

Wisconsin Basketball Prospects

Wisconsin's 1961-1962 Basketball team was the surprise of the nation, posting a fine 17-7 over-all record, placing second in the Big Ten with a 10-4 mark, and gaining runner-up honors in the Holiday Festival in New York's Madison Square Garden.

The Badgers added to their lustre with a rousing 86-67 whipping of conference champion Ohio State here at Madison, ending a long 22-game winning streak by the eventual NCAA runners-up.

The talented young men who compiled the school's best record since 1950 return for 1962-1963 action, and in some quarters they are rated as a topflight contender to succeed Ohio State as Big Ten champion. Wisconsin has not won a basketball title in the conference since 1947, longest drought by the Badgers since the Big Ten began basketball competition in 1906.

Coach John Erickson, ably assisted by John Orr, welcomes back eight major lettermen from last year's team that provided thrills galore. There's Ken Siebel, 6-4, 195 pound senior forward from Rock Falls, Ill., the Badgers' most valuable player the past two years, and the Big Ten's seventh leading scorer a year ago.

The exciting backcourt duo of juniors Don Hearden, 6-0, 170, Kimberly, and Mike O'Melia, 5-11, 150, Rhinelander, remains intact. Hearden was Wisconsin's second leading scorer last year, including a 29 point production that helped stun Ohio State. O'Melia thrilled the fans with his blinding speed, deft ball handling, and paced the Badgers' fast break down the court.

Centers Jack Brens, a 6-8, 193 junior from St. Charles, Ill., and Tom Gwyn, a 6-6, 200 pound senior from Milwaukee, return, and both enjoyed fine seasons a year ago. Brens developed fast, and though idled by a hand injury while the Badgers were winning their way into the Holiday Festival finals, he was Wisconsin's fourth best scorer for last year. Gwyn, who also played forward, proved an invaluable front court man, and set Wisconsin's rebounding pace for the season. He had his best scoring night against Dayton in New York with 29 points.

Lon Ostrom, 6-4, 1833, Silvis, Ill., was a fine reserve performer, who came off the bench time after time to give the Badgers a needed boost at critical moments of each game.

Gene Englund, Jr., son of the center on Wisconsin's 1941 Big Ten and NCAA championship team, added depth to the Badgers' front line and picked up valuable playing time as he gained his baptism playing collegiate basketball.

Eighth letterman returning is Hugh V. 'Pat' Richter, 6-6, 229 pound center, better known as an All-American end on the football team. Pat has won letters in football, basketball, and baseball during the first two years of his varsity career at Wisconsin, and proved to be a fine asset to the basketball team.

His fourteen point scoring burst in Madison Square Garden last December helped the Badgers upset Providence College in first round play. Pat's a rugged rebounder and came up with clutch performances several times as the Badgers battled for the Big Ten title last winter.

Newcomers expected to contribute to the 1962-1963 team include forwards Charles Aslakson, Marshfield, Wis., and Billy Barrow, Alexandria, Va.; and guard Jim Bohlen, 5-9, Reedsburg. Both Aslakson and Bohlen rated all-state mention for their play two years ago in state high school basketball.

Last year's Badger cagers played the game close to the belt, winning eight of nine games decided by six points or less. Only close game they lost was a two point decision to Minnesota at Madison late in February that eliminated them at the time from the Big Ten title chase. The Badgers won two one-point victories—64-63 over Florida State at home, and 65-64 over Northwestern at Evanston, Ill. They won a high scoring 103-101 decision from Illinois at Madison, and used three points to beat Purdue 89-86 on the Fieldhouse floor. Four points was the margin as the Badgers beat Illinois at Champaign by 85-81.

Five point wins were registered twice over Michigan State (83-78 and 77-72) in a home and home series, and the Badgers broke a tight game open with a last minute rally to score a 94-88 win over Minnesota at Minneapolis.

The 1961-62 Badgers were the highest scoring, finest shooting team ever at Wisconsin, and they'll be asked to do much of the same if they are to equal their winning record of last season.

The veteran talent is capable and the only foreseeable problem is having to use both Tom Gwyn and Jack Brens in the line-up at the same time this year. A year ago, they alternated, and whenever Coach Erickson looked to the bench he had a rested reserve. This depth problem may not be solved until Pat Richter reports for the sport after the Rose Bowl game on January 1, 1963.

The schedule remains rugged, with the Badgers slated to meet such fine nonconference foes as Air Force Academy, Arizona, Texas Western, Miami (O.), UCLA, Marquette, and St. John's of Brooklyn, N. Y. Air Force and Arizona will be met away from home, the others at Madison.

The Badgers will also be co-hosts in the first annual Milwaukee Basketball Classic with Marquette, and Utah and Navy will provide topflight competition.

The Big Ten schedule features seven home games, including Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Minnesota, and Northwestern, all of whom figure to be challengers with Wisconsin for the conference championship—up for grabs now that Ohio State has graduated Jerry Lucas, John Havlicek, and Mel Nowell.

Meet Badger Coaches . . .

JOHN ERICKSON

John Erickson begins his fourth campaign as head coach at Wisconsin and he has high hopes that his Badger cagers can continue the winning pattern they established last season with a 17-7 overall record. Pre-season ratings place the Badgers 8th in the nation for 1962-63.

The 1961-62 season produced a second place Big Ten finish, highest for a Wisconsin cage team since 1950, and the 10-4 conference record was best ever for a Wisconsin team since the Big Ten adopted the fourteen game conference schedule in 1951.

Additionally, victories over highly ranked Providence and Dayton in the Holiday Festival in New York's Madison Square Garden and a resounding 86-67 conquest of Ohio State at Madison to end the Buckeyes' 22 game winning streak brought national attention to the Badger five.

Erickson and his staff accomplished much in teaching the Badgers the techniques of the fast break and the 1961-62 Badger team ranked as the nation's eighth highest scoring machine, with a per game average of 84.7 points.

The national attention focused on Erickson's fine team last year also meant promotion of assistant Ron Nord, valued staff member, to the head coaching position at Montana State University, Missoula, Mont.

A rugged conditioning program accompanies Wisconsin's preparations for a campaign, and enables the staff to exploit the fast break—with its sharp passing—to its fullest extent.

The Badgers in three years under Erickson and his staff compiled a 32-40 record in the won-lost column, and the Big Ten record for the same seasons

is assessed at 18-24.

John's a native of Rockford, Ill., where he prepped at East High before entering Beloit College where he became the first player in Beloit's history to score over 1,000 points in a career. Before graduating in 1949 he was selected to the All-Conference teams for three consecutive seasons and was team captain in his junior and senior years. His Little All-American recognition was won in his senior year. That was the only varsity basketball that Erickson has ever played.

While in Rockford (Ill.) East High School, his coach thought that John was too small to play much basketball, and so he never won a varsity letter.

Basketball isn't Erickson's only accomplishment. He was also a top-notch tennis player in college, winning Midwest Conference singles and doubles titles in 1946, 1947, and 1948; and winning the Wisconsin State Singles and Douglas Championships in 1946-47.

After graduation he moved to Stevens Point, Wisconsin, where his teams won 39 games against only 7 defeats in two seasons. His 1951-52 squad came to the State Tournament and was defeated in the Championship finals. In the 1952-53 season he coached at Beloit High School, winning 14 games and losing 11. His team made the State Tournament, being eliminated by the eventual champion, Menasha, in the first round.

Two years of Army service followed the Beloit High School job, and upon returning from the service in 1955 he took over the head coaching spot at Lake Forest, Illinois, College. His three year record at Lake Forest showed 33 wins and 38 defeats.

In April of 1958 he was appointed assistant coach at Wisconsin, becoming head coach when Bud Foster resigned at the completion of the 1958-59 season.

The Badger coach is 34 years old, married and has two daughters.

John was much in demand as a banquet speaker and was a featured basketball clinic lecturer in the Midwest last summer.

JOHN ORR

John Orr begins his fourth season as assistant coach to John Erickson, a man with whom he played on the outstanding Beloit College teams following World War II. Orr achieved fame as a prep star at Taylorville, Illinois high school, gained more honors as a collegian at Beloit, and extended his success to the high school coaching field in basketball as well as football.

John was a member of the famed Taylorville, Illinois High team that completed an unbeaten season of 45 consecutive wins to annex the 1944 Illinois State high school championship. Following high school, he enrolled at the University of Illinois where he played both football (end) and basketball (forward) in 1944-45 school year, gaining second team Big Ten honors in football, and honorable mention in basketball.

His college career was interrupted by service in the Marine Corps, and he coached and played on the Mare Island, California football team that won 19 games, lost just five games in 1945-46.

Returning from service, he followed his prep coach, Dolph Stanley, to Beloit College, and helped build that school into a nationally recognized basketball power. The 6-3, 34-year-old Orr was three times named to the All-Midwest Conference team, and gained the NAIB All-American basketball first team in both the 1947 and 1948 seasons.

After his graduation from Beloit in 1949 he played with the Peoria Caterpillars in the National AAU tournament and also spent the 1949-50 season playing professional basketball with the St. Louis Bombers and the Waterloo Hawks of the old National Basketball Association.

He started his high school coaching days at Milton Union High in Milton, Wis. At Milton his team won 15 against 7 losses. In 1951 he moved to Dubuque Senior High in Dubuque, Iowa where his teams posted a 103-71 mark from 1951-59. In addition to basketball he coached football in 1957 and 1958 seasons, compiling a 9-6-1 record.

Three of his Dubuque high school football players went on to play Big Ten football, including guard Dion Kempthorne and halfback Ken Montgomery, letterwinners on Wisconsin's 1962 championship squad. Others have played at Arizona and California.

John has been a member of the Badgers' freshman football staff the past two seasons, and has become a featured after-dinner speaker at athletic banquets. John is married and has four daughters.
