SEASON PREVIEW

Optimism abounds as second-year head coach Stu Jackson and the Badgers prepare for the 1993-94 season. And with good reason. Four starters and 11 letterwinners are returning from the squad that posted a 14-14 record and earned a National Invitation Tournament bid last season. Eighty-one percent of last year's scoring and 70 percent of the rebounding are back. The top four scorers, led by first-team all-Big Ten pick Michael Finley, are back. Add to this nucleus what is arguably the finest recruiting class in school history and it's easy to see why anticipation is running high in Madison.

Last year, Jackson delivered on his pledge to bring excitement back to the Field House. Implementing an up-tempo, defense-oriented style of play,

he transformed the once methodical Badgers into one of the more wide-open and entertaining teams in the Big Ten.

Late in the season, Wisconsin sported a 14-9 overall record, a 7-7 mark in league play and appeared ready to make a run at its first NCAA tournament bid since 1947. A four-game losing streak put an end to those hopes, but the team did advance to its third NIT berth in five seasons.

Despite a disappointing loss to Rice in the first round, the Badgers accomplished a great deal in the first year of the Jackson regime and were clearly headed in the right direction. The team enjoyed its first national ranking since 1974 (24th by CNN/USA Today), set school records for three-point field goals (219) and three-point attempts (570) in a season, set Big

Ten records for three-pointers (138) and three-point attempts (374) in a season, tied the school record for 100-point games in a season (4), led the Big Ten in turnover margin (4.2) and three-point field goals per game (7.7) and posted its highest attendance average since 1967 (10,387).

The strides made last season should continue in 1993-94 as Jackson's system becomes more ingrained. Pressing defense and the three-point shot will continue to be points of emphasis, a deeper bench will pay dividends on both ends of the floor, and rebounding and interior defense—the team's biggest weaknesses last year — are expected to be significantly improved.

Following is a position-by-position look at the 1993-94 Badgers:

Guards

For the third year in a row, the Badgers will rely on **Tracy Webster** to quarterback the offense. The senior point guard earned third-team all-Big Ten recognition last season after leading the Badgers in assists (6.4), free throw accuracy (.809) and steals (2.4). He was second on the team with a 14.1 scoring average and set school records for assists (179) and steals (66) in a season.

Webster enters this season needing 59 assists to pass Mike Heineman as the Badgers' career leader and 37 steals to top Trent Jackson as Wisconsin's all-time leader. He is also 68 points shy of reaching the 1,000-point plateau.


Backing up Webster at the point will be freshman **Darnell Hoskins**, who earned first-team all-state and Southwest Ohio Player of the Year honors at Chaminade-Julienne High in Dayton. He led his team in scoring (21.2), three-point shooting (35-92, .380), free throw shooting (151-181, .834) and assists (4.9) as a senior.

The incumbent at the shooting guard spot is junior **Andy Kilbride**, who averaged 6.7 points per game and was the Badgers' Defensive Player of the Year last season. A long-range shooting specialist, he led the team with a .458 mark from three-point range and tied for sec-


ond on the squad with 49 three-pointers. He was second in the Big Ten in three-point accuracy with a .493 mark in league games.

Senior guard **Jason Johnsen**, last year's Most Improved Player, will again see significant playing time at shooting guard. He saw more than 20 minutes of playing time per game and, like Kilbride, registered 49 three-pointers and averaged 6.7 points per game. His .389 mark from long-range was the second best on the team.

Senior walk-on **Chris Conger**, who joined the team last season, will also see action at the off-guard spot. He played in 13 games a year ago.

Senior guard Jason Johnsen


Finley, who has been named to the 1994 *Playboy* all-America team, may also see time at the shooting guard spot. He ranked second in the Big Ten in scoring (23.2), first in three-point field goals per game (2.44), fifth in steals (1.83) and 10th in free throw accuracy (.780) a year ago.

Finley gained valuable international experience last summer as a member of the inaugural Team USA squad that played in Europe. He also participated in the World University Games in Buffalo in July.

Junior power forward **Brian Kelley** started 26 games last year and is the leading candidate to hold down the spot this season. The 6-7, 240-pounder averaged 5.0 points per game and was second on the team with a 4.1 rebounding average.

Sophomore **Otto McDuffie** and junior **Howard Moore**, both of whom saw limited action last year, are expected to see spot duty.

Freshman **Jalil Roberts**, a talented scorer and defender, may see time at both the small forward and shooting guard positions. The 6-4, 185-pounder earned first-team all-New Jersey and honorable mention all-USA honors at perennial power Jersey City St. Anthony's. He averaged 17.5 points, 5.5 rebounds and 3.0 steals in leading the

Friars to a 28-1 record and a No. 4 national ranking a year ago.

Centers

With starter Damon Harrell lost to graduation, the post position is wide open entering fall drills. Seniors **Jeff Petersen** and **Grant Johnson** are the veterans of the group. Petersen, who was a member of this summer's Big Ten All-Star team, played in 27 games last season, including six as a starter, and averaged 5.3 points and 1.6 rebounds. Johnson, who started 26 games as a sophomore, was used as a defensive specialist off the bench last season. The three-time academic all-Big Ten selection averaged 0.9 points and 1.5 rebounds per game.

Sophomore **Greg Timmerman** played in just three games a year ago and will see spot action this season.

Freshman **Rashard Griffith**, one of the most heralded recruits in Wisconsin history, brings an impressive list of credentials to Madison and is expected to have an immediate impact. The 6-11, 265-pounder from Chicago's Martin Luther King High earned McDonald's all-America, second-team *Parade* all-America and 1993 Mr. Basketball of Illinois recognition as a senior. He averaged 22 points, 14 rebounds and seven blocked shots and led King to a 32-0 record and its second state championship in four years.

Schedule

Home games against Stanford and state foes Marquette, UW-Green Bay and UW-Milwaukee and road games at Texas Tech and Loyola Marymount highlight this year's non-conference schedule. Home games against Mississippi Valley State, Grambling and Eastern Michigan round out the non-conference slate.

Ten of the Badgers' opponents advanced to post-season play last year — Indiana, Michigan, Illinois, Purdue, Iowa, Marquette and Texas Tech advanced to the NCAA tournament, while Minnesota, Ohio State and Michigan State were NIT participants. The Badgers are scheduled to appear on ESPN three times — at Texas Tech, at Penn State and at home against Illinois.



THE COACHES



HEAD COACH STU JACKSON



When Stu Jackson was hired as Wisconsin's 11th head coach on March 25, 1992, he arrived in Madison brimming with optimism and enthusiasm, promising to bring an exciting, up-tempo brand of basketball to the UW Field House and committed to directing Badger basketball to new heights. One year later, it appears that the former New York Knicks head coach is well ahead of schedule in revitalizing Wisconsin's basketball fortunes.

Jackson's "sudden impact" began before he coached his first game, when he landed what is arguably the best recruiting class in school history. The trio of 7-1 center Rashard Griffith, 6-5 swingman Jalil Roberts and 6-0 point guard Darnell Hoskins gave the Badgers' a top-20 recruiting class nationally and was a major step in putting Wisconsin's program back on the map.

On the court, the 37-year-old directed the Badgers to a 14-14 overall

record, a 7-11 mark in the Big Ten and a berth in the National Invitation Tournament. Jackson, whose record was the best by a rookie head coach at Wisconsin since Bud Foster went 15-5 in 1934-35, became the first Big Ten coach to take over a losing program and earn a post-season tournament berth in his first season since Bill Musselman led Minnesota to the NCAA tourney in 1972. Wisconsin defeated nationally ranked Minnesota, Ohio State and Michigan State in succession in January, which resulted in a No. 24 ranking in the CNN/USA Today coaches' poll, the Badgers' first national ranking since 1974.

Jackson's up-tempo style led to numerous school records, including three-point field goals (219) and three-point attempts (570) in a season, three-pointers (15) and three-point attempts (31) in a game, 100-point games in a season (4) and consecutive 100-point games (3). The Badgers set Big Ten records for three-pointers (138) and three-point attempts (374) in a season and led the league in three-pointers per game (7.7) and turnover margin (4.2). The club also posted its highest scoring average since 1972 (77.0 points per game).

Attendance at the Field House also soared in Jackson's inaugural season. The Badgers enjoyed their highest attendance average since 1967 (10,387), their highest mark in Big Ten games since 1953 (11,289) and the most sellouts since 1950 (5).

Jackson came to Wisconsin from the National Basketball Association office in New York City, where he had served as director of basketball operations since 1991. In his capacity with the NBA front office, Jackson assisted with the administration of the league officiating staff, with team and player discipline and with team operational procedures such as trades, waivers, contract signings and salary caps. He also served as the league's liaison to United States of America Basketball (USAB) for the 1992 Olympic basketball team.

Before his stint with the NBA office, Jackson was head coach of the New York Knicks for just over one season. When he was appointed to the job at age 33, he became the second-youngest head coach in NBA history. He posted a 52-45

record during the 1989-90 regular season and the first 15 games of the 1990-91 campaign.

After being named NBA Coach of the Month in December of 1989, Jackson directed the Knicks to the 1989-90 Eastern Conference playoffs. After upsetting the Boston Celtics 3-2 in the first round, the Knicks lost a 4-1 series to eventual champion Detroit.

Prior to taking over as the Knicks' head coach, Jackson served two seasons as an assistant coach in New York under Rick Pitino. The Knicks posted a 90-74 mark during those years and advanced to the playoffs both seasons.

Before joining the Knicks, Jackson was the associate head coach and head recruiting coordinator under Pitino at Providence College from 1985-87. The 1987 Friars finished fourth in the Big East Conference — the school's highest finish ever — and advanced to the NCAA Final Four in New Orleans. They lost to Syracuse in the semifinals and finished the season with a 25-9 record.

Jackson began his coaching career in 1981-82 as a graduate assistant at the University of Oregon. He served as an assistant coach at Oregon in 1982-83 and at Washington State from 1983-85.

Jackson was one of the original "Kamikaze Kids" when he played for Oregon from 1974-76. He was a starting forward on squads that earned berths in

the National Invitation Tournament in 1975 and 1976. Those teams included future NBA players Ron Lee and Greg Ballard and were coached by Dick Harter, who went on to serve as head coach of the Charlotte Hornets and is now an assistant with the Knicks.

Jackson averaged 10.3 points during his three years at Oregon, scoring 861 points to make the school's Top 25 career scoring list. The Ducks posted a 55-31 mark during Jackson's tenure in Eugene.

After suffering a knee injury after his junior season, Jackson transferred to Seattle University, where he finished his college career during the 1978 season.


He scored 192 points his senior season, giving him 1,053 points for his career, and received his bachelor's degree in business administration and management from Seattle in 1978.

Before joining the coaching field, Jackson worked as a marketing representative at IBM in Los Angeles from 1978-81.

A native of Reading, Pa., Jackson enjoys bicycling and swimming. He and his wife, Dr. Janet Taylor, have four daughters: Lauren (4), twins Taylor and Erin (2) and Yanna, born in July. Dr. Taylor is the sister of former Duke University and New York Knicks guard Vince Taylor.

NBA Coach of the Month in December of 1989 ... led New York Knicks to second round of Eastern Conference playoffs in 1989-90.

Q & A WITH STU JACKSON

Q: Now that you've had time to reflect, what are your thoughts on your first season at Wisconsin?

A: The best way to summarize last season is that it was a good start. We set out and accomplished the goals we wanted to accomplish. We wanted to establish ourselves as a very hard-working team, and I think we did that. We wanted to be a team that was in excellent physical condition, and I think we accomplished that, and we wanted to be a team that reached its academic potential, and I think with our team grade-point average of 2.7 we accomplished that. Last year really laid a foundation in the areas that will help carry this program into an even more successful future.

Q: What was the most important lesson you learned in your first year as a college head coach?

A: One of the biggest lessons I learned is that if you have members of the team who are good people and will work hard toward a common goal, you can experience success, no matter what your talent level. I think our guys proved that last year.

Q: What was the biggest adjustment from coaching in the NBA to coaching in college?

A: The biggest thing for me was just in the importance placed on each game. With an 82-game schedule in the NBA, it truly is a marathon, not a sprint. But here, with only 27 regular-season games, each game becomes critical.

Another big difference was in my relationship with the players. I had a

chance to get involved in our players' lives, and that was very enjoyable for me. In the NBA, it's much more of a business relationship, and while you do develop friendships there, everybody pretty much goes their own way after a practice or a game. Here, our situation is much more of a family-type situation

we had a lot of players — guys who hadn't really played a lot, especially in Big Ten games — who became good solid Big Ten players during the course of the year. Seeing that improvement and development was very satisfying.

Q: What was your greatest disappointment of last season?

A: I think having a shot at the NCAA tournament and then not seeing that dream fulfilled. As unrealistic as it might have been at the beginning of the season, it became very realistic later in the season, and not to get it was frustrating. But we'll use that experience as fuel and motivation to eventually achieve that goal. It gave our players a taste in their mouth that they'll want to experience again, and if we're fortunate enough to get into the tournament, that taste and experience will be a great motivator.

Q: What was your impression of Big Ten basketball?

A: It confirmed my greatest hopes and my worst fears. It's a league of great teams, great players and great coaches. I can't imagine a more exciting league in the country. The enthusiasm that's generated in the communities and across the states is something you just don't find in most parts of the country.

Q: What did you think about the atmosphere in the Field House?

A: Our fans started out good, and by the end of the season, they were great. I think they were probably a little unsure at first, with a new coach and a new style of play, but they progressed the same way the team did. Their attitude and

where we are involved in each others' lives to a much greater extent and the relationships are a lot closer.

Q: What was your greatest accomplishment last season?

A: The thing I was most proud of with this team is that they were asked to become closer as a team, and they did that. Because we were able to do that, we were able to enjoy some success. That was one of our most gratifying accomplishments. Another was the fact that

enthusiasm really matched our style of play by the time the Big Ten season came around. Like the team, our fans will use last year as a foundation to build on for this season and for the future.

Q: What are you most excited about as you head into your second season?

A: I'm excited about this year's team because we've added some talented young freshmen, but more importantly, we are returning players who have really improved and gotten to another skill level. And I think this year we'll be able to take advantage of the experience and knowledge we all gained last year playing in a new system in a new program with a new coach. We'll be able to use that as a springboard to become better this year.

Q: How would you assess the team's strengths and weaknesses?


A: Our strength will always be our style of play — the fact that we are a very fast-paced, wide-open team. With a nucleus of Tracy Webster and Michael Finley, we have two of the league's better players. All good teams are led by good players, and I feel they're two of the best.

We'll continue to be a good perimeter shooting team and an excellent three-point shooting team, but this year, with the addition of Rashard Griffith, we'll also have an improved low-post game as well. Defensively, we'll have a presence in the middle that has been lacking, and I think that will become one of our strengths.

Our depth will be an added strength, particularly on the perimeter. We've got Tracy, Mike, Andy Kilbride, Jason

Johnsen, Chris Conger and Otto McDuffie returning, and then we add Darnell Hoskins and Jalil Roberts. That's a pretty deep group, which is so important with our pressing style.

In terms of weaknesses, rebounding is a major concern.



Q: Will we see any new wrinkles in the Stu Jackson system this year?

A: We're going to try to take the next step in a full-court pressure system. We'll attempt to press even more and do some different things defensively to assist our ability to apply full-court pressure. Offensively, I think we'll try to run and push the pace even more than last season.

Q: How do you see the Big Ten race shaping up?

A: Although I'm still not a Big Ten expert, I feel that for the first time in a number of years, there's no clear-cut favorite. There are a number of teams that could win it. That should provide for a lot of speculation and make for a very exciting and wide-open race. I think the parity in the league this year is as good as it's been in a long time.

Q: What are your feelings on this year's schedule?

A: I like our schedule. I think your schedule should mirror the growth of your program. As we try to take steps forward, our schedule will grow with us. This year's schedule is indicative of growth.

I'm excited about playing the in-state teams (Marquette, UW-Green Bay, UW-Milwaukee). It's a position I've softened on because the demand in the state for these games is overwhelming. That kind of demand is a very positive sign that Wisconsin basketball across the state is alive and well.

Q: Because of all the attention the freshmen have received, are you concerned that people might be expecting too much too soon?

A: Outside expectations are not things that our players, particularly the freshmen, are focused on or concerned with. As long as they continue to develop and improve and meet the expectations of the team, then that will be gratification enough. What people from the outside expect has no influence.





ASSISTANT COACHES



STAN VAN GUNDY

Stan Van Gundy, who was promoted to associate head coach this summer, is in his second season at Wisconsin. In addition to his recruiting and coaching responsibilities, he assists with scouting and game preparation.

Before coming to Madison, the 34-year-old Van Gundy was head coach for four seasons at Massachusetts-Lowell. The Chiefs posted a 14-15 mark his last season and advanced to the semifinals of the New England Collegiate Conference playoffs.

Prior to his stint at Lowell, Van Gundy served as an assistant coach at Canisius College (1986-87) and Fordham University (1987-88). From 1984-86 he was head coach at Castleton State College (Vt.), where he posted a 68-18 mark. The school's 26-2, 23-7 and 19-9 records under Van Gundy were the three best in school history. He was named NAIA District 5 Coach of the Year and Vermont's College Coach of the Year in 1983-84 and led the team to the NAIA District 5 championship in 1984-85.

A 1981 graduate of the State University of New York at Brockton, Van Gundy began his coaching career as an assistant at Vermont.

Stan played college basketball for his father, Bill, at SUNY-Brockport and was named Scholar-Athlete of the Year for the entire SUNY system in 1981. His father continues in the coaching ranks at Genesee Community College in Batavia, N.Y. Stan's brother Jeff is an assistant coach with the New York Knicks.

Stan and his wife, Kim, have a daughter, Shannon (2). The Van Gundys live in Madison.



BOB BEYER

The newest member of the Badger coaching staff is Bob Beyer, who was hired in August after a four-year stint as an assistant coach at Siena College in Loudonville, N.Y., a suburb of Albany.


Siena posted a 77-46 record during Beyer's tenure, including a 25-10 mark two years ago, when the Saints were co-champions of the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference title. Siena advanced to the quarterfinals of the National Invitation Tournament that season, falling in overtime to Massachusetts. The Saints were 16-13 last season.

A native of LeRoy, N.Y., Beyer served as an assistant for four years at Albany (N.Y.) State University before going to Siena. At Albany, he assisted Richard "Doc" Sauers, the winningest active coach in Division III.

Beyer, 31, began his coaching career during his senior year at Alfred University. After playing for three seasons, an injury ended his playing career and he began working as an assistant at Alfred State University College of Technology, a two-year college.

Beyer's background includes serving as head coach of the Adirondack Region Open squad at the Empire State Games. In 1988, he guided Adirondack to the silver medal, losing to New York City in the championship. Beyer's 1989 and 1992 teams won bronze medals, and his 1991 squad won the gold medal.

Beyer graduated with honors, earning a bachelor of arts in history from Alfred University in 1984. He also holds a master's in curriculum planning and development from SUNY-Albany (1989).



TIM BUCKLEY

Another first-year member of the Badger staff is Tim Buckley, who was hired this summer after serving for four seasons as head coach at Rockford (Ill.) College. Besides his coaching duties, he helps direct the Badgers' summer camps, assists with scouting and coordinates underclass recruiting.

Buckley posted a 50-52 record at Rockford—reaching the 50-win plateau faster than any other coach in school history — and ranks second on the school's all-time victory list. In 1990, as the youngest coach in the NCAA, he led Rockford to a 16-9 record, the team's first winning season in seven years.

A native of Aurora, Ill., Buckley was an assistant at Rockford under former Wisconsin assistant Chuck Schramm in 1989 and was named head coach when Schramm joined the Badger staff a year later.


While at Rockford, Buckley also served as head coach for the Pioneer Region in the Illinois Prairie State Games.


ROBERT HACKETT

Hackett, 29, earned a bachelor's degree in consumer science from Wisconsin in 1988. He and his wife, Renee, live in Madison.




BRIAN HECKER

The health and well-being of the Wisconsin basketball team is entrusted to athletic trainer Andy Winterstein, who is in his seventh season with the UW sports medicine staff.





Andy and his wife, Barb, who is the secretary in the Badger basketball office, reside in Madison.



MEDIA INFORMATION

Credentials

Requests for credentials must be placed with the UW Sports Information Office in writing, at least one week in advance. Requests should be made on company letterhead. Upon receipt of applications, appropriate credentials are either mailed or available at the Sports Information Office or the press will-call window at the Athletic Ticket Office.

Credentials will be issued according to the following priority guidelines: 1) National publications and newspapers filing for the following day's publication. 2) All newspapers designated by the visiting sports information director. 3) Television and radio stations originating a live broadcast. 4) Television and radio stations covering for nightly news. 5) All other requests will be evaluated on a space-available basis, with preferences given to those who regularly cover Wisconsin basketball.

Spouses, dates, children and other non-workers will not be allowed in any of the media areas.

Parking

A limited number of parking passes are available to working media. They will be issued on a first-come, first-served basis. Contact the Sports Information Office for further information.

Radio

Each visiting radio station admitted for broadcast should contact the sports information office at least one week prior to the game they wish to cover. Each radio station will be issued three credentials as per Big Ten guidelines. If credentials are not mailed, they may be picked up at the Sports Information Office, or on game day at the media will-call window at the Ticket Office (Gate 21 of Camp Randall Stadium). Radio facilities are located in the balcony level of the west side of the Field House.

Photographers

Floor photo passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service and television photographers. Photographers are

expected to display their credentials prominently at all times and must work from behind either baseline. No photographers will be permitted along the length of the floor. The University of Wisconsin follows NCAA and Big Ten guidelines regarding event photography.

Press Row Services

Working areas for the media are located on the west side of the Field House — in the mezzanine level for most print media and in the balcony level for broadcast media. Coats and other personal belongings may be stored in the Reinke Room, located at the north end of the Field House. Programs, media guides, game notes and refreshments will be available in the Reinke Room before each game. Halftime and final statistics, play-by-play and coaches' quotes will be furnished to all working locations.

Telephones/Fax Machine

Telephone lines in the press area must be ordered at least one week in advance of the game(s) for which they are needed. Orders should be made through both Wisconsin Bell (800) 447-7738 and UW Telecommunications (608) 262-0521 during regular business hours. Several courtesy phones will be made available by the UW Sports Information Office.

Use of a fax machine may be arranged through the Sports Information Office prior to the game.

FAX-ON-DEMAND

Through the services of Info Connection, Inc. of Atlanta, Ga., conference schools and the Big Ten Conference office offer 24-hour access to the latest press releases, statistics and notes via a "Fax-on-Demand" network. Each school and the conference office will produce a directory of information available to the media. The information can be accessed through the use of the handset of a fax machine. To receive more information, contact the Big Ten at (708) 696-1010.

Postgame Interviews

Following a 10-minute cooling-off period, Stu Jackson and requested Badger players will meet with the media in the women's locker room in the southwest corner of the Field House on the lower level. Jackson will be available first, followed by the visiting coach and UW players. The UW locker room is closed.

Practices

All Wisconsin practices, including shoot-arounds, are closed. No exceptions. Jackson and Badger players will be available for interviews either before or after practice (see below).

Player Interviews

During the fall semester, when practices are scheduled from 3:30-6:30 p.m., players will be available for interviews from 2:45-3:15 p.m. During the winter semester, when practices are scheduled from 1:30-4:30 p.m., players will be available for interviews from 4:30-5 p.m. All interviews must be arranged through the Sports Information Office. Please contact John Estes by noon of the day you wish to interview a player. No interviews are granted the day of a game, until after the game.

Requests for collect-call telephone interviews may be made with John Estes at the Sports Information Office.

Freshmen are off limits for all interviews until after the last exam of their first semester.

Jackson Interviews

Jackson is available for interviews before practice in the fall semester and after practice during the winter semester. On the road, Jackson will be available to the media at the Badgers' hotel the day or evening before the game or at the team's shoot-around the day of the game. 
Steve Malchow




John Estes

Television Coverage

A minimum of 25 of the Badgers' 27 regular-season games will be televised live this season, including three games nationally on ESPN and five throughout the Midwest on the Raycom Regional network. Wisconsin's flagship station, WTV in Milwaukee, will broadcast 10 games on a state-wide network, while WMTV in Madison will air another six locally.

Pat Hughes, who has provided radio play-by-play for the Milwaukee Brewers for the last nine seasons, will call the Badger games on the state network. Hughes, who teams with Bob Uecker on the Brewer broadcasts, was the 1990 Wisconsin Sports-caster of the Year. Before coming to Milwaukee, he worked for ESPN, USA Cable Sports Network, Warner Amex in Columbus, Ohio, and Gill Cable in San Jose, Calif.



Radio Coverage

Since 1989-90, exclusive coverage of Wisconsin basketball has been provided by WTMJ Radio (620 AM) in Milwaukee. WTMJ provides an exclusive state-wide network of more than 30 radio stations for all Badger games. WTMJ awarded the exclusive rights in Madison to WTSO Radio (1070 AM).

Calling all the action on the Wisconsin basketball network is WTSO sports director Matt Lepay. A 1984 graduate of Ohio State, Lepay is in his sixth season as the Badgers' play-by-play announcer. Before joining WTSO in 1988, he was sports director of WNCL in Columbus, Ohio, and prior to that worked at stations in Athens and Piqua, Ohio.

Lepay, who also provides pregame, halftime and postgame coverage on Badger football broadcasts, serves as host of the Barry Alvarez and Stu Jackson call-in shows.

Lepay's partner on the Wisconsin basketball network is veteran analyst Ron Blomberg, who has been providing color commentary on Badger broadcasts since 1977. Blomberg, who played for Wisconsin in the late 1940s, is a member of the Wisconsin High School Coaches Hall of Fame, having coached at Peshtigo and Brookfield Central.

Following his coaching career, Blomberg joined the Milwaukee Bucks as administrative assistant when the franchise was formed in 1969. He became an assistant general manager in 1972 and was the team's color analyst on radio and television from 1971 through 1976. Blomberg has been director of the Milwaukee Bucks basketball camps since 1969.

Stu Jackson joins WTSO sports director Matt Lepay for "The Stu Jackson Show" on the Badgers' radio network. The 60-minute show, which airs weekly during the season, includes Jackson's analysis of the Badgers' season and questions from the audience.

THE BIG TEN CONFERENCE

A

meeting of seven Midwest university presidents on Jan. 11, 1895, at the Palmer House in Chicago to discuss the regulation and control of intercollegiate athletics was the first development of what would become one of organized sports' most successful undertakings.

Those seven men, behind the leadership of James H. Smart, president of Purdue University, established the principles for which the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives, more popularly known as the Big Ten Conference, would be founded.

At that meeting, a blueprint for the control and administration of college athletics under the direction of appointed faculty representatives was outlined. The presidents' first-known action was "restricted eligibility for athletics to bona fide, full-time students who were not delinquent in their studies." This helped limit some problems of the times, especially the participation of professional athletes and "non-students" in the university's regular sporting events. That legislation, along with others that would follow in the coming years, served as the primary building block for amateur intercollegiate athletics.

Eleven months after the presidents met, one faculty member from each of those seven universities met at the same Palmer House and officially established the mechanics of the "Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives," or "Big Ten Conference" or "Western Conference."

Those seven universities were: the University of Chicago, the University of Illinois, the University of Michigan, the University of Minnesota, Northwestern University, Purdue University and the University of Wisconsin. Indiana Uni-

versity and the State University of Iowa (now the University of Iowa) were admitted in 1899. The Ohio State University joined in 1912. Chicago withdrew in 1946 and Michigan State College (now Michigan State University) was added three years later in 1949.

After a 40-year period of constancy in membership, the Conference expanded to 11 members for the first time. On June 4, 1990, the Council of Presidents voted to confirm its earlier decision to integrate Pennsylvania State University into the Conference.

At the turn of the century, faculty representatives established rules for intercollegiate athletics that were novel for the time. As early as 1906, the faculty approved legislation that required eligible athletes to meet entrance requirements and to have completed a full year's work, along with having one year of residence. Freshmen and graduate students were not permitted to compete, training tables were forbidden, and coaches were to be appointed by university bodies "at modest salaries."

Football and baseball were the popular sports prior to 1900. Wisconsin won the first two football championships and Chicago claimed the first three baseball titles. The first "official" sponsored championship was in outdoor track, and it was held at the University of Chicago in 1906. It was won by Michigan.

Since then, there have been many different athletic events popularized on Big Ten campuses. Some became extremely popular — football and basketball, for example. Others, like boxing, fell by the wayside. Today, the Big Ten sponsors 12 championships for men and 11 for women.

WISCONSIN FIELD HOUSE



The Wisconsin Field House has been the home of the Badgers since 1930. The building was a project of former athletic director George Little when he arrived at Wisconsin-Madison in 1925.

In 1927, Little proposed to the athletic council and regents the plan under which the Field House was to be constructed. This proposal met the approval of the board after two previous attempts had failed.

The original layout included a \$650,000 building to house both an indoor training facility for intercollegiate teams and the required program of physical education. The portion to be used for intercollegiate athletics was estimated at \$385,000.

The intercollegiate section of the facility housed the men's and women's basketball teams and the wrestling squad. Its construction cost approximately \$434,000. The first game played in the Field House was on Dec. 13, 1930, when the Badger men's basketball team posted a 17-14 win over Carroll College. The official dedication game followed on Dec. 18, when Wisconsin downed Pennsylvania, 25-12.

The structure remains a part of Camp Randall Stadium, standing on the south end of the field, with stands built against its north wall. The Field House originally contained a basketball floor with a seating capacity of 12,000, a complete track

facility, and room for indoor football and baseball training.

The football, track and field and baseball teams moved to the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center, better known as "the Shell," upon its completion in 1956.

In April of 1976, the state Building Commission approved \$718,000 for the renovation of the Field House. The project was aimed at improving the seating facility and allowing for other activities to be held in the building.

Permanent bleachers were added to the north, south and west sides of the court, with portable seats and a stage area on the east side. This effort brought the seating capacity to 11,500. New locker rooms and a training facility were constructed under the west stands and the existing locker rooms were renovated.

A new lighting system was added in 1977, along with an improved sound system. A state-of-the-art scoreboard was installed prior to the 1991-92 season.

In addition to serving as the home for the UW men's and women's basketball, wrestling and volleyball teams, the Field House is the site of the WIAA boys' and girls' state basketball tournaments, the WIAA state wrestling tournament, concerts, graduation ceremonies and numerous other events.


SEASON REVIEW

All the tired cliches usually attached to rebuilding basketball programs applied to the 1993 Wisconsin Badgers. All except one, maybe. Five-year plan? Not a chance, as Coach Stu Jackson's first Badger squad showed enough promise to raise NCAA tournament hopes for the 1994 campaign.

Winning did not come easily to the Badgers early on as they attempted to adapt to Jackson's up-tempo style of play. A preseason loss to a Russian traveling team and a gut-wrenching loss in the season-opener at Loyola (Ill.) served as reminders to Badger fans that this team was less than a year removed from losing 18 games in Coach Steve Yoder's final season.

The ship was righted somewhat as the Badgers won six of their next seven heading into a clash with state rival Marquette. Wisconsin's 77-67 victory on the Warriors' home floor, in front of a crowd of more than 18,500, was a bit of a turning point for the Badgers because of the way they dominated their favored opponent. Wisconsin used a swarming defense to cause seven turnovers and made six of 11 three-pointers in jumping out to a 39-27 half-time lead. The Badgers then showed the ability to hold onto a lead against a Marquette team that would go on to earn an NCAA tournament berth. More than anything, the game showed just how good the team could be as it grasped Jackson's style of play.

The Big Ten season proved to be just as up-and-down as the non-confer-

ence season had been. The good came early, as the Badgers, finally playing Jackson's style of basketball, posted a 5-4 record through the first half of the Big Ten season. Included in that record were consecutive victories over nationally ranked Minnesota (19th), Ohio State (24th) and Michigan State (21st). Following the victory at Michigan State, the 12-5 Badgers received their first national ranking since 1974 (24th by CNN/USA Today). All four of the UW's losses in the first half of the league season were to eventual NCAA tournament teams.

The second half of the Big Ten campaign was not nearly as kind to the Badgers, as the team struggled in the stretch run of a grueling conference schedule. The UW opened the second half of its league slate at home against Purdue. A capacity crowd was witness to an awesome display by Boilermaker sophomore forward Glenn Robinson, who went over, around and through the Badger defense to score 42 points in Purdue's 90-87 double-overtime win. None of his 30 second-half points was more demoralizing than his last-second layup that tied the game at the end of regulation, sending a game that Wisconsin had led by six points with a minute to play, into overtime.

The Badgers didn't react very well to the tough loss, losing consecutive road games at Minnesota and Ohio State before catching their breath with home wins against Michigan State and Illinois. With a .500 league mark and four games remaining in the

Big Ten season, the Badgers had a chance to make a last charge for the NCAA tournament. Instead, the Badgers were surprised at home by Penn State, 62-58, and beaten at Northwestern, 100-89, before dropping their final two games at Iowa and at home against Indiana.

To illustrate just how much the Badgers' quick start raised expectations in Madison, there was a sense of disappointment when the National Invitation Tournament selected Wisconsin to participate in postseason play for the third time in five years. The team obvi-

ously shared the disappointment, losing at home to Rice, 77-73.

For Jackson, who said at his inaugural press conference at Wisconsin, "I will never, ever come to grips with mediocrity," a 14-14 record was not considered the mark of a great season, even if it was the best mark by a rookie coach at Wisconsin since 1935. The progress the Badgers made from day one of the Jackson regime, however, did make the 1993 season a positive one.


The team's heavy use of the three-point shot resulted in school and Big Ten records for three-point field goals in a game and a season and attempts in a season. Defensive pressure was another Jackson trademark on a team that led the Big Ten in turnover margin and placed two players (Michael Finley and Tracy Webster) in the top five of the league in steals per game.

The excitement generated by the team did not escape the local fans. The Badgers enjoyed their highest attendance average since 1967 and the highest Big Ten attendance average since 1953. The season's five home sellouts were the most since 1950.

Finley's development into all-America status highlighted the indi-

vidual improvement that the Badger players made in 1992-93. He set several Badger records in a season that earned him first-team all-Big Ten recognition by league coaches and media. Nationally, Finley earned honorable mention all-America honors from Associated Press and was named second-team all-Midwest by *Basketball Weekly*.

Webster set Wisconsin season records for assists (175) and steals (66) and earned third-team all-Big Ten honors. He led the Big Ten in steals (2.56) and assists (6.3) — the only player to lead the league in two statistical categories.




DAVE STLUKA

ries — and finished second in free throw percentage (.855). Although Webster suffered through a subpar shooting year, Jackson consistently praised him for becoming a "true point guard" in terms of leadership and passing skills.

Accolades did not stop there, however. Andy Kilbride was named the team's Defensive Player of the Year, and Jason Johnsen was named Most Improved Player. Both cracked the top 10 for three-pointers per game and three-point accuracy in the Big Ten. Wisconsin also placed Grant Johnson, Jeff




Andy Kilbride was second in the Big Ten in three-point accuracy (.493) and was the Badgers' Defensive Player of the Year.

Petersen, Chris Conger and Damon Harrell on the academic all-Big Ten team.

The 1993 season was most notable for the improvements made up and down the roster. Sophomore Brian Kelley averaged two more rebounds per game in the last 12 contests than he did through the first 16. Kilbride's scoring average improved nearly three points over his last 12 games. Of the five regular starters (Finley, Webster, Harrell, Kilbride and Kelley), only Webster did not increase his scoring and rebounding averages over the 1992 campaign.

The 1993 season was an important one for Wisconsin. In the scope of his rebuilding efforts, Jackson needed the right chemistry on the team to install his up-tempo system, and the players responded to the change better than many expected. Despite the graduations of centers Harrell and Louis Ely, Wisconsin looks poised to make a run at the NCAA tournament in 1994. The future is now for Wisconsin, and the 1993 Badgers paved the way for future success.






PUSHIN' THE PACE

“In my time in the NBA, I learned that the difference between a journeyman player and a player who continually got better was directly proportional to how much attention that player paid to developing his skills. The really great players were always getting better and adding something to their game each year. In the case of Magic Johnson, for instance, he added a hook shot, and he went from not having a good perimeter shot to being a top three-point shooter. Joe Dumars was primarily a penetrator coming out of college, but he developed into one of the better long-range shooters. The great players just continue to add skills to their game, and that's what our objective is here with our individual instruction program.





It's a formal program that focuses on individual skill development of each one of our players. It's the time that allows the player to really chase his goals of reaching his potential as a player.



It's something we did when I was at Providence College. We started with a team that wasn't overly talented, and we got to the Final Four in two years. I think a lot of our success was the result of the skills learned in individual instruction.

The difference between Wisconsin and other programs is that most individual instruction is done 15 or 20 minutes before or after practice. We set aside three or four hours of our allotted practice time each week for our players to work only on their offensive skills.





The segments include things like two-ball dribbling and full- and half-court ballhandling and shooting, which includes six different dribble moves and close- and long-range shooting. One segment is technique shooting, which focuses very specifically on your technique and a rapid repetition of shots. Another part deals with shooting within the offense, where we concentrate on those shots you'll be getting within the structure of our offense.

A lot of the instruction is one-on-one work with the coaches. The segments are done quickly and in a continuous and very intense teaching environment. **”**

CONDITIONING & WEIGHT TRAINING

"Physical conditioning is a major factor with our style of play. Our goal is to be the best-conditioned team in the country, and we feel we have the best strength and conditioning program in our conference. It is very comprehensive and innovative and takes advantage of state-of-the-art equipment and technologies that monitor progress and actually produce a better athlete." — Head Coach Stu Jackson



The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a sophisticated blend of science, technology and one-on-one attention to each athlete. Throughout the year, UW athletes spend more time working on strength and conditioning than any other aspect of their game. During the off-season, athletes work on strength improvement, speed, power, agility and conditioning. The in-season program is devoted to continuation of strength gains and performance-related conditioning.

Each year when freshmen arrive, baseline measures of strength, speed, power, agility, flexibility and endurance are collected. Measures of body composition, weight and frame-size are also recorded. With this information, goals are set for development and maintenance. Programs are established for each basketball player by strength and conditioning coach Robert Hackett, a former track all-American at Wisconsin. The UW also offers a sports nutrition program, coordinated by Dave Ellis. The program assists athletes in meeting their nutritional demands and body composition goals.

CONDITIONING GAINS

Under the direction of strength and conditioning coach Robert Hackett, the Badger basketball team has made significant improvements in its conditioning program and in the weight room since Stu Jackson's arrival. The following team averages document the dramatic gains made in each area.

TRAINING ROOM

The Wisconsin Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the outstanding services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

Headquartered in the McClain Center, the department also maintains facilities at Camp Randall Stadium, the UW Field House, the Natatorium, the Nielsen Tennis Stadium and the Dane County Coliseum.

Services

The Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members utilize Cybex strength-testing devices, provide dietary analyses, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility. Should injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians from the UW Hospitals and Clinics.


The UW is one of a handful of schools with an on-site X-ray machine, enabling physicians to quickly and thoroughly evaluate injuries and prescribe treatment and rehabilitation. Daily

orthopedic and urgent care clinics plus counseling and nutrition services are available by appointment.

Athletic trainers and physicians work together to design rehabilitation programs for injured athletes. A wide variety of facilities and equipment, including a rehabilitation swimming pool, Cybex equipment, the Impulse Inertial Exercise System, Stairmasters, and Fitron Bicycles, help athletes rehabilitate injuries and minimize the loss of general fitness during recuperative time.

Professional Staff

Dennis Helwig, a 1974 UW graduate, coordinates the Sports Medicine Program. He is assisted by five athletic trainers, one physical therapist, two graduate assistant trainers and 30 student trainers. Team physician coverage is headed by Dr. Jim Keene and Dr. Greg Landry of the UW Hospitals and Clinics. Orthopedists Dr. Ben Graf and Dr. John Orwin round out the medical staff.





ACADEMIC SUPPORT

The primary objective of the Department of Academic and Student Affairs office is to ensure the academic success of all UW student-athletes. Counseling and advising services, plus a number of academic help programs, are offered to all student-athletes at the University.


The academic and student affairs staff is available to assist the UW basketball team in registration and course selection, monitor progress toward degrees, offer career guidance and serve as valuable resource people.

Staff members work with student-athletes who desire extra academic help. The department utilizes the services of more than 100 tutors to provide one-on-one assistance or group study help.

The department maintains a computer center, arranges for exam proctoring, offers advice on resume preparation and coordinates the grant-in-aid program. Support groups are offered to students who become medically or academically ineligible for competition.






ATTENDANCE GAINS

Attendance at the UW Field House jumped dramatically in the first year of the Stu Jackson era. The 11,500-seat facility was at capacity five times, the most sellouts since 1950.

The Badgers' overall attendance average of 10,387 was up more than 900 from 1991-92 and the highest average since 1967. The Big Ten average of 11,289 was up more than 700 fans from the year before and was the best mark since 1953.

EXPOSURE & TRAVEL

Playing college basketball in the Big Ten Conference and at the University of Wisconsin is an opportunity for success, excitement and exposure.


Badger basketball is unique with its intense media coverage. Among the many media outlets that routinely cover the Badgers are three local television stations, two local radio stations and the Wisconsin Radio News Network, four major newspapers (two in Madison and two in Milwaukee), two daily student newspapers, plus one specialty publication, *Badger Plus*, which covers Wisconsin athletics exclusively.

Stu Jackson, Badger players and the Wisconsin team were showcased in the national media last year with articles that appeared in *USA Today*, *Sports Illustrated*, *The Sporting News*, the *Chicago Tribune*, the *Chicago Sun-Times*, the *New York Daily News* and several other major metropolitan newspapers.

In terms of television coverage, Big Ten basketball is seen on ESPN, ABC, CBS, NBC and Raycom Sports and Entertainment. The Badgers, who played on CBS and ESPN last season, are scheduled for three ESPN appearances this season. More than 20 other Badger games will be shown locally or regionally on the Raycom Network this season. In addition to being broadcast live, nearly a dozen home games will also be shown on the Wisconsin Public Television network on a delayed basis.

On radio, Badger games are heard on a 34-station state-wide network. Coach Stu Jackson has a weekly media conference that routinely draws more than a dozen reporters, and he also has television and radio shows that are seen and heard in all corners of the state.

Attendance at the UW Field House reached its highest level in more than 20 years last season. The 11,500-seat facility was sold out five times and is likely to be sold out on a season-ticket basis for the 1993-94 season.



ROAD TRIPS

During their time at Wisconsin, Badger players see and experience different parts of the United States and the world through team travel.

In recent seasons, the Badgers' schedule has included games or tournaments in Dallas, Miami, Las Vegas, Portland, Tampa, Tempe, Honolulu and San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Future schedules include trips to Loyola Marymount in Los Angeles, Stanford in Palo Alto, Calif., and the Maui Classic in Hawaii. The team will also travel to Europe or Australia for a week-long playing tour in the summer of 1995.

MADISON

Located in southern Wisconsin, Madison is home to both the University of Wisconsin and the state capital. The city was designed so that the school and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of academics and politics.

One of the Midwest's most vibrant communities, Madison offers an endearing quality of life to both its residents and students.

The centerpiece of the city is the State Capitol. The campus is west of the Capitol and offers easy access to shopping malls, restaurants for every taste and popular night spots.

With a diverse population of nearly 190,000, Madison offers the unique combination of big-city excitement and small-town charm. Madison is an action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, sports, arts and recreation.

Madison was listed as the second most livable city in the United States in a 1993 *Money* magazine survey.

Besides the UW Athletic Department, the city offers a large quantity and high quality of outdoor leisure activities. *Outside* magazine ranked Madison as one of the top 15 sports towns in the nation several years ago.



NO. 2 IN MONEY MAGAZINE SURVEY

Madison was listed No. 2 on *Money* magazine's 1993 list of the country's most liveable cities. Following are excerpts from the magazine's seventh annual survey:

"A popular T-shirt sold in Madison describes the state capital and home of the University of Wisconsin as THE ALTERNATIVE TO REALITY. That's about right. Madison, which has ranked in our top 10 for the past three years, offers special attractions.

"Madison's awesome beauty and laid-back style appeal to most everyone: Walk along State Street's thriving pedestrian mall and you'll see the elderly (on bicycles) and yuppies and hippies moving among the street vendors, New Age stores, and coffee shops.

"For a relatively small city, Madison offers a number of surprises. For example, you can find Caribbean, Ethiopian, Thai and more than 20 other reasonably priced types of ethnic restaurants."


CAMPUS LIFE

Situated among gentle rolling hills and wooded areas between Lakes Mendota and Monona is the 900-acre University of Wisconsin campus. Located in the state's capital city, Madison, the UW campus is one of the nation's most picturesque.


Two movies have been filmed on the UW-Madison campus, including the 1986 hit *Back To School*, featuring Rodney Dangerfield.

There are many famous landmarks on campus, including tree-lined Bascom Hill, North Hall (the first building on campus), Van Hise Hall (the tallest building on campus) and Picnic Point (a 129-acre peninsula). A favorite gathering spot for students is the Memorial Union and its lakeside terrace.

Wisconsin students include some of the nation's foremost scholastic achievers. The diversification of the student body and its campus life make the UW a truly special educational experience.

THE UNIVERSITY

The University of Wisconsin-Madison, founded in 1848, throughout its history has been recognized as one of the nation's leading institutions of higher learning, with many departments ranked among the nation's top 10.

Nobel Prize-winning research, a liberal tradition of shared governance and a diverse student body have given UW-Madison a worldwide reputation. Wisconsin has ranked among the top universities in the United States in every scholarly pursuit since 1910.

In what is the most extensive study on graduate level education of its kind, the five-volume *Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States* rated Wisconsin tied for eighth (with UCLA and Michigan) for its academic quality.

Political Atmosphere

Because of its roots in Wisconsin legislation, the UW-Madison has always maintained close links with the state. With the passage of a federal act in 1862, it became one of the nation's first land grant colleges, establishing a tradition of research in agriculture and the life sciences.

A number of centers and programs exist on the campus specifically to facilitate the exchange of information between the university and government, business and industry. Mandated by Wisconsin statute, faculty governance has been a hallmark of the university since its founding.

Physical Setting

UW-Madison is considered one of the most beautiful college campuses in the country, lying as it does along the shore of Lake Mendota. There are five lakes in the Madison area, two of which — Mendota and Monona — form an isthmus on which the state capitol sits.

Madison's lakes, rolling hills, architecture, parks and arboretum have enhanced UW-Madison's reputation for scenic beauty. Hollywood filmmakers have selected the campus as its location for films about college life; one film was the 1986 hit *Back to School* with Rodney Dangerfield.

Academic Leader

The UW has been a leader in many areas. Among the breakthroughs at UW: establishing the first academic programs in the U.S. for Scandinavian Studies (1875), Psychology (1888), Agricultural Economics (1909), Genetics (1910) and Wildlife Management (1939); launching the world's first space observatory; conducting the nation's first bone marrow transplant; operating the nation's first radio station (WHA) in 1917; discovering Vitamins A and B; and finding evidence to link cancer with saccharine and cyclamates.

Student Body

From an initial enrollment of 17, the student population has grown to more than 40,000, making it one of the nation's largest universities. Although almost 80 percent of the students come from Wisconsin, Madison's isthmus is truly an international community.

UW-Madison students come from more than 115 countries, and the UW ranks fourth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment. It is one of the nation's most diverse student populations.

Faculty

The UW-Madison faculty routinely wins national citations for teaching excellence, research and service. Much of the university's international reputation comes from the quality of its faculty. In fact, UW faculty and alumni have accounted for 12 Nobel and 17

Pulitzer Prizes. There are 54 UW-Madison faculty members who have won Presidential Young Investigator awards (second to MIT); nine winners of the National Medal of Science; and three Searles Scholars. Forty-four professors at the UW-Madison are enrolled in the National Academy of Sciences, 14 are members of the National Academy of Engineering and three have been named to the National Academy of Education.

One of the nation's leading institutions for higher learning, the UW-Madison includes 11 schools, 133 academic departments, 17,340 employees and a \$1.2 billion budget. Majors are offered in 156 bachelors, 184 masters and 125 doctorate programs.

UW-Madison Rankings


Five Stars for Academics. The *Fiske Guide to Colleges 1993* gives the UW-Madison its highest academic ranking. In fact, UW-Madison is one of just eight public universities to receive the five-star rating.

Top-10 Rankings. The *Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States*, the most comprehensive and recent survey conducted, ranked departments in all areas as some of the best in country. Sociology, German, chemical engineering and geography were ranked No. 1 or 2 in the nation, according to the 1983 study.

Leading Executives. The university produced the third-highest percentage of CEOs at Fortune 500 industrial companies and at 350 Fortune 500 service companies according to a 1987 *Wall Street Journal* survey. A 1992 *Standard & Poor's* survey ranks UW-Madison second for executives with undergraduate degrees.

First in Private Support. With gifts totaling more than \$128 million in 1990-91, UW-Madison is the leading public institution in gaining private support and sixth among all U.S. higher education institutions.

Scientists Cited Third-Most. UW-Madison scientists are the third-most frequently cited scientists in the world, according to a 1983 study by the *Surveys of Science Resource Series*.



DEPARTMENT & COLLEGE RANKINGS

■ The School of Education is ranked No. 1 in the nation, according to a study conducted at the University of Illinois released in 1990.

■ Sociology ranked first in the 1983 *Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States*, and German, chemical engineering and geography came in second.

■ *U.S. News & World Report's* annual graduate school rankings, published in 1993, ranked UW-Madison in the top 12 of six science programs. The rankings were: computer science (tied for eighth), biology (tied for ninth), chemistry (10th), nursing (tied for 11th), health services administration (tied for 12th) and engineering (12th).

■ The School of Business real estate program ranks first in the nation this year, according to *U.S. News & World Report*.

■ The School of Business ranks first in the nation in research productivity among public institutions and fifth overall, according to the Spring 1988 issue of *Review of Business and Economic Research*.


■ Scholarly output by the marketing faculty ranks first in the nation according to a 1988 study in *Review of Business and Economic Research*.

■ Faculty at the School of Journalism and Mass Communication were ranked No. 1 in the nation in research productivity in 1988 by *Journalism Quarterly*.

■ The plant pathology department tied for first with the University of Cal-Davis in a 1986 study by the National Research Council of the National Academy of Sciences.

■ The forestry department was named the top research department in the country in 1986, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



Pat Richter, who made his mark as a Wisconsin all-America football player in the 1960s, is realizing similar successes as an administrator. The Madison native is in his fourth year as the Director of Athletics.

Richter, the last nine-time letterwinner in school history, is responsible for overseeing one of the nation's most successful athletic programs.

As an Administrator

Named to his position in December of 1989, Richter is in charge of a division that includes 20 sports, nearly 700 student-athletes, more than 160 employees and a large physical plant.

Since Richter joined the department, UW athletics have made giant strides. Among his biggest impact moves, Richter hired former Notre Dame defensive coordinator Barry Alvarez and former New York Knicks coach Stu Jackson to head the football and basketball teams.

He oversaw an improvement in facilities, helped regain program support from every corner of the state and worked diligently to return the department to fiscal solvency. After inheriting a department that was \$2.1 million

in debt, Richter and his staff have eliminated the deficit in three years, during a time that three-quarters of the nation's athletic departments are losing money.

Success on the field of play has been a trademark of Richter's department. Badger hockey and crew teams have won national championships during his tenure and the men's cross country and women's track squads placed second at NCAA meets in the last year.

The 1991-92 season will be remembered as one of the most successful in school history. *USA Today* rated Wisconsin's total program as the nation's sixth best. Only six schools (including Wisconsin) had both their men's and women's programs ranked in the newspaper's top 10. Additionally, the Badgers realized a surplus of \$1.3 million over its budget projections in '91-92.

Wisconsin's football and men's basketball teams are making tremendous strides. Alvarez' gridiron squad has climbed into the national rankings and attracted record-setting crowds to Camp Randall Stadium. Badger basketball, in Jackson's first year, earned its third National Invitation Tournament berth in the last five seasons. The Badgers were nationally ranked for the first time since 1974 and had five sell-outs in the Field House, the most since 1950.

As an Athlete

Richter's love for Badger athletics started as an undergraduate, when he earned three letters each in football, basketball and baseball.

Pat earned all-America (1961-62), academic all-America (1962) and all-Big Ten (1961-62) honors as a football end. He led Wisconsin to the 1963 Rose Bowl and caught a game-record 11 passes in the Badgers' 42-37 loss to USC.

Richter led the Big Ten in receiving twice and is still the third-leading receiver in school history. As a senior,

Richter won Wisconsin's 1963 Big Ten Medal of Honor (given for proficiency in scholarship and athletics) and received the Knute Rockne Award (given to the nation's top lineman).

Richter earned all-conference honors in baseball (1963) and led the Badgers in hits, home runs and runs batted in three times. Pat earned his scholarship for basketball, where the 6-6 center played three seasons.

After earning his B.S. degree from the UW in landscape architecture in 1964, Pat was a first-round draft pick of the NFL's Washington Redskins. He played nine years (1963-71).

Professional Life

Upon retirement from the NFL, he returned to Wisconsin to earn his law degree (1971). After employment with a Madison law firm, he worked his way up to Vice President of Personnel at the Oscar Mayer Corporation.

Richter was honored with an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award for post-college achievements in 1988. He is a member of the Wisconsin State Athletic and Madison Sports Halls of Fame, the NFL Player and Alumni Associations and the American Bar Association. Pat was included in the inaugural class of the Athletic Department Hall of Fame in 1991.

He is a regular contributor to many charitable organizations, including the UW Children's Hospital and the Four Lakes Boy Scouts.

Personal Life

Richter and his wife, Renee, have four children: Scott, Brad, Barry and Tim.

BIG TEN CONFERENCE

From its beginning almost 100 years ago, the Big Ten Conference continues to be recognized as one of the premier athletic leagues in the nation. In a time when consistent excellence is difficult to maintain, the Big Ten continues to be a showcase for the finest achievements in athletics and academics.

Basketball Success

The Big Ten Conference is arguably the premier basketball conference in America. The league regularly sends five or six teams to the NCAA Tournament. The Big Ten leads the nation with 33 Final Four appearances and is second with 197 NCAA Tournament victories. Big Ten schools boast nine NCAA titles since the tournament began in 1939, including Wisconsin's 1941 crown.

Nation's Attendance Leader

Big Ten men's basketball has enjoyed unprecedented popularity through the

years. Crowd sizes every season justify this assertion. The Big Ten has been the conference leader in attendance every year since 1977 and retained its place last season by averaging 12,696 per game. The 11 league teams attracted an NCAA-record 2,145,677 spectators in 1992-93.

Media Exposure

More evidence of Big Ten basketball's popularity is found in the consistently high television ratings and exposure. Of the 99 conference games, 97 are beamed on television, with no fewer than 163 games available this season either on broadcast or cable TV. In 1992-93, league games showed significant increases in viewership. The 12 Big Ten games televised by CBS showed a 10.9 percent rating increase over the previous year, while ESPN's "Super Tuesday" series had an average rating increase of 17 percent over 1991-92.

With Penn State's addition to the league in 1992, the Big Ten features 11 institutions in eight states and reaches into major metropolitan areas such as Chicago, Detroit, Minneapolis/St. Paul, Cincinnati, Columbus, Milwaukee, Indianapolis, Pittsburgh and Philadelphia.

Conference Leadership

The Big Ten has long been recognized for its excellence in athletics, but more importantly is dedicated to the academic well-being of its participants. The league has long pushed for higher standards for student-athletes.

With its founding principles still serving as the guiding force, the Big Ten will continue to be a national leader.

ACADEMICS & ATHLETICS

Achieving national recognition in both academics and athletics is a difficult challenge for universities and colleges today. The University of Wisconsin is one of the few institutions that has earned praise for its work in the classroom and on the field of play.

With its admittance to the Association of American Universities (AAU), one of the most prestigious organizations of higher education, the UW-Madison has been recognized for its solid reputation in the academic world. Indeed, only 56 schools nationally are in the AAU.

Balancing the academic requirements of an outstanding institution with the demands of collegiate athletic competition is difficult. However, the University of Wisconsin has attacked the challenge and succeeded.

Besides its academic prowess, the University of Wisconsin is one of the top total-sports programs in the nation. Ac-

cording to a survey conducted by *USA Today*, Wisconsin had the 23rd-most successful athletic department in the nation for 1992-93. Programs are ranked by performance in the top 10 NCAA Division I sports. Teams were ranked from 1-20, with 20 points going to the national champion.

On the conference level, the Badger men's program placed fifth in the all-sports standings, winning team titles in cross country, golf and soccer (regular season). In figuring a Big Ten all-sports champion, one point was awarded for first place, two for second place, etc. for each sport. Total points are divided by the number of sports offered at each school. The list includes all varsity sports plus basketball and football.

Inclusion on both the AAU and *USA Today* lists clearly demonstrates that academics and athletics do mix at the University of Wisconsin.
