AZTECS SOCCER

It's a new year and a new era for Los Angeles Aztecs soccer, as 1978 has brought about a changing of the guard. And new owners Larry Friend, Don Reynolds and Alan Rothenberg have wasted little time in letting Southern California sports fans know their new club is for real.

'The potential this team has is mind-boggling," says Friend, who serves as the club's new President. "The game is exploding all over the country, and this year it starts in Los Angeles."

For the new Aztecs management, there exists an advantage of having a club that has been a consistent winner over the past four years. For the record, Los Angeles is the only NASL team to win a playoff berth in each of those four seasons.

In 1974's inaugural year, not only did the Aztecs make the playoffs, but they won all the way to the finish and came home with a title.

The next two seasons saw the Los Angeles teams finish with 12-10 and 12-12 regular-season records respectively; But on each occassion, the year ended in a first round playoff defeat.

It was during the '76 season that soccer really began to open up in Southern California, at least professionally. The Aztecs made big news with the signing of George Best, Charlie Cooke and other world class players, beginning a build for the future. And when Steve David arrived in town prior to the 1977 season, it appeared that future had arrived.

David brought with him tremendous scoring punch and subsequently teamed with Best and Cooke to generate 39 goals and a like number of assists amongst them. The Aztecs finished the season at 15-11, led the league in scoring and generally made a shambles of opposing defenses. Prior to the playoffs though, David went out with an injury, leaving the team to re-adjust without him. Best carried the Aztecs to wins over San Jose and Dallas before the team was eliminated by Seattle in the league semi-finals.

Head Coach Terry Fisher has 11 players returning from last year's team, combining with some off-season acquisitions to make the Aztecs a team to beat in 1978.

"Sure, we're going to win a lot of games this year," says Friend. "But we're just as interested in winning some fans, too. That and winning the championship again are the only reasons we're here."

NEW LOOK '78

Major management changes

Immediately after the ownership change in late October,

additional internal moves were forthcoming.

The first was the naming of former Los Angeles Lakers basketball star Rudy LaRusso as new Aztecs General Manager, LaRusso, in private business prior to accepting his new post, professes no doubts about becoming involved with a 'new' game.
"Everybody is saying 'Soccer is coming,' " LaRusso says.

"Really, it's already here, and I want to be a part of it."

Shortly thereafter, co-owner Friend took the reigns as President of the club on a full-time basis, a move that had not been pre-planned.

"We didn't plan it this way," Friend said, referring to conversations with partners Reynolds and Rothenberg. "I had planned to ease into it over a couple seasons."

But finding his division of interests too severe, Friend decided to resign his partnership in the Bear, Stearns investment business to take control of the Aztecs in January.
"There's just too much work to be done," he says, "and now's the time to do it. I just couldn't wait.

Next, the club fulfilled a need for the intense organization that Friend is striving for with the hiring of Ted Podleski as new Vice-President of Operations.

Ted is one of the most thoroughly organized people I have ever seen, "says Friend. "He is a major addition to this club." Podleski previously served as the number two man in the NBA Phoenix Suns organization for nine years.

Meanwhile, outside of the club headquarters, there was a change taking place that was much more visible to fans - the

moving of all home games to the Rose Bowl in Pasadena.

"We're really pleased with the opportunity to play there, "LaRusso says. "It's an outstanding stadium with an excellent surface for our players and perfect visibility for fans in any seat."

Indeed, the historic bowl is a prestigious stadium for the Aztecs to now call "home". With 104,000 seats available, the next project is filling them with bodies - preferably families.

"This is a tremendous opportunity for a family to spend the day together," stresses Friend. "Every game will be a special

event with something for everybody".

Pointing out the tremendous explosion in youth soccer throughout Southern California, Friend explained the Aztecs

philosophy on reaching the kids.

"The youngsters playing the game now are going to be the ones who really make it happen in the future," he says. "It's up to us to make game days fun for them, so they'll come back again and bring their parents."

It's a new look and a new enthusiasm for Aztecs soccer,

and Friend reflects the ultimate optimism.

"If we're wrong about anything," he confesses, "It's only on the timing of the matter. We all know there's a great future ahead of us here."

TERRY FISHER Head Coach



At 28 year of age, Terry Fisher is entering his fourth year as head coach of the Los Angeles Aztecs, and remains the youngest head man in major professional sports.

For Fisher, a native of Pennsylvania and former player at Hartwick College, coaching in Los Angeles has been a unique experience. This is his third head job in

Southern California following two assignments on the collegiate level, and each move has made him better at his trade.

"When I started at Whittier College in '72," Fisher recalls, "it was my first head coaching job. Naturally, as an assistant previously on the amateur level, I learned much about the game. But this was my first opportunity to 'handle' people myself." Fisher was equal to the task, as his team won the school's first-ever conference championship to qualify for the NAIA tournament.

From Whittier, there followed a quick promotion to the number one job at UCLA, where Fisher took his team to the final-four tournament twice before losing. His combined record for those seasons was a phenomenal 34–4–8.

"The talent helped that record a bit," Fisher says modestly. "Working with the best organized athletic department in the country is my greatest recollection of the UCLA days. And it really gave me the opportunity to see what kind of coach I could be under really ideal conditions."

Fisher's accomplishments as a college mentor enabled him to snare the head job with the Aztecs. Following the Los Angeles club's NASL title in '74, head coach Alex Perolli departed along with many of his players. Subsequently, Fisher took over a team with only four returnees and began a rebuilding program. And now, three full years later, he has seen his team develop into "the most exciting club in our history," again a top contender.

During his Los Angeles term, Fisher's 41 wins has already lifted him to sixth place on the NASL's active coaches list. And once again, he has enjoyed an opportunity to coach some of the game's most outstanding talent.

Has coaching international stars the likes of George Best, Charlie Cooke and Steve David been difficult for a young coach?

"Not at all," claims Fisher. "It's been a lot of fun. Not necessarily easy, but fun nonetheless."

11-GEORGE BEST

5-8, 155 Forward Born May 22, 1946 Belfast, Northern Ireland

George Best begins his third season as a member of the Aztecs, and has now established himself



as a major star in the United States as well as a legendary figure in England. There is little doubt as to Best's abilities, still better than most even after a long and stormy career. His 15 goals and 37 points in '76 was a tremendous start in this country, but not nearly as impressive as last year's statistics. Playing only 20 games in 1977, Best adapted his play to the club's speed-oriented style built around Steve David. And George filled the need for expert passer and playmaker extraordinaire. His 18 goals tied an all-time league record shared with Pele. Additionally, Best's 11 goals, coming mostly when games were on the line, helped him total 40 points for third place in the NASL scoring derby. Over the past two season's George's ability to score in the clutch has been more than evident: In 23 wins over the past two seasons in games which he played, Best has been responsible for 10 game-winning shots. Born in Belfast, Northern Ireland, George had perhaps greater impact on English Soccer than any other player of his era. At the age of 22, he had established himself as the top player in the country, being named England's Footballer of the Year in 1968, and again in '69; He was named Player of the Year for all of Europe as well in '68 and led the English League's First Division in goals the same season. George's incredible career began in 1963 with his debut for Manchester United's first team at age 17. In '64, George made his first appearance for Northern Ireland, and has made 31 more since. Following a brief suspension in 1970, Best returned to the headlines with six goals against Northhampten. Following three more seasons filled with controversial conduct on and off the field, Best "retired" for the third time in 1974, but soon announced his intention to play again in the United States. He became an Aztec in late 1975, and began his career in Los Angeles during the '76 season. His name and career achievements known universally throughout the soccer world, Best's recent marriage to model Angela McDonald-Janes became instant international news. The couple, married on the 24th of January in a small Las Vegas ceremony, currently resides in Hermosa Beach.

TERRY FISHER SAYS: Trying to say something about George Best that hasn't already been said many times before is impossible. He's truly one of the all-time great 11 players the world ever has —and ever will—see. George is one of the few remaining superstars in soccer, and maybe a talent that will not be seen again in other players for many years to come.

3-COLIN CLARKE

6-1, 180 Defender Born April 4, 1946 Glasgow, Scotland

The newest Aztec, arriving slightly more than two weeks prior to the season opener, Clarke brings



tremendous expertise and a well-rounded knowledge of the game to Los Angeles. His career began following a high school education at Penilee High in Glasgow, Scotland, his birthplace. Colin's first professional experience was with Arsenal, where he played for two seasons. From there, it was on to Oxford United, where Clarke established himself as a player. For 13 seasons, he played defense, precisely the reason for his being called upon by Aztecs coach Terry Fisher to help shore up that particular department. As a first year player in the North American Soccer League, Clarke is looking forward to the experience, and considers the move a great opportunity to play in a new surrounding. He and wife Susan have one child, Jamie Stuart, age 3.

TERRY FISHER SAYS: Colin has played this game a long time and knows what to look for. Obviously, we're really pleased to have him in Los Angeles, and already he's shown his wares effectively during the pre-season. He's well-rounded and extremely strong.

5-CHARLIE COOKE

5-9, 160 Midfielder Born October 14, 1942 St. Monance, Scotland

Charlie is one of several Aztecs returning for his third season in Los Angeles. In his first year



Los Angeles, In his first year (1976), Scotland's former Player of the Year recorded 10 points, appearing in 12 games. Despite a broken arm that cut his season short, Cooke's performance that year earned him the recognition of the entire league as he was voted All-NASL at his position. The 1977 season was even better for Charlie; His two goals and 15 assists earned him 19 points, third in team scoring behind Steve David and George Best. The assist total was second best in the entire NASL behind Best's 18, and once again earned Charlie All-NASL honors. Cooke is the co-holder of the Aztecs single game scoring record (7 points), established against the Boston Minutemen in 1976, Charlie and his wife have two children, and currently resides in Redondo Beach.

TERRY FISHER SAYS: Charlie's skill is obvious, as indicated by two years of All-NASL status. His direct speed and flair are ideal for a team like ours, and a key ingredient for our attacking midfield.

7-STEVE DAVID

6-0, 165 Forward Born November 3, 1951 Point Fortin, Trinidad

Undoubtedly one of the most dangerous scorers in the North American Soccer League, David figures to eventually surpass all league scoring records. Last



season, Steve's first as an Aztec, he led the NASL in scoring for the second time in four years. His 58 points were far and away tops among all players, with a phenomenal 52 of them coming on 26 goals in 24 games. Originally from Point Fortin, Trinidad, Steve was voted Player of the Year three consecutive seasons in his home country before signing his first professional contract with the Miami Toros in 1974. In his first season, David's exciting play and world class sprinter speed helped him score 13 times as he finished second in Rookie of the Year voting. In 1975, his career took off; 23 goals and six assists totalled 52 points and gave David his first NASL scoring title. Following an injury-plagued '76 season, David came to the Aztecs looking for a new home. And he found one playing with George Best. Best, most noted for his scoring, became the league's assist leader largely because of David. Most coaches around the NASL will agree there's very few players who can catch the Trinidad veteran once he turns on the speed, and Steve's become the league's premier breakaway man. At his peak last season, David put together an incredible streak of scoring a goal in 10 consecutive games, and at one point had an accumulation of 16 goals over a 12-game span. He has been a member of his national team in Trinidad for eight years, and won All-NASL honors in 1974, '75 and '77. Steve is single and resides in Los Angeles.

TERRY FISHER SAYS: Sheer speed, uncanny shooting accuracy and a phenomenal ability to find cracks in the defense; What else can you say? Steve is certainly one of the great ones in the North American Soccer League, and we're counting on him again this year.

9-RON DAVIES

6-0, 185 Forward Born May 25, 1942 Holywell, North Wales

Ron Davies is a true veteran in every sense of the word. After making 549 appearances in British



Football League games, Ron came to the Aztecs in 1976, and immediately contributed to the attack. His 1976 statistics reflected an accumulation of 15 points on six goals and three assists, even though he was moved to central defender midway through the season. Once stationed in his new position, he was good enough to be voted the Aztecs "Best Defender" that season. The '77 season saw the steady Davies again record 15 points, with six more goals and three assists totalled while playing various positions. Ron began his lengthy career with Chester, and eventually moved on to Luton Town, Norwich City, Southhampton, Portsmouth and Manchester United, from where he was obtained by the Aztecs. Ron & wife Sylvia have two daughters, ages 12 and 10.

TERRY FISHER SAYS: His tremendous amount of experience will prove invaluable to us, whether he plays in the front or back. Ron's been around a long time and his knowledge of the game is a plus for any team.

12-ALAN KELLY

5-11, 165 Midfielder Born June 29, 1956 Glasgow, Scotland

Perhaps the brightest of all young Aztecs prospects, Alan was the team's first-round draft choice

the team's first-round draft choice in the '78 NASL draft. Following four outstanding years at San Diego State University, Kelly is making a serious bid for a regular position. While in college, he was named All-American twice and considers the honor of being drafted in the first round by the Aztecs his most memorable soccer experience thusfar. Alan was born in Glasgow, Scotland, but is now a United States citizen. He is single and resides in Redondo Beach.



TERRY FISHER SAYS: Alan was one of the big surprises of the '78 draft. He has a large amount of talent and needs only experience to make it in this league.

15-RAMON MIFFLIN

5-9, 165 Midfielder Born April 5, 1947 Lima. Peru

Joining the Aztecs this season, Ramon is probably one of the best known soccer players ever to



come out of Peru. His experience in the game includes seven different seasons playing with Pele, four with Santos (Brazil), and three with the Cosmos. On four different occasions, he has been a member of the South American National Team, and played for Team America in the 1976 Bicentennial Cup. Ramon was a member of Peru's World Cup Team in 1970 and 1974, and calls his years of international soccer with Pele the greatest experience of his career. Also active off the field, Mifflin has coached high school soccer in New York the past two years; He earned his Business Administration degree from the University of Peru (Lima) in 1968. His best North American Soccer League season was his first with the Cosmos in 1976, as he accounted for six goals, six assists and 18 total points in only 15 games.

TERRY FISHER SAYS: Ramon had a quiet season last year statistically, but we know he can still play. And he can still play well. He's had experience under every kind of game conditions and can really be a steadying force for us. His accurate passing and precise playmaking is Ramon's best asset.

17-ANE MIHAILOVICH

5-9, 155 Midfielder Born November 16, 1951 Uratnica-Tetovo, Yugoslavia

Originally a native of Yugoslavia, Ane just recently obtained his American citizenship. He came




to the Aztecs from the Yugoslav-Americans of the Greater Los Angeles League in 1977, and will be remembered for his thrilling game-winning goal against San Jose in last year's sudden-death overtime playoff opener. Ane previously played for teams in the American Soccer League (Detroit Mustangs and Cleveland Cobras) and briefly in the Canadian Soccer League. He has played virtually every position on the field, and is particularly strong in the middle. Ane is single and lives in San Pedro.

TERRY FISHER SAYS: Ane's versatility is his primary asset. He has good speed and a very powerful shot. We are not at any disadvantage with Ane on the field, since he can play anywhere and help us.

20-BILL MISHALOW

5-9, 160 Goalkeeper Born March 6, 1952 Chicago, Illinois

One of professional sports great Cinderella stories, Billy originally earned his spot on the Aztecs



roster in the classical "hard way." A native of Chicago, he spurned a collegiate hockey scholarship to attend the University of Alabama-Huntsville and play soccer. A standout there, he was named his team's MVP three straight seasons and developed a tremendous desire to play in the North American Soccer League. Arriving in Los Angeles as a walk-on, his hustle and tremendous physical condition won him a spot on the permanent roster. Billy begins his third season as an Aztec as part of what many consider to be the best goalkeeping tandem in the NASL-along with teammate Bob Rigby. And "Mish" has proven his worth statistically. His career goals against average is an eye-popping 1.08, including a '77 season that saw him allow just eight goals in eight games while recording three shutouts. He was the club's Outstanding Rookie in '76 and -along with Bob McAlinden-makes a tremendous number of public appearances for the Aztecs in each off-season. Extremely popular with the fans, Mishalow is single and lives in Manhattan Beach.

TERRY FISHER SAYS: As part of our 'Dynamic Duo' in the nets, it's a comfortable feeling knowing we have such depth at the key position on the field. Billy's a great story, as a walkon, and has helped us establish the best goalkeeping depth in the NASL.

8-BOB McALINDEN

5-7, 145 Midfielder Born May 22, 1946 Salford, England

Bob McAlinden is entering his third season with the Aztecs and has played more games for the



club than any player other than Ron Davies. His ability to stay injury free due to outstanding conditioning has made him a dependable performer during past seasons. Originally playing for Manchester City, Bob took a five year leave of absence from the game before coming to Los Angeles on George Best's personal recommendation. He scored 11 points in '76 and 10 more in '77. Noted for his all-out hustle for the duration of every game, Mc-Alinden's inspirational play earned him the Aztecs Most Popular Player award in '77, as voted by the fans.

TERRY FISHER SAYS: He's a great guy to have around. You always love a guy you can depend on, and that's certainly true of Bobby. His determination and work rate are good ingredients for any team.

18-JOHN McGRANE

5-10, 160 Defender Born October 12, 1953 Glasgow, Scotland

John is beginning his second season with the Aztecs after winning a position on the '77 squad



as a free agent. During his collegiate years at Simon-Fraser University, Canadian citizen McGrane was a member of the 1976 NAIA Champions. He was voted the NAIA's Most Valuable Player award in '75, and was selected to the Canadian Olympic Team. He was voted the Aztecs Rookie of the Year award last season, and calls the club's first game against the Cosmos last season his greatest thrill in soccer. John and wife Arde reside in Torrance.

TERRY FISHER SAYS: He converted to defense from a wing position at his own suggestion, and that will help us considerably. His quickness and willingness to attack allows him to mark opposing players very effectively.

16-LEIF REDAL

6-2, 185 Defender Born May 26, 1956 Tacoma, Washington

The Aztecs second-round draft choice in 1978, Redal gained ample soccer experience during four years

at UCLA. There, his teams advanced once to the NCAA final four, and three other times to the finals of the Western Regionals.



Originally from Tacoma, Washington, Leif is one of the biggest Aztecs players at 6-2, 185 pounds. He has been an All-Coast Team selection twice, and comes to the Aztecs with expectations of seeing much playing time in 1978. Redal is single and lives in Torrance.

TERRY FISHER SAYS: We expect Leif can contribute to this team, as indicated by our drafting him in the second round. He's a hard worker and dependable.

1-BOB RIGBY

6-0, 175 Goalkeeper Born July 3, 1951 Ridley Park, Pa.

Bob is undoubtedly one of the finest American players in the North American Soccer League,



and is ready to re-establish himself at the top of league goalkeepers. Following his graduation from East Stroudsburg State College in Pennsylvania, Rigby went on to become an immediate star in the fledging NASL in 1973 as a member of the Philadelphia Atoms. During his first pro season that year, "Rigs" set the soccer world on its ear with an astounding record-setting goals against average of 0.62 per game. In the following two seasons, his average was an equally impressive 1.10 and 1.59, with a cumulative total of 13 shutouts. Rigby recorded five shutouts as the number one keeper with the Cosmos in '76, and moved to Los Angeles last season. Struggling through his first "off-season" in five years, Rigby's '77 average of 2.46 goals against raised his career average to 1.42-a figure that still ranks among league leaders. A tremendous physical specimen, Bob was a featured contestant in the 1975 Superstars competition and won respect for all soccer players with a fourth place finish. He and wife Dale have a new four-month-old son.

TERRY FISHER SAYS: Bob is unquestionably one of the finest all-around athletes in this or any league. He is a phenomenal trainer with tremendous reactions. We expect he will continue to be a steadying influence for us on the field.

2-BOBBY SIBBALD

5-6, 150 Defender Born January 25, 1948 Hebburn, England

Bobby Sibbald returns to the Aztecs for his third season. Originally a member of the '75 side, he



missed the '76 season, but rejoined the club again in '77. And last year was surely his best of the two. Playing in 25 games, Sibbald proved to be the anchor of the Aztecs defense, and still managed to move forward for a goal and four assists. He began his playing career with Leeds United, and was with that club for five years. From there, he transferred to York F.C., before joining Southport, where he played for six seasons. Sibbald is considered a tenacious fullback, and his quickness makes him an excellent one-on-one defender. He will make numerous runs into the offensive end and was the team's 4th leading scorer in his first NASL

season in Los Angeles ('75). Bobby and wife Brenda have a nine-year-old son and he currently reside in Redondo Beach.

TERRY FISHER SAYS: Bobby Sibbald is probably the best attacking fullback in the league. He's very skillful, and has the tremendous ability to read a situation and respond to it properly. He knows what will happen and where.

10-WOLFGANG SUHNHOLZ

5-11, 175 Midfielder Born September 14, 1946 Berlin, West Germany

Entering his fourth North American Soccer League season, Wolfgang figures to become a



Wolfgang popular figure with Aztecs fans. His colorful nature on the field, as well as off, in infectious. And in addition to flamboyance, he is equally as talented at his position. Suhnholz originally played NASL soccer with the Boston Minutemen, before moving on to the Toronto Metros at playoff time in 1976. He proved his worth there immediately, leading his team through the tournament to the league championship, and in the process earned the title game's MVP award. 

AZTECS ON RADIO/TV

The Aztecs radio and television package for 1978 is highlighted by the addition of three key Southern California stations to form the club's broadcast network. KIIS Radio 1150-AM, a company of Combined Communications Corporation , airs all Aztecs games home and away. KTTV, Channel 11 carries nine games this season on Los Angeles area television (schedule page 1). Calling the play-by-play for all games (with the exception of the July 9 TVS telecast) is Chick Hearn, veteran voice of the Los Angeles Lakers. Hearn is currently in his 17th season of broadcasting Laker action, and is currently working on a consecutive game string of more than 1,150 without a miss. Previous soccer experience includes play-by-play for the Los Angeles Wolves in the late 1960's. His partner the season is Norm Jackson, returning for his fourth season with the Aztecs. Presently, Jackson's full-time duties outside of the broadcast booth include a position as Director of Coaching for the California Soccer Association South.

For the increasing number of Spanish speaking fans throughout Southern California, KWKW Radio 1300-AM airs Aztecs home games live from the Rose Bowl with Antonio Gonzalez and Hernan Q. Escandon calling the action. Gonzalez, KWKW News & Sports Director, is a three-time recipient of The Golden Mike Award, presented for excellence and achievement in local news and sports coverage. Escandon is KWKW's popular air personality, whose daily program can be heard from 2-6 p.m.

FOR THE MEDIA

THE ROSE BOWL is located one-half mile from the junction of the Foothill and Ventura/Colorado Freeways, between Arroyo Boulevard and Linda Vista Avenue. The stadium, surrounded on three sides by the Brookside Park Golf Course and Country Club, is within minutes of four additional major freeway arteries: Golden State, Glendale, Long Beach and Pasadena thoroughfares. The Rose Bowl is 15 minutes from downtown Los Angeles, and 45 minutes from Los Angeles International Airport.

Requests for all credentials should be made well in advance, and will designate seating assignments and on-field photo locations.

ROSE BOWL FACTS & FIGURES

Built originally in 1922, Pasadena's famed Rose Bowl has been a landmark ever since. The 104,699 seat stadium, originally constructed for \$272,198, is unmatched in its natural set beauty and annually attracts the largest sports crowd in this country for New Years Day football.

Throughout the years, the Rose Bowl has been expanded several times. In the mid 1930's, the south end was enclosed to complete the bowl. In late 1950, the same south end was enlarged even moreso, bringing the top row of seats even with the rest of the stadium. A later move in 1968 removed the original running track from around the playing field, where permanent loge seating is now available.

For the past 20 years, the New Years game has been a total sell-out, and two years ago the Rose Bowl was the site for the biggest Super Bowl crowd in history. With a field area of approximately four acres and compact seating facilities, the bowl would hold 2.8 million gallons if filled to the top.
