COVERING THE BADGERS

PRESS ROW: Wisconsin's working facilities for press-radio-television are located on the west side of the Wisconsin Fieldhouse.

WORKING TICKETS: All requests for Press Row tickets must be placed with the Sports Information Office. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pickup at the Press Will Call window at Gate 2. Working press tickets contain assigned seat locations. Telecopier service will be available to members of the working press by the appropriate servicing organizations.

RADIO: Each station admitted for broadcasting will be issued three tickets. Radio facilities are located in the second balcony of the west side. Tickets are mailed upon acceptance. If tickets are not mailed, they may be picked up in advance at the Sports Information Office, or from the Press Will Call window.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Floor passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service, and television photographers. Photographers may work from either the north or south ends and the west side of the court.

PARKING: A limited number of parking passes for Lots 18 and 19 are available to working people only. They will be issued as requested.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: Media representatives may interview Wisconsin players in the Reinke Room after each game in the Wisconsin Fieldhouse following interviews of both coaches.

Players also are available for interviews each day prior to practice in the Fieldhouse (dependent upon class schedules). Practice starts each day at 2:45 p.m. and ends at 6:00 p.m. Requests should be made through the Sports Information Office in advance.

COACHES INTERVIEWS: Bill Cofield will meet with media representatives following each game after a short cooling off period in the Reinke Room of the Wisconsin Fieldhouse.

Best time to interview Coach Cofield on a daily basis is prior to practice at 2:00 p.m. in the Fieldhouse. He can also be reached at his office telephone (AC 608 262-4597) from 11:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. daily, and following practice by calling the Fieldhouse Coaches Office (AC 608 263-6943).

YOUR HOSTS in Wisconsin Fieldhouse and at all University of Wisconsin athletic events are **Jim Mott**, Sports Information Director, and **Bob Leu**, Radio-TV Director.

Jim Mott is a Madison native and has B.A. degrees in Zoology and Journalism from the University of Wisconsin. As an undergraduate, he served as Wisconsin's basketball team manager for four years, earning a major "W" award for his work.

Jim is a past president of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) and the Madison Pen and Mike Club. He was named to the CoSIDA Hall of Fame in 1979.

He and his wife **Dorothy** are the parents of three sons—**William** 17, **David** 14, and **Eric** 12.

Bob Leu joined Wisconsin's Athletic Department staff as Radio-TV Director in September, 1973 from WHA-TV where he had served as producer-director and director of sports.

He's a Milwaukee native and a 1960 graduate of the University of Wisconsin with a Bachelor of Arts degree in speech.

Bob is the producer of Wisconsin's post-season football, basketball, and hockey highlight films, does color commentary on the Badger hockey broadcasts, and is the producer-host of Badger Football which is seen each season on the state's public television stations.

He and his wife **Janis** are the parents of daughters **Dawn** 20, **Amie** 17, and son **Adam** 8.

Bob is a past president of the Madison Pen and Mike Club.

Hirsch Guides Wisconsin Athletic Program

Elroy Hirsch is in his 11th year as Wisconsin's Director of Athletics and he's the guiding force behind one of the finest athletic programs for men and women in the United States today.

A study of Wisconsin's Big Ten participation in 15 sports for men and 12 for women listed the Badgers third overall in men's and fourth in women's competition for the 1978-79 school year.

The Wausau native came back to Wisconsin — where he gained collegiate fame as a star sophomore running back in leading the Badgers to a No. 3 ranking during the 1942 football season — from the Los Angeles Rams on February 28, 1969.

His original appointment as athletic director slated to end in 1979, was first extended in 1974 by the school's athletic board through June 30, 1984, and again in April, 1979 through June 30, 1988 by Chancellor Irving Shain upon recommendation of the Athletic Board.

Athletic Board Chairman Professor Frederick W. Haberman, commented, "This extension is, of course, a mark of confidence by our university administration and by the Athletic Board.

"Mr. Hirsch has earned our support. His services to the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics and to the University in general are very valuable. Under his leadership we have never had a deficit budget, we have been phenomenally successful at the box office, we have received more private funds than ever before, we have upgraded the physical plant considerably, we have maintained competitive status in almost all our sports and we have been consistently free of scandal.

"He has presided over a program that is educationally responsible and fiscally efficient and has done so with dignity that befits a great university."

Chancellor Shain stated in a letter to Hirsch, "I am very pleased to take this present action. My own observations certainly support the opinion of the Athletic Board that you are one of the outstanding athletic directors, not only in the Big Ten, our 'home' conference, but also in the country at large. I am personally, as well as professionally, delighted to have you as a member of our university staff."

Hirsch commented, "I'm extremely pleased with the decision. It's just wonderful."

He said his major objectives for the decade ahead are, "coping with inflation and acquiring proper funding for women's athletics. My other ambition is to have Wisconsin in a football bowl game."

Following the 1942 season when the Badgers posted an 8-1-1 record, Elroy played at Michigan in 1943 as a Marine trainee, — football, basketball, track and baseball — to become the only athlete at Michigan ever to win an "M" in four sports in one season.

Elroy had an highly successful professional football career that started in 1946 as a half-back with the Chicago Rockets of the post-war All-America Conference. Later, he put in nine great seasons with the Los Angeles Rams as one of the all-time great ends.

He's been named to the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame, (1965), to professional football's Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio (1968), to the National Football Hall of Fame in New York (1974), and to the Madison Sports Hall of Fame (1977).

He's also a member of the all-time NFL All-Star team for his play as end and flanker with the Los Angeles Rams that served to change the game from one of two-way players to offensive and defensive specialists under free substitution.

Elroy and his wife, Ruth, have two children — son Win Stephen, Los Angeles, and daughter Patricia Caroline, a junior at Wisconsin.

HEAD COACH BILL COFIELD

William L. Cofield begins his fourth season as the head coach at the University of Wisconsin. In this short period of time **Cofield** has brought national recognition to Wisconsin's basketball program by annually facing one of the toughest schedules in the country and recruiting the nation's best high school talent.

Bill, a 39-year-old native of Carrier Mills, Illinois, became the Badgers ninth basketball coach on March 16, 1976.

Cofield had been an assistant at the University of Virginia under Terry Holland for two seasons prior to accepting the position at Wisconsin.


Bill played his collegiate basketball at Casper Junior College in Wyoming, and later transferred to McKendree College in Lebanon, Illinois. There he earned a Bachelor of Arts in physical education in 1963; he also earned a master's degree in physical education from the University of Kentucky in 1967.

His coaching career began at H. E. Davis Junior High School in Cleveland, Ohio, in 1963. After two seasons, **Bill** became the head coach at Cleveland's East-Technical High School where his team posted a 20-1 record in 1965-66.

The following year **Cofield** entered the college ranks as an assistant coach at Kentucky State College. He was named the head coach at Lincoln University of Pennsylvania. While at Lincoln, his teams posted a 19-3 and a 19-9 record, winning the conference championships and earning NAIA berths in 1967-68 and 1968-69. The latter team reached the finals of the NAIA tournament.

Bill moved to Prairie View A & M in Prairie View, Texas, at the start of the 1969-70 season. There he compiled a four-year record of 57 wins against 48 losses. His 1972-73 team posted a 19-8 record and a second place finish in the Southwestern Athletic Conference.

Cofield became the nation's first



black athletic director and head coach at a predominately white institution of higher learning by accepting both positions in 1973 at the College of Racine.

Bill joined the staff at Virginia in 1974, when he left Racine as the school went out of business.

Bill and his wife **Shirley** are the parents of three daughters, **Kimberly 18**, **Staci 17**, **Kena 15**, and a son **Clay 14**.



ASSISTANT COACH WILLIAM "BO" RYAN



On the same day that Coach Bill Cofield accepted the head coaching position at Wisconsin in 1976, he named **William "Bo" Ryan** of Chester, PA as an assistant to coach the guards.

The 31-year-old **Ryan**, who at the time was the basketball coach at Sun Valley High School in Sun Valley, Pa., had previously worked as an assistant to Cofield at the College of Racine in 1973-74.


Bo was a high-scoring guard for Wilkes College in Wilkes-Barre, Pa., for four years. He was captain and Most Valuable Player his senior year. **Bo** still holds two records at Wilkes—most points scored in a conference game (43) and most field goals in a single game (18).

Coach **Ryan** was graduated with a degree in Business Administration in 1969 and later did post-graduate work at Villanova.

In 1975, **Ryan** was named Delaware County Coach of the Year as he guided the Sun Valley team to a 15-7 record and a second-place finish in the Philadelphia Suburban 2 League, despite having no starter over 6-1. The second-place finish qualified Sun Valley for the State Tournament for the first time ever.

Bo and his wife **Kelly** are parents of a daughter, **Megan** 4, and a son, **William Francis** 1.

ASSISTANT COACH LARRY REED



Larry Reed, 39, also joined the Badger basketball staff as an assistant coach in charge of forwards and centers in March 1976.



A native of Milwaukee, **Reed** moved from the front office staff of the Milwaukee Bucks where he had been serving as administrative assistant, first to former President Ray Patterson and then General Manager Wayne Embry.

Reed is a 1957 graduate of Milwaukee Lincoln high school where he starred in football, basketball and baseball, winning nine letters, and is a graduate of UW-Milwaukee where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Social Welfare in 1967. Two years later he also received a Master of Science degree in Social Work from UW-Milwaukee.

Larry's collegiate career, which began in 1957, was interrupted by service in the U.S. Air Force where he was named to the all-Air Force team for three years. He returned to UW-M in 1964 and by the time his career ended in 1967, he had established himself as the school's all-time leading scorer and rebounder.

Following graduation, **Reed** served as an assistant coach at UW-Milwaukee for two years, and then joined the Bucks organization in 1970 as coach of the Milwaukee Muskies, a Buck farm team, which won the Continental league title. The following year he moved to the Buck front office.

Larry and his wife **Sharon** are the parents of three sons **Larry, Jr.** 17, **Darrell** 15, **Damian** 5, and a daughter **Terri** 13.



ASSISTANT COACH TODD LANDRUM

Todd Landrum is Wisconsin's "Man on the Move". **Todd** spends more time in the air than on the Wisconsin bench, finding future prospects and scouting the Badger opponents. Coach **Landrum** joined the basketball staff in August of 1976 after serving as a graduate assistant to Ron Rainey at the University of Delaware for two seasons.

Landrum, a 28-year-old native of Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio, received his undergraduate degree in physical education from Ohio Northern University in Ada, Ohio, in 1973. He obtained a master's degree also in physical education from Delaware in 1976.

In addition to his recruiting and scouting duties, **Todd** has coached the Varsity Reserve program for the past three seasons with an overall record of twenty-eight wins to nine defeats. His team this past season posted a perfect 17-0 record.

Todd is married to the former **Brenda Emmelhainz** of Columbus, Ohio, and resides in Middleton, WI.

ATHLETIC TRAINER JIM BOSANNY

Jim Bosanny is the new member of the Wisconsin staff completing his rookie season this past winter. **Jim** has been a member of the training staff for the past five years, working the first four as a student assistant.

A native of Monroe, Wisconsin, **Jim** earned his undergraduate degree in physical education from Wisconsin in 1977. He is certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA). In addition to treating athletic injuries, **Bosanny** coordinates all of the Badger's meals.

Jim and his wife **Vicki** live in Monona, WI.

VOLUNTEER COACH DEAN ANDERSON

The newest member of the Badger staff is **Dean Anderson**. The 23-year-old, Madison, Wisconsin native, will serve as the academic supervisor and assist in coaching the Varsity Reserve program.

HISTORY OF THE WISCONSIN FIELDHOUSE

The Wisconsin Fieldhouse was a project of then Athletic Director George Little when he arrived at Wisconsin in 1925 and it became a reality in 1930.

In 1927, Little proposed to the athletic council and regents the plan under which the fieldhouse was to be constructed. This proposal met the approval of the board, after two previous attempts had failed; one of those having passed the legislature only to be vetoed by Governor Zimmerman.

The original layout had contemplated a \$650,000 building to house both an indoor training facility for intercollegiate teams and the required program of physical education. The portion to be used for intercollegiate athletics was estimated at \$385,000.

This intercollegiate portion is represented in the present facility that houses both the basketball teams and wrestling squad. Its actual cost was somewhat more than estimated totalling \$434,000 with construction completed in September of 1931.

The structure would be a part of Camp Randall Stadium, standing on the south end of the field, with concrete stands built against its north wall. The fieldhouse contained a basketball floor with a seating capacity of 12,000, a complete track facility, and room for indoor football and baseball training.

In April of 1976, the state Building Commission approved \$718,000 for the renovation of the fieldhouse. The project was aimed mainly at improving the seating facility and allowing for other activities to be presented in the building. Permanent bleachers were added to the north, south, and west sides of the court with portable seats and a stage area on the east side. This effort brought the seating capacity to 12,204. New locker rooms and a training facility were constructed under the west side seats and the existing locker rooms were renovated. A new lighting system was added in 1977 to make the Wisconsin Fieldhouse one of the best facilities in the Big Ten.



1979-80 WISCONSIN BASKETBALL PROSPECTUS

The Wisconsin basketball team is coming off its best season since 1974 under fourth year coach Bill Cofield. The Badgers finished with an overall twelve and fifteen mark, while tying for eighth place in the Big Ten with Minnesota.

The highlight of the Wisconsin season came in the season finale by upsetting eventual NCAA champion Michigan State 83-81 on a last second shot by sophomore guard Wes Matthews. The Badgers began to show their capabilities in the final four games as they defeated Michigan, Northwestern, Ohio State and Michigan State and snapped a ten-game losing streak.

Wisconsin has all five starters returning and is the only squad in the Big Ten to return its entire roster. Wes Matthews, a third team all-Big Ten guard, leads the list of returnees. Matthews led the squad in scoring with 499 points and set a new Wisconsin single season assist mark of 106. He finished seventh in Big Ten scoring with an 18.8 average, while finishing eighth in assists with a 4.0 average. At the other guard spot, Arnold Gaines and Dan Hastings shared duties most of the season. Gaines averaged 6.9 points per game at his point guard spot, while being credited with 96 assists and a 3.5 average in Big Ten assists. Hastings, who started the final four games of the season, scored 103 points from his reserve role.

The front line of the Badgers was considered one of the toughest in the conference as they again led the Big Ten in rebounding, with three players among the top eleven. Senior co-captain Joe Chernelich heads the list of returning front liners. Chernelich just missed a Pan-American tryout last spring, as he was selected as the first alternate. Joe finished third in scoring with 276 points and second in rebounds with 212. He also was a prominent figure in the final Big Ten statistics finishing twentieth in scoring and seventh in rebounding. Complementing Chernelich at the other forward position is Claude Gregory. Gregory was named SPORTS ILLUSTRATED "Player of the Week" in March, as the Badgers upset both Michigan State and Ohio State. Claude was Wisconsin's leading rebounder with an 8.7 average, while being the second leading scorer with 407 points. He tied Kevin McHale of Minnesota as the league's third best rebounder, and was the Big Ten's eleventh leading scorer.

In the middle is junior Larry Petty, who earned a lot of respect last season in the Big Ten. Petty had a much improved sophomore campaign after a disappointing rookie season. Larry was the Badgers' fourth leading scorer and third leading rebounder. The loss of forty pounds from his freshman season to last year made the difference in Larry's play.

Giving the Badgers depth at all three positions up front is sophomore Keith Mitchell. Mitchell was used last season at both the center and forward positions appearing in 25 games and scoring 43 points.

A pair of outstanding in-state recruits in Mike Kreklow and Greg Dandridge should give the Badgers needed depth at both the forward and guard positions. Kreklow, a 6-6½ forward from Neenah, was a consensus all-state player and is considered an outstanding outside shooter. He will be used at the small forward spot and should give an added dimension to the Badger attack. Greg Dandridge is a 6-3 guard, from Milwaukee, and was honored by the Hertz Corporation as the best player in the state. Greg possesses exceptional speed and should complement Wes Matthews. He is considered an outstanding defensive guard and uses his speed to his advantage.



DID YOU KNOW—Wisconsin basketball teams over the years have played in three triple overtime games, winning two of them and tying the third? The first overtime game took place at the Old Red Gym on Langdon Street, December 14, 1923, with the Badgers tying DePauw 25-25. No decision was reached as both coaches agreed that their teams were too tired to continue after the three overtime periods.

On February 18, 1967, Badger forward **Chuck Nagle** hit from the corner with seven seconds left in the third overtime to give Wisconsin a 96-95 win over Iowa at Iowa City.

On January 29, 1977, Wisconsin defeated Michigan State 87-83 in three overtimes with **Bob Falk** scoring four points, **Bill Pearson** and **Arnold Gaines** three each to break a 77-77 deadlock that existed after the second overtime period.
