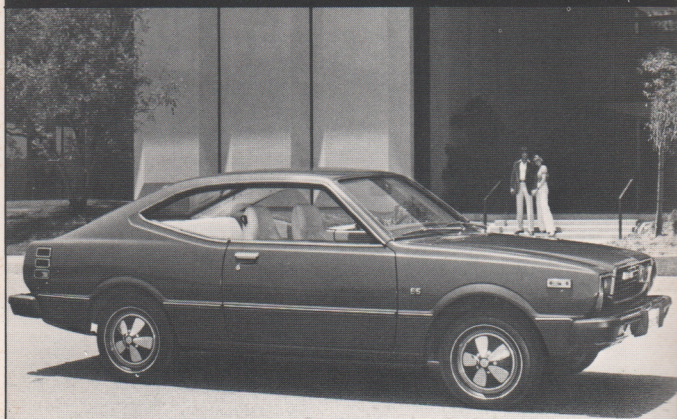

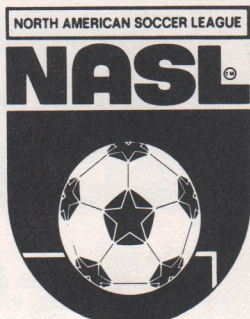

CLIVE TOYE PRESIDENT AND GENERAL MANAGER

Clive Toye, President and General Manager of the New York Cosmos, is the man who persuaded Pele to play in the United States.

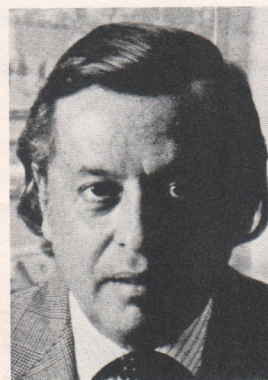
Toye, head of the Cosmos since the franchise was admitted to the North American Soccer League in 1971, took 4½ years and 120,000 miles of travel through three continents to bring Pele to the Cosmos.

Pele has previously played for only one club, Santos of Brazil, in his 19 years as a player.

Altogether Toye has spent nearly 10 years in the North American Soccer League, first as General Manager of the now defunct Baltimore Bays, then as Director of Administration and Information for the league itself. At the time the regime of Toye and then Executive Director, now Commissioner Phil Woosnam took over the League in 1969, there were only five clubs. Now there are 20.

Toye is a member of the 5-man North American Soccer League Executive Committee, Council member of the United States Soccer Federation and coach of the Heathcote Hornets, 4th and 5th grade champions of the Scarsdale Recreation League.

As a journalist, he was chief soccer writer of the 4 million circulation Daily Express of London. As a radio broadcaster, he was regularly heard on BBC national world wide services. As an author, he has had two books published in the United States. As a TV announcer, he has handled CBS network telecasts. As a soldier, he served with the 29th British Infantry Brigade in Korea.



NESUHI ERTEGUN CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD

A life-long soccer fan, Nesuhi Ertegun is the Chairman of the Board of the New York Cosmos.

Mr. Ertegun is the President of WEA International as well as Vice Chairman of the Board of Atlantic Records and has a music business background which extends back to the 1940s when he and his brother began to promote concerts at the National Press Club in Washington.

A self confessed "jazz and blues freak", Mr. Ertegun joined Atlantic Records in 1955 after a career as a record store owner, music magazine editor, record producer and teacher.

One of his finest achievements at Atlantic, has been his responsibility for its extensive jazz catalogue. "It is important music—maybe one of the most important types of American music," he says of his devotion to jazz.

As President of WEA International, he is responsible for the distribution, sales and export of all Warners, Elektra/Asylum and Atlantic labels worldwide.



GORDON BRADLEY
VICE PRESIDENT OF
PLAYER PERSONNEL
AND DEVELOPMENT

Dedication and professionalism are two words that describe Gordon Bradley the Cosmos Vice President of Player Personnel & Development. Bradley, the Cosmos coach since their birth in 1971, was promoted after the 1975 season to his new post.

Surely professional is an accurate description for a man who signed his first contract at the tender age of 16 and is still working with soccer 23 years later. Bradley's career in pro soccer began when he signed his first contract with Sunderland in the English First Division.

this was quite an auspicious start for a youngster not even out of high school.

Gordon's initiation to pro soccer was not a pleasant one. In only his second year, he suffered a broken knee cap which forced him to the sidelines for the next two seasons.

Yet the backbone of a dedicated soccer player is a strong one. Bradley waited patiently before continuing his career with Carlisle of the English First Division. Six years later Gordon was an All-Star with Toronto City in Canada.

At this time, Bradley's interests drifted toward coaching as well as playing. It was in Canada that he first began doubling as a player-coach. This duality continued until 1975 when Gordon turned his talents strictly toward coaching the New York Cosmos.

Bradley entrenched himself in soccer annals with a brilliant defensive display on the world-renown Pele from Santos of Brazil. He held Pele scoreless on that memorable 1968 day, and his team the New York Generals went onto handily defeat their South American neighbors 5-2. In 1975 he became Pele's coach on the second team he has ever played for professionally, Santos being the first.

COSMOS HISTORY

There can be no doubt that 1975 was the year of the Cosmos. Celebrating their fifth season in the North American Soccer League, the New York Cosmos did it in style.

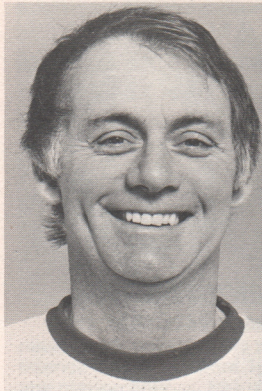
The Cosmos brought immediate international attention upon themselves with the spectacular signing of the world's greatest soccer player Pele. Pele put New York on the world's soccer map. He put a sparkle in the eye of every 10 year old would be soccer player and he captured the imagination of the entire sports world. Team attendance records were set wherever he played. With Pele, soccer had arrived in North America.

The arrival of Pele in the United States unleashed an avalanche of radio, TV, and press coverage. Everyone wanted Pele. He appeared at the White House, on the Tonight Show, and on the cover of Sports Illustrated, to name a few. Everywhere he went he was crowded for interviews and photographs. The press conference to announce his signing was interspersed with arguments by photographers who wanted to get closer to the "Black Pearl".

But Pele's impact extended beyond the grasp of the media. He knocked on soccer youth's door and the youngster's welcomed him with open arms. Soccer balls emerged on thousands and thousands of teenagers and pre-teenagers feet. Department stores became overburdened with requests for balls. American youth became enchanted with the Pele magic. Pele was instantly welcomed to the United States and his popularity continued throughout the world.

Demonstrating the international impact of Pele, the Cosmos were immediately invited to play in the soccer hotbeds of the world. Fittingly enough, the Cosmos chose to make Sweden their first stop. Sweden was the site of Pele's first triumph in the World Cup as a 17 year old prodigy.

Pele's homecoming in 1975 was no less spectacular. European press, TV, and radio greeted his arrival with youthful enthusiasm. Fans followed his every movement. In three games in Sweden, Pele accounted for 5 goals and one assist.



KEN FURPHY
HEAD COACH

"Coaches are like artists aren't they? We all try to create a masterpiece and hope to sit back and enjoy it."

The man who feels that way is Ken Furphy, the new head coach of the New York Cosmos, and he will be called upon to use some of his artistry to mold the Cosmos back into a winning soccer team.

Furphy's credentials are impeccable for the job. The 44-year old native of England spent 14 seasons coaching in England's major leagues, bringing winning soccer to each club he led.

He began his coaching career at Workington as player coach and in his second season elevated the team from the fourth division to the third. He then moved to Watford for seven seasons and had similar success.

Watford, under Furphy's direction, was promoted from third to second division and went to the semi-finals of the F.A. Cup in 1970 before losing to the eventual champs, Chelsea.

After 2 years at Blackburn Rovers, Furphy moved into the first division at Sheffield United for two years. He brought the Blades to fifth place, their finest finish in over 100 years. He was released from United early in the 1975-76 season and subsequently took on the task of building the Cosmos.

"We sought a coach with wide experience at all levels of the game in a variety of situations," said Cosmos President Clive Toye. "In Ken Furphy we have him."

Furphy played 700 games at midfield for Everton, Darlington and Watford before turning his energies to coaching. He has coached RAF, Army and YMCA teams, saying "I just enjoy watching people play the game." Additionally, he was chosen by World Cup coach Sir Alf Ramsey to lead the England Under-23 team in 1974.

Furphy was born on May 28, 1931 at Stockton-on-Tees, England. He and his wife, Doris, have two children, Susan and Keith. Susan is studying for a career in physical education, while Keith is a member of the Ipswich reserve teams.



PROFESSOR
JULIO MAZZEI
ASSISTANT COACH,
PHYSICAL EDUCATION

The man in charge of the physical fitness of the Cosmos is a man of uncommon talents, Professor Julio Mazzei. A specialist in physical education, Professor Mazzei joined the Cosmos in 1975 and has undertaken the task of supervising the training of the team and the rehabilitation of injuries.

The author of nine books on physical education in sports and on the sport of soccer, Professor Mazzei broke into professional soccer with the Palmeiras Club in Sao Paulo, Brazil in 1962. In 1965 he made a fateful move—to the famed

Santos Club of Brazil—and began his association with Pele which has taken him around the world on many ventures. He stayed with Santos until 1972, when he began fulltime work with the International Youth Soccer Program of the Pepsi-Cola company. He and Pele have conducted Pepsi coaching clinics in 64 countries since then.

Professor Mazzei received his Bachelor's Degree from the University of Sao Paulo and holds a Master's from Michigan State. Additionally he earned a Doctorate from Sao Paulo, where he is also a Professor.

He and his wife Maria Helena make their home in New York during the Cosmos season. They have a son Julio and a daughter Marjorie. Professor Mazzei was born on October 27, 1930 in Sao Paulo.

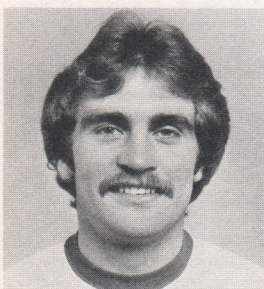


DAVE CLEMENTS, Midfielder

PRO: Comes to the Cosmos this year after a lengthy and distinguished international and club career in Northern Ireland and England . . . is presently the captain and player-coach of the Northern Ireland national squad . . . will miss some Cosmos games in May when he returns to play in the British International Championship, through a special permission clause in his contract . . . he is the first NASL player ever to participate in an international for his country while under NASL contract . . . was purchased outright from Everton of the English First Division . . . previously he had played 10 years for Sheffield Wednesday (2 yrs.), Coventry (7 yrs.) and Wolverhampton Wanderers (1 + yrs.) . . . broke into pro soccer at the age of 16 with Portadown . . . in his career he has played nearly 400 games . . . is naturally a left sided player, but has played all positions over his career.

counted down to Pele's 1000th goal, an unheard-of plateau . . . it finally came on Nov. 11, 1969 in massive Maracana Stadium in Rio de Janeiro . . . the historic moment came on a penalty kick against a club Vasco de Gama . . . his final goal in a Santos uniform came on Sept. 22, 1974—another penalty kick . . . on Oct. 2, 1974, against Ponte Preta. Pele played his last game before retiring from Santos and from soccer . . . his retirement lasted only 250 days before he was lured back to the field by the Cosmos . . . his World Cup performances were spectacular to say the least . . . in the four final round tournaments he played in he scored 13 goals in 15 games despite suffering injuries in 3 of the tournaments.

1976 TIE BREAKER PROCEDURE

NASL games which are tied at the end of regulation play will be extended by 15-minutes of "sudden death" overtime (two 7½ minute periods). A flip of the coin will decide which team will kick off. The first team to score a goal, either from the field or by penalty kick, shall be the winner. If no score occurs in the first period, play shall be halted by the referee. The teams will change ends of the field. Play will be restarted with a kick-off by the team opposite that which started the overtime period.

If the game remains tied at the end of the second period, the outcome will be decided by the kicks from the penalty spot. The referee will first flip the coin with the winner choosing which team will kick first. Each team shall take five penalty kicks in alternating order. When these have been completed, the team which has scored on the most penalty kicks shall be declared the winner. (The kicks shall be ended when one team has achieved an insurmountable advantage, such as scoring on its first three kicks while their opponents miss their first three). If the teams remain tied after the prescribed five penalty kicks, they shall continue to take alternate penalty kicks until one has scored more than the other after an equal number of attempts. Only players in the game at the end of the overtime period, or players injured during the regular game or overtime period and not replaced, shall be eligible to take such penalty kicks. No player may take a second penalty kick until all other eligible members of his team have done so at which time they shall continue in the original rotation.

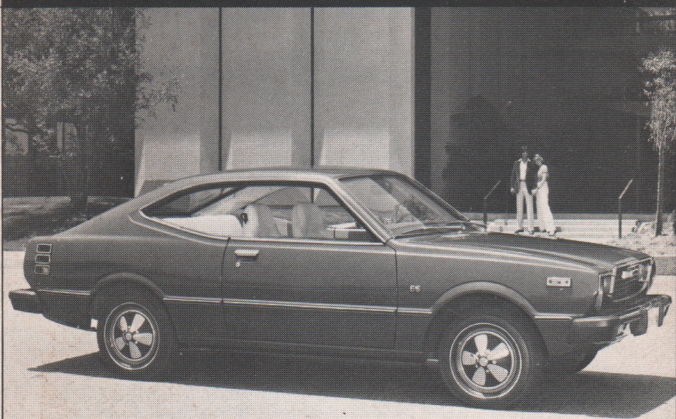
