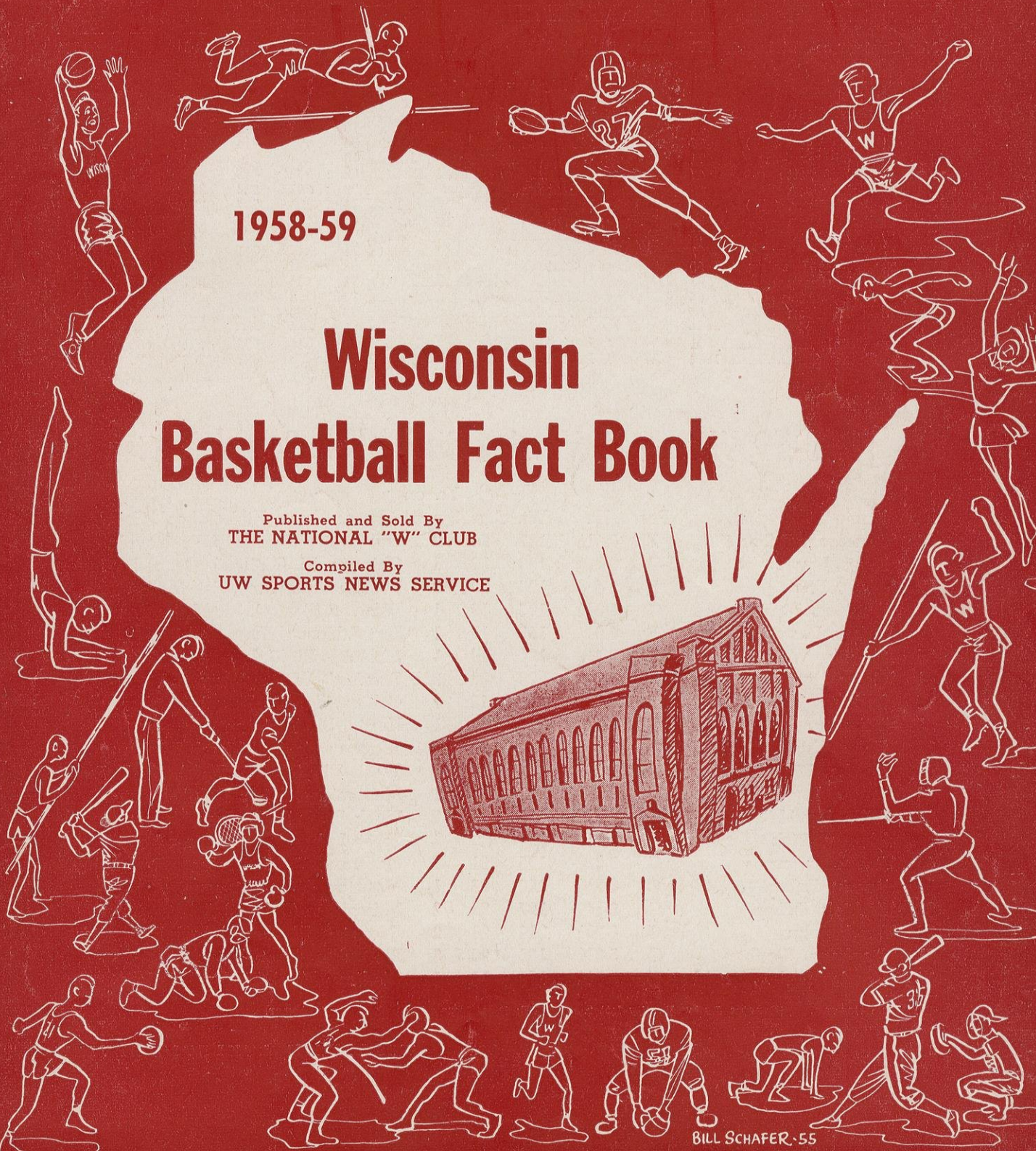

Badger Basketball Could Surprise

Badger basketball fortunes should be back on the upswing this season as Head Coach Harold E. "Bud" Foster starts his 25th season as head mentor for the Badgers. Foster will have eight returning lettermen plus a host of promising sophomores with which to try to better last year's last place finish.

The outlook would be even brighter if Foster had departed veterans Bob Litzow, forward, and Walter "Bunk" Holt, guard and most valuable player, returning for action this year. Litzow led the Badgers in scoring last year with 324 points, while Holt totaled 295 tallies. Finding replacements for this pair that tallied 619 points of the Badgers' 1382-point offense last season presents Foster and his coaching aides with a major problem.

Three starters from last year's squad form the nucleus of this year's quintet. Center Ray Gross, guard Brian Kulas and forward Bob Barneson are all returning with another year of experience under their belts and promise to play a large role in forming the current squad. Gross, who will graduate at mid-term, is a 6-7 center who was fifth in Badger scoring last year. He tallied 140 points in 22 games while leading the Badgers in rebounding. Ray is a hustler and has shown pre-season indications of becoming a very steady ball player.

Kulas is a rangy, 6-6 guard, who placed third in Badger scoring last season with a total output of 197 points. He is one of the tallest guards in the Big 10 and can always be counted on for a good performance. Brian drives well and his rebounding played an important part in last year's campaign.

The third returning starter is 6-4 forward Bob Barneson from Eau Claire, Wis. Barney totaled 147 points last year and was second to Gross in the rebound department. He is potentially one of the finest shots on the squad and a very capable ball handler. Bob has shown signs of being ready for a very good year with his pre-season play.

Other lettermen returning include forwards John Stack, who won a letter as a center last year before being injured, and Fred Clow, and three guards, all of whom saw action as a starter at various times during the course of 1957-58. The backcourt veterans include Bob Serbiak, Jim Rogneby, and Steve Stephens.

Serbiak started last season as one of Foster's first team guards, and was immediately tabbed as the playmaker on the squad. Later in the year he gave way to Kulas, but showed signs of being a dependable clutch ball player. Rogneby and Stephens saw limited action, but are in contention for important roles in this season's race.

Clow, a 6-5 forward from Rockford, Ill., played in only 13 games last year but managed to pick off 54 rebounds. He is a promising shot and should see a lot of action this year.

The return of 6-7 center John Stack brings smiles to the coaching staff. Stack, who started to have a fine year last season, was injured early in the season against Rice and was forced to sit out the rest of the games.

Stack appears to be fully recovered from the injury, and will receive a thorough test at forward opposite Barneson in the early season games. Foster must also depend on John for center duty once the first semester's action is concluded, as Gross will graduate at that time. A healthy Stack could mean a successful season for the Badgers.

The rest of the squad is made up primarily of sophomores, who can be counted on as valuable additions to the Badger team. Early season workouts have singled out three promising new faces. Ivan Jefferson, 6-3 forward from Colp, Illinois, has shown signs of being Big 10 material and is currently fighting for

a starting berth. Ivan is an all-stater from Illinois and captained last year's freshman team. He's a good rebounder for his size and an excellent shot. Jefferson should be heard from this year.

Another all-stater from south of the border in Illinois is 6-4 Tom Jackson. Tom rebounded and shot very well for the freshmen and has been impressive thus far for the varsity in their workouts. He hooks well with either hand and with his 230 pound frame he commands a lot of respect under the boards.

Bob Rossin from Mauston, Wis., is the third promising sophomore prospect. Bob's a 6-7 pivot man who should see a lot of action, especially after Gross' graduation.

Junior varsity award winner Rick Murray, along with Dave Mills and Dick Dutrisac, round out the guard prospects at this point. All three are good shots and capable play makers, with Murray being groomed for a possible starting role. Murray showed well at times last year, including a "hot" night against Wyoming when he tallied 15 points, but lacked consistency. Dutrisac was an all-state Wisconsin guard as a senior at Wausau high school and shows much promise. He stand 6-3, and his height would help the Badgers in the back court.

Forward ranks should be bolstered by the return of Jim Biggs, numeral winner in 1956. Biggs is a deadly shot and could well be the surprise of this year's squad.

All in all, the year could be full of many surprises. The Badgers haven't been conceded much of a chance in the Big 10 race according to pre-season picks, but could be instrumental in upsetting more than one of the championship-bound apple carts.

Wisconsin's Head Basketball Coach

Dean of the Western Conference basketball coaches, Harold E. "Bud" Foster embarks on his 25th season in charge of Badger cage fortunes with official recognition nationally of his ranking as a top-rated coach.

Bud is a past president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches (1956) of the United States, and in August of 1955 was a member of a coaching clinic that toured Japan under the auspices of the Far East Army Command.

Born in Newton, Kansas, May 30, 1906, Bud had the distinction of being the heaviest baby ever born in that state; he tipped the scales at 13¾ pounds.

Because Newton did not offer any high school facilities, Bud prepped at Mason City, Iowa, high school, then went to Chicago. He entered Wisconsin in 1926, studying economics and playing basketball. He was all-conference center in the seasons of 1929 and 1930; also earned All-American honors in 1930.

Graduating in June, 1930, Foster played professional basketball with Chicago and Oshkosh (All-Stars) teams, selling seeds for an Oshkosh firm during the off-seasons. In 1933, he was named freshman coach at Wisconsin and stepped into the varsity coaching spot when Dr. Walter E. Meanwell resigned in 1934.

Foster's initial team tied for the conference crown in 1935, then spent the next five years in the conference second division. But, in 1941, he welded together a fine group of players which, after a poor start, won their last 15 games to snare both Big Ten and NCAA championships. His last championship team was in 1946-47 and these cagers also finished third in the Eastern NCAA regional meet in 1947.

Included in the record of Foster-coached Wisconsin teams the past 23 years are second place finishes in 1942, 1944, and 1950. In overall play, Foster's teams have won 262 games, losing 248.

Assistant Coach "Fritz" Wegner

Like Foster, Fred "Fritz" Wegner, assistant coach, is a graduate of Wisconsin and also played on the Oshkosh All-Star pro cage teams.

Fred is regarded as one of the keenest scouts in collegiate basketball and an ideal assistant coach.

"Fritz" as he is known around Big Ten and national collegiate basketball circles, played guard on Wisconsin teams that won 40 games, lost 20 during his collegiate career, including a 21 won, 15 lost record in Big Ten competition that was highlighted by his play on the 1935 championship team, Foster's first coached Wisconsin team.

His athletic ability was not limited to the hardwood, as he played first base on the Badger baseball teams of the same years. He was a good "glove" man, and an adequate hitter.

Fred is an Oshkosh, Wisconsin native, and starred in basketball, baseball, and track at Oshkosh high school in the early thirties.

He came to Wisconsin as an assistant coach in basketball one year after his graduation, commencing duties in 1937, and adding the job of assistant in baseball in 1940. He also teaches in the physical education program at Wisconsin, holding the title of associate professor.

During the past thirteen summers, Fred has been in charge of the Madison Boys' Baseball program, which annually provides competition for upwards of 1500 Madison youths between 8 and 15 years of age.

Fred is married and has one daughter.

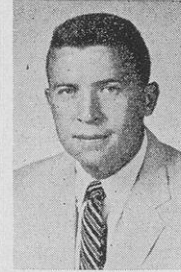

Erickson Is New Cage Assistant

Meet John Erickson, the new full-time assistant to Basketball Coach Harold E. "Bud" Foster. John is 30 years old, and a native of Rockford, Ill., graduating from East High school there in 1945.

His collegiate career coincided with the rise of Beloit College to national prominence, and he became the first Buccaneer ever to tally over 1000 points in a career. He rated All-Midwest Conference honors three straight seasons, and in his senior year gained Little All-American first team recognition. He also served as Beloit basketball team captain his junior and senior years. At Beloit, he was schooled in fast-break basketball.

Erickson coached three years in Wisconsin following graduation—2 years at Stevens Point's P. J. Jacobs High School (39 games won, 8 lost) and one year at Beloit High school (14 games won, 11 lost)—before entering military service, serving as a recreational specialist and athletic coach in the army. His 1952 Stevens Point High school team placed second in the state cage tournament, and his Beloit team the following year also reached the state tourney, being eliminated in the first round by the eventual champion, Menasha.

John coached two of Coach Foster's all-time high scorers—Dick Cable (1180 points in four years), and Bob Litzow (938 points in three years)—while they were in high school at Stevens Point.

Following service, John became head coach at Lake Forest College, winning 34 games, losing 38 over the past three years, with a 14-9 mark in his first year, 7-17 in 1956-57, and 13-12 during the past season.

Badgers In Hall of Fame

University of Wisconsin basketball coaches and players have been honored by being named to the Helms Hall College Basketball Hall of Fame in the past few years.

Chris Steinmetz, all-time Wisconsin high scorer with 462 points in 1904-05, and captain of that team, was named to the Hall of Fame in 1957, and George Levis, co-captain of the 1917 Wisconsin team, was named this past year to a place among the all-time greats.

Wisconsin is also represented by Coaches Walter E. Meanwell and Harold E. 'Bud' Foster, who have been Wisconsin's only basketball coaches since 1920, in the Hall of Fame.

A Wisconsin graduate and co-captain with George Levis of the 1917 team, Harold Olsen, is also listed among the all-time great coaches of the game in the Helms Hall of Fame. Olsen did much of his collegiate coaching at Ohio State, though he started his career as coach at Ripon College, and closed it at Northwestern.
