

The Chicago Fire and D.C. United played to a scoreless draw in front of 10,444 fans at Cardinal Stadium in Naperville, IL. Fire goalkeeper Zach Thornton made six saves to earn his sixth shutout of the season (35th of his career) in a match that was eerily similar to the one played on July 20 in a 0-0 draw between the teams at this venue. The Fire remained in second-place in the Eastern Conference increasing its record to 8-8-4 for 28 points sitting just one point behind the MetroStars (9-10-2, 29 pts.), which lost to Columbus (8-9-4, 28 pts.) earlier in the evening.

The Chicago Fire captured a point in its 2003 MLS Season Opener Sunday night with a 1-1 draw against the New England Revolution in front of a sold-out Cardinal Stadium crowd of 7,143 fans in Naperville, IL. Fire midfielder and World Cup star DaMarcus Beasley tallied the Fire's lone goal in the 36<sup>th</sup> minute, while defending Budweiser Scoring Champion Taylor Twellman scored the equalizer for the Revolution just five minutes later.

## FIRE FLASHES

### Series History vs. United

The Fire will look to take the lead in the all-time regular season series with D.C. United, which is currently all square at 5-5-2. The Eastern Conference rivals entered the 2002 season deadlocked at four wins apiece, but last year's 1-1-2 mark registered by both clubs could not break the tie. The Fire holds the tiebreaker in the overall competition by virtue of its 2-0 victory over United in MLS Cup 1998 at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, CA on October 25, 1998. The Fire will look to improve its 2-5-0 mark at RFK Stadium, a record that includes a 1-0 loss against the Kansas Wizards in MLS Cup 2000.

### Fire Looks to Carry Over Success on Road

The Fire hopes to build on its impressive 2002 away from home when it opens its MLS road schedule on Saturday. The "Men in Red" went 6-8-0 away from Cardinal Stadium in 2002, which was the third best road record in MLS, and was the only team in MLS to outscore its opponents on the road last season (1.43 GS – 1.36 GA). Chicago will be looking to improve upon its impressive record in MLS road openers, which currently stands at 3-1-1.

### Familiar Foes to Meet Saturday

The Chicago Fire and D.C. United have more in common than being Eastern Conference rivals, as four players have made moves between the Windy City and the Nation's Capital within the last year. Fire defender Orlando Perez was the first to transition when he was traded from D.C. to Chicago on July 18, 2002. The two clubs swapped midfielders on December 26, 2002 when the "Men in Red" acquired Justin Mapp and Dema Kovalenko was sent to the "Black-and-Red." The final deal was made on January 27, 2003 when forward Hristo Stoichkov, who will be unavailable for Saturday's contest while serving the second game of a two-game suspension, was traded to United. Another pair of Fire members made their starts in Major League Soccer with D.C. United, as Jesse Marsch won a pair of MLS Cups with the club in 1996 and 1997 and Fire Head Coach Dave Sarachan served as an assistant coach in D.C. from 1998-1999.

### Sarachan Starts MLS Coaching Career

Sunday's 1-1 draw with New England marked the official debut for Dave Sarachan as the Head Coach of the Chicago Fire. Though Sarachan is no stranger to the MLS sidelines, having served as an assistant for two seasons at D.C. United from 1998-99, Sunday's contest marked the first time Sarachan served as the man in charge on the sidelines in an MLS contest. The 48-year-old Sarachan comes to the Windy City after serving as the top assistant for the U.S. Men's National Team for the last three seasons, where he helped Bruce Arena guide the squad to a memorable journey to the quarterfinals of the 2002 FIFA World Cup in Korea/Japan last June.

#### **Five Fire Newcomers See First Action**

Sarachan was not the only person making his Fire debut in Sunday evening's 1-1 draw against the Revolution, as a quintet of players-midfielders Andy Williams and Justin Mapp and forwards Rodrigo Faria, Damani Ralph and Nate Jaqua- all saw their first minutes in a Fire uniform. Williams and Faria were both named to the Fire starting eleven, while Mapp saw more minutes in Sunday's match (36) than he did in all of 2002 with D.C. United (28). Ralph and Jaqua, the Fire's first two selections in January's 2003 MLS SuperDraft, made their first MLS appearances as second-half substitutes for Orlando Perez (85') and Faria (91') respectively.

#### **Armas and Whitfield Return to Action**

Two key members of the Chicago Fire defensive corps – midfielder Chris Armas and defender Evan Whitfield – saw their first action in an MLS regular season contest in Sunday's home opener after knee injuries sidelined them both early on in the 2002 season. Whitfield made his first appearance in over a year since suffering a torn left ACL against D.C. United on March 30, 2002 while Armas made his debut as the Fire captain after missing the last 11 months with a torn right ACL that he injured on May 12, 2002. Both Armas and Whitfield started and played the entire 100 minutes.

#### **Ante Out For Fire**

Chicago will be forced to start the season without its all-time leading scorer, forward Ante Razov. Razov collected a red card in the 92<sup>nd</sup> minute of the Fire's season-ending loss to New England in Game Three of the 2002 MLS Cup quarterfinals on October 2. The MLS Disciplinary Committee issued a three-game suspension, to be served the first three games of the 2003 regular season, to Razov for the severity of the incident. Razov is slated to return when the Fire hosts the San Jose Earthquakes at Cardinal Stadium on May 10.

#### **Fire on the Charts**

- Chicago midfielders DaMarcus Beasley and Andy Williams are picking up where they left off last year when it comes to picking themselves up off the turf. Beasley and Williams were fouled four and five times respectively in Sunday's season opening 1-1 draw against New England. Williams collected the second most fouls suffered in MLS in 2002 with 86 in 24 games, while Beasley followed close behind in third with 83 in just 19 appearances.
- Beasley appears to be picking up the slack for suspended forward Ante Razov in shots taken. Beasley leads MLS in shots taken after firing a career-high seven attempts towards the target against New England last Sunday. Razov led the league by a comfortable margin in shots taken in 2002 after firing 115 shots, 15 more than second-place Carlos Ruiz of the L.A. Galaxy.
- Fire goalkeeper Zach Thornton established an early-season MLS lead in saves per game by making seven stops in Sunday's 1-1 draw with New England. The Galaxy's Kevin Hartman has registered 10 saves and Columbus's Jon Busch has collected nine, however, both of those netminders have registered two games for their clubs in 2003. Thornton's seven saves was a personal best at Cardinal Stadium, as the goalkeeping stalwart registered six saves at the Fire's temporary home on three occasions during the 2002 season.
- With Sunday's 1-1 draw against New England and the Galaxy's similar result at Dallas, Thornton kept his three-win advantage over Hartman on the MLS all-time goalkeeper wins list. Thornton tops the category with 76 career victories.

#### **Fire Finalizes Roster With Futagaki and Walls**

After an active off-season, the Chicago Fire put the finishing touches on its 2003 player roster on March 11 by signing midfielders Ryan Futagaki and Nick Walls. Futagaki, a product of UCLA, was the Fire's sixth round (54<sup>th</sup> overall) 2003 SuperDraft selection and was signed as senior roster player while Walls, who was undrafted out of St. Louis University, was signed to a squad as a developmental player. The Fire is currently two players shy of the 2003 League maximum of 24, with 17 of 18 senior roster spots filled and five of six developmental positions claimed.

#### **"Ironman" Marsch Sidelined Due to Injury**

The Chicago Fire will be without its most dependable player for the beginning of the 2003 season as midfielder Jesse Marsch has been sidelined due to a right fibula stress fracture. Marsch suffered the injury in the Fire's 1-0 preseason victory over the Colorado Rapids on April 5. Marsch was the only member of the Fire to start all 28 games in 2002 and leads the club in games played (143), games started (136) and minutes played (12,207). The club has not yet established a timeline for Marsch's return to the field.

#### **Thornton Approaches Minutes Played Record**

While midfielder Jesse Marsch will remain out of the Chicago line-up, Fire goalkeeper Zach Thornton appears ready to surpass the midfielder's record for the most minutes played in a Fire uniform. Should Thornton earn a draw in Saturday's match at D.C. United, his 100 minutes played would tie the eight-year MLS veteran with Marsch at 12,207 career minutes. Marsch and Thornton are two of the five remaining original members of the Chicago Fire that took the field starting in 1998.

#### **Fire the Youngest Team in MLS**

With the signing of 23-year-old midfielder Ryan Futagaki and 21-year-old midfielder Nick Walls on March 11, the youngest club in Major League Soccer got even younger. With the off-season acquisitions of up-and-comers like Justin Mapp (18), Nate Jaqua (21), Logan Pause (21) and Damani Ralph (22) and "grizzled veterans" Rodrigo Faria (26) and Andy Williams (25), the average age of the Fire entering Saturday's contest against D.C. United will be a League-low 24 years and 183 days, more than five months (155 days) less than the average age of the next youngest team, the MetroStars.

## FIRE HEAD COACH—DAVE SARACHAN

1<sup>st</sup> Season With Fire - 0-0-1 All-Time in MLS

Dave Sarachan was appointed as the head coach of the Chicago Fire on November 4, 2002, after serving as an assistant coach on the United States National Team under Bruce Arena.

As the first full-time assistant coach on Arena's staff, Dave Sarachan joined U.S. Soccer on January 1, 2000, to help orchestrate the U.S. Men's National Team's qualification and historic quarterfinal run at the FIFA World Cup Korea/Japan 2002.

Sarachan assisted Arena at a number of matches in 1999, while also serving D.C. United as an assistant coach during the 1998 and 1999 MLS seasons. Sarachan originally joined D.C. United on Dec. 17, 1997, after Bob Bradley resigned to take the head coaching position with the Chicago Fire.

Sarachan filled in for a suspended Arena on the bench in the USA's last two qualifiers of 2000, a 0-0 draw with Costa Rica on October 11, and a 4-0 win in Barbados on November 15 that gave the U.S. the Group "E" title and advancement into the final round of qualifying.

The 48-year-old Sarachan joined United from Cornell University, where he compiled a 64-63-16 record over nine seasons in charge of the Big Red soccer program. In this time at the school, he led the club to successive appearances in the NCAA tournament in 1995 and 1996. Sarachan's Big Red squad defeated Bradley's Princeton team to take the 1995 Ivy League Championship.

The move to the U.S. National Team reunited Sarachan with Arena for a third time, having previously served as his assistant with United and also at the University of Virginia. Prior to taking the job at Cornell University, Sarachan worked under Arena at Virginia for five seasons from 1984 to 1988 after Bradley departed to take the head coaching position at Princeton University.

A 1976 graduate of Cornell, Sarachan played two seasons with the Big Red.
