

### FROM THE COMMISSIONER

I'm pleased to be able to present the enclosed information about the North American Soccer League to the members of the news media who follow and report on our League. This is a very significant year for the NASL. We hope the data in this Media Guide will be helpful in your coverage of it.

The NASL has grown to the point where our 20 teams now make it the third largest major league on the continent. Five new cities have joined for this 1975 championship season — Chicago, Hartford, Portland, San Antonio, and Tampa. Since the end of the 1973 season, the League has expanded from 9 to 20 cities in the United States and Canada. They dot the continent from Toronto to Los Angeles, Vancouver to Miami and represent most of its major centers of population, commerce, and sports enthusiasm.

It's easy to be enthusiastic about soccer. The game is played in 143 nations and enjoys enormous spectator and participant popularity. Soccer has the ingredients to appeal to all — excitement, continuous action, skill, stamina, courage. The sport is captivating youngsters, both boys and girls, who relish a game where size isn't a primary factor, but fun is. It's attracting parents who enjoy seeing their children participate in a low-risk, high-conditioning sport. And it's appealing to adults and young people who like seeing the pros perform and rooting for their team.

This surge in popularity was reflected in new NASL attendance records last season. A single game mark of 24,093 was set in Philadelphia. Two expansion teams, San Jose and Seattle, had several sellouts. Average attendance increased 23% over the previous year. Season ticket sales for this year were up 181% over 1974.

Fans of NASL expansion teams have had much to cheer about on the field, too. Unlike other sports, many new teams have met with "instant" success. The last two NASL championships have been won by first year teams, the Philadelphia Atoms and Los Angeles Aztecs. In addition, three other new teams, Baltimore, Boston and San Jose, earned playoff positions last summer. A 1975 expansion team, Tampa Bay, has continued the success pattern by qualifying for the first NASL Indoor Championship playoffs.

The creation of top flight indoor competition among NASL teams adds a new dimension to the League and the game in North America. Both in the arenas and via CBS-TV's national telecasts, fans found NASL indoor soccer a very exciting sports spectacle. It provides the opportunity to follow their teams virtually year 'round. It also enables players to hone their skills and further their development.

This additional opportunity to play will help in the twin missions on which the United States and Canada are embarked: advancing to positions among the soccer powers through World Cup success. Most of the outstanding players selected to represent our two nations on the American and Canadian World Cup teams play in the North American Soccer League. I'm confident our pattern of success will continue on these missions, too, in the long run.

### NASL HISTORY

In five years, the North American Soccer League [NASL] has grown from five teams to 20 and is the third largest professional sports league in North America.

Despite a partial collapse after its first season, 1968, the NASL was kept alive and has built its foundation on five of the 17 franchises that operated that year. The five franchises were Atlanta, Baltimore, Dallas, Kansas City and St. Louis. Two of those charter five, Dallas and St. Louis, are still members of the League today which has grown to the present 20 franchises in the United States and Canada playing in four divisions with further expansion on the horizon: Baltimore, Boston, Chicago, Dallas, Denver, Hartford, Los Angeles, Miami, New York, Philadelphia, Portland, Rochester, St. Louis, San Antonio, San Jose, Seattle, Tampa, Toronto, Vancouver, Washington.

In 1967 there were two competing leagues, the United States Association [USA] which imported entire foreign teams to represent the 12 franchises for the initial season, and the National Professional Soccer League [NPSL], consisting of ten teams which recruited domestic and foreign talent. The Los Angeles Wolves, represented by Wolverhampton Wanderers of England, won the U.S.A. Championship with an incredible 6-5 overtime victory over the Washington Whips, represented by Aberdeen of Scotland. The Oakland Clippers captured the NPSL crown with a two-game, total-goals 4-2 victory over the Baltimore Bays, losing 1-0 in Baltimore before winning 4-1 in Oakland.

In 1968 the two leagues merged to form the North American Soccer League with 17 teams. The Atlanta Chiefs captured the first NASL title with a 3-0 victory over the San Diego Toros after the two teams had played to a 0-0 tie in San Diego in the

first game.

The Kansas City Spurs won the reduced League crown in 1969 by a one point

margin in the standings over the Atlanta Chiefs. No playoffs were held.

The Washington Darts and Rochester Lancers joined the League in 1970 and both won their division titles and met to decide the League crown. The Lancers won the first game 3-0 and held on to win the championship with a 4-3 two-game aggregate, as Washington defeated them 3-1 in the second game. The NASL consisted of six teams

in 1970, since Baltimore dropped out.

The League grew to eight teams in 1971 with expansion to Montreal, New York and Toronto and the loss of Kansas City. The Washington Darts franchise moved to Miami. In that year, the Dallas Tornado, a perennial cellar dweller became the NASL's first Cinderella team. The Tornado finished second in the Southern division behind Atlanta but then proceeded to eliminate defending champion Rochester in semi-finals in a best two-out-of-three game series, which included two record marathon games. In the championship series, the Tornado defeated Atlanta in the last two games of the best of three game series after losing the opener. Atlanta had defeated New York in their semi-final round.

The 1972 season saw the second year New York Cosmos capture the NASL crown with a climatic 2-1 victory over the stubborn St. Louis Stars, after having eliminated Dallas 1-0 in the semi-finals. St. Louis had defeated Rochester 2-0 to reach their

first-ever final. There were no membership changes in 1972.

The NASL added a ninth franchise in 1973, the Philadelphia Atoms. The Atoms promptly became the first expansion team in the history of major professional sports in North America to capture a national title in their inaugural season. They accomplished the feat with a 2-0 victory over Dallas before a record crowd of 18,824 in Dallas. The Atoms reached the final with a 3-0 victory over Toronto, while Dallas was defeating New York 1-0 in the other semi-final.

### Commissioner PHIL WOOSNAM

Phil Woosnam has been associated with the NASL since 1967 when he joined the Atlanta Chiefs as general manager and coach. In 1968, he was elected NASL Coach of the Year after leading Atlanta to the championship, and was appointed coach of the United States World Cup Team. The following year Woosnam was named to head the League. Prior to joining the NASL, he was an outstanding player for England's West Ham United, Aston Villa and Leyton Orient. He represented his native Wales in more than 35 international games. Commissioner Woosnam was graduated with an Honors Degree in Physics from the University of North Wales.

He holds a B.S. in Journalism from the University of Missouri.

### SAN JOSE EARTHQUAKES WIN NASL INDOOR CHAMPIONSHIP

The San Jose Earthquakes are the North American Soccer League's first indoor champions.

The rugged Quakes shook the title from the Tampa Bay Rowdies 8-5 before a highly enthusiastic crowd of 8,618 in San Francisco's Cow Palace Sunday afternoon, March 16. Millions more viewed highlights of the action packed six-a-side battle on CBS-TV.

The championship tilt between San Jose and the new Tampa Bay franchise culminated the NASL's series of four regional indoor tournaments which began in January. Played on artificial turf, the arenas' hockey playing areas were completely utilized, including the dasherboards.

"Playing the boards" became a new skill for many players and added a dimension of excitement for fans.

Best at it were veteran World Cup coach Ivan Toplak's Earthquakes. Training for the indoor season since last fall, they earned their way into the championship game with a hard-fought 8-5 semifinal win over the Dallas Tornado. Tampa Bay blew out the injury-decimated New York Cosmos 13-5 in the opener of the Cow Palace semifinal doubleheader enjoyed by 9,118.

But it was a different ballgame for the young Rowdies of Coach Eddie Firmani in

the final rumble with the Quakes.

San Jose's brilliant front line of Paul Child, Archie Roboostoff and Art Welch rocked Tampa Bay with an opening offensive tremor which didn't cease until the

Californians had taken a 6-1 lead by the end of the first period.

At the same time the Rowdies offense, for which Doug Wark had powered an NASL indoor record six goals against New York, was being shut down by San Jose. The 35-year-old Gabbo Gavric spearheaded the Quakes contingent which blunted most Rowdies thrusts. Playing tough defense with him were the diminutive duo of 5' 3" Manny Hernandez and 5' 5" Johnny Moore and the Demling brothers, Buzz and Mark.

Behind their swarming red jerseys, San Jose's towering goalkeeper, 6' 4" Mike Ivanow, picked off, or deflected, shots with outstanding positioning and cat-quick reflexes.

Tampa Bay battled back gamely to close the gap to 6-3 at the end of the second 20-minute period. But Child and company early in the third and final stanza put it out of reach. Bernard "Dancing Shoes" Hartze and the NASL's number one 1975 draft pick, Farrukh Quraishi, sparked the Rowdies rally. The Floridians were the third new expansion team in as many years to reach an NASL championship final.

Child and Gavric were elected by the news media as co-winners of the English

Leather Trophy for the Most Valuable Player.

They also were unanimous media choices for the All-Tournament team. Selected with them were Dallas Goalkeeper Ken Cooper and his Tornado teammates Ilija Mitic and Mike Renshaw, and Tampa Bay's Doug Wark.

### 1975 LEAGUE STANDING POINTS

Each winning team will be awarded six points toward its NASL season standings, whether victory occurs in regulation or overtime play. No points will be granted for a loss. Winners and losers will receive one bonus point for each goal scored in regulation or overtime play up to a maximum of three bonus points per team per game.

EXAMPLE: If Los Angeles would defeat an opponent 4-2, the Los Angeles team would receive six points for the victory and three bonus points for each goal scored up to three — a total of nine points in the standings. The losing opponent team would only receive two points, one for each goal scored.

### 1975 PLAYOFFS FORMAT

The NASL Championship Playoffs will begin the week of August 10th. The eight qualifiers for the quarter final round will be the four divisional champions plus the two teams with the highest total points among the eight remaining Eastern and Northern teams, and the two teams with the highest total points among the eight other Central and Western teams.

### SOCCER BOWL - 75

The championship final, Soccer Bowl - 75, will be played Sunday, August 24. It will be televised nationally, live and in color, by CBS-TV.

### **CLUB HISTORY**

The Baltimore Comets entered their initial season of professional competition in 1974 featuring native Baltimorean talent, young American college draftees, and European players.

Despite predictions of a lowly finish in the Eastern Division of the NASL, generally considered the toughest since it included the reigning champion Philadelphia Atoms, the Comets fought their way into the post-season playoffs.

Although losing 1 to 0 at Boston in a game that could have gone either way, the Comets were considered to be one of the most attractive attacking teams in the NASL. The only time the eventual champions, the Los Angeles Aztecs, faced the Comets the Aztecs were defeated proving that the Comets were as strong as any team in the League.

The Comets were honored with the placement of two players on the NASL All-Star team. Striker Peter Silvester was selected as the League's Most Valuable Player, and defender Geoff Butler was also named to the All-Star squad. In addition, Keith Aqui was runnerup as Rookie of the Year.

Rookies Paul Scurti and Dennis Wit, local products of Baltimore, were honored by selection to the U.S. National Team and U.S. Olympic Team respectively.

Protecting the nets for the 1974 Baltimore Comets was one of the finest goalkeeper tandems in the NASL, Lincoln Phillips, and Alan Mayer, an All-American rookie sensation from Madison College. Since last season, Mayer has had an immensely beneficial and successful stint performing for the Southend United Reserve team in England.

With the experience gained in 1974 and the chance to strengthen the weaker areas of the team, Coach Doug Millward considers his 1975 squad 50% better on the field

with a 300% stronger bench.

The 1974 season saw the Comets play before 211,800 fans in a total of 21 home and away matches, an average attendance of over 10,000. In addition, increasing attendance near the close of the season at home is an indication of future positive developments for professional soccer in Baltimore.

Doug Millward feels that with only a slight improvement in the Comets away

record and a repeat of their outstanding performance at Memorial Stadium, the team

will go "all the way" in 1975.

### **CLUB HISTORY**

On December 27, 1973, John C. Sterge armed the "Boston Soccer Revolution" by purchasing an expansion franchise in the NASL. Then, in a "name-the-team" contest, the people of Boston, who started another rebellion 200 years ago, christened the revolutionary crew with an appropriate nickname, the Boston Minutemen.

An opening win started the march through the summer on the right foot. In the long hot months, the Minutemen battled 20 times and by the end of August, their 11-9 record was good enough to claim the Northern Division title and a playoff spot.

A quick goal and stout defense downed the Baltimore Comets 1-0 in the opening round. It was off to the West Coast for the semi-finals. There the Minutemen met their match as the eventual champion Los Angeles Aztecs were on the title trail themselves, and with a 2-0 Boston loss, the season was over.

However, the Revolution has not stopped there!

This season brings new hope to the Boston Minutemen. In March, Coach Hubert Vogelsinger traveled overseas to sound the Minutemen "call to arms" for 1975. While in London, he signed Ade Coker who will be depended on to help supply the "direct hits" on the enemy's goal. The crowd-pleaser led the team in goals scored last year.

A healthy Henning Boel will return to the Minutemen lineup as a defender. Boel's determination to shake an injury has been rewarded as he earned the rank of captain and will lead the troops in battle during the '75 season.

Harvard University contributes to the Revolution by providing the last man on

Harvard University contributes to the Revolution by providing the last man on defense for the Boston Club. Crimson alumnus Shep Messing was acquired from the New York Cosmos last winter and will be trying to nail down the goalkeeper post.

The Boston Minutemen will play their home games at Boston University's Nickerson Field. In the spirit and determination of the Minutemen of olde, it's "on with the revolution!"

### **CLUB HISTORY**

The Sting was born October 31, 1974, when the North American Soccer League The Sting was born October 31, 19/4, when the North American Soccer League officially granted a Chicago franchise to commodities broker Lee B. Stern, president of L. B. Stern & Co., Ltd. and former director of the Chicago Board of Trade. Chicago became the 18th franchise in the NASL, which later added Portland and Hartford to round out its four division, 20-team League.

The name "Chicago Sting" emerged from a Stern family discussion. While it was inspired by the movie of the same name starring Robert Redford and Paul Newman, the trade is the Thing's became

the team logo is an angry bee guarding a soccer ball. "The Sting is the Thing" became the new team's battle cry and Stern vowed that heavy emphasis would be placed on

recruiting Chicago players.

The first appointment by Stern was George Fishwick to the post of vice president and director of soccer administration. Fishwick has been a strong voice in soccer for more than 40 years and in 1974 was elected to the United States Soccer Hall

Stern next tapped Mike Pyle, former Chicago Bears captain and nine-year professional football veteran, as executive vice president and general manager. The playing roster was started with the signing of four players, Rudy Getzinger, Wally Obreski, Ian Stone and Richard Green, all star performers in Chicago's National

Soccer League.

In the NASL college player draft January 15, the Sting acquired Mickey Rooney and Brad Steurer from Keene State (New Hampshire) and Tom Kazambe from Wooster of Ohio.

In preparation for their first season, The Sting travelled to England on a pre-season tour in March and returned home with an unplemished record of two victories over Stockport County 2-1 and Wycombe Wanderers 4-1 and tie with Southport 1-1.

### **CLUB HISTORY**

The Dallas Tornado, one of the original members of the North American Soccer League, has learned to enjoy a winning tradition under the leadership of Head Coach Ron Newman.

Newman took over the coaching position in 1968 of a team which had failed to win in its first 21 games. However, three years later, 1971, the Dallas Tornado ended the season as the North American Soccer League champions.

In 1972, the Tornado finished second in what was then known as the NASL

Southern Division with a record of 6-5-3.

In 1973, Dallas led the League with 111 points and posted their best record ever winning 11 games losing four and tying four. They battled their way to the NASL championship game with a 1-0 semifinal victory over the New York Cosmos before bowing to the Philadelphia Atoms 2-0 in front of an NASL record playoff crowd of 18,824 in Texas Stadium. It was a remarkable year for the Tornado's Kyle Rote, Jr. who was selected Rookle of the Year after capturing the NASL scoring crown.

In 1974, the Tornado played 14 games without defeat in regulation time, and

reached the playoffs for the fourth consecutive year — both are League records.

The upcoming 1975 season holds even more promise with the return of striker Rick Reynolds, who complemented Kyle Rote, Jr. so well in 1973, Albert Jackson,

David Chadwick, Tommy Gore and George Ley. In addition the Tornado has added South African midfielder Walter Rautmann. Coach Newman is also expecting strong showings from U.S. Olympic Team standouts Neil Cohen and Freddie Garcia.

### **CLUB HISTORY**

### CLUB HISTORY

Hartford lived up to it's name as the "Insurance City" by the manner in which it acquired a franchise in the NASL. On January 14, 1975, when Henry Nozko, chairman of the Greater Hartford Chamber of Commerce's Sports and Recreation

Committee, announced that Hartford had become the 19th NASL franchise, he did so with the assurance that the Hartford team would be comprised of an impressive nucleus of veteran professionals on the field and in the front office.

The Hartford Bicentennials are headed by President Paul G. Sanderson, headmaster of Suffield Academy, who has been associated with soccer in the Connecticut River Valley for over 20 years. His first appointment was Mike Bosson as the Bicentennials' general manager. Bosson was general manager last season of the American Soccer League champion Rhode Island Oceaneers, Sanderson also brought to the Hartford Bicentennials the Oceaneers' head coach, Manfred Schellscheidt, who served as assistant coach of the United States National Team in European competition this spring. Schellscheidt was also assistant coach of the NASL champion Philadelphia Atoms in 1973.

Charlie McCully, who was the MVP in the United States National Team's thrilling 1-0 victory over Poland in 1973, will play alongside of his brother Henry in the Bicentennials' starting lineup. Tending goal for Hartford will be Arnold Mausser, considered one of the best young keepers in the nation.

All-American Kevin Welsh from the University of Bridgeport was the team's first draft choice and will play forward for the new club. A member of the U.S. Olympic Team, Welsh will be joined by Olympic teammate George Chapla on the Bicentennials' roster. Also under contract are Francisek Smuda and Miroslaw Chodakowki, the former a sweeper back who has played for the Polish National Team and the latter a forward who should add strength to the team's scoring punch. The Bicentennials began NASL competition in the Northern Regional Indoor Tournament in February. "We fell just six seconds short of gaining a berth in the indoor soccer finals," Schellscheidt said. "I'm sure that, after our training tour in Jamaica and Curaco we will enter the regular season with a Bicentennial team that will have been worth waiting 200 years for."

### CLUB HISTORY

It will be the "new look" Los Angeles Aztecs in 1975.
The defending North American Soccer League champions are under new ownership, guided by a new coach with plenty of new players.

After defeating Miami, 4-3 in the championship final, owner Dr. Jack Gregory sold his interest in the club to a group headed by John Chaffetz, now the Aztecs' managing general partner.

Chaffetz promptly hired a new coach, 25-year-old Terry Fisher who had a highly

successful two seasons at UCLA.

The new owner moved the team's home games from East Los Angeles College to El Camino (12,000-seating capacity) and then made the biggest trade in the NASL's nine-year history.

Seven Aztec regulars, Luis Marotte, Pedro Martinez, Renato Costa, Julio Cesar Cortez, Ricardo DeRienzo, Mario Zanotti and Blas Sanchez, were traded to the new expansion San Antonio Thunder for their 1975 college draft first round choice, Sergio Velazquez, and their first round draft selections for 1976 and 1977.

Velazquez, a two-time All-American at UCLA, scored 56 goals in his sophomore

and junior seasons.

Other newcomers include Hungarian striker Julie Veee, two other ex-UCLA performers Firooz Fowzi and Fishaa. In addition L.A. has picked up five outstanding English players including goalkeeper John Taylor from Birmingham City.

However, Fisher also has plenty of returnees from the championship club like 1974 NASL Rookie of the Year Doug McMillan, Ramon Moraldo, Tony Douglas, Jerry Kazarian and Jose Lopez.

McMillan led Los Angeles in scoring during its initial season with 30 points on 10

goals and 10 assists.

Both McMillan and Kazarian are coming off injuries. McMillan underwent successful knee surgery during the off-season, while Kazarian missed all but the first six games of last year with a pulled hamstring.

### **CLUB HISTORY**

Rain fell in bucketsfull for 24 straight hours on opening day in 1972. Nobody could fathom the team nickname — the Gatos. The team won only two games and the crowds reflected the dismal record.

No wonder some pretend that inaugural season never really happened. But it did, and the renamed Miami Toros can look back now, and smile on humble beginnings. From that precarious toehold the Toros have grown by annual quantum leaps.

The first owner, John Bilotta, sold the team to a solid and influential Florida-based ownership including general partners Angel Lorie, James Billings, Harper Sibley and Elizabeth (Mrs. Joe) Robbie.

That second year the Toros moved into the Orange Bowl to stay. Crowds more than doubled in size and the Toros forged the third-best record in a nine-team League. Striker Warren Archibald was the League's MVP.

Year Three was even better. The Toros won 15 games, lost five and captured the 1974 Eastern Division crown. Miami trounced Dallas, 3-1, in the semifinals and then lost a dizzying championship game in overtime to Los Angeles on CBS television.

The Toros have drawn 18,290 for a regular season game (1974), and the legendary Pele attracted 22,474 fans to the Orange Bowl in 1973. The attendance figures are rising in concert with a by-now typical American boom in soccer at the youth and school levels.

Miami acquired an American coach, Dr. Greg Myers, after John Young resigned in February 1975 following two successful seasons. Myers also coordinated a development program that has brought Toros players into direct contact with more than 150,000 South Florida residents — one of the more ambitious community efforts in U.S. pro sports history.

### **CLUB HISTORY**

Since arriving on the NASL scene in 1971, the New York Cosmos have enjoyed continued League successes. They were in the League playoffs every year but last year. In 1972 they won the whole bundle by knocking off the St. Louis Stars.

That first season was a rough one. General Manager Clive Toye and Coach Gordon Bradley had barely three months to produce a professional soccer team. Bradley pulled up his pants legs and waded into the German-American League he was so familiar with and pulled out players like Barry Mahy and Jorge Siega. The strategy worked as the Cosmos made the playoffs in their initial attempt.

1972 was the "Year of the Cosmos." They moved their home field from Yankee Stadium to Hofstra Stadium while busing their powerful offense through the rest of the League. They defeated the St. Louis Stars 2-1 in the championship game. That year Randy Horton became the first player ever to win Most Valuable Player and Rookie of the Year in back-to-back seasons.

Unfortunately, fate turned her fickle cheek. Some of the key players from the 1972 championship squad would be lost for the season. These proven performers plus established stars like Werner Roth, Joe Fink, and the returned John Kerr promise to make the Cosmos' August schedule a very busy one.

### **CLUB HISTORY**

The first pro sports team in history to win a championship in its first season, the Philadelphia Atoms are embarking on their third campaign in the North American Soccer League. The 1973 unit won the NASL crown. Last year's club — with almost the same roster — dropped to third in the Eastern Division.

Coach Al Miller, first American-born mentor in the NASL, has bolstered his forces for 1975. He's attracted the two leading scorers in Bermuda — Freddie Lewis and Ralph Bean — to Philadelphia and brought over top-ranked English League stalwarts: defender Tony Want and midfielder Bobby Hope, Birmingham City; and midfielder John McLaughlin, Liverpool. Hope comes from Scotland's World Cup Team and has more than a decade in England's First Division.

Of course, Miller still maintains his "Americanization" program. Goalkeeper Bob Rigby (East Stroudsburg), defenders Bob Smith (Rider) and Tom Galati (So. Illinois) and midfielders Barry Barro (Phila. Textile) and Bill Straub (Penn) have been members of the U.S. National Team. All were collegiate All-Americans.

The Atoms standout college draftees are goalkeeper Frank Brady (Drew) and midfielder Chris Bahr (Penn State) of the famous soccer family (father, Walt, former World Cup player now coaches at Penn State; brother, Casey, starred at Naval Academy and with '73 Atoms).

Also returning are veterans Derek Trevis, renowned "sweeper", and midfielder

George O'Neill, respective products of English and Scottish soccer.

Atoms owner Tom McCloskey, who opted to retain an NASL franchise rather than purchase one in the National Football League, has his team playing in comfortable, convenient Veterans Stadium, one of the several major athletic plants his construction firm has built around the country (RFK Stadium in Washington, the Spectrum and Civic Center Convention Hall in Philadelphia, Keystone Race Track in Neshaminy, Pa., and Atlantic City Race Track in New Jersey). The Atoms have attracted average crowds of better than 11,500 in their first two seasons including a League Record crowd of 24,093 for their 1974 home opener.

### **CLUB HISTORY**

The Portland Timbers were born on January 23, 1975, when NASL Commissioner Phil Woosnam officially granted the Rose City a franchise, making the Timbers the

last of this year's five expansion cities.

General Manager Don Paul, former pro football star with the Cleveland Browns, General Manager Don Paul, former pro Totolali star with the Cleveland Browns, immediately went to work screening coaching candidates and selected Vic Crowe, 42, a well-known English coach, who played 350 games in 12 seasons with Aston Villa. Crowe spent two years with Petersborough United before coming to the NASL's Atlanta Chiefs in 1967. He was named the Chiefs' MVP that season and made the Sporting News NASL All-Star Team. Crowe coached Atlanta in 1969 to within one point of the League title. In 1969, he returned to England and took over Aston Villa and returned the team to its status as an English soccer power.

Portland has the potential to be a very strong club with six players from England's elite First Division, including five teammates from Wolverhampton Wanderers: Peter Withe, Jim Kelly, Chris Dangerfield, Barry Powell and Don Gardner.

The Timbers are also working towards building an operation on, and off, the field which will duplicate the attendance records set in other NASL Western Division cities.

### CLUB HISTORY

All honors were awarded to teams under the direction of Sal DeRosa, the present assistant general manager, who

coached the Lancers during four separate periods of their existence.

John J. Petrossi, now executive vice president and general manager of the Lancers, views 1974 as the "over-the-hump" year and looks to 1975 with overflowing optimism. The Lancers appear to have established themselves in the local community and are enjoying long awaited recognition. With the addition of Indoor soccer, Coach Dumitru has begun to develop a year-round program which will condition players and provide the public expanded soccer enjoyment.

In the largest player trade in the history of the North American Soccer League, the Thunder obtained seven members of the 1974 champion Los Angeles Aztecs squad including Marotte and goalkeeper Blas Sanchiz in exchange for their 1975 number one college draft selection, Sergio Velazquez of UCLA. Perolli expects his other draft choices Mike Durr of North Texas State, Chris Carenza of Southern Illinois University, and Mark Stahl of Chico State to make their presence known before the end of the season.

The Thunder has taken a leading role in the development of youth soccer in San Antonio. From a zero beginning, some 2,000 youngsters now participate in several leagues throughout the city.



#### **CLUB HISTORY**

The Seattle Sounders enter their second season in the North American Soccer League firmly established in the Northwest sports scene.

Seattle recorded the first sellout in NASL history on June 22, 1974 as 13,876 people showed up to watch the Sounders defeat the defending champion Philadelphia Atoms 2-0. It was the first of six consecutive sellouts.

Despite playing in the smallest stadium in the League the Sounders ranked second in average attendance with 13,521 per game. Memorial Stadium has been expanded in 1975 to 17,426 to try to meet the demand for tickets. Over 7,000 season tickets

were sold and the Sounders are virtually assured of a sellout for every home game. Five-time All-NASL defender John Best made the transition from player to coach smoothly, directing the Sounders to 13 wins in 20 games. Despite the early season loss of star Pepe Fernandez, Seattle narrowly missed the playoffs while compiling more points than two other NASL divisional champions.

Seattle was the most consistent team in the League. Best's influence was very apparent in the defense which topped the NASL allowing 0.80 goals per game. No team scored more than two goals against the Sounders in a game. The Sounders also had the best goal difference in the League.

On offense striker John Rowlands 28 points (4th-NASL) and David Butler 21 points (7th-NASL) were the second best 1-2 scoring punch in the League.

All of the 1974 key players are back led by first team All-NASL choices striker John Rowlands and goalkeeper Barry Watling. Key additions have come from England where Best picked up Welsh international midfielder Arfon Griffiths and other top players. Top 1975 college draft pick, defender Manny Matos from Adelphia University, is also expected to help. Matos, teamed with U.S. National Team defender Dave D'Errico, give the Sounders two promising young professionals.

## **CLUB HISTORY**

The Tampa Bay Rowdies are one of five additions to the NASL's 1975 lineup. But they are already heralded as the season's Cinderella Team as a result of their tremendous indoor season in which they won the NASL's Eastern Regional Tournament. In the semifinals, the Rowdies routed the New York Cosmos 13-5, before bowing to the more experienced San Jose Earthquakes 8-5, in the title game. The expansion franchise put together by co-owners George Strawbridge and Beau Rogers became the Tampa Bay area's first major league team in July of 1974. After the appointment of one-time Italian league scoring idol Eddie Firmani as coach, the

Rowdies have never looked back.

Firmani has put together a squad that's a model blend of youth and experience. The youth and exhuberance is provided by players like three-time All-American Farrukh Quraishi from Oneonta (N.Y.) State; who was Sporting News and Soccer Monthly's Player of the Year, 18-year-old South African Mike Connell, and Penn

State's Randy Garber.

Firmani's most significant signing is striker Clyde Best from West Ham United of the English First Division. Best was West Ham's second leading scorer last year. Captain John Boyle, a veteran of 300 English First Division games with Chelsea, and goalkeeper Mike Hewitt and defender Alex Pringle, both acquisitions from Scotland's Dundee Football Club, add strength to the Rowdies defense. Dribbling wizzard Bernard "Dancing Shoes" Hartze and hard-shooting Doug Wark, who scored a record six goals against New York indoors, will spark the offense. Expected to bolster the roster will be English league veterans winger Stewart Scullion, who starred for Sheffield United, and Chelsea striker John Sissions.

The Rowdies are new, but they'll be marked men from the opening whistle and the chances are good they'll be able to cope with whatever comes.

## **CLUB HISTORY**

The Toronto Metros enter their fifth North American Soccer League campaign with a new look. In an effort to regain the Northern Division title which they captured in 1973, the Metros have strengthened themselves by merging with Toronto Croatia, one of the most successful teams in Canadian history. Most recently Toronto Croatia were club champions of Canada in 1971, '72 and '73.

The club also has a new look in the front office. Aldo Principe, a native Italian with an extensive soccer background, has been named general manager. David Jones, the former assistant coach of the Metros, has been named head coach and team manager, and Tom Zlodre has been selected as chairman of the club's technical

committee.

The Metros entered the NASL in 1971 and promptly led the League in attendance. Although the club again failed to land a playoff berth in 1972, Toronto

once more outdrew every other NASL entry.

In 1973, the Metros started slowly before jelling into one of the best balanced teams on the continent. Toronto possessed the League's second highest offensive output (32 goals in 19 games) and finished second in the NASL's goals against category (only 16). The Metros were eliminated from the playoffs by the

Philadelphia Atoms, the eventual League champions.

Last season, the Metros opened with three consecutive wins and talk of a second straight Northern Division title. Then came a miserable, midseason slump in which Toronto dropped eight of 11 games. The Metros fell far behind first place Boston and were unable to catch the pace-setting Minutemen despite a 3-0 victory over the

playoff-bound New Englanders late in the campaign.

The 1974 Metros were plagued by a maddening inability to score when opportunities were afforded them. The Metros have always been strong in midfield and on defense with All-League selections Ian McPhee, Gene Strenicer, Fernando Pinto and Brian Rowan.

Scoring has been the problem and standout newcomer Damir Sutevsky is expected to be the answer. Sutevsky will team with last year's leading scorer for the

Metros, Bruno Pilas.





# CLUB HISTORY

They also acquired forward Karl Minor

from Philadelphia.

The Diplomats' young, but talented, front office staff has made great strides with the large number of youth, 22,000 at last count, playing soccer in the metropolitan Washington area. Club officials are sure the Diplomats will become one of the

strongholds of soccer during the future of the NASL.

## 1975 TIE-BREAKER PROCEDURE

NASL games which are tied at the end of regulation play will be extended by 15-minutes of "sudden death" overtime (two 7½ minute periods). A flip of the coin will decide which team will kick off. The first team to score a goal, either from the field or by penalty kick, shall be the winner. If no score occurs in the first period, play shall be halted by the referee. The teams will change ends of the field. Play will be restarted with a kickoff by the team opposite that which started the overtime period.

If the game remains tied at the end of the second period, the outcome will be decided by kicks from the penalty spot. The visiting team will kick first. Each team shall take five penalty kicks in alternating order. When these have been completed, the team which has scored on the most penalty kicks shall be declared the winner. (The kicks shall be ended when one team has achieved an insurmountable advantage, such as scoring on its first three kicks while their opponents miss their first three).

If the teams remain tied after the prescribed five penalty kicks, they shall continue to take alternate penalty kicks until one has scored more than the other after an equal number of attempts. Only players in the game at the end of the overtime period, or players injured during the regular game or overtime period and not replaced, shall be eligible to take such penalty kicks. No player may take a second penalty kick until all other eligible members of his team have done so at which time they shall continue in the original rotation.



#### CONDENSED RULES OF SOCCER



- RULE 1 The Field of Play. (Diagram above)
- RULE 2 The Ball (NASL approved ball Adidas) circumference 27" 28", weight 14 oz. 16 oz.
- RULE 3 Number of Players. Each team consists of 11 players, one of whom must be the goalkeeper. A maximum of three substitutes may be used.
- RULE 4 Player Equipment. Consists of a shirt, shorts, stockings and shoes. Goalkeeper must wear colors which distinguish him from the other players.
- RULE 5 Referees. One referee is appointed for each match. He is responsible for control of the game and his decisions are final.
- RULE 6 Linesmen. Two linesmen assist the referee by indicating offside, when the ball is out of play, and which team is entitled to the corner kick or throw in.
- RULE 7 Duration of the Game. Shall be two equal periods of 45 minutes unless otherwise agreed upon.
- RULE 8 The Start of Play. A flip of coin decides which team will kick off. Each team must stay on its own half of the field and the defending players must be at least 10 yards from the ball until it is kicked.
  - After a goal the team scored upon will kick off. After halftime the teams change ends and the kickoff will be taken by the opposite team to that which started the game. A goal cannot be scored directly from a kickoff.
- RULE 9 Ball In and Out of Play. The ball is out of play when (a) it has wholly crossed the goal line or touchline, whether on the ground or in the air, or (b) when the game has been stopped by the referee.
- RULE 10 Method of Scoring. A goal is scored when the whole of the ball has passed over the goal line, between the goal posts and under the cross bar.

## CONDENSED RULES OF SOCCER (cont'd)

RULE 11 — Offside. A player is offside if he is nearer his opponents' goal line than the ball at the moment the ball is played unless, (a) he is in his own half of the field of play, (b) there are two of his opponents nearer to their own goal line than he is, (c) the ball last touched an opponent or was last played by him or (d) he receives the ball direct from a goal kick, a corner kick, a throw in, or when it was dropped by the referee.

Note: This is the Traditional Rule. In 1973 the NASL introduced a "Blue Line" Concept with a line drawn the width of the field 30 yards from each goal (see diagram). Under it, an attacking player is not offside until he is within 35 yards of his opponents' goal rather than midfield, as under the traditional rule.

RULE 12 — Fouls and Misconduct. A player who intentionally attempts to or actually: (1) kicks, (2) trips, (3) jumps at, (4) charges violently, (5) charges from behind, (6) strikes, (7) holds or (8) pushes an opponent, or (9) intentionally handles the ball shall be penalized by a direct free kick. Any one of these nine offenses committed in the penalty area by a defender will result in a penalty kick to the offensive team.

A player committing less flagrant violations such as offside, dangerous plays, obstruction or ungentlemanly conduct will be penalized by an indirect free kick.

RULE 13 — Free Kicks. Are classified into two categories: "Direct" (from which a goal can be scored directly against the offending side) and "Indirect" (from which a goal cannot be scored unless the ball has been touched by a player other than the kicker before entering the goal).

For all free kicks the offending team must be at least 10 yards from the ball until it is kicked.

- RULE 14 Penalty Kick. A direct free kick taken at the penalty mark. All players except the player taking the kick and the goalkeeper must stay outside the penalty area and at least ten yards from the ball (hence the arc at edge of penalty area).
- RULE 15 Throw In. When the ball has wholly crossed the touchline it is put back into play by a throw in from the spot where it went out and by a player from the opposite team that last touched it. A goal cannot be scored directly from a throw in.
- RULE 16 Goal Kick. When the ball has wholly crossed the goal line after being last touched by a player from the attacking team, it is put back into play by a kick from the goal area by the defending team.
- RULE 17 Corner Kick. When the ball has wholly crossed the goal line after being last touched by a player from the defending team, it is put back into play by a kick from the corner on the side the ball went out by the attacking team.

#### **GLOSSARY OF SOCCER TERMS**

CENTER - to pass the ball from a wide position on the field into the penalty area.

CHARGE — pushing the opponent off balance legally by shoulder to shoulder contact.

 ${\sf CLEAR}-{\sf a}$  throw or kick by the goalkeeper or a kick by the defender in an attempt to get the ball away from the goal area.

CROSS - same type of pass as center.

 ${\sf DEFENDER}-{\sf primarily}$  a defensive player who assists the goalkeeper in protecting the goal.

 $\mathsf{DRIBBLE}-\mathsf{a}$  way of advancing the ball past defenders by a series of short taps with one or both feet.

 ${\sf FORWARD}$  — primarily an attacking player whose responsibility is to create and score goals.

GOALKEEPER — the last line of defense. The only player who can use his hands within the field of play. He is limited to using his hands only within the penalty area.

HALF-VOLLEY - kicking the ball just as it is rebounding off the ground.

HANDS - illegal act of intentionally touching the ball with the hands or arms.

HEADING — a method of scoring, passing and controlling the ball by making contact with the head.

LINKMAN — another name for midfielder.

 ${\sf LOB}-{\sf a}$  high, soft kick taken on the volley, lifting the ball over the heads of the opponents.

MARKING - guarding an opponent.

MIDFIELDER — is both an offensive and defensive player who is primarily responsible for linking the forwards and defenders.

 $\mathsf{OBSTRUCTING}-\mathsf{preventing}$  the opponent from going around a player by standing in his path.

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{OVERLAP}}\xspace -$  the attacking play of a defender going down the touchline past his own winger.

PITCH — another name for the field of play.

 ${\sf SAVE}-$  the goalkeeper stopping an attempted goal by catching or deflecting the ball away from the goal.

 ${\sf SCREEN}$  — retaining possession and protecting the ball by keeping your body between the ball and opponent.

SLIDING TACKLE - attempting to take the ball away from the opponent by sliding on the ground.

## GLOSSARY OF SOCCER TERMS (cont'd)

STRIKER - a central forward position in the team with a major responsibility for scoring goals.

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{SWEEPER}}\xspace - \ensuremath{\mathsf{a}}\xspace$  defender who roams either in front of or behind the defender line to pick up stray passes.

TACKLING — attempting or taking the ball away from an opponent when both players are playing the ball with their feet.

TRAP — controlling a ball passed close to the player by means of the feet, thighs or chest.

VOLLEY - kicking the ball while it is in flight.

WALL PASS - a pass to a teammate followed by a first time return pass on the other side of the opponent (give and go).

WING - an area of the field near the touchline.

WINGER - name given to the right and left outside forwards.

4-3-3 — the player formation most used today (a goalkeeper, four defenders, three midfielders, three forwards).

4-2-4 — most used alternative formation to the 4-3-3 (a goalkeeper, four defenders, two midfielders and four forwards).

# NASL HISTORY (Cont'd)

In early December 1973, the NASL expanded to the West Coast and for the first time since 1968 re-established itself as a national league with franchises in Los Angeles, San Francisco, Seattle and Vancouver, B.C. The League also added franchises in Baltimore in early December, Boston in late December and Denver in early February 1974 and increased its membership to 15 teams as Atlanta and Montreal dropped out.

The 1974 season was by far the most successful in the League's history. A total of 1,181,630 spectators for a record average of 7,825 per game attended the 151 regular season games. The average was a 104% increase over the 1971 average of 3,844. San Jose led the League with an average of 16,576 followed by Seattle [13,717], Philadelphia [11,784] and Vancouver [10,098]. Only Philadelphia in 1973 had ever

averaged more than 10,000 per game.

In 1974, the Los Angeles Aztecs became the seventh different NASL Champion in as many years and the second expansion club to capture the title in its first season. In a classic final in the Orange Bowl in Miami, the Aztecs defeated the Miami Toros 4-3 on a tie-breaker after tying the game in the final three minutes to send the game into the tie-breaker. Four goals were scored in the final 12 minutes of the match. The championship game was witnessed by 15,507 in the Orange Bowl and a nationwide CBS television audience. It marked the NASL's return to national television for the first time since 1968. The year also included the formation of the NASL Marketing,

Through NASL Marketing, Inc. the League has taken on a new image and identity for the 1975 season and has introduced its own game ball. The League has also added five new franchises in Chicago, Hartford, Portland, San Antonio and Tampa to bring the League to a record total of 20.

The League started 1975 with its first Indoor Championship tournament [see full account elsewhere]. CBS-TV telecast two of these games and will do two outdoor games.


