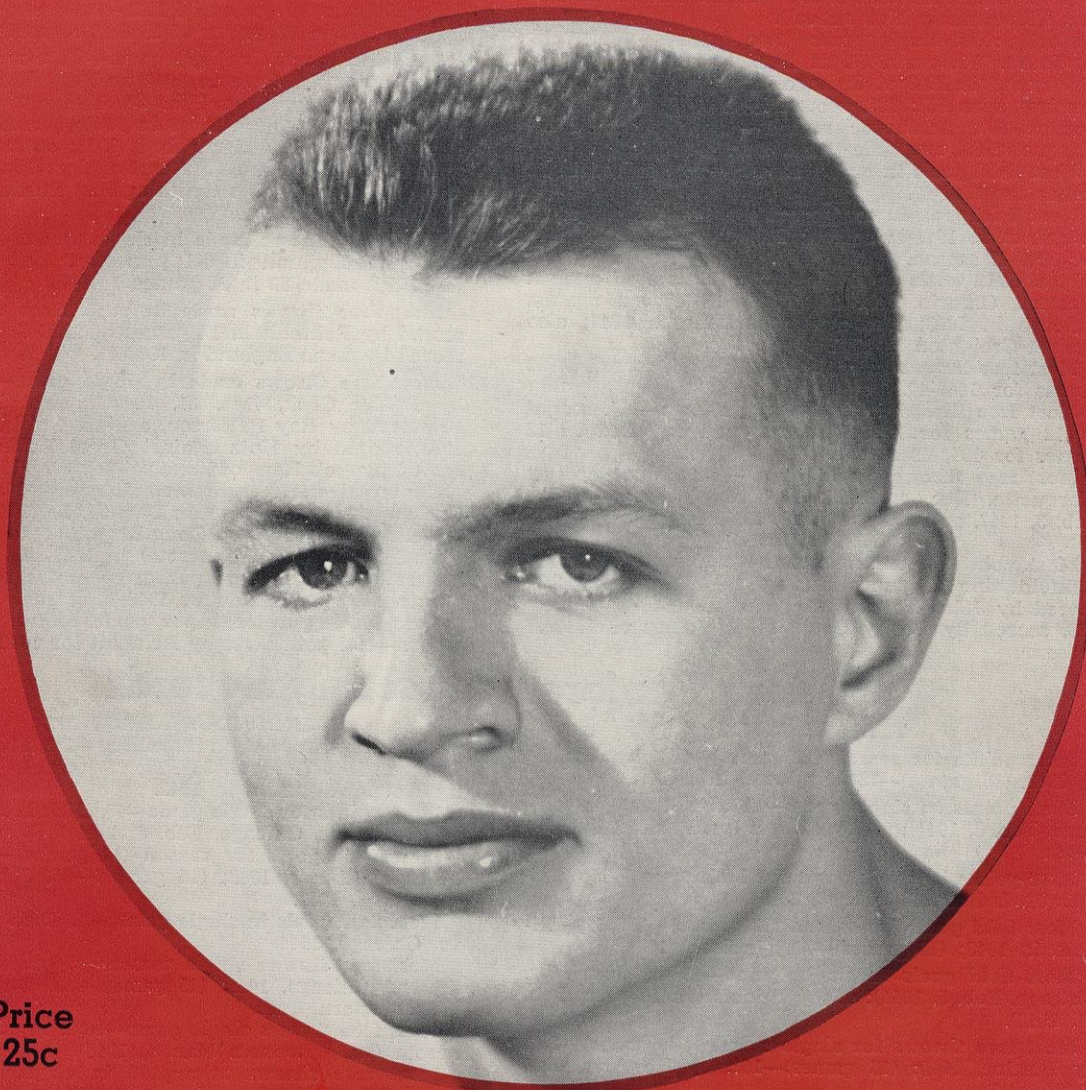

University of Wisconsin Basketball Scoring Records

TEAM RECORDS

Most points in entire season—1,228, scored in 22 games in 1947.

Most points in conference season—718, scored in 15 games in 1942; 677, scored in 12 games in 1947.

Most points in single game—80, scored against Beoit in 1905; 79, scored against Western Ontario, Canada, in fieldhouse, Feb. 26, 1949; 75, scored vs. Creighton in fieldhouse, Jan. 8, 1949; 74, scored against Chicago, Feb. 8, 1943, in fieldhouse; also scored 74 points against Chicago in 1944; 72, scored against Purdue, in 1947 (first half at Purdue, second half at Evanston, Ill. township high school).

Most points single game (two teams)—134 (California 73, Wisconsin 61, at Berkeley, Dec. 19, 1947); 132, scored in 1943 at Chicago Stadium (Wisconsin 67, Northwestern 65); 132, scored in 1947 (Wisconsin 72, Purdue 60); fieldhouse record—130 (Wisconsin 67, Marquette 63, overtime game, Dec. 4, 1948).

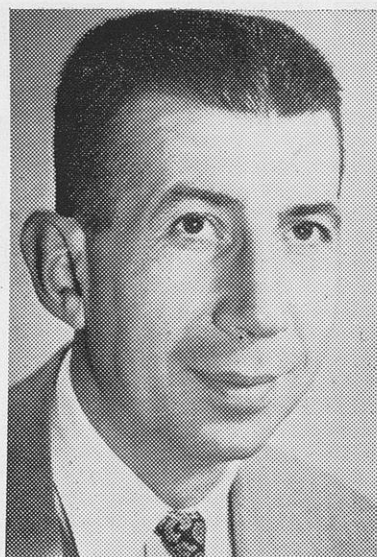

Three Western Conference championships, one National Collegiate Athletic Association title, and two runners-up in Big Ten play during 15 seasons of varsity coaching are the highlights in the career of Harold E. "Bud" Foster, University of Wisconsin head basketball coach.

Born in Newton, Kansas, May 30, 1906, Bud had the distinction of being the heaviest baby ever born in that state; he tipped the scales at 13 $\frac{3}{4}$ pounds.

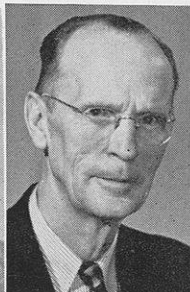
Because Newton did not offer any high school facilities, Bud prepped at Mason City, Iowa, high school, then went to Chicago. He entered Wisconsin in 1926, studying economics and playing basketball. He was all-conference center in the seasons of 1929 and 1930; also earned All-American honors in 1930.

Graduating in June, 1930, Foster played professional basketball with Chicago and Oshkosh (All Stars) teams, selling seeds for an Oshkosh firm during the off-seasons. In 1933, he was named freshman coach at Wisconsin and stepped into the varsity coaching spot when Dr. Walter E. Meanwell resigned in 1934.

Foster's initial team tied for the conference crown, then spent the next five years in the conference second division. But, in 1941, he welded together a fine group of players which, after a poor start, won their last 15 games to snare both Big Ten and NCAA championships. His last championship team was in 1946-47 and these cagers also finished third in the Eastern NCAA regional meet of 1947.

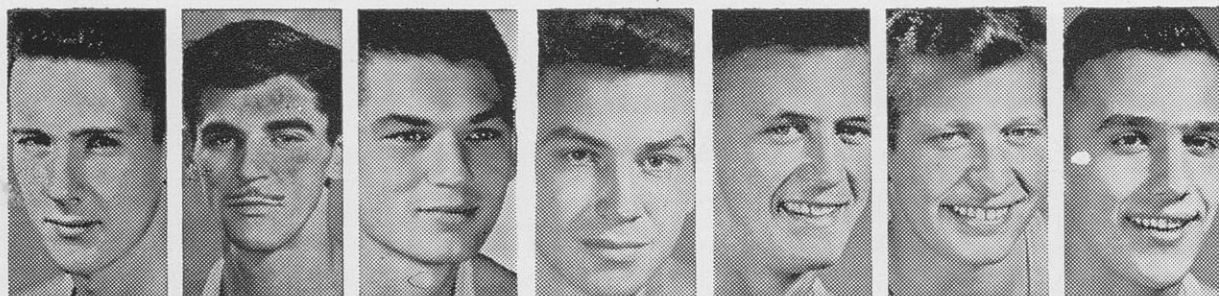

Like Foster, Fred "Fritz" Wegner, assistant coach, is a graduate of Wisconsin and also played on the Oshkosh All-Star pro cage teams. Fred, who is regarded as one of the keenest scouts in collegiate basketball and an ideal assistant coach, played guard on the Wisconsin varsity teams of 1934-35-36; also was first baseman on the baseball teams of those same years. He starred in basketball, baseball, and track at Oshkosh high school.

Fred came to Wisconsin as an assistant coach in basketball one year after his graduation, later on adding the baseball duties in 1939 as an assistant to Art Mansfield.

Bruce Fossum Assistant Coach

Bruce Fossum, a major letterman on four of Foster's recent teams, is the graduate assistant member of the coaching staff. An all-around sports star at Ashland high school, Bruce was named as all-state tournament guard in 1945. He graduated from Wisconsin in June, 1949, and now is taking advanced work in physical education.

Forward . . . sophomore . . . 6-3 . . . 180 . . . 19 . . . Rockford, Ill.—Illinois All-State center in 1943 . . . State tournament individual high scorer . . . member of East Rockford five, state runner-up in 1948 . . . third in Illinois state interscholastic individual golf tourney and member of the state championship team . . . won frosh numerals last year . . . majoring in mechanical engineering . . . Birthdate was Feb. 9, 1931.

FRED BENCISCUTTO (32)

Forward . . . junior . . . 6-1 . . . 165 . . . 24 . . . Racine.—Entered Wisconsin in 1948 as a transfer student from the University of Wisconsin Extension School at Racine . . . Was the leading scorer for the Racine Extension five . . . Played on the Racine Horlick prep cage team . . . Won the Big Eight golf crown while attending Horlick . . . Won junior "W" with the Badger cagers last year . . . Won a major "W" with the Wisconsin golf team last spring . . . Birthdate was Nov. 1, 1924.

WILLIAM BUECHL (10)

Forward . . . sophomore . . . 6-1 . . . 178 . . . 19 . . . Wauwatosa—All-State forward on the state championship Wauwatosa basketball team . . . Also All-Suburban in 1947 and 1948 . . . Won three emblems as a fullback on the grid team and two others as an infielder on the baseball team . . . majoring in mechanical engineering . . . Birthdate was Aug. 4, 1930.

Forward . . . sophomore . . . 6-2 . . . 183 . . . 19 . . . Madison—Was a forward and guard on the 1948 Madison West basketball team . . . Starred in tennis for three years and was a member of the 1947 state high school championship team . . . Entered in the School of Commerce . . . Won his numerals with Wisconsin's freshman cage team last season. Birthdate was Mar. 6, 1930.

Guard . . . sophomore . . . 6-0 . . . 170 . . . 18 . . .
Beloit—A member of Beloit's state high school championship cage team of 1947 . . . All-Big Eight guard in 1948 . . . Played end on the 1948 Beloit Big Eight football team that copped the conference title . . . Entered in the Commerce School . . . Won his Freshman numerals in basketball last season . . . Birthdate was Dec. 14, 1930.

ROBERT MADER (39)

Guard . . . senior . . . 6-1½ . . . 175 . . . 21 . . . Wis-
consin Rapids—Will be after his fourth major "W" this year having earned his first as a freshman in 1947 . . . Was third high among Badger scorers last year with 139 points . . . All-Conference guard for two years while playing with Lincoln high school in Wisconsin Rapids . . . Also played in the state high school tourney in 1946 . . . JAMES MOORE (44)

Guard or center . . . senior . . . 6-4 . . . 210 . . . 21 . . .
Stevens Point—Gunning for his third major "W" His rebound ability should assure him of having his best season this year . . . In 1948 he had a shooting average of .324 and last year wound up with an average of .286 . . . Was coached by a former Badger football and basketball star, Russ Rebholtz, at Stevens Point high school . . . An all-conference performer for two years at Stevens Point . . . Won individual scoring honors in his final year . . . Majoring in physical education . . . Birthdate was Oct. 15, 1928.

ALBERT NICHOLAS (8)

Guard . . . sophomore . . . 6-3 . . . 168 . . . 18 . . .
Rockford, Ill.—One of the outstanding members of last year's freshman basketball team . . . At West Rockford (Ill.) high school he gained all-Conference honors in the Illinois Big Eight and second team on the Illinois All-State . . . Was co-captain in 1948 . . . son—Was a nine letter winner under Coach Willis Jones at Madison West . . . A member of the state high school championship five of 1945 . . . At West he competed in football, basketball, track and tennis . . . Was in service for one year . . . After two years on the Badger junior varsity cage squad he broke in as a regular last year . . . He had the best free throw percentage last season making 40 out of 51 attempts . . . He won a major letter on the Badger tennis team last spring. Birthdate was Aug. 8, 1927.

BOB PETRUSKA (24)

Guard . . . junior . . . 5-11 . . . 185 . . . 20 . . . Lake
Mills—One of two Badger football players on the Wisconsin basketball squad . . . He compiled an impressive record at Lake Mills High school . . . Starred in football, basketball, golf and baseball . . . He was the key player on the L-Cats, four straight years conference basketball champs . . . Was all-state halfback in 1945 and 1946 . . . Finished Lake Mills with 10 letters . . . Last year he won a junior award on the Badger cage team . . . Has won two major letters in football . . . The past season he developed into one of the best quarterbacks in the conference . . . Majoring in physical education . . . Birthdate was July 28, 1929.

DON REHFELDT (23)

Center . . . senior . . . 6-6½ . . . 215 . . . 22 . . . Chi-
icago, Ill.—Almost completely rewrote Wisconsin's individual scoring records last year . . . Possesses one of the best left-handed hook shots in Badger history . . . This is his fourth year in a Wisconsin uniform . . . Was a member of Wisconsin's 1947 conference champions . . . Graduated from Amundsen high school in Chicago, Ill., where he was a star cager . . . Entered Wisconsin in 1944 and after one semester joined the army . . . He re-entered Wisconsin in 1947 . . . Played with the 41st Division All-Stars, winner of the Pacific Olympics cage title . . . Has chosen coaching as his future profession but will probably put in a few years of professional basketball . . . Birthdate was Jan. 7, 1927.

ROBERT REMSTAD (50)

Center . . . junior . . . 6-4 . . . 195 . . . 21 . . . Kenosha.
 Gained athletic fame in football, basketball, and track at Kenosha high school . . . He graduated from there in 1945 . . . That fall he played end on the Badger football team . . . After the grid season he entered service and was discharged in 1947 . . . He was awarded a junior "W" last season playing with the Badger JayVee cagers . . . Birthdate was Mar. 24, 1928.

All-Time History of Wisconsin Basketball

BASKETBALL was introduced at Wisconsin in 1898, just six years after its origination, with five former Milwaukee East Side high school lads, who had learned the game at the YMCA, as its sponsors. These young men were Walter Hirschberg, Paul Stover, John Mapel, Carl Stillman, and Bob Burdick.

This quintet played a few games with amateur teams, the university backing the venture to the extent of furnishing the use of a gym, free air, and light. John Hickey, janitor at the gym and a famous character of that day, referred to the group as the "squat tag" team.

No one then had any idea to what extent the sport of basketball would develop or the degree of success and popularity it would eventually attain here.

The game existed after a fashion and it is a tribute to its natural attraction that it flourished despite complete lack of official support. When the call for candidates was issued in 1903, more than 125 men reported. They had to buy their own suits, shoes, and finance their own games, the athletic association generously donating a basketball now and then.

But in 1904, Emmett D. Angell came to Wisconsin as a gym instructor and it was he who gave real impetus to the sport of basketball. He was the first real coach and a driving one. Some excellent players were developed and some real team work was developed. Leading players at the time were Chris Steinmetz, Harvey Schofield, Charles McLess, and Stewart McConochie.

Wisconsin had played and lost to a touring Yale team 35-20 in 1901-02 season. Minnesota also had appeared on the schedule, the Gophers winning 30-10, to inflict one of three losses on the Wisconsin nine-game slate of that season. After another successful season which counted up five wins against two defeats in the 1902-03 schedule, Wisconsin became ambitious and carded 13 games for the 1903-04 year. The Badgers won 10 of those games, touring the midwest and playing the best representative teams of that season.

The 1904-05 outfit was quite a team, although its record of eight wins against nine setbacks does not compare favorably with other seasons. That team made an extensive tour of the East and learned a lot of basketball, playing Columbia, Eastern Intercollegiate champions, and the outstanding independent club teams in New York and Pennsylvania. Columbia beat Wisconsin 21-15. The Columbia game was a rough one, Captain Steinmetz emerging with a cracked jawbone. Steinmetz, along with Bob Zuppke, who later gained football coaching fame at Illinois, were the only members of the Wisconsin team who played every minute of that nine-game Eastern trip. Wisconsin returned to the midwest and challenged Chicago which then was claiming the western title. The Maroons were beaten 29-24 and the Badgers promptly claimed the territorial title honors.

By the 1905-06 season, Wisconsin was playing a representative conference schedule, winding up second in the Big Ten. With a similar 6-2 won and lost record in conference play the next season, the Badgers shared the title and also came in for a piece of the crown in the 1907-08 campaign but lost to Chicago 18-16 in a special playoff.

The Badgers played their first 12-game conference schedule in the season of 1909-10, winding up third

with eight wins and four defeats. Fifth place was the best Wisconsin could do the next year but with the coming of Dr. Walter Meanwell as coach for the 1911-12 season, basketball really began to boom. His first team was unbeaten in Big Ten play, winning the title. His 1912-13 team lost but one game, again taking the crown. And the next season produced another unbeaten conference team. The boom was on!

In his first 10 years at Wisconsin Meanwell produced seven title teams. By the time he retired in 1934, he could point to nine championships and three runner-up spots.

Meanwell's revolutionary coaching methods were largely responsible for Wisconsin's success during his early regime. The short pass, criss-cross plays, dribble and block style of play used by Meanwell coached teams simply had conference competition stymied.

His record still is the best in the conference and he added luster to it when he left Wisconsin twice to coach at Missouri and each time produced a Missouri Valley conference championship team.

Meanwell coached teams always ranked high in conference ratings. Otto Stangel, forward in 1912, held the single game field goal mark of 13 for many years and was a scoring leader in the conference.

The Meanwell teams of that era excelled on defense. The 1911-12 team held its opponents to an average of 15 points a game and the next year, the average still was less than 16 points. The 1923-24 team never had more than 20 points a game scored against them.

When Meanwell resigned in 1934, he was instrumental in having Harold "Bud" Foster appointed as his successor. "Bud," who gained All-Conference and All-American rating as a center in the years of 1929 and 1930, graduated in 1930, played pro basketball with the Oshkosh All-Stars, then was named freshman coach at Wisconsin in 1933.

Foster's first team, the 1934-35 unit, tied for the Western Conference crown. Then came five years of doldrums, chiefly caused by lack of material for the high caliber of competition of the Conference. But in the 1940-41 season, "Bud" was able to weld a winning combination, which, after a poor start, won 15 straight games to wind up as Big Ten and NCAA champions. Starring for that title team were Gene Englund, center; and John Kotz, forward, both of whom won All-American honors before they were graduated.

Wisconsin was given little hope for the 1946-47 season but the Badgers really confounded the experts.

Wisconsin won the Conference crown with a second-half defeat of Purdue a week after the regular season had ended. A bleacher crash at Lafayette, Ind., had halted the Wisconsin-Purdue game at half-time, and the game, which was to determine Wisconsin's title chances, was not completed until 10 days later at Evanston, Ill. Wisconsin lost to City College of New York in the opening game of the Eastern NCAA tournament but defeated Navy in the playoff for third place. Star players for the Badgers included Bob Cook, conference leading scorer and All-American choice; Glenn Selbo and Walt Lautenbach, all-conference guards.
