

COLUMBUS CREW TEAM HISTORY

On June 15, 1994, the capital of the state of Ohio, Columbus, was introduced as one of the 10 Major League Soccer (MLS) inaugural franchises. Columbus was awarded the team largely due to the fact that it led the country in season ticket deposits, with more than 11,500, and it had plans to build a soccer-specific stadium.

The objective of Major League Soccer is to become the fifth professional major sport in the United States, following the National Football League, the National Hockey League, the National Basketball Association and Major League Baseball. Major League Soccer also desires to produce players and teams that are competitive on an international level. Major League Soccer is the legacy of the 1994 World Cup held in the United States, widely considered the most successful World Cup in the history of soccer.

Major League Soccer brought the spirit and intensity of the world's most popular sport to the United States on April 6, 1996. It will appeal to the children who play and the families that support soccer,

through competitive ticket prices and family-oriented promotional days at the stadium. Major League Soccer will: encourage attacking and entertaining soccer through its dynamic players and coaches; improve the performance of U.S. soccer teams in competition; and provide affordable family entertainment.

The team started building its foundation for the future on February 6, 1996, when they selected Brian McBride with the first overall selection in the inaugural MLS draft. The roster was to be filled with four players allocated by the league and the rest to come from a draft. McBride joined Brian Maisonneuve and Doctor Khumalo on The Crew roster. Maisonneuve and Khumalo, The Crew's first-ever allocation, both were allocated to The Crew prior to the draft.

In 1996, The Crew were televised on SportsChannel Ohio and SportsChannel Chicago, as well as WB53. In addition to "looking good" on television, The Crew was able to look good while on the road thanks to an agreement The Crew had in year one with Structure to be the official

The Crew kicked off their inaugural season at home, in "The Horseshoe," against D.C. United in front of a sellout crowd of 25,266. The Crew used great goaltending by Bo Oshoniyi and two McBride goals to power their way to a 4-0 victory.

The rest of the season was a roller-coaster that saw The Crew endure both a five-game and a six-game losing streak, coupled by the resignation of head coach Timo Liekoski. Through all of this, The Crew was able to finish the season 9-1 under new interim coach Tom Fitzgerald. Joining Fitzgerald for the stretch run was an Ohio product that had been successful on the international level, goalkeeper Brad Friedel. Friedel was acquired on August 8, and went 8-1 to end the regular season, helping The Crew qualify for the Eastern Conference playoffs.

The Crew hosted their first-ever playoff game on September 25, dropping a 2-0 decision to the Tampa Bay Mutiny. The Mutiny went on to eliminate The Crew in the third game of a three-game series.

In 1996, the big winners were the fans of The Crew, who were voted the best fans in the league by *USA Today*. The Crew averaged 18,950 per game, including an all-time high of 31,550 who witnessed The Crew blank the MetroStars 2-0, on September 15. In addition to being the best fans, the "Crew Experience" was graded an outstanding entertainment value by Gentleman Associates, an Indianapolis based research firm that conducted surveys in 1996.

In 1997, The Crew kicked off its second season of Major League Soccer in Columbus. There were a lot of ups and downs on and off the field, but the season ended with The Crew making its deepest run into the playoffs, advancing

to the Eastern Conference Finals.

The 1997 season for The Crew meant the addition of two regulars on the U.S. National Team, in defenders Thomas Dooley and Mike Lapper. Both national team veterans joined the team in June. Dooley and Lapper joined Trinidad National Team member Ansil Elcock, who became a member of The Crew prior to the season.

The addition of Lapper, Dooley and Elcock helped offset the loss of defenders Paul Caliguiri and Ricardo Iribarren, who was lost due to a visa problem.

On the field, The Crew opened the season as hot as anyone in the league and were in first place until a loss on May 22, two months into the season. This loss started a five-game losing streak, and saw The Crew lose 10 out of 12. This dry spell knocked The Crew all the way to fourth place in the Eastern Conference.

However, The Crew was able to rebound and win four of their next five, salvaging their playoff hopes. As the playoff race intensified, so did The Crew's play. The Crew finished the season winning three of its final four games, finishing third in the Eastern Conference, up a spot from 1996.

The 1997 playoffs were a rematch of the 1996 playoffs, however, with drastically different results. After falling to the Tampa Bay Mutiny in the 1996 playoffs, The Crew turned the tables on the Mutiny. In game one, The Crew traveled to Tampa and used goals by Jason Farrell and A.J. Wood to take game one. In the second game, The Crew used a stellar performance by goalkeeper Brad Friedel and goals by McBride and Robert Warzycha to garner a 2-0 victory and complete the sweep, in front of the home fans at Ohio Stadium, and give The Crew its first-ever playoff series victory.

The Eastern Conference Finals were a different story, however, as defending MLS Cup champion D.C. United downed The Crew two games to none.

In addition to the changes that took place prior to and throughout the 1997 season, the changes that took place between 1997 and 1998 have also given The Crew a new look.

In the off-season, The Crew lost goal-keeper Brad Friedel to Liverpool in the English Premier League but gained U.S. National Team goalkeeper Juergen Sommer, from his English club team, the Queens Park Rangers, as well as Mark Dougherty from Tampa Bay, the all-time wins leader in MLS history with 32 wins. The Crew also lost Jason Farrell, A.J. Wood and Jorge Salcedo in the 1998 MLS expansion draft, with all three going to Chicago.

The Crew traded Pete Marino to Kansas City for Frank Klopas, however, Klopas refused to report to Columbus and The Crew and Chicago Fire eventually worked out a trade in Feb. 1998 that sent Klopas to his hometown of Chicago in exchange for the return of Farrell.

In addition to player movement. The Crew's search for a stadium of its own has also been a hot topic. In May of 1997 The Crew witnessed the fall of Issue 1, a Franklin County vote that would have provided the team with a downtown home while a Dublin city vote on Feb. 10, 1998 also was defeated that would have provided a home for The Crew in suburban Dublin, a northwest community in Columbus. The Crew is continuing to search for a place in Columbus to build the first professional soccer-specific stadium in the U.S. The stadium issue will have to be resolved fairly quick as The Crew will be unable to play in Ohio Stadium after the 1998 season due to renovations being made there.

Heading into 1998, The Crew will look to improve on its 1997 success. Joining the mix this season are two offensive spark plugs in Trinidad National Team star Stern John and Jamaican National Team member Andrew Williams. The two new internationals will join five draft choices, including first round pick Jeff Cunningham.

The Crew also acquired its second Project-40 player, former Virginia standout Brian West. West joins Ubusuku Abukusumo as The Crew's two developmental players.

These newcomers, along with an already solid core of players should provide a lot of excitement for the fans in Columbus as The Crew enters its third season of MLS soccer in Ohio Stadium. This season will also showcase two new expansion teams in MLS, Chicago and Miami, and nine Saturday night home games for The Crew.

The Crew's first Project-40 player, Ubusuku Abukusumo, is assigned.

June 5, 1997

Ohio State and The Crew sign lease extension through the 1998 season.

June 18, 1997

Robert Warzycha is named to MLS Eastern Conference all-star team.

July 9, 1997

Brian McBride scores the game-winning goal with two minutes left in the second annual all-star game in Giants Stadium to give the East a 5-4 victory. Robert Warzycha also tallied a goal for the East.

Aug. 11, 1997

The Crew opens state-of-the-art Training Center in Obetz, Ohio.

Oct. 8, 1997

Columbus wins its first playoff series, beating Tampa Bay 2-0 to win the series two games to none.

Oct. 16, 1997

ESPN, Inc. and MLS sign multi-year television deal. ABC will air 12 games for the '98 season.

Oct. 26, 1997

Brad Friedel wins MLS Pepsi Goalkeeper of the Year Award. Friedel and Thomas Dooley are named to the MLS AT&T "Best 11" team.

Jan. 12, 1998

Todd Yeagley and Mike Clark leave to train for three weeks with German Bundesliga power Bayer Leverkusen.

Jan. 20, 1998

Former Virginia star Brian West is assigned to The Crew as its second Project-40.

Jan 28, 1998

U.S. National Team goalkeeper Juergen Sommer signs with MLS and The Crew.

Jan. 31-Feb. 1, 1998

MLS holds its College and Supplemental drafts. Crew selects South Florida standout Jeff Cunningham with its first round pick.

Feb. 26, 1998

21-year-old Trinidad and Tobago National Team star Stern John joins the Crew as a discovery player.

March 2, 1998

Jamaican National Team member Andrew Williams becomes The Crew's second discovery option of 1998.

March 7, 1998

Crew defeats Kansas City 1-0 in a shootout in the second annual "Dayton Cup for Charity." Crew keeper David Winner scores the gamewinner in the ninth round.

March 11, 1998

Crew inks television deals with WSYX-Ch. 6 (ABC), WTTE Fox 28 and FOX Sports Ohio to air eight Crew games in 1998.

March 21, 1998

Crew kicks off year three of MLS play on the road at Tampa Bay, winning 2-1.

March 30, 1998

Crew Week III kicks off.

April 4, 1998

Crew opens home portion of 1998 schedule against two-time MLS Cup Champion D.C. United at Ohio Stadium.



LAMAR HUNT INVESTOR-OPERATOR

Lamar Hunt is one of America's leading sports entrepreneurs. In 1960, Lamar Hunt helped make pro football history by founding and organizing the American Football League, which included his Dallas Texans franchise. After three years, the team moved to Kansas City and became the Kansas City Chiefs, who celebrated their 35th year in mid-America in 1997.

Hunt's influence can be seen in the landscape of professional football. In fact, Hunt was the principle negotiator in the merger that took place between the AFL and NFL that paved the way for the modern growth of the game. As the founder of the Chiefs franchise, Hunt helped provide Kansas City with a team that became the winningest in the 10-year history of the AFL, earning spots in two of the first four Super Bowls, and winning Super Bowl IV by defeating the Minnesota Vikings.

One of the greatest tributes to Hunt's contributions towards professional football, is the AFC Championship Trophy that carries his name. He is also credited with accidentally putting the name "Super Bowl" on the NFL's Championship game - the name coming from his children's toy "Super Ball." Former NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle also credited Hunt with first suggesting the use of Roman numerals in the title of the Super Bowl.

As president of the American Football Conference in the NFL, Hunt is also a member of several influential NFL committees. In addition to his work within this country, he has also worked on the international development of football, serving on the Board of Directors of the NFL's World League.

Hunt is also one of the founding minority partners of the Chicago Bulls in the NBA, a director of Kansas City's Hunt Midwest Enterprises and Chairman of the Board of Unity Hunt Resources, the Hunt

family's Dallasbased investment firm. He was also Co-chairman of the Dallas World Cup Host Committee



In 1967, Hunt became an investor in the Dallas Tornado Soccer Club of the North American Soccer League (NASL). That organization and its legacy of soccer disciples was an early catalyst in the development of the game, placing north Texas at the cutting edge of the American youth soccer market.

Once again, Hunt has stepped to the forefront of U.S. soccer by becoming a charter investor in Major League Soccer. With 10 teams across the league, MLS has been created with a unique single-entity operating structure, in which investors own an interest in the league, not just the individual teams.

A year-round sports fan, Hunt has been associated with several additional entertainment ventures, including the family's former involvement in the development of the World Championship Tennis protour.

In 1982, Hunt was honored for his efforts to establish soccer by being inducted into the U.S. Soccer Hall of Fame in Oneonta, New York. Hunt has also been inducted into both the Pro Football Hall of Fame and the International Tennis Hall of Fame. He has been honored in the state Sports Halls of Fame of both Missouri and Texas.

Hunt was born on August 2, 1932, in El Dorado, Arkansas and graduated from Southern Methodist University (SMU) with a B.S. in geology in 1956. While at SMU, he was a four-year reserve end on the varsity football team. He and his wife Norma, who reside in Dallas, have four children, Lamar Jr., Sharron, Clark and Daniel.



CLARK K. HUNT Investor-Operator

Clark Knobel Hunt is President of Hunt Financial Group ("HFG"), a Dallas based financial services concern. Through Hunt Financial, Hunt has been responsible for the development of two Securities and Exchange Registered Investment Advisory firms; SCM Advisors and Speece, Lewis & Thorson, and an Investment fund manager, Hunt & Wissman, L.L.C. ("H&W"). Hunt & Wissman serves as the manager of two U.S. based investment partnerships; Apollo Diversified Wealth and Conservative Growth Strategies, and a consultant to the Nevis, West Indies investment company, Infinity Investors, Ltd.

Hunt also serves as a director of several family- controlled enterprises including a venture capital investor, Hunt Capital Group and a real estate mining and theme park conglomerate, Hunt Midwest Enterprises. He is an officer and director of Hunt Sports Entertainment, the management company responsible for overseeing the Hunt's family investments in the Kansas City Chiefs of the National Football League, the Chicago Bulls of the National Basketball Association, and the Columbus Crew and Kansas City Wizards of Major League Soccer. With Major League Soccer, Hunt serves as the chairman of the Competition Committee. which plays an important role in the league's development through player allocations and league operating rules.

Hunt began his business career as a financial analyst for Goldman, Sachs and Co. in New York. While at Goldman, Sachs and Co., Clark worked on financing transactions including mergers, acquisitions, initial public offerings, gross cur-

rency swaps, and leveraged buyouts with an aggregate value in excess of \$1 billion.

Clark Hunt attended Southern Methodist University (SMU), where he graduated first in his class with a B.A. of Business Administration and was a two-time recipient of the university's highest academic award, the Provost Award for Outstanding Scholar. He was captain of the school's nationally ranked Division I soccer team, and was twice named a first-team Academic All-American. Additionally, Clark was the recipient of the University's Presidential Award of Excellence as a Scholar-Athlete and the Senior Athletic Award for Outstanding Scholar. In recognition of scholarship, leadership and service to the university, he received the Dad's Club Outstanding Senior Man Award and the Edwin L. Cox School of Business Outstanding Senior Award.

While at SMU, Hunt served as a member of the Blue Ribbon Committee in the role of Intercollegiate Athletics. This panel established the guidelines for intercollegiate athletics that SMU has pursued for the past decade. Hunt recently joined SMU's 21st Century Council, which is a committee composed of young leaders who will review the role of athletics at SMU, but will also address the range of issues all universities must deal with in preparing for the next century.

He resides in Dallas, with his wife Tavia.



RON PIZZUTI COLUMBUS INVESTOR

After 15 years in the retail business, working for F&R Lazarus & Co. and The Limited, Inc., Ron Pizzuti left the merchandising industry behind and made an aggressive move into the world of commercial real estate. Today he is the chairman and CEO of Pizzuti Inc. and its three operating subsidiaries: Pizzuti Development Inc., Pizzuti Management Inc. and Pizzuti Realty Inc., with offices in Columbus and Orlando, Fla. and Chicago, Ill.

Throughout his career he has been known for his risk taking, dedication, forthrightness and vision for the company. Even during tough economic times, the organization has persevered and prospered because of his uncanny ability to identify and capitalize on the right opportunities. He has built an organization that today has over 2,100 single-family lots under development, manages over six million square feet of space and in central Ohio alone has developed one of the most active industrial parks in the state of Ohio called SouthPark, which will have over 5 million square feet of office warehouse space.

A graduate of Kent State University, Pizzuti's accomplishments and level of commitment are not limited to business. He is active in numerous commercial, civic, arts and educational organizations and is well known in the community for his fundraising efforts for the arts and human services. In addition, the Pizzuti family has set up a charitable foundation that focuses on health and human services with a special emphasis on assisting children.

Currently, Pizzuti is chairman of the board of trustees for the Columbus Sym-

phony Orchestra and has played a major role in reviving the orchestra and getting its finances back on track. He serves



on the executive committee of the Greater Columbus Chamber of Commerce and is a key contributor to the city's master plan. He is vice president of the board for the Columbus Museum of Art and is a board member of the Ohio Arts Facilities Commission, Kent State University, Ohio Dominican College, Kenyon College, Children's Hospital and the Wexner Center Foundation. He also was appointed by Columbus Mayor Greg Lashutka to head the Sports Facilities Committee, which has been charged to bring professional sports to Columbus and has succeeded in landing a National Hockey League franchise, the Columbus Blue Jackets.

Pizzuti was also selected as the 1994 Central Ohio Entrepreneur of the Year award winner in the real estate category.

A licensed real estate broker in both Ohio and Florida, he is a member of the Columbus Board of Realtors, International Council of Shopping Centers, Building Industry Association, National Association of Industrial & Office Parks, Urban Land Institute and the Corporate Council of the Economic Development Council of Orlando.

He resides in Bexley with his wife Ann. The Pizzuti's have three children; Dara, Ellen and Joel.

JAMEY ROOTES PRESIDENT/GENERAL MANAGER

The future of soccer in America may well rest with Major League Soccer, which launched its inaugural season in 1996. The bright outlook of the world's most popular sport in this country will also depend heavily on bright, young executives like the 1996 MLS Executive of the Year, Jamey Rootes, President and General Manager of the Columbus Crew in Maor League Soccer.

Rootes, 31, has a wealth of experience not only as a soccer player and coach, but also as a business and marketing executive. In addition to being a top player on two NCAA championship teams, he was also a coach and promoter at a top collegiate team. He started a successful developmental soccer school for young players and was a top, young executive at the IBM Corporation. He was also heavily involved in the wildly successful World Cup '94 venture.

Rootes, a native of Stone Mountain. Georgia, received city, state and national recognition as a high school soccer player and was selected to be a part of the U.S. National Team player pool in '84. As a freshman that year, he helped Clemson University, a perennial soccer power, win their first NCAA soccer title. As a senior in '87, he led the Tigers to their second NCAA championship while earning firstteam All-Atlantic Coast Conference, All-South and Clemson Club Athlete of the Year honors.

During Rootes' four years at Clemson, he began to develop his business skills as the founder and operator of Rootes'



interest and ability among thousands of voungsters across the southeast.

Following his playing career, Rootes joined the IBM Corporation, one of the country's top training grounds for executive talent. He served IBM as a corporate marketing representative, where he quickly moved up the

organization's executive ladder. During his tenure, he remained active as a soccer coach and administrator, and eventually left IBM to become more heavily involved in the sport.

As part of the coaching staff at Indiana University, which boasts one of the nation's finest college soccer programs, Rootes worked with premier players like Todd Yeagley and Brian Maisonneuve. who both won national collegiate player of the year honors in '94, and both played with the Columbus Crew in 1996 and 1997. Using his promoting and marketing skills, he also helped boost attendance at the Hoosiers' games by 45 percent. In '94 he left IU to help stage the most successful World Cup ever as an operations manager with World Cup USA's Chicago venue.

Rootes is engaged to Melissa Wildgen and lives in Columbus.



TOM FITZGERALD

HEAD COACH

Columbus Crew Head Coach, Tom Fitzgerald, is set to begin his second full season as The Crew's coach.

Fitzgerald, who has been a coach for 21 seasons, brings a 24-18 MLS regular season record and a 3-4 playoff mark into the 1998 campaign.

Last season Fitzgerald led The Crew to its first-ever playoff series victory, a first-round sweep over the Tampa Bay Mutiny, before falling to the eventual MLS Cup champion D.C. United in the Eastern Conference Finals. The team finished the regular season with a 15-17 mark and a 2-2 record in the playoffs.


In 1996, Fitzgerald took over the head coaching position with 10 games left in the regular season and proceeded to lead The Crew to a 9-1 record to end the regular season, including a 1-0 victory at New England in the last regular season game to put The Crew in the playoffs. 

Fitzgerald also earned some impressive individual honors while at Tampa. He is a three-time Sunshine State Conference Coach of the Year award winner, tallying



Assistant Coach/Goalkeeper Coach


Greg Andrulis, a veteran head coach of 12 seasons, is set to begin his second full year as the Columbus Crew's assistant coach and goalkeeper coach. Prior to joining The Crew, Andrulis was the head coach at Wright State University for 12 years, a Division I school in Dayton, Ohio. While at Wright State, he compiled a 134-71-27 record, making him the all-time winningest coach at Wright State. He was also The Crew's goalkeeper coach during the latter part of the 1996 season.

Andrulis was a former goalkeeper and respected goalkeeping instructor with the Olympic Development Program as a region II staff coach. He holds a USSF "A" license as well as an advanced National Diploma from the NSCAA.


opportunity for youth players of all skill levels to receive training from The Crew coaching staff and players.

Certain elements must be considered when choosing a name for a professional sports team. The name must be unique, versatile, appeal to the youth, and most importantly capture the attitude and key values of the team. Thus, after evaluating numerous possibilities, Major League Soccer in Columbuswas named the Columbus Crew.

"In designing the logo and uniform, several factors were considered," says Peter Moore, Worldwide Creative Director for adidas and designer of The Crew logo and uniform. "It was necessary to represent the Columbus community in an appropriate and positive manner. The name suggests a work hard, show-me-don't-tellme attitude. The name implies 'team,' people working together,"

The Crew's team colors are black, yellow and metallic silver. The Crew logo remains consistent with the hard working attitude for which the name was intended. The three construction workers featured

in the logo, complete with hard hats and displaying a look of distinct seriousness, reflect the demeanor that is expected from "America's Hardest Working Team." A secondary logo, featuring the same three construction workers, has incorporated "Columbus," because the original logo or crest did not have the city's name.

The Crew name was a result of a month-long contest in *The Columbus Dispatch* asking eager soccer fans to submit names for the new Columbus MLS franchise. After receiving thousands of entries, with each one being carefully considered, an entry that was only suggested once became the chosen one, and The Crew was selected. Luis Orozco of Columbus, Ohio was the one person who submitted Crew as a nickname, and as a result of being chosen as the Grand Prize winner of the contest, he received two season tickets to the team's inaugural season at "The Horseshoe," Ohio Stadium.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER CONTINUES TO GROW ENTERING YEAR THREE

Embarking on its third season, Major League Soccer enters 1998 with two new teams – the Chicago Fire and Miami Fusion. During the first two campaigns, MLS enjoyed unprecedented success on the field, in the stands, on television and among the league's numerous commercial affiliates.

During the offseason, MLS further solidified its status as America's fifth major professional sports league by agreeing to a landmark, multi-year television package that will include a minimum of 12 regular season and playoff games on ABC in 1998, and 35 on ESPN and ESPN2. Although the last two MLS Cups were televised on ABC, the 1998 season opener will be the first MLS regular season game televised on network television.

With the world's grandest sporting event, the World Cup, taking place this summer in France, MLS players will be performing on the world's stage. The vast majority of U.S. National Team players are currently on MLS rosters and many top international MLS stars will showcase their skills in France. Nearly 50 MLS players were active with their respective national teams in World Cup qualifying for France 1998 (including 27 who represented the United States in its qualifying run) and a select group of MLS players will play among the world's elite in France. On the homefront, each of the league's 12 teams will see a segment of the regular season schedule lessen in mid-June, during the two-week first round of World Cup France '98, with teams playing three or fewer contests from June 10-25.

Shortly after World Cup France '98, many MLS World Cup players will travel to Orlando, Florida for the 1998 MLS

All-Star Weekend July 30 - August 2. The MLS All-Star Weekend will be highlighted by a doubleheader with the league's third annual midseason battle between the Eastern Conference and the Western Conference along with a second game featuring two top international clubs.

After enduring rainstorms at the first two MLS Cups, the league's 1998 championship game will take place in sunny Southern California on Sunday, October 25 at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena. Bruce Arena and D.C. United will be trying for a three-peat after winning the first two MLS Cups, but the hometown Galaxy will be looking to return to the league's championship after a runner-up finish to United in 1996.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER QUICK FACTS

- Twelve-team summer league with the 1998 season from March 15 through MLS Cup '98 on October 25.
- 32 regular-season league games per team; each team will play the other teams in its conference four times, twice at home and twice on the road; it will play two times against the six teams in the opposing conference.
- MLS Playoffs consist of best-of-three Conference Semifinals, best-of-three Conference Finals and a one-game championship to be broadcast live by ABC television from the Rose Bowl on October 25, 1998.
- During the 1998 season, MLS teams will play exhibition games against international teams. In addition, many teams had international tours and/or games during the offseason.



A LOOK BACK AT THE FIRST TWO YEARS

In 1996, the persistently asked question was finally answered. Yes, Americans showed that they were ready for a big-time professional soccer league. Fans came out in full force during Major League Soccer's inaugural season, making believers out of sports fans and members of the media around the globe. Enthusiasm was evident in MLS stadiums across the country as flag-waving, horn-blowing and wave-making fans proved that soccer is here to stay.

The league's second season saw an increased level of play on the field, with a consistent throng of hardcore supporters coming out to the 10 MLS stadiums. Several world-class players such as Los Angeles' Jorge Campos, Tampa Bay's Carlos Valderrama (now with Miami), Dallas' Alain Sutter and New England's Walter Zenga showcased the talents that have made them superstars across the globe. Zenga and San Jose's Ronald Cerritos made their MLS debuts in 1997, as did American stars Thomas Dooley and Mike Lapper. A total of 16 players from the 1994 U.S. World Cup Team now don MLS uniforms, while others, such as Colorado's Chris Henderson, D.C. United's Roy Wegerle and Jeff Agoos, and Kansas City's Preki have seen their international careers rejuvenated following stellar MLS performances. In addition to the league's American and international stars, rising talents like Kansas City's Mark Chung, Tampa Bay's Steve Ralston, D.C. United's Tony Sanneh and Dallas' Damian made their mark on MLS in '97.

Parity has been prevalent throughout the league's first two seasons as 10 teams battled in their collective quest to reach MLS Cup. Colorado and New England, the two teams who failed to earn playoff spots in year one, each sewed up postseason berths in their second seasons, with the Colorado rebounding from a league-worst 11-21 mark in 1996 to streak through the 1997 playoffs before succumbing to two-time champion D.C., 2-1, in MLS Cup '97.

The first two MLS seasons drew a total of 5,125,326 fans, an average of 16,017 per game, eclipsing the league founders' initial projections of 10,000-12,000 per game. The 1996 and 1997 MLS playoffs drew 508,649 fans to 30 matches, an average of 16,955. MLS Cup '97 at RFK Stadium was attended by 57,431 fans, making the league's second championship game the second-largest sporting event ever held at the historic venue.

MLS games also are high-scoring, averaging 3.3 goals per game, one of the highest per-game averages of any professional soccer league in the world.

MLS has made exciting and important strides to establish itself as the America's fifth major professional sports league and looks forward to making a continuously significant impact on the U.S. and international sports scene in 1998 and beyond.

THE BEGINNING

On December 17, 1993, in fulfillment of U.S. Soccer's promise to FIFA, World Cup USA 1994 Chairman and CEO Alan I. Rothenberg announced the formation of Major League Soccer and unveiled the league logo. After receiving formal bids from 22 cites to secure a team, signing many top U.S. and international stars, solidifying financial investment and welcoming key corporate sponsors, MLS unveiled its plans for the



league's inaugural season on October 17, 1995.

Following the MLS Player Combine in January, 1996, and the league's first player draft one month later, each of the league's 10 clubs entered its first-ever spring training with high expectations. An overflow crowd of 31,683 at Spartan Stadium witnessed San Jose forward Eric Wynalda score the league's historic first goal in a 1-0 victory over D.C. United. The ultimate goal – the launch of a world-class professional outdoor soccer league in the United States with 10 teams nationwide – had become a reality.

THE PLAYERS

The top American players playing abroad returned home in 1996 to excite U.S. sports fans with their attacking brand of soccer. In addition, many established and rising international stars brought their skills to American soil.

MLS teams feature a unique mix of domestic and international players. Along with the top performers from the United States, each club has the ability to carry five international players on its 20-player roster.

Homegrown American superstars Eric Wynalda (San Jose), Eddie Pope (D.C. United) and Marcelo Balboa (Colorado Rapids) are just a few of the top U.S. players currently on MLS rosters. Along with the top domestic players, MLS teams feature some of the world's most recognizable and talented international players such as Carlos Valderrama (Miami), Marco Etcheverry (D.C. United) and Jorge Campos (Los Angeles). The 1997 season saw forwards Jaime Moreno (D.C. United) and Ronald Cerritos (San Jose) emerge as two potent offensive talents.

Project-40, the joint venture between MLS and U.S. Soccer, identifies America's top young soccer talent and provide it with valuable training opportunities in the professional arena in order to enhance international success. Young Project-40 players such as Brian Dunseth (New England) and Ben Olsen (D.C. United) are keys to the United States' future success on the international level

THE SINGLE-ENTITY CONCEPT

Major League Soccer features a unique ownership and operating structure for a major professional sports league in the United States. Unlike other professional sports leagues which are a confederation of individual franchise owners, MLS is structured as a single limited liability company (single-entity). In a single-entity endeavor, each team operator owns a financial stake in the league, not just an individual team. In addition, player contracts are owned by the league rather than by individual teams.

The single-entity concept allows teams to operate autonomously in their markets, but with the incentive to see that all teams are financially successful. MLS believes this single-entity structure enables it to avoid many of the pitfalls that have plagued other professional sports leagues.

Major League Soccer's investor group includes many of the world's most successful business leaders and sports entrepreneurs. These progressive individuals believe in the future of professional outdoor soccer at the highest level in the United States and are determined to make Major League Soccer a continuing success.

MLS investor-operators include



Philip Anschutz, railroad/real estate industrialist and co-owner of the NHL's Los Angeles Kings; John Kluge and Stuart Subotnick of Metromedia Company, one of the largest private companies in the United States: the Kraft familv, owners of the NFL's New England Patriots; Lamar Hunt, founder of the American Football League and owner of the Kansas City Chiefs, and his sons Clark and Lamar Jr.; former investment banker Marc Rapaport; Kenneth Horowitz, a communications entrepreneur and wireless telephone pioneer; and API, a division of The Sponsorship Group, a U.K.-based sports marketing and television production company. Alan I. Rothenberg, the Founder of MLS and current U.S. Soccer President, also is an investor.

EXPANSION – 1998 AND BEYOND

Several cities - including, but not limited to - Seattle, Charlotte, Cincinnati, Pittsburgh, San Diego, Houston, Portland, and Atlanta - have expressed interest in bringing Major League Soccer to their region. MLS' current plans aim to add two more expansion teams in either 2000 or 2001, followed by an additional two clubs in 2002 or 2003, bringing the league to an ideal size of 16 teams. However, expansion will not occur at the expense of the quality of play, the dilution of player talent, or without suitable, professional venues in which to showcase the team, an ownership group committed to the long-term success of MLS and its constituents, or a community without a proven ability to support major professional sports, including soccer.

MLS RULES

Rule 1 - The Field of Play

Major League Soccer fields may have a minimum width of 50 yards and a maximum width of 100 yards, and fields may have a minimum length of 100 yards and a maximum length of 130 yards.

Rule 2 - The Ball

The official Mitre Game ball of Major League Soccer will have a circumference of 27" - 28" and a weight of 14 oz.-16 oz.

Rule 3 - Number of Players

Each team consists of 11 players, one of whom must be the goalkeeper. A maximum of three substitutes, plus the 'keeper, may be used. If an MLS team substitutes its 'keeper during a match, he shall not count as one of the three allowed field player substitutes.

Rule 4 - Player Equipment

A player's uniform must consist of shirt, shorts, socks, shinguards and shoes. The goalkeeper must wear colors which distinguish him from the other players.

Rule 5 - Referees

One referee and two referees' assistants and a fourth official, are appointed for each match. The referee is responsible for control of the game and his/her decisions regarding facts connected with play are final.

Rule 6 - Referee's Assistant

Two referee assistants will assist the referee by indicating offside, when the ball is out of play, which team is entitled to a corner kick or throw in, substitution request and by indicating other misconduct or any incident that has occurred out of the view of the referee.

Rule 7 - Duration of the Game

The game shall be divided up into two equal periods of 45 minutes each. If a MLS match is tied after 90 minutes, a shootout will be held to determine the winner. See MLS tiebreaker procedure for more details on the shootout.

Rule 8 - The Start of Play

A flip of a coin decides which team will kick off. Each team must stay in its own half of the field and the defending players must be at least 10 yards from the ball when it is kicked.

After a goal, the team scored upon will kick off. After halftime, the teams change ends and the kickoff will be taken by the opposite team to that which started the game.

Rule 9 - Ball In and Out of Play

The ball is out of play when (a) it has wholly crossed the goal line or touchline, whether on the ground or in the air, or (b) when the game has been stopped by the referee.

Rule 10 - Method of Scoring

A goal is scored when the whole of the ball has passed over the goal line, between the goal posts and under the cross bar, whether on the ground or in the air.

Rule 11 - Offside

A player is in an offside position if he is nearer to his opponent's goal line than both the ball and the second last opponent unless:

i) he is in his own half of the field of play, or ii) he is level with the second last opponent or two last opponents.

A player shall only be declared offside and penalized for being in an offside position, if, at the moment the ball touches, or is played by, one of his teammates, he is, in the opinion of the referee:

- i) interfering with play or with an opponent, or
- ii) gaining an advantage by being in that position.A player shall not be declared offside by the referee
- i) merely because of his being in an offside position,

or

ii) if he receives the ball direct from a goal-kick, a corner-kick, a throw-in, or when it has been dropped by a referee.

If a player is declared offside, the referee shall award an indirect free kick, which shall be taken by a player of the opposing team from the place where-the infringement occurred, unless the offense is committed by a player in the opponent's goal area, in which case the free-kick shall be taken from any point within the goal area.

Rule 12 - Fouls and Misconduct

A direct free kick is awarded to the opposing team if a player commits any of the following 10 offenses in a manner considered by the referee to be careless, reckless or using excessive force: (a) kicks, (b) trips, (c) jumps at, (d) charges violently, (e) strikes, (f) pushes, (g) holds, (h) spits, (i) intentionally handles the ball, or (i) tackles an opponent to gain possession of the ball, making contact with the opponent before touching the ball.

A penalty kick is awarded if any of the above 10 offenses is committed by a player inside his own penalty area, irrespective of the position of the ball, provided it is in play.

An indirect free kick is awarded to the opposing team if a player, in the opinion of the referee, commits any of the following offences: (a) dangerous play, (b) impedes the progress of an opponent, or (c) prevents the goalkeeper from releasing the ball from his hands.

An indirect kick will also be awarded if the goalkeeper: (a) takes more than four steps while controlling the ball with his hands, before releasing it, (b) touches the ball again with his hands after it has been released from his possession and has



not touched any player, (c) touches the ball with his hands after it has been deliberately kicked to him by a teammate, (d) touches the ball with his hands after receiving it directly from a throw-in taken by a teammate, or (e) wastes time.

A player is cautioned and given a yellow card if he commits any of the following offences: (a) unsporting behavior, (b) shows dissent by word or action, (c) persistently infringes the Laws of the Game, (d) delays the restart of the game, (e) fails to stand the required distance for a corner kick or a free kick, (f) enters or re-enters the field without the referee's permission, or (g) deliberately leaves the field of play without the referee's permission.

A player is sent off and shown the red card if he commits the following offences: (a) guilty of serious foul play, (b) guilty of violent conduct, (c) spits on an opponent or any other person, (d) denies an opponent a goal or an obvious goal-scoring opportunity by deliberately handling the ball, (e) denies an obvious goal-scoring opportunity to an opponent moving towards the player's goal by an offence punishable by a free kick or a penalty kick, (f) uses offensive language, or (g) receives a second caution in the same match.

Rule 13 - Free Kick

Free kicks are classified into two categories: "Direct" (from which a goal can be scored directly against the offending side) and "Indirect" (from which a goal cannot be scored unless the ball has been touched by a player other than the kicker before entering the goal).

For all free kicks the offending team must be at least 10 yards from the ball or the goal line until the ball is kicked.

Rule 14 - Penalty Kick

A penalty kick is a direct free kick taken at the penalty mark. All players except the player taking the kick and the goalkeeper must stay outside the penalty area and be at least 10 yards from the ball (hence the arc at the edge of the penalty area).

Rule 15 - Throw In

When the ball has wholly crossed the touchline, it is put back into play by a throw-in from the spot where it went out and by a player from the opposite team to the player who last touched it. A goal cannot be scored directly from a throw-in.

Rule 16 - Goal Kick

When the ball has wholly crossed the goal line after being last touched by a player from the attacking team, it is put back into play by a kick from the goal area by the defending team.

Rule 17 - Corner Kick

When the ball has wholly crossed the goal line after being last touched by a player from the defending team, it is put back into play by a kick by the attacking team from the corner on the side the ball went out.

MLS TIEBREAKER PROCEDURE/ THE SHOOTOUT

MLS games which are tied at the end of regulation play will go directly into a shootout, involving players on each team challenging the opposing goalkeeper in a one-on-one situation.

Each team will then have five chances in alternate order, with the visiting team kicking first. The shooters will start with the ball 35 yards from the goal and will have five seconds in which to shoot. The goalkeepers have no movement restrictions within the five second period in accordance with normal rules of play. However, the goalkeeper must start each shootout attempt on his goal line.

The kicks shall end when one team has achieved an insurmountable advantage, such as scoring on its first three kicks while their opponents miss their first three.

If the teams remained tied after the prescribed five attempts, they shall continue to take alternate kicks until one has scored more than the other after an equal number of attempts. Only players in the game at the end of the match shall be eligible to take such kicks. Goalkeepers are eligible to kick if the coach so chooses. No player shall take a second kick until 11 kicks have been taken. The shooter is not allowed to play rebounds off the goalkeeper, crossbar, or gooleposts, i.e., the shooter receives only one shot within the five seconds. If the goalkeeper handles the ball outside the penalty box, or fouls the shooter, a penalty kick will be awarded

1998 MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER STANDING POINTS SYSTEM

Each winning team shall be awarded three points for a win in regulation time. A team winning in the shootout will be given one point. No points will be given for a loss, either in regulation or a shootout.



GLOSSARY OF SOCCER TERMS

BOOTS - Another name for soccer cleats.

CENTER (CROSS) - When the ball is passed from a wide area of the field into the penalty area.

CHIP - A high, floated kick that lifts the ball over the heads of defenders or the goalkeeper.

CLEAR - A kick, ideally of good distance, that attempts to get the ball away from the penalty area quickly. Can also be a punch by a goalkeeper.

DRIBBLE - A way of advancing the ball by a series of short taps with one or both feet, usually keeping the ball close to the body, allowing one to change speed and direction with the ball.

ENDLINE - Either of the two lines running from corner flag to corner flag on which the goal sits. Also known as the goal line

FLANK - The area of the field near the touchline. Also known as the "wing."

HALF-VOLLEY - When the ball is kicked just as it is rebounding off the ground.

HANDS - An illegal act that involves touching the ball with the hands or arms. Also a "hand-ball."

HEADING - A method of scoring, passing or controlling the movement of the ball by making contact between the ball and a player's head.

MARKING - The act of guarding an opponent closely.

NUTMEG - The act of purposely dribbling the ball through an opponent's legs and regaining possesion. Can be very embarrasing for the defender.

OBSTRUCTION - Preventing the opponent from moving around a player by standing in his path.

OVERLAP - An offensive play whereby a defender or midfielder runs down the wing past his own forward.

PENALTY SPOT - A circle 12 yards in front of the goal from which penalty kicks are taken.

PITCH - Another name for the field of play.

PROFESSIONAL FOUL - A foul, usually hard and from behind, in which a defender intentionally takes down a forward to disrupt a clear scoring opportunity, usually a break-away. The "professional foul" usually results in a yellow or red card.

RED CARD - A card presented to a player by the referee signifying the player's ejection from the match. The red card is presented for dangerous fouls, repeated fouls, striking an

opponent, spitting, or after a player receives a second yellow card during the game.

SAVE - When the goalkeeper prevents a scoring opportunity by catching the ball or deflecting it away from the goal.

SHEILDING - Retaining possession of the ball by keeping your body between the ball and the opponent.

SHOOTOUT - The tie-breaking procedure after regulation time used in MLS games. In a shootout, each teams has five opportunities to score a goal in a one-on-one situation with the opposing goalkeeper. Each one-on-one situation begins with the goalkeeper in goal and the offensive player 35 yards away from the goal line. The player has five seconds to dribble the ball and score.

SLIDE TACKLE - An attempt to take posession of the ball from the opponent by sliding on the ground.

STRIKER - Another name for a forward, or a player whose primary responsibility scoring goals.

SWEEPER - A defender who roams behind the back line of defenders, closing down attacking opportunities and starting the team's attack.

TACKLING - Attempting to take the ball away from the opponent when both players are playing the ball with their feet.

TRAP - Controlling the ball from a pass, and keeping it close to the body, using the feet, thighs, chest or head.

TOUCHLINE - Another word for the sidelines of the field.

VOLLEY - Kicking the ball out of the air before it hits the ground.

WALL PASS - A pass to a teammate that is immediately returned around the opponent. Also known as "give and qo."

WING - An area of the field near the touchline. Also known as the flank.

WINGER - Name given to the right and left outside forwards in a 4-3-3 formation.

WOODWORK

Another name for the crossbar and goalposts of a soccer goal.

YELLOW CARD - A "caution" card presented to a player by the referee indicating a warning for dangerous fouls, repetitive fouls or unsportsmanlike conduct. Two yellow card cautions result in a red card and the ejection of the player.

THE CREW

OHIO STADIUM HOME OF THE CREW



Ohio Stadium, home of the Columbus Crew and Ohio State Buckeyes football, is one of the most historic facilities in America. Nestled right in the heart of The Ohio State University campus, "The Shoe" as it is fondly referred to because of its horseshoe shaped design, was built in 1922 and is one of the most recognizable stadium landmarks in the country.

Ohio Stadium has served as the home of the Buckeyes for the past 74 seasons.

The capacity for Ohio Stadium is listed as 89,841, but the Buckeyes regularly draw in excess of 94,000 fans per game. The Buckeyes have drawn more than 31 million fans to Ohio Stadium during the 75 years of football games.

For The Crew, Ohio Stadium is downsized from 89,841 to a friendlier, cozier 25,134. The smaller capacity enables fans to feel like they are a part of the game.

CREW TRAINING CENTER

CREW MEDIA INFORMATION

Credentials

Requests for credentials should be made on company letterhead and sent to: Jeff Wuerth, Public Relations Director, Columbus Crew, 77 East Nationwide Blvd., Columbus, Ohio, 43215. Season credentials will be mailed out approximately two weeks prior to the home opener. Single-game requests should be made at least 48 hours prior to game time, by calling 614-221-2739 ext. 25, and can be picked up at Gate 21, on the West side of Ohio Stadium. Please remember that all credentials are intended for the working media only and are not transferable.

Press Box And Access

Located on Ohio Stadium's West side, the press box is serviced by an elevator from the ground level to the press box. The press level can accommodate over 250 writers and broadcasters. To enhance the soccer environment for the press, The Crew will use an open-air press area for the media in section 17 in "B Deck." There will be two rows set up with power and lighting. There will be no phone lines in the outdoor press-area, so if a member of the media needs to file a story, they should do so in the press box.

Parking

Season parking passes are available upon request. The pass should be displayed on your front windshield when entering the Ohio Stadium parking lot. Parking for the media is located in the west or northwest lot of Ohio Stadium.

Photographs

Photographers are asked to wear a photo bib at all times. In accordance with FIFA regulations, all photographers are allowed to shoot only behind the boards. As a courtesy to the fans, still photographers are asked to kneel when shooting. Team photographers, and photographers for legitimate media are the only photographers allowed to shoot Columbus Crew games. Freelance photographers will not be issued credentials unless granted special approval by The Crew's public relations department. All copyrights on all photos will be the property of the Columbus Crew and Major League Soccer.

Phone Lines

There are several phone lines available in the Press Box on a first-come, first-serve basis. But those members of the media needing a private phone line should contact Rhetta Woody at The Ohio State University Phone Service at 614-292-0555.

Practices

The official training site of the Columbus Crew is the The Crew's training facility at The Village of Obetz. Practices will be held from 10:00 a.m. to noon each day. All practice times are tentative and subject to change. Please check with the public relations department prior to each day's scheduled practice.

All interviews with coaches or players should be set up through The Crew's Public Relations Department.

1998 CREW TELEVISION

The Columbus Crew will have a total of 16 regular season games televised over the course of the 1998 season. This season The Crew television network will include WSYX-Ch. 6 (ABC) for the first time. WSYX will broadcast two games this season, including The Crew's season opener at Tampa on March 21. FOX Sports Ohio will broadcast five games this year including three in the final month of the season and WTTE Fox 28 will air one game. Nationally, The Crew can be seen on espn2 three times and on UNIVISION six times. Included in the games on the duece (espn2), will be a match-up with the expansion Miami Fusion. While the Spanish speaking UNIVISION broadcasts will include three home matches.

CREW RADIO NETWORK

All 32 regular season games will be originated by Sports Radio 1460 WBNS, and syndicated throughout much of the state on the Columbus Crew Radio Network. "The Fan," Sports Radio 1460 WBNS, begins its third season as the radio flagship station for the Columbus Crew. For the 1998 season, The Crew Radio Network will be broadcast on 17 stations, WBNS and 16 affliates. Soccer fans throughout Ohio can tune into all The Crew action, brought to you by "The Voice of The Crew," Dwight Burgess. Burgess begins his third season as the play-by-play voice of The Crew and his seventh year as a professional soccer announcer. The 17-year radio and TV veteran also serves as the voice of Ohio State University mens basketball. Burgess was a two-time All-American and ranked among the nation's leading


