FROM THE COMMISSIONER

This guide was prepared with the working media in mind. We hope you will find it helpful in covering the North American Soccer League in 1976.

The Bicentennial Year is attracting the attention of the world and the progress of the NASL and soccer in general is likewise calling the attention of the soccer world to our shores.

As it was last year, the NASL will be composed of 20 franchises in 1976 with Minnesota and San Diego replacing Denver and Baltimore. As the third largest professional league in North America, the NASL will present the best professional soccer in American markets from Miami to Vancouver, from Los Angeles to Boston.

More fans, more top players, better stadia . . . these are the building blocks the

NASL is putting in place in 1976.

Last year almost 2,000,000 fans attended NASL games with San Jose leading the league in average — 17,927 or 95% of capacity. The New York at Washington game produced the largest crowd in NASL history to that point — 35,260. The St. Louis at Portland playoff crowd of 33,503 was close behind.

Sellout crowds attended the semi-final and final rounds of the NASL indoor championship hosted by Tampa Bay as '76 began on an up-beat and a new American record was established when 50,000 attended the New York at Seattle preseason

game in the Kingdome . .

. . . which leads into the new stadia. The Kingdome, Schaefer Stadium, Franklin Field — more and more NASL teams are moving into better playing facilities as the public interest in soccer increases. The Dallas Tornado spent over \$800,000 renovating Ownby Stadium in preparation for 1976.

And the increase in fan interest which necessitates the better stadia is directly tied to the increased number of top class players coming into the NASL. Domestic stars like Kyle Rote, Jr. and Bob Rigby were supplemented by Pele last year and in 1976 George Best, Bobby Moore, Geoff Hurst and Rodney Marsh will be just some of the

World Class players making their NASL debut.

Many of the top NASL players will be selected to represent the United States as members of Team America which will participate with the National Teams of Brazil, England and Italy in the American Bicentennial Soccer Cup to be played in May. Ken Furphy of the New York Cosmos has been chosen by the United States Soccer Federation to coach Team America. In the fall, the USA will enter World Cup qualifying with a team made up largely of NASL players.

As Tampa Bay embarks on its defense of its league title, the NASL will be in its strongest position ever. NASL Marketing has brought soccer closer to the commercial

community thus contributing to the public knowledge of the game.

The time when soccer takes its place at the head of the list of America's sports — as it is in almost all the other 142 soccer playing nations — is growing shorter and the anticipated successes of 1976 will take us another long stride toward that goal.

NASL HISTORY

In just five years, (between 1970-1975) the North American Soccer League (NASL) expanded from five to 20 teams to become the third largest professional

sports league in North America.

Despite a partial collapse after its first season, 1968, the NASL was kept alive and has built its foundation on five of the 17 franchises that operated that year. The five franchises were Atlanta, Baltimore, Dallas, Kansas City and St. Louis. Two of those charter five, Dallas and St. Louis, are still members of the League today which has grown to the present 20 franchises in the United States and Canada playing in four divisions with further expansion on the horizon: Boston, Chicago, Dallas, Hartford, Los Angeles, Miami, Minnesota, New York, Philadelphia, Portland, Rochester, St. Louis, San Antonio, San Diego, San Jose, Seattle, Tampa, Toronto, Vancouver, Washington.

In 1967 there were two competing leagues, the United States Association (USA) which imported entire foreign teams to represent the twelve franchises for the initial season, and the National Professional Soccer League (NPSL), consisting of ten teams which recruited domestic and foreign talent. The Los Angeles Wolves, represented by Wolverhampton Wanderers of England, won the U.S.A. Championship with an incredible 6-5 overtime victory over the Washington Whips, represented by Aberdeen of Scotland. The Oakland Clippers captured the NPSL crown with a two-game, total-goals 4-2 victory over the Baltimore Bays, losing 1-0 in Baltimore before winning 4-1 in Oakland.

In 1968 the two leagues merged to form the North American Soccer League with seventeen teams. The Atlanta Chiefs captured the first NASL title with a 3-0 victory over the San Diego Toros after the two teams had played to a 0-0 tie in San Diego in

the first game.

The Kansas City Chiefs won the reduced League crown in 1969 by a one point

margin in the standings over the Atlanta Chiefs. No playoffs were held.

The Washington Darts and Rochester Lancers joined the League in 1970 and both won their division titles and met to decide the League crown. The Lancers won the first game 3-0 and held on to win the Championship with a 4-3 two-game aggregate, as Washington defeated them 3-1 in the second game. The NASL consisted of six

teams in 1970, since Baltimore dropped out.

The League grew to eight teams in 1971 with expansion to Montreal, New York and Toronto and the loss of Kansas City. The Washington Darts franchise moved to Miami. In that year, the Dallas Tornado, a perennial celler dweller became the NASL's first cinderella team. The Tornado finished second in the Southern Division behind Atlanta but then proceeded to eliminate defending Champion Rochester in Semi-Finals in a best two-out-of-three game series, which included two record marathon games. In the Championship Series, the Tornado defeated Atlanta in the last two games of the best of three game series after losing the opener. Atlanta had defeated New York in their Semi-Final round.

The 1972 season saw the second year New York Cosmos capture the NASL crown with a climatic 2-1 victory over the stubborn St. Louis Stars, after having eliminated Dallas 1-0 in the Semi-Finals. St. Louis had defeated Rochester 2-0 to reach their

first-ever final. There were no membership changes in 1972.

The NASL added a ninth franchise in 1973, the Philadelphia Atoms. The Atoms promptly became the first expansion team in the history of major professional sports in North America to capture a National title in their inaugural season. They accomplished the feat with a 2-0 victory over Dallas before a record crowd of 18,824 in Dallas. The Atoms reached the final with a 3-0 victory over Toronto, while Dallas was defeating New York 1-0 in the other semi-final.

In early December 1973, the NASL expanded to the West Coast and for the first time since 1968 re-established itself as a national league with franchises in Los Angeles, San Francisco, Seattle and Vancouver, B.C. The League also added franchises in Baltimore in early December, Boston in late December and Denver in early February 1974 and increased its membership to fifteen teams as Atlanta and Montreal dropped out.

The 1974 season was by far the most successful in the League's history to date. A total of 1,181,630 spectators for a record average of 7,825 per game attended the 151 regular season games. The average was a 104% increase over the 1971 average of 3,844. San Jose led the League with an average of 16,576 followed by Seattle (13,717), Philadelphia (11,784) and Vancouver (10,098). Only Philadelphia in 1973

had ever averaged more than 10,000 per game.

In 1974, Los Angeles Aztecs became the eighth different NASL Champion in as many years and the second expansion club to capture the title in its first season. In a classic Final in the Orange Bowl in Miami, the Aztecs defeated the Miami Toros 4-3 on a tie-breaker after tying the game in the final three minutes to send the game into the tie-breaker. Four goals were scored in the final twelve minutes of the match. The Championship Game was witnessed by 15,507 in the Orange Bowl and a nationwide CBS television audience. It marked the NASL's return to National Television for the first time since 1968. The year also included the formation of the NASL Marketing, Inc.

Through NASL Marketing Inc. the League took on a new image and identity beginning with the 1975 season and introduced its own game ball. The League also added five new franchises in Chicago, Hartford, Portland, San Antonio and Tampa Bay to bring the League to a record total of 20 clubs.

The League opened 1975 with its first indoor season from January 24 to March 16 before the start of the outdoor season in mid-April. The San Jose Earthquakes won the first NASL Indoor title with an 8-5 victory over the Tampa Bay Rowdies at

the Cow Palace in San Francisco.

The NASL's ninth season, 1975, was distinguished by still new attendance records, a ninth different champion in as many years and third different consecutive expansion team champion in as many years, expanded television coverage and the most significant development in its young history, the signing of Pele by the New

York Cosmos.

The Tampa Bay Rowdies captured Soccer Bowl-75 before more than 17,000 in San Jose's Spartan Stadium and a National CBS television audience with a 2-0 victory over another expansion club, the Portland Timbers. A tremendous 35 yard blast by substitute defender Arsene Auguste in the 66th minute only three minutes after he came on gave the Rowdies the only goal they would need. With only minutes remaining striker Clyde Best scored the insurance goal. The two finalists had finished the regular season with identical 16-6 records and set club and League attendance records on the way to San Jose.

Portland defeated Seattle in overtime in the quarter-finals 2-1 before a playoff and club record sellout home crowd of 31,523. The record stood for three days until the semi-final against the St. Louis Stars, who had defeated the defending champion Los Angeles Aztecs 2-1 on a penalty kick tie-breaker, with an additional 2,000 bleacher seats added, another record sellout crowd of 33,503 witnessed the Timbers 1-0

triumph.

TAMPA BAY ADDS INDOOR TITLE TO '75 OUTDOOR CHAMPIONSHIP

The Tampa Bay Rowdies captured the 1976 NASL indoor championship defeating Rochester 6-4 before a capacity crowd of 5,787 in the Bayfront Arena, St. Petersburg, Florida.

The Rowdies had advanced to the finals by defeating Dallas 6-2 while Rochester

advanced by eliminating the defending champion San Jose Earthquakes 6-4.

A highly successful series of indoor qualifying tournaments preceded the final tournament in St. Petersburg. Rochester came to the finals as a result of winning the Chicago tournament; Tampa Bay advanced by winning the qualifying tournament played at the same site as the finals; and San Jose and Dallas qualified as winner and wild card from the San Francisco tournament.

In the final tournament, Rochester's dark horse entry and goalkeeper Jim May captured the fancy of the Florida crowd on opening night against the defending champions. San Jose got off 65 shots against May but the Lancers' Portuguese connection — Pedro, Garcia, Silva — playing their first indoor soccer game and Tibor Molnar's two goals were too much for the champions.

Tampa Bay scored the final five goals of the other semi-final, two by Clyde Best

who was to be named MVP of the tournament, and came away with a 6-2 win.

The final was played by Rochester without the services of May whose knee injury sidelined him but didn't keep him from an all-tournament selection. Rochester led twice early in the game but fell behind 4-2 on Derek Smethurst's second goal of the game in the third period. Goals by Silva and Escos brought Rochester even late in the game but Smethurst's third goal gave the Rowdies the lead and Best completed his MVP performance with another in the last seconds.

Joining Best and May on the All-Tournament team were Tampa Bay's Stewart

Scullion and Smethurst, John Pedro of Rochester and Julie Veee of San Jose.

David Chadwick of Dallas, San Jose's Paul Child and Julie Veee led all indoor scorers for 1976 with 22 points each. Best was the leading scorer in the final tournament with 10 points.

Commissioner PHIL WOOSNAM

Phil Woosnam is beginning his seventh year as commissioner of the North American Soccer League. The former Welsh International player first came to the NASL as general manager-coach of the Atlanta Chiefs in 1967. In 1968 he was named NASL coach-of-the-year and he coached the United States World Cup team in 1969. In addition to representing Wales in over 35 international games, Woosnam played in England with West Ham United, Aston Villa, and Leyton Orient. He holds an honors degree in physics from the University of North Wales.

Under Woosnam's direction, the NASL has grown to be the third largest professional league in North America with 20 teams scattered from San Diego to Boston. He has seen soccer grow to the point where 58,000 fans attended a preseason game and attendance records are made to be broken. Woosnam's tenure has seen the NASL become the home for players such as Pele, George Best, Rodney Marsh, and Giorgio Chinaglia.

Executive Coordinator/Secretary to the Commissioner SONYA STRAHL

Sonya Strahl has been affiliated with the NASL since 1972. Born in Munich, Germany, where her father played professional soccer, she is an old fan and advocate of the sport. Her extensive and diversified prior business experience includes responsible administrative positions in the public relations, financial and legal fields. A graduate of Queensborough College, she majored in liberal arts.

Director of Administration and Information TED HOWARD

In his sixth year of service to the NASL office, Ted Howard brings a strong background of soccer to his position. While a student at Chico State, Howard played at defense on the college's soccer team. During his graduate work for a master's degree in Business Administration he served as assistant varsity coach to the Chico State team, the first ever champion in the NCAA College Soccer Division. A former member of the board of directors of the California Youth Soccer Association, Howard worked for the Oakland Clippers of the NASL in 1968.

Director of Officials EDDIE PEARSON

Eddie Pearson has been involved with the NASL since its beginning in 1967. An official with the English League, Pearson came to the United States in 1967 to serve as a referee. In 1968 he was named chief referee and the following year was appointed the NASL's director of officials. Pearson was honored in 1974 with appointment as referee coach for the CONCACAF region.

On December 27, 1973, John C. Sterge armed the Boston Soccer Revolution by purchasing an expansion franchise in the NASL. Then in a name-the-team contest the people of Boston, who started another rebellion 200 years ago, christened the revolutionary crew with an appropriate nickname, the BOSTON MINUTEMEN.

Coached by one of the top soccer minds in America, Hubert Vogelsinger, the MINUTEMEN started their first season with a great many questions about the NASL.

However, through good conditioning and excellent preparation, the Brigade found themselves wearing the Northern Division Crown and headed towards the league plavoffs.

playoffs.

Joe Jelinek hit a quick goal in the opening quarter-final match against the Baltimore Comets and then it was up to a strong defense anchored by Patty Greenwood to hold the opponents off. When the dust cleared after ninety minutes of hard fought soccer, the MINUTEMEN were on their way to Los Angeles and the semi-finals, where the eventual 1974 Champions, the Aztecs, dealt them a 2-0 defeat. The 1975 season found many new faces in the ranks of the MINUTEMEN and this was partly the cause of a slow start. Before long Ade Coker and Geof Davis were working together and scoring goals. June was the month that the great Eusebio joined the Brigade and brought with him Jorge Calado, a tall lanky defender, to aid Henning Boel and Alan Wooler in the defense. Between the defensive combination and the superb work of goalie Shep Messing, the MINUTEMEN allowed only nine goals in their last twelve matches. their last twelve matches.

The MINUTEMEN had successfully defended their crown and were only the second team in the history of the NASL to capture division titles back-to-back. In addition to the crown, Shep Messing had won the top goalkeeper honors with the lowest goals against average. Not even an opening round defeat in the playoffs in overtime to the Miami Toros could dim the accomplishments of the season;

In 1976 the MINUTEMEN look to be more than just another contender. First, Coach Vogelsinger would like to claim an unprecedented third consecutive Northern Division Title. Then, considering that 1976 is the Bicentennial Year, what would be more appropriate than to have the NASL Championship won by the team whose namesake started the revolution — The BOSTON MINUTEMEN.

After a near-miss run at the North American Soccer League playoffs in its first

season, the Chicago Sting is aiming for the top in 1976.

season, the Chicago Sting is aiming for the top in 1976.

The Sting missed a wild-card playoff berth by one point, losing out to Los Angeles when they lost the final game of the season on penalty kicks at Washington. In its inaugural campaign, the Sting under the leadership of former English playing great Bill Foulkes as head coach, was paced by the goal-scoring of little winger Gordon Hill, a North American Soccer League all-star.

Sting President Lee B. Stern has shuffled his management team for 1976, promoting former Public Relations Director Jim Walker to General Manager. Walker joins Foulkes and Vice-President George Fishwick, a member of the national Soccer Hall of Eage in running the club's daystroady business.

Hall of Fame, in running the club's day-to-day business.

Hill's emergence as an English superstar at first-division Manchester United has precluded his return to the Sting, but his attacking shoes will be filled by John Kowalik, the 19th-leading all-time NASL scorer. Kowalik set still-standing records when he scored 30 goals and 69 points for the old Chicago Mustangs in 1968. Since then, he has played in Holland, where he was leading scorer in 1973.

CLUB HISTORY

The Dallas Tornado, one of the original members of the North American Soccer League, will take on a new look this year. The Tornado has a new coach (Al Miller, the only American-bred coach ever to lead a team to the NASL title), a new playing site (newly-renovated Ownby Stadium on the campus at SMU) and new red, white and blue bicentennial colors.

The Tornado has been a part of pro soccer in North America since the beginning when Dallas was awarded one of the 12 original franchises in the United States Soccer Association (which merged in 1968 with the National Professional Soccer League to form the NASL). Since that time, the Dallas Tornado has become one of the foremost teams in the league. Dallas has the highest NASL victory total of any team in the league and holds the league record for most consecutive playoff


appearances — reaching the NASL playoffs every year between 1971 and 1974.
In Dallas's first season in 1967, the team was represented by Dundee United Football Club of Scotland. In 1968, the Tornado began to take shape by beginning its second season with a 45-game world tour that took the team to 19 countries.

Starting slowly, Dallas began to build a winner. Finally, in 1971, the hard work d off as the Tornado fought back after dropping the first games of the paid off as the Tornado fought back after dropping the first games of the best-out-of-three league playoff semi-finals and finals series to win the NASL Championship. The Tornado defeated Atlanta 4-1 and 2-0 for the championship.

Dallas reached the NASL playoffs again in 1972, 1973 and 1974. The Tornado lost to Philadelphia in the finals in 1973 and fell in the semi-finals in 1972 and 1974. Under Miller's leadership, the coming 1976 season looks like it will be an exciting one. Miller will blend such returning veteran all-NASL stars as Ken Cooper, Dick Hall, Roy Turner, Bobby Moffat and Kyle Rote, Jr., with team newcomers like John McLaughlin, Jim Ryan, Kevin Kewley and Tommy Tynan.


In addition to putting a winning product on the field, the Bi's are making a strong educational effort and have appointed a full-time Youth Coordinator to spread the

George Best, the flamboyant superstar of English soccer, leads the Los Angeles

Aztecs into their third North American Soccer League campaign in 1976.

Best, who gained a reputation for his great skills on the field with Manchester United as one of the premier players of all time, and received a name off the field for his controversial playboy lifestyle, was induced to come out of retirement by the Aztecs during the offseason.

The Aztecs also added the biggest name in entertainment during the past year to its ownership group as pop singing star Elton John invested in the club and has added

his own special brand of excitement to soccer in Southern California.

The club will once again play its home games at El Camino College in Torrance, and with the added input of Best and Elton John, expect to have its best season yet at the gate and be much improved on the field. Soccer's growth, along with that of the Aztecs, has been growing rapidly in the


Los Angeles area since the club's birth in 1974. In that maiden season the Aztecs captured the NASL title with an exciting 4-3 penalty kick-win over Miami in the Orange Bowl. Shortly after that the club was sold to a group of San Jose businessmen led by John Chaffetz, who moved the team headquarters to the South Bay section of L.A. and began playing home games at El Camino.

Chaffetz also hired an American coach, Terry Fisher — former UCLA mentor — and rebuilt the team with top English and American talent.

The Aztecs were a smash in '75 as attendance almost quadrupled to more than 8,000 per game and the team was among the best in the league by making it to the quarter-finals of the playoffs before losing to St. Louis, 2-1, in penalty kicks.

No wonder some pretend that inaugural season never really happened. But it did.

and the renamed Toros can look back now and smile on humble beginnings.

That second year crowds more than doubled in size, and the Toros forged the third-best record in a nine-team League. Striker Warren Archibald was the League's MVP.

Year three was even better. The Toros won 15 games, lost five and captured the 1974 Eastern Division crown. Miami trounced Dallas, 3-1, in the semi-finals and then lost a dizzying Championship game in overtime to Los Angeles.

Miami acquired an American coach, Dr. Greg Myers, after John Young resigned in

February 1975, following two successful seasons.

Myers led the Club into the playoffs for the 2nd consecutive season, despite a rash of crippling injuries which occurred after the fastest start in the Toros' history (10-2).

Forward Steve David became Miami's second NASL MVP in three seasons.

A re-alignment of front office responsibilities in '76 moves Elizabeth Robbie, wife of Miami Dolphins' Managing General Partner Joe Robbie, into a similar position

with the Toros.

John Young, NASL Coach-of-the-Year in 1974 while guiding the Toros to the Championship game, returns to Miami as Player Personnel Director after a year as Head Coach of the Denver Dynamos.

The Toros' other major move in '76 will be out of the massive Orange Bowl and

into the intimate, friendly confines of 10,000-seat Tamiami Stadium on the campus

of Florida International University.

The Toros have been involved in the NASL playoffs two consecutive seasons; feeling runs high in Miami that 1976 will be no different.


Keeping with the concept that an involved community will learn to love soccer, the directors of the club had their fans choose the team name. In a statewide contest

There can be no doubt that 1975 was the year of the Cosmos. Celebrating their fifth season in the North American Soccer League, the New York Cosmos did it in style.

The Cosmos brought immediate international attention upon themselves with the The Cosmos prought immediate international attention upon themselves with the spectacular signing of the world's greatest soccer player Pele. He put a sparkle in the eye of every 10-year-old would-be soccer player. Team attendance records were set wherever he played. With Pele's soccer had arrived in North America.

The arrival of Pele' in the United States unleashed an avalanche of radio, TV, and press coverage. He appeared at the White House, on the Tonight Show, and on the cover of Sports Illustrated, to name a few. Everywhere he went he was crowded for interview and photographs.

But Pele's impact extended beyond the grasp of the media. He knocked on soccer

But Pele's impact extended beyond the grasp of the media. He knocked on soccer youth's door and the youngster's welcomed him with open arms. Soccer balls emerged on thousands and thousands of teenagers and pre-teenagers feet. American youth became enchanted with the Pele magic.

Demonstrating the international impact of Pele', the Cosmos were immediately invited to play in the soccer hotbeds of the world. Fittingly enough, the Cosmos chose to make Sweden their first stop. Sweden was the site of Pele's first triumph in the World Cup as a 17-year-old prodigy.

Pele's homecoming in 1975 was no less spectacular. European press, TV, and radio greeted his arrival with youthful enthusiasm. Fans followed his every movement. In three games in Sweden, Pele accounted for 5 goals and one assist.

The echoes of Sweden reached Rome as well. 60,000 fans were in Olympic Stadium to greet Pele' and the Cosmos in their encounter with the Italian First Division Club Roma. Playing them even for the first 51 minutes, the Cosmos finally succumbed to the rugged Italians 3-1. Cosmos President Clive Toye called it "the most important game in our history."

Not bad for a team that had already won a NASL championship in 1972 and were

Not bad for a team that had already won a NASL championship in 1972 and were a constant figure in the playoffs. 1976 appears as promising. With one season under his belt, Pele proves to be even more effective in 1976. The Cosmos pose a serious threat to win the NASL championship.

CLUB HISTORY

1976 is the repirth of a soccer revolution in Philadelphia with the new Atoms. In mid-January the United Clubs of Jalisco, owners of four first division Mexican teams, purchased the three-year NASL franchise with the promise of keeping the club in the Cradle of Liberty.

After gaining the use of famed Franklin Field for its home schedule, the Mexican owners named Ed Tepper as the new Atoms President. While preseason workouts were being held in Guadalaira, Mexico, Tepper set the promotion wheels in gear by re-establishing the NASL in the Delaware Valley — a soccer hotbed.

In 1973 the Atoms became the first pro team in sports history to capture a championship in its initial season. The Atoms capped of the 9-2-8 season with a 2-0 title game win over the Tornado in Dallas.

Al Miller, the league's first American-born coach, won Coach of the Year honors in 1973 while defender Chris Dunleavy (Atom MVP) and forwards Jim Fryatt and

Andy Provan captured NASL All-Star honors.

The Atoms fell to 9-11 and 10-12 the past two seasons with an inability to score the main liability. In '75, local star Chris Bahr topped the team in scoring 24 scoring points, 11 goals and was named Rookie-of-the-Year while defender Bob Smith was selected to the all-league squad.

Three former Atoms will coach in the NASL this season: former coach Al Miller (Dallas) sweeper Derek Trevis (San Diego), and Manfred Schillscheidt (Hartford). Helping to develop American players in general and local talent, specifically, the Atoms organization has pledged their support to the soccer groups in the Philadelphia area. The first home game for the new Atoms — May 2 against Rochester — has been

designated Youth Soccer Day. Well-known local players Barry Barto, Juan Paletta, Tom Galati, Manny Matos, Bill Straub, and George O'Neill will join a group of international stars who have

worked together for a year to form the new Atoms of 1976.

Jesus Ponce, who has coached first division Mexican clubs for five years, has the assignment of returning the Soccer Bowl to the Atoms. The 46-year-old played professionally for a decade and has been coaching since 1961. The Atoms hope to have the services of Bahr, who is a sure bet to go high in the

NFL draft after a record setting college football career at Penn State.

Moving to Franklin Field, acknowledged as one of the best spectator stadiums in the country, will enable the new Atoms to reattract the record crowds of the early days of the franchise.

CLUB HISTORY

Portland — commonly called the City of Roses — gained a new nickname during the summer of 1975, "Soccer City U.S.A." In a few short months, Portland's expansionist roots took hold and built the Timbers into one of the winningest and biggest drawing teams in NASL history.

Victories helped, obviously, especially before the partisian Civic Stadium crowds. Over 159,000 fans saw the Timbers' 11 regular season home games and, as the club's 1976 home slate opens on May 1 against St. Louis, Portland will be aiming for its

13th consecutive victory at home.

Portland's 16-6 record tied expansion brother Tampa Bay as the best won-lost percentage in NASL history and the Timbers' 138 points was the highest total during the 1975 campaign. The Timbers also came within one game of the NASL record of eight straight victories and the team had a blazing 15-2 stretch during mid-season.

eight straight victories and the team had a blazing 15-2 stretch during mid-season. Winning means fans in Portland, a town which was hungry for a major league winner. The Timbers drew 27,000 and 23,000 for their final regular season home games against Seattle and San Jose. In the quarterfinals, a midweek return match with the Sounders pulled in 31,523, a playoff record. That figure went five days later when 33,503 jammed the Civic Stadium to watch St. Louis fall, 1-0, in a steady rain. Within the narrow confines of San Jose's Spartan Stadium, Tampa Bay effectively cut off Portland's wing play and Stewart Jump contained Portland striker Peter Withe as the Rowdies won Soccer Bowl '75, 2-0.

Coach Vic Crowe brings back a number of familiar faces for 1976 with defenders Mick Hoban and Ray Martin, winger Jimmy Kelly, midfielder Chris Dangerfield and forward-midfielder Tony Betts, hero of Portland's overtime defeat of Seattle in the playoffs.

Newcomers include striker Mike Ferguson, from English first division Coventry City, midfielder-defender Neil Rioch, from Plymouth Argyle and a former Toronto player in 1971, and midfielder Pat McMahon, a Scot who is another permanent member of the team.

Crowe style of play — a tough defense, controlled midfield play and the flyers from the wings to the striker — probably won't change too much in '76. And there are plenty of Portland fans (over 10,000 season tickets were sold) who hope the results won't change too much, too.



CLUB HISTORY

The newest franchise in the league - the San Diego JAWS - was born on October 14, 1975. On that day, the NASL approved the sale of the two-year-old Baltimore Comets to San Jose Earthquake owner Ken Keegan.

Keegan, a northern California businessman, started building the franchise immediately. He and new General Manager Paul Deese who started January 1 had

their work cut out.

Following an excellent rookie season in which it made the playoffs, Baltimore was plagued by problems last year. The Comets allowed more goals than any other team (52) and could only muster an average of 2,641 at the gate for home games last season.

Having renamed the club the JAWS, Keegan and Deese have worked feverishly to accomplish a virtual facelift in three months. Working with new Head Coach Derek Trevis — formerly with the Philadelphia Atoms — they will field a team comprised of less than 40% returning players. Ten new players from throughout the league will have been added to the roster by the season opener.


By February 15, they had established a game site (Aztec Bowl at San Diego State University), a practice site on the campus of United States International University,

CLUB HISTORY

A witness to the impact of the Seattle Sounders on the Pacific Northwest is that the Sounders will be playing in the new King County Domed Stadium this year. The reason? Sounders soccer has simply outgrown the already expanded 17,925 fan capacity at their original home Memorial Stadium. In 21 games over the first two years, 10 of them were sellouts at Memorial including the last four in 1975.

The 10 sellouts are a North American Soccer League record and Seattle holds the claim of the first NASL sellout on June 22, 1974 as 13,876 fans watched Seattle

defeat Philadelphia 2-0.

In the first year, the Sounders sold 1,500 season tickets. Last year, that total jumped to 7,477. In 1976, Seattle has a pre-season sale of over 11,000 season tickets. Head Coach John Best enters his third year at the helm and has compiled one of the best coaching records in the NASL. The Sounders have been consistent winners, 13-7 in 1974 and improved to 15-7 and a playoff spot in 1975. While reaching the playoffs in 1975, the Sounders set an NASL record by never being shutout during playoffs in 1975, the Sounders set all NASL record by flever being stituted during their entire league schedule, a feat never before achieved by any NASL team. The Sounders had the third best record in the NASL in 1975 but finished second in the Western Division to Portland, which had the league's best regular season record. The Sounders have been characterized by a solid defense and an explosive offense. Three key figures in that defense return, NASL All-Stars Mike England and David

Gillett and steady Adrian Webster.

On offense, the Sounders will show a new look with England World Cup star Geoff Hurst at striker, and former West Ham teammate Harry Redknapp on a wing. David Butler (15 goals in two seasons) is another proven scorer. Key players at midfield are U.S. National Team players Hank Liotart and David D'Errico.

The Sounders are aiming at Soccer Bowl '76 which will be held in the Sounders new home, the 65,000-seat Kingdome.

CLUB HISTORY

In the nine-year history of the North American Soccer League, no club has won the league title twice, let alone twice in succession.

The Tampa Bay Rowdies know keeping the title they won in '75 won't be easy, but they also rest easy in the knowledge it may be harder for the 19 other clubs in the NASL to prevent them from becoming the first ever "double" champion.

The Tampa Bay Rowdies raced to the 1975 title with an overall record of 19-6, the third straight expansion club to win the league, following in the footsteps of Philadelphia (1973) and Los Angeles (1974).

Eddie Firmani, the man chosen by owners George Strawbridge and Beau Rogers to lead their bunch of Rowdies, will have the bulk of his forward line — good for 52 goals in 1975 — back. That group includes Stewart Scullion (eight goals, seven assists), burly Clyde Best (playoff MVP; eight goals, six assists) and '75 leading scorer Derek Smethurst (19 goals, four assists). All three are full-time Rowdies now.

Add to them superstar Rodney Marsh, the English sensation Rogers pursued for over four months before signing the colorful, exciting, personality to a contract.

Call these four "Murderer's Row" — then ask goal keepers why.

When, and if these frontrunners break down, there will always be a fluid midfield to back them up. It will include quick, 20-year-old full-time Rowdie, Mark Lindsay, and rock-hard Tommy Smith, a "loan" acquisition from English League Division One power Liverpool.

The Rowdies boasted the stingiest defense in the NASL (tied with Portland) in 1975, allowing a paltry 27 goals. That includes First Team All NASL choice Farrukh Quraishi, sweeper Alex Pringle, Haitian World Cupper Arsene "Augie" Auguste (who scored the first, and eventual winning goal, in the 2-0 win over Portland in the NASL Final) and Malcolm Linton, a steady, solid, left-sided defender.


The nets will be ably manned by big (6'3") and young (22) Arnold Mausser, an off-season acquisition from Hartford. The Brooklyn native, a U.S. National Team Choice, looms as one of the League's best already.

Reserve strength is a-plenty. U.S. National Team strikers Joe Fink (purchased from the New York Cosmos) and Doug Wark should see considerable action in '76. In midfield, Randy Garber, another U.S. National Team choice, could start a lot of games. Eddie Austin, with a full season of experience under his belt, will keep his American rivals on their toes, So will John Bluem, last year's third round draft choice out of Hartwick College. out of Hartwick College.

Indeed, the champions are "going for the double" and the 12,000 plus who watched them at every Tampa Stadium home game in '75 are sure to multiply as the Rowdies go for it.

CLUB HISTORY

The Toronto entry in the North American Soccer League, known then as the Metros, entered the professional circuit in 1971 leading the League in attendance, a feat the Club repeated in 1972. However, the Metros missed the playoff picture in both seasons.

Things on the playing pitch got much better in 1973 when the Metros reached the playoffs for the first time with some very healthy statistics: second in the League in the scoring column and first in the goal against column. The season ended with a

playoff loss to Philadelphia.

In 1974 the Metros again failed in their guest for a playoff berth and things were not much brighter at the box office, in fact for a time the Toronto franchise appeared doomed. It was rumored that for 1975 the Metros would move to Cincinnati or Cleveland.

But luckily for Toronto soccer fans, the directors of the Club saved the situation by entering into a financial agreement with a very successful local Club, Toronto Croatia, which for years had been one of the prominent teams in the National Soccer League, based at Toronto. The team name chosen was Toronto Metros-Croatia, symbolizing a vital soccer partnership.

A much healthier team was prepared for the 1975 season under the care of new coach Ivan Markovic, who came from Europe bringing with him outstanding stars as

Marian Bradvic and Ivan Lukacevic.

From Italy came two big players, Roberto Vieri and Marino Perani. At the box office and on the field the situation brightened considerably and for the second time the Metros-Croatia made the playoffs, only to lose to Tampa Bay in a heartbreaker. For 1976 the Club appears even more solid than it was last season.




The 34-year-old Krautzun has an impressive string of international coaching credits since his retirement from playing for IFC Kaiserslautern of the German

CLUB HISTORY

1975 TIE-BREAKER PROCEDURE

NASL games which are tied at the end of regulation play will be extended by 15-minutes of "sudden death" overtime (two 7½ minute periods). A flip of the coin will decide which team will kick off. The first team to score a goal, either from the field or by penalty kick, shall be the winner. If no score occurs in the first period, play shall be halted by the referee. The teams will change ends of the field. Play will be restarted with a kickoff by the team opposite that which started the overtime period.

If the game remains tied at the end of the second period, the outcome will be decided by kicks from the penalty spot. The visiting team will kick first. Each team shall take five penalty kicks in alternating order. When these have been completed, the team which has scored on the most penalty kicks shall be declared the winner. (The kicks shall be ended when one team has achieved an insurmountable advantage, such as scoring on its first three kicks while their opponents miss their first three).

If the teams remain tied after the prescribed five penalty kicks, they shall continue to take alternate penalty kicks until one has scored more than the other after an equal number of attempts. Only players in the game at the end of the overtime period, or players injured during the regular game or overtime period and not replaced, shall be eligible to take such penalty kicks. No player may take a second penalty kick until all other eligible members of his team have done so at which time they shall continue in the original rotation.



CONDENSED RULES OF SOCCER



- RULE 1 The Field of Play (Diagram above)
- RULE 2 The Ball (NASL approved ball Adidas) circumference 27" 28", weight 14 oz. 16 oz.
- RULE 3 Number of Players. Each team consists of 11 players, one of whom must be the goalkeeper. A maximum of three substitutes may be used.
- RULE 4 Player Equipment. Consists of a shirt, shorts, stockings and shoes. Goalkeeper must wear colors which distinguish him from the other players.
- RULE 5 Referees. One referee is appointed for each match. He is responsible for control of the game and his decisions are final.
- RULE 6 Linesmen. Two linesmen assist the referee by indicating offside, when the ball is out of play, and which team is entitled to the corner kick or throw in.
- RULE 7 Duration of the Game. Shall be two equal periods of 45 minutes unless otherwise agreed upon.
- RULE 8 The Start of Play. A flip of coin decides which team will kick off. Each team must stay on its own half of the field and the defending players must be at least 10 yards from the ball until it is kicked.
 - After a goal the team scored upon will kick off. After halftime the teams change ends and the kickoff will be taken by the opposite team to that which started the game. A goal cannot be scored directly from a kickoff.
- RULE 9 Ball In and Out of Play. The ball is out of play when (a) it has wholly crossed the goal line or touchline, whether on the ground or in the air, or (b) when the game has been stopped by the referee.
- RULE 10 Method of Scoring. A goal is scored when the whole of the ball has passed over the goal line, between the goal posts and under the cross bar.

CONDENSED RULES OF SOCCER (cont'd)

RULE 11 — Offside. A player is offside if he is nearer his opponents' goal line than the ball at the moment the ball is played unless, (a) he is in his own half of the field of play, (b) there are two of his opponents nearer to their own goal line than he is, (c) the ball last touched an opponent or was last played by him or (d) he receives the ball direct from a goal kick, a corner kick, a throw in, or when it was dropped by the referee.

Note: This is the Traditional Rule. In 1973 the NASL introduced a "Blue Line" Concept with a line drawn the width of the field 30 yards from each goal (see diagram). Under it, an attacking player is not offside until he is within 35 yards of his opponents' goal rather than midfield, as under the traditional rule.

RULE 12 — Fouls and Misconduct. A player who intentionally attempts to or actually: (1) kicks, (2) trips, (3) jumps at, (4) charges violently, (5) charges from behind, (6) strikes, (7) holds or (8) pushes an opponent, or (9) intentionally handles the ball shall be penalized by a direct free kick. Any one of these nine offenses committed in the penalty area by a defender will result in a penalty kick to the offensive team.

A player committing less flagrant violations such as offside, dangerous plays, obstruction or ungentlemanly conduct will be penalized by an indirect free kick.

RULE 13 — Free Kicks. Are classified into two categories: "Direct" (from which a goal can be scored directly against the offending side) and "Indirect" (from which a goal cannot be scored unless the ball has been touched by a player other than the kicker before entering the goal).

For all free kicks the offending team must be at least 10 yards from the ball until it is kicked.

- RULE 14 Penalty Kick. A direct free kick taken at the penalty mark. All players except the player taking the kick and the goalkeeper must stay outside the penalty area and at least ten yards from the ball (hence the arc at edge of penalty area).
- RULE 15 Throw In. When the ball has wholly crossed the touchline it is put back into play by a throw in from the spot where it went out and by a player from the opposite team that last touched it. A goal cannot be scored directly from a throw in.
- RULE 16 Goal Kick. When the ball has wholly crossed the goal line after being last touched by a player from the attacking team, it is put back into play by a kick from the goal area by the defending team.
- RULE 17 Corner Kick. When the ball has wholly crossed the goal line after being last touched by a player from the defending team, it is put back into play by a kick from the corner on the side the ball went out by the attacking team.

GLOSSARY OF SOCCER TERMS

CENTER - to pass the ball from a wide position on the field into the penalty area.

CHARGE — pushing the opponent off balance legally by shoulder to shoulder contact.

 ${\sf CLEAR}-{\sf a}$ throw or kick by the goalkeeper or a kick by the defender in an attempt to get the ball away from the goal area.

CROSS — same type of pass as center.

DEFENDER — primarily a defensive player who assists the goalkeeper in protecting the goal.

 $\mathsf{DRIBBLE}-\mathsf{a}$ way of advancing the ball past defenders by a series of short taps with one or both feet.

FORWARD — primarily an attacking player whose responsibility is to create and score goals.

GOALKEEPER – the last line of defense. The only player who can use his hands within the field of play. He is limited to using his hands only within the penalty area.

HALF-VOLLEY — kicking the ball just as it is rebounding off the ground.

HANDS - illegal act of intentionally touching the ball with the hands or arms.

 ${\sf HEADING}$ — a method of scoring, passing and controlling the ball by making contact with the head.

LINKMAN — another name for midfielder.

 ${\sf LOB}-{\sf a}$ high, soft kick taken on the volley, lifting the ball over the heads of the opponents.

MARKING - guarding an opponent.

<code>MIDFIELDER</code> - is both an offensive and defensive player who is primarily responsible for linking the forwards and defenders.

OBSTRUCTING — preventing the opponent from going around a player by standing in his path.

 ${\sf OVERLAP}$ — the attacking play of a defender going down the touchline past his own winger.

PITCH - another name for the field of play.

 ${\sf SAVE}-$ the goalkeeper stopping an attempted goal by catching or deflecting the ball away from the goal.

 ${\sf SCREEN}$ — retaining possession and protecting the ball by keeping your body between the ball and opponent.

SLIDING TACKLE - attempting to take the ball away from the opponent by sliding on the ground.

GLOSSARY OF SOCCER TERMS (cont'd)

 ${\sf STRIKER}-{\sf a}$ central forward position in the team with a major responsibility for scoring goals.

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{SWEPER}}\xspace - \ensuremath{\mathsf{a}}\xspace$ defender who roams either in front of or behind the defender line to pick up stray passes.

TACKLING — attempting or taking the ball away from an opponent when both players are playing the ball with their feet.

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{TRAP}}-\ensuremath{\mathsf{controlling}}$ a ball passed close to the player by means of the feet, thighs or chest.

VOLLEY - kicking the ball while it is in flight.

WALL PASS — a pass to a teammate followed by a first time return pass on the other side of the opponent (give and go).

WING - an area of the field near the touchline.

WINGER - name given to the right and left outside forwards.

 $4\hbox{-}3\hbox{-}3$ — the player formation most used today (a goalkeeper, four defenders, three midfielders, three forwards).

4-2-4 — most used alternative formation to the 4-3-3 (a goalkeeper, four defenders, two midfielders and four forwards).

NASL HISTORY (Cont'd)

Tampa Bay defeated Toronto 1-0 in the quarter-finals before hosting arch rival Miami, who had defeated Boston in overtime 2-1, in the semi-finals. A club record crowd of 22,710 looked on as the Rowdies convincingly defeated the Toros 3-0.

The arrival of Pele brought the League national and world exposure. His debut was witnessed by a near capacity crowd of 21,278 at Downing Stadium, a national television audience and was beamed live to countries throughout the world. In the 15 games in which he played 10 attracted new club record crowds and six were sellouts including an all-time League record crowd of 35,620 at RFK Stadium in Washington D.C. on June 20.

Other League attendance marks fell as a record of 1,695,651 spectators witnessed regular season play led by San Jose's record average of 17,927, Seattle's 16,830 and Portland's 12,166.

With the increased interest in the League, CBS-TV Sports expanded its coverage of the NASL to five games, three outdoor and two indoor.

In the winter of 1975 the League experienced two franchise transfers, Denver to Minneapolis and Baltimore to San Diego.
