LAMAR HUNT

FOUNDER



Lamar Hunt has been one of America's leading sports entrepreneurs for more than four decades. In addition to his well-known role in the development of professional football, Hunt's most recent contributions to pro soccer have had a major impact on that sport in the United States.

Hunt was bitten by the soccer bug during the 1966 FIFA World Cup and he has attended every ensuing World Cup, with the exception of the 1978 edition of the quadrennial event in Argentina. In 2002, he witnessed at least part of a tournament match in each of the 20 venues spread across the co-hosting countries of South Korea and Japan. He served as co-chairman of the Dallas World Cup Host Committee in 1994.

Hunt became an investor in the Dallas Tornado Soccer Club of the North American Soccer League (NASL) in 1967 and that organization's legacy of soccer disciples was an early catalyst in the development of the game, placing north Texas at the cutting edge of the American youth soccer market. Hunt again stepped to the forefront of U.S. soccer in the mid-1990s by becoming a charter investor in Major League Soccer. With 12 teams across the league, MLS was created with a unique single-entity operating structure, in which investors own an interest in the league, not just the individual teams. In addition to the Crew, Hunt and his family are also the investor-operators of MLS's FC Dallas and Kansas City Wizards.

In 1982, Hunt was honored for his efforts to establish soccer by being inducted into the U.S. Soccer Hall of Fame in Oneonta, N.Y. He has also been inducted into both the Pro Football and International Tennis halls of fame.

But Hunt made his greatest contribution to soccer in this country years later, by funding the construction of the first major-league stadium built specifically for soccer in the United States. Columbus Crew Stadium opened on May 15, 1999 before a sold-out, overflow crowd of 24,741 in the 22,555-seat venue. Later that year, he was awarded the National Soccer Hall of Fame Medal of Honor (only the second one ever given) and saw the U.S. Open Cup Tournament renamed in his honor to recognize his contributions to soccer in America. On Oct. 24, 2002, the Crew won the tournament that bears his name, in the stadium he built, by defeating the Los Angeles Galaxy, 1-0.

Hunt's most visible influence, however, has come on the landscape of professional football. In 1960, he helped make pro football history by founding and organizing the American Football League. His AFL franchise, originally the Dallas Texans, moved after three years to Kansas City and became the Chiefs, who celebrated their 42nd year in mid-America in 2004. It was the winningest franchise in the AFL's 10-year history and the Chiefs earned spots in two of the first four Super Bowls, winning Super Bowl IV by defeating the Minnesota Vikings.

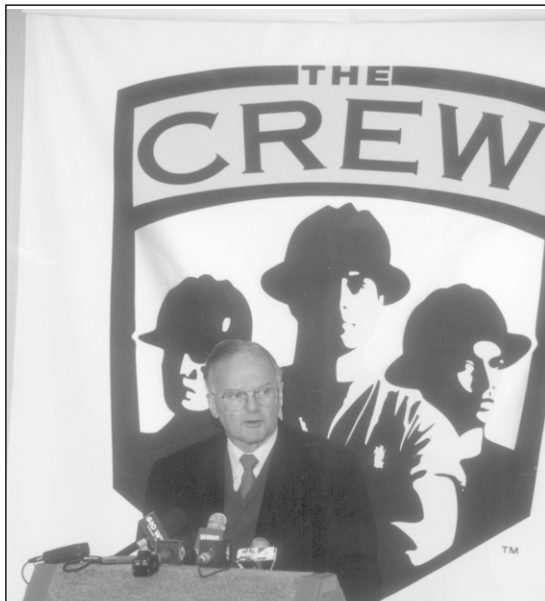
Hunt was the principal negotiator in the merger that took place between the AFL and NFL, paving the way for the modern growth of the game, and one of the greatest tributes to his contributions to pro football is that the AFC Championship Trophy bears his name. In 2000, he was selected to perform the

official coin toss prior to Super Bowl XXXIV, between St. Louis and Tennessee. He is also credited with accidentally coining the term "Super Bowl" for the NFL's championship game — inspired by one of his children's toy super ball. Former NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle also credited Hunt with first suggesting the use of Roman numerals in the title of the Super Bowl.

The president of the NFL's American Football Conference, Hunt is also a member of several prominent NFL committees. In addition to his work within this country, he has also worked on the international development of football, serving on the Board of Directors of the NFL Europe League.

Hunt is also one of the founding minority partners of the NBA's Chicago Bulls, remaining that club's lone original investor, and he has been associated with several additional entertainment ventures, including former involvement in the development of the World Championship Tennis pro tour. But his interests are not confined to professional sports. He is also director of Kansas City's Hunt Midwest Enterprises and Chairman of the Board of Unity-Hunt Resources, the Hunt family's Dallas-based investment firm.

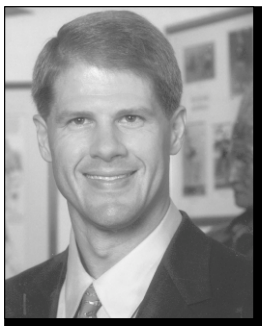
Born August 2, 1932, in El Dorado, Ark., Hunt graduated from Southern Methodist University with a B.S. in geology in 1956. While at SMU, he was a four-year reserve end on the varsity football team. He and his wife Norma, who reside in Dallas, have four children, Lamar Jr., Sharron, Clark and Daniel.





CLARK K. HUNT

INVESTOR-OPERATOR



Clark K. Hunt is one of the founding investor-operators of Major League Soccer. As an influential member of the league, he has served as a member of the MLS Board of Governors since its inception.

Throughout the league's history, he has also held the position of Chairman of the MLS Competition Committee, the group responsible for establishing and managing the league's competitive rules. Hunt has also been a member of the MLS Audit and Finance Committee since the formation of the league and was named Chairman of that committee at the beginning of 2002.

In addition to his league responsibilities, Hunt serves as the Vice Chairman of Hunt Sports Group, where he works directly with the general managers of the Columbus Crew, Kansas City Wizards and FC Dallas on both the business and competitive areas of the teams' operations. Those efforts have been rewarded through the years with the Wizards' ascension to the top of Major League Soccer in 2000, when they won the MLS Cup, and with the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup titles captured by The Crew and Wizards in 2002 and 2004, respectively.

Hunt was also named to the Board of Directors of the National Football League's (NFL) Kansas City Chiefs franchise in 2000 and was elevated to the post of Vice Chairman in 2002 and Chairman in 2004. In this capacity, he works closely with the organization's senior executives in developing and implementing the team's operating and strategic plans.

As part of his increasing role in the NFL, Commissioner Paul Tagliabue recently appointed Hunt to the Board of Trustees of the Bert Bell/Pete Rozelle NFL Player Retirement Plan, which oversees the pension plan established for the benefit of the NFL players. In addition, he serves on the Boards of the NFL Player Second Career Savings Plan, the NFL Player Supplemental/

Disability Plan and the NFL Player Annuituity Program.

In addition to his responsibilities with the family's sports franchises, Hunt serves as Chief Executive Officer of Shoreline Management Group, LLP. Through Shoreline, Hunt provides advisory services to a diverse group of companies in the financial services industries. Prior to founding Shoreline and its affiliated businesses, he began his business career as an analyst with Goldman Sachs & Company in New York and later moved to the firm's Los Angeles office.

Hunt graduated first in his class at Southern Methodist University, earning a degree in Business Administration and was a two-time recipient of the university's highest academic accolade, the Provost Award for Outstanding Scholar. During his collegiate athletic career he was a four-year letterman on the Mustangs nationally-ranked soccer squad, earned first-team Academic All-American honors as a junior and senior and served as tri-captain his final season.

Hunt was born on February 19, 1965 in Dallas, Texas, and graduated from the St. Mark's School of Texas in 1983 and from SMU in 1987. He and his wife, Tavia, have two children, a daughter, Gracelyn, and a son, Knobel.

JOHN WAGNER

HUNT SPORTS PRESIDENT



John Wagner serves as President of Hunt Sports Group, which is the management company responsible for overseeing certain Hunt family sports investments, including the Columbus Crew and Columbus Crew Stadium.

A member of the Major League Soccer Board of Governors, Wagner is also the Chief Operating Officer of Hunt Financial Group, which manages a series of onshore and offshore hedge fund investment portfolios.

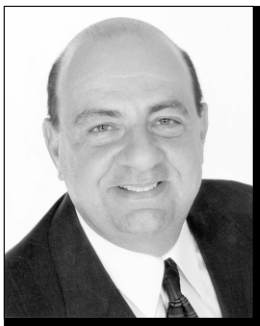
Wagner's previous 13 years of CPA experience in public accounting ended in 1996, after spending nine years with Coopers and Lybrand in Kansas City. He specialized in entrepreneurial business and family-owned business consulting, with an emphasis on federal and state tax issues.

During his years in public accounting, he also managed a joint venture between Hunt Sports Group and Coopers and Lybrand, wherein they provided consultation on matters of state income tax jurisdictions for the NFL, NBA, NHL and applicable players unions to develop uniformity and efficiency in the complex professional athletes non-resident income tax filings.

Wagner earned his Bachelor of Science Degree at the University of South Dakota and completed his MBA degree at the University of Missouri-Kansas City in 1986. He resides in the Dallas area with his wife, Nancy, and their three children, Taylor, Amanda and Parker.

RON PIZZUTI

INVESTOR—OPERATOR



Ronald A. Pizzuti is Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of The Pizzuti Companies, one of the nation's leading real estate development firms headquartered in Columbus, Ohio, with offices in Chicago, Orlando, and Indianapolis. Pizzuti's leadership has guided The Pizzuti Companies to planned, steady growth during the past 28 years. He oversees the company's daily operations and focuses on building and maintaining one of the industry's top teams of real estate professionals.

Pizzuti founded the firm in 1976 after a successful career in retailing, which included executive positions at Federated Department Stores and The Limited, Inc. Today, The Pizzuti Companies develop institutional-grade office, industrial and mixed-use projects throughout the Midwest and Southeast, as well as provide portfolio development, asset and property management and investment services, which stress quality leadership, innovation and attention to aesthetics.

Pizzuti has expanded its portfolio to include more than 20 million square feet of development valued at more than \$1 billion nationwide and its clients include Fortune 500 companies, as well as numerous national and international businesses.

The Pizzuti Companies have a long history of developing high-profile industrial, office and mixed-use projects throughout the Midwest and Southeast. One notable example is SouthPark, a master-planned 500-acre industrial park located in Grove City, Ohio, known for its beautiful park-like campus with over 4 million square feet of industrial buildings.

In recent years, Pizzuti is best known locally for his work on Miranova, a \$150 million project designed by Arquitectonica along the Scioto River. Miranova is a mixed-use development featuring a luxury high-rise condominium tower with more than 100 residences, a 242,000-square-foot Class A office building, a signature restaurant, service retail and a 750-car park-

ing garage. Miranova has served as a catalyst for future downtown development.

A Native of Kent, Ohio, Pizzuti is a 1962 graduate of Kent State University and earned a bachelor's degree in Business Administration. He was awarded an Honorary Doctorate from Columbus College of Art and Design in the spring of 2000.

An industry leader, Pizzuti is an active member of numerous national and local real estate industry associations, including the Urban Land Institute, National Association of Industrial and Office Properties (NAIOP), Columbus Board of Realtors, and Corporate Council of the Economic Development Commission of Orlando. He is a licensed real estate broker in Ohio and Florida.

In the community, Pizzuti recently completed his term as President of the Board of Trustees for the Columbus Museum of Art and presently serves on the Board of Trustees of Columbus Children's Hospital Research Foundation and the Wexner Center Foundation, as well as serving on the Board of Directors of Prospect Bank, Site Santa Fe and BBQ Development.

He served as chairman for both the Board of Trustees of Kent State University and the Columbus Symphony Orchestra. In 1993, at the request of then-Columbus Mayor Lashutka, Pizzuti led an effort to attract major-league sports to Columbus and was successful in securing Major League Soccer (The Crew) and National Hockey League (Columbus Blue Jackets) franchises. Governor Voinovich also appointed him to the board of the Ohio Arts and Sports Facilities Commission.

Pizzuti received the Central Ohio Entrepreneur of the Year - Real Estate Award in 1994; was honored in 1995 with the Jewish National Fund Tree of Life Award for exemplary leadership and humanitarian service; was named the Building Industry Association Citizen of the Year in 1997; and received the Kent State University Distinguished Alumnus Award for professional achievements and service to the university in 1998. In February of 2000, the Greater Columbus Chamber of Commerce awarded Mr. Pizzuti its top honor, the Columbus Award, for his many years of service to the Columbus community.

Pizzuti and his wife, Ann, have three children and reside in Columbus.

MARK McCULLERS

GENERAL MANAGER



Mark McCullers is in his first full season as The Crew's General Manager, though he became the club's Interim GM on July 9, 2004 and has been with the organization since December 1998. During McCullers' interim tenure the team enjoyed an MLS record 18-game unbeaten streak.

As General Manager of Crew Stadium from 1998-2004, McCullers was a key contributor in the development and construction of the first major-league stadium built specifically for soccer in the U.S.

Crew Stadium opened on May 15, 1999 and McCullers was instrumental in luring a succession of marquee events to the historic new facility, including four U.S. National Team World Cup qualifiers, the 2003 FIFA Women's World Cup, the 2000 MLS All-Star Game, MLS Cup 2001 and the 2001 and 2003 NCAA Men's College Cups.

Among the World Cup qualifiers was perhaps the stadium's most memorable event to date, a U.S.-Mexico border clash which opened the final round of CONCACAF qualifying for the 2002 FIFA World Cup on Feb. 28, 2001. Before a sellout crowd in 28-degree temperatures, the U.S. emerged victorious, 2-0, from what the Mexican media dubbed "La Guerra Fria" (The Cold War).

McCullers was named The Crew's Executive Vice President in October 2000, broadening his role with the organization. As Executive VP, McCullers oversaw finance and administration for both entities, as well as Crew Stadium operations and event marketing, while collaborating on sales, marketing and branding initiatives for The Crew. McCullers now oversees all operations for The Crew and Columbus Crew Stadium.

Prior to joining the Crew, McCullers served nine years at the D.C. Sports and Entertainment Commission, first as Event Manager for RFK Stadium and the D.C. Armory and then as Assistant Stadium Manager at RFK. During his career at RFK he helped produce and promote some of the most significant soccer events held in the U.S., including the 1992 and 1993 U.S. Cup, 1994 FIFA World Cup, 1996 Olympic Soccer and MLS Cup 1997.

McCullers serves on the Greater Columbus Sports Commission Advisory Board, the Experience Columbus Events and Sponsorship Committee, the Buckeye Ranch Foundation Board, the Anti-Defamation League/Hank Aaron Diversity in Sports Award Committee, International Association of Assembly Managers (IAAM) Board of Directors and the IAAM Foundation Board.

Born August 19, 1962, McCullers earned a Bachelor of Science in Computer Science from the University of Kentucky in 1984 and a Master of Science in Sports Administration from St. Thomas University (Fla.) in 1989. He resides in Westerville with his wife, Candy, and their three children, Corey, Camryn and Carson.

GREG ANDRULIS

HEAD COACH



Now in his fourth full season at The Crew's helm, Greg Andrulis entered 2005 as the reigning MLS Coach of the Year and owner of the top career winning percentage in club history (.556).

A veteran coach of some 25 seasons, Andrulis is in his ninth full season with The Crew overall, having previously served as the club's assistant coach and goalkeeper coach. He became the club's third head coach on May 17, 2001, succeeding the late Tom Fitzgerald.

The Crew had its finest season ever under Andrulis' stewardship in 2004, finishing the historic campaign on a league-record 18-game unbeaten streak (8-0-10) and winning its first Supporters Shield, as the team with the best overall regular-season record (12-5-13, 49 points) and first regular-season Eastern Conference title. The Crew established club records for most points and fewest losses in a season.

Andrulis' first full season at the helm proved to be a historic one, as well, as he guided the club to its first major championship, the 2002 U.S. Open Cup title. Andrulis' troops also advanced to the MLS Cup semifinals in 2002, before defeating the newly-crowned MLS Cup champion Los Angeles Galaxy, 1-0, on Oct. 24, 2002, in the Open Cup final at Crew Stadium.

After taking over as head coach during the 2001 season, Andrulis led The Crew to one of the best records in Major League Soccer (12-4-4, 40 pts.), which included a then-club-record nine-game unbeaten streak (7-0-2).

Andrulis' tenure got off to an auspicious and dramatic start on May 19, 2001, when Columbus defeated D.C. United 2-1 in overtime despite being forced to play the final 32 minutes of the game two men down, after a pair of second-half red-card ejections.

Prior to joining The Crew late in the inaugural 1996 season, Andrulis spent 12 seasons as the head coach at Wright State University, an NCAA Division I

school located in Dayton, Ohio. While at Wright State he compiled a 134-72-28 record (.632 winning percentage), making him the school's all-time winningest coach.

After taking over the Raiders program in 1985, Andrulis oversaw considerable progress and success. In 1987, the program ascended to the NCAA Division I ranks, from Division II. The following season (1988), Andrulis was named the Ohio Coach of the Year for the second time, after guiding his team to a 16-4-2 mark. Impressively, his teams finished with a winning record in each of his 12 seasons at the helm.

Andrulis was inducted into Wright State's athletic Hall of Fame in 2002 and was accorded the same honor by his high school, Litchfield (Conn.) H.S., in the very same year.

Andrulis is currently a member of the U.S. National Team's Goalkeeping Staff and also serves as the Region II Olympic Development Goalkeeping Coordinator. He holds a USSF "A" li-

cense as well as an Advanced National Diploma from the NSCAA.

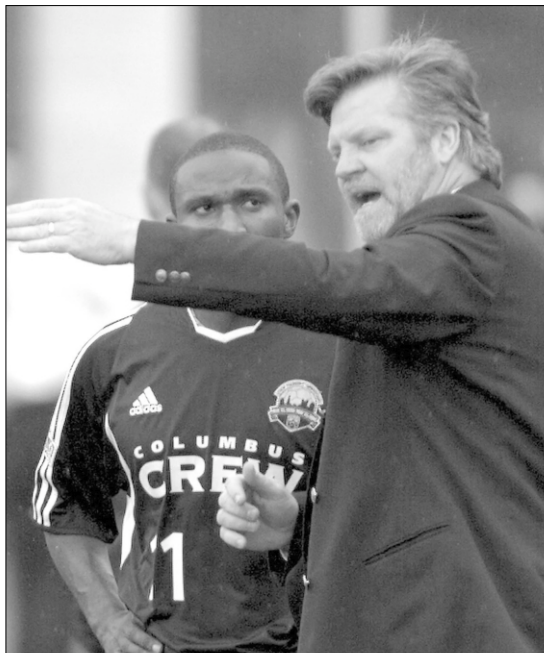
A native of Waterbury, Connecticut, the 46-year-old Andrulis earned a B.S. degree in Psychology in 1980 from Eastern Connecticut State. After spending a year as an assistant coach at his alma mater, he moved to Springfield College (Mass.), where he coached the junior varsity and freshmen teams while earning a M.Ed. in Counseling, with a concentration in Athletic Counseling.

Andrulis also spent three years (1982-84) as an assistant coach at

Clemson University (S.C.), which won its first NCAA national championship in 1984. The Tigers went on to claim another national title in 1987, with many of the players recruited by Andrulis.

Off the field, Andrulis donates time and energy to the Mid-Ohio Chapter of the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation. In 2003, he launched a major fundraiser called "Soccer Aid" that has raised more than \$20,000 for JDRF in its first two years.

ROBERT WARZYCHA

Assistant Coach



Robert Warzycha, one of The Crew's all-time greats on the field, is now in his fourth season on the club's coaching staff and third as a full-time assistant. Warzycha's Dec. 16, 2002 retirement capped a highly decorated, 16-year playing career.

A native of Poland, Warzycha joined The Crew during its inaugural 1996 season and is the club's all-time assist leader (61), while ranking second in games played (160) and fourth in points (99). He finished his career with 19 goals and 61 assists in regular season play and two goals and nine assists in 17 playoff games.

One of the most successful foreign acquisitions in MLS history, the 40-

year-old Warzycha was best known for his set-piece proficiency.

Warzycha spent the 2002 U.S. Open Cup championship season as a player/assistant coach, lending his expertise both on and off the field.

Prior to joining The Crew, Warzycha made 47 appearances with the Polish National Team from 1988-95 and enjoyed a three-year stint with Everton of the English Premier League (1991-94), among many career highlights.

Robert and his wife, Eliza, have three children, sons Konrad and Bartosz, and daughter Olivia.

EDDIE CARVACHO

Assistant Coach



Eddie Carvacho is in his first season on The Crew's coaching staff.

A USSF "A" licensed coach, Carvacho brings a wealth of playing and coaching experience to the Crew staff. The bilingual Carvacho was most recently the Director of Coaching & Operations for the Golden Isles Soccer Association and Jekyll Island Soccer Complex (since June 2003) in St. Simons Island, Ga.

Prior to that, he was an assistant coach at Clemson (2001-2003). He also has his NSCAA Premier Diploma and is on the USSF National Instructor Goalkeeper staff.

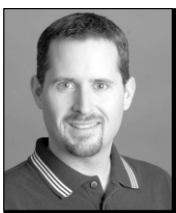
Dr. Kays addresses such topics as motivation, confidence, pressure performance, focus, teamwork, communication, goal-setting, visualization, and recovery from mistakes.

Walther joined The Crew in December 2000 from D.C. United, where he gained experience in marketing, customer relations and game-day operations, in addition to equipment management.

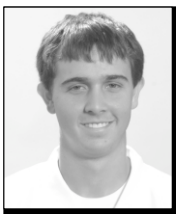

COLUMBUS CREW TEAM HISTORY

The Beginning

On June 15, 1994, Columbus, Ohio, was introduced as the first of 10 inaugural Major League Soccer (MLS) clubs. With more than 11,500 season ticket deposits and plans to build a soccer-specific stadium, the decision to award a team to Ohio's capital city was an easy one.

Exactly four years and 11 months later, on May 15, 1999, The Crew forever etched its place in American sports history by christening Columbus Crew Stadium, the country's first major-league stadium built specifically for soccer. A standing-room only crowd of 24,741 looked on as The Crew defeated New England, 2-0, in what was hailed by then-MLS Commissioner Doug Logan as a "relaunching of the league."

In fact, The Crew has left behind a legacy of firsts on its way to establishing itself as one of the top organizations in Major League Soccer, both on and off the field.

Born of the legacy of the 1994 World Cup held in the United States, Major League Soccer has harnessed the momentum of what is widely considered to have been the most successful World Cup in history. Not only is MLS establishing itself as the fifth major professional sports league in America, but it also strives to create and sustain a style of soccer that is both entertaining and competitive on an international level.

1996: Building The Foundation

The Crew's foundation began to take shape on February 6, 1996, when Columbus selected Brian McBride, a two-time All-American forward from Saint Louis University, with the first overall selection in the Inaugural MLS Draft.

Joining McBride on the first Crew roster was the team's first allocated player, international superstar Doctor Khumalo, arguably the most famous player ever to play for South Africa, and Brian Maisonneuve, the 1994 Hermann Trophy winner from Indiana University.

Playing its home matches at historic Ohio Stadium, The Crew kicked off its inaugural season at "The Horseshoe" against D.C. United in front of a crowd of 25,266. Using two McBride goals and great goalkeeping from Bo Oshoniyi, the Black & Gold cruised to the first victory in team history, blanking United 4-0.

The team's first season was a roller-coaster ride that saw The Crew endure the resignation of head coach Timo Liekoski 22 games into season. Despite that, The Crew was able to rally and go 9-1 in its last 10 games under

interim coach Tom Fitzgerald. Joining Fitzgerald as a catalyst for the stretch run was goalkeeper Brad Friedel, who went 8-1 down the stretch. With the late-season surge, The Crew earned its first playoff berth.

On Sept. 25, The Crew hosted its first-ever playoff game, dropping a 2-0 decision to the Tampa Bay Mutiny. Although Columbus rallied to win Game 2, the Mutiny's home-field advantage proved to be too much to overcome and the Black & Gold were eliminated in three games.

Crew fans were also winners in 1996, as they were voted "best fans in the league" by USA Today. In its first season, The Crew averaged 18,950 per game and drew its single-game record crowd of 31,550 to the Sept. 15 regular-season finale, which ended in a 2-0 victory over the MetroStars.

In addition to being the best fans, the "Crew Experience" was graded an outstanding entertainment value by Gentlemen Associates, an Indianapolis-based research firm that conducted such surveys in 1996.

1997: First Appearance in the Conference Finals

The Crew kicked off its second season in March of 1997. Another up-and-down season saw The Crew advance to the Eastern Conference Finals, where it fell to D.C. United, which went on to claim its second MLS Cup title in as many seasons.

New to the team in 1997 were U.S. National Team regulars Thomas Dooley and Mike Lapper. Along with Friedel, they formed the backbone of one of the league's top defenses.

The Crew completed the first two months of the season in first place, before a mid-season slide knocked it to fourth. Consistent with the team's hard-working image, Columbus was able to rebound late in the year, placing it in playoff contention. As the playoff race intensified, so did The Crew's play, as Coach Fitzgerald's squad captured victories in three of its final four games. The late run vaulted Columbus into third place in the Eastern Conference, up one spot from its finish in 1996.

The Crew's first-round series was a rematch of the previous year, but the result was dramatically different. The Crew turned the tables on the second-seeded Mutiny, gaining a measure of revenge for their first-round defeat in 1996 with a two-game sweep of Tampa Bay.

The upset gave The Crew its first ever playoff series victory and set the stage for the Eastern Conference Fi-

nals against D.C. United.

The Conference Finals were a different story, as defending champ United put an end to The Crew's second MLS campaign, winning the series 2 games to 0.

1998: A Soccer Stadium On The Horizon

As the 1998 season approached, The Crew's off-season was highlighted by player movement and the anticipation of plans for a new stadium.

Perhaps the biggest change was star goalkeeper Brad Friedel's departure to Liverpool of the English Premier League. More than adequate replacements were found though, as U.S. National Team goalkeeper Juergen Sommer was lured from his English club team, Queens Park Rangers, and Mark Dougherty, MLS's all-time wins leader entering the 1998 season, was brought in from Tampa Bay.

In addition to player movement, The Crew's search for a stadium of its own continued to be a hot topic and a high priority. In May of 1997, The Crew witnessed the fall of Issue 1, a Franklin County proposal that would have provided the team with a downtown home. Then, on Feb. 10, 1998, City of Dublin voters rejected a proposal that would have provided a home for The Crew in their suburban community.

With renovations at Ohio Stadium scheduled to begin after the 1998 season, "America's Hardest Working Team" was confronting its biggest challenge to date: finding a new home for 1999.

So the most exciting news of 1998 had to be when the Ohio Expositions Commission voted 6-2 to approve the land lease for a soccer-specific stadium on the grounds of the Ohio Expo Center on May 12. The new stadium site cleared its last hurdle when then-Governor George Voinovich gave the project his stamp of approval on June 9. The Crew and its fans would finally have a home to call their own.

Plans for the site were officially unveiled on July 7 and the groundbreaking on August 14 featured then-MLS Commissioner Doug Logan, who announced that The Crew would host not only the MLS All-Star Game in 2000, but the MLS Cup in 2001.

On the field, another new mix of players would prove vital to the team's success in 1998, with the most significant addition being Stern John, a Trinidad & Tobago star who captured A-League Rookie of the Year honors in 1997.





The Crew was well represented at the 1998 World Cup in France, placing five players in the world's largest sporting event. Thomas Dooley, Brian McBride, Juergen Sommer and Brian Maisonneuve were all named to the U.S. National Team, while then-Crew midfielder Andy Williams played for his native Jamaica. Dooley captained the American squad, while McBride headed home the U.S.'s lone goal of the competition in a 2-1 loss to Iran.

The Crew's contributions to France '98 meant Columbus had to rely heavily on its depth, as the international players trained for and traveled to France through the heart of The Crew's MLS schedule. In their absence, Columbus went 3-4, with two of the losses coming via shootouts, and managed to stay in third place.

Using an array of lineups, The Crew eventually overtook the MetroStars for second place with a 3-0 victory over L.A. on Aug. 29. The team would later make a charge for first, before settling for a second place finish, which secured home-field advantage in the playoffs for the first time.

Crew players also excelled on an individual basis in 1998, including Budweiser Scoring Champion Stern John, who emerged from the pack with a late-season explosion to finish the season with a league-high 57 points, on 26 goals and five assists.

Playing in his third straight MLS All-Star Game, McBride claimed the game's MVP award, notching one goal and adding two assists for the USA All-Stars in the first half. Following the All-Star game, McBride again displayed his knack for spectacular finishes by taking home the MasterCard Goal of the Year award for his acrobatic sidewinding full-volley goal in a 3-0 win over Chicago July 9 at Ohio Stadium.

Much like the regular season, the 1998 playoffs provided Crew fans with plenty of excitement. Columbus swept the MetroStars in the first round, completing the sweep in dramatic fashion when Juergen Sommer knocked away the final NY/NJ shootout attempt to give The Crew a 2-1 victory on the road at Giants Stadium.

In the Eastern Conference Finals, The Crew met a familiar foe in two-time defending MLS champ D.C. United. After falling in the opening game, Columbus returned home for the last MLS game ever played at Ohio Stadium. A torrential downpour failed to dampen the crowd's enthusiasm or bog down the Crew offense, as McBride exploded for his second two-goal game of the playoffs. Columbus cruised to a 4-2 victory, snapping United's MLS-record 13-game playoff win streak and forcing

the series to a decisive third game in the process. But United would prevail in Game 3, riding the momentum of a raucous RFK Stadium crowd of over 20,000 to a 3-0 win.

Yet another 1998 storyline was The Crew's run in the U.S. Open Cup. After advancing to the final through preliminary round games during the summer, the championship match against the Chicago Fire in Virginia Beach was postponed because of Hurricane Bonnie. The match was rescheduled for Oct. 30 at Soldier Field in Chicago. On a soggy night in the Windy City, The Crew was welcomed by nearly 19,000 fans waiting to welcome home their newly crowned MLS champions. A valiant Crew effort would fall just short, when the Fire's Frank Klopas scored the game-winner in sudden-death overtime, giving Chicago a 2-1 win and ending The Crew's 1998 campaign.

1999: A Historic Season

As it waited for the May 1999 opening of Crew Stadium, the team and front office spent January, February, March and April preparing to make history and change the perception of soccer in the United States.

For Fitzgerald and company that entailed playing the first seven games of the season on the road before even playing a minute in the team's new home. Remarkably, the team emerged from the extended road trip with a 5-2 record and sole possession of first place in the Eastern Conference.

Meanwhile, back in central Ohio, Crew fans snatched up an MLS-record 9,282 season tickets, breaking the team's old league record of 9,078 set in 1996. The final 1,000 single-game tickets for Crew Stadium's Inaugural Game sold out in eight minutes, meaning that one of America's most important soccer spectacles sold out more than a month in advance.

Clearly, Crew Stadium's opening was the soccer story of the year in 1999. Some 39 publications ran more than 80 stories on the stadium and its Inaugural Game. Those articles reached an audience of more than 40 million readers, creating an estimated value of more than \$700,000 in advertising.

About the only thing which could have ruined the May 15 home opener would have been a Crew loss. Forward Jeff Cunningham put those fears to rest in the game's 10th minute however, when he rocketed an eight-yard blast past New England goalkeeper Walter Zenga for the stadium's first goal. The overflow crowd of 24,741 rose to their feet and Columbus rode the momentum to a 2-0 win.

Although The Crew wouldn't go undefeated in their new home, it did help

spark the team to a club best 19-13 record. Crew fans also took a liking to the new venue, and with an enthusiastic crowd of nearly 19,000 for the regular-season home finale, Columbus (MLS's smallest market) surged past L.A. to capture the 1999 MLS attendance championship with an average home attendance of 17,696.

On the field, there were many stories to follow in 1999, not the least of which was the play of goalkeeper Mark Dougherty and The Crew defense, which posted the lowest GAA in the Eastern Conference.

Dougherty recorded his milestone 50th career victory, 4-2, Aug. 18 at NY/NJ. For his outstanding play and consistency, he also was recognized as The Crew's Most Valuable Player and BIC Defender of the Year at the end of the season.

Also in 1999, defender Mike Clark also became the first Crew player to appear in 100 games for the Black & Gold, while Brian McBride notched his 100th career point by heading home corner kicks in the 76th and 81st minutes of a 2-1 win over the Miami Fusion on Sept. 26.

Unfortunately for The Crew's opponents, Stern John, the team's Trinidadian super striker was also back in the mix for Columbus in 1999. MLS's 1998 Budweiser Scoring Champion managed to shake off a slight slump in the early going to post an 18-goal season, which featured two hat tricks among four multi-goal games and a game-tying goal in the final seconds of a shootout win against San Jose. John would later end his two-year stint with The Crew having amassed an astonishing 52 goals in 65 MLS appearances.

The Crew's hot start, with a 10-2 combined record against the West, enabled the team to occupy sole possession of second place from May 29 through Sept. 18, when Columbus clinched second place with a 1-0 shootout win at New England.

A familiar foe awaited The Crew in the Eastern Conference semifinals, as Columbus was matched against an improved Tampa Bay side that seemed primed to pull a first-round upset. The Crew had other intentions though, as a two-goal game by John and a three-point game by Brian West made quick work of the upstart Mutiny.

Another rematch with D.C. United in the Eastern Conference Finals was set, meaning that The Crew would need at least one win at RFK Stadium, where it was winless in its previous 11 visits.

A late goal by Cunningham in Game 1 was not enough to overcome a steady performance by United, which coasted to a 2-1 win. Back in Columbus, United

quickly gained the upper hand in Game 2, stunning the Crew Stadium crowd with a seventh-minute goal that gave D.C. a 1-0 lead.

The Crew's fortunes took a positive turn in the 20th minute, when Ansil Elcock knotted the score at 1-1, and a brilliant goal by Cunningham just prior to halftime seemed to put United on its heels.

In what would be his final home game at Crew Stadium, John gave The Crew faithful perhaps the most fitting farewell possible, blitzing United for a second-half hat trick which eased Columbus to a 5-1 win. Despite his impending departure to Nottingham Forest of the English First Division (announced on Nov. 15), his feat that day merely reinforced the fact that John would remain a Crew legend for years to come.

But Game 3 would not feature such a storybook ending, as United and a RFK throng of more than 21,000 fans were too much for The Crew to overcome. United would take the deciding game 4-0, en route to its third MLS Cup Championship.

2000: New Look For League, New Heights for Crew Stadium

MLS's fifth year arrived with an array of new looks instituted by new MLS Commissioner Don Garber. The most significant – and most hailed – changes were the elimination of both the shootout and the game clock that counted down from 45 minutes.

For the first time in 2000, MLS games could end in ties and official match time was kept on the field by the referee, bringing the league's rules more in line with the rest of the world. Realignment created three four-team divisions, replacing the two six-team conferences, and "MLS ExtraTime," ESPN2's weekly news and highlights program, debuted.

Columbus opened the season with many familiar faces, along with a few new ones. Defender/midfielders Mike Duhaney (the 1997 MLS Rookie of the Year, acquired in a trade from NY/NJ for Thomas Dooley) and Mario Gori, a member of D.C. United's 1996 and 1997 MLS Cup Championship squads joined the fold and veteran forward Dante Washington returned to Columbus after a three-game stint in 1996.

All Washington did was put together the second-best offensive season in Crew history, with 39 points on a career-high 15 goals and nine assists. Veteran midfielder Robert Warzycha also fashioned the best season of his MLS career with six goals and a then-team-record 13 assists for

25 points to earn The Crew's Honda MVP award.

But none of it was enough to keep Columbus from falling short in its bid to qualify for postseason play again, and The Crew was on the outside looking in as the playoffs began for the first time ever.

It didn't help that Brian McBride (U.S.) and Ansil Elcock (Trinidad & Tobago) missed significant time for 2002 World Cup qualifying and that McBride, along with a host of others, were bitten by the injury bug.

But the 2000 season will be remembered for many things, among them Warzycha scoring the first-ever regular-season golden goal in MLS history to defeat San Jose 2-1 in the home opener; the emergence of Brian West, who came into his own in his third season in the league; Matt Napoleon's trip to Australia as the alternate goalie on the U.S. Men's Olympic Team; and the gritty, hard-nosed play of Gori and defender Mike Clark.

Most of all, 2000 will be remembered as the year Crew Stadium played host to its first MLS All-Star Game and World Cup qualifying match. Standing-room-only crowds packed the stadium on both occasions – with 23,495 on hand for the July 29 All-Star Game and 24,430 for the U.S.-Costa Rica qualifier on Oct. 11 – further cementing Crew Stadium's important place on the U.S. soccer landscape.

2001: Coaching Change, Change in Fortunes

The Crew's sixth season was marked in the early going by just the second coaching change in club history, but that change sparked a major turnaround which propelled Columbus back into the MLS Cup playoffs after a one-year absence.

The Crew was full of optimism entering the season, adopting the motto "Destiny 2001" as a rallying cry to reach MLS Cup 2001, which would be played at Crew Stadium on Oct. 21.

New arrivals Tom Presthus, a championship goalkeeper acquired in a draft-day trade with D.C. United, Tenywa Bonseu, a Ugandan international defender acquired via Allocation, and 2002 MLS SuperDraft picks Duncan Oughton and Edson Buddle joined a solid returning nucleus to fuel the optimism.

But following a 1-3-2 start, which made its record 1-8-2 in its last 11 matches stretching back to the end of the 2000 season, The Crew dismissed head coach Tom Fitzgerald – who had been at the helm since Aug. 1996 – and replaced him on an interim basis with his top assistant, Greg Andrulis, on

May 17.

Two nights later, on May 19, the Andrulis era commenced with a bang at Crew Stadium, though the new coach could hardly have imagined that his debut would turn out to be one of the most dramatic games in Crew history. With old rival D.C. United in town, Brian McBride gave Columbus a 1-0 lead in the 25th minute, energizing the crowd of 18,491.

The Crew maintained its advantage into the second half, but that's when the wheels appeared to fall off. Two red-card ejections in a span of eight minutes – Ansil Elcock in the 59th minute and Bonseu in the 67th – had Columbus reeling. And D.C. did indeed equalize just two minutes after the second ejection, with Santino Quaranta becoming the youngest player to score a goal in MLS history (16 years, 7 months, 5 days).

Columbus dug in from there, though, and in epic fashion forced overtime, where Jeff Cunningham one-timed a John Harkes corner kick past United keeper Mike Ammann from the middle of the box in the 99th minute. That golden goal with a minute left in overtime, 32 minutes into a two-man disadvantage, capped the most improbable victory in Crew history and charted a remarkable course for the club that would see it go 12-4-4 in 20 games under Andrulis to finish 13-7-6.

Along the way, The Crew fashioned a club-record nine-game unbeaten streak, going 7-0-2 between July 4 and Aug. 19, went unbeaten in its last 11 regular-season home games (7-0-4), matched its all-time high point total (45) in six fewer games and experienced a 13.3 percent rise in attendance (to 17,511 per game).

Individually, forward Jeff Cunningham had a superlative season, becoming the first player in Crew history to record double-figure totals in both goals (10) and assists (13) and setting a new club mark with an eight-game point streak, while playmaking midfielder John Wilmar Perez dished out a team-record and league-leading 15 assists.

The return of midfielder Brian Maisonneuve was also a key factor in The Crew's turnaround. After missing the entire 2000 season with a series of devastating ankle injuries and surgeries, Maisonneuve made a remarkable comeback in 2001, getting stronger and stronger as the season progressed and ultimately being named the MLS Player of the Month for August.

Like every other team in the league, the regular season ended abruptly for The Crew, when the final week was cancelled in the aftermath of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks on New York City





and Washington, D.C. That left Columbus two games shy of completing the 28-game season, which had been adopted for the first time in 2001.

The Crew entered the playoffs as the No. 4 seed and was drawn against the fifth-seeded San Jose Earthquakes, who sported an identical 13-7-6 record. Unfortunately for Andrusis' troops, they ran into a team peaking at the right time and the Quakes used their 2 games to 0 (6 points to 0) series win as a springboard to their first MLS Cup title, which they won at Crew Stadium over the L.A. Galaxy in overtime.

At the conclusion of the season, Andrusis was rewarded with a two-year contract extension and General Manager Jim Smith was named the MLS Executive of the Year.

2002: Champions at last!

Major changes at the league level ushered in 2002. The MLS Board of Governors voted unanimously to contract by two teams on Jan. 8, following a comprehensive strategic review of the league's operations, and the Miami Fusion and Tampa Bay Mutiny ceased operations immediately.

Those changes, made with the league's long-term strength and stability in mind, followed the announcement on Dec. 6, 2001 that MLS investors committed to funding and operating the league for the next five years, through the 2006 season. The league also announced during the offseason that it had agreed to a five-year extension of its broadcast agreement with ABC and ESPN2 to nationally televise a significant schedule of MLS games.

MLS returned to a 10-team, two-conference alignment, with The Crew reentering the Eastern Conference.

But for Crew fans, 2002 will go down in history as the year their beloved Black & Gold finally won a championship.

On October 24, The Crew defeated the newly crowned MLS Cup-champion L.A. Galaxy, 1-0, in the U.S. Open Cup final at Crew Stadium, to claim the prestigious piece of hardware. The U.S. Open Cup is the oldest soccer tournament in America.

Freddy Garcia's 30th-minute goal and Jon Busch's four-save shutout brought glory to Columbus. With the Open Cup title came a berth in the 2003 CONCACAF Champions Cup.

The Crew had advanced to the final in dramatic and improbable fashion, coming back from a two-goal deficit midway through the second half to defeat the K.C. Wizards 3-2 in overtime at Crew Stadium in the semifinals.

Edson Buddle got Columbus on the board in the 76th minute and second-half substitute John Wilmar Perez

scored the game-tying goal two minutes into second-half stoppage time, then banged in the winner 18 minutes into overtime.

Following an up-and-down 11-12-5 regular season, The Crew peaked at the right time, sweeping the defending-champion San Jose Earthquakes in the MLS Cup quarterfinals and advancing to the league semifinals for the fourth time in seven seasons, but for the first time since 1999. The Black & Gold ultimately fell in three games to New England.

Dazzling forward Jeff Cunningham established new career highs in goals (16) and points (37) and was named to the MLS Pepsi Best 11, while young midfielder Kyle Martino was a revelation, winning the league's Rookie of the Year Award, a first for a Crew player.

While Brian McBride was in Korea/Japan helping the U.S. to an unexpected quarterfinal finish at the 2002 FIFA World Cup, more than 27,000 people flocked to Crew Stadium to view the televised action at "Cup Headquarters."

Over 7,500 fans were on hand for the U.S.'s quarterfinal match vs. Germany and the success of "Cup Headquarters" garnered national media attention, including a feature in the June 11, edition of USA Today, live mentions by ESPN play-by-play announcers Jack Edwards and JP Dellacamera during different matches, and prominent mentions, accompanied by video footage, on the June 17 edition of ESPN2's nightly news and highlight show "World Cup 2Night."

In addition to the huge crowd on June 21, the U.S.-Germany viewing party was attended by cameras from CBS's "The Early Show," which also sent a correspondent; ABC's "Good Morning America," and NBC's "Today Show," both of which did live look-ins throughout the match.

The 2002 season also saw its share of milestones, as longtime Crew stalwarts Mark Dougherty, Todd Yeagley, Mike Lapper and Robert Warzycha all retired, while veteran forwards McBride and Dante Washington both reached the 50-goal plateau for their MLS careers.

2003: End of an Era

The 2003 season will be remembered, among other reasons, for being Brian McBride's and Mike Clark's last in Black & Gold.

On the field, an improbable succession of injuries and national team call-ups to key players turned an extremely promising start into a disappointing season. In the end, The Crew missed the playoffs for just the second time in club history.

That was in stark contrast to the optimistic opening weeks of the season, when the key offseason additions of World Cup veteran Frankie Hejduk and All-Star midfielder Ross Paule to an already formidable lineup appeared to be paying dividends. The Crew advanced to the quarterfinals of the CONCACAF Champions Cup and was the talk of MLS in bolting to a 3-0-1 start in league play.

But, ultimately, the Crew's "Big Four" of McBride, Hejduk, goalkeeper Jon Busch and midfielder Kyle Martino, were able to start just 16 of the team's 30 games together. With them all in the starting lineup, The Crew went 7-4-5, but was 3-8-3 with any of them missing.

With forward Edson Buddle added to that equation, the "Big Four" plus Buddle only started 11 times together. The club's record with those five was a gaudy 6-2-3, but just 4-10-5 without one or more of them in the lineup.

Another key player, forward Jeff Cunningham, battled through his own share of nagging injuries, but he did manage to reach a major milestone, becoming the 14th player in MLS history to reach the 50-goal plateau.

The most dramatic moment of the season was provided by McBride and it is sure to remain among the most lasting images he left with Crew fans. Sideline with a respiratory virus in the must-win, next-to-last game of the season at D.C., McBride came off the bench in the 62nd minute and proceeded to score two goals, including the game-winner in the final minute of overtime, to give Columbus a dramatic 3-2 win and keep the club's playoff hopes alive for another week.

During the offseason, McBride, the personification of The Crew since its inception, was transferred to Fulham F.C. of the English Premier League, while Clark, another Crew original, announced his retirement, signaling the end of one era and the dawn of a new one.

2004: The Streak and the Shield

The Crew took the field with a decidedly different look in 2004, after missing the playoffs in 2003, and the dramatically rebuilt roster put together a historic season. Following a slow start, The Crew did not lose a game after June 26 in compiling the longest unbeaten streak in MLS history.

The 18-game unbeaten run (8-0-10) lasted through the end of the regular season and culminated in the club's first-ever Supporters Shield—awarded to the team with the top overall regular-season record—and first regular-season Eastern Conference title. The Crew finished 12-5-13, for 49 points, estab-

lishing new franchise records for most points and fewest losses in a season.

Unfortunately, The Crew's good fortune ran out in the playoffs, when it dropped a two-game, total-goals Eastern Conference Semifinal series to New England, by a 2-1 aggregate score. Incredibly, Columbus had two penalty kicks saved in the return leg at Crew Stadium and it saw its finest season ever end early.

The offseason addition of veteran stalwarts Robin Fraser and Simon Elliott bolstered the lineup, as did the rapid emergence of rookies Chad Marshall and Chris Wingert. Fraser, who was named MLS Defender of the Year at the conclusion of the season, was instrumental in helping to develop

Marshall, the No. 2 overall pick in the 2004 MLS SuperDraft who went on to be named a finalist for MLS Rookie of the Year honors.

The club's future received another shot in the arm on July 22, when The Crew won the rights to highly sought after 17-year-old U.S. youth national team star Danny Szelela in a weighted lottery televised live on ESPN News.

Jon Busch continued his steady ascension to the ranks of elite MLS goalkeepers in 2004, earning a trip to his first All-Star Game and posting a 12-5-12 record and a 1.07 goals-against average. Fraser and Frankie Hejduk joined Busch at the All-Star Game. Edson Buddle led the way offensively, collecting 24 points, on 11 goals

and two assists, including a club-record four-goal game on Sept. 18 against the MetroStars.

Like any other, the 2004 season was not without change. President/General Manager Jim Smith left the club in July to accept an executive position with the NFL Atlanta Falcons and Crew Stadium GM Mark McCullers succeeded him as General Manager. Jeff Cunningham's 62nd and final goal in Black & Gold tied him with Brian McBride atop the club's all-time list, before he was traded to Colorado during the offseason. And after the season, the last active player from the inaugural 1996 campaign, Brian Maisonneuve, announced his retirement after battling ankle injuries for years.

1993

Dec. 17 - In fulfillment of U.S. Soccer's promise to FIFA, Alan Rothenberg announces the formation of Major League Soccer.

1994

June 15 - The city of Columbus is awarded one of the 10 inaugural clubs in Major League Soccer (MLS).

1995

June 8 - Lamar Hunt and Family are announced as the investor-operators of the Columbus Major League Soccer Team.

July 7 - Team Columbus names Jamey Rootes as the team's first general manager.

Oct. 17 - Columbus Mayor Greg Lashutka unveils Team Columbus' name, logo, uniform and colors. Columbus resident Luis Orozco was the only entrant in a month long contest to suggest that the team be named "The Columbus Crew."

Dec. 5 - The Columbus Crew names Timo Liekoski as its first head coach.

Dec. 21 - MLS assigns South African National Team star, Theophilus "Doctor" Khumalo, to The Crew. The Doctor becomes Columbus' first allocated player and first player ever.

1996

Jan. 4 - Tom Fitzgerald is named the first Crew assistant coach.

Jan. 5 - MLS begins its first player combine, bringing more than 250 players to Irvine, Calif., from Jan. 5-15.

Feb. 1 - MLS assigns United States U-23 National Team player, Brian Maisonneuve, to The Crew. He becomes The Crew's second allocated player.

Feb. 3 - MLS assigns 1990 U.S. World Cup veteran and United States National Team veteran Brian Bliss to The Crew. Bliss becomes The Crew's third allocated player.

Feb. 4 - MLS assigns Uruguayan National Team player, Adrian Paz, to Columbus as its fourth allocated player. The Crew is awarded the first pick in the first-ever MLS Player Draft.

Feb. 6 - Major League Soccer conducts its first player draft, holding the first eight rounds at the Hotel Inter-Continental in New York City. Brian McBride, a two-time All-American from St. Louis, is the first overall player selected by Columbus.

Feb. 7 - MLS conducts the final eight rounds of its first player draft at the Hotel Inter-Continental. The 10 teams selected 160 players over the two-day, 16-round draft.

March 4 - The MLS supplemental and college drafts are held. With the 10th pick of the first round of the supplemental draft, The Crew selects 1990 and 1994 U.S. World Cup veteran, Paul Caligiuri.

March 6 - The Crew opens preseason training camp in Dublin, Ohio at Soccer First at SportsOhio. The Crew unveils its local investors and also announces that 1460 WBNS Radio has been named the team's radio station and will air all 32 games.

March 13 - Spring training opens for The Crew in Boca Raton, Florida for 10 days of preseason training and scrim-

mages.

April 13 - The Crew's inaugural game against D.C. United results in a 4-0 Crew victory in front of a crowd of 25,266. The first goal in club history is an 18th-minute own goal and Brian McBride becomes the first Crew player to find the back of the net, in the 29th minute.

May 17 - SportsChannel Ohio, SportsChannel Chicago and local station WB53 sign agreements to air eight Crew matches.

June 4 - The Crew signs its first discovery option player, Polish international Robert Warzycha.

June 24 - Brian McBride is selected to the first annual MLS Soccer All-Star game to be held on July 14 at Giants Stadium.

June 28 - Columbus receives its fifth allocation when Argentinian defender Ricardo Iribarren is assigned to The Crew.

Aug. 2 - With The Crew in fifth-place and a 6-16 record, head coach Timo Liekoski resigns. Assistant coach Tom Fitzgerald is immediately named head coach on an interim basis.

Aug. 7 - The Crew announces that John Ellinger, the men's U.S. National "B" Team head coach, will fill the assistant coach's spot on an interim basis.

Aug. 8 - The Crew acquires U.S. National Team goalkeeper Brad Friedel.

Aug. 16 - The Village of Obetz, Ohio has been selected as The Crew's site for its state-of-the-art training facility.

Sept. 15 - The Crew sets the season record for attendance in Columbus when 31,550 fans come out to see The Crew defeat the MetroStars 2-0 in the last regular season home game of the inaugural year.

Sept. 25 - The Crew makes its first-ever playoff appearance, losing at home, 2-0 to Tampa Bay.

Oct. 18 - Columbus Crew General Manager, Jamey Rootes, is recognized as the league's top executive and awarded the first-ever Major League Soccer Executive of the Year award.

Oct. 24 - The Crew officially removes the interim title from Tom Fitzgerald's name and names him head coach after he led the team to a 9-1 run at the end of the season and into the playoffs.

Nov. 19 - Gentlemen Associates, an Indianapolis based research company, grades the "Crew Experience" as outstanding after conducting surveys during the inaugural season.

Dec. 12 - Greg Andruski, formerly The Crew's goalkeeper coach, is named assistant coach for The Crew, filling the void left by the departure of Ellinger.

1997

Feb. 4 - The team's fifth allocated player, Ricardo Iribarren, learned he would miss the 1997 season due to visa problems.

Feb. 24 - The Crew and MLS re-sign goalkeeper Brad Friedel to a three-year deal.

March 5 - The Crew becomes the first MLS team to land a local network television affiliate, as WTTX Fox 28 signs on to televise games. SportsChannel Ohio would also televise games.

March 18 - Columbus plays in the first

annual "Dayton Cup for Charity" against Kansas City at Centerville Soccer Stadium. The Wizards win 1-0.

March 25 - The Crew Radio Network expands to 16 state-wide affiliates.

April 8 - MLS and ESPN announce Shoot-out Package; 87 percent of all league games will be televised.

April 9 - MLS announces that Chicago and Miami will join the league as expansion teams in 1998.

April 16 - The Crew's Official website, www.TheCrew.com, is unveiled.

May 1 - Brian McBride signs a four-year deal with MLS.

May 3 - Thomas Dooley, U.S. National Team star, signs with MLS and The Crew.

May 6 - Issue 1, a Franklin County vote to raise taxes .5% for a downtown arena and stadium, fails.

May 14 - Crew defeats English Premier League opponent Leeds United, 2-1, at Ohio Stadium in its first-ever international exhibition match.

June 3 - U.S. National Team veteran Mike Lapper signs with Crew and MLS.

June 5 - The Crew's first Project-40 player, Ubusuku Abukusumo, is assigned.

June 5 - Ohio State and The Crew sign a lease extension through the 1998 season.

July 9 - Brian McBride scores the game-winning goal with two minutes left in the MLS All-Star Game at Giants Stadium to give the East a 5-4 win. Robert Warzycha also tallies for the East.

Aug. 11 - The Crew opens its state-of-the-art training center in Obetz, Ohio.

Oct. 8 - Columbus wins its first playoff series, beating Tampa Bay 2-0 to win the series two games to none and advance to the first Eastern Conference Finals series.

Oct. 16 - ESPN, ABC and MLS sign multi-year TV deal. ABC will air 12 games for the 1998 season.

Oct. 22 - Brad Friedel wins MLS Pepsi Goalkeeper of the Year Award.

Nov. 17 - Then-MLS wins leader Mark Dougherty is acquired from Tampa Bay in the waiver draft.

1998

Jan. 20 - Former Virginia star Brian West is assigned to The Crew as its second Nike Project-40 player.

Jan. 31 - Feb. 1 - MLS holds its College and Supplemental drafts. Crew selects South Florida standout Jeff Cunningham with its first round pick.

Feb. 1 - A Dublin City referendum to provide a Northwest Suburban Columbus Stadium for The Crew fails.

Feb. 26 - 21-year-old Trinidad and Tobago star Stern John joins The Crew as a discovery player.

March 11 - Crew inks television deals with WSYX-Ch. 6 (ABC), WTTX Fox 28 and FOX Sports Ohio to air eight games.

April 4 - The Crew wins its last home opener in Ohio Stadium, downing two-time defending MLS Champion D.C. United 2-1.

April 18 - In The Crew's first game against the expansion Miami Fusion, Stern John scores his first career MLS goal in the 48th minute, and then explodes for two more, giving him his first career

hat trick in a 5-1 win.

May 5 - U.S. National Team Head Coach Steve Sampson announces that Crew players Brian McBride, Thomas Dooley, Juergen Sommer, and Brian Maisonneuve have been selected to the U.S. National Team for the 1998 World Cup in France.

May 15 - The Ohio Expositions Commission votes 6-2 to approve the form and content of a land lease to build a soccer-specific stadium on the grounds of the Ohio Expo Center.

May 18 - The State of Ohio Controlling Board approves the lease.

May 19 - Crew announces plans for the construction of the country's first-ever soccer-specific stadium, on the grounds of the Ohio Expo Center. The 25-year lease paves the way for construction of a 22,500 seat stadium. NBBJ is the architect on the project.

May 28 - The Ohio Expositions Commission approves the site.

June 4 - The second to last signature required for the lease's approval is signed by the Ohio Dept. of Administrative Services.

June 9 - Ohio Governor George Voinovich signs the lease, paving the way for the construction of the country's first stadium built specifically for soccer.

June 14 - Rookie Andy Williams makes his first-ever World Cup appearance for the Jamaican National team in a 3-1 loss to Croatia.

June 21 - Forward Brian McBride scores the lone U.S. goal of the '98 World Cup in a 2-1 loss to Iran.

July 7 - The Crew edge the Rochester Raging Rhinos 2-1 in sudden-death overtime in The Crew's first-ever U.S. Open Cup Match. Todd Yeagley tallies the game-winning goal in the 103rd minute.

July 7 - The preliminary plans for Columbus Crew Stadium are unveiled at the Ohio Expo Center.

July 16 - The Crew's Brian McBride and Thomas Dooley are voted as starters for the USA MLS All-Stars for the 1998 MLS All-Star game in Orlando.

Aug. 2 - Crew forward Brian McBride becomes the first Crew player to be named MVP of the MLS All-Star game, as he registered a goal and two assists in the first half of the MLS USA All-Stars' 6-1 victory over the MLS World All-Stars.

Aug. 14 - The most significant date in U.S. Soccer history occurs in Columbus, as The Crew breaks ground on a 22,500 seat soccer-specific stadium. MLS Commissioner Doug Logan announces that the new stadium will host the MLS All-Star Game in 2000 and the 2001 MLS Cup.

Aug. 16 - Crew forward Stern John becomes the first player in MLS history to notch three hat tricks in a season, as he blitzes Kansas City for three goals in ten minutes, during the 5-3 win at Ohio Stadium.

Sept. 15 - The Crew and Sports Radio 1460 WBNS "The Fan" extend their radio partnership through the year 2000, allowing 1460 to remain as the flagship station for the Columbus Crew Radio Network.

Sept. 18 - On the first day of the seat relocation process for the new stadium, The Crew sells 1,181 season tickets. The Club Loges also go quickly as 18 of the 20 available are sold, forcing The Crew to expand the number of Club Loges to 30.

Sept. 27 - In The Crew's 1998 regular season finale against D.C. United, Stern John scores two first half goals to secure the first MLS Budweiser Scoring Championship in Crew history. John finishes his rookie MLS season with 26 goals and five assists for 57 points.

Sept. 30 - In just seven days, The Crew sells out all 1,157 Club Seats in the new stadium.

Oct. 18 - In the last MLS game ever played at Ohio Stadium, The Crew leave "The Shoe" with a 4-2 playoff win over D.C., snapping United's MLS record 13-game playoff win streak. The Crew end the Ohio Stadium era with an all-time home record of 33-20.

Oct. 20 - Brian McBride captures the 1998 MasterCard Goal of the Year award.

Oct. 30 - In the rescheduled Open Cup Final, The Crew lose a 2-1 heartbreaker to the Chicago Fire in sudden-death overtime at Soldier Field.

Nov. 5 - The first pieces of turfgrass sod are laid at The Crew's new stadium. Among those in attendance are Crew Founder Lamar Hunt and President/GM Jamey Rootes. The entire field is installed in just over a week.

Dec. 1 - The Crew announce that the new stadium's inaugural game will be played on Saturday, May 15 vs. New England.

1999

Feb. 9 - The Crew unveils an Inaugural Game logo and announces the creation of an Inaugural Game organizing committee.

March 15 - The Columbus Crew Stadium lights go on for the first time.

April 10 - One thousand Crew single-game tickets for the Inaugural Game at Crew Stadium sell out in eight minutes.

April 20 - The Crew travels to Cincinnati to play its A-League affiliate, the Cincinnati Riverhawks, raising over \$15,000 for tornado relief after a tornado had torn through the Greater Cincinnati area.

May 4 - The Crew holds its first official practice at the new stadium.

May 8 - City, County, and State officials kickoff Crew Week IV with a Crew Stadium Open House, the first-ever event in the new stadium.

May 14 - U.S. Soccer announces that Crew Stadium will be the site for the 1999 U.S. Open Cup Championship.

May 15 - Lamar Hunt receives National Soccer Hall of Fame's Medal of Honor.

May 15 - Crew Stadium, the first stadium built specifically for soccer in the United States, hosts its inaugural game as The Crew down the New England Revolution 2-0 before a sold-out crowd of 24,741. Jeff Cunningham scores the first goal in Crew Stadium history beating Revs goalkeeper Walter Zenga in the 10th minute. Stern John adds the second goal in the 59th minute.

May 22 - Columbus sets a new record for season tickets sales with 9,083, surpassing the previous mark of 9,078 set by The Crew in 1996. The Black & Gold end the year with a season-ticket base of 9,282.

May 22 - Crew Stadium holds its first soccer double header as the U.S. U-17 squad downs the El Salvador U-17s 4-0 to secure a spot in the FIFA Under-17 World Championship, while The Crew suffers its first loss at Crew Stadium falling to the Tampa Bay Mutiny 1-0 in a shootout.

May 29 - The Columbus Crew, Kellogg's and CD 101 sponsor the first non-soccer event in Columbus Crew Stadium when the pop band BoDeans plays a postgame concert.

June 16 - The first-ever Buck-A-Brat night takes place at Crew Stadium. Crew fans devour 14,659 bratwurst.

July 17 - Stern John tallies a goal and Brian McBride has an assist as the East loses 6-4 to the West in the fourth All-Star game. Crew defender Thomas Dooley also plays.

Aug. 3 - Head Coach Tom Fitzgerald signs a two-year contract extension through the 2001 season.

Aug. 3 - Crew Stadium is named the site of the 1999 Ohio High School Athletic Association State Soccer Championships. For the first time, every division's championship game is held at the same venue.

Aug. 4 - Major League Soccer names Don Garber the league's new commissioner, replacing Doug Logan who had been MLS Commissioner since the league's inception.

Aug. 18 - Crew goalkeeper Mark Dougherty collects MLS win number 50 and Stern John set a MLS record with his fifth career hat trick in a 4-2 win over NY/NJ.

Sept. 1 - The A-League's Rochester Raging Rhinos down The Crew 3-2 in extra time in the semifinals of the U.S. Open Cup at the Virginia Beach SportsPlex.

Sept. 7 - U.S. Soccer Federation Secretary General Hank Steinbrecher announces that the USSF has renamed the U.S. Open Cup Tournament the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup Tournament in honor of his contributions to soccer in the United States.

Sept. 21 - Brian McBride signs a multi-year contract that will keep him in Columbus through the 2002 World Cup.

Sept. 26 - Brian McBride becomes the first Crew player and the 14th player in MLS history to eclipse the 100-career-point plateau after scoring two goals in a 2-1 home win over Miami, which gave him 101 points. The win also set a new team mark for wins in a season with 19.

Oct. 3 - Crew Stadium hosts the U.S. Women's National Team in the opening double header of the 1999 Nike U.S. Women's Cup.

Oct. 10 - With a crowd of 18,979 in the final regular season home game vs. Chicago, Columbus (MLS' smallest market) finishes the season with the top home attendance in the league, averaging 17,696 per game.

Oct. 12 - The Crew and Major League Soccer unveil the official 2000 MLS All-Star Game logo.

Nov. 13 - The Black & Gold fall one game short of MLS Cup, losing the decisive game three of the Eastern Finals 4-0 at D.C. United.

Nov. 15 - The Crew and MLS announce that Stern John has been sold to Nottingham Forest of the English First Division.

Nov. 17 - MLS bans the shootout, changes the game clock direction and realigns the league into three divisions. MLS also announces that "Soccer Saturdays" and a Monday night highlight show will be part of its national TV package. The Crew will now play in the Cen-





tral Division with Dallas, Chicago and Tampa Bay.

Dec. 16 - Crew President/General Manager Jamey Rootes announces that he is leaving the organization to become the Vice President of Sales and Marketing for the NFL's new expansion franchise in Houston, later named the Texans.

2000

Jan. 11 - Crew Stadium is named the 2000 Foremost Sports Facility of the Year by the International Sports Summit. Crew Stadium edged out the Staples Center in Los Angeles.

Jan. 25 - Jim Smith is named The Crew's new General Manager. Smith comes to the club from Ohio State University where he was the Associate Athletic Director for Marketing and Communications.

Feb. 6 - MLS holds its first-ever SuperDraft in Fort Lauderdale. Taking the place of the previous college and supplemental drafts, the SuperDraft combined all collegiate, Project-40 and professional players who entered the draft. The Crew trades its first round pick (3rd overall) to Dallas for forward Dante Washington.

March 25 - Robert Warzycha scores MLS's first-ever regular-season "Golden Goal" to propel The Crew to a 2-1 victory over San Jose in its home opener.

May 3 - The Crew snaps its 13-match winless streak at RFK Stadium, defeating D.C. United there for the first time ever, 2-1, on a Richie Williams own goal.

May 24 - Crew Stadium plays host to its first international exhibition match as German Bundesliga power Hamburg SV come to town, but it is The Crew which streaks to a decisive 4-1 victory.

July 26 - In its second international exhibition match of the season, The Crew plays Newcastle United F.C. of the English Premier League to a 2-2 draw before 18,212 spectators at Crew Stadium.

July 29 - A standing-room-only crowd of 23,495 is on hand as Crew Stadium plays host to the 2000 MLS All-Star Game. Mike Clark, Brian McBride and Dante Washington all represent the hometown Crew.

Sept. 6 - Matt Napoleon departs for Australia where he will serve as the alternate goalie for the U.S. Men's Olympic Team at the Sydney 2000 Games.

Sept. 9 - With The Crew already eliminated from postseason contention for the first time ever, a sellout crowd of 24,347 packs Crew Stadium for the the 2000 finale vs. Chicago.

Sept. 13 - Brian McBride departs for England, on loan to First Division club Preston North End F.C. for the duration of the MLS off-season.

Oct. 11 - The U.S. Men's National Team and Costa Rica play to a 0-0 draw in a CONCACAF World Cup qualifying match at Crew Stadium. The second-largest crowd in stadium history 24,430 witnesses the historic event.

Nov. 11 - The first game of the U.S. Women's National Team's Glory Tour, vs. Canada, is played at Crew Stadium.

2001

Feb. 14 - Crew embarks on its first-ever overseas trip with departure for a 12-day training tour in Germany.

Feb. 21 - Agreement is reached with North American Broadcasting Co. to have

Eagle 103.9 (WEGE-FM) become the new flagship station of the Columbus Crew Radio Network.

Feb. 28 - The U.S. Men's National Team defeats Mexico, 2-0, before a chilled, overflow crowd of 24,624 at Crew Stadium, in a final-round CONCACAF World Cup qualifying match.

April 4 - The Crew opens its first-ever international competition with a 2-0 loss to CD Saprissa in San Jose, Costa Rica, in the quarterfinals of the FC (CONCACAF) Giants Cup. The Giants Cup involved the confederation clubs with the top attendance marks. The teams played to a 1-1 draw a week later (April 11) at Crew Stadium and Saprissa advanced to the semifinals on aggregate (3-1).

April 19 - Crew launches "5th Major Sport" program, a partnership with the greater-Columbus soccer community to promote the game of soccer.

May 17 - Tom Fitzgerald is dismissed as Crew head coach, after parts of six seasons, and replaced on an interim basis by his top assistant Greg Andrusis.

May 19 - The Crew pulls out a dramatic 2-1 overtime win over D.C. United in Greg Andrusis' debut as head coach. Jeff Cunningham scores the golden goal in the 99th minute after The Crew plays the final 32 minutes two men down.

May 29 - The Crew defeats Bayer Leverkusen of the German Bundesliga, 4-3, in an international exhibition match at Crew Stadium.

June 5 - Rookie forward Edson Buddle is named to the U.S. Under-20 National Team for the Xth FIFA World Youth Championship, held in Argentina June 17-July 8. Buddle appeared in three matches and scored one goal.

June 7 - The U.S. Men's National Team and Ecuador play to a 0-0 tie in an international friendly match at Crew Stadium, with legendary guitarist Eric Clapton in attendance.

June 16 - Dante Washington sets a new club record for points in a game (8), by scoring three goals and adding two assists in The Crew's 6-1 win over Tampa Bay.

July 6 - The 'interim' is lifted from head coach Greg Andrusis' title, as GM Jim Smith announces he will remain at the helm for the balance of the season.

July 15 - Crew 'got milk?' billboards go up around greater-Columbus, featuring Crew players Mike Clark, Mike Duhaney, Brian Maisonneuve and Brian West.

July 28 - Mike Clark, Brian McBride and John Wilmar Perez represent The Crew in the 2001 All-Star Game in San Jose, Calif. With his five-point day (2g, 1a), McBride became the all-time leading scorer in all-star game history (6 GP, 5g-7a=17 pts.).

Aug. 1 - The Crew sells the 125,000th bratwurst in the history of its Wednesday Buck-a-Brat Nights.

Aug. 19 - The Crew extends its unbeaten streak to a club-record nine games (7-0-2) with a 1-0 win at NY/NJ.

Sept. 13 - MLS cancels the final week-and-a-half of the 2001 regular season, in the aftermath of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks on New York and Washington, D.C. The Crew, whose final two games are cancelled, finish as the No. 4 playoff seed with a 13-7-6 record (45 pts.).

Oct. 9 - Crew forward Jeff Cunningham

departs for a loan spell in Germany with Bayer Leverkusen of the German Bundesliga, following an impressive MLS season in which he became the first Crew player ever to achieve double-figure totals in both goals (10) and assists (13).

Oct. 20 - General Manager Jim Smith is named the 2001 MLS Executive of the Year.

Oct. 21 - The San Jose Earthquakes defeat the Los Angeles Galaxy 2-1 in overtime to win MLS Cup 2001 at Crew Stadium.

Oct. 25 - The Crew signs head coach Greg Andrusis, who posted a 12-4-4 regular-season record after taking over, to a two-year extension.

Dec. 6 - MLS announces that its investors committed to funding and operating the league for the next five years, through the 2006 season.

Dec. 9 - Jeff Cunningham earns his first cap for the U.S. Men's National Team in an international friendly match at South Korea. The Jamaican-born Cunningham was sworn in as a U.S. citizen at the Federal Courthouse in Columbus on Nov. 13.

Dec. 16 - The University of North Carolina defeats Indiana University, 2-0, at Crew Stadium in the final of the 2001 NCAA Men's College Cup which kicked off on Dec. 14 with two national semifinal matches.

2002

Jan. 2 - MLS announces innovative five-year broadcast agreement that includes MLS and FIFA World Cup broadcasts, which will air on ABC and ESPN networks. A new company is formed by MLS to manage sales, service and broadcast production for the World Cup properties, which the league purchased.

Jan. 8 - MLS eliminates the Miami Fusion and Tampa Bay Mutiny via contraction, leaving a 10-team league.

Jan. 17 - Veteran midfielder Robert Warzycha is named a player/assistant coach for the 2002 season.

April 17 - Crew Founder Lamar Hunt announces the promotion of General Manager Jim Smith to the dual role of President/General Manager and signs him to a three-year contract extension.

April 20 - The first annual Connor Senn Memorial Match is played at Jesse Owens Memorial Stadium on the Ohio State University campus. The game pits The Crew against the OSU Buckeyes with a portion of the proceeds benefiting the Connor Senn Memorial Scholarship Fund, established after the Ohio State freshman tragically lost his life after collapsing during a game on Sept. 26, 2001.

April 22 - Brian McBride is one of the 23 players named by head coach Bruce Arena to the U.S. World Cup Team that went on to compete in the 2002 FIFA World Cup in Korea and Japan. Crew teammates Brian Maisonneuve and Brian West are named as alternates.

May 6 - The Crew announces a partnership with the American Dairy Association & Dairy Council Mid East for a "got milk?" promotion. In addition to offering milk at the concession stands during Crew games in Crew Stadium, the promotion also features Crew players Tom Presthus, Brian Maisonneuve, Jeff Cunningham and Duncanoughton sporting milk moustaches on COTA busses

throughout the Columbus area.

May 15 - The Crew competes in an international friendly with FC Nurnberg of the German Bundesliga at Crew Stadium, won by Columbus 7-2.

May 31 - June 30 - Columbus Crew Stadium is transformed into "Cup Headquarters" where The Crew hosts viewing parties for every televised game of the 2002 FIFA World Cup. More than 27,000 people attend the viewing parties, which attract national media attention.

June 5 - Brian McBride tallies the game-winning goal as the U.S. Men's National Team kicks off the 2002 FIFA World Cup with a shocking 3-2 win over world power Portugal in Sown, Korea.

June 15 - Dante Washington scores the 50th goal of his MLS career.

June 17 - Brian McBride tallies his second game-winning goal of the 2002 FIFA World Cup as the U.S. downs rival Mexico 2-0 to advance to the quarterfinals, its best showing in 72 years.

June 24-25 - As a part of the media blitz following the U.S. World Cup Team's successful run in Korea, Brian McBride, along with several of his World Cup teammates, appear on a number of major national television programs, including The Late Show with David Letterman, Connie Chung Tonight, Good Morning America, Live! With Regis & Kelly and ESPN2's World Cup Tonight.

June 25 - Veteran Todd Yeagley announces his retirement due to chronic injuries in his knee and foot. After announcing his retirement, Yeagley joins the Crew's front office as the Assistant to the President/General Manager for the remainder of the season.

June 26 - The Crew plays host to Club Tigres of the Mexican First Division in an exhibition match held at Crew Stadium. Columbus loses its first international exhibition against a Mexican team, 2-1.

June 27 - At Columbus Celebrates Sports, a ceremony held by the Greater Columbus Convention & Visitors Bureau to announce the formation of the Greater Columbus Sports Commission, The U.S. vs. Mexico World Cup qualifier held at Crew Stadium on Feb. 28, 2001 is named the second greatest moment in Columbus sports history. The opening of Crew Stadium is also ranked among the top 20 moments in Columbus sports history.

July 3 - Crew defender/midfielder Duncan Oughton is named to the New Zealand National Team for the Oceania Nations Cup, its regional confederation championship, ultimately won by the Kiwis on home soil.

July 11 - Veteran defender Mike Lapper announces his retirement and joins the Crew's front office staff as Director of Soccer Business Development.

July 31 - Brian McBride scores his 50th career MLS goal, all of them coming with The Crew.

Aug. 3 - Brian McBride, Brian Maisonneuve and John Harkes compete for the U.S. National Team in the Pepsi MLS All-Star Game vs. the MLS Stars.

Sept. 3 - Edson Buddle is named MLS Player of the Month for August.

Sept. 8 - The U.S. Women's National Team defeats Scotland, 8-2, at Crew Stadium in the first-ever meeting between the two countries.

Sept. 10 - The Crew comes from behind in dramatic and improbable fashion to

defeat K.C., 3-2 in OT, in a U.S. Open Cup semifinal at Crew Stadium, after trailing 2-0 through 75 minutes.

Oct. 16 - Midfielder Kyle Martino is named MLS Rookie of the Year, the first Crew player ever so honored.

Oct. 19 - Jeff Cunningham is named to the MLS Pepsi Best 11 team.

Oct. 24 - The Crew wins its first-ever championship, defeating Los Angeles 1-0 to win the U.S. Open Cup title at Columbus Crew Stadium, behind Freddy Garcia's goal and Jon Busch's shutout.

Dec. - Brian McBride is one of four MLS players featured in the December issue of *Vanity Fair*.

Dec. 16 - Crew all-time great Robert Warzycha announces his retirement and becomes a full-time assistant coach after spending 2002 as a player/assistant.

Dec. 18 - Brian McBride signs a multi-year extension to keep him with The Crew through 2005 and beyond.

2003

Jan. 6 - Jim Lauder, former University of Wisconsin and University of Dayton head coach, is named an assistant coach.

Jan. 10 - Brian McBride begins successful, three-month loan spell with Everton of the English Premier League, which sees him score four goals in eight games.

Feb. 19 - Brian McBride and his wife Dina grace the pages of the 2003 *Sports Illustrated* Swimsuit Issue.

March 7 - U.S. World Cup and Olympic team veteran Frankie Hejduk signed.

March 13 - Veteran MLS All-Star midfielder Ross Paule acquired from the MetroStars, in exchange for Chris Leitch and Jeff Matteo.

April 5 - The Crew opens its eighth MLS season with a 1-1 tie against the defending MLS Cup champion L.A. Galaxy at Crew Stadium on MLS "Opening Day." The game is televised nationally on ABC Sports.

April 16 - Crew defeats Monarcas Morelia of Mexico, 2-0, at Crew Stadium, but is eliminated from the CONCACAF Champion's Cup, 6-2 on aggregate, in the quarterfinal round. Columbus defeated Deportivo Arabe Unido of Panama in the Round of 16.

May 10 - Crew Stadium's Huntington Club is dedicated. Located on the mezzanine level in the southeast corner of the stadium, the fully enclosed, climate controlled, high-end hospitality space is utilized for exclusive group functions during Crew matches and other stadium events.

May 10 - Jeff Cunningham becomes the 14th player in MLS history to score his 50th career goal in a 2-0 win over Colorado.

June 7 - The Home Depot Center opens in Carson, Calif., becoming the second major-league soccer-specific stadium to open in the U.S. (after Crew Stadium).

July 5 - Crew players, coaches and team staff receive their 2002 U.S. Open Cup championship rings in an on-field ceremony prior to game vs. Dallas.

July 6 - The U.S. Men's National Team, including Brian McBride and Frankie Hejduk of The Crew, defeats Paraguay, 2-0, in a friendly at Crew Stadium.

Sept. 20, 24, 28 - Crew Stadium plays host to three first-round doubleheaders in the 2003 FIFA Women's World Cup.

The U.S. defeats North Korea, 3-0, before a sellout crowd of 22,828 on Sept. 28.

Oct. 19 - Battling a respiratory infection, Brian McBride comes off the bench to score the 59th and 60th goals of his MLS career, the latter a dramatic game-winner in the final minute of OT at D.C.

2004

Jan. 14 - Goalkeeper Tom Presthus retires months after "Tommy John" surgery to repair a torn ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow.

Jan. 16 - Crew selects Chad Marshall (No. 2 overall) and MAC Hermann Trophy winner Chris Wingert (No. 12) in the first round of the 2003 MLS SuperDraft.

Jan. 20 - Brian McBride transferred to Fulham F.C. of the English Premier League, following eight standout seasons in Columbus.

Jan. 29 - Former New England Revolution assistant John Murphy is named an assistant coach.

Feb. 18 - The Dallas Burn breaks ground on a soccer-specific stadium in Frisco, Texas, due to open in 2005.

March 16 - Defender Mike Clark, The Crew's all-time games-played leader and a member of the team since the inaugural 1996 season, retires.

March 24 - MLS Commissioner Don Garber announces that MLS regular-season contests will no longer feature overtime periods when games are tied after 90 minutes.

May 15 - Crew Stadium celebrates its fifth anniversary with a 1-0 Crew win over the New England Revolution, which was also the opponent when the facility opened on May 15, 1999.

June 13 - The U.S. defeats Grenada, 3-0, at Crew Stadium in its 2006 FIFA World Cup qualifying opener.

June 21 - Crew specialty license plates, featuring the club's logo, are introduced by the Ohio Bureau of Motor Vehicles.

July 9 - President/General Manager Jim Smith departs for an executive position with the NFL Atlanta Falcons and Crew Stadium General Manager Mark McCullers is named Interim GM.

July 14 - Real Salt Lake admitted to MLS as an expansion team for the 2005 season.

July 22 - Crew wins rights to 17-year-old U.S. youth national team star Danny Sztetela in a weighted lottery televised live on ESPN News.

Aug. 2 - CD Chivas USA admitted to MLS as an expansion team for the 2005 season.

Aug. 27 - 2002 U.S. World Cup veteran Tony Sanneh signs with The Crew as an allocation.

Sept. 18 - Edson Buddle establishes a new club record for goals in a game, scoring every Crew goal in a 4-2 win over the MetroStars.

Oct. 6 - Crew defeats Chicago, 1-0, to clinch first-ever regular-season Eastern Conference title and run unbeaten streak to 16 games, setting new league record.

Oct. 17 - The Crew ties Colorado, 1-1, in regular-season finale to extend its MLS-record unbeaten streak to 18 games (8-0-10) and clinch Supporters Shield, won by the team with the top overall regular-season record (12-5-13, 49 pts.).

Nov. 10 - Major League Soccer, Soccer United Marketing and adidas announce exclusive 10-year partnership,





making adidas the official athletic sponsor and licensed product supplier for MLS. The partnership incorporates every aspect of the game, from product creation, to grassroots programs, television rights and retail distribution.

Nov. 12 - Greg Andrus is named MLS Coach of the Year, making him the first Crew coach so honored, and Robin Fraser is named MLS Defender of the Year.

Nov. 13 - Defender Robin Fraser named to RadioShack Best XI team.

Nov. 17 - The U.S. ties Jamaica, 1-1, at Crew Stadium in CONCACAF semifinal-round qualifying for the 2006 FIFA World Cup.

Nov. 19 - Defender Nelson Akwari and forward Erick Scott are selected by Real Salt Lake in the 2004 MLS Expansion Draft.

Nov. 30 - The Chicago Fire breaks ground on a soccer-specific stadium in the Village of Bridgeview, scheduled to open in 2006.

Dec. 4 - Former head coach Tom Fitzgerald is killed in a motorcycle accident in Tampa, Fla.

2005

Jan. 14 - Jeff Cunningham, the club's career co-goal-scoring leader is traded to Colorado after seven years in Black & Gold.

Jan. 19 - Mark McCullers has the "interim" removed from his title and is officially appointed General Manager.

Jan. 27 - Eddie Carvacho named assistant coach/goalkeeper coach.

Jan. 27 - Crew and the Ohio South Youth Soccer Association (OSYA) announce multi-year partnership agreement that includes technical development, sponsorship development and promotional opportunities for both parties.

Jan. 30 - Blockbuster trade sees The Crew send Tony Sanneh to Chicago for Ante Razov.

Jan. 31 - Brian Maisonneuve, the last remaining active player from the inaugural 1996 season, announces his retirement after battling ankle injuries for years.

April 2 - The Crew opens its 10th season against the L.A. Galaxy at Crew Stadium.

CREW TELEVISION

The Crew will have 11 of its games televised locally on the Ohio News Network (ONN) during the 2005 Major League Soccer season. The Crew and ONN have partnered for three years that will make ONN the official local television partner of the team. All 11 games televised on ONN are road games. Dwight Burgess will again handle the play-by-play and Bill McDermott returns for another season as lead analyst on all local broadcasts. Former Crew goalkeeper Tom Presthus also does color for some local games.

An additional four games, one on the road and three at home, will be televised nationally on ESPN2. The 2005 Sierra Mist MLS All-Star Game is hosted by Columbus and will be televised nationally on ABC Sports.

The Crew will also be featured nationally on premium cable networks, FOX Sports World, FOX Sports World Espanol and HDNet, as well as on the MLS Direct Kick subscription package. MLS Direct Kick is available through satellite TV providers DIRECTV and DISH Network, along with digital cable provider IN DEMAND.

All told, at least 29 of The Crew's 32 regular-season matches – including 15 of 16 road games – will be available on TV.

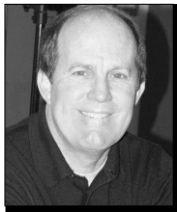

CREW ENGLISH AND SPANISH RADIO

For the fifth season, 103.9, TED-FM, is the English radio home of the Columbus Crew and will broadcast all 32 regular-season games, as well as any playoff contests.

Dwight Burgess, the original "Voice of the Crew," returns for his 10th season behind the microphone. The 2005 season marks his 15th calling professional soccer play-by-play. Burgess will also serve as the Crew's primary television play-by-play announcer again in 2005. In those instances, Jim Henderson will handle the radio duties for the third straight season.

Burgess, a 24-year broadcast veteran, was a two-time soccer collegiate All-American at DePauw University and was twice selected to developmental camps for the United States National Program. He served as captain for two regional teams in international friendly matches against clubs from West Germany and Chile.

Burgess holds a National Coaching License and has coached at the club, high school, and collegiate levels. He is currently the men's and women's head coach at Capital University in Columbus.

A former NSCAA clinician, Burgess also served on the Ohio South Olympic Development Program State Staff.

THE CREW NAME, LOGO AND MASCOT

PRIMARY LOGO

Certain elements must be considered when choosing a name for a professional sports team. The name must be unique, versatile, appeal to youth, and most importantly, capture the attitude and key values of the region or team it represents. With that in mind and after evaluating numerous possibilities, the Major League Soccer franchise in Columbus, Ohio, became The Columbus Crew.

"In designing the logo and uniform, several factors were considered," says Peter Moore, worldwide creative director for Adidas and designer of The Crew logo and uniform.

"It was necessary to represent the Columbus community in an appropriate and positive manner. The name suggests a work hard, show-me-don't-tell-me attitude. The name implies 'team,' people working together."

Using The Crew's team colors of black, yellow and metallic silver, the Crew logo remains consistent with the hard-working attitude for which the name was intended. The three construction workers featured in the logo, complete with hard hats and displaying a look of distinct seriousness, reflect the demeanor that is expected from "America's Hardest Working Team."



SECONDARY LOGO

A secondary logo, featuring the same three construction workers, has incorporated "Columbus," because the original logo, or crest, did not bear the city's name.

The Crew name resulted from a month-long contest in The Columbus Dispatch, which asked soccer fans to submit names for their new MLS franchise. Thousands of entries were re-

ceived, but when all was said and done, "The Crew" emerged as the winner.

Luis Orozco of Columbus was the lone person to submit "The Crew" as a nickname. As a result, he received the contest's Grand Prize of two season tickets to the team's inaugural season at "The Horseshoe," Ohio Stadium. Orozco remains a season ticket holder for the Crew.

MASCOT — CREW CAT

Crew Cat has been the official mascot of the Columbus Crew since the inaugural 1996 season.

Sporting a Crew uniform and trademark hard hat, the most popular feline in central Ohio has been delighting Crew fans of all ages with its antics ever since.

In addition to Crew games, "America's Hardest Working Mascot" can be found throughout the area, making numerous appearances and representing the organization at a wide variety of events—especially anywhere that children and soccer balls converge.

The Columbus Crew organization does not confine its efforts to the field of play. Beyond wins, losses and entertainment is the club's commitment to making a difference in its community.

Right from the beginning, since the inaugural 1996 season, Columbus Crew players, coaches and front office staff have worked diligently to help make central Ohio a better place. Whether through in-kind donations or appearances by Crew Cat, players and staff at charity events, clinics, festivals and parades, The Crew is committed to playing a significant role in the lives of the greater-Columbus community.

The organization's charitable arm, The Columbus Crew Foundation, now plays a vital role in those efforts, as well.

In 2004, The Crew celebrated the fourth season of its 5th Major Sport program, which is one of the most unique and important initiatives it has ever implemented. The partnerships with area youth soccer associations it results in allow The Crew to build relationships with thousands of young players, while promoting the sport. As The Crew moves forward, a major part of the organization's philosophy is devoted to giving back to the sport of soccer and to creating opportunities for growth for young players. One of our missions is to help build and strengthen the game at the grassroots

level, and to share our resources with our soccer community.

The 5th Major Sport program accomplishes this by providing a clinic for association players performed by Crew players, a clinic for association coaches performed by The Crew coaching staff, a 5th Major Sport T-shirt for every player in the association and a voucher for a ticket to a future Crew home game for every player in the association.

The organization is now in its sixth year in the Columbus Reads program, which works under the umbrella of the Help One Student to Succeed (HOSTS) program. Through it, members of the front office staff have been tutoring Columbus City Schools children – to help develop reading and writing skills – since its inception.

The Crew is also associated with a variety of community events and festivals, including "Red, White & Boom," the city-wide Fourth of July celebration, "Crew Night at Go Auction!" and the Columbus Marathon Children's Run for Fun.

In its eighth year, "Kicks for Kids" is now a program of The Columbus Crew Foundation. It rallies monetary support from local small businesses and individuals to make it possible for underprivileged children to attend Columbus Crew home matches at Crew Stadium.

Some members of the Crew organization have become closely involved with a variety of local charities and non-profit organizations on an individual basis, as well. Head coach Greg Andrulis, for example, works closely with the Mid-Ohio Chapter of the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation. In 2003, he launched a major fundraiser called "Soccer Aid" that has now raised more than \$20,000 for JDRF in its first two years. And assistant coach Robert Warzycha regularly assists with fundraising activities for children's hospitals.

THE BIRTH OF COLUMBUS CREW STADIUM

Although it had long been the vision of soccer enthusiasts around the country, Columbus Crew Stadium has a shorter history than most might think.

Constructed in a scant nine months and one day, at a cost of \$28.5 million, the first major league stadium built specifically for soccer in the United States houses only one tenant, Major League Soccer's Columbus Crew. Perhaps more than that, the 22,555-seat facility is also the most extravagant monument to the progress of soccer in the U.S.

Since opening on May 15, 1999, when the hometown Crew downed the New England Revolution 2-0 before a sellout crowd of 24,741, Crew Stadium's impact on soccer in the United States has been recognized around the globe. The new facility sparked a new interest amongst soccer fans in Central Ohio, as Crew fans showed up in number to support their Crew. Their loyalty would be evidenced by the fact that Columbus (MLS's smallest market), finished the 1999 regular season with the league's highest average home attendance of 17,696.

Plans for a soccer specific stadium in Central Ohio had been in the works ever since The Crew's inaugural season, when the Black and Gold called historic Ohio Stadium home. Realizing that The Crew's days at the Horseshoe were numbered due to the facility's oversized seating capacity and downsized field width, team officials made the search for a suitable venue a top priority.

Just after the start of the 1997 season, after more than a year of in-depth studies, The Crew's first real chance at a home of its own came in the form of Issue I, a Franklin County vote to raise

taxes 0.5 percent for a \$285 million downtown stadium and arena complex. Voters went to the polls on May 7, but the issue came up short, as the vote was defeated 56 percent to 44 percent.

The Crew's chances of building its own soccer-specific stadium suffered another blow six months later when The Ohio State University's Board of Trustees approved a \$150 million renovation project for Ohio Stadium on November 7, 1997. Construction would make Ohio Stadium unusable during the summer of 1999, giving The Crew less than 18 months to find or construct a suitable playing venue.

The search would lead The Crew to a 180-acre patch of land in Dublin, a Northwest Columbus suburb, where officials voted to purchase approximately 158 acres of the site in December of 1997. Planned for the site was a \$26 million, 25,000-seat soccer-specific stadium similar to the structure proposed on Issue I. However, a city referendum loomed on February 10, 1998.

The referendum failed by a margin of 59 percent to 41 percent, leaving the team with little time to spare until the start of the 1999 season.

As the 1998 season wore on, time became The Crew's biggest foe. Less than three months after the defeat of the Dublin vote, The Crew proposed another stadium site that called for a 22,500-seat stadium that would be built on land leased from the Ohio Expositions Commission.

The first hurdle was cleared on May 15, when the Expositions Commission voted 6-2 in favor of the 25-year lease. Three days later, it was approved by the state of Ohio's Controlling Board and on May 28 the Ohio Expositions Com-

mission approved the stadium site.

When the stadium's design was unveiled on July 7, it illustrated a combination of European atmosphere and traditional American amenities. From the foundation up, Crew Stadium's sharp-cut industrial look was a steel and concrete masterpiece designed in the very image of America's Hardest Working Team.

At the stadium's ground breaking on August 14, then-MLS Commissioner Doug Logan, made good on his previous promises by awarding Crew Stadium with the 2000 MLS All-Star Game and the MLS Cup 2001. The Crew, the city of Columbus and Major League Soccer had confronted the game's biggest challenge and defeated it soundly, leaving no doubt that The Crew was here to stay.

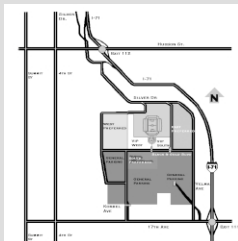

CREW TRAINING CENTER AT OBETZ



The Crew Training Center at Obetz is a state-of-the-art training facility located in the Village of Obetz, Ohio, just south of Columbus, where the team's daily practices and training sessions take place.

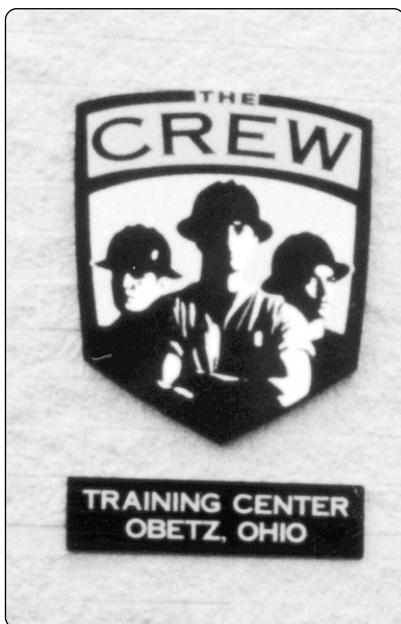
Opened on August 11, 1997, The Crew Training Center was the first facility of its kind in Major League Soccer. It features two full-size soccer fields, one of which has outdoor lighting, and a spacious training room complete with exercise equipment and two whirlpools.

The center also houses offices for the coaching staff, trainer and equipment manager, as well as a locker room, players' lounge and laundry facilities.

DIRECTIONS TO THE COLUMBUS CREW TRAINING CENTER AT OBETZ

From Port Columbus International Airport (CMH): Take 270 South to Alum Creek Dr. Go North (right) on Alum Creek and go approximately 1/4 mile to the facility driveway on the left. The Crew Training Facility at Obetz is located at 4153 Alum Creek Dr., just before the railroad tracks.

From Columbus Crew Stadium: Take I-71 South to I-70 East towards Wheeling. Exit I-70 at Alum Creek Dr. and continue down the ramp to the stop light. Make a left at the light on to Alum Creek Dr., and continue South for 4.5 miles. The Crew Training Facility at Obetz is located on the right side of the road at 4153 Alum Creek Drive.

Visitors to the city – and residents, too – will find excellent arts and entertainment, attractions, sports, shopping and great dining that combine to make the city one of the Midwest's great destinations.

Many of Columbus' performing arts groups can be found along Theater Row downtown, at the Ohio, Palace and Southern theaters. The three historic theaters host the Columbus Symphony Orchestra, ProMusica Chamber Orchestra, Columbus Jazz Orchestra and BalletMet, among others. Broadway in Columbus also routinely brings touring shows to town, while Shadowbox Cabaret performs its unique mix of comedy, skits and rock and roll at Easton Town Center.

Those interested in the visual arts can head to the Columbus Museum of Art, the Columbus College of Art & Design or the Belmont Building downtown, one of the temporary homes of the Wexner Center for the Arts.

The Arena District – home of Nationwide Arena, the Arena Grand Theatre, PromoWest Pavilion music house and a long list of bars and restaurants – is one of the city's most popular entertainment districts. Other hot nightspots include the Brewery District, Easton Town Center, German Village and Short North Arts District.

Columbus is home to a variety of family attractions, including the world-renowned Columbus Zoo and Aquarium, where Jack Hanna serves as director emeritus. Other must-see attractions include COSI Columbus, the city's interactive science center, Franklin Park Conservatory and Botanical Garden, Jack Nicklaus Museum, Motorcycle Hall of Fame Museum, Ohio Historical Center, Ohio Statehouse and Wyandot Lake.

Columbus is fast becoming a leading sports destination. The Columbus Crew, NHL's Columbus Blue Jackets, triple-A baseball's Clippers and the Columbus Destroyers of the Arena Football League are among the city's professional teams. Ohio State University also fields varsity teams in 31 sports – including football, which won the 2002 national championship. The PGA Memorial Tournament and the PGA Wendy's Championship for Children are among major sporting events held in the city each year.

Those who like to shop can head to Easton Town Center on the northeast side, Polaris Fashion Place on the north side and Columbus City Center downtown all offer a variety of shops and restaurants. Smaller shops and boutiques can be found in the Short North, while nearby suburbs of Grandview Heights, Worthington and Westerville all feature quaint shops and restaurants.

Columbus is the largest city in Ohio and the 15th largest in the nation with a population of more than 711,000. Ohio's capital city is one of few in the northeast quadrant of the country whose economy and population have grown steadily over the past three decades. Columbus covers 220 square miles, with most of the city located in Franklin County.

Government, manufacturing, finance, insurance and retail are among the area's leading industries. Nationally recognized companies that started in central Ohio include Wendy's International, Worthington Industries, CompuServe, Red Roof Inns, Bank One, Huntington Bancshares, The Limited, Nationwide Insurance, the Longaberger Company and Bob Evans Farms.

Major employers in Central Ohio include American Electric Power, Ashland Chemical, Battelle Memorial Institute, Honda Manufacturing, Huntington Bancshares, Nationwide Insurance Enterprise, The Ohio State University, the State of Ohio, The Limited and Worthington Industries.

Other colleges in Central Ohio include Columbus State Community College, Columbus College of Art & Design and Franklin, Denison, Ohio Wesleyan and Ohio Dominican universities.

GREATER COLUMBUS SPORTS COMMISSION

Experience Columbus, the region's convention and visitors bureau, created the Greater Columbus Sports Commission in June 2002 to attract professional, collegiate, amateur and youth sporting events to Columbus.

The Sports Commission partners with the Columbus Crew, Columbus Blue Jackets, Ohio State University, the City of Columbus, the Greater Columbus Convention Center and various others public and private organizations to bring a variety of sporting events to the community on an annual basis.

In all of its efforts, the Sports Commission strives to create economic vitality through visitor spending, generate national attention to the city and improve the quality of life for area residents. The Sports Commission has assisted the Crew in attracting the 2003 FIFA Women's World Cup, MLS Cup, MLS All-Star Game, 2002 FIFA Men's World Cup qualifiers and the NCAA Men's College Cup (in both 2001 and 2003) to Crew Stadium in recent years. The Sports Commission also worked to move the Grange Insurance Ohio All-Star Classic, a statewide high-school all-star football game, to Crew Stadium in 2001.

The Sports Commission partnered with Ohio State to attract NCAA men's and women's basketball tournament games to Columbus in 2003, while the Frozen Four national hockey championship was played at the Schottenstein Center this spring. The Sports Commission has also successfully bid on amateur softball, volleyball, wrestling, golf, bowling and fencing tournaments in recent years.

The Sports Commission promotes the area's facilities, including Crew Stadium, home of the Crew. *Soccer Digest* recently named Crew Stadium, the first soccer-specific stadium built for a major league team in the U.S., the 10th best soccer stadium in the world.

Several new venues at Ohio State – including the Schottenstein Center (basketball and hockey), Ohio Stadium (football), Jesse Owens Memorial Stadium (track and field) and Bill Davis Stadium (baseball) – are also available to host events, as is downtown's Nationwide Arena.

2004 CREW GAME-BY-GAME SUMMARIES

APRIL 3, 2004

MetroStars 3, Crew 1 COLUMBUS CREW STADIUM

— Goals from Mike Magee and John Wolyniec on either side of halftime brought the MetroStars back from a one-goal deficit and gave them a victory in the 2004 opener for both teams. Wolyniec scored the game winner in the 52nd minute, after Magee had tied it five minutes before halftime. Frankie Hejduk put the Crew ahead in the 30th minute, heading home the rebound of a David Testo shot, and Amado Guevara finished off the scoring for the Metro two minutes before the final whistle.

APRIL 17, 2003

K.C. Wizards 1, Crew 0 ARROWHEAD STADIUM (Kansas City, Mo.)

Davy Arnaud's first goal of the season would prove to be all Kansas City needed to blank the Crew, as Wizards goalkeeper Tony Meola notched his MLS-record 50th career shutout. The turning points of the match came in the final three minutes of the first half as Arnaud lobbed the ball over Crew keeper Jon Busch after receiving a well-weighted Kerry Zavagnin pass in the 42nd minute. Three minutes later, Crew midfielder Frankie Hejduk was ejected after an off-the-ball tussle with Alex Zotinica in the Wizards penalty area as K.C. set up a wall.

APRIL 24, 2004

L.A. Galaxy 2, Crew 0 THE HOME DEPOT CENTER (Carson, Calif.)

— Carlos Ruiz scored in his fourth straight game, and had both Galaxy goals on the night, to lead L.A. over the Crew. Ruiz opened the scoring from the penalty spot in the 58th minute, after Joseph Ngwenya was brought down in the box by Eric Denton. Columbus' Jeff Cunningham saw his chipped shot cleared off the line by Ryan Suarez in the 72nd minute and Edson Buddle knocked a header off the crossbar in the 83rd. But Ruiz foiled the Crew's plans with a spectacular goal, finishing off a give-and-go with Paul Broome with a volley from the middle of the box. The Crew was missing midfielder Frankie Hejduk due to a red-card suspension.

MAY 1, 2004

Crew 0, Dallas Burn 0 COLUMBUS CREW STADIUM

— Twice Jon Busch reached behind him to snatch balls off his goal line, but the Crew goalkeeper wasn't beaten as Columbus grabbed its first point of the season against Dallas. The Burn extended its unbeaten streak to four matches, while the Crew saw its scoreless streak extended to 330 minutes. Busch grabbed an Eddie Johnson header that bounced off Crew midfielder Kyle Martino, then the underside of the

crossbar and off Martino again just before halftime. Midway through the second half, which opened with a tremendous downpour and 15-degree temperature drop, Busch parried a Steve Jolley header off the inside of the post before scooping it off the line.

MAY 8, 2004

Crew 1, D.C. United 1 RFK STADIUM (Washington, D.C.)

— The Crew got a stoppage-time penalty kick to end a 420-minute goal-scoring drought and nab a point at D.C. In the game's dying moments it looked as if Dema Kovalenko's fourth-minute goal would hold up, but United defender Brandon PrIDEaux pulled down Frankie Hejduk in the box as the clock ticked past the 90-minute mark. Ross Paule's conversion from the penalty spot gave Columbus a second consecutive draw as it scored for the first time since its season opener.

MAY 15, 2004

Crew 1, N.E. Revolution 0 COLUMBUS CREW STADIUM

— Columbus celebrated Crew Stadium's fifth anniversary with its first win of the season, defeating New England behind Edson Buddle's 41st-minute strike, a low shot past Revs keeper Matt Reis and just inside the left post. And the restructured Crew defense, with Nelson Akwari starting in place of veteran Robin Fraser (red-card suspension), held on despite some tense moments. In the 66th minute, Crew keeper Jon Busch made two point-blank saves on Taylor Twellman in a wild sequence in the area to preserve the lead and New England twice put the ball into the back of the net over the final 30 minutes, only to be ruled offside in both instances.

MAY 22, 2004

Crew 3, Chicago Fire 1 SOLDIER FIELD (Chicago)

— The Crew gave its season a jumpstart, winning in Chicago for the first time in five years. A first-half penalty from Jeff Cunningham, after Jim Curtin brought him down in the box, got Columbus on the board in the 32nd minute. Damani Ralph answered back for the Fire in the 49th minute, but the Crew responded to the equalizer with two goals in a four-minute span. Kyle Martino struck first, in the 55th minute, then Michael Ritch slammed his first career goal past Fire keeper Henry Ring. Crew keeper Jon Busch did his part to maintain his side's advantage, making six saves in the game.

MAY 29, 2004

Crew 1, S.J. Earthquakes 0 COLUMBUS CREW STADIUM

— The Crew continued its resurgence — and its home dominance of San Jose — with another win over the 'Quakes. Jeff Cunningham's headed goal in the 69th minute gave Columbus 11 straight wins at home vs. San Jose, dating back to the 1996 season — a MLS record for home winning streak against one team. Just seven minutes in, a flash of brilliance from Crew defender Chad Marshall saved his team from going down a goal, sliding in at the last second to clear the ball off the line after 'Quakes midfielder Ian Russell slotted the ball past Crew keeper Jon Busch from 15 yards out.

JUNE 6, 2004

Crew 2, N.E. Revolution 1 GILLETTE STADIUM (Foxboro, Mass.)

— Crew goalkeeper Jon Busch stopped Jose Cancela's penalty kick three minutes into second-half stoppage time to preserve his club's fourth consecutive victory. Cancela, who beat Busch with a chip shot on a 62nd-minute penalty kick to tie the score, attempted the same shot on the potential dramatic equalizer, but Busch stood his ground and tipped the effort over the crossbar. Frankie Hejduk had given the Crew the lead in the 53rd minute, but then the two teams traded penalties. Jeff Cunningham (68th) answering Cancela's spot kick to again give the Crew the lead. Columbus held strong until the final stages when Shalrie Joseph was brought down in the box by a Chad Marshall slide tackle, setting the stage for Busch's heroics.

JUNE 12, 2004

Crew 2, K.C. Wizards 2 COLUMBUS CREW STADIUM

— Jeff Cunningham scored both Columbus goals as the Crew continued its run of positive results with a draw vs. K.C. Cunningham started an unexpected flurry of three goals in six minutes in the 18th minute, beating defender Nick Garcia to take the ball to the endline and then — from a sharp angle — flipped the ball over keeper Tony Meola. The Wizards answered three minutes later, through Jimmy Conrad, then Shavar Thomas put them ahead in the 24th minute. The goals came on K.C.'s first and second shots on goal, both headers by defenders off corner kicks. Cunningham equalized from the penalty spot in the 63rd minute, after being brought down by Garcia.

JUNE 19, 2004

D.C. United 3, Crew 1
RFK STADIUM (Washington, D.C.) — D.C. United scored three goals in the first half, including a pair of beauties from forward Alecko Eskandarian, to end the Crew's seven-match unbeaten streak. Jaime Moreno got things going early with a tap-in from six yards in the sixth minute and Eskandarian took care of the rest, looping a beautiful volley inside the back post (33rd minute) and curling a spectacular free kick over the wall and into the corner (45th). Freddy Adu faced the Crew for the first time in his career, coming on in the 69th minute. Manny Lagos got the Crew its only goal of the game just before the final whistle to spoil Worthington, Ohio native Troy Perkins' shutout bid.

JUNE 26, 2004

Colorado Rapids 2, Crew 1
COLUMBUS CREW STADIUM — Two goals late in the first half — a 37th-minute Jean-Philippe Peguero half-volley and an own goal by defender Eric Denton seconds before the break — were too much for the Crew to overcome. Edson Buddle finally pulled a goal back for the Crew in the 89th minute, but when defender Michael Ritch had a header cleared off the line by Chris Henderson in the third minute of stoppage time, Columbus fell a goal short.

JULY 3, 2004

Crew 2, Chicago Fire 0
COLUMBUS CREW STADIUM — Edson Buddle and Jeff Cunningham each found the net in the final minutes of the first half to carry the Crew. Buddle opened the scoring in the 43rd minute, beating Chicago's offside trap and chipping a shot over advancing Fire keeper Henry Ring, then a Cunningham shot took a wicked deflection off Chicago defender Kelly Gray and looped high over Ring and into the back of the net a minute later. Fire defender Evan Whitfield was ejected in the 85th minute after he pulled down Cunningham as the last defender preventing a clear scoring opportunity. The Crew's Chris Wingert made his first career MLS start.

JULY 10, 2004

Crew 0, Dallas Burn 0
THE COTTON BOWL (Dallas) — Neither the Crew nor the Burn could find the back of the net on a warm Texas evening. Columbus created good chances, but couldn't convert. In the 37th minute, Dallas goalkeeper Jeff Cassar leapt to deny Edson Buddle's first-time effort from an unmarked position six yards out. And in the 66th, Buddle sent a swerving pass to Cunningham, whose first-time volley nipped the outside of Cassar's right post. The closest the Burn came was in the 76th, when Jon Busch was forced to make an ankle save on Toni Nhlako's close-range flick-on of a free kick.

JULY 17, 2004

Crew 1, N.E. Revolution 1
COLUMBUS CREW STADIUM — The Crew scored moments before halftime to secure a draw. New England rookie Clint Dempsey gave the Revs the lead with a gritty 31st-minute tally, but Kyle Martino responded with a goal against the run of play to even matters in the 45th. Pinpoint crosses from Richie Baker led to a flurry of Revolution scoring opportunities, forcing a number of stops from Crew goalkeeper Jon Busch. Just before halftime, Jeff Cunningham threaded a through ball to Martino, who placed a low shot past the outstretched hand of N.E. keeper Matt Reis.

JULY 24, 2004

Crew 0, Colorado Rapids 0
INVESCO FIELD AT MILE HIGH (Denver) — Despite controlling the run of play for most of the game, the Crew was unable to find the net and played to a scoreless draw at Colorado. Just before halftime, the Crew nearly broke the deadlock when Frankie Hejduk found Edson Buddle all alone in the area, but Rapids keeper Joe Cannon was able to flap at his header and grab it on the second chance before it entered the goal. Columbus came close again in the 72nd minute, when David Testo was put in behind the defense by Jeff Cunningham only to rip his shot right at Cannon who tipped it over the bar.

Crew keeper Jon Busch knocked away Carlos Ruiz's chip shot and Jovan Kirovski's header off a Ruiz cross went over the bar, then the Crew's Kyle Martino lofted a clever chip over the defense that Frankie Hejduk struck with a good one-timer, but Kevin Hartman made a diving save. Columbus' Duncan Oughton came closest to securing a result in the 82nd minute with a rocket that hit the underside of the crossbar.

AUGUST 18, 2004

Crew 2, K.C. Wizards 1
COLUMBUS CREW STADIUM — Kyle Martino spoiled Preki's return to MLS action, netting the game-winner in stoppage time. It was in a preseason game against the Crew that the 41-year-old Preki broke his left fibula and dislocated his left ankle. He played the first half. Martino drew a penalty kick in the first half — which Ross Paule converted — then ripped home a shot from 22 yards out in second-half stoppage time after Taylor Graham had pulled the visitors even, finishing a counterattack with a header in the 79th minute. Moments before, Martino had stolen the ball from Wizards defender Nick Garcia and broken in alone on K.C. keeper Tony Meola, who came up big to shut down Martino.

AUGUST 21, 2004

Crew 2, D.C. United 2
COLUMBUS CREW STADIUM — The Crew and D.C. United played to a draw in the Columbus debut of Freddy Adu, before a sellout crowd of 23,849. Three set-piece goals gave the hosts a 2-1 lead in the second half, but a Frankie Hejduk handball in the 75th minute translated into a penalty kick goal for D.C.'s Jaime Moreno. Alecko Eskandarian put the visitors ahead with a blistering free kick in the 35th, before The Crew's Duncan Oughton scored his first career goal, a header past Worthington, Ohio native Troy Perkins in the 42nd minute. Columbus' Ross Paule then produced a rocketed free kick of his own, from 25 yards, in the 54th.



**AUGUST 29, 2004**

Crew 1, MetroStars 1
GIANTS STADIUM (East Rutherford, N.J.) — Crew keeper Jon Busch made a career-high and club-record-tying 12 saves, including eight in the second half, to help Columbus run its unbeaten streak to 10 games. John Wolyniec pounced on a rebound of an Amado Guevara free kick to give the Metros a 21st-minute lead, then Ross Paule converted a penalty kick 14 minutes later to cap the scoring after Kyle Martino was hauled down in the area by Metros defender Jeff Parke. Crew defender Chad Marshall twice narrowly missed bids for his first professional goal, heading off the post in the first half and having another header cleared off the line in second-half stoppage time. Guevara was sent off for a second yellow card moments before the latter attempt.

SEPTEMBER 4, 2004

Crew 3, L.A. Galaxy 1
COLUMBUS CREW STADIUM — Ross Paule scored all three Columbus goals, running his goal-scoring streak to four games and netting his first career hat trick. U.S. National Team veteran Tony Sanneh made his first start for the Crew and notched an assist in 82 minutes of play. Paule found himself in the right place at the right time twice in the first half (26th and 41st minutes) to stake the Crew to a 2-0 lead. But Joseph Ngwenya was able to cut The Crew's lead in half and give the Galaxy hope just before the halftime whistle blew. Paule completed his hat trick and restored the Crew's two-goal lead in the 68th minute with a penalty kick after an Arturo Torres handball in the box.

SEPTEMBER 8, 2004

Crew 1, S.J. Earthquakes 0
SPARTAN STADIUM (San Jose, Calif.) — Tony Sanneh's first MLS goal in nearly six years gave the Crew a dramatic victory at San Jose. In just his second game with the Crew after six seasons in Germany, Sanneh scored a minute into second-half stoppage time after a Simon Elliott free kick found him. It was the first goal allowed by the Earthquakes in five games. Crew midfielder and former 'Quake Manny Lagos was presented his 2003 MLS Cup championship ring by San Jose captain Jeff Agoos before the game.

SEPTEMBER 18, 2004

Crew 4, MetroStars 2
COLUMBUS CREW STADIUM — Edson Buddle scored all four goals, becoming the first player in club history to accomplish that feat, as the Crew twice overcame one-goal deficits and became the first team to clinch a place in the MLS Cup Playoffs. Buddle became just the sixth player in league annals to hit for as many as four goals in a game. John Wolyniec half-volleyed the Metros into the lead in the sixth minute, but it was

short-lived as Buddle picked up his first of the night just three minutes later. Eddie Gaven reclaimed the lead for the MetroStars early in the second half, but Buddle would score the game's last three goals, the final two off excellent passes from second-half substitute Jeff Cunningham.

SEPTEMBER 25, 2004

Crew 1, D.C. United 0
COLUMBUS CREW STADIUM — The Crew rode an early Tony Sanneh goal to victory against D.C. United in front of a sellout crowd of 23,775. Sanneh's glancing header off a Simon Elliott free kick 10 minutes in was the only goal of the match, while United was reduced to 10 men just before the halftime break when captain Ryan Nelsen was sent off for a second yellow card. D.C. forward Jaime Moreno was forced out of the game in the 25th minute by a left hamstring strain. Crew keeper Jon Busch made two outstanding saves in succession in the 34th minute to preserve the lead and Kyle Martino nearly gave Columbus some breathing room in the 58th, but he hit the post after running onto a pass behind the D.C. defense and rounding keeper Nick Rimando.

OCTOBER 2, 2004

Crew 3, Chicago Fire 3
COLUMBUS CREW STADIUM — The Crew tied the record for the longest unbeaten streak in MLS history but it was a bittersweet result as Andy Herron twice equalized in the second half for 10-man Chicago before a sellout crowd of 23,250. It was the Crew's 15th league match without a loss, tying the record set by L.A. over the final part of the 1997 season and the beginning of the '98 campaign. After Nate Jaqua was sent off in the 36th minute with the Fire ahead by a goal — a Damani Ralph PK — Kyle Martino tied it from the penalty spot just before halftime. But twice after Columbus took leads through Jeff Cunningham, in the 55th and 64th minutes, Herron scored spectacular tying goals, including his second 10 minutes from the end.

OCTOBER 6, 2004

Crew 1, Chicago Fire 0
SOLDIER FIELD (Chicago) — An Edson Buddle goal sent the Crew into the MLS record books with its 16th straight game without a loss. Buddle hammered home a stunning free-kick goal in the 59th minute from just outside the penalty area to clinch Columbus' first-ever Eastern Conference regular season title. After Chicago defender Evan Whithfield pulled down Jeff Cunningham, Simon Elliott put the free kick into motion with a quick inside touch and Buddle came on to hit a beautiful first-time rocket that bent away from Fire keeper Henry Ring as it settled inside the right post. Both squads were missing significant players to international duty, including Chicago's Herron (Costa Rica),

Selowane (Botswana) and Williams and Ralph (Jamaica) and the Crew's Sanneh and Hejduk (U.S.).

OCTOBER 9, 2004

Crew 1, MetroStars 1
GIANTS STADIUM (East Rutherford, N.J.) — Jeff Cunningham's first-half goal gave a reserve-filled Crew side the lead and it held on to claim a point and extend its record unbeaten streak to 17 games. Sergio Galvan Rey converted a second-half penalty kick, after he was tripped by Duncan Oughton in the box, to knot the score. Cunningham was a force all night for Columbus and the goal, a clever toe poke, was the 62nd and final of his Crew career, tying Brian McBride for the most in club history. Goalkeeper Matt Jordan made his regular-season debut in a Crew uniform in place of the resting Jon Busch.

OCTOBER 16, 2004

Crew 1, Colorado Rapids 1
INVESCO FIELD AT MILE HIGH (Denver) — The Crew put the finishing touches on one of the finest seasons in Major League Soccer history by extending its league-record unbeaten streak to 18 games and clinching the Supporters Shield for the first time in club history. The Supporters Shield goes to the club that ends the regular season with the best overall record. Columbus also extended its MLS-record road unbeaten streak to nine games. The goals came on either side of halftime, Duncan Oughton giving the Crew a 40th-minute lead and the Rapids evening the match through a Chris Henderson penalty kick two minutes after the halftime break. Danny Sztetela earned his first MLS point in the game, assisting on Oughton's goal.

MLS Cup Playoffs**OCTOBER 23, 2004**

N.E. Revolution 1, Crew 0
East Semifinals, Game 1
GILLETTE STADIUM (Foxboro, Mass.) — New England handed the Crew its first loss in MLS competition since the end of June and grabbed the advantage in their Eastern Conference Semifinal series. The only goal of the match came out of nowhere and from the unlikelyst of sources in the 25th minute. Given plenty of time to line up his shot from well outside the area, defender Avery John blasted a swerving left-footed shot, leaving Crew keeper Jon Busch with no chance. It was his first-ever MLS goal. Late in the first half, Simon Elliott chipped an indirect free kick from inside the box onto the thigh of Ross Paule, who struck a dipping volley viciously at goal only to see Revs keeper Matt Reis tip it over to end the first half. Kyle Martino had another great chance for the Crew in the 77th minute, but his well-struck effort to the lower left corner was saved brilliantly by Reis.

OCTOBER 31, 2004

Crew 1, N.E. Revolution 1

East Semifinals, Game 2

(N.E. wins series 2-1 on agg.)

COLUMBUS CREW STADIUM

— New England goalkeeper Matt Reis single-handedly knocked the Crew out of the MLS Cup Playoffs, saving a pair of penalty kicks as the teams played to a 1-1 draw that secured the Revs' advancement to the Eastern Conference Final, 2-1 on aggregate. Reis saved spot kicks from Ross Paule midway through the first half and Tony Sanneh late in the second half to seal the Crew's fate. It was just the third time in MLS history — and the first time ever in the postseason — that a goalkeeper saved two penalty kicks in the same game. On top of that, the Crew had hit an MLS record 20 consecutive penalty kicks — 19 in league play and one in the playoffs — before Paule's miss and was 8-for-8 from the spot in the regular season. Taylor Twellman scored for New England on a counterattack nine minutes from the end to seemingly kill off the series, but Edson Buddle's goal two minutes into stoppage time gave the Crew a final breath of life.

Crew 2, Syracuse (A-League) 1

Round of 32

COLUMBUS CREW STADIUM

— The Crew advanced to the Round of 16 with a win over the Syracuse Salty Dogs of the A-League. Ross Paule converted a stoppage-time penalty kick for the game-winner, after midfielder Kyle Martino was taken down just inside the box by Syracuse defender Rene Rivas. The Crew, which outshot Syracuse 17-4 (7-1 on goal), looked like it had the game won when forward Edson Buddle scored in the 70th minute. But Syracuse's Scott Schweitzer knocked home a loose ball from just outside the Crew box in the 81st minute to tie it on the Salty Dogs' only shot on goal of the game.

JULY 20, 2004

Chicago Fire 2, Crew 1 (OT)

Round of 16

COLUMBUS CREW STADIUM

— The Crew was eliminated from the Open Cup in the Round of 16 with an overtime defeat at the hands of MLS rival Chicago. Damani Ralph scored both Fire goals, including the winner in stoppage time of the first overtime period (106th minute). Stoppage time was apparently added to the first overtime after Edson Buddle was given a questionable red card in the 97th minute for a tackle on Logan Pause. Frankie Hejduk put Columbus on top in the 27th minute when he leapt over C.J. Brown to head home a Chris Wingert cross. The Fire tied it with a penalty kick in the 66th minute, which Ralph converted, after Duncan Oughton was called for a foul on Andy Williams in the box. Jon Busch was magnificent in goal for Columbus, making 13 saves.



Crew forward Edson Buddle scored the game winning goal in the Crew's 1-0 win in Chicago, Oct. 6, 2004. The goal gave Columbus its first-ever Eastern Conference regular season title.

THE CREW IN THE LAMAR HUNT U.S. OPEN CUP



Dating back to 1914, the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup (known as the U.S. Open Cup until 1999) is the oldest cup competition in American soccer and among the oldest soccer tournaments in the world. The 91-year-old single-elimination event is open to every affiliated amateur and professional team in the U.S.

Renamed in September of 1999 to

honor Columbus Crew Investor-Operator Lamar Hunt's contributions to the game of soccer, the Open Cup tournament is similar to many of the domestic cup competitions which are popular throughout the rest of the world. Most domestic cup competitions run concurrently with a country's league season and are open to any club that can qualify, giving local amateur teams a chance to compete against the country's elite professional sides.

The 2002 tournament proved to be purely magical as The Crew brought home its first title of any kind. Playing at home at Crew Stadium, Freddy Garcia provided the only scoring of the game as The Crew dominated 2002 MLS Cup Champion Los Angeles 1-0.

Prior to the 2002 title, Columbus'

best finish was a runner-up performance in 1998, when it fell to Chicago, 2-1, in overtime.

The U.S. Open Cup champion has its name engraved into the prestigious Dewar Cup, which has been permanently retired at the National Soccer Hall of Fame in Oneonta, N.Y. It was officially adopted as the U.S. Open Cup trophy in Pawtucket, R.I., prior to the Brooklyn Field Club's inaugural championship in 1914. It is named for British sportsman and philanthropist Sir Thomas Dewar, who donated it to the American Amateur Football Association prior to the 1912 Olympic Games.

The 1999 final was also held at Crew Stadium, where the A-League's Rochester Rhinos upset MLS's Colorado Rapids 2-0.

2005 MLS PLAYER RULES AND REGULATIONS

I. MLS ROSTER COMPOSITION

A Major League Soccer team's full roster is comprised of the **Senior Roster** and the **Developmental Roster**. The full roster shall exceed no more than 28 total players: 18 players on the Senior Roster and no more than 10 players on the Developmental Roster. All 28 players are eligible for selection as part of the gameday squad during the regular season and playoffs.

(A) SENIOR ROSTER

Other than at specified times during preseason or through injury situations (a player added as a season-ending injury replacement), an MLS team shall have no more than 18 senior roster players at any time. The senior roster is comprised of the following players, who all count against a team's salary budget:

(i) DOMESTIC PLAYERS

A domestic player is either a U.S. citizen, a permanent resident (green card holder) or the holder of other special status (e.g., has been granted refugee or asylum status).

(ii) SENIOR INTERNATIONAL PLAYERS

Each team shall be allowed up to four (4) Senior International players on its roster – non-domestic players who turn 25 years or older during the season in question. Although these players can be traded by MLS teams, the Senior International slots themselves cannot be traded.

(iii) YOUTH INTERNATIONALS

A Youth International is a non-domestic player (i.e., non-U.S. citizen and non-green card holder) who is 24 years old or younger. At the beginning of the year in which the player is due to reach the age of 25, this player will be re-classified as a Senior International. Following the 2004 MLS season, each MLS club was allotted three (3) youth international spots with two additional ones provided to the two 2005 expansion teams for their first two seasons. Unlike senior international spots, all youth international spots can be traded on a permanent or temporary basis (the slots revert to the original team in the latter case). Youth International players may be signed to senior roster contracts or developmental roster contracts (see "Developmental Roster" below).

The current list of available youth international spots per team follows (including trades that involved the transfer of some spots as of February 16, 2005): Chivas USA (6), Chicago Fire (3), Colorado Rapids (3), Columbus Crew (3), D.C. United (3), FC Dallas (3), Kansas City Wizards (3), L.A. Galaxy (3), MetroStars (5),

New England Revolution (3), Real Salt Lake (3), SJ Earthquakes (2).

(B) DEVELOPMENTAL ROSTER

MLS teams shall not have more than 10 developmental players on their developmental roster at any time (unless a player is added as a season-ending injury replacement). Developmental players can be either domestic or international and must be 24 years of age or younger. These players do not count against a team's salary budget. They are signed to non-guaranteed contracts and thus, can be waived at any time. Teams are permitted an unlimited number of signings during a given season to ensure all 10-man developmental roster spots are occupied at any one time.

Generation adidas players, domestic underclassmen, form part of a team's Developmental Roster. They are acquired by MLS teams through the SuperDraft or through the Lottery system if they join the League after the SuperDraft.

II. METHODS OF PLAYER ACQUISITION

MLS teams may acquire players and add them to their Senior and Developmental rosters via the following 10 mechanisms:

(A.) ALLOCATIONS

A club earns an allocation for (1) failure to qualify for the MLS Cup Playoffs; (2) as a replacement in the case of the departure or transfer of key players; or (3) due to expansion status. The two new expansion teams each received three allocations each in 2005.

Each year the MLS Competition Committee determines how many allocation spots are made available to each team and whether they are classified as "major" or "minor" allocations (based on the monetary value applied to each allocation by the MLS Competition Committee which considers various factors in determining the figure). Allocation spots or portions thereof (see splitting of allocations below*) can be traded by teams.

Each year, allocations are given a ranking by the MLS Competition Committee. In 2005, one of the three expansion allocations ranked first (the order as between the two expansion teams determined by coin toss at MLS Cup 2004), followed by the major allocations for failure to make the playoffs (ranked between themselves in reverse order of finish in 2004), followed by major replacement allocations in reverse order of 2004, minor replacement allocations in the same order and, finally, remaining portions of split allocations.

In the event that a U.S. National Team player in any age group signs with MLS, (and, if he is a player returning to MLS, if his original club does not have the right of first refusal), the club with the first ranking allocation (see current rankings below) has the option of using its allocation to acquire the player in question, provided that the value of the allocation is sufficient to cover the cost of the player (a minor allocation may not be enough to acquire an expensive player).

Allocations or portions thereof may be used to re-sign current MLS players, with League approval.

The current order for allocations as of Monday, March 14 follows (Rank, Team, Reason for Allocation, use):

1. Los Angeles Galaxy, Expansion allocation portion acquired from Chivas USA (minor), unused
2. Real Salt Lake, Expansion (major) Clint Mathis
3. Chicago Fire, Missing '04 Playoffs (major / split), John Thorington
4. FC Dallas, Missing '04 Playoffs (major), unused
5. Chicago Fire, Transfer of DaMarcus Beasley (major), unused
6. Chicago Fire, Transfer of Damani Ralph (major), unused
7. FC Dallas, Transfer of Cory Gibbs (major), unused
8. S.J. Earthquakes, Etcheverry retirement allocation acquired from FC Dallas (major), unused
9. S.J. Earthquakes, Donovan replacement allocation (minor / split), unused
10. Columbus Crew, Transfer of Brian McBride (major), unused
11. D.C. United, Transfer of Bobby Convey (major), Christian Gomez
12. Chicago Fire, Transfer of Carlos Bocanegra (minor), Samuel Caballero
13. N.E. Revolution, Retirement of Peter Nowak (minor), unused
14. Chivas USA, Expansion, unused
15. MetroStars, Portion of expansion allocation acquired from RSL (minor), Youri Djorkaeff
16. Chivas USA, Expansion, Ramon Ramirez***
17. L.A. Galaxy, Portion of expansion allocation acquired from RSL (minor), unused
18. Chicago Fire, Portion of missing '04 Playoffs allocation (split), Ante Razov, unused
19. MetroStars, Portion of Donovan allocation acquired from SJ (split), unused
20. Chicago Fire, Portion of missing '04 Playoffs (split), Ivan Guerrero

*Beginning in 2005, teams may split major allocations into up to three portions as long as no split portion makes up less than 25 percent of the

original value of the allocation. Once an allocation has been split, the remaining portion(s) shall drop to the bottom of the allocation order. Teams may trade allocations and split portions of allocations.

****** If a team has an outstanding replacement allocation for a departed player, or has not received a replacement allocation, that team has right of first refusal in the event of his return to MLS. If a team has utilized its replacement allocation, either by acquiring another player or through trade or split, the team loses its right of first refusal to such returning player, who is then assigned in the normal manner.

******* Ramirez status under review.

(B.) SUPERDRAFT & SUPPLEMENTAL DRAFT

These are players drafted by teams at the annual MLS SuperDraft, which consists of four (4) rounds beginning in 2005, and the MLS Supplemental Draft, also consisting of four (4) rounds beginning in 2005. These players may include college players, *Generation adidas* players and players from lower divisions. Players classified as Youth Internationals may also be part of the SuperDraft or Supplemental Draft. The selection order for both drafts is based upon each team's on-field performance during the previous season.

A player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft or Supplemental Draft and did not sign with the League, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 immediately following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to the player.

(C.) TRADES

Players, rights to sign players, SuperDraft picks, allocations (or split portions thereof) and Youth International slots may all be acquired and exchanged in trades approved by the MLS League Office provided all of the necessary rules regarding roster and salary budget compliance are met and the trade is consummated during the valid trading period. The latest trade window opened on Nov. 22, 2004 and will close at the 2005 trade deadline of Sept. 15, 2005 (in conjunction with the close of the secondary international transfer window).

(D.) DISCOVERY SIGNINGS

Each team has the opportunity to make six (6) discovery signings per season (up from three (3) discovery signings allowed in 2004). The two expansion teams in 2005 will have 10 discovery signings each in 2005 and six in 2006 and beyond. The last day for discovery player signings is September 15, 2005

- coinciding with the close of the secondary international transfer window and the roster freeze date. The six Discovery signings can be used to fill senior roster spots only.

(E.) DEVELOPMENTAL ROSTER SIGNINGS

Teams are permitted an unlimited number of normal development player signings during a given season to ensure all 10-man developmental roster spots are occupied at any given time. Youth international limits per team still apply.

(F.) WAIVERS

A team may place a player on waivers at any time during the regular season at which point he is made available to all other teams. The waiver claiming period shall commence on the first business day after the League delivers a notice to teams and shall expire at 5:00 p.m. EST on the second business day after the Waiver Period Commencement Date. The claiming period is 48 hours.

Clubs each have the opportunity of claiming a player off waivers in reverse order based on points-per-game total during a given season. If the waivers occur before every team has played three regular season games, the point totals of the previous year are instead taken into consideration with the team with the worst point total having the first option. Club Deportivo Chivas USA and Real Salt Lake will be ranked No. 1 and No. 2 respectively for waiver periods in 2005 due to their expansion status.

Once a team selects a player off waivers, that club is automatically moved to the bottom of the priority list for subsequent waiver selections in a given season, regardless of its points-per-game total. Players who may be placed on the MLS waiver wire are as follows:

(i) A player eligible for a previous SuperDraft who went undrafted; or

(ii) a player who has played in MLS previously where his last MLS team does not wish to exercise their right of first refusal or no longer has the right of first refusal since 12 months have passed since the player's date of release, except in the case of returning U.S. National Team players as stated above.

(G.) LOTTERY

Some players shall be assigned to MLS teams via the weighted Lottery process. Any team assigned a player through the lottery in any particular season shall not be assigned another lottery player that season unless and until all teams have received a lottery player or have agreed to waive their option to participate in a Lottery. The players made available through lotteries include:

(i) *Generation adidas* players signed after the MLS SuperDraft;
(ii) Draft eligible players to whom an MLS contract was offered but who failed to sign with the League prior to the Draft.

The weighted lottery takes into consideration each team's performance over its last 32 regular season games and the most recent postseason. The team with the worst record over its last 32 regular season games (dating back to previous season if necessary) will have the greatest probability of winning the lottery. Teams are not required to participate in a lottery. Players are assigned via the lottery system in order to prevent a player from potentially influencing his destination club with a strategic holdout.

(H.) EXTREME HARDSHIP CALL-UPS

Teams may add players to their roster in cases of "extreme hardship" as follows: (1) a team has less than two available goalkeepers or (2) a team has less than 15 available players. Extreme hardship call-ups are made on a game-by-game basis.

(I.) SEASON-ENDING INJURY REPLACEMENTS

A team with a player lost to a season-ending injury can replace that player on its roster, while remaining responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary. International player limits still apply at the time a season-ending replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

(J.) RETURNING U.S. NATIONAL TEAM POOL PLAYERS

In the event a U.S. National Team pool player (in any age group) playing abroad returns to the U.S. and there is interest from multiple MLS teams, preference will be given first to a team prepared to use an allocation. If there is more than one team prepared to use an allocation on a particular player, the current season's allocation rankings as determined by the MLS Competition Committee would be used. In the event no team is willing to use an allocation, the player will be assigned via waivers.

NOTE: No changes may be made to a team's active full roster during the period beginning on September 15, 2005 (Roster Freeze Date) through the day after MLS Cup. Nevertheless, a team may obtain players in accordance with the extreme hardship rules and procedures to replace players who are injured or otherwise legitimately unavailable after the Roster Freeze Date. Any other replacements after the Roster Freeze Date may only be made in exceptional circumstances in the League's sole and absolute discretion.





(III.) METHODS OF RELEASING PLAYERS

(A) WAIVERS

Teams may waive players based on performance at any time during the MLS season. Players on guaranteed contracts waived on or after July 1 of any year, however, will continue to have their salary budget count against the team's salary budget and the team waiving the player will not receive a replacement except under the normal player acquisition mechanisms. Players may not be waived while they are injured, unless the League reaches a settlement with the injured player for his release. In such a scenario, the settlement amount will be charged to the team's salary budget. Upon return to fitness, however, a player may be waived normally.

(B) TRANSFERS AND LOANS

An MLS player may be transferred or loaned at any time to a team outside the League. Beginning with the 2004 season, FIFA does not recognize player transfers that take place outside of the two following transfer windows:

January 1 – March 31

(Primary Window)

August 15 - September 15

(Secondary Window)

FIFA does allow for free agency outside of the primary and secondary windows in limited circumstances. Visit www.FIFA.com for more details.

(C) CONTRACT EXPIRATION

When a player's contract expires, the player does not count against the roster or budget of the team in question. A team retains the rights to the player indefinitely following the expiration of a contract only if attempts were made to re-sign the player. In exceptional circumstances where an important player could not be re-signed, a team may be awarded a replacement allocation.

NOTE: *No changes may be made to a team's active full roster during the period beginning on September 15, 2005 (Roster Freeze Date) through the day after MLS Cup. Nevertheless, a team may obtain a goalkeeper in accordance with the extreme hardship rules and procedures to replace a goalkeeper who is injured or otherwise legitimately unavailable after the Roster Freeze Date. Any other replacements after the Roster Freeze Date may only be made in exceptional circumstances in the League's sole and absolute discretion.*

(IV.) PLAYER RIGHTS

The following explains the status of player rights in specific instances:

WAIVED PLAYERS

A team waiving a player who clears waivers holds a right of first refusal to such player for 12 months from the date of his release.

OUT OF CONTRACT PLAYERS/ OPTIONS NOT PICKED UP

A team retains the right of first refusal to the player indefinitely only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

DRAFTED BUT NOT SIGNED

A player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft or Supplemental Draft and did not sign, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 immediately following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to sign the player.

PLAYER TRANSFERRED OUTSIDE MLS

If a replacement allocation is granted, a team does not retain right of first refusal unless the team has not yet used the compensatory allocation. In such a case, the team may retain the right of first refusal on the player provided they surrender the full amount of the replacement allocation.

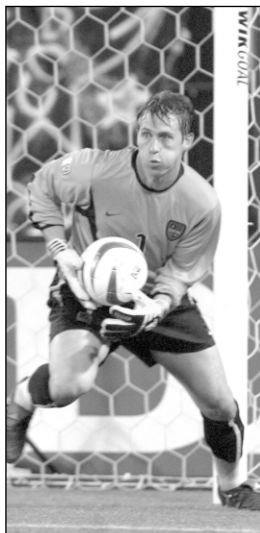

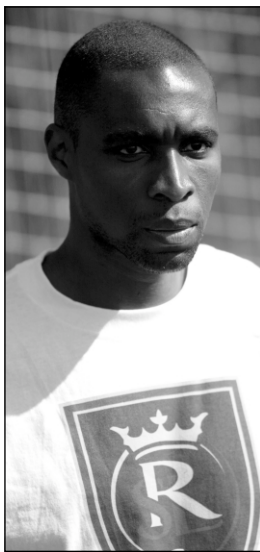

CREDENTIALS

Credentials may be picked up during the week at The Crew's administrative offices at Columbus Crew Stadium, or prior to the game at Media Will Call, which is located at Gate 8 in the northwest corner of the stadium. All credentials are intended for working media only and are not transferable.

PRESS BOX AND ACCESS

The main press box is located on the upper concourse near Crew Stadium's northeast corner. Broadcast booths are located on the stadium's west side at midfield of the upper concourse.

PHONE LINES

Multiple phone lines are available in the main press box on a first-come, first-serve basis.

PRESS BOX PHONE

The press box phone number at Crew Stadium is (614) 447-4289.

PRESS BOX FAX

A fax line is available in the press box. The number is (614) 447-4112.

LIVE TELEVISION TRUCKS

Any television crews wishing to do live shots from Crew Stadium should park behind the north end of the stadium and enter the facility through Gate 8 in the northwest entrance, south of the locker rooms. No TV crew is permitted to park in any of Crew Stadium's paved parking lots. Violators will be towed.

FOOD AND BEVERAGES

Food will be available to the media in the main press box prior to the game. Beverages will be available in the main press box.

POST-GAME PROCEDURE

After the completion of the game, both coaches will be brought into the media room (next to the home locker room) for post-game comments. The opposing coach will be available first, followed by Crew head coach Greg Andrulis. The locker rooms are open to the media 10 minutes after the completion of the game by order of MLS Commissioner Don Garber. Additional interview requests should be made through Crew Director of Public Relations. Jeff Wuerth.

PARKING

Any media wishing to secure a parking pass should contact Jeff Wuerth at (614) 447-4174. Passes can be mailed or picked up at The Crew's administrative offices located at Crew Stadium. The parking pass should be displayed on the front windshield of your vehicle when entering the Ohio Expo Center. Media are asked to enter Crew Stadium from the north off of Hudson and Silver Drive.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Photographers are asked to wear a photo credential at all times. In accordance with FIFA regulations (world soccer's governing body), all photographers are allowed to shoot only behind the field boards in either the north or south ends at field level. Photographers can also shoot from the upper concourse of Crew Stadium. As a courtesy to the fans, photographers are asked to kneel or sit on the benches provided when shooting. Only team and legitimate media photographers are allowed to shoot Columbus Crew games. Free-lance photographers will not be issued credentials unless granted special approval by The Crew's Public Relations Department. Copyrights on all photos will be the property of the Columbus Crew and Major League Soccer.

Practices are generally held in the morning at 10 a.m. All practice times are tentative and subject to change. 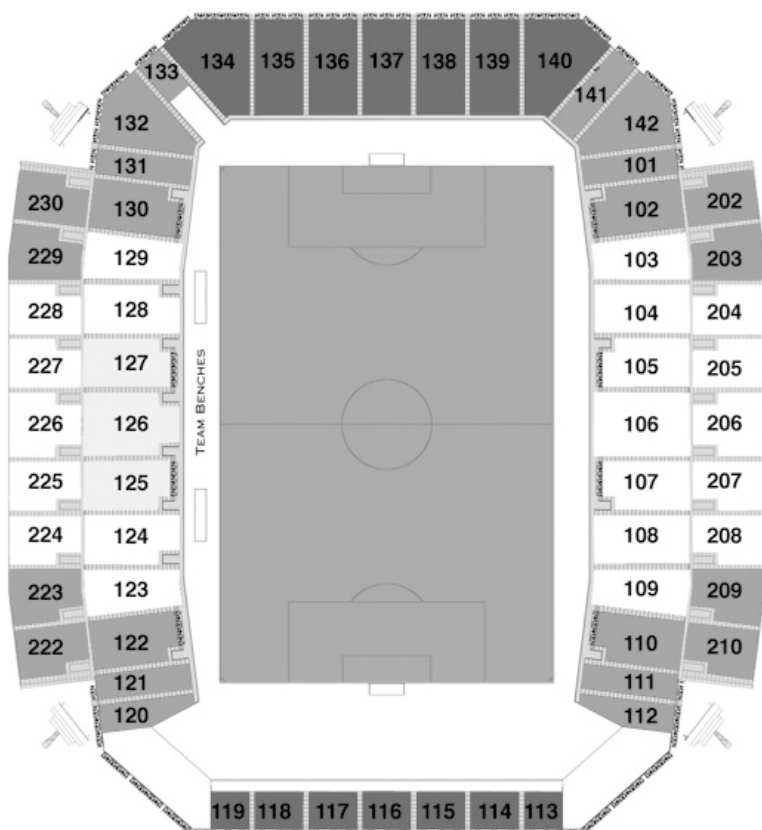


