# COVERING THE BADGERS

**PRESS ROW:** Wisconsin's working facilities for press-radio-television are located on the west side of the Wisconsin Fieldhouse.

**WORKING TICKETS:** All requests for Press Row tickets must be placed with the Sports Information Office. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pickup at the Press Will Call window at Gate 2. Working press tickets contain assigned seat locations. Telecopier service will be available to members of the working press by the appropriate servicing organizations.

**RADIO:** Each station admitted for broadcasting will be issued three tickets. Radio facilities are located in the second balcony of the west side. Tickets are mailed upon acceptance. If tickets are not mailed, they may be picked up in advance at the Sports Information Office, or from the Press Will Call window.

**PHOTOGRAPHERS:** Floor passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service, and television photographers. Photographers may work from either the north or south ends and the west side of the court.

**PARKING:** A limited number of parking passes for Lots 18 and 19 are available to working people only. They will be issued as requested.

**PLAYER INTERVIEWS:** Media representatives may interview Wisconsin players in the Reinke Room after each game in the Wisconsin Fieldhouse following interviews of both coaches.

Players also are available for interviews each day prior to practice in the Fieldhouse (dependent upon class schedules). Practice starts each day at 3:37 p.m. and ends at 6:00 p.m. Requests should be made through the Sports Information Office in advance.

**COACHES INTERVIEWS:** Bill Cofield will meet with media representatives following each game after a short cooling off period in the Reinke Room of the Wisconsin Fieldhouse.

Best time to interview Coach Cofield on a daily basis is prior to practice at 3:15 p.m. in the Fieldhouse. He can also be reached at his office telephone (AC 608 262-4597) from 8:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m., and from 11:00 a.m. to 2:15 p.m. daily, and following practice by calling the Fieldhouse Coaches Office (AC 608 263-6943).

**YOUR HOSTS** in Wisconsin Fieldhouse and at all University of Wisconsin athletic events are **Jim Mott**, Sports Information Director, and **Bob Leu**, Radio-TV Director.

**Jim Mott** is a Madison native and has B.A. degrees in Zoology and Journalism from the University of Wisconsin. As an undergraduate, he served as Wisconsin's basketball team manager for four years, earning a major "W" award for his work.

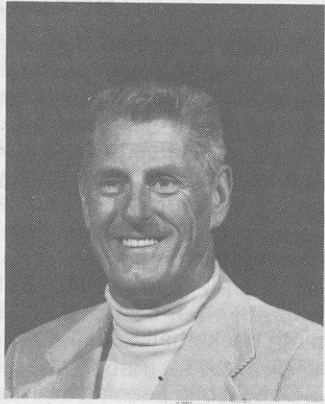
He's a Milwaukee native and a 1960 graduate of the University of Wisconsin with a Bachelor of Arts degree in speech.

## Hirsch Guides Wisconsin Athletic Program

Elroy Hirsch is in his tenth year as Wisconsin's Director of Athletics and he's the guiding force behind one of the finest athletic programs for men and women in the United States today.

A study of Wisconsin's Big Ten participation in 15 sports for men and 12 for women listed the Badgers second overall in men's and fourth in women's competition for the 1977-78 school year.

The Wausau native came back to Wisconsin — where he gained collegiate fame as a star sophomore running back in leading the Badgers to a No. 3 ranking during the 1942 football season — from the Los Angeles Rams on February 28, 1969, and his original appointment as athletic director, slated to end in 1979, was extended in 1974 by the school's athletic board through June 30, 1984.

Professor **Frederick W. Haberman**, athletic board chairman, points out, **"Elroy richly merits our confidence. His dynamic personality has infused our entire operation with that indefinable quality we usually call spirit. He has heightened the total consciousness of the state and of our alumni throughout the country. He's taken the role of the leader."**

Following the 1942 season when the Badgers posted an 8-1-1 record, Elroy played at Michigan in 1943 as a Marine trainee, — football, basketball, track and baseball — to become the only athlete at Michigan ever to win an "M" in four sports in one season.

Elroy had an highly successful professional football career that started in 1946 as a halfback with the Chicago Rockets of the post-war All-America Conference. Later, he put in nine great seasons with the Los Angeles Rams as one of the all-time great ends.

He's been named to the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame, (1965), to professional football's Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio (1968), to the National Football Hall of Fame in New York (1974), and to the Madison Sports Hall of Fame (1977).

He's also a member of the all-time NFL All-Star team for his play as end and flanker with the Los Angeles Rams that served to change the game from one of two-way players to offensive and defensive specialists under free substitution.

**Elroy** and his wife **Ruth** have two children — son **Win Stephen**, Los Angeles, and daughter **Patricia Caroline**, a junior at Wisconsin.

## HEAD COACH BILL COFIELD

William L. Cofield begins his third season as the head coach at the University of Wisconsin. In this short period of time Cofield has brought national recognition to Wisconsin's basketball program by annually facing one of the toughest schedules in the country and recruiting the nation's best high school talent.

Bill, a 38-year-old native of Carrier Hills, Illinois, became the Badgers ninth basketball coach on March 16, 1976.

Cofield had been an assistant at the University of Virginia under Terry Holland for two seasons prior to accepting the position at Wisconsin.

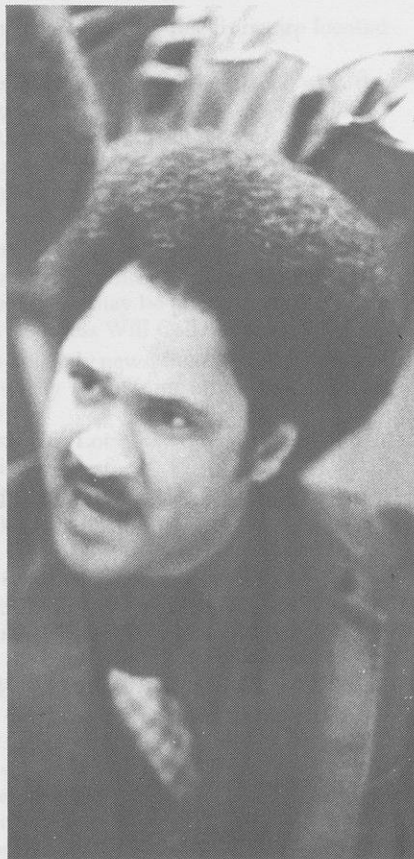
Bill played his collegiate basketball at Casper Junior College in Wyoming, and later transferred to McKendree College in Lebanon, Illinois. There he earned a Bachelor of Arts in physical education in 1963; he also earned a master's degree in physical education from the University of Kentucky in 1967.

His coaching career began at H. E. Davis Junior High School in Cleveland, Ohio, in 1963. After two seasons, Bill became the head coach at Cleveland's East-Technical High School where his team posted a 20-1 record in 1965-66.

The following year Cofield entered the college ranks as an assistant coach at Kentucky State College. He was named the head coach at Lincoln University of Pennsylvania. While at Lincoln, his teams posted a 19-3 and a 19-9 record, winning the conference championships and earning NAIA berths in 1967-68 and 1968-69. The latter team reached the finals of the NAIA tournament.

Bill moved to Prairie View A & M in Prairie View, Texas, at the start of the 1969-70 season. There he compiled a four-year record of 57 wins against 48 losses. His 1972-73 team posted a 19-8 record and a second place finish in the Southwestern Athletic Conference.

Cofield became the nation's first black athletic director and head



coach at a predominately white institution of higher learning by accepting both positions in 1973 at the College of Racine.

Bill joined the staff at Virginia in 1974, when he left Racine as the school went out of business.

Bill and his wife Shirly are the parents of three daughters, Kimberly 17, Staci 16, Kena 14, and a son Clay 13.

## Meet the Staff

### ASSISTANT COACH WILLIAM "BO" RYAN



On the same day that Coach Bill Cofield accepted the head coaching position at Wisconsin in 1976, he named William "Bo" Ryan of Chester, PA as an assistant to coach the guards.

The 30-year-old Ryan, who at the time was the basketball coach at Sun Valley High School in Sun Valley, Pa., had previously worked as an assistant to Cofield at the College of Racine in 1973-74.

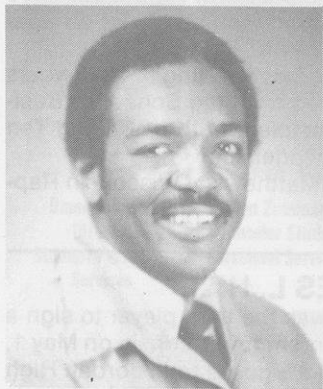
Bo was a high-scoring guard for Wilkes College in Wilkes-Barre, Pa., for four years. He was captain and Most Valuable Player his senior year. Bo still holds two records at Wilkes—most points scored in a conference game (43) and most field goals in a single game (18).

Coach Ryan was graduated with a degree in Business Administration in 1969 and later did post-graduate work at Villanova.

In 1975, Ryan was named Delaware County Coach of the Year as he guided the Sun Valley team to a 15-7 record and a second-place finish in the Philadelphia Suburban 2 League, despite having no starter over 6-1. The second-place finish qualified Sun Valley for the State Tournament for the first time ever.

Bo and his wife Kelly are parents of a three-year-old daughter Megan and an infant son William Francis III.

### ASSISTANT COACH LARRY REED



Larry Reed, 38, also joined the Badger basketball staff as an assistant coach in charge of forwards and centers in March 1976.

A native of Milwaukee, Reed moved from the front office staff of the Milwaukee Bucks where he had been serving as administrative assistant, first to former President Ray Patterson and then General Manager Wayne Embry.

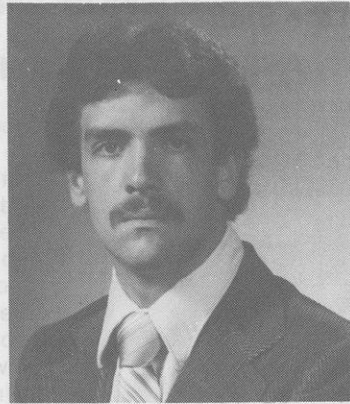
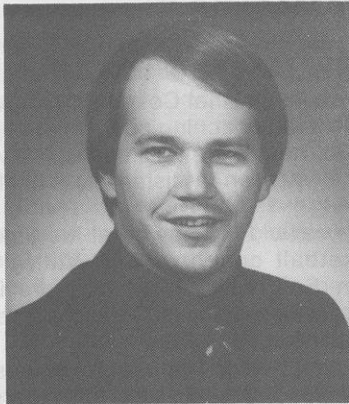
Reed is a 1957 graduate of Milwaukee Lincoln high school where he starred in football, basketball and baseball, winning nine letters, and is a graduate of UW-Milwaukee where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Social Welfare in 1967. Two years later he also received a Master of Science degree in Social Work from UW-Milwaukee.

Larry's collegiate career, which began in 1957, was interrupted by service in the U.S. Air Force where he was named to the all-Air Force team for three years. He returned to UW-M in 1964 and by the time his career ended in 1967, he had established himself as the school's all-time leading scorer and rebounder.

Following graduation, Reed served as an assistant coach at UW-Milwaukee for two years, and then joined the Bucks organization in 1970 as coach of the Milwaukee Muskies, a Buck farm team, which won the Continental league title. The following year he moved to the Buck front office.

Larry and his wife Sharon are the parents of three sons Larry, Jr. 16, Darrell 14, Damian 4 and a daughter Terri 12.





### **ASSISTANT COACH TODD LANDRUM**

Todd Landrum is the youngest member of the basketball staff joining the Badgers in 1976. Landrum, 27, is a native of Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio and came to Wisconsin after serving as a graduate assistant to Ron Rainey at the University of Delaware for two seasons.

Todd received his undergraduate degree in physical education from Ohio Northern University in Ada, Ohio in 1973. He also earned a master's degree in physical education from Delaware in 1976.

Coach Landrum will be in charge of recruiting and scouting for the Badgers, as well coaching the Varsity Reserve.

Todd is married to the former Brenda Emmelhainz of Columbus, Ohio.

### **VOLUNTEER COACH PETE BREY**

The newest addition to the Wisconsin staff is Pete Brey of Wisconsin Rapids, Wisconsin. Pete joined the staff as a graduate assistant in 1977. Pete will serve as an assistant coach to the Varsity Reserve program and serves as an academic consultant to the Badger players.

Brey, 23, captained the Badger squad in 1976-77, completing his four years of eligibility. He received an undergraduate degree from the School of Business in Accounting and Finance. Pete was the recipient of the 1977 Big Ten Medal of Honor for achievement in athletics and academics.

Pete was recently married to the former Debbie Matthews of Wisconsin Rapids, Wis.

### **IN MEMORY OF CHARLES L. HILL**



Charles L. Hill was the third player to sign a national letter of intent to Wisconsin on May 1, 1978. Charlie, a 6-3½ guard from Jordan High School in Columbus, Georgia, was the team's Most Valuable Player in both 1976-77 and 1977-78. He was selected to the Columbus-Phoenix, GA, All-City team and voted the best male athlete at Jordan his senior year. Last season, Charlie led the team in both scoring and rebounding from the center position, averaging 21.9 points and 12.7 rebounds per game. His untimely death from heat stroke on June 21, 1978, left the team in awe, and his contribution will be deeply missed.

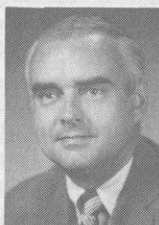

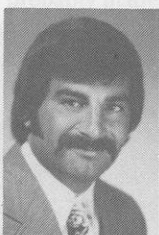

## HISTORY OF THE WISCONSIN FIELDHOUSE

The Wisconsin Fieldhouse was a project of then Athletic Director George Little when he arrived at Wisconsin in 1925 and it became a reality in 1930.

In 1927, Little proposed to the athletic council and regents the plan under which the fieldhouse was to be constructed. This proposal met the approval of the board, after two previous attempts had failed; one of those having passed the legislature only to be vetoed by Governor Zimmerman.

The original layout had contemplated a \$650,000 building to house both an indoor training facility for intercollegiate teams and the required program of physical education. The portion to be used for intercollegiate athletics was estimated at \$385,000.

This intercollegiate portion is represented in the present facility that houses both the basketball teams and wrestling squad. Its actual cost was somewhat more than estimated totalling \$434,000 with construction completed in September of 1931.

The structure would be a part of Camp Randall Stadium, standing on the south end of the field, with concrete stands built against its north wall. The fieldhouse contained a basketball floor with a seating capacity of 12,000, a complete track facility, and room for indoor football and baseball training.

In April of 1976, the state Building Commission approved \$718,000 for the renovation of the fieldhouse. The project was aimed mainly at improving the seating facility and allowing for other activities to be presented in the building. Permanent bleachers were added to the north, south, and west sides of the court with portable seats and a stage area on the east side. This effort brought the seating capacity to 12,204. New locker rooms and a training facility were constructed under the west side seats and the existing locker rooms were renovated. A new lighting system was added in 1977 to make the Wisconsin Fieldhouse one of the best facilities in the Big Ten.



## 1978-79 WISCONSIN BASKETBALL PROSPECTUS

Coach Bill Cofield looks for things to improve as he enters his third season as the Badger head coach.

Wisconsin will again put a young but experienced team on the floor in 1978-79. The roster does not include a senior, as eight lettermen return for the upcoming season.

The Badgers again played one of the toughest schedules in the nation last season with their overall record of 8-19 and placed tied for ninth in the final Big Ten standings at 4-14. They were competitive, having 17 games decided by ten or less points, winning six, while losing eleven.

Wisconsin's strength appears to be in the backcourt, as four lettermen return. Arnold Gaines is coming off his best season as a Badger where he led the team in both scoring, with a 11.3 average and assists, with 80, to be named the team's Most Valuable Player. Knee surgery slowed down his play early last season and he was selected honorable mention to the all-Big Ten team.

Wes Matthews will return for his sophomore season with the Badgers after missing most of the Big Ten season with academic problems. Before his absence, Wes was leading the team in scoring with a 14.5 average.

Dan Hastings did an admirable job coming off the bench last season and should give depth to a solid backcourt. Also coming in at a reserve role is Robert Jenkins, who is considered one of the best defensive guards on the squad. This group of four veterans will give needed balance and scoring strength.

Joe Chmelich has probably been the most consistent performer on the Badger squad the past two seasons. Joe led the team last season in rebounding with 182 and was second in scoring with a 10.2 average, as well as being third in assists.

Claude Gregory probably made the most improvement of any player in the 1977-78 season. Starting the final six games of the season, Claude scored in double figures in each of them averaging 17.3 points. He also ranked second on the team in rebounding and eleventh in the Big Ten.

Larry Petty started 19 games at center during his freshman year and ranked fourth in rebounding with 128. An off season running and weight program will give Larry more mobility and strength for the upcoming season.

Mark Newburg, who was red-shirted last season, gives added depth at center and is considered a good outside shooter for his size.

Four outstanding recruits should help the success of the Badger squad this season. Keith Mitchell, from Taylor, MI, is considered one of the best players to come out of Michigan this year. Keith toured Taiwan this summer as a member of the AAU Junior team, and will give depth at both forward and center.

James Smith, 6-6½, from Pittsburgh, PA, and Gary Zinkgraf, 6-7, from Bethesda, MD, will also see considerable action this season at forward.

Tim Stracka, who will join the basketball team at the completion of the football season, can be used at both guard and forward.

Wisconsin's schedule will feature appearances in two regular season tournaments, hosting the first Wisconsin Invitational with Robert Morris, Long Island, and St. Louis, and traveling to the Holiday Classic in Louisville, KY, with Mississippi State, Oral Roberts and host school Louisville. The schedule also includes a trip to St. John's of New York and hosting intra-state rival Marquette, along with the tough 18-game, double round robin Big Ten slate.

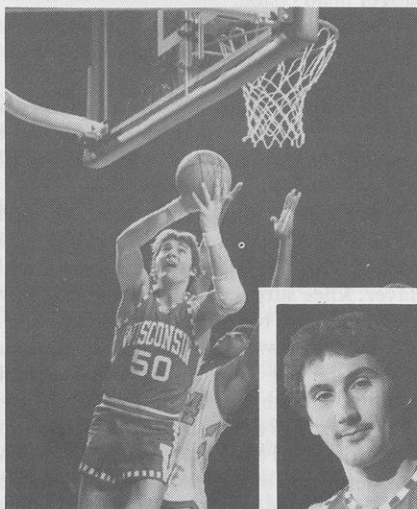
## BADGER PROFILES

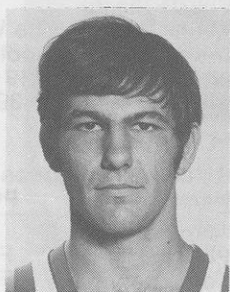
### The Northwestern Outlook

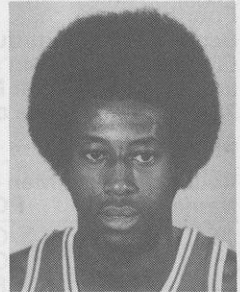
### The Indiana Outlook

#### The Iowa Outlook

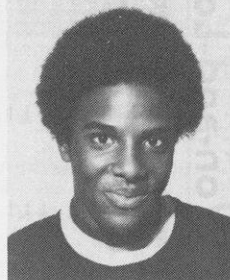

**DID YOU KNOW**-Wisconsin Basketball teams over the years have played in three triple overtime games, winning two of them and tying the third? The first three overtime games took place at the Old Red Gym on Langdon Street, December 14, 1923, with the Badgers tying DePauw 25-25. No decision was reached as both coaches agreed that their teams were too tired to continue after the three overtime periods.

On February 18, 1967, Badger forward **Chuck Nagle** hit from the corner with seven seconds left in overtime to give Wisconsin a 96-95 win over Iowa at Iowa City.

On January 29, 1977, Wisconsin defeated Michigan State 87-83 in three overtimes with **Bob Falk** scoring four points, **Bill Pearson** and **Arnold Gaines** three each to break a 77-77 deadlock that existed after the second overtime period.
