## TEXANS SELECT QB DAVIS MILLS

The Houston Texans selected Stanford QB Davis Mills with the third pick in the third round (67th overall). He is the fourth player drafted by the Texans from Stanford in franchise history.

Mills is the first quarterback drafted by Houston since QB Deshaun Watson in the first round (12th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft. He is also the second quarterback drafted by the Texans in the third round, joining QB Dave Ragone (88th overall) in 2003.
The Texans have drafted nine different quarterbacks in franchise history with Mills being only the fourth selection within the first three rounds of the draft. He is the third Stanford player drafted by the Texans since 2018, which is the most from any college.

Houston now has four quarterbacks on its roster. Mills is only the second (Alex Brink) to be drafted from the Pac-12 in franchise history.

## DAVIS MILLS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- 2020 All-Pac-12 Honorable Mention by the coaches
- 2020 Irving S. Zeimer Award for Team MVP
- 2019 Gundelach Award, given to the Most Outstanding Junior player at Stanford
- Finished his career with a $65.5 \%$ career completion percentage, which was third in school history and a 141.9 career passer rating, ranking fourth in school history
- Set the single-game school record with 504 passing yards on a career-high 33 completions at Washington State (11/16/19)
- Named Allstate Sugar Bowl Manning Award Star of the Week after completing 18 -of- 25 passes for 245 yards and a careerbest three touchdowns in his second career start at Oregon State (9/28/19)
- Made his season debut in 2020 vs. Colorado (11/14) and completed 31 -of-56 passes (55.4\%) for 327 yards. It was his second career 300 -yard passing game and the 56 pass attempts ranked tied for fifth-most by a Stanford quarterback in a single game


## DAVIS MILLS PERSONAL INFORMATION

- Prepped at Greater Atlanta (Ga.) Christian School and was the nation's top-ranked quarterback by Scout and Rivals, totaling 6,290 career passing yards and 66 touchdowns
- Was a three-time all-state selection and left high school as the career leader in touchdown passes and passing yards
- Has two sisters, Erin and Ali, who both played tennis at Tusculum and South Carolina, respectively
- Majored in Science, Technology and Society at Stanford


## WHAT THEY'RE SAYINE...

## Lance Zierlein, NFL Network

"There isn't going to be an excessive amount of tape on Mills, but teams will see a player with below-average mobility, good size and plenty of arm talent for passing attacks looking to open up the entire field. Mills is still in the developmental stage as it pertains to his ability to command the offense and play chess against coverages and blitz looks. He's made for a play-action attack that can promote his timing as a passer and help keep him protected. The injury background and lack of experience are potential stumbling blocks, but the talent is better than the production and worthy of a middle-round pick for development as a good backup to low-end starter."

## Danny Kelly, The Ringer

"Mills has a well-built, athletic frame. A former five-star recruit and the top-ranked pro style passer in the country coming out of high school, he logged just 11 starts at Stanford after suffering multiple knee injuries early in his career and having his season cut short in 2020 by the pandemic. He completed 65.5 percent of his passes in 14 career appearances, tossing 18 touchdowns and eight interceptions while averaging 7.9 yards per attempt. He brings experience operating both from under center and from the shotgun, and looks comfortable turning his back to the defense, snapping his head around, and making throws off play-action. A team captain, Mills is a quick processor with a strong arm and a quick, tight release. He can drive the ball downfield when he needs to but also showed the ability to put some touch on the ball. He's accurate and confident throwing fades and back-shoulder passes, and is not afraid to stare down the gun barrel and let a pass fly in the face of pressure. Mills showed the willingness to climb the pocket to make passes over the middle of the field, and brings decent mobility to scramble when things break down. He impressed decision-makers and scouts at a rainy and windy pro day in March, running times of 4.58 and 4.66 seconds in the 40yard dash."

## PRIME PRDSPELT

Mills was ranked as the 15th-best prospect by 247 Sports in the 2017 high school class. Since 247Sports began their recruiting rankings in 2000, Mills is the third-highest ranked player ever selected by the Texans.

## TEXANS DRAFT WR NICD COLLINS

The Texans drafted WR Nico Collins with the 26th pick of the third round (89th overall) in the 2021 Draft. Collins is the third player from Michigan drafted by the Texans and first since QB Drew Henson in the sixth round in 2003.

Collins is the 18th wide receiver drafted by the Texans in team history, which is the fifth-most of any position. He is the earliest wide receiver taken by Houston since Braxton Miller in 2016. Houston now has 10 wide receivers on its roster.

Collins and Texans LB Zach Cunningham attended rival high schools in Pinson, Ala., which compete in Region 6 Alabama High School football. Collins' Clay-Chalkville High School and Cunningham's Pinson Valley High School combined to win six Region 6 championships from 2012-18, although the two never played against one another.

- Notched 78 receptions for 1,388 yards (17.8 avg.) with 13 touchdowns during his career
- Voted the 2019 Offensive Player of the Year by his teammates after playing in 12 games ( 10 starts) and totaling 37 receptions for 729 yards ( 19.7 avg.) and seven touchdowns
- Had a career day at Indiana (11/23/19) when he set career highs in receiving yards (165) and touchdowns (three) on six receptions ( 27.5 avg.)
- Led the team n 2018 in receiving yards (632) and was second in receptions (38) and receiving touchdowns (six)
- Recipient of the 2018 Team Most Improved Player Award
- Played two seasons (2018-19) under Texans Assistant Wide Receivers / Offensive Assistant Ben McDaniels when he was at Michigan

## WHAT THEY'RE SAYINE...

## Dane Brugler, The Athletic

"A two-year starter at Michigan, Collins lined up both inside and outside in offensive coordinator Josh Gattis' pro spread scheme. He never reached 40 catches in a season with unimpressive production, but the Wolverines' inconsistent quarterback play limited his statistical output. Collins is a plus athlete for his size with the foot quickness and body control to win above the rim. Though he shows flashes of a playmaker, he must consistently play up to his size and improve on tight-window throws. Overall, Collins isn't a sudden or energetic player who will consistently separate underneath, but he is an impressive height, weight, speed prospect with the smooth routes and dependability to push for an NFL starting role (N'Keal Harry style player)."

## Lance Zierlein, NFL.com

"Outside receiver with excellent size and quality build-up speed to attack the third level. Collins shines with his ability to track the deep ball and land the 50-50 catch. His size, hands and competitive nature give him an advantage on contested catches underneath. He struggles to slip press coverage quickly and has issues ridding himself of coverage unless he's getting vertical. Despite his frame, his struggles to uncover on intermediate routes could bother teams looking for a three-level target. Collins must improve his route acumen to open his catch windows a little wider, but he has the size, field toughness and ball skills to become a future chain-mover as a WR2."

## WHAT THEY'RE SAYINE...

## Dane Brugler, The Athletic

"A three-year starter at Miami, Jordan was a weapon at tight end in offensive coordinator Rhett Lashlee's scheme, lining up primarily in the slot. His production and impact increased each of the last three years and he was a consistent chain-mover with 52 of his 73 receptions ( $71.2 \%$ ) the last two seasons resulting in a first down. A fluid mover for his size, Jordan quickly enters his route and doesn't break stride at the catch point, tracking the ball and carrying his speed to be a seam-buster ( $63.3 \%$ of his career receiving yards came after the catch). While he gives terrific effort as a blocker, he lacks ideal size and strength in this area, which lowers his margin for error vs. NFL defenders. Overall, Jordan needs to become more detail-focused as a blocker and route-runner, but he has the athleticism and ball skills to be a three-level pass-catching threat. He projects similar to Irv Smith as a "move" tight end prospect."

## texans take te brevin jordan

The Houston Texans took TE Brevin Jordan from Miami (Fla.) with the third pick in the fifth round (147th overall). He is the fifth player drafted by the Texans from Miami (Fla.) in franchise history and the first since 2011. Jordan joins WR Andre Johnson as the only Hurricane skill position players (RB, TE and WR) drafted by the Texans.
Houston has now selected four tight ends in the last four drafts. Jordan joins James Casey as the only tight ends selected by Houston in the fifth round. Houston now has seven tight ends on its roster and Jordan is the 12th tight end drafted by the Texans in franchise history.
The Texans selected offensive players with their first three picks in the draft for the first time since 2016 and only the third time in franchise history (2002).

## BREVIN JORDAN CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- 2020 Mackey Award semifinalist and 2019 finalist
- 2020 and 2018 Second Team All-ACC
- 2019 First Team All-ACC
- Recorded the fourth-most receptions (105) and sixth-most receiving yards $(1,358)$ among all FBS tight ends since 2018
- Ranked second on the team in receptions (38) and receiving yards (576) and tied for the team lead in touchdown receptions (seven) in 2020


## BREVIN JORDAN PERSONAL INFORMATION

- Attended Bishop Gorman High School in Las Vegas
- His father, Darrell, was drafted by the Atlanta Falcons in the ninth round of the 1990 NFL Draft. His father never played in the NFL, but Brevin says, "he's watching down on me and I'm going to accomplish his dreams for him"
- Posted single-season career highs in receiving yards $(1,111)$, receptions (63) and touchdowns (13) during his senior year of high school
- Rated as the top-ranked tight end in the country by ESPN. com and 247Sports.com

## TEXANS PICK LB GARRET WALLDW

The Texans picked LB Garret Wallow from TCU with the 26th pick of the fifth round (170th overall). He became the second played drafted from TCU in franchise history, joining his former teammate DL Ross Blacklock who was drafted by the Texans in 2020. Wallow became the 25th player drafted by Houston that either went to college or high school in Texas or had some connection to the state. The Texans have also done so in each of the last five drafts (2017-21).

Houston has now drafted 20 linebackers in team history, which is the fourth-most of any position. Wallow was the first linebacker ever to be drafted in the fifth round by the Texans.
The Texans used two of their sixth round picks (No. 203 and 212) to acquire the 174th overall pick in the fifth round. The Texans then traded No. 174 and No. 233 to move to No. 170 and add Wallow. Houston has now executed 29 trades on draft day in franchise history and this marks consecutive drafts with three trades.

## GARRET WALLOW CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- 2020 and 2019 First-Team All-Big 12
- 2020 and 2019 Honorable-Mention Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year
- Finished his career with the Horned Frogs with a total of 295 tackles, which was the fourth-most in the 20-year history of TCU Head Coach Gary Patterson
- Led the Big 12 in tackles (125), notched a team-best 18.0 tackles for loss and finished tied for ninth in FBS at 10.4 tackles per game as a junior in 2019
- Set a career high with 19 tackles against SMU (9/21/19)
- Named 2019 Big 12 Defensive Player of the Week for his 13-tackle performance against Arkansas at Pine Bluff (8/31)

## Dane Brugler, The Athletic

"A three-year starter at TCU, Wallow was the SAM linebacker in head coach Gary Patterson's 4-2-5 base scheme. Wallow fills the stat sheet with his active play style, play speed and nose for the football. While he has the lateral range to work around blocks, he has some limitations with his length and change of direction, which will dent his tackling batting average versus NFL blockers and ball carriers. Overall, Wallow lacks ideal size and redirect skills, which especially shows in coverage, but his speed, toughness and closing burst will be an immediate fit on special teams as he competes for defensive reps as a run-and-hit linebacker."

## TEXANS ADD DL ROY LIPEZ

The Houston Texans added DL Roy Lopez from Arizona with the 11th pick in the sixth round (195th overall). He is the first player from Arizona to be drafted by the Texans since LB Brooks Reed in 2011.
Lopez is the 25th defensive lineman drafted by the Texans in franchise history, which is tied for the second-most at a position. Christian Covington (2016) was the last defensive lineman drafted in the sixth round by the Texans and Houston now has 25 defensive linemen on its roster.

## ROY LOPEZ CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Started all five games for the Wildcats in 2020 after transferring to the program and went on to lead the team with 4.0 tackles for loss
- Played four seasons (2016-19) at New Mexico State where he recorded 137 career tackles, 20.0 tackles for loss, and 8.0 sacks
- Played in all 12 games as a junior (2019) and piled up 63 tackles, 12.5 tackles for loss and 4.0 sacks
- Earned 2017 All-Sun Belt Conference Honorable Mention


## ROY LOPEZ PERSONAL INFORMATION

- Attended Mesquite High School in Tempe, Ariz.
- Lettered four years in wrestling as a heavy weight, amassing two State Championships and a career record of 113-3
- Was a 2015 first team All-State selection and the 2015 Defensive Lineman of the Year by Arizona Varsity Rivals
- His father, also Roy, was hired as the head football coach for Mesa (Ariz.) Desert Ridge High School in January of 2021. He previously was twice named the Arizona High School Coach of the Year at Tempe (Ariz.) Marcos de Niza High School

## WHAT THEY'RE SAYINE...

Dane Brugler, The Athletic
"A two-star recruit, Lopez committed to New Mexico State over Utah State and was an immediate starter on the defensive line. After redshirting in 2019 due to a leg injury, he transferred to Arizona for his final season, starting all five games as a nose tackle in the Wildcats' three-man front. The son of a coach, Lopez is easy to spot on film with his long, blonde hair, but also his energy. He plays low off the snap with the body flexibility and active hands to stack blocks (his wrestling background translates). He will occasionally be engulfed by power and struggles versus double-teams. Overall, Lopez isn't consistently disruptive, but he has terrific agility, contact balance and upper-body strength to be a one-gap nose in a four-man front."

The Texans drafted Miami (Fla.) TE Brevin Jordan with the third pick of the fifth round (147th overall) in the 2021 NFL Draft. Jordan joined WR Andre Johnson as the only Hurricane skill position players (RB, WR, TE) to be drafted in Texans franchise history.

## HOME GROWN

The Texans have drafted 25 players overall and at least one player in all but the 2013, 2014 and 2016 drafts that either went to college or high school in Texas or had some connection to the state. From 2017-21, the Texans selected at least one player with Texas ties.
In 2020, DL Ross Blacklock became the first player from TCU drafted by the Texans in franchise history and in 2021, his former Horned Frog teammate LB Garret Wallow was chosen by the team in the fifth round (170th overall). In 2019, Houston took Texas DL Charles Omenihu with the 23 rd pick of the fifth round (161st overall) and Texas A\&M FB Cullen Gillaspia with the sixth pick of the seventh round (220th overall), which marked the first time in team history that the Texans drafted a player from Texas and a player from Texas A\&M in the same draft.

## QUICK IMPACT

Despite a limited offseason due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Texans' 2020 draft class made an impact on offense, defense and special teams.

## DL ROSS BLACKLOCK (2ND ROUND, 40TH OVERALL)

Saw action in 15 games (one start) as a rookie and logged 14 total tackles (10 solo), one tackle for loss and two quarterback hits. Made his first career start in Week 17 vs. Tennessee (1/3/21) when he notched a season-high three solo tackles.

## DL JONATHAN GREENARD (3RD ROUND, 90TH OVERALL)

Played in 13 games (one start) and notched 18 total tackles (nine solo), two tackles for loss, 1.0 sack, three quarterback hits, one pass defensed and one special teams tackle. Broke out in Week 11 vs. New England (11/22) when he sacked Patriots QB Cam Newton for a seven-yard loss.

## OL CHARLIE HECK (4TH ROUND, 126TH OVERALL)

Appeared in three games with one start at right tackle in his debut season. Saw extended action at right tackle after OL Laremy Tunsil was injured and was part of an offensive line that helped the Texans offense average a franchise record 9.6 yards per play in Week 16 vs. Cincinnati (12/27).

## DB JOHN REID (4TH ROUND, 141ST OVERALL)

Played in 13 games as a rookie (one start) and notched nine total tackles (eight solo), one pass defensed and four special teams tackles. Totaled the most solo tackles (five) by a Texans defensive back in their NFL debut in Week 1 at Kansas City (9/10).

WR ISAIAH COULTER (54TH ROUND, 171ST OVERALL)
Appeared in one game after spending the first seven weeks of the season on the Reserve/Injured list.

## THE EIBHTH ROUND

The Texans have had success beyond the draft with college free agents, including various players on the current roster.

LS JON WEEKS (2010) - Played in every game since joining the Texans as a college free agent in 2010, holding the franchise record for the most games played and consecutive games played (176). Was also only one-of-10 players across the NFL to play in every game of the 2010s decade. Has handled 1,705 extra point, field goal and punt snaps and contributed 31 special teams tackles.

K KAIMI FAIRBAIRN (2016) - Connected on 104-of-123 field goals ( 84.6 percent) in 64 games, landing him second on the franchise's all-time scoring list with 460 career points. Set the franchise records and led the NFL in points scored (150) and field goals made (37) in 2018. Also tied for the most 50-plus yard field goals made in Texans history (14) after converting four in 2020.

DL AUZOYAH ALUFOHAI (2020) - Saw action in three games and notched one total tackle in his NFL debut in Week 15 at Indianapolis (12/20).

RB SCOTTIE PHILLIPS (2020) - Played in eight games as a rookie and notched nine rushing yards and seven receiving yards while also appearing on special teams. Returned five kickoffs for 96 yards in Week 15 at Indianapolis (12/20).


DL Jonathan Greenard contributed his first career sack in Week 11 when he took down Patriots QB Cam Newton in the fourth quarter for a seven-yard loss. The former third-round pick had his most productive game of the season in Week 17 vs. Tennessee when he logged a season-high nine total tackles (five solo) and one tackle or loss.

## BUILDINE THE TEXANS

The 2021 offseason has seen the Texans put an emphasis on gathering proven veteran talent. Of the 37 new players Houston acquired - either through trade or free-agent signing - there were two former first-round picks, two former second-round picks, eight former third-round picks, four former fourth-round picks, three former fifth-round picks, four former sixth-round picks, two former seventh-round picks and 12 former college free agents.
Among those acquisitions was former first-round pick RB Mark Ingram II who has been a three-time Pro Bowler (2014, 2017, 2019) in his career and has 51 rushing touchdowns since 2014. The team also acquired another former first-round pick in DL Shaq Lawson who comes to the Texans after consecutive seasons with 18 quarterback hits in 2019 and 2020. The Texans also added OL Marcus Cannon and DB Desmond King II, who are both former fifth-round picks that have previously been All-Pro and Pro Bowl selections, respectively. Cannon and King II are two of the six fifthround picks currently on the Texans roster.

## FIRST-ROUND FACTDRS

Houston's first-round draft picks have almost all made immediate impacts in their first season in the NFL.

RB JONATHAN WELLS (2002, 4TH ROUND, 99TH PICK)
Played in 60 games ( 18 starts) from 2002-05. Ran for 1,167 yards and 10 touchdowns on 374 attempts ( 3.1 avg.). Caught 44 passes for 323 yards (7.3 avg.) and two touchdowns.

DB DEMARCUS FAGGINS (2002, 6TH ROUND, 173RD PICK)
Appeared in 82 games ( 36 starts) for the Texans from 2002-08, logging 191 total tackles ( 167 solo), 38 passes defensed, five interceptions, three forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries, 1.0 sack and 26 special teams tackles. Returned an interception 43 yards for a touchdown in 2004.

## RB DOMANICK WILLIAMS (2003, 4TH ROUND, 101ST PICK)

Named NFL Rookie of the Year in 2003 after rushing for 1,031 yards. Went on to post back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons. Ranks second in team history with 3,195 career rushing yards and was named to the Pro Football Weekly All-Rookie Team. Played for the Texans from 2003-05 and started 36 -of-40 games played.

## WR JEROME MATHIS (2005, 4TH ROUND, 114TH PICK)

Named to the 2006 Pro Bowl and All-Pro Team after returning 54 kickoffs for 1,542 yards and two touchdowns in 12 games. Ranked second in the NFL with a 28.6 avg. and was named to the PFWA All-Rookie Team. Played for the Texans from 2005-07.

DB C.C. BROWN (2005, 6TH ROUND, 188TH PICK)
Started 47-of-50 games he played in for the Texans from 2005-08 and tallied 251 total tackles ( 193 solo), three interceptions, 16 passes defensed, four forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries and 1.0 sack.

OL ERIC WINSTON (2006, 3RD ROUND, 66TH PICK)
Started 87 consecutive games at right tackle from 2006-11 and helped the Texans offense to three consecutive top-five finishes from 2008-10.

TE OWEN DANIELS (2006, 4TH ROUND, 98TH PICK)
Had 385 receptions for 4,617 yards (12.0 avg.) and 29 touchdowns (200613). Elected to 2009 and 2013 Pro Bowl. Named to PFWA All-Rookie Team with 34 receptions for 352 yards ( 10.4 avg.) and five touchdowns.

## WR JACOBY JONES (2007, 3RD ROUND, 73RD PICK)

Ranks first all-time in franchise history in punt return yards with 1,820 to go along with three touchdowns on 179 returns ( 10.2 avg.). Played in 75 games for the Texans, recording 127 catches for 1,741 yards (13.7 avg.) and 11 touchdowns from 2007-11.

## LB ZAC DILES (2007, 7TH ROUND, 218TH PICK)

Played in 50 games ( 30 starts) from 2007-10 with Houston, compiling 212 total tackles ( 154 solo), 1.0 sack, an interception, five quarterback hits, 14 tackles for loss, three forced fumbles, a fumble recovery, three passes defensed and 11 special teams tackles.

## RB STEVE SLATON (2008, 3RD ROUND, 89TH PICK)

Set a team record as a rookie with 1,282 yards rushing and led the AFC in total yards from scrimmage with 1,659. Ranks sixth in team history in career rushing yards with 1,832 . Played in 42 games ( 26 starts) for the Texans from 2008-2011.

## DB GLOVER QUIN (2009, 4TH ROUND, 112TH PICK)

Notched 310 total tackles ( 248 solo), 47 passes defensed, five interceptions, three forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries and 14 tackles for loss in 63 games played ( 60 starts) with the Texans (2009-12). Also tarted all 16 games for three straight seasons (2010-12) for the team.

## TE JAMES CASEY (2009, 5TH ROUND, 152ND PICK)

Appeared in 61 games ( 20 starts) and caught 66 passes for 752 yards (11.4 avg.) and four touchdowns (2009-12). Also had 28 special teams tackles.

## DB BRICE MCCAIN (2009, 6TH ROUND, 152ND PICK)

Appeared in 72 games from 2009-13 and posted 105 total tackles ( 88 solo), 33 passes defensed, five interceptions, including one returned for a touchdown, and 19 special teams tackles.

## DL EARL MITCHELL (2010, 3RD ROUND, 81ST PICK)

Played in 63 games ( 17 starts) from 2010-13. Recorded 134 total tackles (81 solo), 3.5 sacks, six quarterback hits, six tackles for loss, one forced fumble, two fumble recoveries and four passed defensed.

TE GARRETT GRAHAM (2010, 4TH ROUND, 118TH PICK)
Registered 100 receptions for 1,059 yards (10.6 avg.) and 10 touchdowns in six seasons with the Texans (2010-15). Started 31-of-60 games played and tied for the team lead in receiving touchdowns with five in 2013.

QB T.J. YATES (2011, 5TH ROUND, 152ND PICK)
Led Houston to its first playoff appearance, first division crown and first postseason win in franchise history. Became the first rookie quarterback in 43 years to lead a team to back-to-back fourth-quarter wins and was the fourth fifth-round pick since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to win his first start. Has served three stints with the Texans (2011-13, 2015 and 2017) and appeared in 21 games ( 10 starts).

OL DEREK NEWTON (2011, 7TH ROUND, 214TH PICK)
Started in 68 -of- 82 games he played in from 2011-16, including a 56 game start streak from 2012-16, which marked the fifth-longest active streak in the league at the time. Blocked for four 1,000-yard rushers and played every position besides center along the offensive line.

OL BRANDON BROOKS (2012, 3RD ROUND, 76TH PICK)
Started 44-of-50 games played for the Texans at guard from 2012-15 and blocked for two 1,000-yard rushers.

## OL BEN JONES (2012, 4TH ROUND, 99TH PICK)

Named Texans Rookie of the Year in 2012 after starting 10 games and playing in 16. Became a mainstay for the Texans on the offensive line and played in 64 consecutive games, including starting all 16 games in 2014 and 2015. Blocked for two 1,000-yard rushers. Spent the 2012-15 seasons with the Texans.

TE RYAN GRIFFIN (2013, 6TH ROUND, 201ST PICK)
Has appeared in 77 games ( 36 starts) since 2013, logging 136 catches for 1,491 yards (11.0 avg.) and seven touchdowns.

RB ALFRED BLUE (2014, 6TH ROUND, 181ST PICK)
Set the franchise record for carries in a game (36) and tied a rookie rushing record with 156 yards at Cleveland (11/16/14). Became the first player in franchise history with a rushing, receiving and return touchdown in the same season in 2014. Had 2,407 rushing yards and 10 total touchdowns for Houston from 2014-18.

## FB JAY PROSCH (2014, 6TH ROUND, 211TH PICK)

Played in 63 -of- 64 possible games since getting drafted in 2014, including 13 starts. Blocked for two 1,000-yard rushers in four seasons. Also had 16 special teams tackles from 2014-17.

## DB ANDRE HAL (2014, 7TH ROUND, 216TH PICK)

Played in 69 games ( 40 starts) and posted 180 total tackles ( 124 solo), 12 interceptions, 31 passes defensed, six tackles for loss, two forced fumbles, two quarterback hits and 1.0 sack. Led the Texans with 12 interceptions from 2014-18.

## DL CHRISTIAN COVINGTON (2015, 6TH ROUND, 216TH PICK)

Appeared in 50 games, including nine starts, after getting drafted in 2015. Registered 65 total tackles ( 39 solo), 7.5 sacks, 16 quarterback hits, 11 tackles for loss, one forced fumble and one pass defensed from 2015-18.

## DL D.J. READER (2016, 5TH ROUND, 166TH PICK)

Started 52-of-61 games from 2016-19 and compiled 154 total tackles, 6.5 sacks, 24 quarterback hits, 16 tackles for loss and one pass defensed. Became the third rookie in franchise history to record a sack in the postseason in the 2016 Wild Card, joining LB Brooks Reed and DL J.J. Watt.

DB JUSTIN REID (2018, 3RD ROUND, 68TH PICK)
Played in 44 games ( 40 starts) and accumulated 240 total tackles (181 solo), 19 passes defensed, nine tackles for loss, five interceptions, 2.0 sacks and six quarterback hits. Owns the second most total tackles by a defensive back in their first three seasons in franchise history and the seventh-most total tackles by a defensive back.

## DL CHARLES OMENIHU (2019, 5TH ROUND, 161ST PICK)

Appeared in 29 games (seven starts) in his first two seasons and logged 30 total tackles ( 19 solo), 7.0 sacks, 21 quarterback hits, two forced fumbles and four passes defensed. Also became the fifth player in franchise history to record at least 3.0 sacks in each of their first two seasons.

Can you just weigh in a little bit on QB Davis Mills? Obviously an incredible recruit coming out of high school, don't have a lot of film on him, but Stanford's produced some pretty good quarterbacks and pretty good football players.
"Sure. Again, appreciate everybody taking some time here this evening sticking around. It's, before I answer the question, just, exciting time for the organization, opportunity for us to continue the team-building process, which again, it's not necessarily going to be about one draft, one player. It's going to be about a continuation of just continuing to add competition, just, what we try to do from day one is to create a culture of competition, selflessness, and toughness and add players. And you've seen through the myriad of transactions throughout the course of the spring what we're trying to do. And tonight was an opportunity for us to add more football players to the team that we think we want to work with and may have some future with us. So specifically to your question, Davis (Mills) played in a good program at Stanford. Coach (David) Shaw does a great job with their program offensively. Has some of the attributes that a quarterback that we like and possess and played well with his opportunities when he was on the field, so it was a situation where we like the player, we spent time with him before the draft, did our research, did our homework. And, again, it's about trying to create competition across the football team, across all position. We talked about this on the pre-draft call a couple weeks ago. That's our philosophy and that's our mindset and we're going to continue to do that. So that was the rationale and the impetus for the pick."

Did acquiring 37 players like you have give you the luxury of being able to draft a quarterback who will have time to develop? And how does the selection of QB Davis Mills affect the QB Deshaun Watson situation?
"Again, it's just part of the team-building process. I wouldn't say there was any one specific factor or any one particular thing that goes into it. What we tried to do is evaluate the players and put the players in a position and on the board and then go through our process. There were several players that I would say that we were discussing in that 67 range, wherever it was. We had discussions with some teams kind of in both directions at different points. So, again, we take the information, look at the board, and I would say a lot of great dialogue, a lot of great discussion with our group. Liip (James Liipfert), Matt Bazirgan, you know, Rob (Kisiel), Zique (Mozique McCurtis), John (Ritcher), so a lot of good discussions and when it came time to pick at 67, we felt that that was the best decision for our team at the time so it doesn't impact anybody. Again, our whole philosophy has been to create as much competition as possible and we'll continue to do that."

I know there's a lot of variables that go into a draft, like you mentioned in your pre-draft call, but in an ideal scenario is QB Davis Mills a future franchise quarterback for you guys?
"Yeah, again, I think it's really just about adding players to your football team that you want to work with and have some of the qualities that you desire. So, again, I would say both players that we selected and I would say the players that we're going to hopefully select here tomorrow, however many players that is, have the qualities that we look for in football players. Again, we're trying to create a culture of competition, selflessness, and toughness, so who are the players that embody that along with their physical traits and characteristics, that's our responsibility to try to find those players and that's what we're hopefully going to try to continue to do. And, again, you have to be purposeful and you have to stay disciplined and just try to make the decisions that you feel make the most sense for your organization. So that's what we did tonight and hopefully we'll continue to do that each step of the way. Again, there's a lot of fanfare and hype that goes along with the draft. Again, I think it's just about, really the next step for whomever comes in here, and it's no different than the free agents that we have acquired, is to come in our building, learn our program, understand our program, assimilate to our culture, and just take it one day at a time and just be the best version of themselves and try to makes as much improvement on a day-today basis as a football player as they can and the competition will sort itself out. Again, it's not going to be what I think or my decision or what David (Culley) thinks. It's going to be the players are ultimately going to determine who plays, what their role is, and how big or small that is."

What was it about WR Nico Collins that made you guys want to trade up and how much did Passing Game Coordinator / Quarterbacks Coach Pep Hamilton influence your opinion of Nico?
"Yeah, couple good questions there. I would say it's all kind of combined. So I think when you're working through this process, again, you're looking at the players relative to supply and demand, number one, again, across all positions. And number two, what are your alternatives relative to if you don't get a player at a certain level, right, okay, then their next opportunity to pick, I think we were scheduled to pick at 109 right there at the top of the 4 th. So as we started to go through the third round, I would say there were a number of players that we liked that we said, okay, like, they're starting to come off here fairly quickly, and so if we have an opportunity to find a player that we like that we have at a certain level relative to whatever our other options are, then it might be worth a discussion. So I would say that was really the impetus. Again, we talked about this on the call. Really, trades are always player-driven and it's not, and it's really about just the other factors that go into it, right? So do you, okay, we picked at 67, OK, if you wait until 109, how many players are going to be available, who are you going to lose, and what are your alternatives going to be. So that was philosophically the mindset. So, again, as we worked through it, some of the players that were kind of in that range were starting to come off the board and we said, all

right, here's an opportunity with a player that we like, that we, to your second part of your question, we have some degree of background with, right? Between Pep (Hamilton) being at University of Michigan and Ben McDaniels being at the University of Michigan. So, again, you take all the information, all the factors that go into the decision-making process. So, and again, we moved, I would say, marginally. You take a 5th and then the 4th next year, which we had two 4ths, so again, we still have, I don't know, seven picks next year, something like that. So when you do your kind of costbenefit analysis relative to all the information that's, I would say, the reason that we made a decision that we did."

You've coached wide receivers. What's WR Nico Collins' potential?
"Not very well (laughing). No (laughing). Believe me, I wasn't a reason, like, our receiving corps was any good in 2007. No, I would say specific to him, he's got good size, he runs well, he's got good hands, so he catches the ball well. He's got good playing strength. So, again, how is that going to translate into our system and into NFL competition? We'll find out. I mean, obviously, that's a big, I would say, X factor for all of these players. So I would say there's some qualities there that we like, and we talked a little bit earlier about this or just another question was asked, like, the receiving corps, we have added some players that had maybe a little bit more size relative to where it was. But, again, like Brandin Cooks is a really good football player, I don't care how big or small he is or isn't, right? So, again, you're going to need different types of people, different types of players, that can complement one another. So I would say, like, when you look at some of the different players at that position they're all kind of different shapes and sizes and, again, it's going to be about the competition and we'll let the players sort out like what their role is, how big or small it is or isn't."

I know oftentimes it's the board that dictates you have the players rated and all that. Did you go in feeling right off the top you needed to get a quarterback and a receiver?
"Yeah, again, you don't really ever go into it and say we need $X$, we need $Y$. You just take the information. You have players that I think you sort of earmark. I would say probably our volume of players that were on the board is probably a little bit smaller relative to previous years. Again, like, there's players at some point you're going to have to make a decision you're comfortable, not comfortable, for a myriad of reasons and if you have to eliminate a player for whatever the reason is, that's okay to do, and then you try to focus in on, say, a core group of players. So whatever the positions are the positions are. We don't dictate that. We don't control that. So, again, it's do your research, go through your process, take the information, put the players in the position as you see it. Again, it doesn't necessarily mean we're right. It just means like here's what we think we potentially could have based on our analysis and our assessment. And, again, like once they get here, we're going to get a lot more information, and then we'll see whether
or not the information that we had or what our analysis or what our evaluation of the player was and we're not going to know that here for a little bit."

Generally speaking, can you share what your priorities are for tomorrow?
"Yeah, try to improve, I would say, our football team, try to create competition. Again, they will probably be, I would say, we're going to look at the board just like we did in the first few days, right? I mean, we'll try to follow it horizontally and just look at different players at different positions relative to how we have graded them. So their role commensurate with their value and how that fits. So we'll try to stay as disciplined as possible. So, again, I wouldn't say it's about one position, about one player. It's going to be about a number of different things and that's how we're approaching it."

Curious, the thought process, were you torn at all? There were some defensive players there that potentially could make an impact this coming season.
"Yeah, again, you just have to trust what your process is and, again, we had a lot of great discussions and I would say there's always going to be some players that you like more than other players. It doesn't mean that there's one way to look at it or, again, I think sometimes perception isn't always reality. So there's a lot of - believe me, there's a lot of people that put a lot of time and effort, and a lot of people on TV talk about different players and, which is great, it creates a lot of excitement and a lot of information. But, again, like that's - again, this is why we are here and we have to trust the things that we believe in and just try to make the decisions that we think make the most sense for the Houston Texans and we'll hopefully continue to do that each step along the way."

Are you more excited now after day two of the draft than you thought you would be or this is what you had laid out?
"Yeah. No, I mean, it takes a lot for me to get excited. No, again, I think it's an opportunity. It's a great opportunity for us to continue to put players on our team that we want to work with. And, again, it's, the draft is a kind of a finite period of time, it's fixed and it's three days. And, again, the team-building process doesn't, won't stop after tomorrow, right? So there's more work to do. There's always more work ahead of us and I think it's really more of a workman-like mentality that we have. I mean, I'm not going to go home tonight and kind of rest on my laurels and grab a Corona. I mean, maybe somebody else will do that, but I'm probably not going to do that. You try to take it one step at a time and try to make good thoughtful decisions along the way and that's all we can really control. Again, focus on the things that we can control, which is getting ready for tomorrow and kind of turning the page, and then once we get through tomorrow, turning the page to the next day. So it's an ongoing process and I think that's, I would say where the excitement lies is that it's kind of continuous, it's very fluid, and it's not a fixed end point."

When you talk about the scouts Matt Bazirgan, Jack Easterby, that room full of guys that you trust, what were they saying about the picks that you made and what did everybody else like about Davis Mills and Nico Collins?
"Yeah, actually, before I answer that question, just for the record, I haven't seen Dodgeball. So just in case you're interested."

## Did you see my video?

"I did."

## How have you not seen Dodgeball?

"I'm not a movie buff. I hate to admit that. So, I mean, I know I'm kind of embarrassed, but l'm not a big movie person."

## That's okay. You need to see it at some point.

"OK, anyway. No, again, look, ultimately, it's my decision, right? So, I mean, but you trust the people around you, so I would say like from a scouting perspective, I mean, our scouting staff, it's Liip (James Liipfert), it’s Baz (Matt Bazirgan), it's our national scouts, our area scouts. So, they put a lot of time a lot of effort into it. They put a lot of information and process a lot of information. So, again, like, those are the guys that we're relying on. I would say Liip is a key component. It's the college scouting director and he's a big part of the draft process and there's a lot of people that are involved. We've got a pretty good group of guys, good area group, Matt, Rob (Kisiel). So, again, ultimately, take the information and it's, you know, in the end, like, the reason I'm here is to make those decisions and that's my responsibility and I have a responsibility to our group and I have a responsibility to the organization and to the ownership. So, again, it's, you try to make thoughtful decisions, try to take the information, process it, and just make a good decision and just keep moving forward. Again, and relative to picking a specific player or particular player, again, it's always relative to what your other options are and how you feel about those players and what your evaluation of those players are. So, again, it's not one factor, it's not one person, it's not one thing, there's just a myriad of things that go into it and in the end, like, that's my responsibility to our organization, to our coaching staff, and our scouting staff and maybe I can take the heat off their shoulders. You guys can blame me for everything."

With the assets you used to move up those 20 spots to get WR Nico Collins today and considering you don't have another selection for another 40 picks or so and then another one in the 190s, if there's an opportunity to move up with what you have in the future draft capital and what you still have tomorrow, do you feel like you have the assets needed to move up if you're so inclined?
"Yeah, it's a good question. I think there's a certain degree of maneuverability that could, you could do some things. Again, I would just say, I mean, I don't want to go out on a limb here, but it's probably unlikely that we would do anything relative to future picks. So, again, I think taking the five picks that we have
positioned right now at 147 , the 3 sixths, and then the 7 th, and whether or not we can maneuver within that framework, I mean, that's something that we'll look at. Again, it always goes back to what are your options and what's the alternative and what are you viewing in front of you. So it's always driven on that. It's not, okay, I'm going to wake up in the morning and we're going to say, OK, like, we need to trade this pick to get to this spot and draft Mr. X, like, we don't even know who we're talking about yet, right? So, again, does it preclude us from maneuvering around? Not necessarily. So we'll look at everything. Again, there's some things that can you do within reason, but we're going to be responsible. We're going to make good decisions and not put ourselves in a position - again, it's really who you, what are you doing, who are you doing it for, and what's the cost associated with it."

Could you tell us specifically what you like about QB Davis Mills, the tangibles, as well as the intangibles, please?
"Yeah, I would say played in a good offensive system, played for a good coach, has pretty good size, fairly accurate with the ball, smart, makes fairly good decisions. So, again, like all these players have things that there are some things that they do well, but I would say all of them have things they can improve. I would say, honestly, some of the players that have been in our building over the last two weeks, they have areas they can improve and a lot of them have been in the league for however many years. So every player has physical attributes relative to the position that they play and there's always ways for players to improve and try to make them better and that's our responsibility as a staff to try to maximize whatever they have, and each player is different, some will make more progress quicker than others. But, again, there's no set formula for any particular player, so whatever they do well, whatever assets and attributes they have, that's a good starting point, but it doesn't necessarily mean anything until you actually put in the work and then just see how it manifests itself. And, again, this is a long process. It's one day at a time, one step at a time. Again, like the offseason program is two weeks old, like we have had some players that have been in the building since February and those players have made a lot of progress. We have seen the tangible progress. So then the next step is to go from what they have done to go on to the field and let's see how that translates. So each player is at a different stage and our job is to kind of shepherd them as best we can and they have a responsibility on their end as well to try to become the best player that they can for our organization and that's all we can ask of the players."

## QB DAVIS MILLS

Did you have any idea you would be drafted by the Texans and how much pre-draft interaction did you have with them?
"Not a lot. Surprised by the call. Obviously, very humbled to take on this new challenge in the NFL. I can't wait to get out to Houston and meet the staff, meet the coaches, meet the players and start putting my head down and get to work and start earning my teammates' trust."

## What do you feel like you bring to the Texans?

"I think first thing, obviously, I can't do it from the start, but I think my leadership ability is up there. Obviously, you've got to get in front of some of my teammates to start building their respect by putting in hard work and then the next thing, just that winning mentality and that ability on the field. It all comes together as a team and can't wait to get out there with the other guys on the team."

## How special is this moment for you?

"It's incredibly special, very humbling. I started playing football when I was six years old and this was always the dream to get into the NFL and then the ultimate dream is winning Super Bowls. I want to have a chance to do that someday."

What did you tell teams when they asked you about your left knee injury and the history with that leg?
"I mean, as much as they needed to know, medical history-wise. I'm fully healthy. I've been fully healthy for over two-and-a-half years now. I just can't wait to get in there and compete."

What are some of your best qualities that you think you can bring to this team to help them win?
"Like I said, one, just kind of that leadership ability. Obviously, it's something a quarterback needs to have whether they're the starter or the backup. I just want to come in and compete with my teammates and then lastly, just being a good teammate for the guys, doing whatever the team asks me to do to come in there and be a good member of the organization."

What do you know about the situation with QB Deshaun Watson situation?
"Not much about it. Obviously, the only thing I can control is how I handle myself. Like I said, just can't wait to get out there and start meeting the people already in Houston. My sister actually just got a place out in Houston, so l'll have some family out there that I can be with. Really, just can't wait to get out there and compete."

Are there any quarterbacks you've kind of patterned your game after in college, pros?
"Not necessarily. Obviously, I'll always watch the great QBs on TV and try to pick some of their best traits and add it to my own. I've
always felt like to be my best, I have to play my own game and I feel like it's at least done me good this far."

You said you were surprised by the call. Why were you surprised by the call?
"Obviously, it's an incredibly exciting night. I had my family and friends around me. It was just surprising to finally have this come into reality."

Can you elaborate, tell us a little bit about your sister and why she was moving to Houston?
"It is. She is my second oldest, so she's the middle child. Went to Houston, University of Houston, for a fifth year and played tennis there and got her MBA there. Now she's working in wealth management out in Houston and actually just was living with roommates and just got her own place out there. So, I might be able to sneak into one of her bedrooms and save some money."

## How do you feel about coming to Houston?

"Oh man, I'm so excited. I'm so excited. I'm just ready to come in and get to work. This is a great feeling. It's a dream come true. It's a dream come true for me. I'm so excited to become a Houston Texan. I'm just speechless right now, I am."

You've got great size. How are you able to use your size and have it translate to the NFL?
"I use my size as an advantage. I feel like that's one part of my game that I excel in. I play big. I play physical. I'm glad that the Houston Texans believed in me and they picked me up. I'm just ready to come in and get to work, I am."

How much interaction did you have with Houston during the pre-draft process?
"Just the Senior Bowl. Lot of Zoom calls here and there. This is the call that I've been waiting on my entire life. I'm glad. I'm speechless right now. Emotions are running high. I'm just excited to come to the Texans and be a Houston Texan."

How important do you think the week at the Senior Bowl was for you, seeing as you didn't play in 2020?
"Yes, sir. I think that week was very important to me because I opted out of 2020 season and I feel like that was my opportunity to showcase what l'd been working on during the offseason, throughout the opt out, during the season because I didn't play. I felt like that was my opportunity to showcase what l'd been working on. I felt like that whole week, that's what I did. Can you talk about what you worked on during the season? What were you doing? What was that like for you?

## Opening Statement:

"First off, just wanted to say thank you to a lot of different people, organizationally, our scouting staff, our coaching staff, the support staff, the selflessness that they all displayed. This is a team effort. It's a collective effort. There's a lot of people that are involved, and I would say when you look at the people that are in this building, start with Coach (David) Culley, we talked last night about what we're trying to do with our program in terms of finding people that aren't afraid of competition, that are selfless and are tough. And I would say when you see what David Culley has had to endure here over the past I would say week and however many days, he just found out today that his father passed away, he was 94 years old, which he was a huge part of his life. I know he'd expressed those sentiments a few weeks back when he was hired as a head coach here. He had the opportunity to go back home and see his father and how grateful he was for that opportunity. But again, even in the face of I would say adversity that he's gone through over the last few days with his father, and then he also lost his high school coach who was a massive influence in his life. To think about the things that he's had to deal with over the last week, and then to see his joy and to see his attitude speaks to the selflessness of him and the selflessness of this program, which embodies and encompasses the things that we're trying to do. I think thoughts and prayers are appropriate to David and his family at this time. I know he certainly would be appreciative of that, but you really wouldn't know how much he's hurting just based on how he's handled everything, which is with grace, humility and dignity and selflessness, and attitude to has that really quite frankly permeated the building on a day-to-day basis. In addition to David, I think secondly, just thankful for the scouting staff, the coaching staff, for their effort, for the time that they put into this. Again, scouting the draft in and of itself, it's a year-long process. It's not about three days, it's not about one particular weekend. It's a culmination of a lot of different I would say hours and time, and there's a vast number of things that people are responsible for to kind of get to this end point, and again, this is an opportunity for us to build our team, and we're going to continue to work through the team-building process as we go here through the spring and the fall. But just really a huge thank you and a tip of the cap to the entire organization from a football operations standpoint because none of this would be really possible without their time and selfless efforts. With that, we'll take some questions and go from there."

You traded up to 174 when I think 161 was still on the clock and then you traded to 170. Can you walk us through what happened there and why you did that?
"Yeah, sure, absolutely. We talked a little bit about this last night. This draft today was probably going to be more about maneuvering around, and it's relative to the supply and demand of players that you're looking at and how they're graded and what those op-
portunities are going to look like and when are you going to pick those players, who are you actually going to pick. Again, it was really more about positioning more than anything else. Again, when you make a move, whether it's four spots or whether you make a trade at however many spots, everybody looks at it and says, wow, they moved up five spots or they moved up to get this player, when more than anything it's just about sort of repositioning relative to what the inventory of players was that we were looking at. I think going into this, I think as we sat last night and then again this morning, the expectation was we probably wouldn't use all five picks just because of how they were positioned, so I mean, I'd say we were actively just trying to look at maneuvering around and trying to see if we could put ourselves in the position that we felt we could actually pick a player that we liked as opposed to just picking a player for another reason just to pick a player."

What was your philosophy on the lack of a normal college season maybe leading to quality players kind of slipping down, or other teams thinking they should punt some of those picks into future years when they have more information next year?
"Yeah, again, it goes back to just positioning and just looking at the volume and the quality of the players and the supply and demand. I think that's kind of a convenient probably excuse about next year's draft. It will be a little cleaner than this year's draft. Again, I don't subscribe to that theory. I don't think that's necessarily accurate or true. Again, you have to look at your team, you have to look at the information you have, look at your roster and then just try to make decisions accordingly based on that information, which that's what really we tried to do."

You talked last night about not wanting to go into a pick with a position in mind. When you go into the undrafted free agency process, does your mindset change, and how does that process work for you?
"That's a really good question. Really what you have to do is you have to look at how your team is currently positioned and then look at it from a sheer numbers standpoint relative to how the

roster is constructed. Quite frankly the undrafted process is a little bit more position specific just relative to what your needs are because a lot of those players you're looking to add for depth or whatever the case may be, and if you have $X$ amount of players at one position, OK, if you add a player at that position, are you adding a player that's necessarily better than what you have? Is this performance commensurate with that? Again, you actually can be a little bit more strategic, and you've actually probably looked at it and tried to target some specific players. I would say in this particular instance this year our volume is going to be probably pretty low, so again, it's really more about looking at your numbers, looking at your roster, and then just trying to fill it accordingly. It is, it's kind of you shift your mindset and it becomes a little -- I know it's kind of counterintuitive. You spend all this time about the draft picks, and then you get to the undrafted part and you're actually a little bit more targeted, a little bit more specific, but I'd say that's probably the case for those teams."

Did you go into the draft thinking there was a possibility you could make some deals to trade up because you had signed 37 players or traded for them, giving you the luxury of not needing a bunch of picks?
"Again, it goes back to a cost-benefit analysis, so however your team is positioned, then you react accordingly. So we went into it with 78, 79 players, we had eight picks, most of them were a little bit later. If we had signed less players, again, in order to move up in the draft, there's a cost associated with that. So you're giving up - whatever the asset is that you're giving up. It's A, who's that for, and what are you giving up in return. Again, when you look at today, it was really more about positioning, really didn't give anything up, and going back to yesterday, again, it was really about positioning other than we added the additional fourth-round pick next year. Again, whenever you trade up for a player to move up, A, it's how big is the move, how far are you going and then at what cost. I mean, that's what you have to weigh."

What did you guys think pre-draft about the quality of the defensive side versus the offensive side of the ball?
"It's a good question. I would say certain positions probably had a little bit more depth than others, and again, it's about supply and demand, right. Everybody's looking at the same I would say, players, how you evaluate those players and grade those players, it's 32 different draft rooms. It's not the same system. Beauty is in the eye of the beholder a little bit to some degree, and what you're doing and does a player fit some of the things that you're doing. To your question, were there defensive players that we looked at and earmarked? Absolutely. Did we have the opportunity to get them, it didn't manifest itself, so again, is that defensive player relative to the offensive player, OK, how are those players graded, what's the value, and then again, what's the role relative to the value, and then again, you just want to try to weigh all the factors equally and then ultimately make a decision. Again, to your question, do you go into a draft and say we're going to draft this side of the ball versus that side of the ball, no, that's not how it works.

It might look like that on the surface, but that's really - I can't see in the crystal ball any better than anybody else, so you just kind of work through it, you look at the information and you process it and then you make a decision and you move on."

Earlier in the offseason you referenced trying to hit singles and doubles with some of the roster moved. Is that sort of the same mentality in the draft or especially with limited picks are you trying to hit a home run?
"I think you're trying to maximize your opportunities, whatever they are, and you don't know how it's going to turn out. I would say in free agency to a certain extent you have a little bit more known commodity. Going back and looking at where we were in March from a cost standpoint, we didn't have unlimited resources that were available to us, right, so again, cost of a player relative to something else, so for every X player you sign, you're going to, OK, won't be able to add three or four. So, again, you have to look at that position, so there's some financial components to it. You're looking at, I would say, more known commodities because at least you've seen them play. When you get to the draft, none of these players have seen an NFL field before, an NFL snap, so you're projecting them. That's what the draft is; it's projection, and you just have to try to make a decision about what you think the player is going to be. Sometimes it's the player turns out the way you think, and other times he doesn't for a myriad of reasons, and that's the draft."

With the number of players already on your roster, will the undrafted crop of players be smaller than normal? Could you maneuver around to make it larger if need be?
"That's a good question. I would say more than likely it'll probably be smaller, just relative to our numbers. Again, we had to start yesterday, right, 78 , so we drafted five, so there's 83 , so you have call it seven spots, however many you sign. Again, if you sign a few, then you have some open roster spots, which might not be a bad thing because there might be some transactions that take place here league-wide, given what teams have done draft-wise, right. Players that may be drafted at a position, maybe that opens up inventory at that position, so player gets waived or is on a waiver wire or maybe that player is available in trade, so actually having some wiggle room there a little bit with maybe three or four spots might give you the opportunity to add somebody that maybe you weren't even thinking about. Try to just give ourselves as much flexibility as possible. I think we'll have more information specifically about our players once we actually get to see them a little bit more on the field and then we can assess that information. Again, you just try to make good decisions with the information that you have and that'll be an ongoing process."

Could you give us some thoughts on each of the guys you drafted today?
"Sure. We'll start with (Brevin) Jordan. Played since his freshman year at Miami. He started a number of games, productive player in the passing game. Decent with the ball in his hands, runs hard, has some straight-line speed. Again, had pretty good production as a pass catcher. (Garret) Wallow played, I would say, for a good defensive coach in Coach (Gary) Patterson. They've been known for defense for a long time, and the way they're constructed defensively, specifically to Garret - now, he was in the box a little bit, he played detached from the formation. Instinctive player, runs well, can close space, is a decent tackler, A-plus football makeup and character, which that's important to what we're trying to do, like we talked about last night. And then (Roy) Lopez, a grad transfer, actually finished up at Arizona. He was at New Mexico state I believe before that, so played there, high school wrestler. Really strong. He's 6 -foot-1 and change, 305 . I think he did like 36 bench presses or something like that, so has good playing strength. Leverage, I would say especially with - defensive linemen and offensive linemen it's really about playing with leverage and playing with technique, bending your knees. Again, I'd say Roy has some concept of that just given his background. Tough as nails. Again, high football character and make up, which is important to the overall development of the player. So that's I'd say a quick just snapshot on those three."

How would you evaluate what you were able to do in this draft and did you get accomplished what you wanted?
"I'm sure depending on who you ask they'll have an evaluation. But no, again, we just tried to add good football players that are good people, that aren't afraid of competition, that are selfless and that are tough. They have certain skills or attributes relative to their position that we think they can add to our team and that we can look to improve or develop. I would say that's probably the best way to summarize it. You know, again, it's just one aspect of the team building process. It's certainly maybe a bigger part of the team building process just because there's more opportunities at one particular point in time. You've got, I don't know, 250, 260 players, whatever it was, that were picked, and there's going to be hundreds of other players that weren't drafted that you're going to look to evaluate. Again, so I think it's one step hopefully in the right direction, and again, it's just the first step of what we're trying to do this year, and there will be other opportunities hopefully for us to continue to improve our team."

Logistically, how do you think it all went with your staff in the draft room few days and when do you expect to get these rookies and the guys that are going to sign here together actually on the field, and what's the plan for that rookie camp?
"A couple good questions there. From a staff standpoint, really a lot of credit to our staff. I would say just when you transition into a situation like this, not really having worked with a large volume of people kind of in this capacity, but everybody handled them-
selves outstanding. It was, I would say, process-wise very clean, very smooth. Everybody had an understanding of what their role and expectation was, and the communication - again, especially on the third day when the picks - you go from 10 minutes to seven minutes to five minutes to four minutes. You have to think quickly, you have to react quickly, and there's not a lot of time. Everybody kept their poise, everybody kept their cool. I solicited opinions from our staff, from Liip (James Liipfert), from Baz (Matt Bazirgan), from John Ritcher, from Zique (Mozique McCurtis) because those guys have put as much time into it as anybody. From a staff standpoint, really honestly couldn't really ask for anything more just from their efforts and the job that they have done. To your second question, the rookies will be in here for rookie minicamp here at some point. We're working through the final logistics of when that's going to be, but really whenever that is, it's about the next four to six weeks for them to assimilate into our program, understand our program. They've been on their own for a long time, basically since January up until now they've been on their own, they've been training, they've been doing non-football related things, they've been out of the team infrastructure, the team environment. Now they're on a team, they know they're a Houston Texan. So now we're going to have to teach them and train them about the things that are important to how we run our program, what's important, what the expectation is from them. That's going to be part of their responsibility, is to process that information and then apply it in a number of different levels, whether it's on the field, whether it's in the weight room, whether it's with the dietitian, it's in the football operations, it's logistics, it's travel. Whatever it may be, just an understanding of what it means to be a Houston Texan and everything that goes along with it."

What is it about TE Brevin Jordan that made you want to use one of your picks on a position where coming into the day you already had four or five players at tight end?
"It's a good question. Again, I'd say when you look at the team, it's really about competition and it's about creating opportunities. The players are going to create their opportunities. We have to get them on the team, right, however they get them here, right, you draft them, you sign them in free agency, you trade for them, whatever the case may be. Then once they're here, ultimately the competition is going to dictate who plays, who doesn't play and what their role is. Again, you can't just look at it from a sheer numbers standpoint sometimes. I think we all kind of get caught up in that, well, you have $X$ number here. Well again, we talked about this pre-draft, there's multiple examples of in New England when we drafted players who it might look like on the surface like you had a lot of players at that spot, but in reality it's just trying to add good football players to your team and then let the competition sort itself out, and as we've seen, as we know, there's constant movement with rosters and with players, and depending on their contractual situation, what that looks like. So again, there's a lot of factors that go into this whole process."

## TE BREVIN JORDAN

## Can you talk about how much Miami QB D’Eriq King helped you get where you are right now? <br> "D'Eriq King came in last year and he was an ultimate leader for the University of Miami. He was a leader. He was a captain. He was reliable. His integrity was off the charts. He came in and made me a better person and that's what made me - overall that made me a better football player."

## How much did it help being a starter for three years?

"I think it helped me a lot. I came in as true freshman, deer-in-theheadlights freshman and I earned my spot. I had to come in and compete. I had to come in and earn my spot. So, I think that's just going to help me going into the NFL, playing with the Texans. I'm going to have to compete. I'm going to have to earn the trust of my teammates."

## Do you pattern your style of play after other players?

"Yeah, definitely. I watch a lot of football. I watch a lot of tight ends. I watched Antonio Gates, Shannon Sharpe, Dallas Clark, Aaron Hernandez when he was with the Patriots - I watched a lot of guys. A lot of guys that are similar to my stature. The way they just played the position, it's remarkable. I definitely take little bits and pieces from a lot of different guys."

What was it like when you heard your name called when the Texans called you?
"It was such a crazy feeling. I've been waiting. I was just so scared. I was just so scared and to finally get the call, it was beautiful. I saw that Houston number and just freaked out."

## Why were you scared?

"I wasn't scared, I was more so just hyped. I got the call and I was just hyped up, because leading up this, the fifth round, I was just waiting. Got the call from Houston and I just flipped out. It was just the most beautiful feeling."

What do you think will be the biggest adjustment for you going to the next level?
"I think the biggest adjustment for me overall will be just working on my tendencies on the field, working on my technique. The defensive ends and the linebackers in the NFL are a lot bigger and lot stronger. Just going in there adding some strength, adding some muscle to my mass, just going in there having to block those guys is going to be the biggest adjustment, but I'm ready to take on the challenge."

## LB GARRET WALLOW

## How are you doing?

"I'm doing amazing."

## What did you think when you got the call from the Texans?

"It was really just a surreal moment to see my mom break down and me break down as well. I honestly was shocked, to be honest. I wasn't expecting to go right at that pick, so it was just amazing, especially just seeing something that you've been working your entire life manifest out and come together. It's just a beautiful thing. I'm just ready to get started for the Texans."

## So there were some tears?

"Oh, absolutely."

## How much do you weigh?

"I came in at pro day at 220, but I weigh 227 right now. I got back up to my normal playing weight which is around 228 to 230 ."

Can you tell us about your game and how you think it will fit in in the 4-3 that the Texans are playing?
"Most definitely. First off, one thing about me is just leadership, so that's one thing that I want to bring to the Texans, is just coming in and being the best leader that I can, being the best player for the team that I can. Definitely want to come in there and learn the playbook, be a smart player for the Texans and help out anyway that I can for us to win a Super Bowl. The most important thing is just being the best teammate that I can. That's probably the most valuable thing I bring to the table."

## How much do you think TCU prepared you for the next level?

"I would definitely say they helped me raise my IQ, definitely helped me think of football differently more from a player standpoint and a student as well. I guess just really for smart-wise, definitely from a professional level. Definitely just prepared the best way possible especially being under Coach P (Gary Patterson), such a great coach. Holding everybody to a high standard, not letting anybody slack for nothing. From that standpoint, definitely prepared me for where I'm about to be now."

What do you think about the opportunity to play under Associate Head Coach / Defensive Coordinator Lovie Smith?
"It's just a beautiful opportunity. Like I said, just to be so close to home and playing in Texas as well, it's a beautiful thing, man. It's just crazy. As you can tell, I'm still at a loss for words. I'm just excited to get down there and get started and get things rolling."

## How do you do on special teams?

"Most definitely. Whatever the coaching staff needs me to play or needs me to do, I'm willing to fill that role, I'm willing to fill that spot to the best of my ability."
