### **Press Information and Guidelines**

PRESS BOX: Welcome to the 1979 season of the Memphis Rogues and the North American Soccer League. We have a beautiful press box and we intend to operate it in a professional manner with your assistance. The working press area is located on the first level of the three-story press box at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium. All working news media should enter the press gate behind the press box by the elevator. Credentials must be presented. When leaving the press box you must obtain "return pass stub" from elevator man if you plan on re-entering the box later.

**CREDENTIALS:** If you have not requested credentials prior to the season and need them, you must request them in writing one week in advance from Rudi Schiffer, Vice President, Memphis Rogues, 2200 Union Ave., Memphis, Tennessee 38104. Credentials can then be picked up on game night from the "Will Call" window at the main ticket office Hollywood entrance.

TELEVISION AND RADIO: Visiting TV (third level, booth #3) and visiting radio (second level booth #3) have ample seating. A radio coupler and phone is provided in the radio booth with line charges to be billed directly to your club. TV producers should contact the Liberty Bowl Superintendent, AI Brown, directly, to coordinate TV logistics. Telephone 901-272-1214. Visiting radio coupler is 901-276-1342 with backup 901-276-1388. Home radio is 901-276-1385.

**PHOTOGRAPHERS:** Field photographers should enter the South Tunnel and go directly to the field. All field photographers must wear credentials at all times. There is also a photo deck (covered) on the third level of the press box, and your pass grants you access to that level only. Field photographers are cautioned that the area of the team bench and either side of it for ten yards, are off limits to nonplaying personnel per league regulations. Field photographers must also remain outside of white restrictive photographer's lines or at least two vards from the playing horders at all times.

lines, or at least two yards from the playing borders at all times. FREELANCE PHOTOGRAPHERS: Freelance photographers are advised to take special note of the following policy:

"Freelance photographers must have working press credentials issued for the privilege of covering matches. In return, the freelancer agrees to supply the Rogues PR department with at least three black and white & X10" pictures at no charge within five days following the game. The Rogues are entitled to use the pictures for publicity purposes but the photographer will retain the negative and rights to enter said photos in the NASL Photo Contest."

AMFAX COMMUNICATIONS: AMFAX Communications services will be available on the first level of the press box upon request. In addition to FAX services, they will also provide VDT (Teleram) on-line typesetting. Anyone requiring such services can contact AMFAX Communications, 40 Pleasant St., S. Weymouth, Mass. 02190, (617) 337-3415, (24 hour service) Pamela Girouard. Requests must be made to AMFAX 24 hours prior to game!

game! PRESS BOX SERVICES: Statistics, pre-game, during the game and post game, will be supplied from the stat center at the right end of the first level. Kits will be supplied prior to each game at your seat or upon demand from Alan Saloman, your press box supervisor. Refreshments and food are served in the press box area before and during the game. Admission to the press area is strictly limited to members of the news media, stat crews and assisting PR personnel. No one else is admitted to these areas and we kindly request that you refrain from cheering that disturbs the working media. We will also provide a telecopier. There will be two phones, one for incoming calls from other teams with scores (901-276-1406) and one for credit card calls for visiting clubs (901-276-1405). There are also six pay phones located on the first level just behind your seats.

There are also six pay phones located on the first level just behind your seats. LOCKER ROOM POLICY: Admission to the locker room is governed by credentials issued by the Rogues. There is no admission to the locker room prior to the game and they will open ten minutes after the end of the game. Locker rooms are located on the south end of the field under the stands. Final stats will be brought to the locker rooms.

### **Club Capsule History**

Now in their second year of operation, the Memphis Rogues are building a foundation for the future with a goal of being one of the best operated franchises in the NASL.

Solely owned by H. T. Mangurian, Jr., the second-year Rogues completed their initial season in the league with an average attendance of 9,500 and fully expect to improve on that figure substantially for 1979. In addition, a pledge drive that was started to keep the team from moving from Memphis generated an outpouring of support for the club after the season. The result is expected to more than double 1978 season ticket sales.

Under the direction of owner Mangurian, newly appointed Vice President of Operations, Rudi Schiffer, and Coach Eddie McCreadie, the Rogues reorganized over the winter, made several key player trades to strengthen the club, came up with an excellent player draft, and put together a roster well in advance of the season. This gave McCreadie the lead time to organize a team, something which he didn't enjoy in 1978 when he was hired and given only five weeks to complete and train a squad.

The result was a start of nine losses but once McCreadie, the legendary Chelsea fullback, put his fine Scottish touch to the team, they rocked the soccer world with their first two wins, a 3-1 stunner over Dallas, and a real shocker, a 1-0 upset of the mighty Cosmos. The Rogues and McCreadie became national names off that victory and with virtually the same nucleus of players from last year and the addition of several others, the Rogues figure to be a strong competitor in the American Conference Central Division.

In winter trades the club acquired Frantz St. Lot and Gene DuChateau. St. Lot is a talented right back from the Tampa Bay Rowdies, the team that was a finalist in the 1978 Soccer Bowl. He is expected to give the Rogues a much strengthened defense over last year. DuChateau is a very solid goalkeeper and was picked up from Oakland. A three year veteran in the NASL, he is viewed as a strong competitor for the starting job that John Houska earned last year with an excellent record in his rookie season.

Because of the team's pride and spirit in every game, there developed in Memphis an almost fanatical fan support that at times had visiting teams wondering why they didn't get the same support. It will be better in 1979 since Memphians have "Rallied 'Round the Rogues."





### Harry T. Mangurian, Jr., Chairman

Harry T. Mangurian, Jr., is the No. 1 fan of the Memphis Rogues in their quest for a championship in the North American Soccer League . . . and that's understandable!

It's not just the fact that he's the sole owner of the Rogues, but more so because of his exuberance, enthusiasm and total dedication to success whether his energies are directed to business or sporting endeavors. Second best is an unfamiliar result in his mind and he expects the Rogues to be competitive on the field and a vastly improved team over last year.

Mangurian's achievements are a matter of record. Following his formal education in Rochester, N.Y., and three years of U. S. Navy service in World War II (Pacific Theater), he fostered and developed a national chain of retail furniture stores bearing his name which ultimately were merged with General Portland, Inc. Concurrently, he launched a successful contracting and

Concurrently, he launched a successful contracting and management firm, Drexel Properties, Inc., which has developed and marketed more than 10,000 co-operative and condominium apartments in South Florida. The Drexel firm, based in Ft. Lauderdale, serves as the parent company of many varied endeavors, including condominium construction, warehousing and land development.

As a sportsman, Mangurian has extensive holdings in thoroughbred racing and breeding. Today, he enjoys watching his blue and beige Mockingbird Farm colors run at major race tracks throughout the United States. His breeding farm in Ocala is considered a model for the production and training of thoroughbreds.

Mangurian is also co-owner, with John Y. Brown, of the Boston Celtics of the National Basketball Association; and he is at courtside for virtually every game.

His varied business and sporting interests receive his personal attention, whether they are in Ft. Lauderdale, Ocala, Boston, Rochester or Memphis, requiring thousands of miles of travel every month. This task is made easier by using Southeastern Jet Corporation, his own charter jet service which has logged millions of air miles in the last decade. Born and raised in Rochester, Mangurian is a young 51 years of age, enjoys golf, tennis and skiing, and almost always is in the accompaniment of his beautiful wife, Dottie, who in her own right is a knowledgable and enthusiastic sports fan. 3



### **Rudi Schiffer**

### Vice President Operations Public Relations

Four years as an administrator and public relations practioner in professional soccer paid off for Rudi Schiffer after the 1978 season when he was appointed as vice president of operations for the Rogues. It was his initial task to reorganize the club and direct a successful season ticket drive aimed at Memphians who had pledged their support to the team for 1979.

Working closely with owner H. T. Mangurian, Schiffer is moving toward a goal of making the Rogues one of the most efficient and best operated franchises in the NASL. He has all-around experience and has worked in every phase of soccer operations as well as being a dedicated soccer fan. Schiffer is a former businessman who gave up a profitable advertising and public relations business to pursue a pro soccer career.

He learned his soccer in West Germany with the Armed Forces, was co-captain off the Boston University Soccer team in 1962 and has been involved in youth soccer as a coach and director. A native of Boston, he is married with two soccer-playing children.

Now a full-time resident of Germantown where he is involved in various community groups and projects, Schiffer is a dedicated believer in the future of soccer in the USA and its high potential in the Mid-South.

"Memphians have been drawn to pro soccer and the team has responded to them," said Schiffer. "The result is that this city could earn a name for itself as one of the best franchises in the NASL. The people here want a solid pro team and we will provide them with one because of their tremendous support."

An enthusiastic and tireless speaker who will go anywhere to promote the sport, Schiffer puts in long hours promoting the game he loves because he feels the game needs extra effort in the Mid-South where it was virtually unknown until recent times.

### Eddie McCreadie Head Coach

In 1978 Eddie McCreadie was thrown in the trenches of North American Soccer League battle before he had time to learn the names of his players. This year it will be different.

The coach of the Memphis Rogues was hired five weeks before the 1978 opener and given a mandate to put a team together in the shortest possible time. He accepted that challenge and although the club suffered nine straight defeats,



McCreadie hung in there with his charges and when they jelled, it was with a vengeance. They bopped Dallas 3-1, for the historical first Rogues victory and in the next match, whipped the mighty Cosmos, 1-0, for what ranks as one of the upsets of the season.

This year McCreadie, a Glasgow native, has the challenge of welding together a club built around a veteran nucleus, draft choices and new loan players. But challenges are a part of his lifestyle and he vows that his 1979 club will be competitive and difficult to defeat.

One of the more erudite coaches in the league today, McCreadie, 37, came to Memphis last season after coming to a parting of the ways with the famous Chelsea team of England's First Division.

Before becoming a coach, McCreadie earned accolades as one of the best fullbacks in England. He was good enough to play for Scotland 23 times in full internationals and he starred at left back for Chelsea from 1962 to 1974. He was so good that last year he was selected to the All-London team of the Decade.

When he hung up his boots his reliability and agressiveness on the field led to his appointment as manager of the Blues in 1975. He took them from the second division back to the first by 1977 and he was hailed as a miracle worker. He then had a difference of opinion on his contract with Chelsea and the Blues loss was Memphis' gain.

McCreadie's second year at Memphis will have another goal besides winning games. He fervently believes in the mission of soccer in this country and that is to develop the skills of American born players so that they can compete on even terms in the NASL with foreign imports.

"I would hope that all coaches from abroad would emphasize development of Americans," says McCreadie. "The game in this country has to be built around them and the sooner the better."

### **Meet the Players**



#### 0 **GENE DuCHATEAU...Goalkeeper**

6-0...180...25...American Rated a very solid keeper by Coach McCreadie, DuChateau also has three years of playing experience in the NASL and very good credentials that led to his acquisition in a trade with Oakland over the winter. In five starts last year was named "Defensive Player of the Game." Began career after graduation from Adelphi with former Connecticut Bicentennials and finished both seasons as starting keeper. Also had appearances with the U. S. National Team and the Olympic squad. Played one winter in Hong Kong and was selected to the city's pro all-star team, only American to gain that honor. Quick and aggressive, good on high crosses. (Pronounced: Doo-shat-toe)



JOHN HOUSKA ... Goalkeeper ... 6-0...190...22...American

It started with the Rogues first victory, 3-1 over Dallas, and built into a crescendo with the 1-0 upset of the season over the Cosmos . . . "Hooo-ska". The chant became the calling card of big John and he carried it well in his rookie year. In 19 matches he made 91 saves and gave up only 35 goals for a fine 1.84 goalsagainst-average. And he recorded four shutouts. Trained with Crystal Palace in England over the winter. Rated by Coach Eddie McCreadie as a future bright star in American soccer. Physical around the goal but can finesse it when the chips are down. Twice an All-American, member of the 1976 NCAA Division II championship team, Loyola of Baltimore. (Pronounced Hoo-ska)

#### **BOBBY THOMSON ... Defender** 6-0...170...33...British

Defense is his game but the experience of Bobby has also led to spot assignments in the midfield when the need was there. Saw action in 22 matches last year for 1947 minutes of play. Notched four assists and likes to go forward. Former MVP of the defunct Connecticut Bicentennials, a team leader in every respect. Played for England 8 times and former captain of Wolverhampton and Birmingham, Player of the Year in 1974 for Luton Town. Ability to react coolly under pressure is a key asset as well as his three years experience in the NASL. Used mainly at right back. Nicknamed the "B. T. Express.



3 DAVE GRIMALDI ... Defender... 6-0 ... 165 ... 24 ... American Obtained in trade last year from Dallas, saw 363 minutes of play at right back. Underwent knee operation over winter but regained fitness and had good spring training. Hardworker and serious. Has fine crossing ability as overlapping fullback.

### 4 RUBEN ASTIGARRAGA . . . Midfield . . . 6-0 . . . 170 . . . 28 Argentina

A very skilled midfielder acquired by the Rogues during pre-season training. "ASTI" played for Zacatepec in Mexico's First Division last year where he was the second leading scorer with 16 goals from midfield. Two years running was named to National All-Star Selection, picked by sportswriters in Mexico. Also played First Division in Argentina for Velez Sarfield where he was fourth leading scorer with 14 tallies in 1975, and for Chacarita. A playmaker with great vision on the field, provides insurance if Charlie Cooke gets injured. An exciting playmaker, nicknamed "ASTI." Married, son Ruben. (Pronounced: Ah-stig-a-raga)





#### 5 JOHN FAULKNER...Defender... 6-0...180...30...British

A staunch and consistent centerhalfback who marked some of the biggest names in the league out of games last season, Faulkner recorded 2547 minutes of play in 29 matches. Excellent ability in the air, used on the attack on special plays and scored two goals. A rugged six-footer, he is in second year with Rogues after he was purchased from England's Luton Town. Also played for Leeds United. Expected to anchor defensive back four this year.

#### JIMMY HUSBAND...Forward... 5-8...160...31...English

Off to a slow start in 1978, Jimmy finished the season in top form and wound up with 9 goals to lead the Rogues in that department. His luck changed when he was assigned his old lucky number 7 and he promptly beat San Jose with his first goal wearing it. Sharp in the box, he takes advantage of the smallest opening. Also notched 4 assists for total of 22 points, second best on team. With year in league under his belt, he is expected to be a top offensive threat for Rogues. Has history of scoring goals, racked up 44 goals for Everton in 158 games and 37 for Luton in 115 before Rogues acquired him. Appeared in 28 games for 2480 minutes.



#### 8 CHARLIE COOKE...Midfielder... 5-9...160...35...Scottish

A legend at Chelsea where he helped produce some of that club's finest moments in soccer, Bonnie Prince Charlie is viewed as the key man in the Rogues' attack this season. Came to the club in a late season trade last year and appeared in only seven games for 607 minutes. Was hampered with a leg injury but is in top condition after training with London's Brentford in off season. A wizard with the ball in one-onone situations, he is highly creative and the playmaker the club lacked last year. Third year in the league after two seasons with Los Angeles. Two-time allleague selection with Aztecs.



**9** CHRIS NWOKOCHA...Forward 6-0...180...23...Nigerian Very fast, strong, excellent in the air and can score-read the scouting report on this rookie from Clemson, the Rogues' top draft selection in 1979. Rated by Coach McCreadie as top collegiate player in NCAA finals and expected to contribute substantially to Rogues offense in first year. Has more than usual experience of college senior, having played two years with Nigerian National team. Scored 60 goals over 4 years with Tigers for school record. Honorable mention

All-American. (Pronounced: Nah-wok-a-

chaw)



### (10) TONY FIELD . . . Forward . . . 5-8...155...32...English

Led the Rogues in points scored in 1978 with 25 from 7 goals and 11 assists. A dangerous man in the box with a proven talent of scoring the big goals and drawing key fouls. High point of the season was his opportunistic game winner in 1-0 upset over Cosmos, the team that traded him after he was named team MVP in 1977. Expected to improve goal production this year and be one-two punch with Jimmy Husband. Ability to remain fit and uninjured led to team-leading 2690 minutes of play in 29 games and missed only one game due to ejection. Highly experienced and a key man on special plays he was seasoned with a career that encompassed stints at Sheffield United and Blackburn, Has 119 career goals in English League play and appeared in 44 matches with Cosmos.




(12) HENRY McCULLY...Forward... 6-0...190...30...American His team-leading 72 fouls indicate why

His team-leading 72 fouls indicate why he is nicknamed "Mad Dog." But his spirited Scottish style of play is only one facet of his all-around ability. He played both forward and defense for the Rogues and did equally well in both areas. As a striker he notched 8 goals in only 35 shots, plus 3 assists. Highlight was fastest two goals in club history, a pair in the first 2:10 against San Diego. An on-the-field leader who never gives up, McCully is an inspirational player with four years experience in the league, having previously played for Connecticut. Born in Scotland, a naturalized American, lives year 'round in Connecticut.



HUGH O'NEILL . . . Midfield/ Forward . . . 5-10 . . . 160 . . . 24 American

A fast, attacking player with a good work rate, Hugh appeared in 12 matches for 715 minutes. Now in fourth year in NASL after playing for Dallas and Connecticut. Also played for Glasgow Rangers reserve team and is former twotime All-American from University of Bridgeport. First player ever signed by Rogues, scored two goals in '78.



Saw limited action as reserve last year but has good potential because of allaround athletic prowess. One of the fastest men on team, he can jump with anybody and is a threat in air. A first round draft choice of Cosmos, acquired in trade last year. Expected to continue development under Coach McCreadie and with more experience will be future factor in team's offense. Member of Brandeis University team that won Division III NCAA championship. Nicknamed "Cleve."



16 BEN POPOOLA . . . Midfield/ Forward . . . 5-10 . . . 160 . . . 25 Nigerian

Second draft choice in '79 from Clemson, was field general of Tiger team that made it to the NCAA finals. A playmaker who can also score, he is a steady unflappable player who has two years experience with Nigerian National team. High potential, according to Coach McCreadie, and expected to make impact in first year. Plays both forward and midfield. Honorable mention - Southern All-American team. (Pronounced: Pah-poo-la)





(17) CHRIS BENNETT . . . Midfield 5-9... 165... 27...Canadian Mild-mannered off the field, he is a dynamo on it. Redheaded Chris appeared in only five matches last year because of severe injury that forced his withdrawal from the team to recuperate. Came back to fitness over winter playing in Vancouver and ready to go again in '79. Has 13 appearances for Canadian National team and is in fourth year in league. A hardworker who defends with vigor, has the experience to help this vear.

#### 18 ROMAN ROSUL ... Forward ... 6-0...180...25...American



Hardworking Rosul made only 12 appearances for 819 minutes last year but somehow he still popped in 7 goals including a hat trick against San Jose and two goals in four minutes after coming on as a reserve to tie Detroit there. Tenacious around the goal he scores equally well from the air and on the ground. Sought after by two other league clubs over the winter, loaned to Detroit for European tour. Now in fourth year in league, has potential to be top American striker with more playing time. Easy going manner but punishing attacker and respected by defenders because of size and aggressiveness. (Pronounced: Russell)





(1) OSCAR PISANO ... Defender ... 5-10...155...22... Argentinian Formerly played with Argentino Jrs. in first division. Starred for Argentinian National Amateur Team in '74 and '75. A solid player who is always on the mark. Has extremely strong kick; excellent in the air against taller opposition. Nickname is "'Tano" because of his Italian descent.



6 STEVE LOVELL...Defender... 5-11...160...Welsh His teammates at Crystal Palace, England's top second division team, nicknamed him "Bionic." He can do it all, especially in the air where he is rated a superb player. Young and agressive he is expected to play alongside John Faulkner in the back four. Lovell has won honors having played on two youth cup winners for the Welsh Schoolboy International team and Welsh Youth International team.



### **Condensed Rules of Soccer**

Rule 1 — The Field of Play. (Diagram above).

- Rule 2 The Ball (NASL approved Ball Adidas) circumference 27"-28", weight 14 oz.-16 oz.
- Rule 3 Number of Players. Each team consists of 11 players, one of whom must be the goalkeeper. A maximum of three substitutes may be used.
- Rule 4 Player Equipment. Consists of a shirt, shorts, stockings and shoes. Goalkeeper must wear colors which distinguish him from the other players.
- Rule 5 Referees. One referee is appointed for each match. He is responsible for control of the game and his decisions are final.
- Rule 6— Linesmen. Two linesmen assist the referee by indicating offside, when the ball is out of play, and which team is entitled to the corner kick or throw in.
- Rule 7— Duration of the Game. Shall be two equal periods of 45 minutes unless otherwise agreed upon.
- Note: See NASL Tiebreaker Procedure.
- Rule 8— The Start of Play. A flip of coin decides which team will kick off. Each team must stay on its own half of the field and the defending players must be at least 10 yards from the ball until it is kicked.

After the goal the team scored upon will kick off. After halftime the teams change ends and the kickoff will be taken by the opposite team to that which started the game. A goal cannot be scored directly from a kickoff.

- Rule 9— Ball In and Out of Play. The ball is out of play when (a) it has wholly crossed the goal line or touchline, whether on the ground or in the air, or (b) when the game has been stopped by the referee.
- Rule 10 Method of Scoring. A goal is scored when the whole of the ball has passed over the goal line, between the goal posts and under the cross bar.
- Rule 11 Offside. A player is offside if he is nearer his opponents' goal line than the ball at the moment the ball is played unless, (a) he is in his own half of the field of play, (b) there are two of his opponents nearer to their own goal line than he is, (c) the ball last touched an opponent or was last played by him or (d) hereceives the ball directly from a goal kick, a corner kick, a throw in, or when it was dropped by the referee.

Note: This is the Traditional Rule. However, in 1973 the NASL introduced a "Blue Line" concept with a line drawn

the width of the field 35 yards from each goal (see diagram). Under the new rule an attacking player is not offside until he is within 35 yards of his opponents' goal rather than midfield, as under the Traditional Rule.

Rule 12—Fouls and Misconduct. A player who intentionally attempts to or actually: (a) kicks, (b) trips, (c) jumps at, (d) charges violently, (e) charges from behind, (f) strikes, (g) holds or (h) pushes an opponent, or (i) intentionally handles the ball shall be penalized by a direct free kick. Any one of these nine offenses committed in the penalty area by a defender will result in a penalty kick awarded the offensive team.

A player committing less flagrant violations such as offside, dangerous plays, obstruction or ungentlemanly conduct will be penalized by an indirect free kick.

Rule 13 — Free Kicks. Are classified into two categories: "Direct" (from which a goal can be scored directly against the offending side) and "Indirect" (from which a goal cannot be scored unless the ball has been touched by a player other than the kicker before entering the goal).

For all free kicks the offending team must be at least 10 yards from the ball until it is kicked.

- Rule 14 Penalty Kick. A direct free kick taken at the penalty mark. All players except the player taking the kick and the goalkeeper must stay outside the penalty area and at least 10 yards from the ball (hence the arc at edge of penalty area).
- Rule 15 Throw In. When the ball has wholly crossed the touchline it is put back into play by a throw in from the spot where it went out and by a player from the opposite team that last touched it. A goal cannot be scored directly from a throw in.
- Rule 16 Goal Kick. When the ball has wholly crossed the goal line after being last touched by a player from the attacking team, it is put back into play by a kick from the goal area by the defending team.
- Rule 17 Corner Kick. When the ball has wholly crossed the goal line after being lasttouched by a player from the defending team, it is put back into play by a kick from the corner on the side the ball went out by the attacking team.

## Formula for Breaking Standings Ties for Playoff Positions

An eight-step procedure is in use to determine the order of finish in regular season play and thus break any ties that may exist in the point totals. The order of finish within a division is determined as follows:

- a. greatest number of points determined by the NASL point system
- b. greatest number of points; accrued by results only (i.e., no bonus points)
- c. the greater goal difference (goals for minus goals against)
- d. the most outright wins (i.e., no overtime, no shootout wins)
- e. the greater number of goals scored
- f. procedures a thru c applied to road games only
- g. procedures a thru c applied to home games only
- h. coin toss

Bonus points: one point is awarded for each goal scored up to a maximum of three per team per game.

### NASL Standing Points System

Each winning team will be awarded six points toward its NASL season standings. No points will be given for a loss. Winners and losers will receive one point in the standings for each goal scored in a game with a maximum of three such bonus points awarded per team. Winning teams who score three or more goals in the game will receive nine points in the league standings. Losing teams can get no more than three points (for three or more goals) in the standings.

### Roster and Citizenship Requirements

Rosters of NASL teams may not consist of any more than 30 players. In the first 17 players, a club may have no more than 11 non-citizens (minimum six citizens of the U.S. or Canada, regardless of the roster size).

A club may have an additional 13 players on its roster, providing a ratio of citizens as follows:

### **Playing Roster**

No more than 16 players may be selected for a game and entered on its line-up card.

No more than 11 of the 16 players may be non-citizens and no more than 9 non-citizens may be on the field at any one time.

### **Glossary of Soccer Terms**

**Center** — to pass the ball from a wide position on the field into the penalty area.

**Charging** — pushing the opponent off balance legally by shoulder to shoulder contact.

**Clear** — a throw or kick by the goalkeeper or a kick by the defender in an attempt to get the ball away from the goal area.

Cross — same type of pass as center.

**Defender** — primarily a defensive player who assists the goalkeeper in protecting the goal.

**Dribble** — a way of advancing the ball past defenders by a series of short taps with one or both feet.

**Forward** — primarily an attacking player whose responsibility is to create and score goals.

**Goalkeeper** — the last line of defense. The only player who can use his hands within the field of play. He is limited to using his hands only within the penalty area.

**Half-Volley** — kicking the ball just as it is rebounding off the ground.

**Hands** — illegal act of *intentionally* touching the ball with the hands or arms.

**Heading** — a method of scoring, passing and controlling the ball by making contact with the head.

Linkman - another name for midfielder.

**Lob**— a high, soft kick taken on the volley, lifting the ball over the heads of the opponents.

Marking - guarding an opponent.

**Midfielder** — both an offensive and defensive player who is primarily responsible for linking the forwards and defenders.

**Obstructing** — preventing the opponent from going around a player by standing in his path.

**Overlap** — the attacking play of a defender going down the touchline past his own winger.

Pitch — another name for the field of play.

**Save** — the goalkeeper stopping an attempted goal by catching or deflecting the ball away from the goal.

Screen — retaining possession and protecting the ball by keeping your body between the ball and opponent.

**Shootout** — the tie-breaking procedure used in NASL games when teams are tied after playing two sudden death overtime periods. Teams take five alternating shootout attempts at opposing goalkeepers in a one-on-one situation.

Sliding Tackle — attempting to take the ball away from the opponent by sliding on the ground.

**Striker**— a central forward position in the team with a major responsibility for scoring goals.

**Sweeper** — a defender who roams either in front of or behind the defender line to pick up stray passes.

**Tackling** — attempting to or taking the ball away from an opponent when both players are playing the ball with their feet.

**Trap** — controlling a ball passed close to the player by means of the feet, thighs or chest.

Volley - kicking the ball while it is in flight.

Wall Pass — a pass to a teammate followed by a first time return pass on the other side of the opponent (give and go). Wing — an area of the field near the touchline.

**Winger** — name given to the right and left outside forwards. **4-3-3** — the player formation most used today (a goalkeeper, four defenders, three midfielders, three forwards).

**4-2-4** — most used alternative formation to the 4-3-3 (a goalkeeper, four defenders, two midfielders and four forwards).

### NASL Tie Breaker Procedure/ The Shootout

NASL games which are tied at the end of regulation play will be extended by 15 minutes of "sudden death" overtime (two 7<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-minute periods). A flip of the coin will decide which team will kick off. The first team to score a goal, either from the field or by a penalty kick, wins the game.

If the game remains tied at the end of the second overtime period, the outcome will be decided by The Shootout which involves players on each team challenging the opposing goalkeeper in a one-on-one situation.

The visiting team will kick first and each team will take five chances in alternate order. Attacking players will start with the ball on the 35-yard line and must take their shot within five seconds. Goalkeepers have no movement restrictions within the five-second period in accordance with normal rules of play.

The kicks shall be ended when one team has achieved an insurmountable advantage, such as scoring on its first three kicks while their opponents miss their first three.

If the teams remain tied after the prescribed five attempts, they shall continue to take alternate kicks until one has scored more than the other after an equal number of attempts. Only players in the game at the end of the overtime period shall be eligible to take such kicks. Goalkeepers shall not take kicks. No player may take a second kick until all other eligible members of his team have done so, at which time they shall continue in any order the team may wish, i.e., they do not have to kick in the same rotation.
