MEDIA INFORMATION

Credentials: News media representatives on assignment who do not hold press box credentials for the entire season should request single game credentials at least one day in advance by writing or calling the Rowdies' Public Relations office. Credentials will be left under the individual's name at the press gate at the South-west end of Tampa Stadium to be picked up at or prior to game time. Please do not be offended if asked for identification.

Photographers: Field photographers should enter press gate, pick up credentials and go directly to the field. Photographers are asked to avoid both team benches as much as possible — only passing behind the visitor's bench and completely avoiding the home bench. Any special assignments requiring proximity to home bench or lockerroom access should be registered with the Rowdies PR office. Such assignments can easily be arranged — but must be **pre**arranged. Photographers lines are drawn on the field for all games and outlined on the back of the photographer's credential. Compliance is appreciated.

Press Box: The Rowdies use the first level (PB 1) of the Tampa Stadium press box for all members of the working press, except live broadcasts, which are located on PB 2. Three courtesy phones are located on PB 1. Refreshments are served on PB 2. All media members except photographers are asked to stay in the press box until the last 15 minutes of the game. Family members or friends are not permitted in the press box.

Copy Transmission: The Rowdies make available for media use a Xerox telecopier at every game. Representatives from Am-Fax will also be present, making available FAX and teleram service upon request.

Lockerrooms: Admission to lockerrooms after the games is governed by issued credentials. Members of the working press will be admitted ten minutes after end of game. There is **no** admission to lockerrooms before the game.

The Rowdies' President and sole owner personifies the very essence of the Tampa Bay Rowdies. George, as he prefers to be called, exudes the confidence and optimism that makes the



Rowdies organization a success in the Bay area as well as the NASL.

An active contributor to American soccer, George is the Chairman of the NASL Marketing Committee, Chairman of the NASL Indoor Soccer Committee, and a past member of the NASL Executive Committee.

As athletically inclined as the players on his team, George is part owner of the NHL's Buffalo Sabers hockey team and an avid horseman. A champion amateur rider, he has ridden many of his thoroughbreds to victory in the steeplechase category representing the Strawbridge's Augustin stable. In 1979, the champion mare Waya, of which he is part owner, won the Eclipse Award, which is the top categorical award in thoroughbred racing. George's horses have won Eclipse awards the last three years. George is also a member of the prestigious Jockey Club.

A resident of Philadelphia, George is a graduate of Trinity College in Connecticut where he played intercollegiate lacrosse. He earned his Doctorate of Philosophy in Latin American History from the University of Pennsylvania in 1966. George is also a veteran of the college classroom where he taught Latin American History and political science for the past ten years.

His total commitment to his 1974 franchise has endeared him to Bay Area fans as he rarely misses a Rowdies game or a community affair highlighting his team.

Charles Serednesky, Jr.

Executive Vice Pres. and G. M.

Charles (Chas) Serednesky, Jr. is the man who keeps the ball rolling at the Rowdies.

Entering his third season as Exec-

utive Vice President and General Manager, Chas has been an administrator with the Rowdies since 1974 when the franchise was founded. Chas began his association with the Rowdies as Business Manager putting together the overall business and promotional framework under which the Rowdies still operate.

A promotion to Administrative Vice President was effected in 1976 and responsibility was expanded to include all club financial affairs. In 1978 Chas was promoted to Executive Vice President and General Manager — the chief operating officer of the Rowdies.

A resident of Tampa, Chas is a graduate in Business Administration of Youngstown University, where he played intercollegiate baseball and basketball. He earned his Masters of Science degree in Sports Administration from the prestigious Ohio University.

Eddie played as a midfielder for the Rowdies in '75 and '76 before joining the front office team a year ago. He heads the community involvement and youth devel-

ducts soccer instruction throughout the Bay Area as a major part of his commitment to youth development. A graduate of Hartwick College in New York, Eddie is also a U.S.S.F. "A" licensed coach.

Bob joined the Rowdies last year to coordinate KICK advertising and oversee group and season ticket sales. A marketing graduate from Purdue University, he is currently enrolled in the MBA program

at USF. Bob oversees the efforts of Sales and Marketing and directs the entire Rowdies sales program, working closely with Corporate Sales and Marketing representatives. Mike Hern and Danette Lynch. Heavily involved in sales related promotions, Bob is largely responsible for presenting the Rowdies to the business community and soliciting their active involvement.

ROWDIES HISTORY

SUCCESS REPEATS ITSELF



The Rowdies story actually began on July 19, 1974, when the North American Soccer League awarded George Strawbridge, Jr. and Beau Rogers the league's sixteenth franchise. Five days

later Eddie Firmani was named head coach - upon a strong recommendation from current coach Gordon Jago. Scotland's Alex Pringle was the first player signed in late October. One month later, after receiving hundreds of entries in a "Name the Team" contest, Tampa Bay's first pro soccer club had a name - the "Rowdies." On Valentines Day 1975 the Bay Area fans took the Rowdies to their hearts as the new team won their debut indoors in a 7-2 trouncing over the Washington Diplomats at St. Pete's Bayfront Center. The Rowdies' outdoor debut also produced victory with a 2-1 overtime win over the Rochester Lancers. The Rowdies ended the season with a 16-6 expansion record and a 2-0 championship victory over Portland in the first ever Soccer Bowl before 17,009 fans. An average 12,064 "Fannies" came out to watch their Rowdies play that first year.



Tampa Bay continued their winning ways in '76 by taking the NASL Indoor championship beating Rochester 6-4 and sporting an exceptional 18-6 outdoor record to take a second straight

Eastern division title. A 2-0 loss to Toronto ended the Rowdies' championship drive as the Metros went on to win the NASL title. The Rowdies, in the meantime, saw 16,452 fans come out to see them at each game, and looked ahead to next year.



This year of turmoil began on a high note as the Rowdies hosted the famed Zenit of Leningrad in an outdoor-indoor series. They lost both but drew record breaking crowds to

Tampa Stadium (41,611) and the Bayfront Center (6,345). In May, another record breaking crowd of 45,288 packed Tampa Stadium to watch the Rowdies defeat Franz Beckenbauer and the Cosmos 4-2. Two days later, Eddie Firmani, the Rowdies' first and only coach, quit for personal reasons. Captain Lenny Glover and then John Boyle finished the season as coach for the Rowdies, who made it to the playoffs for the third straight year with a 14-12 record. The Cosmos, coached coincidently by Eddie Firmani, beat the Rowdies 3-0 in the first game and took the NASL championship. A new average attendance record was established as 20,280 fans saw Rowdies action at each game.



On December 5, 1977, the year of rebuilding began as Gordon Jago, a renowned and long sought after English coach, was hired. After a 6-2 indoor season and an 18-12 outdoor season,

Jago and his Rowdies entered the playoffs as the American-Eastern runners-up with the cocky claim that they would make it to the Soccer Bowl. And they did, beating Chicago, San Diego and then Ft. Lauderdale. New York stopped them again, but the Rowdies had won another American Conference championship. Average attendance for each game was 18,123.



In another prolific year for Tampa Bay, the Rowdies decided early to make it to Soccer Bowl for the second straight year. And that they did. But the going wasn't easy. Along the

way, the Rowdies added more treasures to their chest as they captured the American-Eastern title, with a regular season record of 19-11, and the American Conference title. Oscar Fabbiani led the league in scoring, and set a team record as well, with 58 total points all in his first NASL season. After defeating Detroit, Philadelphia and San Diego in playoff games, the Rowdies went to New York to meet the tough Vancouver Whitecaps. It was a tight match, but Vancouver took the honors, 2-1. The Rowdies average attendance jumped to number two in the league with 28,546 per game. The NASL's first indoor season ended successfully as the Rowdies played out an 8-4 season record and defeated Memphis for the championship title of the very first NASL Indoor Season.



STABILITY THE KEY TO '80

Surprise!

The 1980 Tampa Bay Rowdies are going to look very similar to the 1979 Rowdies. Oh, a few familiar faces have been replaced with younger ones but for the most part the team is intact.

"Stability," says Jago. "That's what I hoped to achieve when I first came to the Rowdies and we're almost there. Individual talent alone won't take you to the top. You need well organized, carefully calculated team work to support individual brilliance. And you can't develop that kind of team work when you clean house every year. It's just impossible."

"The Rowdies will enter the '80 season with more returning starters than ever before. And we've played together through the indoor season too. I think those two factors alone will give us an edge over last year's performance."

Jago plans to brave the '80 season with a much trimmer roster than last year. It's a risk, he admits, because of injury but one that's worth taking to give every member of the team some playing time.

"I think we can carry it off," says the Rowdies' head boss, "because we not only have talented and versatile players, but professionals . . . players who will give everything they've got in any position they're asked to play."

The Rowdies are carrying an extra body in the goalkeeping ranks in lanky Ulster Community standout Kevin Clinton. One of the Rowdies' draft choices, Kevin will most likely see most NASL games this year from the bench. When you've got two in front of you like Winston DuBose and Zeljko Bilecki it's fair to say they'll dominate playing time. Bilecki played with the title winning Rowdies through the indoor season finishing with a 4.74 goals against average. Florida Cracker Winston DuBose trained with Ipswich Town's reserve team through the winter, honing up his netminding skills and English accent. It's hard to say who will win the starting nod. Last year "Z" took 17 games with a 1.28 goals against average and Dancin' Du' grabbed 13 to the tune of 1.84 goals against. But it is safe to say that the Rowdies can count on top class performances from either.

The Rowdies' defense will see more change than any other area on the field. Gone are English loaners Barry Kitchener and Manny Andruszewski. But back are All Stars Mike Connell (first team) and John Gorman (second team). Connell's trademark is consistency and he's corroborated that claim to fame through the indoor season. John Gorman can play in the right or left back slot and which he does will probably depend on who the other back is. Rowdie fans will enjoy watching the same type of overlapping play Gorman gives from one of any number of North American candidates — Sandje

Ivanchukov, Peter Chandler and Paul Mott or English defender Farrukh Quraishi. The man in the middle to replace Big Barry will be Yugoslavian Refik Kozic. A Yugoslavian international from Partizan, "Kokie" carries the height and experience to hold down that central spot with authority. Says Jago, "Eight years in the Yugoslavian first division gives a player first class experience. We'll be looking to use that know-how in our set plays — both offensively and defensively."

The midfield hasn't changed from last year. Captain Jan Van Der Veen will probably be back in the central midfield spot, flanked by Canadian Wes McLeod and Yugoslavian standout Peter Baralic. It's a powerful combination. Look for Van Der Veen to take the defensive stance as McLeod and Baralic break on the attack. McLeod boasts speed and good ball skills. Baralic, an awesome shot and excellent vision. Other midfield support could come from Americans Perry Van Der Beck, Paul Mott or veteran Peter Anderson.

Up front the Rowdies are missing the familiar face of Rodney Marsh but they field a surplus of talent, nonetheless. Oscar Fabbiani must come to mind first. Last year's league leading scorer rocked the indoor game with his intelligent movement on and off the ball and his accurate shot. In only nine games he scored 15 goals and 16 assists.

Steve Wegerle is back and the indoor game may have been just the thing this speedy winger needed. Plagued by inconsistent performances on astroturf during the regular season, Wegerle was forced to play an entire schedule on it because of indoor. By the playoffs he had obviously mastered it. He scored 11 goals in five matches.

The Rowdies can also field Peter Anderson or newly acquired Neill Roberts up front. Anderson is entering his third year with Tampa Bay. Roberts comes to the Rowdies via Atlanta from South Africa. Roberts scored 14 goals in 19 games last year for the Chiefs and when he knocked in four in one game against the Rowdies in indoor, they decided to put a stop to it. They purchased his contract and signed him to a multi-year pact. Roberts' height (6-2) is expected to make him an excellent target man for Wegerle's crosses and Fabbiani's one touch passes.

"So there you have it," says Jago. "Versatility, talent, even brilliance. There's not a weak link."

Bay Area fans might agree after watching the Rowdies annihilate their indoor competition on their way to the inaugural NASL indoor championship; but Jago warns it's a different game.

"We'll use our indoor experience for fitness, ball skills and a winning psychology. But now we've got to go out and win another title of another game."

COACHING STAFF



Gordon Jago and Keith Peacock.

Between the two of them, they've played 29 years of professional soccer.

Gordon Jago spent his twelve years at Charlton Athletic F.C. as a defender.

Keith Peacock spent his seventeen years at Charlton Athletic F.C. as a forward and then a midfielder.

Put the two together as head coach and assistant coach, mix them up with a few Rowdies, and you've got a formula for success.

Gordon's coaching career reads like a who's who in English soccer. Spanning nearly 20 years on both sides of the Atlantic, Gordon began coaching for Eastbourne United in 1962. In 1966, he was appointed assistant manager and coach of Fulham F.C. English League First Division.

Then, in 1968, he came to the United States and the NASL as head coach of the Baltimore Bays. Back to England two years later, Gordon served as head coach for the famed Queens Park Rangers F.C. First Division, later becoming its manager.

In 1975 it was on to Milwall F.C. Second Division as manager and finally, in 1977, back to the U.S. and the Tampa Bay Rowdies.

As American Conference defending champions, Gordon feels that stability will be the key word as he enters his third year as head coach with Tampa Bay.

"It takes three years to build a strong organization," he says. "Our play will be more organized and more stable by virtue of being together."

With the Rowdies career win/loss record of 54-31, indoor and outdoor combined, Gordon predicts the 1980 season will be Tampa Bay's best soccer to date.

After the '79-80 NASL Indoor Championship title, the Rowdies are already on their way.

Playing a big role in the Rowdies' indoor championship drive was assistant coach Keith Peacock. His addition to the Rowdies' coaching staff has been a major plus for Tampa Bay.

Keith came to the Rowdies late last year from an assistant coach/player role with the ASL's Columbus Magic.

Prior to his arrival in the United States, Keith spent seventeen years as a professional soccer player with Charlton Athletic F.C. from 1962 to 1975. He played as a winger and then was shifted to a midfield position.

As a midfielder, Keith captained Charlton from '75 to '79. He also earned his team's Most Valuable Player award in 1972, 1978 and 1979. Appearing in 580 league and cup matches, Keith established a team record as an outfield player.


In preparation for his eventual coaching career, Keith earned his F.A. full badge in 1970.



CONDENSED RULES OF \$



Rule 1 — The Field of Play. (Diagram above).

- Rule 2 The Ball (NASL approved Ball Adidas) circumference 27"-28", weight 4 oz.-16 oz.
- Rule 3 Number of Players. Each team consists of 11 players, one of whom must be the goalkeeper. A maximum of three substitutes may be used.
- Rule 4 Player Equipment. Consists of a shirt, shorts, stockings and shoes. Goalkeeper must wear colors which distinguish him from the other players.
- Rule 5 Referees. One referee is appointed for each match. He is responsible for control of the game and his decisions are final.
- Rule 6 Linesman. Two linesmen assist the referee by indicating offside, when the ball is out of play, and which team is entitled to the corner kick or throw in.
- Rule 7 Duration of the Game. Shall be two equal periods of 45 minutes unless otherwise agreed upon.
- Note: See NASL Tiebreaker Procedure.

Rule 8 — The Start of Play. A flip of coin decides which team will kick off. Each team must stay on its own half of the field and the defending players must be at least 10 vards from the ball until it is kicked.

After a goal the team scored upon will kick off. After halftime the teams change ends and the kickoff will be taken by the opposite team to that which started the game. A goal cannot be scored directly from a kickoff.

- Rule 9 Ball In and Out of Play. The ball is out of play when (a) it has wholly crossed the goal line or touchline, whether on the ground or in the air, or (b) when the game has been stopped by the referee.
- Rule 10 Method of Scoring. A goal is scored when the whole of the ball has passed over the goal line, between the goal posts and under the cross bar.
- Rule 11 Offside. A player is in an offside position if he is nearer to his opponents' goal line than the ball, unless:
 - a) he is in his own half of the field of play, or
 - b) there are at least two of his opponents nearer their own goal line than he is.
- A player shall only be declared offside and penalized for being in an offside position, if, at the moment the ball touches, or is played by, one of his team, he is, in the opinion of the Referee:

OCCER

- a) interfering with play or with an opponent, or
- b) seeking to gain an advantage by being in that position.

A player shall not be declared offside by the Referee:

- a) merely because of his being in an offside position, or
- b) if he receives the ball, direct, from a goal kick, a corner kick, a throw-in, or when it has been dropped by the Referee.

If a player is declared offside, the Referee shall award an indirect free kick, which shall be taken by a player of the opposing team from the place where the infringement occurred, unless the offense is committed by a player in his opponent's goal area, in which case, the free kick shall be taken from a point anywhere within that half of the goal area in which the offense occurred.

Note: This is the Traditional Rule. In 1973 the NASL introduced a "Blue Line" concept with a line drawn the width of the field 35 yards from each goal (see diagram). Under the new rule an attacking player is not offside until he is within 35 yards of his opponent's goal rather than midfield, as under the Traditional Rule.

Rule 12 — Fouls and Misconduct. A player who intentionally attempts to or actually: (a) kicks, (b) trips, (c) jumps at, (d) charges violently, (e) charges from behind, (f) strikes, (g) holds or (h) pushes an opponent, or (i) intentionally handles the ball shall be penalized by a direct free kick. Any one of these nine offensescommitted in the penalty area by a defender will result in the awarding of a penalty kick to the offensive team.

A player committing less flagrant violations such as offside, dangerous plays, obstruction or ungentlemanly conduct will be penalized by an indirect free kick.

Rule 13 — Free Kicks. Are classified into two categories: "Direct" (from which a goal can be scored directly against the offending side) and "Indirect" (from which a goal cannot be scored unless the ball has been touched by a player other than the kicker before entering the goal).

For all free kicks the offending team must be at least 10 yards from the ball until it is kicked.

- Rule 14 Penalty Kick. A direct free kick taken at the penalty mark. All players except the player taking the kick and the goalkeeper must stay outside the penalty area and at least 10 yards from the ball (hence the arc at edge of penalty area).
- Rule 15 Throw in. When the ball has wholly crossed the touchline it is put back into play by a throw in from the spot where it went out and by a player from the opposite team that last touched it. A goal cannot be scored directly from a throw in.
- Rule 16 Goal Kick. When the ball has wholly crossed the goal line after being last touched by a player from the attacking team, it is put back into play by a kick from the goal area by the defending team.
- Rule 17 Corner Kick. When the ball has wholly crossed the goal line after being last touched by a player from the defending team, it is put back into play by a kick from the corner on the side the ball went out by the attacking team.

Style: A very experienced and versatile player, Anderson can take almost any position on the field. Always exhibits tight control and accurate passing. Good vision and thorough knowledge of the game allows him to take up excellent position in the attack and be a consistent goal scorer.

1979 Season: Missed the entire regular season because of commitments to Sheffield United (played on loan 'til May) and a broken collar bone (suffered in his next to last scheduled match with Sheffield). But came off the injured reserve list to appear in six playoff games for the Soccer Bowl bound Rowdies. Played with the Rowdies' Championship indoor team this winter, scoring the game winning goal of the championship mini-game. Scored 7 goals-11 assists during twelve game indoor season.

Career: Anderson signed his first professional contract at 21 with English second division Luton Town in 1971. He played five years with them before joining Antwerp of Belgium for two years. From Antwerp both he and Rowdie Van Der Veen joined the San Diego Sockers in '78. The Rowdies purchased Anderson mid-season. A major contributor to Tampa Bay's '78 playoff drive, he scored two playoff goals — one against his former teammates in San Diego.

Personal: Single. A certified accountant, Anderson owns a sporting goods store in Belgium and interests in "The Seafood Center" in Tampa. He's an enthusiastic, if not particularly proficient, golfer.



1979 Season: An almost unbelievable inaugural season for this goalscoring phenom. For starters, he won the NASL scoring title in his very first year. Only one other player has done that - the Cosmos' Giorgio Chinaglia. And Fabbiani stole the title from the same man who had held it for two consecutive years. He did it with 25 goals and 8 assists for 58 points. One of those goals won him Goal of the Year honors and five (scored in one game) put him in the league record books. Fabbiani's mid season scoring outburst broke ten team scoring records and earned him the NASL Offensive Player of the Week. His steady season long performance earned him team MVP honors and a spot on the Second NASL All Stars. He was selected as the Co-Player of the Year along with Johan Cruyff by the PSRA. Although he'd never even seen the indoor game 'til this year, Fabbiani took to it quickly. He scored 15 goals and 16 assists in just nine games of the Rowdies' championship indoor season.

Career: Fabbiani started his career with Boca-Juniors of Argentina as a school boy of 15. He stayed with the Argentinian club for six years before a 1973 transfer to Monte Video. A ten month stint with San Felipe of Chile followed before Fabbiani joined Palestino and blossomed as a goalscorer. In five years with Palestino he scored 163 goals in 182 games. 



No bonus points will be awarded for goals scored in overtime or the Shootout. Winning teams who score three or more goals in the game will receive nine points in the league standings. Losing teams can get no more than three points (for three or more goals) in the standings.

Formula for Breaking Standings Ties for Playoff Positions

An eight-step procedure is used to determine the order of finish in regular season play if there are any ties that exist in the point totals. The order of finish within a division is determined as follows:

- b. greatest number of points; accrued by results only (i.e., no bonus points)
- c. the greater goal difference (goals for minus goals against)
- d. the most outright wins (i.e., no overtime, no shootout wins)
- e. the greater number of goals scored
- f. procedures a thru c applied to road games only
- g. procedures a thru c applied to home games only
- h. coin toss

NASL Tiebreaker Procedure/ The Shootout

NASL games which are tied at the end of regulation play will be extended by 15 minutes of "sudden death" overtime (two 7½-minute periods). A flip of the coin will decide which team will kick off. The first team to score a goal, either from the field or by a penalty kick, wins the game.

If the game remains tied at the end of the second overtime period, the outcome will be decided by The Shootout which involves players on each team challenging the opposing goalkeeper in a one-on-one situation.

The visiting team will kick first and each team will take five chances in alternate order. Attacking players will start with the ball on the 35-yard line and must take their shot within five seconds. Goalkeepers have no movement restrictions within the five-second period in accordance with normal rules of play.

The kicks shall be ended when one team has achieved an insurmountable advantage, such as scoring on its first three kicks while their opponents miss their first three.

If the teams remain tied after the prescribed five attempts, they shall continue to take alternate kicks until one has scored more than the other after an equal number of attempts. Only players in the game at the end of the second overtime period shall be eligible to take such kicks except that each team may substitute for its goalkeeper at any time during the Shootout. Such a substitute may be selected from any of the players included on a team's official line-up card submitted prior to the start of the game. However, once a goalkeeper has been substituted for, he may not be reinstated. Goalkeepers shall not take kicks. No player may take a second kick until all other eligible members of his team have done so, at which time they shall continue in any order the team may wish, i.e., they do not have to kick in the same rotation.


