TYTUS HOWARD NOTES

TEXANS SELECT T TYTUS HOWARD

The Houston Texans selected Alabama State T **Tytus Howard** with the 23rd pick in the first round (23rd overall). He is the first player drafted by the Texans from Alabama State in franchise history.

Howard is the second offensive tackle drafted by Houston in the first round in team history and first since Duane Brown in 2008. This also marks the earliest Houston has drafted an offensive lineman in franchise history.

Howard becomes the first HBCU player to be selected in the first round of the NFL Draft since Tennessee State's Dominique Rogers-Cromartie in 2008. He is also the first SWAC player drafted in the first round since Jackson State CB Rashard Anderson in 2000 and the first player from Alabama State to be drafted in the first round in school history.

Houston now has 14 offensive linemen on its roster. Howard, who started for the South Team in the 2019 Senior Bowl, was also the 13th offensive tackle drafted by the Texans in franchise history.

TYTUS HOWARD CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Started 10 games as a senior in 2018
- Played and started all 11 games at tackle in 2017
- Led team in pancakes, and allowed just one sack in 2017
- Helped team win five of their last six games of the 2017 season
- Started in seven games on the offensive line in 2016
- Appeared in eight games in 2015
- Started on the offensive line in six contests in 2015
- Helped the Hornets average 373.5 yards per game in 2015
- Walked on at Alabama State as a tight end in 2014

TEXANS PICK CB LONNIE JOHNSON JR.

The Houston Texans picked Kentucky CB **Lonnie Johnson Jr.** with the 22nd pick in the second round (54th overall). He is the first player drafted by Houston from Kentucky in franchise history.

Johnson was the 16th cornerback drafted by Houston in team history and the earliest taken since Kevin Johnson (first round, 16th overall) in 2015. WR DeAndre Hopkins announced the selection from Nashville.

LONNIE JOHNSON JR. CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Former junior college player who spent two seasons at Kentucky (2017 and 2018)
- Started in 18 of 26 career games, including 18 in a row
- Two-year totals included 64 tackles, 3.0 TFL (13 yards), 1.0 sack, 12 PBUs, two blocked kicks, one interception and a forced fumble
- Intercepted a pass in the third quarter vs. Penn State in the Citrus Bowl in 2018, the first interception of his career
- Also had a pass breakup and four tackles in helping UK claim its first postseason victory since 2009
- Invited to play in the Reese's Senior Bowl where he charted four tackles in the game for the South
- Had two blocked kicks in his career, a blocked extra point vs. ECU and a blocked field goal vs. Missouri in 2017
- Had a career-high seven tackles as a junior vs. Louisville in 2017
- Graduated in December with a degree in community and leadership development

LONNIE JOHNSON JR. PERSONAL INFORMATION

- Totaled 66 tackles, two interceptions, two blocked field goals and a blocked punt, while catching 40 passes for 772 yards and 14 touchdowns at West Side High School
- Also had 253 rushing yards on 22 carries with five TDs
- An extremely talented athlete who also excelled at track and field, helping Gary West Side win the 2014 state championship with individual titles in the long jump and 4x100 relay
- Born in Gary, Indiana

TEXANS DRAFT T MAX SCHARPING

The Houston Texans drafted Northern Illinois T **Max Scharping** with the 23rd pick in the second round (55th overall). He is the first player drafted by Houston from Northern Illinois in franchise history.

Scharping is the second offensive tackle drafted by the Texans this year, joining T Tytus Howard (first round, 23rd overall). This marks the third time in franchise history and first time since 2013 that Houston has chosen two offensive tackles in the same draft.

Scharping is the first tackle drafted in the second round by the Texans since Chester Pitts in 2002. WR DeAndre Hopkins announced the selection of Scharping from Nashville.

MAX SCHARPING CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Started 53 consecutive games, every game of his career from 2015-18, and played every offensive snap (998 plays) in 2018
- Earned a \$13,000 scholarship as a National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete & 1 of 12 finalists for the William Campbell Trophy
- Also a semifinalist for the Wuerffel Trophy
- Selected as a first team Google Cloud Academic All-American and was an All-District selection three times during his NIU career
- First team All-MAC choice at left tackle in 2017
- All-MAC selection at right tackle in 2016
- Named FWAA Freshman All-American, the MAC's only representative on the team in 2015
- Started all 14 games for the Huskies, the only NIU freshman in 2015 to do so

MAX SCHARPING PERSONAL INFORMATION

- Three-time all-conference & two-time all-area high school honoree
- Started all but one game over three seasons on the offensive and defensive lines in high school
- Garnered all-state honors following his senior season of high school
- Born in Green Bay, Wisconsin
- Earned his undergraduate degree in kinesiology and completed his master's degree in December 2018

"They had a need on the offensive line and they doubled up on it. Position, wall-off blocker. He's a little raw, but he's got some upside."

KAHALE WARRING NOTES



TEXANS LAND TE KAHALE WARRING

The Houston Texans landed San Diego State TE **Kahale Warring** with the 23rd pick in the third round (86th overall). He is the second player drafted by the Texans from San Diego State in franchise history and the first since Chester Pitts in 2002.

Warring is the 11th tight end drafted in franchise history and the earliest one selected since C.J. Fiedorowicz (third round, 65th overall) in 2014. Texans Offensive Assistant Coach and former QB T.J. Yates announced the selection from Nashville.

KAHALE WARRING CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Big tight end who showed drastic improvement since arriving in 2015
- Put on 30 pounds since arriving on SDSU's campus
- Missed the final 10 games of the 2016 season with a foot injury
- Returned to play in all 13 in 2017 with three starts
- Only played one year of high school football
- Was awarded a scholarship late in the 2017 fall camp
- Out of his 51 career catches, eight went for touchdowns
- Was an honorable mention all-Mountain West selection, voted on by the league's media and head coaches in 2018
- Was on the Mackey Award Watch List, which goes out to the top tight end in the country in 2018
- Was a 2017 Burlsworth Trophy nominee, which goes out to the most outstanding collegiate football player who began his career as a walk-on and has shown outstanding performance on the field
- Played in all 13 games on the season with three starts in 2017
- Had 18 catches and 248 receiving yards (13.8 avg.) with a team-high three touchdowns in 2017

TEXANS CHOOSE DE CHARLES OMENIHU

The Houston Texans chose Texas DE **Charles Omenihu** with the 23rd pick in the fifth round (161st overall). He is the fifth player drafted by the Texans from the University of Texas in franchise history, which ties Notre Dame for the second-most in team history.

Omenihu was born in Houston and is the 22nd player drafted by the Texans that either went to college or high school in Texas or had some connection to the state in franchise history. This marks the first time in team history that the Texans drafted a player from Texas and a player from Texas A&M in the same draft.

Omenihu is the 11th defensive end drafted by the Texans in team history and the first since Carlos Watkins (fourth round, 142nd overall) in 2017. Texans Pro Bowl ILB Benardrick McKinney announced the selection from NRG Stadium.

TEXANS PICK CB XAVIER CRAWFORD

The Houston Texans picked Central Michigan CB **Xavier Crawford** with the 23rd pick in the sixth round (195th overall). He is the first player drafted by Houston from Central Michigan in franchise history.

Crawford is the 17th cornerback drafted by Houston in team history and the second one selected by Houston this season, joining **Lonnie Johnson Jr.** (second round, 54th overall). The only position drafted more frequently by Houston has been linebacker (18).

This marks the first time since 2011 that the Texans have drafted two cornerbacks in the same draft. Houston also took multiple corners in 2004, 2009 and 2010. Crawford becomes the 14th member of the Texans' current secondary.

TEXANS DRAFT FB CULLEN GILLASPIA

The Houston Texans drafted Texas A&M FB **Cullen Gillaspia** with the sixth pick in the seventh round (220th overall). He is the third player drafted by Houston from Texas A&M in franchise history and the first 12th Man to ever be drafted to the NFL.

Gillaspia is the first fullback drafted by Houston since Jay Prosch (sixth round, 211th overall) in 2014. This also marks the first time in team history that the Texans drafted a player from Texas and a player from Texas A&M in the same draft.

CULLEN GILLASPIA CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Becomes the first 12th Man to get drafted in the NFL Draft
- Served as the 12th Man every game in 2016, 2017 and 2018, a streak of 38 consecutive games

GENERAL MANAGER BRIAN GAINE & HEAD COACH BILL O'BRIEN (4/27)

FB Cullen Gillaspia played several positions in college. What position do you think he will play here?

(O'Brien) "We'll start him off on offense as a fullback and he was an excellent special teams player there, also. Was the 12th man at Texas A&M. I think everybody understands what that means there. Came to our local pro day. Our scouts did an awesome job getting him into our local pro day. We're excited to be able to add him to our team – and he's from Katy."

Could you do a recap on the whole draft, what your goals were going in and what you got?

(Gaine) "Our whole goal for the draft was to honor the process. You've heard me say that before. We had a very good balance of best available mixed with the opportunity to meet team needs, but equally just impressed with the scouts' effort, the coaching staff's effort – the vetting process in terms of the intangible profile, the character profile, guys who love football, who embraced the process of getting ready to play on Sundays. I feel like with every at-bat we had, we got good football players, but guys that will fit our culture and fit our program as well."

You've mentioned that the best picks are when best available line up with team needs. Did that happen for you in this draft?

(Gaine) "Yeah, there was a mix and balance of all those opportunities. With our process, we build the board accordingly, with no influence in terms of what the team need might be. When those opportunities arose, when the team need was met with the best available, those were obviously the best selections. At every level of the draft, I was very pleased with the process, the coordinated effort between the coaches and the scouts, the vision that we had for the players. We feel like in every round that we got somebody who's going to be a contributing player for the roster."

Can you talk about DE Charles Omenihu?

(Gaine) "The first thing that stands out when you see him from the physical profile is his size and length. Very tall, very long, very athletic, has mobility, can play sideline to sideline, but it's his versatility in jobs, in terms of the alignments. There's really not one strict position that he can play, like, 'He has to do this job.' We feel like there's a lot of variations of the things he can do for us both in base defense and then substitution defense. He can play off the edge, he can play inside, was productive, he found the ball, played hard. We were happy to have the opportunity to get him."

Other than size, what differentiates CB Lonnie Johnson Jr. and CB Xavier Crawford?

(Gaine) "Starting with Lonnie Johnson, physically – I have to address that because he does have outstanding size, rare size for the position. Six-foot-one, six-foot-two, 210 pounds, 4.4 (40-yard) coming out. Perimeter outside player who has a chance to play press coverage. Xavier Crawford, who we took in the sixth round, just body type is just different. He's 5-11, 190 pounds, ran 4.37 (40-yard) coming out. He gives you more position versatility, maybe, to play outside and inside. Both guys will obviously add speed, range, athleticism, mobility and obviously fourth down is critically important to any skill position. So, we're pleased to have the opportunity to get him in the sixth round."

Does it help you to have examples of late-round draft picks that have developed into contributing players for you?

(O'Brien) "Sure, everybody's different, but yeah, I understand your point. I think Brian (Gaine) described it perfectly. You've got a guy there that had 9.5 sacks this year at Texas. Played a lot of different spots up front for Texas. That's something that everyone understands for us is important. When Brian and I talk, it's always about – at pretty much every position – it's about versatility and the jobs that the guy can do, especially relative to the roster. The more you can do really helps your value, and that's what we looked at with Charles (Omenihu)."

What needs are you looking to fill during undrafted free agency?

(O'Brien) "I think the big that we do is the process here that Brian (Gaine) has put in place relative to the college free agent process really involves the scouts and the coaches work together. That process started obviously a couple of months ago and really ramped up the last few days. They're constantly communicating and trying to do the best job possible to create the most competitive roster possible. That's when you have a good football team, when at every stage of the year you have a very competitive roster. That's when you have a really complete football team, so that's what we're going to work to do over the next couple of hours here."

With a guy like CB Xavier Crawford who played on a team that didn't have a lot of success, how do you separate what he was able to do?

(Gaine) "Independently of the results of the team that he played on, we're grading the player, obviously, from the physical standpoint. As it relates to a guy coming from a team that maybe didn't have as much success, his football character and intangible profile really check the boxes. Through facing adversity and going through a tough season, he still played hard, still finished the season and still played at a very, very competitive level. As it relates to facing adversity in a tough season, I kind of like that part of it. Naturally, everybody wants an opportunity to win, but the fact of the matter is he overcame that adversity and was able to make himself into a draft pick."

What are some of the keys with the coaches and scouts working together during undrafted free agency?

(Gaine) "Vision. It's having a shared vision of what the player is and how he's going to help the team, how he's going to make the team, how he's going to fit in the scheme, how he's going to fit in the program. We work together hand-in-hand for a series of weeks and months so that we arrive to the same vision of how the guy's going to make the team, compete for a roster spot, what jobs he's going to do, et cetera, et cetera. So, it's all about building the shared vision of what the player is."

What are some of the traits you're looking for in a wide receiver during the college free agency process?

(Gaine) "Naturally, the height, weight, speed – the physical dimensions. We want to make sure that they check the boxes for us in that regard. No. 2, their opportunity to make the team and then the third thing we're always looking for is competitiveness and football make-up, because they're going to face adversity in terms of trying to make the team. The fourth thing is special teams. If he's not going to be a big guy and he's a big skill or skill player, his best chance to roster or even get to the 53 or the 46, is more than likely going to be on fourth down. All those elements, I think, compose the best profile of a guy that can make it."

What is your reaction to the incident involving TE Ryan Griffin?

(Gaine) "We've been in touch with Ryan. We're aware of the situation. We commented on the matter, but as of right now, we're not going to comment on it anymore."

What do you expect from rookies coming in for minicamp?

(O'Brien) "The first thing we tell them is really at the end of the day, this is a very important few days that we've had here, but when you arrive here, it's what you do from that point forward. It's not really how you got here, it's when you get into the building, what you do from this stage forward. That'll be the big thing. We'll get them in here for rookie minicamp, we'll start indoctrinate them into our culture, our systems and how we do things. It's an exciting time. We're very excited about this draft class. We really feel good about every single guy and their contribution – potential contribution – to the roster, and we're excited to get started with them."

Last year you had the best special teams since you've been here. How much can the guys that you drafted help you in that regard?

(O'Brien) "I think that's a big thing, especially with the skill guys. I think guys that can run and play in space, have the ability to cover kicks – that's an important part of the 53-man roster. We're a long way away from that, but I think that when you look at whether it's a DB – really whatever position, obviously, other than the offensive line, you're looking for guys that can help you in some way, shape or form on special teams, and I think we've done a really good job of that. I think there's a few examples, but if you look at the seventh round pick, (Cullen) Gillaspia, that's a guy that we feel can come in here and help us in that regard. Like I said, we're looking forward to getting going with these guys."

Did the rule changes on kickoffs change the way you look for guys to play on kickoff coverage, kickoff and return teams?

(O'Brien) "That's a good question. I think the big thing is when you have – let's just start with coverage – when you have guys that can cover kicks, that gives you a lot of different strategies as to how to kick the ball, how to kick it off. I think that's a big deal, where you have guys that can run down and make the tackle and create turnovers and create game-changing plays. That's a big deal in this league, so I do think that those types of additions can really help your team."



Did you prepare any differently this year knowing that you had a first- and second-round pick rather than starting the draft with a third-round pick last year?

(Gaine) "There was not. Even though we didn't have a first- and second-round pick last year, we still built the board accordingly and didn't omit any process or any regularity. We still treated the board as if we had a first- and second-round pick. So, nothing changed."

No superstitions or start a new tradition?

(Gaine) "Not at all. We just got a chance to pick."

Are you happy with the way you've addressed the overall speed of your roster?

(Gaine) "I am, and the best way to answer that is over this weekend we felt we got bigger, longer, stronger and tougher, and equally more athletic. That was a point of emphasis. We wanted to increase team speed, team size, team length, team strength and we feel we were able to fortify those things through this draft weekend."



DE CHARLES OMENIHU (4/27)

Did you have any additional interaction with the Texans other than a workout?

“No, I just had an individual workout with the D-line coach. It went really well. We had a really good conversation. I’m just blessed to have this opportunity. I know I definitely will come and work my tail off to do whatever he needs and Coach (Bill) O’Brien needs me to do to make my impact for the team.”

What kind of player and person are the Texans getting in you?

“They’re going to get a long, athletic defensive lineman that can play inside and out, and a guy that’s going to be a sponge to J.J. (Watt), Jadeveon (Clowney) and Deshaun (Watson). Deshaun’s been a big homie, too. So, just surround myself with guys who know what to do, have been around the game and have been successful.”

What did QB Deshaun Watson tell you about playing for the Texans? Do you share the same agent?

“Yes sir. Deshaun just told me that you have to come in and work hard. That this isn’t just play time. Coach (Bill) O’Brien is a coach that expects a lot of you, and that’s where I came from. So, nothing will change. Just like I said, I have to earn my stripes and make my way on the team.”

What does it mean to you to play football in Texas for high school, college and now at the professional level?

“It’s a blessing. Definitely a blessing. It’s a good thing that my friends and family can definitely come to watch me play. It’s a dream that’s finally fulfilled. Like I said, it’s just a blessing. I can’t thank the Houston Texans enough for giving me this opportunity.”

Do you think Head Coach Bill O’Brien and Texas Head Coach Tom Herman have similarities as far as their expectations for players?

“Oh yeah, definitely. You definitely know that you’re going to have to put your hardhat on. When you come in, practice is not going to be a cake walk. Practice is going to be something where you definitely have to put your best foot forward. I’m grateful for that and I’m definitely ready for that.”

Do you have a chip on your shoulder?

“I’ve had this chip on my shoulder since I was playing ball. My chip on my shoulder is not even a chip, it’s a boulder. I’m definitely going to come in, head down, ready to work. Like I said, ready to earn my stripes and do everything I need to do to contribute on this team.”

What do you think you can learn from DE J.J. Watt and DE/OLB Jadeveon Clowney?

“I think I can learn from J.J. especially because we play kind of the same position – hand work and how to use my length a little bit better. Then with Jadeveon, me probably playing multiple positions with the Texans – maybe rushing outside and learning from Jadeveon – crazy enough, I wore No. 7 because of Jadeveon Clowney my senior year of high school. I’ve definitely looked up to him. I wore 90 because of him as well as a guy that I just watched and I was like, ‘I want to be just like him.’ It’s crazy that I get to do that and also work with J.J., a guy that’s a Hall of Famer, amazing football player. It’s a blessing.”

Have you talked to Assistant Head Coach/Defensive Coordinator Romeo Crennel yet?

“No, I have not, but I’ve heard great things about him. I’ve known about him just following football. Like I said, it’s just a blessing. This is the opportunity of a lifetime and I fully intend to take advantage of it tenfold.”

CB XAVIER CRAWFORD (4/27)

How exciting is it to be picked by the Houston Texans?

"I'm excited. I'm enthused. Honestly, there aren't even words to describe how excited I am."

Did you have a lot to do with the Houston Texans prior to the NFL Draft as far as a visit, workout, meeting or all three?

"Yeah, I worked out privately. Always stayed in contact with someone in the office. For me, honestly, it's not really a surprise, but you know how this process is. You never know what's going to happen. Anything can happen in this process. I'm not surprised I am; I am surprised because you never know where you're going in this process."

What do you think about being teammates with DE J.J. Watt and OLB/DE Jadeveon Clowney?

"That's great. They're great at their positions. They're going to make my job a lot easier. I can't do anything but praise them."

How were you able to overcome your back injury at Oregon State to become a First-Team All Mid-American Conference at Central Michigan?

"I had to get back to the basics. I took some time off. I was injured, so I got time to study the game, become more of a student. I just knew when I got my opportunity to play on the field again that I was going to make the most of it. When I went out there, I kind of had a 'take no prisoners' attitude and whatever happens, happens."

How cool is it for you and Buccaneers CB Sean Bunting to be drafted despite a poor season for your team?

"Our record really didn't tell how good the team actually was. We were kind of young, so we were trying to put things together. Me and Sean (Bunting), we kind of competed with each other and we just had an attitude who was going to make the next play. We always competed, so that kept us going no matter what our record was."

Do you pattern your style of play after anyone in the NFL?

"Yeah, I pay a lot of attention to Brent Grimes. Steven Nelson was somebody that was at Oregon State and he was actually my host. I always keep in contact with him, so he's the guy I like to watch a lot because I know him personally. Darius Slay. There's a bunch of guys I like to watch. I just like to learn a little bit from everybody, because no one's really the same, but I can learn something from anyone."

What's your favorite kind of coverage to play?

"I'm man-to-man. I want to see you versus me and I want to see what you're going to do on me."

Being a former track athlete, what type of training will you bring to the NFL?

"Just the track background and form running. I'm going to have to cover guys that can run. Everybody can run at this level. It's not going to be like a surprise like 'I'm going to play a guy this week that's fast, but' – it's going to be somebody every week that's going to challenge me. I'm definitely going to have to use that."



What's your philosophy toward special teams? Did you play on them a lot in college and do enjoy that?

"Yeah, I played my freshman year, but due to our numbers we just didn't have a lot of numbers at corner, so I was the starter. They had to use other positions to play the positions that I played just because if I got hurt, there was nobody else. Yeah, I enjoy special teams. It's part of the game and it's part of the game that you need. It's crucial and it can help you win, so I'll play anywhere."

What was it like going from a Power 5 school like Oregon State to a Mid-American Conference school?

"It was little bit different as far as the resources, as far as what we had in the medical and just everything like that. It's not much of a challenge. There's not a challenge drop-off or anything like that to me. I feel like, at that level, you just have to know that you're coming in here to play and you're already at a disadvantage because you're at a smaller school. Other than that, I really didn't see a difference."

After the journey you've been on, what would it feel like to get a football home and play in the same place for a few years?

"It's going to feel good to finally be in one place. I can finally just focus on one spot, but I'm just ready to contribute however I can."

You ran faster at your pro day than at the combine. Did you just feel better or was it something you did to run faster?

"Honestly, the combine, it was kind of – I was prepared, but it kind of got the best of me physically, mentally after doing everything you do and then getting to the day you're supposed to perform at your top. I'm not going to lie, I just wasn't prepared for that. All the training, everything that you do doesn't put you in the position where you're going to be up for four days straight and barely sleeping and stuff like that. I just came to the day and I was just worn out. I got back to pro day and just relaxed and was like 'All right, there's no pressure. I already performed at the combine, so I'm going to go out here and do what I do.' So, that's what I did."

How would you describe your journey from where you started in playing football to where you are today?

"To me, it hasn't been smooth – that's for sure. It's been a lot of twists and turns, ups and downs. At the end of the day, I stayed persistent and I'm right where I want to be right now."



FB CULLEN GILLASPIA (4/27)

How cool is it being drafted by your hometown team?

"I could not ask for a better situation. I talked to Brian Gaine, Coach (Brad) Seely, the running backs coach and all the staff and I said, 'Hey, I'm a hometown kid. I've been Houston Texan since Day 1. They were my favorite team growing up. I've seen every one. This is where I want to be. Houston is home. I hope y'all pick me. Don't make me go to a division rival and make me play against you.' I'm ecstatic to be here and I could not be happier to be a Houston Texan."

Did you have a lot of contact with the Texans during the pre-draft process or was this a surprise?

"Definitely a surprise when they decided to pick me. I'd been in contact with the scouts and Brian Gaine. I had done their local day and there were four scouts at our pro day. So, I had taken the time out, I had been with them and I got to know the coaching staff and the scouting staff as well. Coming from a special teams guy from a first-year fullback, hearing that call – you hope for it (but) you don't necessarily expect it. You prepare for the best and expect the worst. When I got that call in the seventh round, I couldn't have been happier. Brian Gaine called me and made me a Texan and this is a dream come true."

What does it mean to you to be the first 12th Man in Texas A&M history to be drafted?

"It means everything. They say that I'm the 12th Man or that I'm number 12 and I've made this thing popular, but that's not true. The 12th Man and Texas A&M have such a rich history from E. King Gill in the early 1900s all the way to Jackie Sherrill of the 12th Man kickoff team. Me getting drafted, me scoring the touchdown in the bowl game, this is for all of the number 12s before me. It's not about me. It's about the brotherhood. It's about the guys that came before me and laid the foundation for me to get to wear the number 12."

Are there a player or two that you identify with or follow on the Texans while growing up?

"Yeah, actually, Bryan Braman – special teams demon, had the long hair. I thought that guy was an absolute stud, loved to watch him growing up. Growing up, I was a linebacker and I was a linebacker two of my years in college, so watching Brian Cushing and the energy that he brought. I would say those two dudes were the probably the guys I looked up to on the Texans. Jay Prosch is another one who was a fullback for a couple of years there in Houston. One of the best ones I can remember saying, 'I want to be like that guy,' was definitely Bryan Braman with long hair and running down on special teams and wreaking havoc."

Have you ever made a tackle without your helmet?

"I have not made a tackle without my helmet. That's going to have to happen shortly. If my helmet gets knocked off, I'll be sure to go get that 15-yard penalty and try to make that tackle."

Did you know that Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach Brian Cushing is now part of the strength and conditioning staff? What is it going to be like to get to work out with him in the weight room?

"I did. I got a chance to – when I was on kind of a visit with the Texans, we did some stuff in the weight room to kind of do some testing or whatever, and I got a chance to work with him. I was like, 'Hey man, I don't think you know this, but I'm from Houston. I'm from Katy. I'm a huge fan and I watched all your plays, watched all your games growing up. If I have a chance to come here, it's going to be a pleasure working with you.'"

How did Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach Brian Cushing respond?

"We chopped it up a little bit. One of his former teammates, Phillip Supernaw, who my agent actually represents (him) Zeke Sandhu of Elite Athlete Management. He represents him, so we kind of got a chance to connect with Phillip Supernaw and make that connection. Also, Phillip Supernaw is from Katy and went to my school as well, so he had a chance to play with the Texans for a few years and be Brian Cushing's teammate. It was a cool experience and I just told him 'I'm a huge fan and I'm ready to get to work. If this happens, I hope I can be a sponge and just soak up everything you have to say.'"

Do you think any Texans fans who are connected to Katy will find a way to pull for a guy from Katy Taylor?

"We'll see. I think it'll be pretty easy for them to pull for the Texans, so we'll see."

Sticking with that, are you going to be able to share a backfield with D'Onta Foreman out of the University of Texas?

"We're on the same team now. We're teammates. UT is a great school. I'm A&M, College Station, Texas A&M Aggies all the way. You put those things aside, it's all just in the fun of the game. I'm ready to get to work. I hope I can open up some holes for him and really put him on the map this year and lead him to the season he wants to have."

Where you with your family when you got drafted?

"Yes, sir. We were over at my house. We were having a crawfish boil. I had a bunch of friends and family over. When I got that call it was really just a surreal moment. Five years ago I was a walk-on at Texas A&M. I was on the scout team for two years. If you would have told me that I'd be getting drafted right now, I would have laughed in your face. But it happened. All my best friends are Houston Texans, my family are Houston Texans and I couldn't be happier. My dad is literally busting at the seams with happiness and my mom is happy with me just staying home, and my brother is just happy he doesn't have to root for anyone other than the hometown team. It was a great experience. I'm happy I got to be with my family and I couldn't be more excited for the situation, and I'm ready to get to work."

How long have you been working at fullback and what do you think about playing fullback in the NFL?

"I've only been a fullback for about a year now. I played defense in high school and defense in college until my fifth year, until Jimbo Fisher converted me to a fullback. I love the position. I love getting the ball, I love opening up holes for the running backs. Like I said, Trayveon (Williams) is a great back. It was easy to open up holes for him. In this day and age, the fullbacks aren't necessarily the 1980 neck-roll, iso-fullbacks. They are more the H-back, get out in the flat, maybe run a wheel route. Looking forward to getting the ball. Looking forward to opening up some holes for the backs, really just looking forward to helping this team whatever way I can, whatever way Coach (Bill) O'Brien sees fit."



GENERAL MANAGER BRIAN GAINE & HEAD COACH BILL O'BRIEN PRESS CONFERENCE (4/26)

What do you like about CB Lonnie Johnson Jr. and T Max Scharping?

(Gaine) "Lonnie Johnson, a player we've obviously studied through the fall. Outside cornerback with excellent height, weight, speed. Six-foot-one and change, 210 pounds, 4.40 (40-yard dash), played very well in the Senior Bowl and matched up versus some very good competition. Played very well in the Bowl game. Very aggressive in run support. He can play perimeter press coverage, can play man coverage. We're excited to have him. Max Scharping, very versatile offensive lineman, starting left tackle, team captain material, outstanding football character, big man, fits our parameters – the height, weight, speed. Both of those players fit all the prototypical standards we're looking for and equally in the intangible profile from the football character standpoint, so they fit our program well."

What was it that stood out for you about CB Lonnie Johnson Jr.?

(O'Brien) "I don't want to speak for Brian (Gaine), but I think we both were really impressed with him at the combine and all the different places that our coaching staff and scouting staff, especially, met with him. He was just a really impressive guy. The way he could talk about his life, the way he could talk about football, and then obviously his skillset on the field. I think the more and more our organization got to know him, we felt like he would be great fit, kind of like we were talking about today with Tytus (Howard). Just smart, tough, dependable. That's what we're looking for and that's what we saw with him."

Were CB Lonnie Johnson Jr.'s press-man skills something you were looking for?

(O'Brien) "We're always just trying to do what is best for the team. I think the big thing we always talk about is what is the best for the team. What are we trying to do? It's not about drafting for this position or last year or next year. It's all about this year. It's all about what can these guys do for us relative to this year and then moving forward, obviously, with the future. We look at it and we look at their skillset. We do a great job. Brian (Gaine) and his staff do a great job of incorporating the coaching staff after the season into the scouting process. Then we all come to a vision on each player in draft meetings. Then the culmination of it is right here. It's really the process that Brian has put together is where we all come together on it and we feel like all these guys that we've drafted, we're really excited about them. We feel like they really fit what we are looking for from a skillset standpoint and from a character standpoint."

What was the thought process behind adding TE Kahale Warring?

(Gaine) "Best available. He's another player that we got to know, spent a lot of time with here over the winter and here through the spring. He meets our prototypical standards, everything we look for from the physical standpoint and equally from the football character skillset, but a ton of upside here. A youthful player as it relates to his football experience, but a ton of upside. Six-foot-five, 255 pounds, ran 4.6, has great ball skills. He's been a multi-dimensional athlete (over) his career and we feel like the ceiling is high here. He'll be a good addition for us both in the classroom, in the locker room, but also on the football field."

How would you evaluate TE Kahale Warring as a blocker?

(Gaine) "Good. He has a chance to develop in the running game. There's no physical limitation that should limit him in terms of his development in that area, and first and foremost, he's willing to do it. Naturally, he'll need time and experience on the job, but really there's no physical part of his game that he should not be able to ascend and develop in that area."

You picked up two smart offensive linemen the last two days. Is that something you look for in your offensive linemen?

(Gaine) "Yeah, it's critically important. When you think about game planning during the week, the preparation that goes into the week. The defenses that they are planning, the mental part of the game, the classroom portion of developing as an offensive lineman is a critical element to our research, a critical element to the profile that we want in terms of the offensive linemen we bring in here. We think he's a versatile guy where he can be a tackle or guard, but he's an offensive tackle that can probably play all four positions on the offensive line."

Did you exercise WR Will Fuller V's fifth-year option today?

(Gaine) "Yeah, we plan on doing that. That's something we plan on doing."

Is there a position on your roster that has more competition than tight end right now?

(O'Brien) "No, I think that as you look at our team – look, we're still having to fill out the 90-man roster. I think the big thing is we're always talking about competition. I think the best teams that we've been around had the most competitive rosters. We're a long way to go from where we will be at this time tomorrow night when we have to fill out a 90-man roster. But, we're always looking to have a very competitive roster, have really good practice sessions. On a side note, our offseason program is two weeks old. It's going really well. Our staff is doing a really good job – strength staff, training staff, nutrition – all of these guys are really doing a great job of getting these players going during the spring. We start Phase 2 on Monday and everybody's excited. Then we add the rookies in a couple of weeks here and we'll be hitting the ground running."

How valuable is something like the Senior Bowl, specifically with CB Lonnie Johnson Jr.?

(Gaine) "The Senior Bowl is one part of the process and you heard me say this yesterday: our process starts in June and it ends here during this draft weekend period. The Senior Bowl or all the All-Star games, they allow you a lot of time to spend individually with the players in terms of the interview process. You get to go out and watch their practice habits, you get to find out a little bit more about them from the intangible profile, spend time with them, a lot of discovering their personality. Then you start to ultimately evolve how these players would fit into your program, your culture, fit into your locker room. When you go to the bowl games, you get all those opportunities to spend almost unlimited time with these players, not just from the playing part on the field, but also from the time you spend with them from an interview setting. It's an enjoyable part of the process because you've done all the fall work and once you arrive to that you finally can start to maybe get to know the player on a more personal level."

Since CB Lonnie Johnson Jr. has played both sides of the ball, how do you think that will help him at the next level?

(O'Brien) "I think these guys that do that, that play on both sides of the ball, a lot of these guys – if you look at Tytus (Howard) just as an example, playing quarterback and doing those things even though that's not the other side of the ball, I think that's really important. I even think that guys that play other sports – you look at Warring, he played water polo, the type of conditioning that it takes to be able to do that. I think that's important. I think it's good. I think the more experience they have in different roles when they come through their high school careers, their college careers, I think that's really helpful."

How many players do you have that have a master's degree by the time they're drafted like T Max Scharping?

(Gaine) "Yeah, that's good to have, it's certainly a valuable asset to have. It just goes to show you their commitment to learning and educating and improving themselves. To me it displays their willingness to get better."

You go into the final day with three picks left. What do you see is the most immediate needs you still need to address?

(Gaine) "We're going to honor the board. We're going to honor the process. You heard me say this before. It's just the best available player that makes the most sense in the moment and at that time. We'll have to wait and see because we don't have a pick in the fourth round. We have spots five, six and seven, so we'll get good valuable additions to the team, add some good talent at all those points in the draft."





CONFERENCE CALL WITH CB LONNIE JOHNSON JR. (4/26)

What does it mean to you to be drafted into the NFL after growing up in Gary, Indiana?

"It's hard coming out of Gary. Getting up out of here is just different. I've just had a lot of support today. I broke down because I know how hard it is getting out of there, and I know that I'm not done yet."

What does it say about your character that you persevered on the football field and in the classroom to get to where you are?

"It just basically shows that I work hard. Everything that it took to get here, everything I've been through, I'm lost for words right now. I really just don't even know what to say."

Were there some moments in junior college where you nearly quit playing football?

"I almost gave it up at one point in junior college because I kept getting knocked down every step I tried to take. Every step forward I tried to take, I kept getting knocked down. I almost thought about giving it up. (I) just stuck with it. Ended up finally qualifying through school, got to Kentucky and ended up doing the right thing."

How much do you feel your size gives you an advantage on the field?

"I'll do whatever they need me to do. At the end of the day, I know what I work at and I know my size is a big thing and that's part of the reason they drafted me today. I'm just ready. I'm just ready to get to work."

What coverage do you feel most comfortable executing?

"Press man. Press man. I like to get down there and get gritty."

What was the transition from wide receiver to defensive back like?

"It was really just going from forward to backward. I'm doing everything that a receiver's doing backwards. I know what he's doing, just trying to anticipate things."

Do you try to emulate 49ers CB Richard Sherman's game?

"Yeah, a little bit of Richard Sherman, Pat Pete (Patrick Peterson), Jalen Ramsey's my guy. I really just try to emulate everything they do because I know they're bigger corners in this league."

How did you feel about your meetings with the Texans throughout the draft process? Were you surprised the Texans drafted you?

"I had a great feeling meeting with them. It was surprising just because I didn't know when it was going to happen. It didn't know when or where I was going, but when it happened, I just thanked God. I was happy. I'm humbled and I'm ready."

How do you feel about playing on a defense led by DE J.J. Watt and DE/OLB Jadeveon Clowney?

"They're going to be my best friends. They help me make plays and I'm going to help them. I'm going to give them that time they need to get back there."

Did you work out for the Texans at Kentucky?

"Yes sir."

Did you meet with the Texans at the combine or during a visit?

"Yes sir. I met with them at the combine, the Senior Bowl and worked out for them at my school."

Where did your nickname 'Lotto' come from?

"Just basically because I'm lucky. I'm lucky to make it out of here, I'm lucky to be in this position. I'm lucky to get drafted. Everything – I'm lucky. That's why they gave it to me when I was young."

Who gave you your nickname 'Lotto'?

"My dad."

What would you say to people at the University of Kentucky?

"I just thank them for everything. They gave me the opportunity to come to Kentucky and just show off my talent. Without them, I wouldn't be where I'm at today."



CONFERENCE CALL WITH T MAX SCHARPING (4/26)

What did you do as far as interaction with the Texans throughout the draft process and were you surprised when they took you?

"I had a private workout with Coach (Mike) Devlin. I wasn't too surprised and I felt it went really well. I'm very happy to be a Texan."

When you met with them, did they talk to you more about playing on the outside or playing on the inside?

"A little bit of both. Whatever they need me at, I'll be available to play guard or tackle."

You played a little bit of guard but mostly at tackle, right?

"Yeah, I played mostly tackle in college. But, I played a little bit my freshman year at guard. I've been working with O-line coaches at guard, too. I'm comfortable with both, so whichever one they ask me to play, I'll be able to do."

You've been working privately during the draft process to be prepared for guard?

"Yes, sir."

I read that you started 53 consecutive games. Durability is something that is not a problem for you, correct?

"Yeah, I started every game through four years – 53 starts. So, I feel like durability is one of the best aspects of my game."

What do you know about QB Deshaun Watson?

"I know he's one of the best quarterbacks in the league. He's a great person to be able to protect for. He's athletic. He can move throughout the pocket and he has a great arm. I can't wait to be one of the guys protecting him."

I saw that you had a 3.99 GPA in college. Why are you such an under-achiever in the classroom?

"You can't just set the bar too high. You can't get that 4.0. That's what it is."

Which teacher did you wrong?

"It was freshman year English teacher. I don't know what I did. Obviously, I upset her or something."

The Texans will practice with the Packers and then play at Lambeau this year. What will that mean to you to get to play in Green Bay?

"My dad actually talked about it already. I'm actually in Green Bay right now. It will be an amazing opportunity for me and my family to be able to see me play at Lambeau early on in my career. I can't wait for that."

What are the challenges to work through as you potentially prepare for playing guard?

"Obviously, everything happens a little bit faster at guard, so you need to have your hands and feet ready a little bit faster than at tackle. You have a little bit more space at tackle. It's a little bit more physical inside, so you just have to adapt your game a little bit for both of those."

What do you have your master's degree in?

"I have my master's (degree) in exercise physiology. Hopefully that will translate onto the field."

What does it mean for you to be teammates with DE J.J. Watt?

"I grew up watching him at Wisconsin, so it's going to be amazing to be on the same team. You're going against the best defensive line in the country, really. You've got him, you've got (Jadeveon) Clowney. Blocking those guys in practice every day, you're going to be going up against the best, so games should be a lot easier."

Did you go to a lot of games growing up at Lambeau Field? When was the last time you went as a fan?

"I actually was at a game just this past year even in college. I got to come to a Monday Night one. I've been to games basically all throughout my life. I'm used to Lambeau, just not on the field part. That'll be very interesting."



CONFERENCE CALL WITH TE KAHALE WARRING (4/26)

How much did playing water polo help you prepare to play football?

"I think water polo helps a lot with your hand-eye coordination and just becoming an overall athlete. Really, I think basketball is what transitioned the most."

How did you decide to play football after playing multiple sports?

"I played a ton of different sports in high school at the varsity level. All of that really helped make me a complete athlete. I took away so many different traits from each sport. I think basketball transitioned so well just because any time you're lined up on a defender, similar to giving a guy an inside-out move and then getting past him and finishing at the hoop, just like in football you're getting past your defender, you're attacking him, you're giving him a little move and you're going up and catching the ball. I think football and basketball go hand-in-hand really well."

Did someone convince you to play football or is it something you discovered naturally?

"I've always been really curious about the sport. I always wanted to play. My last chance to try to play the sport was my senior year of high school. My mom never let me play growing up. She said if you really want to play, then you'll play in high school. I finally made the switch my senior year of high school. I really just played to have fun. Had a really fun season, and it wasn't until later after the season my coaches said that I could play college football if I wanted to. I was excited because I really just fell in love with the sport."

Do you view blocking as something you want to improve at as you enter your NFL career?

"Yeah, that's something I'm really excited to work on with my tight ends coach and Coach (Tim) Kelly, the offensive coordinator. Him being a tight ends coach as well in the past, I'm really just excited to get in and do whatever they tell me to do and perfect my craft through them. That's what I'm really excited about."

How excited are you to play with QB Deshaun Watson?

"I'm thrilled. I actually got a chance to catch a few passes from him in the past. I think he's an unbelievable player. I can't wait to get with him and start working on things. I think he's such an unbelievable leader. He was at Clemson and I know that transitioned right to the Texans right now. So,

I'm thrilled to get working with him."

Did you work out with QB Deshaun Watson at UCLA?

"It was in the L.A. area."

What was your contact like with the Texans before the draft?

"They came out and worked me out. I also took a visit out there to Houston. I stayed out there for two days. I had a day break from all of my visits so I stayed in Houston for a day. I actually got a chance to go to a Rockets game when they were making all of those three-point shots. I got a feel for Houston, and the next day I got to visit the facility and meet all of the coaches. So, I already feel like I have a good feel for the city and the organization. They were my No. 1 choice from the get-go."

When you decided to start playing football as a senior in high school, did you ever think you'd be drafted into the NFL?

"No, I was just playing and enjoying the game of football, falling in love with it day by day. I was just having fun with my friends."



T TYTUS HOWARD INTRODUCTORY PRESS CONFERENCE (4/26)

HEAD COACH BILL O'BRIEN

Opening Statement

"Good afternoon everybody. Appreciate everybody coming out today. This is an exciting day for us here in Houston. What I'd like to start off by doing is to introduce our first-round pick from last night, Tytus Howard, an offensive lineman from Alabama State. I'd also like to introduce his family that's here today. His mom, Teresa, his grandmother, Wyona, and his fiancée, Chelsea. They're here with him today.

When Brian Gaine and I think about Tytus Howard, we think, first of all, smart, tough, dependable. Tytus was a three-year starter at Alabama State. (He) was a three-year captain. Tytus was very impressive to us from the day we met him. Brian spent time with him at the Senior Bowl. We all spent time with him at the combine. We had a very interesting meeting at the combine where Tytus was very impressive in the combine room in the meeting led by Brian Gaine, Matt Bazirgan, James Liipfert, and then Mike Devlin and myself were in there. We were really impressed. Obviously, like I always talk to you guys about, the stages of the draft – obviously, watching Tytus on tape, four-hole player. I feel like we have a guy here that can play tackle and guard. We're going to start him off at tackle and we're going to teach him both positions. We'll get going right away with him. We're really looking forward to working with him. He's a leader. I can't tell you how many people spoke very highly of him, especially his coaches all the way back from high school to college. Also, just want to say 'Welcome to Houston, Tytus.' Looking forward to working with you, and most importantly, welcome to your family, today. Appreciate you guys being here. I know it's been a long night. It was an exciting night last night."

T TYTUS HOWARD

What was it like to be back in the Texans facility after visiting here during the pre-draft process?

"It was a great feeling to come back. I had a great visit, so I felt good. I felt at home when I came on my visit. When I came in with my family today, it just felt good to be back here and know I'm going to be here for a long time."

What role has your family played in developing you as a man and how have the values your family instilled in you made an impact in your life?

"It always started with respect. Growing up, my grandmother, my mother always instilled in me to be respectful and go after everything I wanted to be. Just growing up and just watching them be the people they are, it helped me and motivated me to be better. I had a great grandfather who was a hard-working man. I always modeled myself after him, and that made me happy to just to do this and be where I am today to help my family out. I have a great fiancée who's always on me. She keeps me humble. She keeps me level. So, I have to credit her for helping me be the person that I am."

What was the meeting with the Texans at the combine like?

"Just showing how smart I am as a player. My former background as a quarterback helped me analyze things a lot faster. So, once they were able to see that, the meeting started off great. It helped them to make me an easy choice."

What has been going through your mind since you heard your name called last night?

"It was an unbelievable feeling. When it first happened, tears just came down my face. I was so happy to be in the moment and to have my family experience that with me. I got back to the bed at night, I look at my fiancée and I was like, 'Dang. It feels like I'm dreaming.' I didn't get much sleep. Came in here today just prepared. I'm ready to come back and just get to work, be the best teammate I can be and help this team win."

How did you end up playing at Alabama State? Did you consider other schools?

"I considered a lot of schools. I was a quarterback and got overlooked in high school. I was a lot smaller than I am today. My mom actually reached out to the head coach at Alabama State about me coming on as a walk-on. I ended up walking on there. That coach actually left after that semester. A new coach came in. He gave me a chance to earn a scholarship. After the semester went by, he said he was impressed and offered me a scholarship. I transitioned to offensive tackle, and that's how I am where I am today."

How does it feel to be the first person from an HBCU in 11 years?

"It's a great feeling. It just speaks for itself that no matter where you are, you can get picked up from anywhere. Teams are going to find you. It's just about how much work you have to put in and how dedicated you are to football. I just hope this helps be a ladder for other guys in the future. I'm going to represent HBCUs in a positive way."

How much did you have to eat to put on the weight you did to transition to offensive line?

"I always was a big eater growing up. I guess when I got to college and got older, it caught up with me. I had to eat a lot, drink a lot of protein shakes. Actually, my first time ever working out for real was college. I didn't work out in high school at all. I got to college, I started working out and got bigger and stronger. Just eating a lot of calories. Then, my girl – actually when we got our first apartment – that became better for us because I didn't have to eat in the cafeteria. I would skip meals when I had to eat in the cafeteria. So, she would cook for me every night. My mom cooked for me all the time. She baked desserts for me. The weight just came on. Then, I actually got taller over the years. I thought I was done when I got to high school. I was like 6-3. One semester went by and I jumped up to 6-4. Another semester, 6-5. That's how I am today."

How many pre-draft visits did you take? Did you face anyone in particular at the Senior Bowl that made you believe you could play at this level?

"I took around 24 visits, in that area. It was a lot of travel. I was on the road for like a month straight. I got to go home for two days. The Senior Bowl was pretty great. I got a chance to play against a lot of great players. One in particular would be Montez Sweat. I went in one-on-ones. I won the first rep, lost the second rep. Got to team and had a great team. After that first day of practice, I came to talk to the offensive line coach. He was like, 'You belong here.' I was like, 'I know I belong here. I'm going to get better tomorrow.' I got better the next day. I told him I'd have a better day the next day, and I got better that day. So, that week just gave me a lot more motivation. I had a chip on my shoulder to be better, to prove that I belong, and I did that."

Do you remember playing both sides of the ball against Alcorn State? And what does it mean to have your coach speak so highly of you?

"He's just speaking on me because of the type of person and player I am. Coach (Donald Hill-) Eley and I have a great relationship. He was actually my tight ends coach when I first got to Alabama State and he's the one who moved me to offensive tackle. Going into that week at Alcorn, I actually got sick the night before the game – I had some food poisoning. The day of the game, they gave me some IVs and I was like, 'I'm still going to play, Coach.' I go out there to play and I was playing right tackle. The guy at left tackle was struggling with the guy who was over him, so I went to the sideline and asked my coach if I could move to left tackle and you put him at right tackle. I ended up moving to left tackle and locked that guy down for the rest of the game. It got to the end of the game and one of our d-linemen was hurt. Coach needed somebody to go in on field goal block. I was like, 'Put me in, Coach. I'll go in on field goal block.' I hadn't ever played it before. I actually ended up getting through the line and almost blocking the kick. The guy missed the field goal, and we won in overtime. I just love to play football. Any position I can get in at and help the team, that's what I want to do."

You didn't get food poisoning from your fiancée's cooking, right?

"No, no. It was actually from the hotel. I think they tried to get me."



What stood out to you the first time you talked to Head Coach Bill O'Brien?

"Just his attitude. He's all about football. That's how I am myself. I just want to play for a coach who's about winning, being a great person, being a great teammate and that's what he's about. So, hopefully when I get here, I can live up to the expectations – which I am going to do – and be the best football player I can to help this team win some games but also be a great teammate."

Are you more comfortable playing at right or left tackle?

"To be completely honest, it's about the same for both. When I first started playing offensive line, I started playing right tackle, but I was running with the twos at left tackle. So, my coach was like, 'If I'm going to make you learn tackle, I might as well make you learn both of them at once.' Over the years, I played both in and out at left tackle and right tackle. In practice, I ran with the ones, twos and the threes just because we didn't have that much depth on the offensive line. I feel completely comfortable playing left or right tackle and also playing some guard as well."



GENERAL MANAGER BRIAN GAINE (4/25)

Do you plan to use T Tytus Howard on the left or right side?

"We see Tytus Howard as an offensive lineman. We'll start the best five, however it works out. He'll have a chance to compete for a starting job, come in and earn what he gets, but the fact of the matter is, Tytus has been a starting-caliber player at right tackle and left tackle. He's played both positions. So, however it works out, we'll see. It remains to be seen. We also think he can play guard. We believe he's a four-hole player, prototypical guy, has all of the height, weight, speed – the measurables that we like. He's got the make-up, the intangible profile that's excellent. I believe he was a three-time captain for his university, so it's a very interesting story in terms of his background and his profile. We're excited to have him."

What went into the decision to draft T Tytus Howard? Did it have more to do with his game tape or things you saw at the Senior Bowl?

"As it relates to the profile of Tytus, we felt like he passed each test – in terms of the process of scouting – with flying colors. What I mean by that is if you just think back to the fall season, how he played during the fall, had starts both on the left side and the right side, goes to the Senior Bowl and plays well. Goes to the best All-Star game in the business and played very well. In fact, he started that game. Goes to the combine and excels. Did very well in the interview process, the private workout settings that we had with him, the Pro Day settings. I felt like with each interval, he was able to pass each segment with flying colors. (He) made a very favorable impression in terms of the intangible profile, the person, the character matched with the physical ability and the physical traits. We felt like he checked all the boxes."

Do you believe T Tytus Howard's best football is ahead of him with all of the resources the Texans can offer?

"He's going to have a great opportunity here in terms of our infrastructure – certainly will at a professional level. You're talking about a guy who's 6-foot-5, 320 pounds, ran a 5.0 flat, has the height, the length, the size, the strength. He lifted well, he ran well, he moved well. Then, with our infrastructure here in terms of our strength and conditioning program, our sports science element, our player wellness, our training room, our nutrition program. He's going to have all of these great benefits, I think, to really maximize his potential."

What stood out to you about T Tytus Howard during the interview process?

"First and foremost, (he's) a very authentic person when you meet him. What you see is what you're going to get, No. 1. No. 2, from a football character standpoint, from the make-up standpoint, the football intelligence, the passion and love for the game, (he) has both physical and mental toughness – a very dependable guy. He embraces the process of preparing to win in football. Everything that goes into it Monday through Saturday is excellent. Then, we know he loves playing on Sundays. We know he's going to love playing football on Sundays, but it's the process of preparation. He fully embraces it. He loves the process of getting ready to play football."

What parts of the transition to the NFL can be more challenging for a player who played college football at a small school?

"Certainly competition, the level of competition, but what I would say is the level of competition that he played at, he played at a very high level. Someone alluded to it earlier about the Auburn game, in terms of the best competition he played against, the Auburn game, and then the Senior Bowl where he started in the Senior Bowl and excelled in both experiences that he had. I know the competition in terms of comparably speaking to a power-five conference, he's not coming from a power-five conference, but I'm not concerned about that at all."

How proud are you of your scouting department to find a player like T Tytus Howard?

"Our scouting department did a wonderful job here evaluating him. The scouting process starts as early as August in terms of when the scouts go out. They're watching the film through the summer once they get their list in June and they're preparing to go visit these schools in August, September and October. So, our scouts were on him since, I would say, as early as August when we were visiting the training camps."

Do you feel like there are still good cornerbacks, offensive linemen and pass rushers available in the draft?

"I do. I think this is a great opportunity for the team tomorrow, here on Day [2], to get not two, but three good players – three contributing players. Just looking at our board right now, it looks very favorable for us in terms of spots 54 and 55 to get some impactful contributors, not just at the positions you mentioned. I think across the board right now, we're positioned very well to get two good players at 54 and 55, and 86 is very favorable for us as well."

How much do you value versatility in offensive linemen?

"We value it highly. The way we look at Tytus (Howard), we really see him as an offensive lineman. Similarly, what we said about Martinas Rankin last year. Wherever Martinas plays for us this year, whether it be tackle or guard, guard or tackle, when you think about the 46-man roster, you may dress only seven offensive linemen. So, he's going to have a chance to compete for a starting role. I just don't know what position that's going to be. It could be tackle, it could be right, it could be left, it could be left guard, it could be right guard."

How did T Tytus Howard compare to T Andre Dillard on your draft board?

“Both talented guys. From a physical profile on both players, they both fit the bill in terms of what we would look for at the position. Andre Dillard – talented player. Tytus (Howard), equally talented, but they are also – from the intangible profile and the football character profile – both were very strong in those categories. Both good players, deserving of where they went on the draft board.”

Will you address the reports regarding DE/OLB Jadeveon Clowney?

“I’m not going to address speculation. I’m not going to do that.”

Did you consider trading up for T Andre Dillard?

“I’m not going to disclose any kind of trade decisions that we’ve had.”

Does it impede T Tytus Howard’s progress to focus on versatility rather than focusing on one position?

“That’s a fair assessment in terms of a rookie coming in. The first thing you want them to do is learn what they have to do to be successful, and then you give them as much as they think they can handle. We think Tytus (Howard) has the ability to handle volume in terms of the mental and the intelligence part of it. We’re excited about that because we feel he will be dependable in the classroom.”

Why do you think it’s a positive to not label T Tytus Howard a specific position such as left tackle?

“It’s about competition. It’s about competition. We have (Julién) Davenport, we have (Matt) Kalil, (at) left tackle right now. We have Seantrel Henderson at right tackle. The best five will play, whoever those players are. He played right tackle and he played left tackle. That could be the position, but it’s also about competition.”

For your prep for this draft, how much did you anticipate it to unfold the way it did with all the cornerbacks still available?

“The draft process can be unpredictable. This is why we spend 11 months preparing for it. We’re always contingency planning. We try to honor the board and value the board and let the board speak to us as it relates to who we should take next and who we should consider. This is why we spend so much time putting the board together so that we’re prepared for, ‘Hey, if this happens, we do that.’ ‘If that happens, we do that.’ So, we’re always contingency planning and we are always ready to make those decisions when they happen.”

Are you surprised only one cornerback went in the first round?

“Yes and no. Sometimes it’s based on need, sometimes it’s based on best available. You’re not in other people’s draft rooms. You don’t know what their boards look like as it pertains to what they need or who they see as the best available on their board. Tomorrow is a very good opportunity for a lot of good corners to get selected because there are a lot of good remaining corners on the board.”

When you spoke with us last week, you mentioned best available meeting with needs of the team. How do you feel like the selection tonight fits into that?

“Very good, very good. I felt like our process to arrive at the decision was very clean, very precise, very detailed. I had full input from personnel staff, coaching staff. This was a unified decision for sure.”

Did you learn a lot about T Tytus Howard at the Senior Bowl with you and your personnel being there?

“I wouldn’t say that was the defining moment about what we learned about Tytus (Howard). I’ve said this before; scouting truly is a process and it doesn’t just end when the season ends. It really starts for us in June when we get our list and we start watching the films through the summer. He was a guy that the whole National Football League knew about as early as the month of June and then when you went and saw him play in August and September and the early portions of the fall, you saw a good-looking prospect. Like I said, he passed the test at every stage of our evaluation. Happy to have him.”

Playing multiple positions in his upbringing as a football player, how has that helped T Tytus Howard’s athleticism and how does his athleticism compare to other offensive linemen around the league?

“Being versatile in the league, first and foremost is very valuable. You heard me allude to it earlier. It’s not just always about the 53-man roster. It’s really about the 46 when you talk about the versatility because then on gameday it could be a number of different things. If injuries happen, he could play four positions for us. That being said, when you’re playing other positions, yes, you do have to have a level of athleticism to do that because you’re moving from an edge position where you’re handling speed, power, athleticism and then you’re moving inside and you’re maybe dealing with more power, brute strength in a shorter box. So, we feel that his physical dimensions allow him to do both, either or, which we like because on gameday it gives us a ton of versatility and then when injuries happen, we have the ability to move some pieces around.”

What kind of on-field demeanor does T Tytus Howard have? Does he play with a nastiness?

“He does. Physical and mental toughness, very good, very instinctive player. He’s aggressive, plays hard, plays to the whistle. We are excited about that because it matches with the physical profile as well. The best selections, I know I have said this in the past, are the ones where you have a guy that meets the physical profile with the intangible profile and we like that profile on offensive lineman, especially. He’s going to be a good addition to what I would say the offensive line room. He’s going to be a very good addition in terms of the football personality in the offensive line room.”

T Tytus Howard is still relatively new to the offensive line. He mentioned that he is still learning to be this size. In what ways does that manifest into his game?

“It’s a great story. If you know the profile and understand the profile of how he’s developed to where he is right now – quarterback to tight end to offensive line. It’s a great story about development as well. The fact is he’s played two other skilled positions on offense. If anything, that’s going to be a strength of his. He’ll have a full understanding of the passing game, the pass-protection schemes, the run game. There really shouldn’t be any limitations. He’ll understand the premises and maybe the things that a quarterback has to deal with. He’ll understand what a tight end has to deal with and he’s playing offensive line. I think that’s a very unique skillset when it comes to the mental profile of the game.”

Do you know of any offensive linemen that were quarterbacks in high school?

“I don’t know about quarterbacks. I don’t. But, I know some where certainly tight ends.”

CONFERENCE CALL WITH T TYTUS HOWARD (4/25)

How does it feel to get drafted by the Houston Texans after attending an FCS school?

"It's just an unbelievable feeling right now. I'm just blessed to be a part of the Houston Texans. Great organization. I had a good feeling about the team when I went and did my visit and they decided to draft me. I promise you they didn't make a mistake. I'm going to go out there and give them everything I have."

What do you know about QB Deshaun Watson and how much are you looking forward to protecting him?

"I know Deshaun Watson is a very mobile quarterback. He's been one of the best quarterbacks. He still hasn't been in the league that long. Me being a tackle, I feel like me and my athleticism, I'll be able to protect him longer. He's more mobile, so he moves around a lot more. I feel like me and him are going to build a great relationship while I'm there and help win some games for the Houston Texans."

Who is the most responsible for helping you change your body as you transition from a quarterback to where you are at now?

"My strength staff, they helped me. Coach Medgar Harrison was very hard on me. He stayed on me about eating right. My fiancé always cooked for me. I was always eating and I'm just getting bigger and faster and stronger over the years."

Can you talk about your athleticism and being able to transition from tight end to offensive line?

"I will still be able to use all my athleticism. The more I picked up weight, I know I lost a little speed but my athleticism still stayed there. I've been able to move in ways all offensive linemen aren't able to move, so I think just me playing tight end and quarterback, it just helped me because I never lost it."

When you visited the Texans, what kind of feedback did you get from General Manager Brian Gaine and Head Coach Bill O'Brien and how seriously did you think they were taking you as their potential first-round pick?

"I got some great feedback from them. I was just talking to them and they liked the player I was and the person I was. They gave me good feedback and saying they liked me and the player they hoped they could get me."

How do you feel at all that you are still learning the tackle position and the size that you are at right now?

"Yes, sir. I still feel like I am still learning more about this. I'm pretty smart, but as a player I have a lot to learn. Get to the NFL, get better from day one. I know that my ceiling is high and I'm looking to be the best I can be."

As a former quarterback, do you feel like you have a sense for how long the quarterback needs and what you need to protect him because you played that position?

"Yes, that's one of the main things with me playing quarterback. I know how it feels to play quarterback, so I know how being sacked feels. I try my best to not give up any sacks so I try to play as long as I can from keep the guy from hitting the quarterback."

You had an interesting tweet today about you and a gorilla and a phone booth. Can you tell us about that?

"There was a saying that one of my offensive line coaches used to say, his mentality is you put him in a cage with a gorilla, you better pray for the gorilla, not him because he's going to be all right. That's just how I feel. You just put me in a cage with anybody and I feel like I'm going to come out. That's my mentality going in."

How does it feeling coming out of an HBCU school and going in the first round, especially since the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) doesn't get a lot of love when it comes to the NFL Draft?

"It's just so special to me. Just to represent the HBCU schools and the SWAC. Just to show that you can have players come from HBCU and the SWAC and just be good players like they have in the SEC and ACC. For me, to get this chance to be drafted as a first-round pick, I'm going to make the most out of it so guys in the future who are from the SWAC get a chance to get looked at like I did."

What's your favorite meal your fiancé makes for you?

"My favorite would be her chicken spaghetti. I'll eat that back-to-back nights. I'll eat the whole pan."

Did eating your fiancé's meals help you get to the weight you needed to be to play offensive line?

"Yes, it did. It really did. It helped me pack on weight, but not in a bad way. It helped me out a lot."

Did the Texans indicate if you would play right or left tackle?

"They feel like I can play right tackle, left tackle or guard. So, whatever position they put me in, I'm going to go in and make the most out of it."

Have you played guard before in your career?

"I have before in practice, but I can play anything you put me in at. That's how good I can adjust to it."

You've been compared to former Arkansas-Pine Bluff and current Saints T Terron Armstead. Do you know him?

"Yeah, I'm familiar with him. I actually talked to Terron Armstead about a week ago. He said he was just sending me prayers. He just told me he hoped the best for me, and if I need anything, let him know. I'm not going to hold him short of that because I know the type of player he is and where he came from. I know I can learn a lot from him."

How high were you expecting to go in the draft?

"I was expecting first round."

TEXANS DRAFT NOTES

HOME GROWN

The Texans have drafted 23 players overall and at least one player in all but the 2013, 2014 and 2016 drafts that either went to college or high school in Texas or had some connection to the state.

Houston took Texas DE **Charles Omenihu** with the 23rd pick of the fifth round (161st overall) and Texas A&M FB **Cullen Gillaspia** with the sixth pick of the seventh round (220th overall). Omenihu is from Houston while Gillaspia is from Katy, Texas. This marks the first time in team history that the Texans drafted a player from Texas and a player from Texas A&M in the same draft. It also marks the third year in a row the Texans selected two players with Texas ties.

FIRST IMPRESSIONS

The Texans saw a lot of production from their 2018 draft class on both offense and defense.

TE JORDAN AKINS (3RD ROUND, 98TH OVERALL)

Recorded 17 receptions for 225 yards (13.2 avg.) in 16 games as a rookie.

WR KEKE COUTEE (4TH ROUND, 103RD OVERALL)

Set franchise records for the most receptions (11) and receiving yards (109) in an NFL debut in Week 4 at Indianapolis. Finished his rookie season with 28 receptions for 287 yards (10.3 avg.) and one touchdown in six games played.

OLB DUKE EJIOFOR (6TH ROUND, 177TH OVERALL)

Notched eight total tackles (six solo), 1.0 sack, two passes defended, two quarterback hits, one tackle for loss and one fumble recovery in 11 games. Became the fifth rookie in franchise history to record a sack in his first career NFL game.

ILB PETER KALAMBAYI (6TH ROUND, 214TH OVERALL)

Tallied five total tackles (four solo) on defense and eight special teams tackles in 15 games played as a rookie.

T MARTINAS RANKIN (3RD ROUND, 80TH OVERALL)

Appeared in all 16 games (four starts) at both left tackle and left guard.

S JUSTIN REID (3RD ROUND, 68TH OVERALL)

Compiled 81 total tackles (64 solo), three interceptions (including one returned 101 yards for a touchdown), 10 passes defended, one quarterback hit, two tackles for loss, one forced fumble, two fumble recoveries and seven special teams tackles in 16 games (12 starts), becoming the first NFL player to record that stat line in a season since each stat became officially tracked by the NFL.

TE JORDAN THOMAS (6TH ROUND, 211TH OVERALL)

Finished his rookie season with 20 receptions for 215 yards (10.8 avg.) and four touchdowns, which tied Andre Johnson (four) for the second-most touchdown receptions in a season by a rookie in team history. Thomas also tied Mychal Rivera and Clarence Moore (four) for the second-most touchdown receptions by a rookie selected in the sixth round-or-later since 1991.

BUILT THROUGH THE DRAFT

Despite not having a first- or second-round selection in the 2018 NFL Draft, Texans rookies combined to play 18.73 percent of all team plays (4,600-of-24,565) in 2018, which marked the third-highest among NFL division leaders.

Houston's rookie class played a total of 4,600 snaps on offense, defense and special teams, which ranked 10th in the NFL. The Texans rookie class played 16.96 percent of offensive and defensive snaps (2,911-of-17,168) and led the NFL in percentage of special teams snaps played at 22.83 percent (1,689-of-7,397 total special teams snaps.)

On offense, Texans rookie TE Jordan Thomas tied Andre Johnson for the second-most touchdown receptions (four) by a rookie in franchise history, while WR Keke Coutee set franchise records for the most receptions (11) and receiving yards (109) in a player's NFL debut.

On defense, Texans rookie S Justin Reid became the first player to record 81 total tackles, three interceptions, 10 passes defended, two fumble recoveries and seven special teams tackles in the NFL since each stat became officially tracked by the NFL, while rookie OLB Duke Ejirofor became just the fifth player in team history to record a sack in his NFL debut.

As for special teams, Texans rookie S A.J. Moore led the team with 11 special teams tackles, while rookie P Trevor Daniel finished fourth in the NFL with 36 punts pinned inside the 20-yard line in 2018.

G FRED WEARY (2002, 3RD ROUND, 66TH PICK)

Started 43-of-63 games he appeared in for the Texans from 2002-07. Blocked for two 1,000-yard rushers.

RB JONATHAN WELLS (2002, 4TH ROUND, 99TH PICK)

Played in 60 games (18 starts) from 2002-05. Ran for 1,167 yards and 10 TDs on 374 attempts (3.1 avg.). Caught 44 passes for 323 yards (7.3 avg.) and two TDs.

CB DEMARCUS FAGGINS (2002, 6TH ROUND, 173RD PICK)

Appeared in 82 games (36 starts) for the Texans from 2002-08, logging 191 total tackles (167 solo), 38 passes defended, five interceptions, three forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries, 1.0 sack and 26 special teams tackles. Returned an interception 43 yards for a touchdown in 2004.

RB DOMANICK WILLIAMS (2003, 4TH ROUND, 101ST PICK)

Named NFL Rookie of the Year in 2003 after rushing for 1,031 yards. Went on to post back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons. Ranks second in team history with 3,195 career rushing yards and was named to the Pro Football Weekly All-Rookie Team. Played for the Texans from 2003-05 and started 36-of-40 games played.

S GLENN EARL (2004, 4TH ROUND, 122ND PICK)

Started 31-of-37 games from 2004-06 and recorded 147 total tackles (112 solo), three interceptions, 10 passes defended, 2.0 sacks and one forced fumble.

LB CHARLIE ANDERSON (2004, 6TH ROUND, 200TH PICK)

Played in 60 games (five starts) from 2004-07 with Houston, compiling 38 tackles, 3.0 sacks, three forced fumbles, four passes defended & 40 special teams tackles.

WR JEROME MATHIS (2005, 4TH ROUND, 114TH PICK)

Named to the 2006 Pro Bowl and All-Pro Team after returning 54 kickoffs for 1,542 yards and two TDs in 12 games. Ranked second in the NFL with a 28.6 avg. and was named to the PFWA All-Rookie Team. With the Texans from 2005-07.

S C.C. BROWN (2005, 6TH ROUND, 188TH PICK)

Started 47-of-50 games he played in for the Texans from 2005-08 and tallied 251 total tackles (193 solo), three interceptions, 16 passes defended, four forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries and 1.0 sack.

T ERIC WINSTON (2006, 3RD ROUND, 66TH PICK)

Started 87 consecutive games at right tackle from 2006-11 and helped lead the Texans offense to three consecutive top-five finishes from 2008-10.

TE OWEN DANIELS (2006, 4TH ROUND, 98TH PICK)

Had 385 receptions for 4,617 yards & 29 TDs (2006-13). Elected to 2009 & 2013 Pro Bowl. Named to PFWA All-Rookie Team with 34 rec. for 352 yards & 5 TDs.

WR JACOBY JONES (2007, 3RD ROUND, 73RD PICK)

Ranks first all-time in franchise history in punt return yards with 1,820 to go along with three touchdowns on 179 returns (10.2 avg.). Played in 75 games for the Texans, recording 127 catches for 1,741 yards and 11 touchdowns from 2007-11.

LB ZAC DILES (2007, 7TH ROUND, 218TH PICK)

Played in 50 games (30 starts) from 2007-10 with Houston, compiling 212 tackles, 1.0 sack, an interception, five quarterback hits, 14 tackles for loss, three forced fumbles, a fumble recovery, three passes defended & 11 special teams tackles.

RB STEVE SLATON (2008, 3RD ROUND, 89TH PICK)

Set a team record as a rookie with 1,282 yards rushing and led the AFC in total yards from scrimmage with 1,659. Ranks sixth in team history in career rushing yards with 1,832. Played in 42 games (26 starts) for the Texans from 2008-2011.

S GLOVER QUIN (2009, 4TH ROUND, 112TH PICK)

Notched 310 total tackles (248 solo), 47 passes defended, five interceptions, three forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries and 14 tackles for loss in 63 games played (60 starts) with the Texans (2009-12). Started all 16 games for three straight seasons (2010-12) after starting 12 games as a rookie in 2009.

TE JAMES CASEY (2009, 5TH ROUND, 152ND PICK)

Appeared in 61 games (20 starts) and caught 66 passes for 752 yards (11.4 avg.) and four touchdowns (2009-12). Also had 28 special teams tackles.

CB BRICE MCCAIN (2009, 6TH ROUND, 152ND PICK)

Appeared in 72 games from 2009-13 and posted 105 total tackles (88 solo), 33 passes defended, five interceptions, including one returned for a touchdown, and 19 special teams tackles.

DT EARL MITCHELL (2010, 3RD ROUND, 81ST PICK)

Played in 63 games (17 starts) from 2010-13. Recorded 134 total tackles (81 solo), 3.5 sacks, six quarterback hits, six tackles for loss, one forced fumble, two fumble recoveries and four passes defended.

TE GARRETT GRAHAM (2010, 4TH ROUND, 118TH PICK)

Registered 100 receptions for 1,059 yards and 10 touchdowns in six seasons with the Texans (2010-15). Started 31-of-60 games played and tied for the team lead in receiving touchdowns with five in 2013.

QB T.J. YATES (2011, 5TH ROUND, 152ND PICK)

Led Houston to its first playoff appearance, first division crown and first postseason win in franchise history. Became the first rookie quarterback in 43 years to lead a team to back-to-back fourth-quarter wins and was the fourth fifth-round pick since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to win his first start. Has served three stints with the Texans (2011-13, 2015 and 2017) and appeared in 21 games (10 starts). Re-joined the Texans as an offensive assistant in 2019.

T DEREK NEWTON (2011, 7TH ROUND, 214TH PICK)

Started in 68-of-82 games he played in from 2011-16, including a 56-game start streak from 2012-16, which marked the fifth-longest active streak in the league at the time. Blocked for four 1,000-yard rushers and played LT, LG, RG and RT.

G BRANDON BROOKS (2012, 3RD ROUND, 76TH PICK)

Started 44-of-50 games played for the Texans at guard from 2012-15 and blocked for two 1,000-yard rushers.

C BEN JONES (2012, 4TH ROUND, 99TH PICK)

Named Texans Rookie of the Year in 2012 after starting 10 games and playing in 16. Became a mainstay for the Texans on the offensive line and played in 64 consecutive games, including starting all 16 games in 2014 and 2015. Blocked for two 1,000-yard rushers. Spent the 2012-15 seasons with the Texans.

DE JARED CRICK (2012, 4TH ROUND, 126TH PICK)

Registered 5.5 sacks, including a career-high 3.5 in 2014 with the Texans. Played in 63 games (32 starts) from 2012-15, including starting 31-of-32 games at defensive end in 2014 and 2015. Also recorded 146 total tackles, 13 passes defended and 24 quarterback hits as a Texan.

TE RYAN GRIFFIN (2013, 6TH ROUND, 201ST PICK)

Has appeared in 77 games (36 starts) since 2013, logging 136 catches for 1,491 yards (11.0 avg.) and seven touchdowns.

TE C.J. FIEDOROWICZ (2014, 3RD ROUND, 65TH PICK)

Started 42-of-51 games that he appeared in with the Texans from 2014-17, recording 89 receptions for 881 (9.9 avg.) and six touchdowns.

RB ALFRED BLUE (2014, 6TH ROUND, 181ST PICK)

Set the franchise record for carries in a game (36) and tied a rookie rushing record with 156 yards at Cleveland (11/16/14). Became the first player in franchise history with a rushing, receiving and return touchdown in the same season in 2014. Had 2,407 rushing yards and 10 total touchdowns for Houston from 2014-18.

FB JAY PROSCH (2014, 6TH ROUND, 211TH PICK)

Played in 63-of-64 possible games since getting drafted in 2014, including 13 starts. Blocked for two 1,000-yard rushers in four seasons. Also had 16 special teams tackles from 2014-17.

S ANDRE HAL (2014, 7TH ROUND, 216TH PICK)

Played in 69 games (40 starts) and posted 180 total tackles (124 solo), 12 interceptions, 31 passes defended, six tackles for loss, two forced fumbles, two quarterback hits and 1.0 sack. Led the Texans with 12 interceptions from 2014-18.

DE CHRISTIAN COVINGTON (2015, 6TH ROUND, 216TH PICK)

Appeared in 50 games, including nine starts, since getting drafted in 2015. Registered 65 total tackles (39 solo), 7.5 sacks, 16 quarterback hits, 11 tackles for loss, one forced fumble and one pass defended from 2015-18.

NT D.J. READER (2016, 5TH ROUND, 166TH PICK)

Set career highs in sacks (2.0) tackles for loss (five) and games started (16) in 2018. Tallied 102 total tackles (53 solo), 11 quarterback hits, 10 tackles for loss and 4.0 sacks in 46 games (37 starts) since being drafted in 2016. Recorded a sack in Houston's Wild Card victory over the Raiders in 2016, becoming the third Texans rookie to record a sack in the postseason.

TEXANS DRAFT NOTES

THE EIGHTH ROUND

The Texans have had success with college free agents, including a number of players on the current roster who have been contributors.

ILB DYLAN COLE (2017) - Registered 38 total tackles (23 solo), 1.0 sack, two interceptions including one returned for a touchdown, six passes defended and seven special teams tackles in two seasons in Houston.

P TREVOR DANIEL (2018) - Ranked fourth in the NFL and tied a franchise record with 36 punts pinned inside the 20-yard line as a rookie.

K KA'IMI FAIRBAIRN (2016) - Set franchise records and led the NFL in points scored (150) and field goals made (37) in 2018, and connected on his final 15 field goal attempts of the 2018 season.

C/G GREG MANCZ (2015) - Appeared in 45 career regular season games with 27 starts at both center and guard. Also has appeared in three postseason contests with two starts.

OLB BRENNAN SCARLETT (2016) - Finished with 12 total tackles (eight solo), three passes defended, two quarterback hits, one interception, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and six special teams tackles in 12 games played in 2018.

WR VYNCINT SMITH (2018) - In Week 16 at Philadelphia, became the first college free agent to record a touchdown reception to tie or take the lead in the final 2:30 of a game since Dolphins RB Damien Williams in Week 16 of the 2014 season.

DIAMONDS IN THE ROUGH

In his first NFL draft at the helm, Texans General Manager **Brian Gaine** selected several contributing rookies in the sixth round-or-later and signed several college free agents who played vital roles for Houston in 2018.

Texans TE Jordan Thomas—selected with the 37th pick of the sixth round (211th overall)—tied Mychal Rivera and Clarence Moore (four) for the second-most touchdown receptions by a rookie selected in the sixth round-or-later in the NFL since 1991.

Sixth-round selection OLB Duke Ejirofor became just the third Texans rookie to record a sack in the first two weeks of a season and the first since NT Amobi Okoye in Week 2 of 2007, while fellow sixth-round selection ILB Peter Kalambayi became a stalwart of the Texans special teams units, recording eight special teams tackles in 15 games played as a rookie.

Texans S A.J. Moore recorded the fourth-most special teams total tackles (11) by a college free agent rookie in the NFL, P Trevor Daniel tied a franchise record for the most punts pinned inside the 20-yard line with 36 and WR Vyncint Smith became the first rookie college free agent to start in Week 1 for Houston in franchise history.
