

### 1961-62 Wisconsin Basketball Prospects

Wisconsin's 1961-62 basketball hopes rest with a nucleus of six returning lettermen and an outstanding group of sophomore personnel that observers feel may be the finest first-year players for the Badgers in

many a season.

The Badgers, coached by personable John Erickson, now in his third year as the guiding hand of the school's cage fortunes, hope to continue their rise to the first division in the coming Big Ten campaign. Each year under Erickson the Badgers have moved up a notch — from tenth to ninth in his first season with a 4-10 record, and from ninth to eighth last year, again with a 4-10 record.

Lone returning senior is forward Tom Hughbanks, who at six feet, five and one-half, 208 pounds, has ranked as the school's leading scorer during his first two seasons of competition. Tom scored 312 points in 24 games as a sophomore and last year tallied 301 points in 23 games. He has established himself as the eleventh best scorer in Wisconsin basketball history, and he has the opportunity to move higher on the

all-time list during the coming campaign.

Four junior lettermen available include Ken Siebel. the team's second leading scorer last year with 283 points in 24 games, and the leading Wisconsin scorer in the Big Ten with 198 points in 14 games, good for a tie for sixteenth place in the final conference individual scoring tables. Siebel, from Rock Falls, Illinois, stands six feet, five, weighs 195, and can play either forward or guard. He is a fine defensive player and ranked as the Badgers' third best rebounder a year ago. He was named Wisconsin's most valuable basketball player as a sophomore, first Badger cager to receive that honor as a sophomore since Bob Cook

Other juniors available include Tom Gwyn, a 6-7 center; Hugh 'Pat' Richter, a reserve center a year ago; and Lonnie Ostrom, a 6-5, 190-pounder from Silvis, Ill. Gwyn, who improved rapidly a year ago at center, hails from Milwaukee's Messmer High School and proved to be the second best rebounder on the varsiyt, grabbing 182 rebounds in 24 games and scoring 166 points for the year.

Ostrom, who played vital roles as a reserve during the stretch run last season, shows signs of developing into a good scorer, and his hustle will pick the Badgers up when he enters a game this season. His scoring was inconsistent last year-just 26 points in 13 gamesbut Coach Erickson has hopes that he will develop that knack of getting clutch baskets when needed

Richter, who won Major "W" letters in three sports as a sophomore, again will be hampered by a late start on the cage court, but his height and rebounding ability will aid the Badgers once he has shaken off his 'football legs'. Pat was recruited by the basketball staff originally, and it is ironic that his finest success in collegiate athletics to date has been on the gridiron, and in baseball (he batted .398 in 29 games last spring). He scored 37 points a year ago in 13 cage games—14 against Washington State, and will be a welcome addition to the 1961-62 squad.

Ron Jackson, a second-semester sophomore, won his major "W" award for his exciting play in the second half of last year's schedule after gaining eligibility at the end of the first semester. Hailing from Chicago's Tilden Tech High School, Jackson scored 167 points in 12 games - best average of any Badger per game last year—and thrilled the crowds with his "stuffing" of the basket when he had the opportunity. His finest games were against Indiana,

tallying 26 points in each game.

The untested sophomores show promise of breaking their way into the Badgers' starting line-up and include guard Dave Grams, Monroe; forward Gene Englund, Jr., Oshkosh, son of the Badger great of twenty years ago who paced Wisconsin to the 1941 NCAA basketball title; guard Don Hearden, Kimberly; and Mike O'Melia, another guard, who hails from Rhinelander and appears capable of pacing the Badgers downcourt on the fast break.

Other first-year men who rate high include Ed Laskos, a six foot, seven, center or forward from Oregon, Illinois; Jack Brens, a six foot, eight boy from St. Charles, Illinois; and Tom Graika, a six foot, four, forward or guard from Milwaukee South High

Don Hearden is a fine defensive player, and if he gains confidence as a scorer, will definitely aid the

Badgers in the backcourt.

Grams was a fine shot in high school basketball, ranking as one of the state's all-time great scorers at Monroe, while Englund is a strong rebounder. O'Melia is rated a fine fast-break type guard, and will probably be the starter in the backcourt when the season opens.

Brens, who has many good moves, may develop into the 'big' man at center that the Badgers have been searching for these many years. He has good moves, is a good shot, and shows strength under the offensive and defensive backboards.

All in all, the Badgers of 1961-1962 will have speed and power to make the fast-break attack function properly and will be improved both offensively and

defensively over a year ago.

The coaching staff, headed by John Erickson, will again include John Orr and Ron Nord, each also starting their third season in the role of assistant

The schedule is attractive, including home games against Cincinnati (Dec. 9) and Ohio State (March 3) in the Wisconsin Fieldhouse. Cincinnati defeated Ohio State 70 to 65 last year in overtime to win the NCAA

The Badgers play Ohio State, Indiana, and Purdue, all title contenders last year, once each, with the Buckeyes and Boilermakers being met at home. Northwestern is also met once, and with Indiana, will be faced on the road.

### MEET HEAD COACH JOHN ERICKSON

John Erickson, Wisconsin's young and ever optimistic basketball coach, starts his third year as head coach of the sport at Wisconsin, and the former Beloit Little All-American selection has the Badgers

climbing back on the road to success they once enjoyed in the game.

In John's first year, the Badgers won eight games, lost 16, and placed 9th in the Big Ten. Last year, the Badgers won 7, lost 17, but matched their Big Ten record of 4 wins, 10 defeats, and moved up to 8th place ni the final standings.

Erickson and his staff have accomplished much in teaching the Badgers the fastbreak style of basketball, and, while the offense has proved exciting, the 1960-61 Badger cagers showed fine improvement


on defense too.

Wisconsin figures to improve considerably on its overall record during the current campaign, despite a home schedule that includes NCAA champion Cincinnati, Big Ten champion and NCAA runner-up

Ohio State, and Purdue, featuring Terry Dischinger.

John's a native of Rockford, Ill., where he prepped at East High before entering Beloit College where he became the first player in Beloit's history to score



After graduation he moved to Stevens Point, Wisconsin where his teams won 39 games against only 7 defeats in two seasons. His 1951-52 squad came to the State Tournament and was defeated in the Championship finals. In the 1952-53 season he coached at Beloit High School. winning 14 games and losing 11. His team made the State Tournament, being eliminated by the eventual champion, Menasha, in the first round

Two years of Army service followed the Beloit High School job, and upon returning from the service in 1955 he took over the head coaching spot at Lake Forest, Illinois, College. His overall record for three seasons at Lake Forest was 37 wins against 35 defeats.

In April of 1958 he was appointed assistant coach at Wisconsin, becoming head coach when Bud Foster resigned at the completion of the 1958-59 season.

The Badger coach is 33 years old, married and has one daughter.

### JOHN ORR — Assistants — RON NORD

John Orr begins his third season as assistant coach to John Erickson, a man with whom he played on the outstanding Beloit College teams following World War II. Orr achieved fame as a prep star at Taylorville, Illinois high school, gained more honors as a collegian at Beloit, and extended his success to the

high school coaching field in basketball as well as football.

John was a member of the famed Taylorville, Illinois high team that completed an unbeaten season of 45 consecutive wins to annex the 1944 Illinois State high school championship. Following high school, he enrolled at the University of Illinois where he played both football (end) and basketball (forward) in 1944-45 school year, gaining second team Big Ten honors in football, and honorable mention in basketball.

His college career was interrupted by service in the Marine Corps, and he coached and

Corps, and he coached and played on the Mare Island, California football team that won 19 games, lost just five games in 1945-46.

Returning from service, he followed his prep

Returning from service, he followed his prep coach, Dolph Stanley, to Beloit College, and helped build that school into a nationally recognized basketball power. The 6-3, 33-year-old Orr was three times named to the All-Midwest Conference team, and gained the NAIB All-American basketball first team in both the 1947 and 1948 seasons.

After his graduation from Beloit in 1949 he played with the Peoria Caterpillars in the National AAU tournament and also spent the 1949-50 season playing professional basketball with the St. Louis Bombers and the Waterloo Hawks of the old National Basketball Association.

He started his high school coaching days at Milton Union High in Milton, Wis. At Milton his team won 15 against 7 losses. In 1951 he moved to Dubuque Ron Nord enters his third season as assistant to John Erickson, and the former Badger—he is a 1950 graduate of Wisconsin, earning major "W" awards in basketball as a guard under "Bud" Foster, and in baseball as an infielder under the tutelage of "Dynie" Mansfield—turned in a fine first year of coaching the

Wisconsin freshman team, which this year has produced several outstanding sophomores for the Varsity.

Coach Nord is from Minneapolis, Minn., where he played his prep ball at Minneapolis South High School. In high school he was All-City in football, basketball and baseball.

He entered the United States Air Force during World War II, where he played basketball and baseball in addition to his regular duties of working on the Atom Bomb Project.

His career coaching record totals 115 wins against only 66

defeats. He started his coaching days at Beaver Dam, Wis., where his teams won 26 while losing 12 starts. After Beaver Dam he moved to Oshkosh in the tough Fox River Valley Conference where his teams won 89 and lost 54.

At Oshkosh his teams won the Valley Crown in 1954-55 and 1955-56. He brought his 1954 squad to the State Tournament where they were eliminated by the eventual champion, Stevens Point, in the semi-final round.

Ron is married and has five children.

Senior High in Dubuque, Iowa where his teams posted a 103-71 mark from 1951-59. In addition to basketball he coached football in 1957 and 1958 seasons, compiling a 9-6-1 record, and this past autumn was an assistant freshman football coach at Wisconsin.

John is married and has four daughters.


