Shoppers' Guide to Buying Diamonds



Diamonds Are Priced According To The 4 "C's"

CARAT-

This is the unit of weight used for diamonds. There are 100 points in a carat. The average rough diamond weighs less than a carat. Larger stones have a greater value per carat.

COLOR-

Most diamonds are white with a tinge of color. Colorless diamonds are rare and more valuable.

CLARITY-


Most diamonds contain natural imperfections - spots, bubbles or lines included in the stone when it was crystallized from carbon millions of years ago. A "flawless" diamond - one that shows no imperfections to a trained eye using 10-power magnification - is very rare.

CUT-

The diamond's beauty depends on the way it handles light for brilliance, fire, and scintillation (twinkling). Marquise, pear-shaped and oval diamonds tend to look larger than round (brilliant) or emerald-cut diamonds of the same weight, but the round has more brilliancy.

Graduations within each of the Four C's make for an infinite number of combinations to determine the value of any diamond.

MILAN MANDARIC

Chief Executive Officer/President

In San Jose, California, Milan Mandaric's success with his electronics firm has sparked the emergence of several companies along the West Coast and in Europe. In St. Louis, the Storm's Chief Executive Officer and President brought the newest entry into the Major Indoor Soccer League (MISL) like a bolt of lightning.

July 13, 1989, Mandaric stood before an enthusiastic group of supporters at the Missouri Athletic Club in downtown St. Louis to christen the organization he intends to build into the "model franchise" of the MISL. And after recognizing his management abilities, work ethic and fortitude which enhanced the production of his current businesses, there is no question that Mandaric's commitment to the excellence and

excitement of soccer will prosper.

Mandaric, 50, is a native of Novi Sad, Yugoslavia, where he studied mechanical engineering. He managed his family's machine business so well that his ambitions and aggressiveness led him to expand the operations through a movement to Switzerland in 1966. His long-time desire to live in the United States occurred in 1968.

A self-made success story, he founded his first company, Lika, which he sold to Tandy Corporation (Radio Shack) after 11 years of productive existence.

Mandaric then founded the Sanmina Corporation — Sanmina being named after his two daughters, Alexandra and Yasmina — which became a high technology leader in the design and manufacturing of components for computers. Presently, Sanmina employs more than 500 people at manufacturing facilities in San Jose, California; Santa Clara, California; Seattle, Washington; and current expansion in Europe.

His newest venture is in the communication data field. The company, Senses International, concentrates on the manufacturing of innovative security systems — also located in San Jose.

Even though Mandaric's ventures into the business sector have been prosperous, soccer is his first love. "I was a player myself, but never a big star. However, not playing professionally didn't deter me from my love for the game and wanting to own a team," said Mandaric. He intends to run the Storm's soccer club as he would a successful business enterprise.

He did so by participating in the expansion efforts of the old North American Soccer League, which was rapidly growing to meet the demands of individuals and cities for professional outdoor soccer here in the United States.

Mandaric owned the San Jose Earthquakes from 1974 to 1978, during which time they became one of the NASL's most successful teams both on the field and at the gate. The organization produced an attendance of approximately 15,000 per game during its first season and followed that feat by drawing almost 19,000 fans in a 18,000-seat stadium that next year, in addition to winning a division title.

In an effort to generate a rivalry about the San Francisco Bay area, Mandaric sold the Earthquakes and purchased a team that had gone out of business in Connecticut. Nicknaming it the Stompers, he moved the organization to Oakland, where they saw 34,000 people on hand for the first game. The NASL soon experienced difficult times, however, and Mandaric slowly divested himself from ownership in the franchise.

He kept his hand in professional soccer over the years through close associations with several First Division Teams in Europe, including once serving as the President of Standard Liege, a First Division squad in Belgium.

In 1988, Mandaric and St. Louisan Dennis Long examined the possibility of acquiring the St. Louis Steamers before they ceased operations. The concept of buying an expansion franchise also was raised, but he decided to wait a year.

"When I looked into establishing a MISL team for the 1989-90 season, I thought about several cities around the country. But I was easily drawn to St. Louis because of the sports nature of the community, especially to soccer. I have a tremendous respect for their dedication to sports, which greatly influenced me to re-establish professional soccer here," Mandaric said.

Mandaric and his wife, Gordana, reside in northern California but will make home in St. Louis as well. They have two daughters.

DENNIS P. LONG

Chairman of the Board

A man who loves soccer both athletically and intellectually, Dennis Patrick Long played the game well and coached it even better — making time to coach three teams while acting as President of Anheuser-Busch.

As the Storm's Chairman of the Board, he hopes to bring success to professional soccer in St. Louis, as he has been doing as a management consultant for both the domestic and international operations of the Anheuser-Busch Companies.

During his years as President of Anheuser-Busch, the brewery was a primary reason for the building of St. Louis Soccer Park, one

of the premier installations of its kind in North America.

For a decade, Long was the President and Chief Operating Officer of the brewery subsidiary of Anheuser-Busch Companies, Inc. Under his direction the company maintained and strengthened its position as the world's largest brewing operation, doubling beer sales volume growth while quadrupling earnings.

Prior to assuming the presidency, Long served as Group Vice President of Anheuser-Busch with responsibility for all the company's non-beer business, including Busch Entertainment (Busch Gardens), Busch Industrial Products (bakers yeast and corn products), and Busch Properties, Inc. (real estate development and business centers). Under his guidance, all three subsidiaries achieved record sales and profit.

Long is a director of Jefferson Smurfit Corporation, Mercantile Bancorporation, the National Conference of Christians and Jews, the Catholic Youth Council of St. Louis, Kilo Diabetes and Vascular Research Foundation, the National Board of Directors of Boys Hope, Catholic University of America, and is the former Chairman of the Board of the worldwide U.S.O. He is a member of the American Marketing Association, the Sales and Marketing Association, Missouri Athletic Club and Sunset Country Club.


Long is the recipient of a number of significant awards, including the De La Salle Medal from Manhattan College, New York; the "Man of the Year" award of the World Mercy Fund, Dublin, Ireland; the Daughters of St. Paul "Man of the Year" award; Ambassador of the Year from the City of St. Louis; and the Secretary of Defense Medal for Outstanding Public Service, the highest honor awarded to a civilian by the Department of Defense. He has been honored also as "Irish American of the Year" by IRISH AMERICAN magazine.



Executive Vice President / General Manager

The Clydesdale horses, Spuds McKenzie t-shirts, fishing boats, his own merchandising company, and now what? Executive Vice President and General Manager of the St. Louis Storm?

That's a question that the Storm's first Executive Vice President/ General Manager Erv Pesek can answer emphatically yes! "This is probably the only job that I would have left my own company to do," said Pesek. "I wanted to become involved with this organization because I'm very committed to St. Louis and soccer.

Pesek, 40, left his own company's operation in August of 1989 — a little more than one year after taking on the position of president and owner of his full service merchandising firm, Marketing Products Group (*mpg*). By accepting the head management position within the St. Louis Storm's organization, Pesek put his responsibilities with his own company on the back-burner.

In his role as the Storm's general manager, Pesek oversees all club operations including marketing, sales, advertising, promotions, merchandising, finance operations, and day-to-day administration. "St. Louis deserves as many professional sports teams as possible, and that's why we hope to establish a strong foundation for the Storm and the MISL in St. Louis," said Pesek.

A native of St. Louis, Pesek attended Quincy College (Illinois) on a soccer scholarship. He graduated in 1971, after completing a Bachelor of Arts degree in psychology. Even though Pesek was offered a tryout with the St. Louis Stars of the now-defunct North American Soccer League, he opted to pursue a Masters degree in industrial psychology at Georgia Tech.

Pesek began his career at Anheuser-Busch Companies in 1973, and was employed in a variety of management positions for 14 years. Pesek left Anheuser-Busch in 1987 and became Corporate Director of Marketing for the Bass Pro Shops in Springfield, Missouri, concentrating his efforts on marketing and sales of the company's line of Tracker boats. It was in 1988, that he developed his company, mpg.

Pesek and his wife, Margaret, live with their three daughters Erin (14), Elizabeth (12) and Colleen (9) in Webster Groves.

Not only do the backgrounds of the Storm players have a spice of St. Louis to them, but that home-grown image can be found in the front office staff as well. Born and raised in Kirkwood, Bob Wilber assumed the position of Vice President -Marketing less than three months prior to the 1989-90 season opener.

Wilber, 33, brings to the organization a strong background in sports marketing. For the past three years he served as Project Director and later, Senior Director for DelWilber + Associates — a sports marketing firm based in Washington, D.C.

The representation of property clients to gain sponsorship was Wilber's main responsibility when he became Senior Director a year and one-half after beginning with DelWilber + Associates. It was in the following 18 months that he worked closely with the Major Indoor Soccer League (MISL), the St. Louis Blues,

the Florida Derby and the Sugar Bowl.

Prior to joining DelWilber + Associates, Wilber fulfilled a life-long dream by playing professional baseball, following his completion of college at Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville. Wilber graduated in 1978, with a degree in television/ radio communications.

Now with the Storm, Wilber is directly responsible for all activities within the marketing, promotions, advertising, community relations, public relations and ticket sales departments. The central focus of his daily workload is marketing. "I concentrate on the sale of sponsorships and tickets as well as overseeing the presentation of the team to our fans and community."

Wilber is the son of Del Wilber, Sr., a former major league catcher for the St. Louis Cardinals, Boston Red Sox and Philadelphia Phillies.



DON POPOVIC

Head Coach

As Head Coach and Director of Team Operations for the St. Louis Storm, Don Popovic, 48 returns to the city where his professional career in the United States first began.

Arriving in the United States in 1965 to play outdoor soccer, Popovic excelled for the St. Louis Stars in the old North American Soccer League (NASL). In his two stints with the Stars — covering a total of six years — Popovic began rounding out one career while beginning another. Playing through 1972 with the Stars, Popovic first stepped into coaching as an assistant during his final season with St. Louis.

"I really enjoy being in St. Louis again. I've always considered St. Louis my hometown, because this is where I had my first experiences in this

country. I had met a lot of people and established a lot of friends here."

Popovic later played a season in Kansas City and once again in Europe, before finishing his playing career with the Toronto Eagles of the Canadian National Soccer League.

Popovic took his coaching talents to the Major Indoor Soccer League (MISL) in 1978 as coach of the New York Arrows. Under his leadership, the Arrows won four consecutive league championships in the MISL's first four seasons. His 1980-81 squad compiled a 35-5 mark, the highest winning percentage (.875) in any of the MISL's eleven campaigns.

Midway through the 1982-83 season, Popovic joined the Golden Bay Earthquakes. Following an 8-10 mark over the final 18 MISL games in 1983, he led the 'Quakes to 20-10 finish outdoors.

Over the next three seasons, Popovic took the helm with the several struggling franchises, including the Las Vegas Americans and the Pittsburgh Spirit. His lifetime coaching record in eight seasons in the MISL stands at 188 victories and 87 defeats — tops on the all-time list for win percentage (.684) and fourth in wins. He netted honors as MISL Coach of the Year in 1980-81 to duplicate the achievement he garnered in the NASL.

A native of Yugoslavia, Popovic was a member of the Yugoslavia National Youth Team before turning professional at the age of 17 — signing with Red Star Belgrade, a First Division team in Yugoslavia. He came to the United States in 1965, and played in the NASL until 1975.

In 1976, Popovic became coach of Toronto, and led them to a 35-1 record and the Candian Cup championship. From 1976 through 1979, Popovic coached the NASL's Rochester Lancers, leading them to the playoffs twice in four years.

Popovic had the honor of coaching the Indoor European World All-Stars in 1974, during an exhibition tour of Brazil, Germany, Spain and France. He also served as assistant coach of the World Outdoor All-Stars in 1982 in competition against the Barcelona, Spain team, a game played in front of 120,000 fans to benefit UNICEF.

Though he grew up with the outdoor game, Popovic fell in love with American-style indoor soccer. With his unerring eye for talent, he discovered some of the top players to ever play in the MISL, including Steve Zungul, Branko Segota, Fernando Clavijo, Stan Stamenkovic, Zoltan Toth and Stan Terlicki.

Returning to the MISL as head coach for the St. Louis Storm after a two-year absence, Popovic won't settle for second-best even with an expansion team.

"I can't promise, and I don't ever promise championships. But by working hard and honest, the results will come. I hope to build an exciting team and with some luck, hopefully we can go a long way."

Popovic and his wife, Connie, currently reside in St. Louis.



DENNY VANINGER

ASSISTANT COACH

Denny Vaninger is right at home as the Storm's first assistant coach. He was born and raised in St. Louis and has lived soccer and all facets of his new job for the past 16 years.

Named to Head Coach Don Popvic's staff less than two weeks after the establishment of the new MISL franchise, Vaninger assists in the coaching and training duties as well as coordinating the soccer operations aspect of the Storm's community relations appearances.

A graduate of St. Mary's High School, Vaninger was the leading scorer in 1970 when the team went undefeated and captured the State Championship trophy. He was also a twotime All-American at Florissant Valley Community College in St. Louis (1970-71), leading the squad to a NJCAA National Championship, before continuing his educational studies at Harris Teachers College.

He participated outdoors in the Canadian Soccer League in 1973 with the Serbian White Eagles, but Vaninger returned to his hometown late that year to play forward for the St. Louis Stars of the old North American Soccer League (NASL).

A member of the Stars from 1973 to 1978, he spent his off-time with the U.S. National

Team as they travelled through Mexico, Poland, Italy and Haiti during his four-year sting (1973-76).

Vaninger continued in the NASL with the Fort Lauderdale Strikers (1978-81) before making a return trip once again to suit-up for the St. Louis Steamers of the MISL. During his brief career (1981-83) in the MISL, he scored seven goals and three assists in ten games.

Vaninger suffered a career-ending injury during his second and last season with the Steamers when tackled in a game against the New York Arrows. A broken left ankle brought an end to his playing career, but failed to slow his involvement with soccer.

Vaninger is a member of the Missouri Youth Soccer Association coaching staff, holds a USSF A Coaching License, and directs youth soccer camps and clinics for the Busch Soccer Camp in St. Louis.

"I've always been in charge of youth development with all the organizations that I've been a part of," said Vaninger, "and I enjoy all the different speaking engagements, player appearances and coaching clinics. At one time or another, I've been to each school in the St. Louis community doing these appearances, and I look forward to visiting them again with The Storm."

Vaninger and his wife, Karen, live in South St. Louis with their two children, Megan (8) and Kevin (7).

STORM goaltender Slobo Ilijevski resembles a fine wine. Why? Because he just

keeps getting better with age.

Ilijevski, the Major Indoor Soccer League's career goal keeping leader in wins, shutouts (6), saves, games played, minutes played, and shots faced, is enjoying another banner season this year with the expansion STORM. Through Feb. 12, Ilijevski had a 9-5 record and led the league with an average of over 13 saves per game.

He will make his sixth MISL All-Star game appearance this year, also tops among goalkeepers in a career. Being selected to play in another All-Star game ranks high on Ilijevski's list of accomplishments, especially now that he is a

very young 40 years old.

"Every time you get to go to this event is special, and being chosen by the players is always an honor," Ilijevski said. "Age is just a number for me."

Ilijevski has tried to pattern his success at 40 with some of the great major

league baseball players who have enjoyed lengthy careers like Nolan Ryan and Tommy John.

"Just like baseball, soccer is a game that young boys play," Ilijevski said. "But some of the older guys are still enjoying them and playing well also."

Ilijevski is obviously one of those playing well, and he is fueled by the competitive spirit and fire that burns deep

"It's all about a challenge," Ilijevski said. "What I appreciate from all team sports is that the best teams and players

Many people believed that Ilijevski's illustrious career might have come to an end after the now-defunct St. Louis Steamers folded. But certainly not Slobo. He wasn't done yet.

"I was very disappointed when the Steamers folded, but I didn't want to end my career on that note," Ilijevski said. "I went to Baltimore just for me, to prove that I can still play the game."

Ilijevski is definitely proving that he can still play the game in St. Louis, as consecutive MISL Defensive Player of the Month honors in December and January will attest.

"We're working hard now and it's paying off," Ilijevski said. "We are making a great showing for a team in its first year, and I'm confident that we're going to do well the rest of the season and in the playoffs."

Ilijevski has some strange remedies that he has concocted to treat the various injuries that creep up on an athlete over the years, and some think of them as kind of crazy. But the truth is they work.

For example, Ilijevski uses onions and tomatoes to help relieve sore muscles and ligaments.

"I was raised when medical technology wasn't nearly as advanced, and I've gotten a lot of injuries throughout my career," Ilijevski said. "And my homemade remedies work. I put the chopped onions with the soap directly on the injury and wrap them with plastic and a towel. After that, the crushed tomatoes go right on after that in the same way. I keep each of them on for four hours and they do work."

Ilijevski also drinks warm water while playing soccer in both practices and games. Warm water? "That's again just my way of doing things," Ilijevski said. "Cold water makes me sick when my body is so hot. A lot of people joke about these things I do, but I'm still kicking. I must be doing something right."

Ilijevski is married to Linda, his companion of 10 years even though they were married in September of 1988. In his spare time, he deals with his laundry businesses and real estate holdings that he has acquired for life after being a professional athlete.

"I'm always looking out to make plans for the future," Ilijevski said. "I enjoy these things and they will keep me busy after soccer."

But the current plans on Slobo's mind are the rest of the season and hopefully a playoff shot this spring.

"We are a great team now, and we are only going to get better," Ilijevski said. "I don't see one real dominant team in this league right now and with our blend of youth and experience, we should really be clicking on all cylinders come playoff time."
