## 2022 SEASON

The New England Patriots overcame a 1-3 start by winning five of their next six games and entered the final week of the season with an 8-8 record and a chance to secure a playoff position with a victory at Buffalo. Unfortunately, a 35-23 loss to the Bills and wins by Pittsburgh and Miami eliminated New England from the postseason.

The Patriots defense finished eighth in the NFL in yards allowed and finished near the top in several categories. The defense finished tied with San Francisco for second in the NFL with 30 takeaways (Dallas had 33), third in the NFL with 19 interceptions (Pittsburgh and San Francisco each had 20) and tied with Dallas for third in the NFL with 54 sacks (Philadelphia had 70 and the Kansas City had 55). In addition, the Patriots set a team record with an NFL-leading seven defensive touchdowns, including a stretch of four straight games with a defensive score. The Patriots also tied a team record with five interceptions returned for a touchdown. S Kyle Dugger scored three of those touchdowns, the most defensive touchdowns by a Patriots player since the 1970 NFL merger. The Patriots had two players finish with double-digit sacks with LB Matthew Judon setting a career-high with $151 / 2$ sacks and LB Josh Uche with a career-high $111 / 2$ sacks.

On offense, RB Rhamondre Stevenson reached 1,000 rushing yards for the first time in his career. He became New England's first 1,000 yard rusher since the 2016 season.

Another highlight of the 2022 season was third-round draft pick Marcus Jones, who scored on offense, defense and special teams to become the fourth player in NFL history to do so and the first since the 1947 season. Jones also finished second in the NFL with a 12.5 punt return average and finished second in the NFL with 1,007 total return yards. He became the Patriots first rookie to earn Associated Press first-team All-Pro Honors when he was selected as a punt returner.

## 2023 OPPONENTS

The Patriots 2023 opponents have been determined. In addition to playing each of the other AFC East opponents twice, the Patriots will play one game against each of the AFC West and NFC East teams. As the third-place team in the AFC East, the Patriots will play the third-place team of the AFC South (Indianapolis), AFC North (Pittsburgh) and NFC South (New Orleans).

Home: Buffalo, Miami, NY Jets, Kansas City, Los Angeles Chargers, Philadelphia, Washington, Indianapolis and New Orleans.

Away: Buffalo, Miami, NY Jets, Denver, Las Vegas, Dallas, New York Giants, Pittsburgh.

Under Kraft's leadership since he purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports.

Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins - 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09).

Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (349), division titles (19), winning percentage (.678), playoff wins (33) and playoff seasons (22).


Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 29 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (. 238 pct.), the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on
 Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (24) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 29 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 22 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons.

## A WINNING TRADITION I

Robert Kraft won his 300th game overall as owner of the New England Patriots against Miami on Sept. 30, 2018. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and in his 432nd game, the fastest an owner has reached the milestone. Al Davis of the Raiders accomplished the feat in 495 games (31 seasons) while Pat Bowlen of Denver reached 300 career wins in 501 games (30 seasons).

## A WINNING TRADITION II

## KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS

The Patriots have 349 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 349-166 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

## CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS

New England is the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

## PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 28 times in their 63-year history. Twenty-two of those playoff berths have come in the 29 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. - Meyers, who threw touchdown passes in Weeks 10 and 17 in 2020, became the fourth wide receiver with two touchdown passes in a single season in the Super Bowl era, joining Rod Gardner (2003), Antwaan Randle El (2010) and Odell Beckham Jr. (2018).

\section*{MEYERS COMPLETES TWO PASSES IN ONE GAME}
- Meyers completed two passes vs. Tampa Bay on Oct. 3, 2021. He caught a backwards pass from QB Mac Jones and then threw across the field to RB Brandon Bolden, who managed a 15-yard gain in the second quarter. \section*{DEDICATION TO HIS GOALS}
- While in high school, RB Rhamondre Stevenson started gaining attention for the impressive stats he posted as a junior. Unfortunately, due to his grades, Stevenson was academically ineligible to receive a football scholarship despite being recruited. Following his senior year of high school, Stevenson took a year off from football working part-time jobs at Wal-Mart and Jimmy John's. But after a year away, he decided to follow a group of his friends and enroll in Cerritos Community College. During his time at Cerritos, he shared a two-bedroom apartment with up to six other guys at times and rode his bicycle 20 minutes to and from practice every day. After putting up monster stats in his second season at Cerriots, he committed to Oklahoma. Oklahoma led him to the 2021 NFL Draft where in the fourth round on the third day the Patriots selected Stevenson. In addition he worked on his academics and made the Dean's List while at Oklahoma.

- Patriots 2022 fourth-round pick Jack Jones was in the starting lineup at cornerback at Green Bay on Oct. 2, 2021 in place of the injured Jalen Mills. It was Jones' first NFL start. He forced and recovered a fumble on WR Romeo Doubs in the first quarter to give the Patriots a first down at the 50-yard line. Later in the second quarter, he intercepted a QB Aaron Rodgers pass and returned it 40 yards for a touchdown. - LB Matthew Judon has been selected to represent the New England Patriots in the 2023 NFL Pro Bowl. Judon is headed to his fourth consecutive Pro Bowl and second straight with the Patriots.
- Judon led the team with a career-high \(121 / 2\) sacks in
 and reached a career-high and \(151 / 2\) sacks in 2022 to become the fourth Patriots player with back-to-back 10-plus sack totals, joining Garin Veris ( 10 in 1985 and 11 in 1986), Andre Tippett ( \(181 / 2\) in 1984 and \(161 / 2\) in 1985) and Tony McGee ( 12 in 1977, \(11 \frac{1}{2}\) in 1978 and \(101 / 2\) in 1979). - Judon registered a sack in each of the first five games of the 2022 season. He is the first New England player to start a season with at least one sack in each of the first five games to start a season. - Pro Football Hall of Famer Andre Tippett is the only Patriots player to record more sacks in a season than Judon's \(151 / 2\) in 2022 with Tippett recording 18½ in 1984 and \(161 / 2\) in 1985.

\section*{THE RISE OF THE GREEN GOBLIN}
- DB Jalen Mills has embraced his nickname "The Green Goblin." The origins of the nickname started out as a joke during his rookie season with Philadelphia when he dyed his hair green. Mills is not sure whether it was a coach or the media, but the spiderman villain nickname stuck.
- Said Mills, "It just kind of came from my rookie year and then just throughout my years playing for the Eagles, my style of play. That's what I get it from. It's kind of something that I stuck with."

\section*{A NUMBER CHANGE WITH A STORY}

Late in the Eagles' eventual Super Bowl-winning season, Jalen's Uncle Uhkoto lost his battle with cancer. The once-close relatives had long since drifted apart and fallen out of touch. As a result, only in the wake of Uhkoto's death did Jalen learned that his uncle - a man who otherwise shunned sports - could quote his nephew's NFL statistics chapter and verse: every pass breakup, every interception, every tackle, every game, Uhkoto was keeping track of Jalen. The discovery left him with a heavy heart.
"It kind of broke me down," Jalen revealed, "because we had grown apart. We were close at one point in time. It took that moment for me to realize, this is a man I looked up to as a younger kid, and now he was looking up to me, keeping up with sports that he didn't even care about. So, I wanted to honor him in my own quiet way."

In 2021, Mills would get that opportunity. After signing his free-agent contract with New England, Jalen learned that the NFL would relax its jersey number restrictions, allowing certain positions beyond kicker, punter, and quarterback to wear single-digits on their uniforms.

Mills, who wore 31 and 21 at times as an Eagle, chose No. 2 here in New England. You see, almost no one ever called Uhkoto - pronounced uh-COO-too - by his full name. They preferred his shortened nickname: Two.



\section*{VERSATILITY}
- "I'm one of the guys that when you ask me what position I play, I say 'defense.' I want to be able to line up everywhere, and most importantly, I want to be able to produce everywhere."
- Began his career in 2014 in San Diego focusing on special teams and was selected to his first Pro Bowl in 2018 as a special teamer. His 2018 Pro Bowl berth was the only one that Matthew Slater did not get voted to from 2011-2021.
- Started all 16 games at safety in 2020 for the Patriots and led the team in tackles with a career-high 107.

- LB Jahlani Tavai starred in high school as a nose guard. He was undersized and did not attract attention of many colleges. But after finding out one of the English teachers at his high school was the son of then-Hawaii coach Norm Chow, he reached out to the teacher, Cameron Chow, and asked if Cameron could tell his dad scout Jahlani. Cameron followed up and passed along Jahlani's tape to his dad and the very next day Jahlani had a scholarship offer. According to Jahlani, his football career would have been over after high school if it wasn't for this connection.

\section*{CAREER-HIGH THREE SACKS}

- Rookie DB Marcus Jones returned a third quarter interception 69 yards for a touchdown vs. Cincinnati on Dec. 24. He scored on a punt return for a touchdown, a touchdown reception and an interception returned for a touchdown to become the fourth player in NFL history to do so in a season, joining Frank Bacon (1920), Bill Dudley (1947) and Tommy Harmon (1947). - Jones, who made his first career start on defense vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1, 2022, also lined up on offense and scored on a 48-yard touchdown pass from QB Mac Jones on his first play from scrimmage in the first quarter. Jones became the first defensive back to record a touchdown reception on offense since 2000 when S Marcus Coleman of the New York Jets caught a 45-yard touchdown pass from QB Vinny Testaverde against Buffalo on Sept. 17, 2000. Jones caught 15 passes for 137 yards with a one receiving touchdown during his college career. He scored on a 47-yard touchdown pass vs. Navy on Sept. 25, 2021. - Slater earned his 10th Pro Bowl invitation in 2021, extending his NFL record for most Pro Bowl selections as a special teamer. Slater has the second-most Pro Bowl selections as a Patriot with 10. - From Sickle Cell to Education to Criminal Justice to Healthcare Equity, Devin's work is prolific. He has steered the New England Patriots' Players Social Justice Fund since it was established at the end of the 2018 season, and has served as a Players Coalition Task Force Member and Chair of its Education \& Economic Advancement Committee since its founding in 2018. Devin serves as a member of the Board of Boston Medical Center and on the Advisory Board of Boston Uncornered, which redirects gang-involved individuals from violence and incarceration to education and careers. Devin is an advocate for a number of other issues that affect the community. His positive and meaningful impact on others has been immeasurable.

- The Josh Uche Foundation was created to empower and provide at-risk youth with educational advancement, resource programming, mentorship, and mental health empowerment.

\section*{GCORING FLURRY}

The Patriots scored three touchdowns in a 57-second span during the final two minutes of the first half against Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014, turning a 17-7 lead into a 38-7 cushion. It was the fastest three-touchdown flurry in the NFL since the Patriots had three touchdowns in 52 seconds against the New York Jets on Nov. 22, 2012. The Patriots have staged two historic come-from-behind victories over the past several seasons:

Bill Belichick coached the Patriots back from a 25-point deficit to win Super Bowl LI. A comeback of that magnitude is extremely rare. There had been 2,656 games in which a team led by 25 points or more in NFL history, including the postseason. Teams leading by 25 had recorded 2,647 wins, seven losses and two ties, a winning percentage of .997.

New England came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (09/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (01/01/12)

    - The Patriots have played in 59 postseason games, fourth-most in NFL history behind Dallas (66), Pittsburgh (63) and Green Bay (61).
    - The Patriots are second with 13 seasons of 12 wins since 1970 , behind San Francisco's 14 seasons with 12 victories.
    - New England has won 13 games in a single season seven times in franchise history. Only San Francisco has more 13-win seasons with 10.
    - The New England Patriots have won 14 or more games in a season five times, most in NFL history. San Francisco is second with four 14 -win seasons.
    - New England has 28 undefeated months since 2000, most in the NFL over that span. Green Bay is second with 21 undefeated months during that time.
    - The Patriots have 35 winning seasons since 1970, second all-time behind Pittsburgh's 39.
    
    - The Patriots have 574 total victories, the fourth-most wins since their inception in 1960, behind the 586 wins by Pittsburgh and Dallas and the 575 by Green Bay.
    - New England (1,025) played their 1,000th game in franchise history (regular season and playoffs combined) against Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021 and became the first original AFL team to play in 1,000 games.
    - With rookie free agents DL DaMarcus Mitchell and DB Brenden Schooler making the initial 53-man roster in 2022, the Patriots have now had a rookie free agent make the opening day roster for 19 straight seasons, tied with Denver for the longest streak in the NFL.
    - The Patriots ended a 10-year streak of finishing in the top 10 for fewest points allowed (2012-2021) after finishing 11th in 2022 with 20.4 points allowed.     The Patriots limited the Jets to just 2 yards on seven offensive possessions in the second half on Nov. 20. It is the fewest yards allowed by the team in a half in franchise history. The previous low was 25 yards by the Los Angeles Rams in the first half on Dec. 4, 2016.

    The Patriots held the Jets to just six first downs on Nov. 20, the fewest since allowing just five in a game at Green Bay on Nov. 19, 2006. The Patriots last held the Jets to just six first downs on Sept. 22, 2019.
