NESUHI ERTEGUN CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD



Nesuhi Ertegun, chairman of the board of the Cosmos, was the driving force behind Warner Communications' move into soccer.

In 1970 Ertegun met with Phil Woosnam, Commissioner of the North American Soccer League, and Lamar Hunt, a member of the league's Executive

Committee, to explore the possibility of WCI owning a New York-based franchise. Out of that discussion came the formation of one of the NASL's strongest franchises.

When Warner Communications formed the Cosmos, Nesuhi was named first president of the team. He became chairman of the board in 1977 and was succeeded as president by his brother, Ahmet.

Ertegun's involvement with soccer goes back to the days of his youth, when he played the sport in his native Turkey, in Switzerland and in France. His knowledge of the game and the world's top players helps make him one of the club's top scouts.

The resident soccer expert at WCI Headquarters in New York, Nesuhi is also president of WEA International, the world-wide distribution arm of the WCI record companies: Warner, Elektra/Asylum, and Atlantic.

AHMET ERTEGUN PRESIDENT



Ahmet Ertegun, one of the founders of the Cosmos, has been largely responsible for the club's development into a cornerstone of the North American Soccer League and one of the best known teams in the world.

When Warner Communications acquired the NASL's New York franchise in 1970 and the Cosmos

came into existence, Ahmet was named vice president and his brother Nesuhi president of the club. In 1977 he was elevated to the post of president, succeeding Nesuhi, who became chairman of the board.

In addition to his role with the Cosmos, Ertegun is also chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Atlantic Records, another Warner Communications division that he founded in 1947.

Born in Istanbul, Turkey, the son of a career diplomat, Ahmet moved to the United States with his family at the age of 13. He studied classical philosophy at St. John's College in Annapolis, Md., and undertook graduate studies at Georgetown University before moving to New York.

RAFAEL DE LA SIERRA EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT



Rafael de la Sierra wears a variety of hats in the Cosmos scheme of things. In addition to being executive vice president of the Cosmos, he is a member of the club's board of directors and is also president of the Soccer Camps of America. De la Sierra is directly involved in the negotiation of player

contracts and acquisitions (including securing the services of players such as Pele and Giorgio Chinaglia for the Cosmos). He negotiates the Cosmos exhibition games and tours, and has also negotiated leases for the various stadiums in which the Cosmos have played including the contract that brought the club to Giants Stadium in 1977. He is chairman of the committee to establish an NASL Professional Soccer Hall of Fame.

Elected a vice president of Warner Communications, Inc. in January 1979, he is responsible for the planning and construction of all new facilities for WCI and its divisions. De la Sierra joined WCI in 1972 and was named an assistant vice president in 1973.

A native of Havana, Cuba, he studied at the University of Havana and graduated from the University of Florida School of Architecture in 1963.

KRIKOR YEPREMIAN VICE PRESIDENT AND GENERAL MANAGER



Krikor Yepremian, beginning his third year as general manager of the Cosmos, was named a vicepresident of the club last September.

Yepremian, has been at the helm of three straight division winners since he moved over to pro soccer in 1977 as the general manager of the Ft.

Lauderdale Strikers. Nobody in the league has been associated with more victories over that span, as the Strikers rolled up a league-best 19-7 record in 1977, and the Cosmos have put together back to back 24-6 slates since he took over.

Born in Cyprus of Armenian parents, Yepremian was exposed to soccer at an early age. Moving to the United States in 1959 he played four years at Indiana University, and also served as an assistant coach of the Hoosiers while attending graduate school there.

Yepremian, the older brother of football players Garo and Berj Yepremian (both of whom he coached in the art of place-kicking), was involved with N.F.L. football before his move to soccer. He represented several players on the Detroit Lions and Miami Dolphins among others.

HENNES WEISWEILER HEAD COACH



"The Great Weisweiler" is how Cosmos Chairman of the Board Nesuhi Ertegun introduced the new Cosmos mentor, and truer words were never spoken.

Hennes Weisweiler is acknowledged throughout the world as soccer's top teacher and tactician. He first came into prominence as assistant coach of the

West German National Team which won the World Cup in 1954. In 1964, he became the coach of Borussia Moenchengladbach, an unknown small town team in West Germany's Second Division. After three years, the team was promoted to the First Division, and by 1970 they had won their first of five league championships and were on their way to becoming one of the most famous teams in the world.

In 1975, after a record 11-year tenure with Moenchengladbach, Mr. Weisweiler went to Barcelona for one year where he coached current Cosmos star Johan Neeskens. He returned to West Germany in 1976 to take over the helm of F. C. Cologne who had not won a league championship since 1964. His impact was immediate and in 1977, he guided his new club to the German Cup title. The following year he accomplished the rare feat of a 'double' by winning both the league championship and his second straight cup title.

From 1953 to 1973, Mr. Weisweiler was also the head instructor at Sport Hochschule, a world famous soccer university in West Germany. Top coaches from all over the world came to learn the Weisweiler techniques. Known as the 'coach of coaches' he instructed every famous German coach in the Bundesliga today.

PROFESSOR JULIO MAZZEI TECHNICAL DIRECTOR



Professor Julio Mazzei, the technical director of the Cosmos, and Pele's longtime friend and advisor, has been involved in professional soccer for 19 years as a coach, lecturer and specialist in physical education. He came to the United States with Pele in 1975 when the now-retired star joined the Cosmos.

Professor Mazzei broke into pro soccer in 1962 with the Palmeiras Club of Sao Paulo. In 1965 he moved to the famed Santos Club of Brazil, where he began his association with Pele. The Professor, who also worked with the Brazilian National Team, and Pele have conducted soccer clinics for coaches and children in 64 countries.

In all, with Palmeiras, Santos, the Brazilian National Team, and the Cosmos, Professor Mazzei has been involved in 1,005 games (including 276 international matches). His teams have won 567, lost 229 and tied 209 over the years, and have captured 18 various championships.

The author of nine books on physical education, Professor Mazzei has also consulted on several instructional soccer films. He received his Bachelor's Degree from the University of Sao Paulo and holds a Master's Degree from Michigan State.

The 49-year-old Professor continues to perform his duties as Executive Vice President of Soccer Camps of America in addition to his Cosmos responsibilities. He was elected to the club's board of directors in February, 1980.

TERRY GARBETT ASSISTANT COACH



Terry Garbett begins a new career this season, and if he attacks it in his typical manner, he will be as successful a coach as he was a player. From his first Cosmos game four years ago to the two shootout goals in his final appearance against Vancouver last September, the Cosmos new assistant

coach was one of the most popular, hard-working players the club has ever had. With world-class superstars all around him, it often took the chemistry that Terry provided to produce victories. At one stretch the Cosmos won 27

straight games in which he appeared. As a defensive minded player he was the perfect complement to the team's otherwise attack-oriented midfield, and things simply seemed to click better with him on the field.

Terry began his career with Middlesborough of the English Second Division in 1963, and also had stints with Watford and Blackburn before joining Sheffield United of the First Division in 1974. He joined the Cosmos prior to the 1976 season.

MIGUEL DE LIMA GOALKEEPER COACH



Miguel de Lima, the first specialized goalkeeper coach hired at the college level, earned the distinction of becoming the initial goalkeeper coach in the North American Soccer League when he joined the Cosmos the end of May.

The 42-year-old de Lima was hired by the Cosmos to work with

netminders Hubert Birkenmeier and David Brcic. He was previously Brcic's goalkeeper coach at St. Louis University.

De Lima, a native of Brazil who is a naturalized U.S. citizen, was the first team keeper for Vasco da Gama and Botafogo F.C., both first division clubs of the Rio de Janeiro League. He played in 1968 with the old New York Generals, where his teammates included Cesar Menotti, coach of the Argentina National Team, and Gordon Bradley, now at the helm of the Washington Diplomats (their coach was Freddie Goodwin, currently president of the Minnesota Kicks). De Lima wound up his playing career with the St. Louis Stars in 1971, when he joined St. Louis University.

EROL YASIN Assistant coach



Erol Yasin, following three years of service as a Cosmos goalkeeper, embarks on a new career in coaching this season.

Erol retired at the end of the 1979 season as the Cosmos career leader in shutouts with eleven. His six shutouts in the 1978 season alone, also remains a club record, and he closed his

Cosmos career with a stingy goals against average of 1.29. Erol joined the Cosmos in 1977 after a brilliant career with Galatasaray of Istanbul. He played on 27 occasions for the Turkish National Team, and was in the nets for numerous European Cup matches.

ROBERT ROLONTZ VICE PRESIDENT COMMUNICATIONS



Robert Rolontz, Director of Corporate Information for Warner Communications Inc., is Vice President of the Cosmos, Operations. He oversees the sales, public relations and media advertising areas for the Cosmos.

An experienced journalist and public relations executive, Mr. Rolontz has authored many articles for

the entertainment industry and consumer press, and is currently the executive editor of Warner World, the Warner Communications publication. Mr. Rolontz was also the editor of the Pele commemorative program which was released in conjunction with Pele's Farewell game.

DOMINICK FLORA VICE-PRESIDENT AND EXECUTIVE ASSISTANT



Dominick Flora oversees the Cosmos marketing area, handles special projects and coordinates the Cosmos international tours. He joined the Cosmos in 1977 as director of sales. He was subsequently promoted to marketing director, and last September was named a vice-president and executive assistant to Rafael de la Sierra.

A basketball All-American at Washington & Lee University, Flora joined the Cosmos from the Federal Broadcasting Company, where he was in charge of organizing a commercial cable television network. Prior to that he was director of marketing for the Portland Thunder of the World Football League.

Cosmos: The '79 Season

Following back-to-back North American Soccer League championships in 1977 and 1978, the Cosmos saw their hopes for three consecutive league crowns dashed by the Vancouver Whitecaps, who eliminated the defending titlists in the National Conference final.

All told in 1979, the Cosmos, whose year also featured a pre-season tour of the Caribbean and South America and a post-season junket to the Far East and Australia, played before 2,127,606 people. They bettered the onemillion mark in NASL total attendance for the second straight year...and also attracted more than one million fans to Giants Stadium for their 21 games in the Meadowlands.

In 1979 the Cosmos equaled the league won-loss mark of 24-6 they established the year before; they also set a record for standings points with 216. And striker Giorgio Chinaglia continued his relentless pursuit of Ilija Mitic's all-time NASL records for goals (101) and points (239); entering the 1980 campaign Chinaglia's totals were 94 and 223.

Since their inception in 1971, the Cosmos, in addition to putting on a first-class show of their own, have strived to bring quality international soccer to the United States. In 1979, playing before a crowd of 70,134 at Giants Stadium, they held the 1978 World Cup Champions, the Argentine National Team, scoreless for 87:54...or until Daniel Passarella's header gave the visitors a hard-fought 1-0 win.

The success of the Warner Communications-owned franchise—and, for that matter, soccer in the United States—traces directly to the Cosmos' 1975 signing of Pele, who retired as an active player following the 1977 campaign. The Cosmos captured their first NASL championship in 1972 and advanced to the playoffs in 1973 and 1976 before their consecutive titles the next two years.

BACKGROUND

Formula for Breaking Standings Ties for Playoff Positions

An eight-step procedure is used to determine the order of finish in regular season play if there are any ties that exist in the point totals. The order of finish within a division is determined as follows:

- a. greatest number of points determined by the NASL point system
- b. greatest number of points; accrued by results only (i.e., no bonus points)
- c. the greater goal difference (goals for minus goals against)
- d. the most outright wins (i.e., no overtime, no shootout wins)
- e. the greater number of goals scored
- f. procedures a thru c applied to road games only
- g. procedures a thru c applied to home games only

Glossary of Soccer Terms

Center — to pass the ball from a wide position on the field into the penalty area.

Charging — pushing the opponent off balance legally by shoulder to shoulder contact.

Clear — a throw or kick by the goalkeeper or a kick by the defender in an attempt to get the ball away from the goal area.

Cross — same type of pass as center.

Defender — primarily a defensive player who assists the goalkeeper in protecting the goal.

Dribble — a way of advancing the ball past defenders by a series of short taps with one or both feet.

Forward — primarily an attacking player whose responsibility is to create and score goals.

Goalkeeper — the last line of defense. The only player who can use his hands within the field of play. He is limited to using his hands only within the penalty area.

Half-Volley — kicking the ball just as it is rebounding off the ground.

Hands — illegal act of *intentionally* touching the ball with the hands or arms.

Heading — a method of scoring, passing and controlling the ball by making contact with the head.

Linkman — another name for midfielder.

Lob— a high, soft kick taken on the volley, lifting the ball over the heads of the opponents.

Marking - guarding an opponent.

Midfielder — both an offensive and defensive player who is primarily responsible for linking the forwards and defenders.

Obstructing — preventing the opponent from going around a player by standing in his path.

Overlap — the attacking play of a defender going down the touchline past his own winger.

Pitch — another name for the field of play.

Save — the goalkeeper, stopping an attempted goal by catching or deflecting the ball away from the goal.

Screen — retaining possession and protecting the ball by keeping your body between the ball and opponent.

Shootout — the tie-breaking procedure used in NASL games when teams are tied after playing two sudden death overtime periods. Teams take five alternating shootout attempts at opposing goalkeepers in a one-on-one situation.

Sliding Tackle — attempting to take the ball away from the opponent by sliding on the ground.

Striker — a central forward position in the team with a major responsibility for scoring goals.

Sweeper — a defender who roams either in front of or behind the defender line to pick up stray passes.

Tackling — attempting to or taking the ball away from an opponent when both players are playing the ball with their feet.

Trap — controlling a ball passed close to the player by means of the feet, thighs or chest.

Volley - kicking the ball while it is in flight.

Wall Pass — a pass to a teammate followed by a first time return pass on the other side of the opponent (give and go).

Wing — an area of the field near the touchline.

Winger - name given to the right and left outside forwards.

4-3-3 — the player formation most used today (a goalkeeper, four defenders, three midfielders, three forwards).

4-2-4 — most used alternative formation to the 4-3-3 (a goalkeeper, four defenders, two midfielders and four forwards).

NASL Tiebreaker Procedure/ The Shootout


NASL games which are tied at the end of regulation play will be extended by 15 minutes of "sudden death" overtime (two 7½-minute periods). A flip of the coin will decide which team will kick off. The first team to score a goal, either from the field or by a penalty kick, wins the game.

If the game remains tied at the end of the second overtime period, the outcome will be decided by The Shootout which involves players on each team challenging the opposing goalkeeper in a one-on-one situation.

The visiting team will kick first and each team will take five chances in alternate order. Attacking players will start with the ball on the 35-yard line and must take their shot within five seconds. Goalkeepers have no movement restrictions within the five-second period in accordance with normal rules of play.

The kicks shall be ended when one team has achieved an insurmountable advantage, such as scoring on its first three kicks while their opponents miss their first three.

If the teams remain tied after the prescribed five attempts, they shall continue to take alternate kicks until one has scored more than the other after an equal number of attempts. Only players in the game at the end of the second overtime period shall be eligible to take such kicks except that each team may substitute for its goalkeeper at any time during the Shootout. Such a substitute may be selected from any of the players included on a team's official line-up card submitted prior to the start of the game. However, once a goalkeeper has been substituted for, he may not be reinstated. Goalkeepers shall not take kicks. No player may take a second kick until all other eligible members of his team have done so, at which time they shall continue in any order the team may wish, i.e., they do not have to kick in the same rotation.



Condensed Rules of Soccer

Rule 1 — The Field of Play. (Diagram above).

- Rule 2 The Ball (NASL approved Ball Adidas) circumference 27"-28", weight 4 oz.-16 oz.
- Rule 3 Number of Players. Each team consists of 11 players, one of whom must be the goalkeeper. A maximum of three substitutes may be used.
- Rule 4 Player Equipment. Consists of a shirt, shorts, stockings and shoes. Goalkeeper must wear colors which distinguish him from the other players.
- Rule 5 Referees. One referee is appointed for each match. He is responsible for control of the game and his decisions are final.
- Rule 6 Linesman. Two linesmen assist the referee by indicating offside, when the ball is out of play, and which team is entitled to the corner kick or throw in.
- Rule 7 Duration of the Game. Shall be two equal periods of 45 minutes unless otherwise agreed upon.
- Note: See NASL Tiebreaker Procedure.
- Rule 8 The Start of Play. A flip of coin decides which team will kick off. Each team must stay on its own half of the field and the defending players must be at least 10 yards from the ball until it is kicked.

After a goal the team scored upon will kick off. After halftime the teams change ends and the kickoff will be taken by the opposite team to that which started the game. A goal cannot be scored directly from a kickoff.

- Rule 9 Ball In and Out of Play. The ball is out of play when (a) it has wholly crossed the goal line or touchline, whether on the ground or in the air, or (b) when the game has been stopped by the referee.
- Rule 10 Method of Scoring. A goal is scored when the whole of the ball has passed over the goal line, between the goal posts and under the cross bar.
- Rule 11 Offside. A player is in an offside position if he is nearer to his opponents' goal line than the ball, unless:
 - a) he is in his own half of the field of play, or
 - b) there are at least two of his opponents nearer their own goal line than he is.
- A player shall only be declared offside and penalized for being in an offside position, if, at the moment the ball touches, or is played by, one of his team, he is, in the opinion of the Referee:

- a) interfering with play or with an opponent, or
- b) seeking to gain an advantage by being in that position.

A player shall not be declared offside by the Referee:

- a) merely because of his being in an offside position, or
- b) if he receives the ball, direct, from a goal kick, a corner kick, a throw-in, or when it has been dropped by the Referee.

If a player is declared offside, the Referee shall award an indirect free kick, which shall be taken by a player of the opposing team from the place where the infringement occurred, unless the offense is committed by a player in his opponent's goal area, in which case, the free kick shall be taken from a point anywhere within that half of the goal area in which the offense occurred.

Note: This is the Traditional Rule. In 1973 the NASL introduced a "Blue Line" concept with a line drawn the width of the field 35 yards from each goal (see diagram). Under the new rule an attacking player is not offside until he is within 35 yards of his opponent's goal rather than midfield, as under the Traditional Rule.

Rule 12 — Fouls and Misconduct. A player who intentionally attempts to or actually: (a) kicks, (b) trips, (c) jumps at, (d) charges violently, (e) charges from behind, (f) strikes, (g) holds or (h) pushes an opponent, or (i) intentionally handles the ball shall be penalized by a direct free kick. Any one of these nine offensescommitted in the penalty area by a defender will result in the awarding of a penalty kick to the offensive team.

A player committing less flagrant violations such as offside, dangerous plays, obstruction or ungentlemanly conduct will be penalized by an indirect free kick.

Rule 13 — Free Kicks. Are classified into two categories: "Direct" (from which a goal can be scored directly against the offending side) and "Indirect" (from which a goal cannot be scored unless the ball has been touched by a player other than the kicker before entering the goal).

For all free kicks the offending team must be at least 10 yards from the ball until it is kicked.

- Rule 14 Penalty Kick. A direct free kick taken at the penalty mark. All players except the player taking the kick and the goalkeeper must stay outside the penalty area and at least 10 yards from the ball (hence the arc at edge of penalty area).
- Rule 15 Throw in. When the ball has wholly crossed the touchline it is put back into play by a throw in from the spot where it went out and by a player from the opposite team that last touched it. A goal cannot be scored directly from a throw in.
- Rule 16 Goal Kick. When the ball has wholly crossed the goal line after being last touched by a player from the attacking team, it is put back into play by a kick from the goal area by the defending team.
- Rule 17 Corner Kick. When the ball has wholly crossed the goal line after being last touched by a player from the defending team, it is put back into play by a kick from the corner on the side the ball went out by the attacking team.
