss at Baltimore (Colts' final game played in Baltimore before moving to Indianapolis).

#### 1984

January 3-The Oilers name Hugh Campbell as new head coach.

January 30—Announcement is made that Kay Dalton will remain as offensive coordinator and also that Jerry Glanville will become new detensive coordinator.

February 3—The Oilers announce that they win the "recruiting war" for free agent QB Warren Moon.

**February 10**—Entire organization loses tremendous friend with the passing of radio talk-show host John Breen. Breen was first employee hired by the Oilers in 1959 and served in numerous front office capacities, including General Manager and Director of Player Personnel.

May 1—Oilers officially select Dean Steinkuhler and also draft a total of 14 players during the one-day marathon. Of the 14 selected, 10 were defensive players.

September 6—Oilers and City of Houston celebrate 25th season of professional football at "Silver Salute," which is held on the floor of the Astrodome. The black-tie gala consists of dinner, dancing and an auction with all proceeds benefiting the Ronald McDonald House. This date is also proclaimed "Houston Oilers Day" by Mayor Kathryn J. Whitmire.

**October 9**—Oilers trade RB Earl Campbell to New Orleans Saints for first round choice in 1985 draft. The Oilers also obtain C Jim Romano from Raiders for Houston's third and sixth round picks in 1985.

**October 26**—Oilers announce that KODA-FM will be new flagship station for Oilers' radio broadcasts beginning in 1985. The Oilers and KO-DA-FM sign a multi-year contract.

**November 11**—Qilers defeat Chiefs 17-16 in Kansas City after losing opening ten games of the season as Hugh Campbell gets first win as NFL head coach.

**November 18**—Houston wins second consecutive game as Jets fall by a 51-20 margin in the Astrodome. Warren Moon again hits for over 70% of his attempts (20 of 28 for 71%) and throws for three TDs. Larry Moriarty rushes for 138 yards for second consecutive 100-plus yard game.

**December 2**—Houston defeats Steelers in overtime thriller 23-20 for third win in four weeks before home crowd. Joe Cooper kicks winning field goal with 5:53 elapsed in extra period. It is the first overtime loss in Steeler history.

**December 12**—G Mike Munchak is selected to play in the AFC-NFC. Pro Bowl game in Honolulu.

**December 17**—Warren Moon completes his first NFL season with 3,338 yards passing, breaking the team record set by George Blanda in 1961 (3,330). Tim Smith's 1,141 yards receiving enabled him to become third player in Oilers' history to post consecutive 1,000 yard receiving seasons after gaining 1,176 in 1983. Bill Groman (1960-61) and Charlie Hennigan (1963-64) were the others.

#### 1985

July 1—The Oilers sign 1983 Heisman Trophy winner Mike Rozier. Rozier was selected by the Oilers in the first round of the 1984 Supplemental Draft of USFL players.

July 2—WR Drew Hill is acquired by the Oilers in a trade with the Los Angeles Rams.

**August 3**—The Oilers battle the New York Giants in the annual NFL Hall of Fame Game in Canton, Ohio, with the Giants winning 21-20. The game also makes radio history as the first stereo broadcast of an NFL game on KODA-FM.

**December 9**—Hugh Campbell is relieved of his duties as head coach. The club names Defensive Coordinator Jerry Glanville as interim head coach for the season's remaining two games.

#### 1986

January 2—The Oilers release seven assistant coaches from their employment contracts. The seven coaches are John Devlin, Joe Faragalli, Gene Gaines. Ken Houston, Bruce Lemmerman, Bob Padilla and Al Roberts.

January 20—Jerry Glanville signs a five-year contract as Head Coach of the Oilers. Glanville served the final two 1985 games as interim head coach in addition to serving as defensive coordinator since 1984.

February 2—G Mike Munchak starts for the AFC in the annual Pro-Bowl in Honolulu, Hawaii.

February 6-Floyd Reese is named as the Oilers' LB coach.

April 29—The Oilers select Purdue QB Jim Everett with their first selection in the 1986 NFL Draft. The team follows by selecting Louisville WR Ernest Givins in the second round and RB Allen Pinkett of Notre Dame in the third round.

**August 30**—The Oilers defeat the Dallas Cowboys 17-11 to finish the preseason with a 4-0 record. It marks the first time since 1965 that the Oilers have completed their preseason schedule undefeated.

**September 18**—The Oilers trade QB Jim Everett, the third player selected in the 1986 draft, to the Los Angeles Rams in exchange for G Kent Hill, DE William Fuller, the Rams' number one draft choices in 1987 and '88 and L.A.'s fifth rounder in 1987.

**December 21**—Houston concludes the 1986 season on a positive note, defeating the Buffalo Bills 16-7. WR Drew Hill catches five passes for 114 yards giving him 1,112 yards for the season as he joins rookic Ernest Givins (1.062 yards) to form the 19th tandem in NFI, history to each surpass the 1.000-yard receiving mark. In addition, QB Warren Moon throws for 208 yards to finish the year with 3,489 yards and break his own single season club record. PK Tony Zendejas connects on all three of his field goal attempts and his 22 three-pointers establishes a new Oiler high.

#### 1987

July 1—The Oilers announce plans to retire the #34 jersey of former RB Earl Campbell, the leading rusher in club history. The ceremony is scheduled for August 13.

**October 4**—The Oilers win their first "replacement" game in Denver 40-10 as QB Brent Pease throws for 260 yards and a TD and LB Eugene Seale returns an interception 73 yards for a touchdown.

Seale returns an interception 73 yards for a touchdown. **October 25**—With the players' strike over, the Oiler "regulars" return to action with a 37-33 win over the Falcons as RB Mike Rozier rushes for 144 yards while rookie WR Curtis Duncan catches two TD passes including the game-winner.

**October 28**—First round draftee FB Alonzo Highsmith ends his holdout by agreeing to a multi-year contract.

November 3—The Oilers acquire veteran T Bruce Davis from the Raiders for what later becomes a 1988 second-round draft choice.

November 4-1/G Bruce Matthews ends his holdout by agreeing to terms with the Oilers.

**November 15**—The Oilers earn their first victory in Three Rivers Stadium since 1978, beating the Steelers 23-3 as QB Warren Moon completes 16 of 22 passes for 239 yards and two TDs.

**December 15**—Along with several prominent Houston business leaders, K.S. "Bud" Adams, Jr., holds a press conference to announce that the goal of marketing 75% of the new Columbia Suites by December 15 has been met.

**December 23**—The Oilers place three players on the AFC Pro Bowl roster, their largest contingent since 1981. Chosen to play in the Honolulu all-star game are S Keith Bostic, G Mike Munchak and RB Mike Rozier.

**December 27**—The Oilers clinch their first playoff berth since 1980 as they defeat the Bengals 21-17 before an SRO crowd at the Astrodome. Rookie FB Alonzo Highsmith scores two TDs and QB Warren Moon throws his 21st scoring pass of the season. That marks the most TD passes by an Oiler since George Blanda tossed 24 in 1963.

#### 1988

January 3-In an AFC Wild Card Playoff, the Oilers defeat the Seahawks 23-20 in overtime on Tony Zendejas' 42-yard field goal.

January 10—The Oilers' season ends as the Broncos defeat them 34-10 in an AFC Divisional Playoff before 75,968 fans in Mile High Stadium. April 21—The Oilers acquire DE Sean Jones from Raiders along with LA's second-round draft choice. Houston gives up one of its first-round draft picks, a fourth rounder and changes places with Raiders in the third round.

May 6—The Oilers announce that they will hold training camp at Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos. SWTSU thus becomes the Oilers' eighth training camp site since the team's inception in 1960.

May 17-Oilers re-assign Mike Holovak to Assistant to the General Manager.

July 11—The Oilers name Dick Corrick as Director of College Scouting. Corrick joins the Oilers after working for the Green Bay Packers since 1971.

August 29—The Oilers complete the third undefeated preseason in their history (1965, 1986) beating the Dallas Cowboys 54-10.

November 7-The Oilers appear on Monday Night Football for the first time since 1982 and defeat the Cleveland Browns 24-17.

**December 14**—The rosters for the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl are released and feature eight Oilers including DE Ray Childress, WR Drew Hill, G Bruce Matthews, QB Warren Moon, G Mike Munchak and RB Mike Rozier.

December 24—The Oilers beat the Cleveland Browns 24-23 in an AFC. Wild Card Playoff Game as RB Allen Pinkett scores two touchdowns.

#### 1989

January 1—In an AFC Divisional Playoff Game, the Oilers drop a 17-10 decision to the Bills before 79,532 fans at Rich Stadium in Buffalo. February 1—Executive Vice-President/General Manager Ladd K. Herzeg announces his resignation.

**February 2**—The Oilers announce the promotion of Mike Holovak to General Manager, replacing Ladd Herzeg. Also, under NFL's new "Plan B" free agency, 21 Oilers are left unprotected while 37 are protected.

February 22—The Otlers name Kevin Gilbride to the post of Quarterbacks Coach. He joins the club after serving as Offensive Coordinator at East Carolina.

April 1—The Ollers end up losing 15 players and signing seven under the NFL's first "Plan B" free agency system.

April 7-The Oilers sign QB Warren Moon to a new long-term con-

September 24—Despite a sellout crowd in the first game in the newlyexpanded Astrodome, the Oilers lose to the Buffalo Bills, 47-44 in OT.

**October 1**—The Oilers defeat the Miami Dolphins 39-7 as QB Warren Moon completes a career-best 82.6% of his passes (19/25). In addition, Houston's defense holds Dolphin QB Dan Marino to his worst game as a starter (11/29, 103 yds.).

**October 22**—The Oilers record the ninth shutout in club history and their first in nine years (spanning 132 games) with a 27-0 whitewash of the Pittsburgh Steelers. Pittsburgh manages just 132 total yards, the fewest yards allowed by Houston in 12 seasons.

**December 3**—The Oilers win at Pittsburgh 23-16 despite a blizzard and windchill temperatures of -20 degrees. RB Lorenzo White's one-yard run with 21 seconds remaining wins it as the Oilers claim sole possession of first place after the season's 13th game for the first time since 1967

**December 10**—The Oilers honor their 30th Anniversary "Dream Team" while defeating the Tampa Bay Buccaneers 20-17.

December 20-G Bruce Matthews, QB Warren Moon and G Mike Munchak are named starters for the February 4 Pro Bowl.

**December 23**—In a regular season finale battle for the AFC Central Division title, the Oilers lose to the Cleveland Browns 24-20 on RB Kevin. Mack's TD with 39 seconds left. The Oilers fall short after battling back from a 17-0 deficit as QB Warren Moon establishes personal bests for attempts (51), completions (32) and yards (414, most since George Blanda's 418 (n 1961). Oilers set all-time single season attendance record with 451,027 fans, eclipsing 411, 652 in 1978. **December 31**—In an AFC Wild Card playoff game, the Oilers lose a 26-

**December 31**—In an AFC Wild Card playoff game, the Oilers lose a 26-23 OT decision to the Pittsburgh Steelers as PK Gary Anderson kicks a 50-yard field goal, Houston WR Ernest Givins catches 11 passes for 136yards and two TDs.

#### 1990

January 6-Jerry Glanville leaves his position as Oilers' head coach by "mutual agreement,"

January 9—Jack Pardee signs a five-year contract to become the 14th head coach in Houston Oiler history. Pardee joins the Oilers after enjoying a successful three seasons as the head coach at the University of Houston.

January 12—Head Coach Jack Pardee announces the hiring of three of his University of Houston assistant coaches to Oiler posts. Named to Pardee's Oiler staff are Defensive Coordinator Jim Eddy, Offensive Line Coach Bob Young and Defensive Backs Coach Pat Thomas.

January 30—The Oilers extend the contract of Executive Vice President/General Manager Mike Holovak. In addition the team names former LBs Coach Floyd Reese to the newly-created position of Assistant General Manager and promotes Quarterbacks Coach Kevin Gilbride to Offensive Coordinator. Also, the team announces the signing of a multiyear contract that allows KTRH-AM/KLOL-FM to broadcast all Oiler football games beginning in 1990.

March 15—The Oilers announce that Raycom Sports Network has agreed to a multi-year contract to televise Oiler preseason games plus a weekly wrap-up show.

September 23—The Oilers win their 1990 home opener 24-10 over the Indianapolis Colts as QB Warren Moon becomes the all-time leading passer in club history. Moon throws for 308 yards (plus 3 TDs) to surpass George Blanda's team record of 19,149 yards. The record fell on a third quarter seven-yard pass to WR Haywood Jeffires. WR Drew Hill catches ten passes for 123 yards to help key the victory.

September 30—The Oilers capture their first road win of the season; defeating the Chargers 17-7 as QB Warren Moon throws for 355 yards, and WR Drew Hill records his 50th career touchdown. Moon's 27 completions allows him to pass Dan Pastorini's club record of 1.426.

**October 14**—QB Warren Moon passes for 369 yards and a career-best five TDs as the Oilers hammer the Cincinnati Bengals 48-17. Moon thus becomes the first player in pro football history to throw for over 20,000 yards in two different leagues (21,228 in Canadian Football League).

**December 2**—Despite losing 13-10 in overtime at Seattle, QB Warren Moon's 232 passing yards allow him to break his own single-season club passing record of 3.651 yards (set in 1989).

**December 9**—The Oilers shatter several team records while drubbing Cleveland 58-14. Included among the records set are most points in a game, in a quarter (51) and in a half (45). RB Lorenzo White ties a club mark with four rushing touchdowns, the first time that's been accomplished in the NFL in two years.

**December 16**—The Ollers win a key road game, beating Kansas City 27-10 at Arrowhead Stadium. QB Warren Moon again supplies the big news, completing 27 of 45 passes for 527 yards. That represents the second best single game passing performance in NFL history. The record belongs to the Rams' Norm Van Brocklin, who threw for 554 yards against the New York Yanks on September 28, 1951. Moon had an opportunity to break the record but declined to do so based on the Oilers' comfortable lead. Almost overshadowed by Moon's effort was WR Haywood Jeffires catching nine balls for 245 yards (including 87-yard TD) which marked the second best receiving day in Oiler history. Charles Hennigan had 272 receiving yards versus the Patriots on October 13, 1961.

**December 19**—Six Ollers are named to the AFC squad for the February 3 Pro Bowl. The six include starters G Bruce Matthews, QB Warren Moon and G Mike Munchak, plus reserves DT Ray Childress. WR Ernest Givins and WR Drew Hill.

**December 23**—The Offers lose an opportunity to cement their grasp on first place in the AFC Central Division by losing at Cincinnati 40-20. Additionally, QB Warren Moon is lost for the remainder of the season after suffering an open dislocation of his throwing thumb.

**December 29**—Oiler Owner/President K.S. "Bud" Adams and San Antonio Mayor Lila Cockrell jointly announce a tentative agreement for the Oilers to hold their annual summer training camp in San Antonio. Also it is announced that the Oilers will serve as the host team for preseason games in San Antonio's Alamodome when that facility is completed in 1993.

**December 30**—Led by back-up QB Cody Carlson, the Oilers earn a wild eard playoff berth by defeating the Pittsburgh Steelers 34-14 in the Astrodome. Carlson completes 22 of 29 passes for 247 yards and three TDs. With the victory, the Oilers end up in a three-way tie for first place with Cincinnati and Pittsburgh in the AFC Central.

#### 1991

**January 6**—The Oilers' 1990 season comes to a close as they are eliminated from the playoffs by the Cincinnati Bengals. Houston loses at Riverfront Stadium 41-14 in an AFC Wild Card game.

January 26—It is announced that Earl Campbell has been voted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The announcement is made in Tampa, Florida. Campbell is to be enshrined on July 27.

May 17—The Oflers and the City of San Antonio formally sign six-year contract which will allow the Oflers to hold training camp there. Trinity University is chosen as the host school.

September 16—In a pre-game ceremony, Earl Campbell receives his Hall of Fame ring from Hall Executive Director Pete Elliott. In the game that follows, the Oilers defeat Kansas City 17-7 to signal the first 3-0 start in franchise history.

**October 13**—In a 23-20 victory over the Jets at Giants Stadium, WR Haywood Jeffires ties Charlie Hennigan's 30-year-old team record for receptions in a game with 13 (186 yards). QB Warren Moon completes 35 of 50 passes for 423 yards, which is the fifth best total in team annals. Also, WR Drew Hill surpasses Hennigan's 410 catches to become the alltime leading receiver in Oiler history.

**November 3**—Despite a 16-13 OT loss at Washington, WR Drew Hill moves past WR Ken Burrough's 6,907 receiving yards to become the Oilers' all-time leader in that category.

**November 10**—QB Warren Moon establishes career highs for completions (41) and attempts (56) as he throws for 432 yards, which is fourth best in team history, in Oilers' 26-23 OT victory over Dallas. Moon also passes Fran Tarkenton's 47,003 yards and moves into second place behind Ron Lancaster on all-time professional passing yards chart.

**December 8**—The Oilers defeat the Steelers 31-6 in the Astrodome as Houston captures its first-ever undisputed AFC Central Division championship. QB Warren Moon throws for 254 yards and becomes just the third QB in NFL history (Miami's Dan Marino, San Diego's Dan Fouts) to have back-to-back 4.000-yard seasons.

**December 15**—QB Warren Moon surpasses Dan Marino's NFL record (378 in 1986) for completions in a season as the Oilers beat the Browns 17-11.

**December 18**—Eight Oilers (tied NFL-best), including a league-high six starters are named to the AFC team for the February 2 Pro Bowl. The six starters include CB Cris Dishman, DE William Fuller, WR Haywood Jeffires, C Bruce Matthews, G Mike Munchak and LB Al Smith. DT Ray Childress and QB Warren Moon are also named to the squad although Childress was eventually unable to play because of a back/rib injury.

**December 21**—WR Haywood Jeffires becomes just the fifth player in NFL history to record 100 receptions in a single season despite the Oilers' 24-20 road loss to the Giants. Coupled with Drew Hill's 90 catches, that pair's 190 represents the most receptions by two teanmates in one season in league annals. In addition, QB Warren Moon eclipses Dan Marino's NFL record (625 in 1986) for attempts in a season. DE William Fuller registers his 15th sack of the season and thus becomes the first Oiler ever to lead the conference in that category.

**December 29**—The Otlers defeat the New York Jets 17-10 in an AFC. Wild Card playoff game before 61,485 fans in the Astrodome. S Bubba McDowell intercepts two key passes inside the Otler five-yard line to preserve the win.

#### 1992

January 4—After leading for most of the game, the Oilers end up losing a heartbreaking 26-24 decision to the Denver Broncos in an AFC Divisional Playoff game in front of 75,301 fans at Mile High Stadium. PK '96 Houston Oilers David Treadwell's 28-yard field goal with 16 seconds left in the game proves to be the deciding points. The loss mars a great performance by Oiler QB Warren Moon who completes 75% of his passes (27 of 36) for 325 yards and three touchdowns.

March 6—The Oilers name Steve Underwood as General Counsel. Underwood joins the Oilers from the Houston firm of Caldwell and Hurst where he has handled most of the team's legal work since 1977.

**August 1**—The Oilers defeat the Dallas Cowboys 34-23 in the American Bowl in Tokyo, Japan, which marks Houston's first game outside of the United States.

August 31—The Oilers and QB Warren Moon reach agreement on a new multi-year contract that includes a settlement of a controversial escalator clause.

**September 29**—The Oilers sign free agent WR Webster Slaughter to a two-year contract. Slaughter had been one of four players who were declared free agents by a Minneapolis judge on September 24.

**October 11**—In a 38-24 win at Cincinnati, QB Warren Moon ties a personal best with five TD passes to eclipse George Blanda's team record for career touchdown passes (165, Moon now has 169). Also WR Haywood Jeffires catches three TD passes to tie the franchise record, and RB Lorenzo White rushes for a career-best 149 yards.

**October 18**—QB Warren Moon becomes the leading passer in professional football history by surpassing Ron Lancaster's 50,535 yards (in 19 years). After the Oilers' heartbreaking 27:21 loss at Denver, Moon now has 50,589 yards. Moon's total, accumulated in less than 15 seasons, includes 21,228 yards in the CFL and 29,361 yards in the NFL.

**November 15**—In Houston's 17-13 win at Minnesota, QB Warren Moon suffers a fractured upper left arm on a fourth quarter hit by Viking S Vencie Glenn and misses the next five games. Despite the injury, Moon becomes just the 14th NFL QB to surpass 30,000 passing yards as he accomplishes that faster (125 games) than any player in league history except for Miami's Dan Marino (114 games).

**November 26**—Subbing for the injured Warren Moon, QB Cody Carlson throws for a career-high 338 yards as the Oilers defeat the Lions 24-21 on Thanksgiving Day in Detroit.

**December 11**—After being diagnosed with kidney cancer, Offensive Coordinator Kevin Gilbride undergoes surgery for the removal of his cancerous kidney. He misses two games as Receivers Coach Chris Palmer and injured QB Warren Moon help to handle Gilbride's game day responsibilities.

**December 23**—An NFL-best nine Oflers carn Pro Bowl honors with four players designated as starters for the February 7 game. The starters include WR Haywood Jeffires, C Bruce Matthews, G Mike Munchak and LB Al Smith. The Houston reserves feature DT Ray Childress, WR Curtis Duncan, WR Ernest Givins, QB Warren Moon and RB Lorenzo White. The inclusion of Jeffires, Givins and Duncan represents the first time ever that three receivers from the same team have been designated as Pro Bowlers.

**December 20**—Shortly after their exciting, come-from-behind 17-14 win at Cleveland, the Oilers learn that they have clinched a playoff berth for the sixth straight season. That represents the longest current post-season streak in the NFL.

**December 27**—As Houston routs Buffalo 27-3 in the regular season finale, WR Haywood Jeffires catches six passes to finish with 90 receptions. He thus leads the AFC in that category for the third straight season, becoming only the second player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to accomplish that feat.

#### 1993

January 3—The Offers lose a 11-38 OT decision at Buffalo in an AFC. Wild Card playoff game. QB Warren Moon completes 36 of 50 passes for 371 yards and four first half touchdowns.

January 4—The Otlers announce that they will not offer new contracts to Defensive Coordinator Jim Eddy and Defensive Backs Coach Pat Thomas.

January 29-The Oilers name Buddy Ryan as the team's defensive coordinator.

July 2—NFL Commissioner Paul Tagliabue rules in a dispute between the Oilers and Redskins. Tagliabue completes a trade which sends Washington LB Wilber Marshall to Houston in exchange for the Oilers' third round draft choice in 1994 and their fifth rounder in 1995.

**November 1**&—WR Haywood Jeffires ties a team record with three touchdown receptions and QB Warren Moon throws four TD passes in just over two quarters of playing time as the Oilers rout the Bengals 38-3 at Riverfront Statlium. RB Gary Brown earns AFC Offensive Player of

the Week honors by rushing for 166 yards in his first NFL start which marks the most yards by an Oiler back in 12 years.

**November 21**—RB Gary Brown explodes for 194 rushing yards to lead Houston to its fifth straight win, a 27-20 victory at Cleveland. Brown's rushing total is the highest by any AFC back in three years and the most by an Oiler in 13 years. His back-to-back running sum of 360 yards is also the team's best in 13 seasons. Brown becomes the first NFL back in ten years to gain over 100 yards in his first two career starts. Also, S Marcus Robertson ties a team record by becoming the first Oiler in 22 years to get three interceptions in a game.

November 28—In the Oilers' 23-3 Astrodome victory over the Steelers. WR Ernest Givins passes Drew Hill's 480 catches to become Houston's all-time leading receiver.

**December 5**—As Houston captures its seventh straight win with a 33-17 home decision over Atlanta, the Oilers' defense forces seven turnovers (including a team record-tying six interceptions) for its highest such total in 16 years.

**December 14**—Oiler DT Jeff Alm commits suicide following the death of his best friend in a traffic accident. The Oilers hold a memorial service for their teammate the following day.

**December 19**—The Oilers clinch their second outright AFC Central Division championship with a 26-17 win over the Steelers at Three Rivers Stadium. Houston thus cements a playoff berth for the seventh consecutive season, the longest current streak in the NFL. The Oilers also become just the second team since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to go undeleated within the AFC's Central Division (also 1975 Steelers). Against Pittsburgh, PK Al Del Greco surpasses the team record of 115 points in a single season.

**December 28**—G Mike Munchak establishes an Oiler record by being named to the Pro Bowl for the ninth time (Elvin Bethea had eight appearances).

#### 1994

January 2—The Oilers close the regular season with their club record 11th consecutive win, a 24-0 shutout of the Jets in the Astrodome. The winning streak is the longest in the NFL in nine years as the Oilers become just the fifth team in league history to close a season with 11 straight victories. The Oilers also set a franchise record with 12 wins for the season and go undefeated in both November and December for just the third time ever. Amazingly, RB Gary Brown finished with 1,002 yards in just eight starts.

January 27—The Oilers promote Assistant General Manager Floyd Reese to the position of Executive Vice-President/General Manager. Reese succeeds Mike Holovak who assumes the title of Vice-President/Player Personnel and Scouting.

**February 8**—The Ollers promote Kevin Gilbride to Assistant Head Coach/Offense and name Dick Coury as the team's Offensive Coordinator.

February 9—Houston names Jeff Fisher as its new Defensive Coordinator, replacing Buddy Ryan who left the Oilers to become General Manager Head Coach of the Arizona Cardinals.

April 13—The Minnesota Vikings announce that they have reached an agreement to acquire QB Warren Moon from the Oilers in exchange for draft choices.

August 15—The Oilers defeat the Dallas Cowboys. 6-0, before 112,376 fans at Azteca Stadium in Mexico City. The in-house attendance is the largest ever for an NFL game.

September 4—WR Ernest Givins becomes Oilers' all-time receiving yardage leader, surpassing Drew Hill's mark of 7,477. Givins would end the season with 7,935 yards on 542 career receptions.

**November 6**—G Mike Munchak, who announced his retirement on July 21, 1994 to join the Oilers under the title of Assistant to Football Operations, is honored by Oiler Owner/President K.S. "Bud" Adams, Jr., by having his #63 jersey retired at halftime ceremonies of Oilers-Steelers game.

November 14—After a 1-9 start, Head Coach Jack Pardee and Assistant Head Coach/Offense Kevin Gilbride are relieved of their dutics. Jeff Fisher is elevated to title of Head Coach/Defensive Coordinator.

December 24—Houston closes out season with 24-10 victory over the New York Jets for Fisher's first win as a head coach.

#### 1995

January 5-Ollers announce that Jeff Fisher will remain as head coach, officially becoming the 15th head coach in franchise history.

January 17—As his first hire. Fisher brings in Jerry Rhome under the title of Offensive Coordinator.

March 3—The Oilers jump into the free agent pool and sign the NFL's all-time leading kickoff returner, Mel Gray, Gray joins the Oilers after successful stints with the Detroit Lions and New Orleans Saints.

March 7—The team announces five-year contract with KHTV/Channel 39 to broadcast Oilers' preseason games. The pact reunites the team and KHTV, which carried Oilers preseason action in '89.

March 23-Houston lures in one of the most coveted unrestricted free agents by signing C Mark Stepnoski from the Dallas Cowboys.

March 28-The Oilers sign veteran QB Chris Chandler from the Rams.

April 22—With the third overall choice in the draft, Houston selects Alcorn State QB Steve McNair.

July 25-QB Steve McNair signs contract at press conference held at Oilers' training camp.

August 11—Tennessee newspaper reports that Nashville Mayor Phil Bredesen is meeting with Oiler officials. Nashville is willing to build new stadium if it will attract a professional team. K.S. "Bud" Adams, Jr. and Bredesen execute an agreement that gives the City of Nashville a 70-day exclusive negotiating period with the Houston Oilers to build a stadium and relocate the team.

August 19—Oilers-Chargers preseason game is canceled by NFL after field is deemed unplayable for safety reasons.

September 3—The Oilers travel to Jacksonville and defeat the Jaguars 10-3 in the expansion team's inaugural game.

September 24—QB Chris Chandler connects on 25 of 26 passes for 352 yards and four TDs, leading Oilers to a 38-28 win over the Bengals at Riverfront Stadium. Chandler's 88.46 completion percentage misses the NFL record by one completion. Chandler, who hooked up with rookie WR Chris Sanders on TD passes of 58 and 46 yards, is named AFC Offensive Player of the Week.

November 2—Ollers' long-time equipment assistant Bill "Mojo" Lackey passes away after a massive stroke.

**November 5**—Oilers win 37-10 over Browns and dedicate game to "Mojo" and his family. The win marks the Oilers' largest margin of victory at Cleveland since a 40-10 decision on Oct. 12, 1975.

**November 12**—K.S. "Bud" Adams, Jr. and the Oilers announce the establishment of the Bill "Mojo" Lackey Memorial Award, which would be given to the player, coach or front office staff member that best exemplifics the qualities of the former equipment assistant. A \$10,000 check is given to the winner to be awarded to charity in his or her name.

November 16-K.S. "Bud" Adams, Jr. and Nashville Mayor Phil Bredesen sign a relocation agreement to move the Oilers the Tennessee.

**December 14**—G Bruce Matthews, S Blaine Bishop, CB Darryll Lewis and C Mark Stepnoski are selected to the Pro Bowl. Matthews sets the Oiler mark for consecutive selections with his eighth straight Pro Bowl honor.

December 17-Paul "Hoss" Noska, equipment assistant, is honored with the First Annual Bill "Mojo" Lackey Memorial Award.

#### 1996

March 26-Oilers sign veteran WR Willie Davis from the Kansas Gity Chiefs.

**April 20**—After trading down in the first round (from 9th to 17th) to acquire extra picks from Oakland. General Manager Floyd Reese and Head Coach Jeff Fisher execute a trade with the Seattle Seahawks to move back up to the 14th spot in the '96 draft to select Heisman Trophy winner Eddie George from Ohio State. Sent to the Seahawks in the trade was DT Glenn Montgomery.

April 30-The National Football League approves the team's relocation to Nashville in a special owner's meeting held in Atlanta, Georgia.

May 3-Adding more weapons to the offense, the Oilers agree to terms with RB Ronnie Harmon from the San Diego Chargers

May 7-Voters of Davidson County in Nashville. Tennessee, overwhelmingly approve a referendum held to decide on the use of public funding for a new downtown stadium.

September 23, 1979 - Houston 30, at Cincinnati 27: Oilers win the toss. On opening series, Bengals force Cliff Parsley punt. Cincinnati drives to Oilers' 14-yard line, but K Chris Bahr misses a 32-yard field goal attempt. Houston again has to punt on its ensuing series. The Oiler defense then forces a punt by Bengals' Pat McInally. Houston takes over on the Cincinnati 42. RB Earl Campbell's 15-yard run is the long play prior to K Toni Fritsch's winning 29-yard field goal at 14:28 of OT.

October 28, 1979 - at Houston 27, N.Y. Jets 24: Oilers win the toss. QB Dan Pastorini's 22-yard completion to FB Rob Carpenter is the long play as Ollers drive 58 yards. K Toni Fritsch kicks the winning 35-yard field goal at 5:10 of OT.

November 23, 1980 - at N.Y. Jets 31, Houston 28: Jets win the toss. A personal foul on Houston's Guido Merkens on the kickoff gives New York possession at the Jets' 40-yard line. QB Richard Todd's 17-yard screen pass to RB Bobby Harper is the long play prior to K Pat Leahy's winning 38-yard field goal at 3:58 of OT.

September 4, 1983 - Green Bay 41, at Houston 38: Packers win the toss. RB Eddie Lee Ivery's 12-yard run is the long play as Packers drive 59 yards. K Jan Stenerud kicks the winning 42-yard field goal at 5:55 of OT.

October 23, 1983 - Kausas City 13, at Houston 10: Chiefs win the toss. QB Bill Kenney's 20-yard completion to WR Stephone Paige is the long play as Chiefs drive 60 yards. K Nick Lowery kicks the winning 41-yard field goal at 7:41 of OT.

October 30, 1983 - at Cleveland 25, Houston 19: Oilers win the toss. Browns' defense forces a John James punt. Houston defense does the same to Cleveland as Jeff Gossett punts on ensuing series. Oiler QB Gifford Nielsen's pass is intercepted by Cleveland S Mike Whitwell and returned 15 yards to the Houston 20-yard line. On the next play, RB Boyce Green scores a touchdown on a 20-yard run at 6:34 of OT.

December 2, 1984 - at Houston 23, Pittsburgh 20: Oilers win the toss. QB Warren Moon's 19-yard completion to WR Steve Bryant is the long play as Oilers drive 63 yards. K Joe Cooper kicks the winning 30-yard field goal at 5:53 of OT.

September 28, 1986 - Pittsburgh 22, at Houston 16: Oilers win the toss. Steelers' defense forces a Lee Johnson punt that is returned 41 yards to the Oilers' 15-yard line by Pittsburgh's Rick Woods. Two plays later, RB Walter Abercrombic runs three yards for winning touchdown at 2:35 of OT.

November 30, 1986 - at Cleveland 13, Houston 10: Oilers win the toss but elect to kickoff (18-25 MPH winds). Oilers' defense forces a Jeff Gossett punt. QB Oliver Luck, replacing an injured Warren Moon, leads the Oilers to the Cleveland 31-yard line, but then is intercepted by CB Frank Minnifield at the Browns' 21. Again Houston's defense puts the Browns in a punting situation. Once again, Minnifield picks off a Luck pass, returning it to the Oilers' 37. FB Kevin Mack's seven-yard run and QB Bernie Kosar's seven-yard pass to WR Brian Brennan are the long plays prior to K Mark Moseley's winning 29yard field goal at 14:34 of OT

\*\*January 3, 1988 - at Houston 23, Seattle 20: Seahawks win the toss. Oilers' defense forces a Ruben Bodriguez punt. QB Warren Moon's 15yard pass to WR Drew Hill is the long play as the Oilers drive 61 yards. K Tony Zendejas kicks the winning 42-yard field goal at 8:05 of OT.

September 4, 1988 - Houston 17, at Indianapolis 142 Colts win the toss. On the opening series, QB Gary Hogeboom completes a screen pass to RB Eric Dickerson, but Oiler LB John Grimsley forces a fumble which is recovered by LB Robert Lyles on the Colts' 42-yard line. RB Earnest Byner carries three times for a total of nine yards before Chip Lohmiller kicks a 41-yard field goal to win the game at 4:01 of OT.

November 10, 1991 - at Houston 26, Datlas 23: Oilers win the toss. Cowboys' defense forces a Greg Montgomery punt as Dallas takes over on its own 24-yard line. The Cowboys move to the Oiler 24-yard line where they have a first down following a Houston holding penalty. Dallas RB Emmitt Smith gains seven yards but fumbles after a hit by LB Lamar Lathon with Oiler 8 Bo Orlando recovering at the Houston 15. Oiler RB Lorenzo White runs once for two yards before K Al Del Greco boots the game-winning 39-yard field goal at 1:55 of OT.

Two plays later, K Gary Anderson hits from 40 yards out for the winning score at 3:36 of OT.

October 8, 1995 - at Minnesota 23, Houston 17: Vikings win the toss. The Vikings move the ball to their 38-yard line but are forced to punt. Minnesota P Mike Saxon then pins the Oilers in at their 8-yard line with a 5-t-yard boot. On his third carry of overtime, RB Rodney Thomas scampers 27 yards to give the Oilers a first down at their 35. QB Will Furrer, who replaced Chris Chandler after he injured his shoulder while being sacked on the Oilers' last offensive series in the fourth quarter, is intercepted on his second pass attempt by CB Dewayne Washington (25-yard return). RB Robert Smith takes his third consecutive carry of OT 20 yards for the winning score with 7:10 gone in the extra stanza.







Handling the play-by-play chores for his third season will be KTRH Sports Director Russ Small, who was the Oilers' color analyst from 1992-93.

# **PRESEASON TV**

For the second consecutive year, KITTV (Channel 39) will carry Houston Oilers' preseason football. The Oilers and KHTV were reunited in '95 after the station carried games during the summer of '89.

Ron Franklin, who previously did play-by-play for Oilers' radio broadcasts from 1971-1982, will again call the action this summer.

Franklin is nationally-known as an ESPN play-by-play commentator for the cable network's prime-time College Football Association telecasts and NCAA basketball games. He currently operates his own production company, "Ron Franklin Productions," in Austin, Texas.

# MEDIA INFORMATION

**CREDENTIALS:** Media representatives who do not have press eredentials for the entire season (but will be working for an accredited media outlet on an immediate deadline) may request them on a single-game basis. Telephone or written requests must be made at least three working days in advance to Dave Pearson, Director of Media Relations and Services: Houston Oilers, 8030 El Rio, Houston, Texas 77054 (713/881-3500). Reserved credentials can be picked up at Press Will Call, located at the Astrodome's Loading Dock on the day of the game.

**PHOTOGRAPHERS:** Photographers with accredited media outlets on an immediate deadline may request credentials on a singlegame basis from the Oilers' Media Relations Department. Due to space limitations, it is not possible to issue credentials to freelance photographers. Field photographers are reminded to remain outside of the bench areas.

**PRESS BOX:** To get to the Astrodome press box, enter the stadium at the Loading Dock entrance between the West and South gates (where the TV trucks are parked). Take the press elevator to Level 5 and turn right on the concourse. Follow the concourse until it ends, and you will be in the working press area. Visiting radio is located in Booth 567 while network TV announcers will be in Booth 571. All broadcasting booths are located on the fifth floor concourse. Only credentials issued by the Houston Oilers will be honored for admittance to the Astrodome.

**LOCKER ROOMS:** Admission to the home and visiting locker rooms is governed by each individual team. Only media representatives with proper credentials will be admitted into the locker rooms. No one will be admitted into the locker rooms prior to or during the game. Your press credential is good for admittance to both locker rooms. To reach the Oilers' locker room from the press box, take the fifth floor concourse to Aisle 561 and turn left to the elevator. The Oilers' locker room is on Level 2 (on the left as you exit the clevator). To reach the visiting team's locker room, pro-

ceed past the Oilers' locker room to the concourse and turn left. Follow the concourse until it ends at Aisle 226. Turn left through the double doors and it will be on the left.

**PARKING:** Press parking at the Astrodome is very limited. Single game parking requests should be made when requesting your credential and will be processed on a "first come-first served" basis. Media with parking passes should use the main Astrodome entrance at Murworth and Kirby.

**TELEPHONES:** Pool telephones for credit card or collect calls are available in the Astrodome press box. Any media member desiring to have their own press box telephone must order it directly from Ed Lucky, US Telcom (lines) at (713) 853-8119. Media may rent instruments directly from the Oilers at a per-game rate of \$25 while still ordering lines from US Telcom.

# TRINITY UNIVERSITY

The summer of 1996 marks the Oilers' sixth training camp at Trinity University in San Antonio.

The 117-acre campus is located just north of downtown San Antonio. The club's indoor athletic complex is the William H. Bell Athletic Center. The Oilers do most of their outdoor training in Trinity's E.M. Stevens Football Stadium.

Founded in 1869 in Tehuacana, Texas, Trinity was moved to Waxahachie, Texas in 1902, and to San Antonio in 1942. In 1952, Trinity moved to its current location, the "Skyline Campus" that overlooks the city.

The Houston Oilers have played their home games in the Astrodome since 1968.

The playing surface of the Astrodome is AstroTurf. Initially only the baseball infield was covered with the man-made turf. On July 19, 1966, the entire surface of the Astrodome was covered with AstroTurf. A new surface was installed in April, 1978, and again in February, 1988.

The seating capacities are 54,313 for baseball, 59,969 for football, 68,000 for conventions and a maximum of 74,000 for boxing and similar events.
