SEASON OUTLOOK

Clemson Head Coach Brad Brownell is hoping history repeats itself.

This past August he took his team on an 11-day foreign trip to France. Coming off a 17-16 season in 2021-22, the Tigers won three exhibition games in dominating fashion. The trip had an educational benefit as well, as the experience included visits to Monaco, Nice, Paris and Normandy.

Five years ago, he took his team coming off a 17-16 season on summer foreign trip to Spain. That ensuing 2017-18 season the Tigers tied a school record for victories during a 25-10 season and reached the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament by beating SEC Champion Auburn in dominating fashion.

"There are a lot of benefits from a trip like that, it fosters great camaraderie and team building," said Brownell. "It was an educational trip, especially when we went to Normandy."

In addition to the intangible benefits of the trip, there were also considerable pluses when it came to the extra practices and experience. "We were able to develop some depth and experience for our young players. With PJ Hall out at the time with an injury, there was a lot more playing time available for the young guys up front."

Brownell certainly hopes history does not repeat itself this year when it comes to injuries. Last year, the Tigers were in good shape for postseason play until senior Hunter Tyson suffered an injury that forced him to miss eight games. The Tigers lost the first six games that Tyson missed, then won four of five when he returned. Leading scorer PJ Hall also suffered an injury that caused him to miss three games, plus 39 minutes of another. And there were many games Clemson's leading scorer played hurt.

The injuries were major factors in Clemson losing six games by three points or less, including two-point losses to Final Four teams Duke and North Carolina. There was also a five-point loss to Elite Eight team Miami.

Still the Tigers had five wins over teams that won at least 20 games, and five wins in the last six of the year, including wins over ACC Tournament Champion Virginia Tech and 25-win team Wake Forest. The season ended

in the ACC Tournament's second round in overtime on a buzzer beater by the Hokies.

"We did finish the season strong," said Brownell. "And hopefully there will be a carry over. We have players returning who showed improvement over the course of the season. But this is also a new season and a new team. We have seven new players among our top 12 (including redshirt Josh Beadle)."

Brownell is looking forward to improvement from his veterans and an infusion of talent from his newcomers. "We need to play better on defense, and I think we will. There were some things we could not do in the middle of our defense last year because of the injuries to PJ and Hunter. We were not as mobile in the middle as we needed to be. We have more size in the middle this year and that should help us."

"In general, we should be more physical with bigger and stronger players at the guard position. Guard play will be important for us because we are not as experienced in that area, as we have been. But at the same time, we should be more versatile."

While the Tigers do have six new scholarship players, Brownell does have six returning players, including four veterans in at least their third years at Clemson. In addition, newcomer Brevin Galloway, a transfer from Boston College, is a veteran of 100 college games.

Backcourt

Clemson must replace Al-Amir Dawes and Nick Honor in the backcourt, who each started 25 games last year. Dawes was the team's second leading scorer last year at 11.3 points per game, while Honor was fifth at 7.7 points per outing. The Tigers also must replace versatile wing graduate David Collins, who averaged 10.3 points and a team best 6.9 rebounds per game.

But the cupboard is not bare in the backcourt, as seniors Chase Hunter and Alex Hemenway are back, plus redshirt freshman Josh Beadle is ready to join the active roster. Galloway is a transfer from Boston College with plenty of experience at the Division I level. Additionally, Dillon Hunter, Chase's younger brother, is a true freshman

who was ranked as the nation's 64th best player by ESPN.com, enrolled this past summer. Chauncey Gibson is a talented 6-5 player from Texas in his first year as well.

"Chase is a dynamic athlete who has experience at the wing and the point for us," said Brownell. "His experience at multiple positions was important for us last year. He really improved over the course of last year and I look for that to continue. Dillon is more of a point guard and is more of a complete player as a freshman than Chase was at this stage."

Chase Hunter averaged 6.7 points per game last year, but was a much different player over the last half of the season. He had just one double figure scoring game in the first 17, then had nine in the last 16. He averaged 10.0 points per game final 16 games of the year when he helped the Tigers to wins over Wake Forest and Boston College with performances that showed his capabilities.

In the win over Wake Forest, he scored 21 points on 10-12 shooting. Then the next game in Boston, he had a career-high 23 points that included 7-9 field goal shooting. He shot 48 percent from the field and 38 percent on three-point shooting the last 16 games of the year.

Hemenway averaged 5.2 points per game off the bench last season and made 41 percent of his three-point attempts. He had 11 points, including 3-for-3 on three-point shooting in the win over Virginia Tech at the end of the season. He has 83 career three-point goals and has made .415 from distance over his career.

Hemenway was Clemson's leading scorer on the trip to France last Summer with a 16.0 average. The native of Indiana scored 48 points in the three games in just 58 minutes, as he connected on 13-22 three-point shots — good for 59 percent. A fine ball handler, he had just 10 turnovers in 453 minutes last year.

Beadle also played well in France and averaged 13.3 points per game on the trip. He made 53.6 percent of his field goals and had a pair of 16-point performances. "Josh is a player who can create his own shot and is not afraid to drive to the basket. He plays with confidence and is outstanding in the

open court.”

Galloway is a 6-2 guard who has played 100 college games at College of Charleston and Boston College. Last year he showed he enjoyed shooting in Littlejohn Coliseum when he scored 18 points to lead Boston College to victory. He averaged 8.2 points per game for the Eagles last year but was a 15.0 points per game scorer at College of Charleston in 2020-21. He made the CAA All-Defensive team when he had 69 steals in 2019-20. He has 183 career made three-point goals entering this year, his sixth season of college basketball.

Gibson is a combo guard who averaged 17.6 points, 7.0 rebounds and 5.0 assists a game at Kimball High School in Dallas.

Front Court

Brownell has four returning veteran players in the front court and two highly regarded freshmen. The only front court loss from last year is the versatile Naz Bohannon, who averaged 5.7 points per game and shot 53 percent from the field.

PJ Hall is the Tigers top returning player after leading the team in scoring (15.5) last season. Hunter Tyson is a fifth-year veteran who averaged 10.0 points a game last year. Ben Middlebrooks and Ian Schieffelin are two improving big men who made contributions off the bench in 2022.

“PJ and Hunter are two terrific team leaders who set great examples for the rest of the team,” said Brownell. “They have tremendous habits, whether it be in work ethic, nutrition, or extra shooting. They are committed to be as good as they can be.”

“I am looking forward to them both having healthy seasons. Hunter missed eight games last year and PJ missed three, but PJ wasn’t 100 percent most of the year.”

In addition to his 15.5 points per game scoring average, Hall pulled in 5.8 rebounds, led the team in blocked shots with 38, shot 49 percent from the field and 78 percent from the line. He also made 24 three-point goals to give Clemson another perimeter threat. The native of Spartanburg, SC scored in double figures in 28 of his 30 games, including a career high 28 points at Florida State.

Hall’s scoring average was the best for a Clemson center since Dale Davis averaged 17.9 points a game in 1990-91. He was named to the NABC All-District team and was the runner-up in voting for the ACC’s Most Improved Player last year.

Tyson was fourth on the team on the team in scoring last year with his double figure average. He shot 35 percent

from three-point range and shot 47 percent from the field overall. Tyson was Clemson’s second leading scorer on the summer trip to France with a 15.0 average and he led the team in rebounding at nearly 10 per game.

A veteran of 106 college games, Tyson has a chance to break the all-time Clemson record. The productive player averaged 15.0 points and 8.3 rebounds per game when his stats are pro-rated to a 40-minute game.

Schieffelin is a 6-7 forward who averaged 3.1 points per game last year when he made seven starts in Tyson’s absence. He is an aggressive player who had 28 offensive rebounds in limited play last year. He is also capable of hitting the three-point shot. Middlebrooks is a 6-10 center who shot 59 percent from the field last when he averaged 1.2 point per game. He made 9-of-14 shots from the field on the trip to France this past summer.

Chauncey Wiggins and RJ Godfrey are two talented freshmen who will be contributors in the front court this year. Both saw significant action on the trip to France, and they both shot at least 50 percent from the field, and each scored exactly 26 points in the three games.

Wiggins is a 6-9 player from Grayson, Ga. who averaged 12.6 points and 6.6 rebounds per game a year ago. Godfrey is 6-7, 225-pound forward who averaged 16 points and nine rebounds a game for North Gwinnett High School in Suwanee, Ga. His father Randall Godfrey played 11 years in the NFL. RJ was second on the Clemson team in rebounding in the games win France with 20.

THE MEN'S BASKETBALL TEAM HAD JUST DEFEATED VIRGINIA Tech, 53-49, on Senior Day, and the customary senior celebration was just beginning. Following the traditional singing of the alma mater, seniors listen as Head Coach Brad Brownell tells stories and celebrates them before they grab the microphone for themselves in front of a still packed gym. Parker Fox wrapped up his speaking portion and handed the mic to Hunter Tyson.

As he stood up and looked around, he was immediately serenaded with chants of "One more year! One more year!"

It was impossible for Tyson to hold back a smile as he began grinning from ear to ear, even breaking into laughter before he started speaking.

Tyson kept his remarks rather generic, not confirming his plans one way or another, but saying he would take some time to thoughtfully consider whether he would exercise his extra year of eligibility.

Three weeks later he confirmed everyone's highest hopes when he announced his decision to play one more year, and he had precedent behind his decision to stay.



Hunter Tyson came to Clemson the summer of 2018 prior to the start of his freshman year. It would be generous to say that he was 204 pounds when he arrived, but you would be hard pressed to find another example of someone who has grown as much as Tyson during his stay in Tigertown.

His freshman season Tyson joined a team that had four seniors make the decision to return for another year and another chance at the postseason. He soaked in the leadership of Marcquise Reed, Shelton Mitchell, Elijah Thomas and David Skara who all returned from the Tigers' Sweet 16 squad the year before.

"I just wanted to give it one last push, everything I have, for one last year," Tyson said. "I was not ready to leave Clemson yet. I wanted to give one last run. I wanted to go out on a better note. I'm really excited about next year and the success I believe we can have."

Throughout the last four seasons, Tyson's role and production have expanded every year, as have his leadership and relationships. Coach Brownell knows everything that Tyson brings and he simplifies it to one word.

"Intangibles," Brownell said. "Things that guys do on the court that take pressure off teammates that do not involve scoring. Holding each other accountable and providing confidence and smarts. He gives us a lot of that."

Teammates, namely star forward P.J. Hall have noticed of Tyson's leadership since day one.

"The mental toughness, the physical toughness, the determination, everything," Hall said. "It is literally the full package. He is a great player and also a great teammate. Whether they are 6 a.m. or late practices, he is always the loudest one in the gym. He is making sure everyone is doing their thing."

During the last two seasons Tyson has endured serious injuries. He took a knee to the face against Alabama on Dec. 12, 2020. But even a fractured face only sidelined him for a month.

Last year Tyson suffered a freak injury, breaking his collar bone on a contact play under the basket against Florida State. With grit literally in his bones, Tyson had surgery and worked himself back to play this time in less than a month.

Although Tyson contributes to any category that does not register in a box score, he fills the official game record too.

He totaled 13 double-digit scoring games, averaging a career-best 10.0 points per contest last year. He also compiled 16 games with at least five rebounds, including a career-best 13 in a home win against South Carolina. That game was also Tyson's first career double-double (18 points and 13 rebounds).

Hunter Tyson decided that he was not done wearing school colors for Clemson basketball. It is an invaluable decision for the program.

"Having experienced older players is a necessity," Brownell said. "I am pleased because a guy like that chose to come back."

The University, fans and community agree. 🐾



DREAMING OF CLEMSON

We all dream big. Sometimes people or circumstances discourage those dreams and tell us they aren't attainable. When that happens to Brevin Galloway, he adjusts. Nothing matters more to Brevin than winning. But getting the opportunity to live out a lifelong dream isn't anything that he is taking for granted.





ON MARCH 10, 2022, BOSTON COLLEGE LOST 71-69 to the Miami Hurricanes on a buzzer-beating shot in overtime. As Brevin saw his team's ACC Tournament dream fading, he also thought his career was probably over. He started the mental process of understanding that he had just played the last game of his collegiate career.

Less than a month later, April 2, Brevin learned that an additional year of eligibility had been granted to him. After letting that process play out with the NCAA, Brevin entered the transfer portal on April 10, and it didn't take long to connect with Clemson.

"I kid you not, 15 minutes after I entered the transfer portal, I'm on the phone with Coach Brownell. Once the news had gotten out, I was like, I need to talk to Brownell. We got in touch, and I told him I wanted to be a Clemson Tiger."

On May 11, it was officially announced that Brevin would play out his final collegiate season as a Tiger.

"Brevin Galloway not only adds experience to our team, but provides quality depth to our guard group," said Brownell at the time of Galloway's official signing. "He plays the game with a high IQ while also adding in the ability to knock down shots from anywhere on the floor including from distance."

This next part was certainly made clear to Coach when he spoke to Brevin.

"Brevin's strong desire to be at Clemson was such a great fit not just for us, but for him as well."

That strong desire dates to Brevin's middle school and high school days.

"My brother and I went to a lot of the basketball camps growing up. I can remember me being 12 years old and getting my shirt signed by Brad Brownell at kid's camp and getting a photo taken with him. I've been a Clemson fan for as long as I can remember."

Once Brevin realized that he had the talent to continue his basketball career in college, he dreamed of coming to play at Clemson.

"Whenever I was around 14 or 15 years old, I realized that college basketball was going to be a thing for me. That's what I was preparing for, and being from the area, Clemson was my dream school, and it still is my dream school."

Brevin stayed in the state and attended College of Charleston out of high school and played for former Brownell assistant Earl Grant. While Brevin attended CofC, his brother Braden was a star tight end on the football team at Clemson for Head Coach Dabo Swinney.

Brevin came back to games to watch his brother compete and even as a player for another school, he was signing autographs and receiving love from the Clemson family.

"I was a little bit jealous at first (of brother Braden playing football at Clemson) because he was able to stay home and be a Clemson Tiger and wear the orange and purple. To see what he went through, how they treated him and the love they showed him and the respect he got; it didn't do anything but make me want to be a Clemson Tiger more and be a part of the Clemson family. The love from Clemson has always been there."

There is work ahead for Brevin and the Tigers this season, but he isn't letting any of that change his mentality or how he is approaching this final season.

"I just have a grateful mindset. I've obviously been through a lot of adversity with injuries, and my collegiate career was longer than expected. Just being here in this facility, being around a great team, everything is top of the line. The facility, guys, coaching staff, and just how we are treated in general, I've just been grateful for it."

"I really can't put it into words how happy I am to be a Tiger, and I just can't wait to show it by my play on the court."

Brevin is eager to win as he lives out his dream to play at Clemson.

"I came to Clemson to win. I just want to win. I want to make the tournament." 🐾
