
STYLE OF PLAY

PUSHIN' THE PACE

Over the last two seasons, the Badgers' style of play has been transformed from a deliberate, methodical one to an exciting, up-tempo style that features pressure defense and a fast-paced, wide-open offense. Following are a few of the many accomplishments the 1993-94 Badgers enjoyed.

- Earned first NCAA Tournament berth since 1947 and third bid in school history
- Became first team in school history to earn consecutive post-season berths
- Reached 18-win plateau for only the fourth time in school history
- Had best start (11-0) since 1915-16
- Tied school record by winning first 12 home games
- Tied school record for home wins in a season (14)
- Sold out every home game (11,500) for the first time in school history
- Achieved highest national ranking ever: 12th in Associated Press and CNN/USA Today polls (Jan. 12)
- Spent school-record 13 consecutive weeks in AP poll and 11 straight weeks in CNN / USA Today poll
- Set single-season school records for points (2,259), field goals (816), three-point field goals (225) and three-point field goal attempts (609)
- Set single-game school records with 15 three-point field goals and 37 three-point attempts vs. Missouri
- Set Big Ten record with 14 threepoint field goals vs. Michigan State
- Tied school record for most 100-point games in a season (4)
- Posted highest scoring average (77.9) since 1971-72
- Registered lowest field goal defense (.420) since 1973-74
- Led Big Ten in field goal defense (.428), three-point field goals per game (7.2) and blocked shots per game (4.4) in league play

"Players are looking for a style of play that they like and that really fits them. And hopefully they're looking for a program that's really going to make them better, which is our goal. The up-tempo style, the offensive freedom we encourage in our players, the way we shoot the three-pointer ... those are all things that players are looking for. There aren't a whole lot of players out there who want to walk the ball up the floor and play a halfcourt game. If you want to go beyond playing at the college level, whether it's in the NBA, CBA or Europe, the game is wide open and extremely fast, so you've got to be able to play at that pace."

INDIVIDUAL INSTRUCTION








The individual instruction program is an absolute key to our program. The whole key to winning games anywhere is having better players, and there are only two ways to have better players. The obvious one is to go out and recruit the best players you can. But the not-so-obvious one is to really spend a lot of time on players' individual development and make the guys you have better. So maybe we get a guy who is not as good as another guy coming out of high school, but through what we do in individual instruction our guy is a better player two years down the road.

The program is also key to our players' futures. A lot of our guys want to play beyond college, whether it's in the NBA, the CBA or in Europe. To do that, they've got to get better, and I think we owe it to them, with the efforts they put into our program, to give back to them. And how we give back is to spend a lot of time with them developing their individual games. I don't think that happens at a lot of places. I think most places recruit the best players they can, put them into their system offensively and defensively, and the players improve through experience and through the teaching that goes on in practice. But I don't know if there's a lot of time given to individual skill development. Here, that's the foundation of our program.


We're talking about roughly 45 minutes to an hour of our allotted practice time three times a week. During that time, it's totally concentrated on offensive skills — ball-handling, shooting, low-post moves. Another way our program is different is that it's not just geared toward what the player will do in the game. We're constantly trying to expand a guy's shooting range or trying to work on dribble moves he can't make at that point. We continually work on those skills until eventually he'll be able to use them in a game. A guy who can't shoot the three-pointer as a freshman will hopefully be able to by the time he's a junior.

Brian Kelley is a good example of that. He now has the capability of shooting the three, even though we really haven't seen it much in games yet. Andy Kilbride has improved dramatically both in the consistency of his shooting and in his ball-handling. His improved shooting is directly attributable to individual instruction. Darnell Hoskins came in basically as someone who wasn't capable of shooting the three-pointer, and now he's very capable, and that's all come from individual work with him.









CONDITIONING & WEIGHT TRAINING

"The program is state-of-the-art. We're not simply lifting weights and running the players like crazy to get in shape. Our objectives are beyond just getting in shape. Our goal is to develop speed and quickness and jumping ability and truly make the guys better in all those areas. There's tremendous variety in the things we do. The players have no idea when they walk in every day what they're going to be doing, which keeps it very interesting and fresh. There's a fun element to it. At most places, conditioning is sort of drudgery and guys start to dread it. I think our guys really like showing up every day, because they can see they're getting better and they know what we're doing is helping them." — Head Coach Stan Van Gundy





The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a sophisticated blend of science, technology and one-on-one attention to each athlete. Throughout the year, UW athletes spend more time working on strength and conditioning than any other aspect of their game. During the offseason, athletes work on strength improvement, speed, power, agility and conditioning. The in-season program is devoted to continuation of strength gains and performance-related conditioning.

Each year when freshmen arrive, baseline measures of strength, speed, power, agility, flexibility and endurance are collected. Measures of body composition, weight and frame-size are also recorded. With this information, goals are set for development and maintenance. Programs are established for each basketball player by strength and conditioning coach Robert Hackett, a former track all-American at Wisconsin. The UW also offers a sports nutrition program, coordinated by Scott Hettenbach. The program assists athletes in meeting their nutritional demands and body composition goals.

CONDITIONING GAINS

Under the direction of strength and conditioning coach Robert Hackett, the Badger basketball team has made significant improvements in its conditioning program and in the weight room over the last two seasons. The following team averages document the dramatic gains made in each area.

SPORTS MEDICINE

The Wisconsin Sports Medicine program features state-ofthe-art facilities and the outstanding services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

Headquartered in the McClain Center, the department also maintains facilities at Camp Randall Stadium, the UW Field House, the Natatorium, the Nielsen Tennis Stadium and the Dane County Coliseum.

Services

The Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members utilize Cybex strength-testing devices, provide dietary analyses, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility. Should injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians from the UW Hospitals and Clinics.

The UW is one of a handful of schools with an on-site X-ray machine, enabling physicians to quickly and thoroughly evaluate injuries and prescribe treatment and rehabilitation. Daily orthopedic and urgent care clinics plus counseling and nutrition services are available by appointment.

Athletic trainers and physicians work together to design rehabilitation programs for injured athletes. A wide variety of facilities and equipment, including a rehabilitation swimming pool, Cybex equipment, the Impulse Inertial Exercise System, Stairmasters and Fitron Bicycles, help athletes rehabilitate injuries and minimize the loss of general fitness during recuperative time.

Professional Staff

Dennis Helwig, a 1974 UW graduate, supervises the UW Sports Medicine Program. Now in his 20th year as a staff certified athletic trainer, Helwig is assisted by five athletic trainers, one physical therapist, three graduate assistant trainers and 30 student trainers. Team physician coverage is headed by Dr. Ben Graf, medical director of the UW Sports Medicine Center. Dr. Greg Landry, a staff physician for the UW Hospital Sports Medicine and Fitness Center, serves as head of primary care for UW athletic teams. Team physicians Dr. John Orwin and Dr. David Bernhardt round out the medical staff.


ACADEMIC & STUDENT SERVICES

Academic excellence is emphasized at Wisconsin. Much of the credit for the impressive academic record behind many Badger athletes is the counseling system available to the student-athletes.

Academic and student services director Alan Zussman supervises a staff of four full-time and two part-time counselors who conduct the program offered to the nearly 800 UW student-athletes. The advising staff members have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin and a permanent line of communication with all University departments.

For those student-athletes who request assistance, counseling sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Wisconsin athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The counseling staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.


The department maintains a computer center, arranges for exam proctoring, offers advice on resume preparation and coordinates the grant-in-aid program. Support groups are offered to students who become medically or academically ineligible for competition.

ATTENDANCE GAINS

Attendance at the UW Field House has jumped dramatically over the past two seasons, climbing from an average of 9,446 in 1992 to 10,387 in 1993 to a capacity 11,500 a year ago.

Last season marked the first time in school history that every game was sold out. Capacity crowds are expected at the Field House again this season.

Media Exposure & Travel

Playing college basketball in the Big Ten Conference and at the University of Wisconsin is an opportunity for success, excitement and exposure.

Badger basketball is unique with its intense media coverage. Among the many media outlets that routinely cover the Badgers are three local television stations, two local radio stations and the Wisconsin Radio News Network, four major newspapers (two in Madison and two in Milwaukee), two daily student newspapers, plus one specialty publication, *Badger Plus*, which covers Wisconsin athletics exclusively.

Badger players and the Wisconsin team were showcased in the national media last year with articles that appeared in *USA Today*, *Sports Illustrated, The Sporting News*, the *Chicago Tribune*, the *Chicago Sun-Times*, the *New York Daily News* and several other major metropolitan newspapers.

In terms of television coverage, Big Ten basketball is seen on ESPN, ABC, CBS, NBC and Raycom Sports and Entertainment. The Badgers are scheduled for a record five nationally televised games this season — two on CBS and three on ESPN. More than 20 other Badger games will be shown locally or regionally on the Raycom Network this season. In addition to being broadcast live, nearly a dozen home games will also be shown on the Wisconsin Public Television network on a delayed basis.


On radio, Badger games are heard on a 34-station state-wide network. Coach Stan Van Gundy has a weekly media conference that routinely draws more than a dozen reporters, and he also has a television show that is seen in all corners of the state.


ROAD TRIPS

During their time at Wisconsin, Badger players see and experience different parts of the United States and the world through team travel.

In recent seasons, the Badgers' schedule has included games or tournaments in Dallas, Miami, Los Angeles, Las Vegas, Portland, Tampa, Tempe, Honolulu and San Juan, Puerto Rico.

This year's schedule includes a trip to Stanford in Palo Alto, Calif., while next year's slate features a trip to the Maui Classic in Hawaii. The team is also expected to travel to Europe or Australia for a week-long summer playing tour within the next three years.





MADISON

Located in southern Wisconsin, Madison is home to both the University of Wisconsin and the state capital. The city was designed so that the school and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of academics and politics.

One of the Midwest's most vibrant communities, Madison offers an endearing quality of life to both its residents and students.

The centerpiece of the city is the State Capitol. The campus is west of the Capitol and offers easy access to shopping malls, restaurants for every taste and popular night spots.

With a diverse population of nearly 190,000, Madison offers the unique combination of bigcity excitement and small-town charm. Madison is an action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, sports, arts and recreation.

Madison was listed as the second most livable city in the United States in a 1993 *Money* magazine survey.

Besides the UW Athletic Department, the city offers a large quantity and high quality of outdoor leisure activities. *Outside* magazine ranked Madison as one of the top 15 sports towns in the nation several years ago.

No. 2 IN MONEY MAGAZINE SURVEY

Madison was listed No. 2 on *Money* magazine's 1993 list of the country's most liveable cities. Following are excerpts from the magazine's seventh annual survey:

"A popular T-shirt sold in Madison describes the state capital and home of the University of Wisconsin as THE ALTERNATIVE TO REALITY. That's about right. Madison, which has ranked in our top 10 for the past three years, offers special attractions.

"Madison's awesome beauty and laid-back style appeal to most everyone: Walk along State Street's thriving pedestrian mall and you'll see the elderly (on bicycles) and yuppies and hippies moving among the street vendors, New Age stores and coffee shops.

"For a relatively small city, Madison offers a number of surprises. For example, you can find Caribbean, Ethiopian, Thai and more than 20 other reasonably priced types of ethnic restaurants."

Campus Life

Two movies have been filmed on the UW-Madison campus, including the 1986 hit *Back To School*, featuring Rodney Dangerfield.


There are many famous landmarks on campus, including tree-lined Bascom Hill, North Hall (the first building on campus), Van Hise Hall (the tallest building on campus) and Picnic Point (a 129-acre peninsula). A favorite gathering spot for students is the Memorial Union and its lakeside terrace.

Wisconsin students include some of the nation's foremost scholastic achievers. The diversification of the student body and its campus life make the UW a truly special educational experience.

THE UNIVERSITY

The University of Wisconsin-Madison, founded in 1848, throughout its history has been recognized as one of the nation's leading institutions of higher learning, with many departments ranked among the nation's top 10

Nobel Prize-winning research, a liberal tradition of shared governance and a diverse student body have given UW-Madison a worldwide reputation. Wisconsin has ranked among the top universities in the United States in every scholarly pursuit since 1910.

In what is the most extensive study on graduate level education of its kind, the five-volume Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States rated Wisconsin tied for eighth (with UCLA and Michigan) for its academic quality.


Physical Setting

UW-Madison is considered one of the most beautiful college campuses in the country, lying as it does along the shore of Lake Mendota. There are five lakes in the Madison area, two of which (Mendota and Monona) form an isthmus on which the state capitol building sits.

Madison's lakes, rolling hills, architecture, parks and arboretum have enhanced UW-Madison's reputation for scenic beauty. Hollywood filmmakers have selected the campus as its location for films about college life; one film was the 1986 hit *Back to School* with Rodney Dangerfield.

Faculty

The UW-Madison faculty routinely wins national citations for teaching excellence, research and service. Much of the university's international reputation comes from the quality of its faculty. In fact, UW faculty and alumni have accounted for 12 Nobel and 17 Pulitzer Prizes. There are 54 UW-Madison faculty members who have won Presidential Young Investigator awards (second to MIT), nine winners of the National Medal of Science and three Searles Scholars. Fortyfour professors at the UW-Madison are enrolled in the National Academy of Sciences, 14 are members of the National Academy of Engineering and three have been named to the



National Academy of Education.

One of the nation's leading institutions for higher learning, the UW-Madison includes 11 schools, 133 academic departments, more than 17,000 employees and a \$1.2 billion budget. Majors are offered in 156 bachelors, 184 masters and 125 doctorate programs.

Student Body

From an initial enrollment of 17, the student population has grown to more than 40,000, making it fifth-largest among public four-year institutions. Although almost 80 percent of the students come from Wisconsin — representing every county of the state — Madison's isthmus is truly an international community.

UW-Madison students come from more than 125 countries, and the university ranks fourth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment. It is one of the nation's most diverse student populations.

Political Atmosphere

Because of its roots in Wisconsin legislation, UW-Madison has always maintained close links with the state. With the passage of a federal act in 1862, it became one of the nation's first land grant

colleges, establishing a tradition of research in agriculture and the life sciences.

A number of centers and programs exist on the campus specifically to facilitate the exchange of information between the university and government, business and industry. Mandated by Wisconsin statute, faculty governance has been a hallmark of the university of Wisconsin since its founding.

Academic Leader

The UW has been a leader in many areas. Among the breakthroughs at UW: establishing the first academic programs in the U.S. for Scandinavian Studies (1875), Psychology (1888), Agricultural Economics (1909), Genetics (1910) and Wildlife Management (1939); launching the world's first space observatory; conducting the first bone marrow transplant in the United States; operating the nation's first radio station (WHA) in 1917; discovering Vitamins A and B; and finding evidence to link cancer with saccharine and cyclamates.

THE BIG TEN CONFERENCE

"I think the Big Ten is simply the best conference in the country, and I don't think there's a lot of argument with that. If you look at schools with the best total athletic programs, you start with the Big Ten. As far as basketball specifically, it's the most watched conference in the country. More people watch Big Ten basketball than any other league in America. The excitement level is incredible. You're playing in front of sellout crowds night in and night out, and everybody has great home fans. The talent level is great. If you just look at the most recent NBA drafts, you see what kind of players the Big Ten turns out. If you play in this league, you're going to be playing against the best players in country."—Head Coach Stan Van Gundy

From its beginning 100 years ago, the Big Ten Conference continues to be recognized as one of the premier athletic leagues in the nation. In a time when consistent excellence is difficult to maintain, the Big Ten continues to be a showcase for the finest achievements in athletics and academics.

Basketball Success

The Big Ten Conference is arguably the premier basketball conference in America. The league regularly sends five or six teams to the NCAA Tournament. The Big Ten leads the nation with 33 Final Four appearances and is second with 210 NCAA Tournament victories. Big Ten schools boast nine NCAA titles since the tournament began in 1939, including Wisconsin's 1941 crown.

Nation's Attendance Leader

Big Ten men's basketball has enjoyed unprecedented popularity through the years. Crowd sizes every season justify this assertion. The Big Ten has been the conference leader in attendance every year since 1977 and retained its place last season by averaging 12,696 per game. The 11 league teams attracted an NCAA-record 2,163,693 spectators in 1992-93.



Media Exposure

More evidence of Big Ten basketball's popularity is found in the consistently high television ratings and exposure. No fewer than 96 of 99 Big Ten intraconference men's basketball games will be televised in 1995 by CBS Sports, ESPN and Raycom Sports. CBS will

nationally televise eight conference and four non-conference games. Nine different Big Ten teams are scheduled to appear on CBS; all 11 could appear depending on CBS wildcard picks the last two weeks of the season. ESPN will nationally cablecast 13 conference and three non-conference games. ESPN's nine-game "Big Tuesday" Big Ten series begins in January. The Big Ten has been ESPN's highest-rated college basketball conference for seven straight seasons.

With Penn State's addition to the league in 1992, the Big Ten features 11 institutions in eight states and reaches into major metropolitan areas such as Chicago, Detroit, Minneapolis/St. Paul, Cincinnati, Columbus, Milwaukee, Indianapolis, Pittsburgh and Philadelphia.

Conference Leadership

The Big Ten has long been recognized for its excellence in athletics, but more importantly is dedicated to the academic well-being of its participants. The league has long pushed for higher standards for student-athletes.

With its founding principles still serving as the guiding force, the Big Ten will continue to be a national leader.

ACADEMICS & ATHLETICS

Achieving national recognition in both academics and athletics is a difficult challenge for universities and colleges today. The University of Wisconsin is one of the few institutions that has earned praise for its work in the classroom and on the field of play.

With its admittance to the Association of American Universities (AAU), one of the most prestigious organizations of higher education, the UW-Madison has been recognized for its solid reputation in the academic world. Indeed, only 56 schools nationally are in the AAU.

Balancing the academic requirements of an outstanding institution with the demands of collegiate athletic competition is difficult. However, the University of Wisconsin has attacked the challenge and succeeded.

Besides its academic prowess, the University of Wisconsin is one of the top total-sports programs in the nation. The Wisconsin program finished 12th in the inaugural Sears Directors Cup standings for the 1993-94 academic year. The all-sports championship was created by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) to recognize the school with the best performance in men's and women's Division I athletics.

On the conference level, the Badger program placed second in the Big Ten Conference composite standings with team titles in men's and women's golf and a co-championship in football.

Inclusion in the AAU and a top-15 finish in the Directors Cup proves that academics and athletics do mix at the University of Wisconsin.







y vision is to make this program a perennial winner in the Big Ten. I don't want the NCAA Tournament to be something rare and something you'll get excited about because it doesn't come around very often. I want it to be something that we come to expect here. We want to be one of those teams that every year is going to be in contention for the Tournament, and in your better years will be in contention to win the Big Ten."

Stan Van Gundy stated those words at his inaugural press conference on July 22 when he was elevated from associate

head coach to head coach following the departure of Stu Jackson, who resigned to become general manager of the Vancouver Grizzlies of the NBA.

The 35-year-old Van Gundy, who is now the youngest head coach in the Big Ten, may not have to wait long for one of those "better years," as he takes over a squad that is arguably the most talented and promising in Wisconsin history.

Last season, in Jackson's second year at the helm of the program, the Badgers earned their first NCAA Tournament invitation since 1947 and just the third bid in school history. In addition to scratching the 47-year NCAA Tournament itch, the 18-11 Badgers achieved their highest national ranking, climbing as high as No. 12 in both the Associated Press and CNN/USA Today rankings and spending more than 10 straight weeks in both polls. The team enjoyed just the third winning season since 1974 and matched the

fourth-highest win total in school history. For the first time in school history, every game at the Field House was sold out.

With four starters and eight letterwinners back from last year's breakthrough squad, optimism is at an unprecedented high for the 1994-95 team. An upper-division finish in the Big Ten, which would be the team's first since 1974, is within reach, and some prognosticators feel the seasoned Badgers will be among a handful of teams that will contend for the league title. Wisconsin hasn't finished in the top three of the conference since a runner-up finish in 1962.


"I'm certainly not going to downplay expectations," says Van Gundy, who has coached 200 games at the Division II and NAIA levels. "We return four starters and have a lot of people back who are very good players. We should be very, very good.

It may sound corny, but our success is going to depend on the commitment every single one of us is going to make, players and coaches alike. Every player better be working hard to get ready, and better come back in shape and ready to work and make the commitment to winning again."

Heading the list of returnees are pre-season all-America Michael Finley and rising star Rashard Griffith, who combined to score 42 percent of the Badgers' points and were the team's top rebounders last season. In all, 69 percent of last year's scoring and 71 percent of the rebounding are back.

The biggest shoes to fill are those of point guard Tracy Webster, a three-year starter who concluded his career as the Badgers' all-time leader in assists (501) and steals (183). The emotional pulse of the team, Webster averaged 11.4 points last season and ranks eighth on the school's career scoring list (1,264). Also gone is forward / center Jeff Petersen, who averaged 8.1 points and 4.2 rebounds as the Badgers' "sixth man" a year ago. Center Grant Johnson and shooting guard Jason Johnsen were also lost to graduation, while forward Otto McDuffie transferred out of the program.

BACKCOURT

The heir apparent to Webster at the point is sophomore **Darnell Hoskins**, who averaged 11 minutes of action in 22 appearances a year ago. He averaged 2.7 points and 2.1 assists per game but came on strong at year's end. Ac-

cording to the coaching staff, the ultra-quick guard was playing as well as anyone on the squad during the last month of the season.

Also battling for time at the point will be freshman **Sean Mason**, a 6-2, 165-pounder from Olympia Fields, Ill., who will also see action at the shooting guard spot. He averaged 21.8 points as a senior and led Rich Central High to a 23-6 record.

Senior **Andy Kilbride** is the incumbent at the off guard slot. A two-year starter, he pitched in 7.4 points last season and was ranked among the Big Ten leaders in three-point field goals and three-point accuracy. A hard-nosed defender, he can also handle the point guard role if needed.

Kilbride is backed up by sophomore swingman Jalil Roberts and freshman Mosezell Peterson. Roberts played in all

but one game last year, averaging more than 17 minutes. He pitched in 5.5 points per game. Peterson, a 6-4, 195-pounder from Louisville, Ky., averaged 19.9 points and 8.0 rebounds per game as a senior in leading Ballard High to a 25-5 record.

Rounding out the Badgers' backcourt is senior shooting guard **Chris Conger**, a walkon who returns for his third season. A longrange shooter, he saw limited action in 10 games a year ago.

FRONTCOURT

Three frontcourt starters return, led by senior all-America candidate Michael Finley. The leading scorer on the 1994 USA Goodwill Games team that won the bronze medal in Russia this summer, he needs just 262 points to pass Danny Jones as the Badgers' career scoring leader. He currently ranks fourth with 1,593 points and is on pace to become the first 2,000-point scorer in school history.

Finley led the Badgers in scoring (20.4), field goals (208), field goal attempts (446), three-pointers (66), three-point attempts (182), free throws (110) and minutes (36.1) last season

and was second on the squad in rebounds (6.7), assists (3.2) and steals (1.4) per game.

A two-time team MVP, he became just the second player in UW history to average more than 20 points per game twice in a career. He is the No. 2 returning scorer in the Big Ten this season, behind Michigan State's Shawn Respert (24.3).

"It's a great feeling knowing that every night we take the floor we'll have one of the best players in the country on our side," Van Gundy says. "Michael has taken his game and his body to another level this summer. He's developed tremendously in the upper body and gained a lot of strength while still maintaining his agility and smoothness."

Sophomore center Rashard Griffith, who played on Stu Jackson's North squad at this summer's U.S. Olympic Festival, returns to anchor the Badgers in the middle. The 6-11, 270-pounder earned Freshman all-America recognition after averaging 13.9 points and a teambest 8.5 rebounds in his inaugu-

ral campaign. He led the Big Ten with 2.8 blocked shots per game — the first Badger to lead the conference in that category — and was the only freshman in the conference ranked in four statistical categories.

Griffith, who missed four games due to

Griffith, who missed four games due to injury midway through the Big Ten season, finished two blocked shots shy of Brad Sellers' single-season school record of 68 and needs just 55 blocks to pass Brad Sellers as the school's career leader.

"I think the Olympic Festival this summer was good for Rashard's development, and we're looking for another solid season from him," Van Gundy says. "He'll again be one of the dominant inside forces in our

league."

Rounding out the returning starters is senior power forward and two-year starter **Brian Kelley**. Despite averaging just 5.3 points and 4.6 rebounds per game, he was consistently praised by the Badger coaches


for his understanding of team defense, his picks and his unselfishness as the Badgers' "consummate role player." The 6-7, 255-pounder suffered a sprained knee late in the season and saw limited action in the final three games.

Also returning in the frontcourt is senior **Howard Moore**, who was a member of the Big Ten all-star team that competed in Argentina this summer. He saw limited action in 12 games last season, averaging 2.8 points and 1.4 rebounds per game.

Rounding out the stable of forwards are three newcomers. The leading candidate for playing time is junior college transfer **Osita Nwachukwu**. A 6-8, 230-pounder, Nwachukwu (pronounced wa-SHUKE-oo) averaged 8.3 points and 5.9 rebounds for Kilgore (Tex.) Junior College last season. A native of Nigeria, he is the first foreignborn player in Wisconsin history.

"Osita has a Big Ten body and will give us a forceful presence inside," Van Gundy says. "I think he'll really challenge Brian Kelley at the four spot."

Sean Daugherty, a 6-10, 240-pound freshman from Vincennes, Ind, will also battle for playing time. A finesse player with three-point range, he averaged 19 points and 10 rebounds as a senior at Vincennes High.



"Despite his size, Sean will be one of our top three-point shooters," Van Gundy says. "He's an excellent long-range shooter and can make a contribution inside as well. He needs to improve his strength and stamina, but he should be a key contributor."

Daugherty and Nwachukwu will also back-up Griffith at the center spot.

Rounding out the corps of newcomers is 6-9,230-pound **Booker Coleman**, a freshman from Erie, Pa. He averaged 17.3 points and 10.0 rebounds for Cathedral Prep last year and was a first-team all-state selection.

"Rebounding was our biggest weakness last year and will always be a concern," Van Gundy says. "We made a concerted effort to shore up our frontcourt in this last recruiting class, and I'm very pleased with the three kids we brought in at the power forward spot."

and Stanford highlight this year's non-conference schedule. Home games against Wright State, Valparaiso and Loyola Marymount and a road game at Eastern Michigan round out the non-conference slate. The Big Ten schedule features two games against each league team with the exception of Illinois and Purdue, which are on the schedule just once.

Ten of the Badgers' opponents advanced to post-season play last season — Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Michigan State, Minnesota, Purdue, Marquette and UW-Green Bay made NCAA appearances, while Northwestern and Stanford were NIT participants.

Wisconsin will appear on national television a school-record five times during the season. The Badgers will be seen on CBS twice — at home against Michigan and at defending league champion Purdue — and


for the second consecutive season will make three appearances on ESPN — at home against Penn State and Indiana and on the road against Minnesota.

san Van Gundy, who served as an assistant coach under Stu Jackson the last two seasons, was named head coach at Wisconsin on July 22, less than an hour after Jackson was unveiled as vice president of operations and general manager of the NBA Vancouver Grizzlies. The 35-year-old Van Gundy, who is now the youngest coach in the Big Ten, was signed to a five-year contract. He is the 12th head coach in Badger basketball history.

Named associate head coach last season, Van Gundy was the chief recruiter on Jackson's staff and has been heavily involved with scouting and game preparation, as well as the day-to-day operations of the basketball program. The Badgers posted a 32-25 record over the last two years and have appeared in consecutive post-season tournaments for the first time in school history. Last year, the Badgers advanced to the NCAA tournament for the first time since 1947 and finished with an 18-11 record.

Though he has never headed a Division I program, Van Gundy is certainly not lacking for experience. He has coached 200 games at the NAIA and Division II levels, boasting a 122-78 (.610) record. Before coming to Madison, Van Gundy was head coach for four seasons at Massachusetts-Lowell, where he compiled a 54-60 record. He led his squad to a 16-13 record and a berth in the New England Collegiate Conference semifinals in his inaugural season in 1989. The Chiefs posted a 14-15 mark his last season and again advanced to the semifinals of the NECC playoffs.

Prior to his stint at Lowell, Van Gundy served as an assistant under veteran coach Nick Macarchuk at Canisius College (1987) and Fordham University (1988).

From 1984-86, Van Gundy was head coach at Castleton State College (Vt.), where he posted a 68-18 mark. As a 24year-old rookie head coach in 1984, he directed Castleton State to a 26-2 record and a runner-up finish in the NAIA District 5 playoffs. For his accomplishments, he was named NAIA District 5 Coach of the Year and Vermont's College Coach of the Year. The team posted a 23-7 record in 1985 and captured the District 5 championship. In his third and final season, Van Gundy led the Spartans to a 19-9 mark and the district semifinals. The school's records under Van Gundy were the three best in school history.

Van Gundy, who began his coaching career as an assistant at the University of Vermont (1982-83), grew up in Martinez, Calif., where he was a star guard at Alhambra High School. A three-time all-conference selection, he earned all-Northern California honors as a senior and graduated as the all-time leading scorer in Alhambra history (1,233 points).

Stan played college basketball for his father, Bill, at SUNY-Brockport from 1978-81 and was named Scholar-Athlete of the Year for the entire SUNY system as a senior. Majoring in English and physical education, he graduated summa cum laude in 1981.

Stan's father, a 36-year coaching veteran, is now head coach at Genesee Community College in Batavia, N.Y. Stan's younger brother Jeff is an assistant coach with the New York Knicks.

Van Gundy and his wife, Kim, have a daughter, Shannon (2), and are expecting a son in December. They live in Madison.

Q & A WITH STAN VAN GUNDY

Q: What do you see as your biggest strength as a head coach?

A: My biggest strength as a head coach is that I'll continue to work like an assistant coach. I want to get involved in every aspect of the program. I understand the need for leadership, but I also understand the need to continue a cer-

tain work ethic. I want all the people in our program to look at me and know that I'm working every bit as hard as they are. I think the other strength I have is enthusiasm, and I think that will carry forward and be contagious. I'm absolutely excited to get started.

Q: How do you react to concerns about your lack of Division I head coaching experience?

A: It didn't seem to hamper Steve Fisher at Michigan. He's been to a couple of Final Fours. I think that issue is a little overplayed. I'm convinced that my background is a great way to learn the ropes of this business. Being at those lower levels, you learn a lot of things you can't learn at this level or anywhere else. When you're at a Division II or III school, you don't have the tremendous support people we have

around here. There are a lot of people who get into the business at this level who rely on these support people, but they don't really know what those people are doing. I've sat in a room and monitored study table as a coach because there was no one else to do it. I've done everything you could possibly do in terms of running a basketball program, from managing budgets to doing the recruiting, to handling academics, to running the preseason conditioning program.

I've got seven years of head coach-

ing experience behind me. I'm not going to be walking out on the court for the first game this season saying 'Oh, my God' and wondering what the heck to do when the ball goes up. I've coached 200 college games. They haven't been at this level, but basketball is played the same at all levels. The decisions you make in a game are the same. You've got

to go somewhere to learn how to do that, and I'm very satisfied with my background and very confident in my abilities.

Q: What were some of the things you learned during your two seasons working with Stu Jackson, and do you expect much of a transition period?

A: What Stu really gave me was an appreciation for running a program at this level. I've been involved in every aspect of this program. I have tremen-

dous appreciation for what Stu has done for me, in terms of bringing me here to begin with, and also for the way he treated me and the responsibility he gave me. I can honestly say there have been very few decisions made in this program in the last two years that I have not been a part of, so I think the transition will be an easy one.

Q: What are your top priorities for the program?

A: Recruiting is an absolute priority. In this business, you recruit well or you don't get the job done. You've seen that in our football program. Barry Alvarez was the same coach the first year he got here as he was last year when we won the Rose Bowl. He was simply dealing with better personnel. There's no secret to the successful programs out there; they're the ones where the head coaches are out there really working hard. So recruiting is a priority and it's going to get my daily attention.

Q: What are your long-term goals for this program?

A: I'd like to be a perennial contender for the Big Ten title. I'd like to be a team that year

in and year out is a first-division team in this league, and in our better years we'll contend for the Big Ten championship. Certainly we want to be a team that's in the NCAA Tournament on a very regular basis. To do that, we obviously have to do well on the floor, and we also have to continue to recruit well.

Q: How would you assess the strengths of this year's team?

A: I think our strengths are, No. 1, experience in our starting lineup. We

have four starters returning. No. 2, we've got perhaps the best player in the Big Ten Conference in Michael Finley and probably the best big guy in the conference in Rashard Griffith, so we've got two of the better players in the league. No. 3, we should be very strong defensively based on what we've got back from last year. And No. 4, we shoot the ball very well.

will be right there battling for playing time at the wing spot. He came back in great shape and is very talented offensively.

In most cases, how well a newcomer can defend, rebound and handle the physical play in the Big Ten will determine how quickly they will play and help you. last two years, so we're going to go forward with it. We're going to run the ball as much as we can, we're going to give our players freedom offensively as we have been, and we're going to strive to be the best man-to-man defensive team in the Big Ten.

Q: How do you see the Big Ten race shaping up this season?

A: In my mind, I've got to look at Indiana and Michigan up top again. But even with those teams you can point at some weaknesses more so than in the past. On a strict talent level, those two are very, very strong and they have enough returning people who really know what's going on and who have played a lot. From there, you've got Purdue, Minnesota, Illinois, Michigan State and us, and we should all be pretty good. Those are the seven teams that went to the NCAA Tournamentlast year, and in my mind none of those teams have been weakened substantially. Purdue obviously had the most notable loss in Glenn Robinson, and the rest of us also had some losses, but we've all got good people coming back and some strong talent coming in.

I don't think there's anyone in our league that's not capable of winning games. I think the most overlooked fact in the Big Ten last year is that the two last-place teams each won five conference games. If you look at most other leagues, their bottom teams are winning none, or maybe one or two games. It's just an automatic win for whoever plays them, and that's not the case in the Big Ten. Our bottom teams are going to win five or six games, so it's a difficult league across the board.

Q: What are your biggest concerns?

A: I think our depth is a real question because we're going to rely on mostly all new people coming off the bench. Rebounding is still a concern because we basically have the same frontline and less size off the bench. We improved a little last year but still didn't rebound real well. We're a little inexperienced at the point guard spot with the loss of Tracy Webster.

Q: How do you see the five newcomers fitting into the rotation?

A: Our expectations are that all five of them can help us and can fit into the rotation. Sean Mason is talented enough to challenge Darnell Hoskins for the starting point


guard spot, so he's in a position to really push for considerable playing time. For Sean Daugherty, it'll depend on how well he can defend and rebound, because I know he can help us offensively. With Booker Coleman, it'll depend on how well he can rebound and what he can do offensively, because I know he can defend. With Osita Nwachukwu, I have a pretty good idea that he can defend and rebound, so it's a matter of how well he can do offensively and how he can handle the ball. Mosezell Peterson

DAVE BOLLWINKEL

Entering his first season at Wisconsin is veteran coach Dave Bollwinkel, who brings a wealth of knowledge and experience to the Badger staff. He comes to Madison from the University of Dayton, where he served as an assistant coach under Jim O'Brien the last two seasons.

Recognized as a top-notch recruiter and organizer, Bollwinkel served as head coach at Cal Poly Pomona for five years prior to his stint at Dayton. He posted a 60-78 record at the Division II school, with winning seasons his last two years. He was honored as the California Collegiate Athletic Association Coach of the Year in 1991 after leading Cal Poly Pomona to the conference championship game.

Before being named head coach at Cal Poly Pomona, Bollwinkel held assistant coach positions at California (1976-77), Cal Poly Pomona (1977-78), Oregon (1978-80), Colorado State (1980-82) and San Jose State (1982-87). Prior to entering the college coaching ranks, he spent four years as a high school coach in the Oakland, Calif., area, winning two conference championships.

A native of Lafayette, Calif., Bollwinkel attended Princeton University (1968-69) and California, where he graduated with a degree in political science in 1972. SHAWN HOOD

Shawn Hood, 29, joined the Badger staff in August following a six-year stint as an assistant at Cleveland State.

Hood, who served as CSU's senior assistant last season, worked with the Vikings' guards during his tenure as an assistant coach and also had responsibilities for recruiting, scouting and summer camps. He was responsible for the recruitment of Nike all-Americans Craig Caldwell and Reggie Welch and national top 50 player Jamal Jackson.

Hood was a four-year letterwinner at Cleveland State (1983-87), serving as the Vikings' captain his last two seasons. As a junior in 1985-86, he was a backup point guard on the CSU squad that finished 29-4 and earned the school's first NCAA Tournament bid. BRIAN HECKER



he team that did it. This is how the 1993-94 Wisconsin basketball team will be remembered in the annals of UW sports history. A team that started the season with great expectations brought on by an exciting second-

year coach, a nationally recognized recruiting class and a solid core of returning players, and lived up to those expectations by nailing down a trip to the "Big Dance."

From the beginning of the season, it was obvious that this was as good a Wisconsin basketball team as had ever been seen in Madison. Junior Michael Finley, an honorable mention all-America selection as a sophomore, returned to the squad following a summer of international competition that earned him USA Basketball Player of the Year honors. Point guard Tracy Webster was back for his final campaign after back-to-back seasons of all-Big Ten mention. Also returning were junior starters Andy Kilbride and Brian Kelley.

With as much experience and athleticism as the Badgers had returning, the Madison faithful would have had high expectations regardless, but with a top-10 recruiting class in the mix, there was a growing feeling that an NCAA bid was a must. Center Rashard Griffith, hailed as the best recruit ever at Wisconsin, swingman Jalil

Roberts and guard Darnell Hoskins made up the freshman class that was expected to help put the Badgers over the 47-year hump that existed in the program.

The non-conference season did nothing to slow down tournament talk. In the first game of the season, a 106-84 waxing of UW-Milwaukee, Griffith showed why he was among the top 10 recruits in the country. A monster line of 27 points, 12 rebounds and six assists gave hope that

the Badgers now had the inside presence to complete their offensive package. Though Griffith would lead Wisconsin in scoring in only three more games, the UWM game showed just how dominant he could be at the top of his game.

The Badgers completed a sweep of the in-state competition in the non-conference season with a 64-50 win over UW-Green Bay and a 71-52 victory over Marquette, both eventual NCAA tournament teams. Trailing 36-35 against the 24th-ranked Warriors with under 17 minutes to play, the Badgers went on a 26-7 run to blow the game open. Most impressive

was the Badger defense that held Marquette to nine points through nearly 17 minutes of the second half and 18 for the entire 20 minutes. That style of defense led the Badgers to their best season field goal defense (.420) since 1973-74.

The Marquette game also marked the end of an undefeated non-conference schedule (9-0), a feat that had not been accomplished in Madison since the 1929-30 season. It was that non-conference

slate, complete with road games at defending Southwest Conference champion Texas Tech and Loyola Marymount and a home game with Stanford, that would put the Badgers on track to post-season play.

The conference season began with a road game at Penn State, a lower-division team in the Big Ten, but a tough venue to visit. Wisconsin was impressive in a 71-56 victory, a win that increased in stature as conference heavyweights Purdue and Minnesota fell at Penn State over the course of the season. The Badgers improved their record to 11-0 with a 14-

point win over Ohio State, marking the team's best start since the 1915-16 team began with 12 consecutive victories. The team also achieved its highest ranking ever (12th by AP and CNN/USA Today) after its win over OSU.

The Badgers' undefeated season came to a screeching halt at Williams Arena in Minneapolis in a 90-53 loss to the Gophers. It was the Badgers' worst loss ever to Minnesota and their worst loss since 1987. But as bad as they looked at Minnesota, the Badgers looked that good in their next game against ninth-ranked and undefeated Purdue. Kelley and Finley combined to hold Glenn Robinson, the national Player of the Year, to 15 points on 5 of 26 shooting as the Badgers won 75-69. The win over the Boilermakers was arguably the biggest win of the season for Wisconsin, as Purdue went on to win the Big Ten title with a 14-4 mark.

On the heels of their upset win over Purdue, the Badgers split the next six games, winning three at home and losing three on the road, continuing a trend of homecourt success and road struggles. Standing at 15-4 overall and 6-4 in the

Big Ten, Wisconsin was a few wins away from locking up its coveted NCAA tournament bid. However, the Badgers were facing the stretch run at less than full strength. Griffith, sidelined for two games earlier with a knee injury, came up lame with back spasms and was unavailable for Wisconsin's next two games. Wisconsin lost both contests — a 109-78 repeat drubbing from Minnesota and a three-point loss at Purdue.

SEASON REVIEW

With Griffith back in the lineup, but still less than 100 percent, Wisconsin suffered a damaging home loss to Northwestern and a road loss at Illinois, putting the Badgers at 6-8 in the conference with four games to play. The prospects of an NCAA tournament bid, which at one time seemed a sure thing, suddenly seemed to be a longshot. Although they seemed destined for the NIT, the Badgers rebounded with their most focused effort of the year in taking on third-ranked Michigan. Wisconsin's 71-58 win was, in retrospect, the win that probably put the Badgers into the NCAA tournament.

Although nobody was calling it a must-win game at the time, the win showed that, despite a few damaging losses, the Badgers were still a team deserving of an NCAA bid.

Wisconsin closed out the regular season with losses at NITbound Northwestern and Indiana, sandwiched around a 24-point drubbing of Iowa. At 17-10 overall and 8-10 in the conference, the Badgers were looking to become the second school ever from the Big Ten to enter the 64-team field with a losing conference record. Obviously, the NCAA's selection committee weighed the strength of the Big Ten schedule into its decision, as Wisconsin did indeed break from tradition and headed to the West Regional for a firstround matchup with Cincinnati.

The Bearcats proved to be a formidable foe, but Wisconsin was able to upset the Great Midwest Conference tournament champions on the strength of 22-point performances by Finley and Griffith. Griffith was also a monster on the boards, pulling down 15 rebounds against the out-sized Bearcats. The win advanced Wis-

consininto a second-round matchup with fifth-ranked Missouri and proved that the Badgers were able to compete on a national scale.

The Badgers' game with Missouri was decided by the incredible shooting accuracy of the Tigers. Connecting on an amazing 68 percent of its shots, Missouri was able to overcome a career-best 36 points by Finley and a season-high 27 from Webster to end the Badgers' season,

109-96. Playing in his final game as a Badger, Webster put together one of his finest all-around games, adding seven assists and no turnovers to his point total.

After the Missouri game, Jackson talked about how important the 1993-94 season was for setting a standard of excellence that future Badger teams must now strive to surpass — and what a standard it is. By reaching the second round of the NCAA tournament, the team established a goal for the 1994-95 team to top. The Badgers' 18-11 record marked the school's best winning percentage in 20 years (.621), and their 14-2 home record was their best

since 1950 and matched the school record for home wins in a season.

The Badgers earned their first ranking in the AP poll since 1974 and their highest ranking ever (12th) in the AP and CNN/USA Today polls. During one stretch, Wisconsin spent a record 13 straight weeks in the AP poll. The anticipation of a breakthrough season spurred season ticket sales to record numbers. Every seat in the Field House was sold for

the entire season, giving Wisconsin a record 184,000 in home attendance.

Individually, several players stepped up their games. Finley, one of 16 finalists for the John Wooden Award, continued to establish himself as one of the elite players in college basketball. His 20.4 scoring average was down a bit from his sophomore mark but still tied for the fifth-best total in a season at Wisconsin. He also established himself as a force on the boards, averaging 6.7 per game, almost a full rebound better per game than the previous season. Finley's season culminated with second-team all-Big Ten

and honorable mention all-America recognition, as well as the team MVP award.

Webster dished out 171 assists, good for second on the UW season-best list. In his three seasons at Wisconsin, he posted the top three season assist totals in school history and took the lead in career assists (501). His 69 steals in 1993-94 led the Big Ten and set a Badger record, catapulting him into the career lead at Wisconsin (183). He earned honorable mention all-Big Ten recognition, his third all-Big Ten honor in as many years.

Griffith posted nine "double-doubles" in his inaugural season. His 27-point performance in the season-opener established a record for most points by a Badger in his first game. He blocked 66 shots, two shy of Brad Sellers' Wisconsin record, and led the Big Ten in blocks per game with 2.8, the first Badger ever to do so.

Kilbride averaged a career-best 7.1 points per game, including a 10.1 average over his final 14 outings. Senior Jeff Petersen was instant offense off the bench, averaging a career-best 8.1 points in just 17.2 minutes per game. He

earned the team's Most Improved Player award and his third consecutive academic all-Big Ten honor. He was joined on the academic team by Grant Johnson, a four-time academic all-Big Ten recipient, and Chris Conger, who made his second appearance on the team.

March 21, 1941 — Madison, WI NCAA East Regional First Round

The Badgers began their quest for the national championship by rallying in the second half to down Dartmouth in the NCAA East Regional at the UW Field House. The lead changed hands four times in the first half before Dartmouth assumed a 24-22 lead at intermission. The Big Green managed to stay ahead or even through the first 15 minutes of the second half. The score was knotted at 42-42 with about eight minutes left when three-time Ivy League scoring champion Gus Broberg scored inside to give Dartmouth a 44-42 lead. The Badgers tied it again on a hook shot by Charles Epperson, then took their first lead since early in the game on an inside basket by Gene Englund. Englund scored again minutes later, and John Kotz added a pair of free throws to put Wisconsin up 51-46 with just over a minute remaining. Dartmouth scored the game's final four points, including a desperation field goal from near halfcourt as the final gun sounded. Englund and Kotz finished with 18 and 15 points, respectively, to lead the UW, while Broberg paced Dartmouth with 20 points.

March 22, 1941 — Madison, WI NCAA East Regional Championship

Wisconsin avenged a 36-34 home loss to Pittsburgh earlier in the season with a 36-30 victory over the Panthers in the NCAA East Regional title game at the UW Field House. The Badgers jumped to a 10-5 lead and were in front 12-9 before Pittburgh's Eddie Straloski scored six straight points to give the Panthers a 15-12 lead. Pittsburgh led 18-14 at halftime and built its lead to 23-18 early in the second period. The Badgers scored the next six points to go up 24-23, getting a basket from Gene Englund and a field goal and two free throws from John Kotz. They built the lead to 29-25 and eventually extended the margin to 36-26 to win handily. Wisconsin outscored the Panthers 16-6 from the free throw line, going to the stripe 20 times compared to Pittsburgh's seven. Englund was 7 of 8 from the line and finished with 11 points, while Kotz made all four charity tosses and totaled 10 points. Straloski paced the Panthers with 12 points.

Gebert pitched in three more field goals to help the Cougars narrow the margin to 34-32, but the Badgers nailed down the title on a field goal by Kotz and a free throw by Strain. Englund had 13 points to pace the victors, while Kotz totaled 12 points and was selected tournament MVP. Gebert led the Cougars with a game-high 21 points. Wisconsin ended the season with a 20-3 record.





COMEBACK VICTORIES

The largest known comeback in school history occurred on Jan. 5, 1976, when Wisconsin came back from a 22-point deficit in an 82-81 overtime victory over Ohio State at the Field House. The Badgers were outscored 27-5 during a nine-minute stretch in the first half and trailed 47-25 with 3:21 left in the period. They narrowed the gap to 49-31 at halftime and outscored the Buckeyes 41-23 in the second half, forcing overtime when Dale Koehler hit two free throws with 25 seconds left to tie the game at 72-72. Ohio State scored the first five points in the extra period, but the Badgers answered with a 10-2 run to go up 82-79 with 13 seconds left. The Buckeyes made two free throws with eight seconds left before Wisconsin ran out the clock. Wisconsin shot .297 from the field in the first half and .588 in the second, while Ohio State fell from .583 in the first period to just .379 in the second.

The two other biggest comebacks came on Dec. 4, 1948, when the Badgers trailed Marquette by 18 points (37-19) with 17:58 left in the game before rallying for a 67-63 overtime win, and on Nov. 29, 1982, when Wisconsin defeated Toledo 79-71 after trailing by 17 points (47-30) with 19:11 left in the game. Both games were at the Field House.

MEDIA INFORMATION

Credentials

Requests for credentials must be placed with the UW Sports Information Office in writing, at least one week in advance. Requests should be made on company letterhead. Upon receipt of applications, appropriate credentials are either mailed or available at the Sports Information Office or the press will-call window at Gate B of the Field House.

Credentials will be issued according to the following priority guidelines: 1) National publications and newspapers filing for the following day's publication. 2) All newspapers designated by the visiting sports information director. 3) Television and radio stations originating a live broadcast. 4) Television and radio stations covering for nightly news. 5) All other requests will be evaluated on a space-available basis, with preferences given to those who regularly cover Wisconsin basketball.

Spouses, dates, children and other non-workers will not be allowed in any of the media areas.

Parking

A very limited number of parking passes are available. They will be issued on a first-come, first-served basis. Contact the Sports Information Office for further information.

Radio

Each visiting radio station admitted for broadcast should contact the UW Sports Information Office at least one week prior to the game they wish to cover. Each station will be issued three credentials as per Big Ten guidelines. If credentials are not mailed, they may be picked up at the Sports Information Office, or on game day at the media will-call window at Gate B of the Field House. Radio facilities are located in the balcony level of the west side of the Field House.

Photographers

Floor photo passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service and television photographers. Photographers are expected to display their credentials prominently at all times and must work from behind either baseline. No photographers will be permitted along the length of the floor. The University of Wisconsin follows NCAA and Big Ten guidelines regarding event photography.

Practices

All Wisconsin practices, including shoot-arounds, are closed. Van Gundy and players are available for interviews either before or after practice (see following schedule).

Player Interviews

During the fall semester, when practices are scheduled from 1:30-4:30 p.m., players will be available for interviews from 4:30-5 p.m. During the winter semester, when practices

are scheduled from 4-7 p.m., players will be available from 3:30-4 p.m. All interviews must be arranged through the Sports Information Office. Please contact John Estes by noon of the day you wish to interview a player. No interviews are granted the day of a game, with the exception of postgame interviews.

Freshmen will be available for interviews just one day a week during their first semester. Contact John Estes at the Sports Information Office to check on each week's schedule.

Players' telephone numbers will not be made available to the media, and players have been instructed not to conduct interviews when contacted by telephone. For out-of-town reporters, requests for collect-call telephone interviews may be made with John Estes at the Sports Information Office.

Van Gundy Interviews

Van Gundy will be available for interviews after practice in the fall semester and before practice during the winter semester. On the road, Van Gundy will be available to the media at the Badgers' hotel the day or evening before the game or following the team's shoot-around the day of the game. Call

Several courtesy phones will be made available by the UW Sports Information Office.

Fax-on-Demand Service

The Big Ten Conference office and league schools offer 24-hour access to the latest press releases, statistics, notes and box scores via a fax-on-demand network.

Because of this unique service, the University of Wisconsin no longer faxes or mails its basketball releases to media personnel. These releases/game notes can be accessed by requesting cell 3212 on the fax-on-demand system. Similarly, box scores (3214) and play-by-plays (3215) are available immediately after all home games. If media members do not want to access this service, there will be a \$10 charge to fax box scores.

To receive more information, contact the Big Ten Communications Department at (708) 696-1010 or the UW Sports Information Office at (608) 262-1811. Because this service is designed for media use only, the phone number should not be given to the general public.

Postgame Interviews

Head coaches and selected Badger players will be available following each home game in the women's locker room in the southwest corner of the Field House on the lower level. Generally, the visiting coach will be available first, followed by Van Gundy, then UW players. The UW locker room is closed.





Radio Coverage

Exclusive radio coverage of Badger basketball is heard on the 43-station Wisconsin Radio Network. The University Athletic Department and Learfield Communications entered into an agreement last fall for radio broadcast rights for UW football and basketball.

Learfield chose WIBA (1310 AM) and WOLX (94.9 FM) as its rights-holders in the Madison market and WTMJ (620 AM) in Milwaukee.

Calling all the action on the Wisconsin basketball network is Matt Lepay, who has been the voice of Badger basketball for the past six seasons. A 1984 graduate of Ohio State, Lepay was the sports director at WTSO before joining WIBA this season. He previously served as sports director of WNCI in Columbus, Ohio, and prior to that worked at stations in Athens and Piqua, Ohio.

Lepay, who also handled play-by-play on Badger football broadcasts this fall, serves as host of the Barry Alvarez and Stan Van Gundy call-in shows





Wisconsin Field House



he Wisconsin Field House has been the home of the Badgers since 1930. The building was a project of former athletic director George Little when he arrived at Wisconsin-Madison in 1925.

In 1927, Little proposed to the athletic council and regents the plan under which the Field House was to be constructed. This proposal met the approval of the board after two previous attempts had failed.

The original layout included a \$650,000 building to house both an indoor training facility for intercollegiate teams and the required program of physical education. The portion to be used for intercollegiate athletics was estimated at \$385,000.

The intercollegiate section of the facility housed the men's and women's basketball teams and the wrestling squad. Its construction cost approximately \$434,000. The first game played in the Field House was on Dec. 13, 1930, when the Badger men's basketball team posted a 17-14 win over Carroll College. The official dedication game followed on Dec. 18, when Wisconsin downed Pennsylvania, 25-12.

The structure remains a part of Camp Randall Stadium, standing on the south end of the field, with stands built against its north wall. The Field House originally contained a basketball floor with a seating capacity of 12,000, a complete track

facility, and room for indoor football and baseball training.

The football, track and field and baseball teams moved to the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center, better known as "the Shell," upon its completion in 1956.

In April of 1976, the state Building Commission approved \$718,000 for the renovation of the Field House. The project was aimed at improving the seating facility and allowing for other activities to be held in the building.

Permanent bleachers were added to the north, south and west sides of the court, with portable seats and a stage area on the east side. This effort brought the seating capacity to 11,500. New locker rooms and a training facility were constructed under the west stands and the existing locker rooms were renovated.

A new lighting system was added in 1977, along with an improved sound system. A state-of-the-art scoreboard was installed prior to the 1991-92 season.

In addition to serving as the home for the UW men's and women's basketball, wrestling and volleyball teams, the Field House is the site of the WIAA boys' and girls' state basketball tournaments, the WIAA state wrestling tournament, concerts, graduation ceremonies and numerous other events.


From the Dane County Airport — Exit airport via International Lane to Packers Avenue (Hwy. 113). Turn left on Packers Avenue, which changes to Pennsylvania Avenue, Johnson Street, Gorham Street and then University Avenue. Stay on University Avenue through campus until Randall Avenue (look for Milan's Sub Shop and McDonald's on the left side of University). Turn left on Randall Avenue. Go approximately three blocks until Randall forks. Take the right fork (Monroe Street). The Field House is located on the right side on Monroe Street.

From south and I-90 (from Chicago) — Take I-90 to the Madison beltline (Highway 12/18). West on the beltline to Park Street (Hwy. 151). Exit right (north). Take Park Street to Regent Street. Turn left on Regent Street, then approximately six blocks to the Field House.

From east and I-94 (from Milwaukee) — Take I-94 to Highway 30 West. Take Highway 30 to its end at Highway 113 South. Turn left onto 113 South, which becomes Packers/Pennsylvania Avenue. Continue on Packers/Pennsylvania Avenue, which changes to Johnson Street, Gorham Street (one way) and then University Avenue. Stay on University Avenue through campus until Randall Avenue (look for Milan's Sub Shop and McDonald's on the left side of University). Turn left on Randall Avenue. Go approximately three blocks until Randall forks. Take the right fork (Monroe Street). The Field House is located on the right side on Monroe Street.

From west and I-90/94 (from Minneapolis) — Take I-90/94 to Highway 151 South (East Washington Avenue). Continue on East Washington Avenue to State Capitol building. Turn right on Webster Street and complete half a square around the Capitol (Webster to Dayton to Fairchild). Turn right on West Washington Avenue. Follow West Washington to Regent Street. Turn right onto Regent Street. Follow Regent to the Field House.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



at Richter, the former Wisconsin all-America gridiron star and the last nine-time letterwinner in school history, continues to work his magic as Director of Athletics at his alma mater.

During a time of budget tightening, presidential reform and gender equity concerns, Richter has built one of the most respected intercollegiate athletic programs in the nation.

Entering his fifth seasons as Director of Athletics, Richter enjoyed a '93-94 campaign that included many accomplishments. A Rose Bowl victory over UCLA was the Badgers' first appearance in Pasadena since Richter's 1962 squad lost to No. 1 USC. Wisconsin was first nationally in college football attendance increase and finished fifth in the coaches' final poll.

The men's basketball team made its first appearance in the NCAA tournament in 47 years, won 18 games for only the fourth time in school history and advanced to the second round of the national tourney. The hockey team participated in its national championship for the seventh year in a row and 19 of the division's 20 sports have competed in NCAA post-season play during his tenure.

In 1994, Wisconsin finished among the national leaders for the prestigious Director's Cup, presented by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) for all-around athletic success.

Perhaps most satisfying to Richter, however, was the department's elimination of what was a \$2.1 million deficit in 1990. The Badgers were a huge success at the gate last year by filling their venues for football, basketball and hockey to 98.3 percent of capacity. The entire basketball season was sold out on a season ticket basis for the first time in school history.

Named to his position in December of 1989, Richter is in charge of 20 sports, nearly 700 student-athletes, more than 160 employees and a large physical plant.

Athletic Career

Richter's affiliation with Badger athletics started as an undergraduate, when he earned three letters each in football, basketball and baseball.

Pat earned all-America (1961-62), academic all-America (1962) and all-Big Ten (1961-62) honors as a football end. He led Wisconsin to the 1963 Rose Bowl and set a game record with 11 receptions in one of the best Rose Bowl games ever.

Richter led the Big Ten in receiving twice and is still the third-leading receiver in school history. As a senior, Richter won Wisconsin's 1963 Big Ten Medal of Honor (given for proficiency in scholarship and athletics) and received the Knute Rockne Award (given to the nation's top lineman).

Richter earned all-conference honors in baseball (1963) and led the Badgers in hits, home runs and runs batted in three times. Pat earned his scholarship for basketball, where the 6-6 center played three seasons.

After earning his B.S. degree from the UW in landscape architecture in 1964, Pat was a first-round draft pick of the NFL's Washington Redskins. He played eight years (1963-71).

Professional Life

Upon retirement from the NFL, he returned to Wisconsin to earn his law degree (1971). After employment with a Madison law firm, he worked his way up to Vice President of Personnel at the

Oscar Mayer Corporation.

Richter was honored with an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award for post-college achievements in 1988. He is a member of the Wisconsin State Athletic and Madison Sports Halls of Fame and the NFL Player and Alumni Associations. Pat was included in the inaugural class of the Athletic Department Hall of Fame in 1991. Last spring, he was a finalist for induction into the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame.

Personal Life

Richter and his wife, Renee, have four children: Scott, Brad, Barry and Tim. Barry was a member of the 1994 U.S. Olympic hockey team and currently plays in the New York Rangers' organization.



BIG TEN CONFERENCE

meeting of seven Midwest university presidents on Jan. 11, 1895, at the Palmer House in Chicago to discuss the regulation and control of intercollegiate athletics was the first development of what would become one of organized sports' most successful undertakings.

Those seven men, behind the leadership of James H. Smart, president of Purdue University, established the principles for which the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives, more popularly known as the Big Ten Conference, would be founded.

At that meeting, a blueprint for the control and administration of college athletics under the direction of appointed faculty representatives was outlined. The presidents' first-known action was "restricted eligibility for athletics to bonafide, full-time students who were not delinquent in their studies." This helped limit some problems of the times, especially the participation of professional athletes and "non-students" in the university's regular sporting events. That legislation, along with others that would follow in the coming years, served as the primary building block for amateur intercollegiate athletics.

Eleven months after the presidents met, one faculty member from each of those seven universities met at the same Palmer House and officially established the mechanics of the "Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives," or "Big Ten Conference" or "Western Conference."

Those seven universities were: the University of Chicago, the University of Illinois, the University of Michigan, the University of Minnesota, Northwestern University, Purdue University and the

University of Wisconsin. Indiana University and the State University of Iowa (now the University of Iowa) were admitted in 1899. The Ohio State University joined in 1912. Chicago withdrew in 1946 and Michigan State College (now Michigan State University) was added three years later in 1949.

After a 40-year period of constancy in membership, the Conference expanded to 11 members for the first time. On June 4, 1990, the Council of Presidents voted to confirm its earlier decision to integrate Pennsylvania State University into the Conference.

At the turn of the century, faculty representatives established rules for intercollegiate athletics that were novel for the time. As early as 1906, the faculty approved legislation that required eligible athletes to meet entrance requirements and to have completed a full year's work, along with having one year of residence. Freshmen and graduate students were not permitted to compete, training tables were forbidden, and coaches were to be appointed by university bodies "at modest salaries."

Football and baseball were the popular sports prior to 1900. Wisconsin won the first two football championships and Chicago claimed the first three baseball titles. The first "official" sponsored championship was in outdoor track, and it was held at the University of Chicago in 1906. It was won by Michigan.

Since then, there have been many different athletic events popularized on Big Ten campuses. Some became extremely popular — football and basketball, for example. Others, like boxing, fell by the wayside. Today, the Big Ten sponsors 12 championships for men and 11 for women.




