



# PRIME BENEFACTORS

The Kohl Center, set to open in January, is named for U.S. Sen. Herb Kohl (D-Wisconsin), a 1956 graduate of the UW-Madison, who donated \$25 million to the project. Kohl's gift is the single largest private donation in University history. Kohl earned his Bachelor of Science degree in American Institutions from Wisconsin-Madison.

Former all-Big Ten basketball player Albert "Ab" Nicholas and his wife, Nancy Johnson Nicholas, pledged \$10 million toward the project. For their generosity, the facility's practice gymnasium will be named the Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion. Nicholas received his B.S. and M.B.A. degrees from the UW-Madison.

Another financial boost to the project came in the form of a \$2.5 million gift from the Kellner family — Jack F. and his sons, Ted and Jack W. — of Milwaukee. All three Kellners received degrees from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

# THE CONSTRUCTION

The facility will cost \$76 million with \$49 million coming from private gifts and \$27 million in state program revenue bonds, which will be repaid with proceeds from operation of the Kohl Center by the Department of Athletics. There will be no taxpayer or University funding involved in the construction or operation of the Kohl Center.

# **EVENTS TO BE STAGED**

Wisconsin men's and women's basketball, UW-Madison commencements, WIAA state high school tournaments (boys' and girls' basketball and wrestling), musical concerts, summer sports camps and clinics and special events. The building will accommodate Wisconsin hockey at a future date.

# CAPACITY

The Kohl Center will seat 16,500 for basketball. That figure includes 7,500 seats in the lower seating bowl and 4,500 in each of the two balconies. The unique

design of the Kohl Center (with two overhanging balconies) guarantees that all fans will be close to the playing floor with excellent sight lines. The facility is expected to seat approximately 11,000 for hockey. 

# HANDICAPPED SEATING

The Kohl Center will be fully accessible to disabled fans restricted to wheelchairs. Seating will exist for 165 handicapped fans along with their companions. The locations are divided between court level, and the first and second concourses. Disabled parking locations are convenient to the building. The facility will have fully accessible TDD phones, doorways, restrooms and concession stand counters for handicapped patrons. A public access elevator will be available for all fans to use. Services for the hearing impaired are available.

# SPACIOUS LOCKER ROOMS

The Kohl Center will be the new site for the UW men's and women's basketball and, eventually, hockey locker rooms. Four other locker rooms (for visitors or multiple teams during tournaments) also will be in the arena.

The 2,200-square foot, state-ofthe-art locker areas are being designed with the needs of student-athletes in mind, including consideration for team organizational meetings, an athletes' social area and study areas.

There will also be a lounge area with a sound system, video room, computers available in the study room and, of course, a spacious dressing and shower area complete with multiple outlets and lighted mirrors.

# BUILDING SIZE AND DIMENSIONS

The Kohl Center will encompass 450,000 gross square feet rising 90 feet above the ground. The building includes two full-service con-

courses, with the main concourse ceiling measuring 23 feet high.

# LOADING DOCK

The Kohl Center will offer a 30,000 square foot loading dock. There is enough space to house four semi-trucks for large events

in the building. The facility is designed to allow a semi-truck to drive onto the floor for unloading.

# **LUXURY SUITES**

There will be 36 suites (28 in the Kohl (lower) concourse and eight in the Kellner (upper) concourse) in the Kohl Center. Each suite is designed to hold 16 individuals.

### **NICHOLAS SUITES**

Located on the first concourse inside the front door will be a reception room capable of hosting pregame, in-game and postgame gatherings. The room has a capacity of 200 people and can be divided into three smaller rooms. Full food and beverage service is available. These reception rooms may be rented by an organization or the public on a per-game basis. Fans will have a full view of the court from these rooms.

# RETAIL STORE

A full-service retail store will be on-site at the Kohl Center. It will be open during normal business hours plus offer extended hours on game days. Several portable retail vending locations will be located throughout the arena.

# **AUXILIARY GYM**

The Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion will house three full-size basket-ball courts to be used for practice sessions when the Kohl Center is booked for other events. Pregame booster club functions will be scheduled in the gym.

# SUPPORT STAFF AREAS

Many of the athletic department's support staffs will have auxiliary areas in the Kohl Center. They include sports medicine, equipment and laundry, and strength and conditioning.

# TICKET OFFICE

The athletic department ticket office will move its operation into the Kohl Center. The "will-call" window and ticket purchase window will be located in an indoor lobby. An additional six ticket purchase windows on the exterior

of the Kohl Center will handle walk-up sales.

# **FAN AMENITIES**

A state-of-the-art sound system will be implemented in the Kohl Center and TV monitors (capable of showing replays) will be wired to the luxury suites and above concessions stands throughout the building. The Field House scoreboard will be moved into the Kohl Center.

# **Fun Facts**

- The Kohl Center is the secondlargest arena in the Big Ten.
- It would take 1,351,990,520 hockey pucks to fill the Kohl Center.
- The 40,000 cubic yards of concrete in the Kohl Center could build a sidewalk from Madison to Chicago.
- The 30,000 square feet of glass in the Kohl Center is enough for 166 homes.

# MEDIA ACCOMMODATIONS

A full-service media work and interview room will be behind the stands on the court level. Working locations will include video/statistics monitors, phone jacks and power outlets. A darkroom for photographers also will be located near the media workroom.



In the late 19th century, responding to a wave of public interest in gymnastics and other forms of indoor exercise and recreation, several of the more prestigious colleges and universities in the eastern United States began to build large and elaborate gymnasiums to meet the growing demand. Harvard and Yale set the pace, and about that same time, introduced to the sport of basketball by James Naismith, a Canadian-born physical education instructor, many more American enthusiasts began to fill the gyms as spectators of the exciting new game.

At the University of Wisconsin, where the original gymnasium, an old wooden structure on Bascom Hill, had been destroyed by fire, there was strong sentiment to build a replacement. Funding, however, was problematic. But in 1891, when the Wisconsin State Legislature passed a mill tax to help fund a dairy building and law school for the UW and an armory for the state, legislators managed to include a new gym in the package.

The state's decision to build an armory was directly related to a spate of civil disorders, most in the form of tumultuous labor disputes, that were occurring around the country. In Chicago, there was the Haymarket Riot; in Pennsylvania, the Homestead War; in Wisconsin there were two occasions in the 1880s when the National Guard was called out in response to riotous conflicts in Milwaukee and Superior. An urban armory, authorities reasoned, would provide a centralized staging area for the Guard to assemble and train, and could serve as a storehouse for arms and munitions.

Some regional governments responded pragmatically by erecting dual purpose facilities to serve as both armories and gyms. One such structure, the Eighth Regiment Armory in New York, was featured nationally in architectural publications and in *Harper's Weekly* magazine, and it was that particular con-

figuration that provided much of the inspiration for a design submitted to the State of Wisconsin and UW by the Madison firm of Porter and Conover. In 1892, after raising the appropriation for the project from \$75,000 to \$100,000, the UW Board of Regents accepted a bid from T.C. McCarthy to construct the Gymnasium and Armory on the lakefront of lower Langdon Street at a projected cost of \$97,373.

By spring of 1894, construction was complete. In addition to the military specifications, which featured a large drill hall (93 x 160 feet), a smaller room for artillery drill, the commandant's office, and a broad main staircase to enable a battalion of troops to march up and down in columns of four, the Gymnasium/Armory also was fitted out for a wide range of sporting and physical activities.

On the third floor was the gymnasium proper ( $65 \times 160$  feet) containing gymnastic apparatus, a baseball batting cage and rowing machines. Surrounding that area was a 440-yard running track, and adjacent, two rifle ranges. Basketball would be played on the second floor in what otherwise served as the main hall for military

drill. At ground level were bowling alleys, a locker room and a swimming tank.

The final cost, including equipment, was \$122,058. Upon inspection, UW President Charles K. Adams pronounced the facility "not only larger, but also more perfectly adapted to the wants of physical culture than any other institution of the kind in the country."

For the next 35 years, the Gymnasium/Armory served a cross section of purposes. In addition to being a headquarters for the National Guard, the building was used by the UW's branch of the Reserve Officers Training Corps (ROTC). Student events abounded, including large assemblies, concerts, proms and pep rallies. For the UW community and extended public, there were addresses and political speeches by such nationally notable figures as William McKinley, William Jennings Bryan, Eugene Debs and Upton Sinclair. In 1902 and 1904, the building was the site of Republican state conventions, spanning the final two terms of Robert M. La Follette, Sr., as gov-

And then there was its use as a basketball arena.

Originally designed to accommodate 2,240 spectators during a period when the UW's enrollment was barely 800 and the intercollegiate game was still in its infancy, the Armory by 1910 had already grown too small for the size of the crowds. With an enrollment approaching 2,000, and expanding to more than 7,000 by the close of World War I, the UW had to make do for the better part of the next 20 years.

In the earliest days, there was the necessity of making certain adjustments to the ventilation and electrical lighting systems. In 1905, alerted by the infamous collapse of the New York armory, the University added buttresses to the north (rear) wall and also shored up the foundation. The only other major modification was the eventual addition of an annex to the east side of the building to increase crowd capacity slightly.

Complicating the issue considerably was Wisconsin's basketball success. From 1899 to 1929, Badger teams sported a winning edge of better than 80 percent for home games and won 11 Big Ten titles. Eight of those titles occurred during the extended tenure of the legendary Walter "Doc" Meanwell, who coached at the UW from 1912

to 1917, and again from 1921-34, guiding his teams to an overall record of 246-99 and a winning percentage of .712.

With excellence, of course, came other considerations. The alumni began to agitate for a larger and better facility. Intramural athletes, as well as those representing the University in other varsity sports, com-

plained of inadequate space for competitions and practices. Ticket scalping became epidemic. By the 1920's sportswriters were referring to the facility as "the little cigar box gym," and at one point, circa 1927, Meanwell himself was quoted by the *Chicago Tribune* as calling it "a foul-smelling rat trap."

If the general impetus for improvement already was present, it was not until the arrival in 1925 of George Little, formerly an assistant football coach at Michigan, that the full potential for change was clearly defined. Hired at Wisconsin in the twofold capacity of head football coach and athletics director, Little served for two years on the sidelines of Camp Randall Stadium, then gave up his gridiron duties to make administration his primary focus.

Improving the athletics physical plant was Little's greatest priority, and at the top of his list was replacing the Armory. By 1927, he had produced a detailed master plan for the general renewal or construction of several facilities, the Armory and a boat house among them, but the overall cost of \$3 million was considered prohibitive by the state. Citing economic hardship, Governor Fred R. Zimmerman

vetoed the proposal. But in 1928, acting through a dummy corporation set up previously to fund the Van Hise dormitories and provide furnishings for the Memorial Union, the regents approved a \$350,000 loan and granted UW the permission to proceed with planning for a major multipurpose structure at the south end of Camp Randall. Zimmerman left office in 1929, succeeded by Walter J. Kohler, Sr., who gave the project his blessing.

The news of "Little's Folly," as it was called by some doubting wags until its eventual success and acceptance, was greeted with a combination of fond anticipation and sheer incongruity. Designed by State Architect Arthur Peabody in concert with Paul Cret of the Laird and Cret firm, the building would reflect the strong influences of Lathrop Hall, another UW project created by Laird and Cret with Peabody's assistance some 20 years previous. Those architectural influences, predicated on the classic Italian Renaissance style, came together in a large and imposing structure replete with enormous round-headed windows, recessed panels suggesting columns, and the decorative use of Bedford limestone

> and terra cotta trim. The facing was sandstone rubble, a material once plentiful in quarries west of Madison and very much in character with many other campus buildings, including the Van Hise dorms.

In some critics' view, the structure was pompous, dream-like and grandiose. It might develop into a masterpiece, some reasoned, or a potential white

elephant of mammoth proportions.

Size, in fact, more than materials or ambience, was the element seized upon quickly by most early critics. With a planned seating capacity in excess of 8,000, at a time when the UW's enrollment was 8,400, there was reason for detractors to suggest that it would never be filled. The additional notion that capacity could someday be expanded to nearly 13,000 through the installation of a second balcony only seemed to underscore doubts.

From the time initial bidding was opened in June 1929 through dedication in December 1930, the project moved along smoothly. The Quinn Construction Company of Madison was retained to do the excavation and foundation, and William Christenson of Racine was hired as the general contractor. The cost was \$453,756, with \$51,000 to be repaid by the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics through revenues and private gifts over the course of the following 10 years.

Once again, the UW had established a facility that was comparable in merit to any of its kind in the country. At 200 feet by 240 feet, the Field House was large enough to accommodate two portable basketball courts for practice, and one

large court for regulation play. Football and baseball squads could use it for workouts as needed in the spring and fall, and a cinder track of one-eighth mile ringed the inside perimeter to allow, albeit very snugly, for the staging of track and field.

In 1933-34, boxing was introduced as an intercollegiate sport at UW and proved immensely popular with spectators. The Field House became a mecca for fans of the fight game and Wisconsin rewarded its supporters with a program that soon developed into the finest in the nation, earning eight NCAA team titles over the next 26 years and boasting numerous individual champions.

The excitement that surrounded boxing, coupled with the continuing competitiveness of the basketball team well into the 1950s, made seating expansion a necessity much sooner than anyone had anticipated. By January 1936, the second balcony was installed. Official capacity reached 13,000, but with floor seating added for boxing, the Field House could accommodate considerably larger crowds. The all-time attendance record for a single event was 15,200, set in 1940 at a dual match with Washington State.

The basketball team, regrouping

for much of the '30s, returned to prominence with a Big Ten championship in 1941, then climaxed its all-time greatest season with an NCAA title later that year. The Badgers won the Big Ten again in 1947, and between 1942 and 1949 finished, or tied for, second three times. For the UW coaches, John J. Walsh in boxing and Harold "Bud" Foster in basketball, and for their athletes and thousands of fans, those were glorious years.

Apart from men's basketball and boxing, the Field House has been used extensively by other UW squads, including wrestling, women's basketball and volleyball. Another long-time user, the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA), has rented the facility annually for many years to host state high school basketball and wrestling tournaments.

Other uses, particularly for crowds larger than either the Wisconsin Union Theater or Stock Pavilion can hold, have included orientations, commencements, concerts, pep rallies, student carnivals and homecoming shows. The Field House also has been the venue for campus visitors as diverse as the Dalai Lama and the Grateful Dead.

As years passed, however, times, interests and priorities began to change. Boxing was discontinued at Wisconsin in 1960. Between the mid-'50s and early 1990s, the basketball program fell on protracted hard times and attendance dipped precipitously, often to as few as 3,000 to 5,000 per game. As the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics suffered a shortage of revenues and funding in such critical areas as capital maintenance, the Field House began to grow slowly outmoded and in need of renewal and repair.

In 1974, driven in great part by the wishes of the WIAA, there was a major renovation at a cost of \$671,000, nearly half as much again as the cost of original construction. Improvements included the installation of permanent bleachers on the lower level and a permanent floor, expansion of locker rooms and con-

cession areas, and cosmetic detailing.

At the close of the 1980s, major personnel and policy changes in both the UW administration and the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics led to changing priorities and a renewed commitment to athletics excellence. Wisconsin's program had shown good balance overall for nearly 20 years, including some truly outstanding team and individual efforts, but certain critical areas remained in need of substantial reinforcement. Football and basketball were the major programs targeted, and with an influx of quality coaching and recruiting, the enthusiastic support of Badger fans, and increased revenues reflecting the resurgent interest of Badger supporters, the program began to take a quantum leap forward.

With greater human and fiscal resources, coupled with a reorganized and modernized administrative system, virtually all of the UW teams stepped up a notch or two in quality, most noticeably football and men's and women's basketball. Accompanying that upturn, the number of spectators increased in each case dramatically — and that rejuvenation of interest brought a greater demand for tickets than at any other time in UW history. There were greater demands placed upon the aging Field House, and with that, came mounting impetus for the decision that a new arena be built.

In the 1980s, and again in 1994, feasibility studies were conducted to determine the best available site for construction of the project. The consensus recommendations pointed to a parcel of UW and privately owned land near the intersection of West Dayton and Francis Streets, adjacent to the southeast dormitory complex and the Southeast Recreational Facility (SERF). Within the next year, preliminary planning for construction of the Kohl Center was under way.

# "Memories"

"Ohio State was ranked No. 1 nationally and was the defending national champion with Jerry Lucas, John Havlicek and Mel Nowell. OSU had a 47-game winning streak and we were in second place in the Big Ten. Coaches John Erickson and John Orr prepared us well and we rose to the occasion. We played great man-to-man defense individually and as a team. I was assigned the pleasure of guarding Havlicek and held him to three baskets. Offensively, we were in the proverbial 'zone', with everyone contributing. The fans wound up carrying us off the court. Great memories!"

"I remember sitting in the locker room before the games and hearing capacity crowds yelling and cheering even before our team came on the floor. Students and fans in the first and second balconies used to stomp their feet on the floors, which the team could easily hear in the dressing room. This added to the verbal din and created a particularly exciting atmosphere for all of us. I played in the early 1950s and the capacity of the Field House was larger then. Almost all games were played before capacity crowds in those days and the fan support, particularly in close games, was nearly deafening."

Paul Morrow, Badger center, 1952-54

"My fondest recollections are of the intimacy the fans had with the players, not only during the game but before and after, as well. The proximity of the seats to the court was a major advantage in terms of support, but having our locker room tunnel exit right into a public walkway allowed fans access to the players that you don't see much these days.

"Against Purdue in my freshman year, it was so cold outside that you could actually see your breath as we warmed up before the game!

"I also remember the voice of the late Jack Rane (former Field House p.a. announcer), who was a good friend to many of us."

"We defeated Marquette for the first time in 15 tries during the 1978-79 season. With two minutes left in the game, the crowd knew we had it won and stood and began screaming. I recall looking at Danny Hastings and not being able to hear a thing except a high-pitched humm. I also felt like I was being lifted off the floor. At the buzzer, I jumped onto the scorer's table to cheer the crowd.

"We also beat Michigan State and Magic Johnson at the buzzer on Wes Matthews' halfcourt shot. After it went in, the crowd poured onto the floor and lifted us above their heads to cut the nets. Michigan State won the national title that season.

"I remember: the popcorn smells and knowing it was game time; the noise level; the incredible fans and seeing the same faces in the same seats — tremendous loyalty and support; the band was outstanding and played with such heart and energy — we memorized most of the songs and always knew what parts of the game they would be played. (Band director Mike Leckrone) was a show by himself."

"In 1979, after Michigan State locked up a share of the Big Ten title in the next-to-last game, it had to play at Wisconsin. With the game tied in the final seconds, Earvin (Johnson) wanted to pressure the ball. Spartan coach Jud Heathcote said, 'Get back, get back!' Matthews promptly hit a 55-footer to win it. MSU went on to win the national championship, of course, and would have finished with 16 straight wins it if had beaten the Badgers.

"I froze at the Field House every year. It's the only arena in the country where I've worn gloves while typing a story!"

"I remember: Bud Foster, Don Rehfeldt and Bobby Cook — one of the best shooters I ever saw; the boxing on Friday nights and basketball the next day; the smoke at the end of some games was so thick you could hardly see the floor; 10 degrees below zero outside and 100 degrees inside — great place, great memories!"

"It's either too hot or too cold, and the person sitting behind you has his knees pressed against your back. It's also one of the loudest arenas in the Big Ten and, in the last two years, the atmosphere probably has been a major factor in the Badgers playing in the postseason.

"In a time where many "fans" go to sterile arenas more to be seen than to see a game, the Field House crowd is a throwback. Just throw on a red shirt and a pair of jeans and you're ready to watch some

basketball. I can look behind me and see the same folks who've had season tickets for years.

"The noise can be deafening. Even wearing a headset, there are times when I can't hear myself talk — such was the case during games last season against Iowa and Minnesota, two of the more important victories in recent memory, featuring endings UW backers will never forget.

"There have been other special moments like Patrick Tompkins' last-second lay-in to beat the Gophers, Sean Daugherty's buzzerbeater against Penn State and Tracy Webster carrying his team to a come-from-behind overtime win in just his second game as a Badger.

"There have been many disappointments, but the fans keep coming back. Gone are the days of the faithful 5,000." Those 5,000 are still here, but another 6,500 have joined them. They don't care about the 'old barn' being cramped or too hot. They just care about the home team. The Kohl Center has a tough act to follow."

"Bud Foster's first year as head coach in 1934-35 we shared the league title with Purdue and Illinois; the Big Ten and NCAA championships in 1941 — we hosted two NCAA Regional games and won both; boxing titles in 1939-42-43-47-48-52 and 56, all won in the Field House: Dale Bowers' two FTs with no time left to tie the game vs. Marquette and send it to overtime; the win over top-ranked Ohio State in 1962; Ken Barnes' school-record 42 points in 1965; defeating Michigan State in three overtimes in 1977; Rick Olson's 29 points vs. Michigan State and 39 vs. Michigan in back-to-back games in 1984."

"My memories began as a gradeschooler when I would fake illness on the first day of the state tournament and stay home and listen to the first round of games from my bedroom. I imagined what it was like to play in the Field House.

"In high school I attended each state tournament game and watched from the upper balcony. Finally, I began coaching high school ball and my very last high school game in 1976 was in the Field House when my team lost the state title game.

"Then I had the opportunity to bring my UW-Green Bay teams to the Field House to play in its 'unfriendly' confines. Finally, my dream was fulfilled when the Field House became my friendly home. I still get excited every time I set foot on the Field House floor. We go back a long way."

"I've had the opportunity to be a part of many special moments during my career at the Field House. There have been buzzer-beaters and many big upsets — games against Temple, Penn State, Indiana, Iowa and Minnesota come to mind as victories I'll never forget. The atmosphere that has been created by our fans, the student section and our terrific band is unmatched anywhere. There is no question they have been a huge part of our recent success. We all have hopes for similar conditions in the Kohl Center. However, the Field House will always be in a class by itself."

"Having grown up in Madison, my memories of the Field House are many and varied. On one of my first visits to the Field House I watched a Badger boxing match against LSU in the early 1950s and the atmosphere was electric. Attending the State High School Boys' Basketball Tournament as a youngster, then having the chance to play for Madison East and win the state title in 1958 in the Field

House was the greatest thrill for a high school athlete.

"I'd have to say, however, that being a member of the Badger team that, in 1962, upset the great Ohio State team led by Jerry Lucas and John Havlicek was exceptional. The game was the Badgers' from start to finish. Players stepped up to play better than ever. The crowd was incredibly enthusiastic and the Badgers beat the Buckeyes 86-67 in a game that will never be forgotten."

"Nobody has generated more attention by his mere presence in the UW Field House than the General, himself. Like his old plaid jackets and oversized red sweaters, Indiana's Bob Knight has always been the subject of curiosity.

"On this night, a Monday night (Feb. 16, 1987), this Knight was joined by ESPN's Dick Vitale as a national television audience watched the first-place Hoosiers, ranked No. 2 in the nation, and the last-place Badgers, rated a huge underdog. Fifty-four minutes and 56 seconds later, they were still watching as Dean Garrett rebounded Joe Hillman's airball and scored along the baseline to give the Hoosiers a pulsating 86-85 victory in triple overtime.

"Knight used his postgame forum to vent on the Big Ten for agreeing to take part int he second half of these made-for-prime-time, double-headers. Meanwhile, an emotionally drained Steve Yoder, who had just seen his team drop to 1-12 in the conference, thanked his players for not quitting. The Badgers came up short on points, not heart. It was a night to remember"

The Wisconsin basketball program is commemmorating its 100th anniversary in 1997-98. Following is a chronological list of highlights from the first 99 years of Badger basketball.

# DECEMBER, 1898

Six years after the advent of the new sport of basketball, Bob Burdick, John Mapel, Carl Sillman, Paul Stover and Captain Walter Hirschberg make up the first Wisconsin Badger basketball team. Dr. J.C. Elsom is the first UW coach.

# JAN. 21, 1899

Wisconsin plays its first game and falls to the Milwaukee Normal Alumni, 25-15, in Milwaukee.

# MARCH 4, 1899

The Badgers play their first home game. The Milwaukee Normal Alumni edge Wisconsin, 13-10, and the Badgers finish their first season 0-3.

# FEB. 15, 1900

Wisconsin defeats Wayland Academy, 25-15, for the first victory in school history.

# MARCH, 1902

After completing a 10-game schedule (all on the road), the Badgers finish the year with a 7-3 record, their first winning season.

# DEC. 2, 1904

Emmett Angell coaches the Badgers for the first time and watches his team rout Sparta's Company C, 75-10. Christian Steinmetz scores 50 points in the victory to set a pre-modern, single-game scoring mark.



# JANUARY, 1905

The Badgers make their first road trip to the East and come home with a 2-6 mark after games in New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania and Ohio.

# SPRING, 1905

Christian Steinmetz finishes the season with 462 points, setting a Wisconsin season scoring mark that would stand for 61 years. Steinmetz is later named the Badgers' first all-American.

# MARCH 15, 1907

Wisconsin defeats Purdue, 37-10, to secure an 11-3 record and a share of the school's first Big Ten title.

# MARCH 16, 1912

First-year coach Walter Meanwell, known as the "Little Doctor", guides the Badgers to a 32-21 win over Indiana to complete an unbeaten season at 15-0. Wisconsin wins the Big Ten title outright and will win or share the conference crown seven more times before Meanwell's coaching career ends in 1934.

# MARCH 16, 1918

Despite dropping a 19-11 decision to Minnesota, first-year coach Guy Lowman's Badgers win the school's sixth Big Ten championship in 12 years.

# DEC. 18, 1930

The Badgers defeat Penn, 25-12, in the dedication game for the new Wisconsin Field House.

# FALL, 1934


Harold "Bud" Foster, a former all-America player for the Badgers, takes over as head coach. Foster will hold that position for 25 years, longer than any other basketball coach in school history.

# SPRING, 1935

In his first season as head coach, "Bud" Foster leads the Badgers to the Big Ten title with a 15-5 record.

# MARCH 29, 1941

The "Cinderella" Badgers, lower division finishers in the



Big Ten just one year earlier, top Washington State, 39-34, to win the NCAA Tournament. The UW's John Kotz is named tournament MVP. Team captain Gene Englund is the Big Ten MVP and earns all-America honors.

# **SPRING, 1942**

Wisconsin has the Big Ten MVP for the second straight season when John Kotz earns the award. Kotz also garners all-America kudos.

# MARCH, 1947

The 15-5 Big Ten champion Badgers are invited to play in the NCAA Eastern Regionals in New York's Madison Square Garden. Wisconsin takes third place in the East by squeaking past Navy, 50-49, after losing the opener, 70-56, to CCNY.

# FEB. 28, 1949

Junior Don Rehfeldt takes 37 shots in a 70-47 trouncing of Iowa. Rehfeldt's 37 field goal attempts still stand as a singlegame Wisconsin record.

# **SPRING, 1950**

After being named the Big Ten's MVP, Don Rehfeldt becomes Wisconsin's last all-American to date. He finishes his career as the school's all-time leading scorer with 1,169 points. Rehfeldt also is picked second overall in the NBA Draft.

# JAN. 3, 1953

Center Paul Morrow grabs what remains a school-record 30 rebounds in a 50-46 victory over Purdue.

# JAN. 27, 1962

Despite Boilermaker Terry Dischinger's UW Field Houserecord 50 points (the mark still stands), the Badgers defeat Purdue 89-86.

# MARCH 3, 1962

The Badgers defeat a topranked Ohio State squad (86-67) that features all-Americans John Havlicek and Jerry Lucas, as well as reserve forward Bob Knight. The powerful Buckeyes see their 47-game winning streak come to an end.

# MARCH 11, 1963

Senior Ken Seibel earns the team's MVP award for the third consecutive season. He remains the Badgers' only three-time MVP.

# MARCH 8, 1965

Ken Barnes scores a schoolrecord 42 points, along with 23 rebounds, in a 92-73 loss to Indiana. Barnes' mark stands alone until Michael Finley matches it in December of 1994.

# MARCH 11, 1967

With 12 seconds remaining in the season finale against Illinois, sophomore Chuck Nagle makes a layup to tie Christian Steinmetz as the school's single-season scoring leader with 462 points.

# DEC. 9, 1967

The Badgers set a school single-game scoring record with a 120-82 win over Southern Methodist.

# MARCH 2, 1968

Senior Joe Franklin pulls down a career-high 27 rebounds in a 104-84 victory over Purdue — his final game at the UW Field House. Franklin ends his collegiate career one week later having amassed 858 boards for what still is a school-record 11.9 rebounds per game.

# MARCH 9, 1968


Only one year after Chuck Nagle snaps Wisconsin's 62-year-old single-season scoring mark set by Christian Steinmetz, Joe Franklin registers 30 points in the season finale at Northwestern to finish the campaign with a school-best 544 points.

# MARCH 13, 1971

Senior co-captain Clarence Sherrod scores 27 points in a season-ending loss at Michigan to finish the year with 570 points. It is the third time in five seasons that the Badgers have a new alltime single-season scoring leader.

# JAN. 5, 1976

The Badgers record the greatest comeback in school history when they erase a 22-point (47-25) deficit and gain an 82-81 overtime victory over Ohio State at the UW Field House.



# MARCH 3, 1979

Guard Wes Matthews hits a halfcourt shot as time expires as the Badgers defeat Magic Johnson and eventual NCAA champion Michigan State 83-81 at the UW Field House.

# DEC. 30, 1979

The Badgers connect on 32 of 43 field goal attempts (.744) to set a single-game school record and defeat Army 78-54.

# MARCH 10, 1981

Claude Gregory scores 29 points and grabs 17 rebounds in his last game as a Badger. He leaves the school as Wisconsin's career leader in points (1,745) and rebounds (904).

### DEC. 2, 1985

In a non-conference matchup with San Francisco State, senior Rick Olson makes 17 field goals in a 90-61 Badger victory. Olson's 17 field goals tops the previous school record of 16 set nearly 27 years earlier by Bob Litzow.

# MARCH 9, 1986

Setting a school record by starting every game (112) in his four-year career, Rick Olson guides Wisconsin past Northwestern, 70-68. Olson scores 26 points in the game and misses becoming the school's career scoring leader by nine points. However, he does become the UW's single-season scoring champion with 571 points.

# FEB. 16, 1987

In one of the most infamous games in school history, the Badgers take eventual NCAA champion Indiana to three over-

times before falling 86-85 at the UW Field House before a capacity crowd and national television audience.

# MARCH 8, 1987

Mike Heineman scores 20 points, grabs seven rebounds and hands out nine assists in his final game as a Badger. Heineman ends his career as Wisconsin's all-time assist leader with 388.

# DEC. 14, 1988

The Badgers record the widest margin of victory in school history with an 89-34 win over Denver at the UW Field House.

# MARCH 15, 1989

The Badgers, under Coach Steve Yoder, make their first-ever appearance in the National Invitation Tournament and defeat New Orleans, 63-61, at the UW Field House. It is Wisconsin's first postseason appearance since the 1947 NCAA Tournament.

# MARCH 20, 1989

Danny Jones scores 24 points in the season finale against St. Louis. His 611 points establishes a new single-season school scoring record.

# FEB. 15, 1990

Danny Jones snaps Wisconsin's career scoring mark with his first basket of a game against Ohio State. Jones ends his career with 1,854 points.

# MARCH 13, 1991

The Badgers make their second NIT appearance in three years and defeat Bowling Green 87-79 (OT) at the UW Field House. Wisconsin, however, is eliminated from the tournament five days later by Stanford.

# MARCH 25, 1992

Former New York Knicks coach Stu Jackson is hired as Wisconsin's 11th head coach.

# FEB. 13, 1993

Badger sophomore Michael Finley goes head-to-head with Purdue all-American Glenn Robinson. Finley scores 33 points and adds a school-record 10 steals but the Boilermakers prevail 90-87 in double overtime behind Robinson's 42 points.

# MARCH 17, 1993

Wisconsin qualifies for its third National Invitation Tournament in five years but loses 77-73 to Rice in the first round at the UW Field House.

## NOV. 22, 1993

The Badgers are ranked 25th by the Associated Press, their first national ranking by the A.P. since January of 1976.

# MARCH 17, 1994

Led by Michael Finley, Tracy Webster and Rashard Griffith, Coach Stu Jackson's Badgers defeat Cincinnati 80-72 in the school's first NCAA Tournament game since 1947. Wisconsin is eliminated two days later by Missouri.

# DEC. 10, 1994

Michael Finley scores a school record-tying 42 points in a 92-76 loss at Eastern Michigan. Finley registers 33 points in the second half to set the school mark for points in a half.

# JAN. 14, 1995

Michael Finley breaks Danny Jones' school career scoring mark in the first half of the Badgers' 74-67 win at home over Minnesota. Finley goes on to finish his career with 2,147 points.

# MARCH 31, 1995

Dick Bennett is hired from UW-Green Bay as Wisconsin's 13th head coach, replacing Stan Van Gundy.

# JUNE 28, 1995

Forward Michael Finley becomes Wisconsin's first firstround NBA draft choice since 1980 when he is selected 21st overall by Phoenix.

## MARCH 13, 1996

Coach Dick Bennett's Badgers defeat Manhattan 55-42 in the first round of the National Invitation Tournament at the UW Field House. The Badgers are eliminated five days later by Illinois State.

# JAN. 4, 1997

Wisconsin snaps a 31-game losing streak to Indiana with a 71-58 victory over the Hoosiers at the






# UW-Madison

The University of Wisconsin, founded in 1848, has been recognized throughout its history as one of the nation's leading institutions of higher learning. *U.S. News & World Report*, in a 1993 issue, included UW-Madison in a list of the "Best College Buys."

From the initial class of 17, the student population has grown to a current enrollment of nearly 40,000 students, the seventh-largest in the U.S.

- Wisconsin is one of just 60 members of the Association of American Universities (AAU), the most prestigious organization of higher education in the U.S.
- University libraries house more than 5.5 million volumes, 13th-most in the nation according to the *Association of Research Libraries*.
- According to a *Standard & Poor's* survey, Wisconsin is one of the nation's top producers of corporate executives, ranking second in undergraduate degrees.
- *U.S. News & World Report* rated the UW's graduate-level sociology department as No. 1 in the nation. Additionally, the magazine ranked education 5th, library science 6th, social work 7th, psychology and political science 9th and computer science, history, nursing and chemistry 10th.
- The 1983 Assessment of Research-Doctorate *Programs* in the U.S. reported that 15 departments on campus were rated in the top 10 nationally.


# Capital city in an energetic setting



# Media Exposure

Playing basketball in the Big Ten, particularly at Wisconsin, means playing basketball in the spotlight. Wisconsin is covered intensely by local, regional and national media outlets.


Local print coverage includes three major daily newspapers (one in Milwaukee and two in Madison), two student newspapers and one weekly publication (*Inside Wisconsin*) dedicated solely to Badger athletics. Three Madison TV stations and several radio stations also cover the team on a daily basis.

This season the Badgers are scheduled to appear on national television at least five times, including once on CBS, three times on ESPN and once on ESPN2. In addition, 16 other games are scheduled to be televised either locally or throughout the Big Ten region. The Wisconsin Public Television network also shows a number of games statewide on a delayed basis.

On radio, Badger games can be heard on a 43-station statewide network. Coach Dick Bennett has a weekly media conference that routinely draws at least 15 reporters, and he has a weekly television show that is seen in all corners of the state.







# Academics

# Student affairs office oversees academic progress

The primary objective of the academic and student affairs office is to ensure the academic success of all UW student-athletes. Counseling and advising services, plus a number of academic help programs, are offered to all UW student-athletes.

The academic and student affairs staff assists more than 700 student-athletes in registration and course selection, monitoring progress toward degrees and career guidance.

Staff members work with student-athletes who desire extra academic help. The department utilizes the services of more than 100 tutors to provide one-on-one assistance or group study help.

The department arranges for exam proctoring, offers advice on resume preparation and coordinates the grant-in-aid program. Support groups are offered to students who become medically or academically ineligible for competition.



The sparkling new Wade Fetzer Academic Learning Center opened last spring to aid Badger student-athletes in the pursuit of their scholastic goals. The facility includes study rooms, a computer room, auditorium, conference rooms and offices for academic support staff.



to quickly and thoroughly evaluate injuries.





A wide variety of facilities and equipment, including a rehabilitation swimming pool, Cybex equipment, the Impulse Inertial Exercise System, Stairmasters, and Fitron Bicycles, help athletes rehabilitate injuries and minimize the loss of fitness during recuperative time.

# Conditioning

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a sophisticated blend of science, technology and one-on-one attention to each athlete. Throughout the year, UW athletes spend more time working on strength and conditioning than any other aspect of their game. During the offseason, athletes work on strength improvement, speed, power, agility and conditioning. The inseason program is devoted to continuation of strength gains and performance-related conditioning.

Each year when freshmen arrive, baseline measures of strength, speed, power, agility, flexibility and endurance are collected. Measures of body composition, weight and frame-size are also recorded. With this information, goals are set for development and maintenance. Programs are established for each basketball player by strength and conditioning coach Scott Hettenbach, who also coordinates the sports nutrition program. The program assists athletes in meeting their nutritional demands and body composition goals.










# Wisconsin athletics rank among the nation's best


Participating in athletics at the University of Wisconsin guarantees an opportunity to compete at the highest level. The Badgers have developed a national reputation as one of the top all-around schools in Division I-A.

As a member of the Big Ten, Badger student-athletes receive the best in education, coaching, athletic competition, facilities and support.

Wisconsin demonstrated again in 1996-97 that it is one of the NCAA's top all-sports programs. The Badgers once again ranked nationally in the all-encompassing Sears Directors' Cup last year. Wisconsin has placed in the nation's top 20 for all-sports excellence in all four years of the Cup.

The Badgers also captured 1996-97 league titles in men's and women's cross country, indoor and outdoor track plus women's soccer.


Additionally, the football team played in its third bowl game in four seasons and the men's basketball team earned an NCAA tourney appearance for just the second time in 50 years.

# COVERAGE GUIDELINES

#### Credentials

Requests for credentials must be placed with the UW Sports
Information Office in writing, at least one week in advance.
Requests should be made on company letterhead. Upon receipt of applications, appropriate credentials are either mailed or made available at the Sports Information Office or with the parking attendant (white vehicle) at Lot 18 at the Field House (southeast corner of the stadium across the street from the fire station). The Kohl Center will have a Will Call window.

Credentials will be issued according to the following priority guidelines: 1) National publications and newspapers filing for the following day's publication. 2) All newspapers designated by the visiting sports information director. 3) Television and radio stations originating a live broadcast. 4) Television and radio stations covering for nightly news. 5) All other requests will be evaluated on a space-available basis, with preferences given to those who regularly cover Wisconsin basketball.

Spouses, dates, children and other non-workers are not allowed in any of the media areas.

## **Scouting Tickets**

As per the Big Ten Conference's policy, professional basketball scouts must purchase tickets through the UW Ticket Office (1-800-GO-BAD-GERS or 608-262-1440).

## **Parking**

A very limited number of media parking passes are available. They will be issued on a priority basis similar to the guidelines for the issuance of credentials.

### Radio

Each visiting radio station admitted for broadcast should contact the UW Sports Information Office at least one week prior to the game they wish to cover. If credentials are not mailed, they may be picked up at the Sports Information Office. Radio facilities are located in the balcony level of the west side of the Field House and courtside at the Kohl Center.

## **Photographers**

Floor photo passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service and television photographers. Photographers are expected to display their credentials prominently at all times and must work from behind either the southeast or northwest corners of the baseline. No photographers will be permitted along the length of the floor. The University of Wisconsin follows NCAA and Big Ten guidelines regarding event photography.

#### **Practices**

Wisconsin basketball practices at home are open to the media. Media attending practice are asked to sit along press row in the UW Field House. Gameday practice sessions, however, are closed.

## **Player Interviews**

Badger players will be available for interviews after practices.

All interviews must be arranged through the Sports Information Office. Please contact Justin Doherty at the SID Office (608-262-1811) or prior to the end of practice to secure interviews. No interviews are granted the day of a game, with the exception of postgame interviews.

Players' telephone numbers will not be made available to the media, and players have been instructed not to conduct interviews when contacted by telephone. For out-of-town reporters, requests for collect-call telephone interviews may be made with Justin Doherty at the Sports Information Office.

#### **Bennett Interviews**

Head coach Dick Bennett will be available for interviews for approximately 15 minutes after each afternoon Wisconsin practice. Bennett will be available at approximately 6 p.m. on days when the Badgers practice from 7-10 p.m.

Bennett also is available on the road at the Badgers' hotel or following the team's shoot-around the day of a game. Call Justin Doherty at the Sports Information Office to arrange an interview.

Additionally, Bennett holds a weekly media conference throughout the season. These sessions are generally at 1 p.m. in the "W" Club Room in Camp Randall Stadium. Audio cuts from the conferences are available after 4 p.m. on Mondays by calling 608/263-3100 (option 3).

Out-of-town media members wishing to arrange a phone interview with Bennett should contact Justin Doherty at the Sports Information Office.

#### **Press Row Services**

Working areas for the media are located on the west side of the Field House — in the mezzanine level for

most print media and in the balcony for broadcast media. Coats and other personal belongings may be stored in the Reinke Room at the north end of the Field House. Programs, media guides and game notes will be available in the Reinke Room before each game. Halftime and final statistics, play-by-play and coaches' quotes will be furnished to all working locations.

In the Kohl Center, media will be located at courtside and may use the spacious work room for filing stories, storage of personal belongings, access to pregame information, media guides, etc.

## **Telephones**

Telephone lines in the press area must be ordered at least one week in advance of the game(s) for which they are needed. Orders should be made through both Wisconsin Bell (800) 447-7738 and UW Telecommunications (608) 262-0521 during regular business hours. Several courtesy phones on press row will be made available by the UW Sports Information Office.

## Postgame Interviews

Head coaches and selected Badger players will be available following each home game in the women's locker room in the southwest corner of the Field House on the lower level. Generally, the visiting coach will be available first, followed by Bennett, then UW players. The UW locker room is closed.

The visiting coach, Bennett and Badger players will be available in the media work/interview room following games at the Kohl Center.

#### Steve Malchow, Sports Information Director

Steve Malchow is in his eighth season as Director of Sports Information at the UW. He is in charge of publicity for all 11 Badger men's sports programs.

## **Television Coverage**

A minimum of 22 of the Badgers' regular-season games, including all but four home games, will be televised live this season. Among those will be five nationally televised contests — one on CBS, three on ESPN and one on ESPN2 — and three that will be shown throughout the Midwest on the ESPN Regional network. Wisconsin's flagship station is WMTV in Madison.

WMTV sports director Craig Coshun, who called the action for several Badger games last season, heads this year's broadcast team. He is teamed with long-time analyst John Powless, who was head coach of the Badgers from 1969-76.


In addition to the live telecasts, several home games will also be aired on a delay basis on the state-wide Wisconsin Public Television network. WIBA Radio's Van Stoutt and UW academic and student affairs director Alan Zussman handle the announcing duties.



### Radio Coverage

Exclusive radio coverage of Badger basketball can be heard on the 43-station Wisconsin Radio Network. The Athletic Department and Learfield Communications entered into an agreement for radio broadcast rights for Wisconsin football and basketball prior to the 1994 season.

WIBA (1310 AM) and WOLX (94.9 FM) are the rights holders in the Madison market, and WTMJ (620 AM) carries the games in Milwaukee.

Entering his 10th season handling play-by-play duties is Matt Lepay. He has called Badger football the past four seasons. A 1984 graduate of Ohio State, Lepay was Sports Director at WTSO in Madison before joining WIBA in 1994. He previously served as Sports Director at WNCI in Columbus, and prior to that worked at stations in Athens and Piqua, Ohio.





## SEASON PREVIEW

After winning more games over two seasons than any Wisconsin squads have since Woodrow Wilson was President, the Badgers enter 1997-98 riding a wave of optimism and excitement into the third year of the Dick Bennett era.

There are good reasons for the sunny forecast. Wisconsin, entering its 100th season of basketball, returns four starters from a team that was 18-10 overall, 11-7 in the Big Ten (T4th) and earned only the fourth NCAA Tournament bid in school history a year ago.

Wisconsin also welcomes a highly regarded recruiting class that will join the Badger veterans in ushering in a new era when the team begins play in the state-of-the-art, 16,500-seat Kohl Center, which is set to open in mid-January.

The Badgers relied heavily last season upon a defense that led the Big Ten in field goal percentage defense and scoring defense and finished fourth nationally in both of those categories.

"Last year was a very satisfying year for all of us, particularly the way we played the second half of the Big Ten season," said Bennett, who is just five wins shy of 400 for his collegiate career. "I think what we did last year, in terms of performance, is reachable this year. We did it with some good halfcourt defense and some tough play, especially in the second half of many games."

In order for the Badgers to match or exceed their accomplishments of a year ago, they will need to improve their performance at the offensive end of the floor.

"We often labored to score last season and that put added pressure on our defense and forced us to come up with big plays down the stretch," Bennett said. "Our offensive improvement will be the key if

we wish to become an upper echelon team."

For the first time in his tenure at Wisconsin, Bennett will have a roster with a sizable group of upper-classmen. That will allow him to bring his newcomers along at a more reasonable pace.

"Prior to this season, our roster has been pretty much all younger guys and we lacked experience," said Bennett, who could become the first coach in school history to take the Badgers to postseason play in three consecutive campaigns. "To have a couple of classes full of juniors and seniors, I feel, is very important. That will enable us to use the freshmen appropriately."

The inexperienced players Bennett guided to 35 wins in his first two seasons now will be asked as upperclassmen to lead the Badgers into battle against one of the toughest schedules in Wisconsin history.

"I think maturity tends to bring more mental toughness among good players," Bennett said. "I believe we know what it takes from the experiences — both positive and

negative — we've had. We have realized, through our inconsistency, what is necessary for us to be successful.

"Since the beginning, I have spoken only about our level of play and I don't think it's time to start projecting numbers of wins, league standing, postseason possibilities or the like. We should play the game properly on both ends of the court. If we do that, I think we will be a better team."

#### THE BACKCOURT

Depth, flexibility and maturity figure to be the trademarks of the Wisconsin backcourt in 1997-98.

Two seniors (Ty Calderwood and Dave Burkemper), two juniors (Sean Mason and Hennssy Auriantal), a redshirt sophomore (Duany Duany) and a true freshman (Mike Kelley) comprise the guard positions. The group has experience and defensive ability in its favor.

"We will have the capacity to play three guards if we choose to," Bennett said. "With the experienced

guards, along with the maturity of Kelley, we know we have depth. All of them have worked on their jump shots. I'm not prepared to say this is a great shooting corps, but I think it can be a good shooting corps that can play good defense."

Calderwood returns for his final season at point guard after becoming a primary figure in the team's drive to the NCAA Tournament a year ago. Just the second Badger ever to lead the Big Ten in steals (2.33 per game), he averaged 8.8 points, 3.7 assists and shot a teamhigh .792 from the free throw line.

Calderwood made a game-winning three-point field goal with 0:07 left against Iowa and hit two game-winning free throws with 11.8 seconds left in an upset win over No. 2-ranked Minnesota on the last day of the regular season.

"Ty assumed the leadership role last year and I expect he will command that same role this year with more assertiveness because he has been through a season with us," Bennett said.

Mason, who has the ability to play either guard spot, has played in just 17 games the last two seasons after back-to-back ACL injuries to each knee. He was starting alongside Calderwood and was the team's leading scorer last year when he was injured in the fourth game of the season. He used a redshirt season and retains two years of eligibility.

"Sean holds keys in terms of his ability to return healthy," Bennett said. "He has had a good offseason with his rehabilitation. If he can come back, he will give our offense an immediate boost."

Burkemper, who joined the Badgers as a walk-on two years ago, played in 24 games last season, including starting nods in the last 10 contests. He is a hard worker, who is sound with the ball.

"Dave is always waiting in the wings," Bennett said. "He proved last year how valuable he can be.

He is a mistake-free player, who has worked hard on his jump shot. I know he will be ready to contribute in any way he can."

Auriantal is a fine one-on-one defender who led the Badgers in steals as a freshman. An academic all-Big Ten choice last season, he has not missed a game during his 60-game Badger career. He started 13 times last season and averaged 5.0 points per game.

"Hennssy had a very solid freshman year and leveled off a bit last year, which is not uncommon"
Bennett said. "He is more in tune with what he needs to do, particularly on offense. I look for him to make another jump this year. He will challenge for one of the two guard spots."

Duany, who took part in the Big Ten All-Star Tour last summer, start-

ed nine times and played in all but one game last season. His career-high 20 point performance at Illinois led the Badgers to a 17-point win in Champaign. The 6-5 Duany averaged 5.1 points and helps give the Badgers the ability to play with three guards.

"He went through a hard freshman year, but he learned a lot," Bennett said of Duany. "I think he will make a jump from his freshman to sophomore year."


Kelley, a first-team all-state point guard last season at Pius XI High in Milwaukee, is inexperienced; however, Bennett speaks highly of him.

"Mike is a very mature freshman, who will be able to contribute because of his defensive abilities, intelligence and intensity on the court," Bennett said.

Three other guards also will be listed on the roster this season. Junior Jon Bryant, a transfer from St. Cloud State, will sit out one year as mandated by NCAA rules. Freshman Chris Chambers is expected to join the team after the football season is over (he is a wide receiver for the Badgers). Freshman John Moriarity also is in the mix.

#### THE FRONTCOURT

The Badgers should be deep and flexible, if somewhat inexperienced, up front this season. Wisconsin returns starters in senior Sean Daugherty and junior Sam Okey, as well as senior reserves Booker Coleman and Brian Vraney. The remaining forwards — Andy

Kowske, Maurice Linton, Mark Vershaw and Charlie Wills — are true freshmen.

"We have a number of ways we could go," Bennett said. "We could use the veteran group consisting of Coleman, Daugherty and Okey. Sam has the capacity to guard on the perimeter and both he and Daugherty can move on the perimeter. Booker brings excellent defense, screening and rebounding capabilities and, if he can bring the aggressiveness that he has lacked in the past, he could have a very nice senior year."

Okey returns for his third season after earning second-team all-Big Ten honors a year ago. He finished third in the conference in rebounding (8.5) and averaged 11.2 points to finish second on the team. A finalist for a spot on the U.S. World University Games squad, he has started all 59 games in which he has played since coming to Wisconsin.

"After two years of great expectations, I think Sam is settling into more of a role," Bennett said. "He is realizing the need to utilize his strength and explosiveness, in addition to his perimeter skills. He is capable of impacting the game really anywhere from 20 feet in."

Daugherty, the team's most experienced player with 86 games under his belt, was the Badgers' second-leading rebounder (5.4) and third-leading scorer (9.6) a year ago.

"I anticipate Sean having an exceptional senior season," Bennett said. "He has size and he knows how to play."

Coleman enters his fourth year in the program. He played in all but one game last season, averaging 7.8 minutes, 1.1 points and 1.4 rebounds.

"It is time for Booker to demonstrate the aggressiveness that he

needs to demonstrate," Bennett said. "It is the reason he has not received more minutes. We have seen enough to know that if he is aggressive, he will make a major contribution."

Vraney enters his final season as a vital practice player for the Badgers. He earned a share of the team's Red Team Award last year for his efforts as a member of the "red team", which competes against the starters in practice.

The four incoming freshmen frontliners — Kowske, Linton, Vershaw and Wills — all bring size and a wide range of skills to the court. Kowske, according to Bennett, is "a banger who does all of the little things." Linton has the makings of a solid outside player with his size, athleticism and ability to defend on the perimeter. Vershaw is an allaround talent, who is ranked among the top 50 incoming freshmen in most national ratings. Wills combines size, offensive skill and competitiveness and should be in a position to contribute, as well.

#### THE SCHEDULE

Excluding the Big Island Invitational, which is Nov. 28-30 in Hilo, Hawaii, the Badgers will face four nonconference foes who participated in the 1997 NCAA Tournament. Two more nonconference opponents played in last season's NIT. Additionally, every Big Island Invitational entry — except for Division II host Hawaii-Hilo — played in last season's NCAA Tournament.

Wisconsin will host Indiana at the Kohl Center on Jan. 25 at 3 p.m. in the Badgers' first regular-season appearance on CBS in three years. CBS also may televise the Badgers' last game of the regular season at Michigan on March 1. The UW will appear on ESPN

three times — at Michigan State on Jan. 8, at Minnesota on Jan. 27 and at home vs. Iowa on Feb. 3. ESPN2 will telecast the final game in the UW Field House on Jan. 14 against Penn State.

The Big Ten's first postseason tournament will be held March 5-8 at the United Center in Chicago. Due to the postseason tournament, conference schools will play 16 league games, instead of the 18-game slate they have been playing since 1975. The 16-game schedule means that the Badgers will play Indiana, Minnesota, Purdue and Iowa only once this season.

John Chaney Head Coach Temple It only stands to reason that, after a while, teams take on the personality and characteristics of their coach. That being the case, followers of Wisconsin basketball are among the most fortunate fans in America.

The Badger basketball program is in the hands of third-year coach Dick Bennett, who starts his 22nd season as a collegiate head coach in 1997-98.

Bennett has been written and talked about by everyone from former players and fellow coaches to family members, administrators and the media. They use the same words and phrases again and again.

Humility. Toughness. Integrity. Competitive. Intense. Passionate. Fundamentally sound. A great teacher.

Bennett has stamped the Wisconsin program with these personal and professional traits and the results have been nothing short of remarkable.

In his first season he masterfully guided a team most felt would struggle to win 10 games to a 17-15 overall record and an appearance in the second round of the National Invitation Tournament. The 1995-96 Badgers were just the seventh team in school history to win at least 17 games. Guiding the squad through numerous personnel hardships, Bennett set the Wisconsin record for victories in a season by a first-year coach. He became the first Badger coach to win his Big Ten debut since 1912 when Wisconsin defeated Michigan on Jan. 3, 1996.

Bennett endured no sophomore jinx in his second campaign. Rather, he coached the Badgers to the school's second NCAA



Tournament appearance in 50 years, the school's highest Big Ten win total (11) since 1941 and the UW's highest regular-season victory total (18) since 1915-16. Last year's club finished first in the Big Ten and fourth nationally in both scoring defense and field goal percentage defense. The team put together the school's first six-game conference winning streak since 1951.

In his two seasons at Wisconsin, Bennett owns a 35-25 (.583) record. He has coached the Badgers to more wins in his first two years than any other Wisconsin coach. He and Stu Jackson are the only two coaches in Badger history to take teams to back-to-back postseason tournaments.

#### JUST ASK HIS PEERS

The Seattle Post-Intelligencer conducted a survey of 113 college basketball coaches at the 1995 Final Four and found that Bennett ranked

No. 2 nationally when coaches were asked to "name the head coach who regularly does the best job under the most difficult circumstances." The survey also showed that Bennett's peers felt that only Indiana's Bob Knight, North Carolina's Dean Smith and Duke's Mike Krzyzewski rank ahead of him on the national scene when it comes to "strategizing the game." Bennett received votes when coaches were asked "whom would you like to see as coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic men's basketball team."

#### **BUILDING A WINNER IN TITLETOWN**

Bennett came to Wisconsin from UW-Green Bay, where he spent 10 seasons guiding the Phoenix into the national spotlight and solidifying his reputation for coaching overachievers.

He inherited a UWGB team that was 4-24 the year before he arrived and, after his first squad went 5-23, guided the Phoenix to a 15-14 mark in 1986-87. It was just three more years before Bennett and the Phoenix jumped into the national picture with a 24-8 mark in 1989-90. Bennett was named 1990 Mid-

Continent Conference Coach of the Year and took the Phoenix to the second round of the National Invitation Tournament.

The 1990-91 campaign was an historic one for Bennett and the Phoenix. Led by Bennett's son, Tony, UW-Green Bay rolled to a 24-7 overall record and appeared in the school's first NCAA tournament, losing 60-58 in the first round against Michigan State. The Phoenix improved to 25-5 in 1991-92 and won their first regular-season conference title before falling in the first round of the NIT. Bennett was named Mid-Continent Conference and Kodak/NABC District 11 Coach of the Year in 1992.

Following a rebuilding campaign at UWGB in 1992-93, Bennett guided the Phoenix to back-to-back NCAA tournament appearances in his final two seasons. The 1993-94 squad was 27-7, won another conference title and shocked the college basketball world with a first-round NCAA tournament win over a 16th-

ranked California squad that featured Jason Kidd and Lamond Murray. Bennett was tabbed Kodak/NABC District 11 Coach of the Year and *Basketball Times* Midwest Coach of the Year in 1994. Bennett's Phoenix were 22-8 in 1994-95 and dropped a 49-48 decision to Big Ten champion Purdue in the first round of the '95 NCAA tournament.

#### **OFF TO COLLEGE**

Bennett's first collegiate head coaching position was at UW-Stevens Point in 1976-77. After Bennett's initial season at Stevens Point, the program's winning percentage increased each year for the next seven seasons. The only decrease in winning percentage came in Bennett's final season when the Pointers followed a 28-4 (.875) record with a 25-5 (.833) mark.

Bennett coached UW-Stevens Point to a 173-80 record in nine seasons. His last three Pointer squads, which featured guards Terry Porter "Dick Bennett is a tremendous basketball coach who truly loves teaching the game to his players. He is a class person and a credit to college basketball."



#### **BENNETT'S PROS**

Former Wisconsin center Paul Grant is the latest player to reap the benefits of Dick Bennett's abilities as a teacher of the game of basketball. Grant, whose name was absent from lists of projected NBA draftees prior to the '96-97 season, improved so much under Bennett that he became the 21st player selected (Minnesota) overall in the 1997 NBA Draft.

(now of the NBA's Minnesota Timberwolves) and Brad Soderberg (now one of Bennett's assistant coaches at Wisconsin) were a combined 79-13 and made three straight appearances in the NAIA tournament. Bennett was named NAIA Coach of the Year after leading his 1983-84 UW-Stevens Point squad to a 28-4 record and second-place finish in the national tournament. Bennett was named Wisconsin State University Conference (WSUC) Coach of the Year in 1982 and 1985, as well as NAIA District 14 and NAIA Area IV Coach of the Year in 1985.

#### THE JOURNEY BEGAN IN WEST BEND

Dick Bennett's road to Madison began 32 years ago when he coached the 1965-66 freshman squad at West Bend (Wis.) High to a 9-3 mark. He spent 11 seasons coaching Wisconsin high school teams to a combined 168-60 record from 1965-76. In his last year on the prep level, Bennett's Eau Claire Memorial unit recorded a 22-3 mark en route to second place in the state tourney.

#### ALL IN THE FAMILY

Bennett was born in Pittsburgh on April 20, 1943. His family settled in Clintonville, Wis., in 1955 and he attended Ripon College, where he earned a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1965. During his years at Ripon, Bennett played four years each of basketball (guard), football (halfback, returner) and baseball (third baseman). He holds a master's degree in education (emphasis in professional development) from UW-Stevens Point.

Bennett and his wife, Anne, are the parents of three grown children. Kathi, a former all-state basketball player who guided UW-Oshkosh to the 1996 NCAA Division III women's basketball title, is the women's head basketball coach at Evansville (Dick and Kathi currently form one of only two fatherdaughter head basketball coaching tandems at the NCAA Division I level; Minnesota's Clem Haskins and his daughter, Clemette, at Dayton, form the other); Amy, who completed her undergraduate and graduate studies at UW-Stevens Point, is a speech therapist in Green Bay; and Tony, who played for his father from 1988-92 and is UW-Green Bay's all-time leading scorer, currently plays professionally in New Zealand.

Dick's brother, Jack, is head men's basketball coach at UW-Stevens Point (the same position Dick held to begin his collegiate coaching career).



Brad Soderberg, a guard with Dick Bennett's strongest UW-Stevens Point teams in the mid-1980s, begins his third season as an assistant to his college coach.

Soderberg, who was hired in April of 1995 after two seasons as head coach at South Dakota State, is responsible for recruiting and monitoring the academic progress of the Badgers, in addition to coaching duties.

The 35-year-old Soderberg guided the Jackrabbits to a 36-18 (.667) record from 1993-95, including a 21-15 mark in the highly regarded NCAA Division II North Central Conference.


Soderberg served as head coach at Loras College in Dubuque, Iowa, from 1988-93 and led the Duhawks to a 79-45 (.637) record during his five-year stint. Loras was runner-up in the 1992 National Catholic Basketball Tournament and Soderberg was named tournament Coach of the Year. Soderberg served as assistant coach at Loras during the 1987-88 season before becoming head coach.

Before arriving at Loras, Soderberg was an assistant coach at UW-Stevens Point (1984-85), graduate assistant at Colorado State (1985-86) and assistant coach at Fort Hays State (1986-87).

Soderberg is a 1985 graduate of UW-Stevens Point, where he was a guard and team captain for Bennett's 1984 NAIA national runner-up, a team that included Terry Porter, now with the NBA's Minnesota Timberwolves. Soderberg and Porter started all 32 games in the Pointers' backcourt in '83-84 and Soderberg was a first-team all-conference and all-NAIA District 14 selection. He earned the "Hustle Award" at the '84 NAIA Tournament. Soderberg shot 56 percent from the field and 83 percent from the free throw line in his last two years at UW-Stevens Point.

A native of Stevens Point, Wis., Soderberg attended Pacelli High, where his father recently retired as head basketball coach. He has a bachelor's degree in physical education from UW-Stevens Point and a master's in physical education from Colorado State (1986).

Soderberg and his wife, Linda, have two sons, Kramer and Davis, and a daughter, Daley. Brad's sister, Megan, is a manager with the Wisconsin basketball team.

Hood who joined the Badger staff in August of 1994 after six years as an assistant coach at Cleveland State, has duties in recruiting and game

scheduling, in addition to his coaching responsibilities.


Hood, who served as CSU's senior assistant in his last season, worked with the Vikings' guards during his tenure as an assistant coach and also had responsibilities for scheduling, recruiting, scouting and summer camps. He was responsible for the recruitment of Nike all-Americans Craig Caldwell and Reggie Welch and national top 50 player Jamal Jackson.

Hood was a four-year letterwinner at Cleveland State (1983-87), serving as the Vikings' captain his last two seasons. As a junior in 1985-86, he was a backup point guard on the CSU squad that finished 29-4 and earned the school's first NCAA Tournament bid. CSU posted an 83-79 victory over favored Indiana in the first round, then downed St. Joseph's 75-69 to advance to the "Sweet 16," where they lost 71-70 to David Robinson's Navy squad. Hood started on the 1987 CSU team that went 25-8 and advanced to the second round of the NIT.

Hood, who graduated with a degree in social services in 1988, ranks among the career top 10 in steals, assists and games played at CSU. He scored 529 points during his career.

As a prep at Don Bosco High in Boston, Hood led his team to a pair of state titles and became the first junior in school history to score 1,000 points.

Shawn and his wife, Kim, are the parents of a daughter, Brittany, and a son, Brian.

Costanzo, a native of Scranton, Pa., coordinates travel, the Badgers' budget, day-today scheduling and on-campus recruiting. He also serves as


co-director of the Badger basketball summer camps and is executive director of the Badger Basketball Booster Club.



#### MOSEZELL PETERSON

Former Badger swingman Mosezell Peterson, whose Wisconsin basketball career was cut short by a knee injury he sustained in an NIT game against Manhattan in 1996, will serve as a student assistant coach for the 1997-98 season.

Peterson, a native of Louisville, Ky., played in 48 games (21 starts) during his Wisconsin career (1994-96). He averaged 8.6 points and 2.8 rebounds, while shooting 41 percent from the field and 73 percent from the free throw line.



## DAVID WARD

David Ward was named chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison in June 1993, becoming the 25th individual to serve as the university's chief executive. Ward had served as interim chancellor since January 1993.

For the past eight years, Ward has provided strong leadership for efforts to improve the quality of undergraduate education. Changes inspired by Ward include: enhanced student advising, particularly for freshmen and sophomores; expanded course access; a core curriculum; and increased opportunities for undergraduates to conduct research.

The next step, says Ward, is to redefine undergraduate education, not simply through improvements of existing programs and processes, but by developing new ways for learning to occur on college campuses. To that end, he recently published a comprehensive strategic planning document, outlining priorities for the next decade as the university works toward balancing its teaching, research and outreach missions. One way the UW-Madison can unify its activities, Ward says, is by emphasizing learning as a central goal.

This development of campus

learning communities recently was echoed by the Kellogg Commission on the Future of State and Land-Grant Universities. In its first report, this 25-member group of university chief executives, on which Ward serves, called on public institutions to become "genuine learning communities" that are student-centered, support and inspire learners of all kinds, and sustain a healthy learning environment.


During his tenure, Ward has given

new expression to The Wisconsin Idea, the venerable philosophical framework for the university's public service role. The Wisconsin Idea is embodied by a vast array of partnerships between the university and both the public and private sectors, says Ward, from economic development activity and sharing of faculty expertise, to educational collaborations with K-12 schools.

"The university's commitment to the citizens of Wisconsin is stronger than ever as we approach the 21st century," says Ward, who looks forward to marking the university's sesquicentennial in '98-99.

Ward was born in Manchester, England, and received bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Leeds. He earned a Fulbright Travel award to the United States in 1960 and received a doctorate from UW-Madison in '63. Ward served as chair of the geography department from 1974 to 1977 and as associate dean of the Graduate School from 1980 to 1987. He became vice chancellor for academic affairs at UW-Madison in 1989, and in 1991, he was also named provost, chief deputy to the chancellor. His UW-Madison faculty career spans more than 30 years, and he holds the Andrew Hill Clark Professorship of Geography.

As a scholar, Ward is a recognized authority in historical urban geography and has pioneered research on English and American cities during their rapid growth of the 19th and early 20th centuries. He is a past president of the Association of American Geographers. He has authored two books, edited two books and contributed many articles in leading academic journals. In recognition of his postdoctoral research, Ward was awarded the degree of Litt.D. by his undergraduate alma mater.



## PAT RICHTER

Director of Athletics Pat Richter, the former Badger all-America gridiron star, three-sport letterman and successful business executive, is the man in charge of one of the NCAA's most thriving athletic departments.

During a time of budget tightening, presidential reform and gender equity concerns, the dean of Big Ten Athletic Directors has built a model intercollegiate program.


As Director of Athletics, he is responsible for 21 sports, nearly 700 student-athletes and more than 160 employees. Consider that during his administration, he ...

- inherited a division that was \$2.1 million in debt in 1990 and eliminated the red ink on the ledgers in less than four years.
- watched the football, basketball and hockey squads set season attendance marks during his administration. Football attendance has placed in the top 10 nationally the last four years.

• oversaw plans for significant facility improvements, most notably the construction of the \$76.4 million Kohl Center. That state-of-the-art facility will open in January of 1998.

On the field of play, the Badgers have been highly successful during Richter's administration. The football squad has enjoyed unparalleled success during the Barry Alvarez era. Both the men's and women's basketball clubs, under the direction of Dick Bennett and Jane Albright-Dieterle, have made post-season play the standard instead of the exception.

The varsity sports teams have continued the long-standing excellence that Badger fans have come to expect. Wisconsin has ranked among the nation's top all-sports programs in the Sears' Director's Cup in all four years of its existence. The Badgers have claimed three — hockey (1989-90), men's soccer (1995) and men's crew (1997) — national titles during Richter's tenure.





Pat Richter, who was a Wisconsin basketball letterman in the early 1960s, is the dean of Big Ten athletic directors.

Perhaps Richter's most satisfying season as Director was the 1993-94 campaign when his alma mater won the Rose Bowl and qualified for its first NCAA men's basketball tourney in 47 seasons.

As a player, he earned all-America (1961-62) and academic all-America (1962) honors as an end. He led Wisconsin to the 1963 Rose Bowl and set a game-record with 11 receptions.

In the first ever college football game between No. 1 and No. 2 ranked teams, Richter and his Badger teammates dropped a 42-37 decision to USC in Pasadena.

Richter led the Big Ten in receiving twice and is still the third-leading receiver in school history. As a senior, Richter won Wisconsin's 1963 Big Ten Medal of Honor.

Richter was recognized for his gridiron exploits last year with his induction into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame.

He also earned all-league honors in baseball and led UW in hits, homers and RBI three times. The 6-foot-5 center received his scholarship for basketball.

After earning his B.S. degree from the UW in landscape architecture (1964), Pat was a first-round draft pick of the Washington Redskins. He played from 1963-71.

Upon retirement from the NFL, he returned to Wisconsin to earn his law degree (1971). After working at a Madison law firm, he climbed his way to vice president of personnel at Oscar Mayer.

Richter was honored with an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award for post-college achievements in 1988. He is a member of the Wisconsin State Athletic and Madison Sports Halls of Fame, the NFL Player and Alumni Associations and the American Bar Association. Pat was enshrined in the Athletic Department and Rose Bowl Halls of Fame in '91 and '94, respectively. In 1995, he became the second Badger to gain induction into the GTE Academic All-America Hall of Fame.

Pat and his wife, Renee, have four children: Scott, Brad, Barry and Tim.

AL FISH

Al Fish, Administrative Officer at the Athletic Department since 1989, oversees several internal units in the Division and serves as a liaison to campus and state governments and the Athletic Board.

He oversees facility planning, event management, personnel, sports medicine, strength and conditioning, technical and equipment services and University Ridge golf course.

Fish, who came to the Department after three years (1987-89) as the Director of Policy and Budget for the DHSS, is coordinating the construction of the \$76.4 million Kohl Center. Future projects now being planned include the Goodman softball complex, new and expanded crew facilities and Camp Randall Stadium turf and seating renovations.

He worked previously as a liaison for Gov. Tony Earl to the State Assembly, a budget analyst for the State Budget Office and a program evaluator for the Legislative Audit Bureau.

VINCE SWEENEY


Vince Sweeney, in his seventh year at UW-Madison, is now in his third season as an Associate Athletic Director in charge of external relations.

# SEASON RECAP

#### **CAPSULE SUMMARY**

Wisconsin finished the 1996-97 season with an 18-10 overall record and an 11-7 Big Ten mark that was good for a fourth-place tie in the conference with Illinois. The Badgers earned the fourth NCAA Tournament bid in school history and were seeded seventh in the East Region. They lost their first-round game 71-58 to Texas at the Pittsburgh Civic Arena on March 14.

#### HISTORIC SEASON

Wisconsin put together one of the best seasons in school history. Consider the following ...

- The '96-97 squad was only the second (1915-16 team was the other) in Wisconsin history to win 18 regular-season games and just the fifth in school annals to reach the 18-victory mark overall (including postseason games).
- The '96-97 team was the first at Wisconsin to win 11 Big Ten games since the 1941 NCAA champion Badgers finished their league slate with an 11-1 mark.
- Wisconsin has won a total of 19 conference games in the last two seasons. The last Badger teams to win that many league games over two seasons were the 1941 and 1942 units that had 11-1 and 10-5 marks, respectively.
- The Badgers' win over Iowa on Feb. 26 guaranteed the school its first winning record in Big Ten play since the 1974 team finished the conference slate with an 8-6 mark.
- The UW's win at Penn State on Feb. 19 gave Wisconsin five road wins in a season for the first time since 1962-63 and three Big Ten road victories for the first time since 1974.

#### BIG TEN'S NO. 1 DEFENSE

Wisconsin's success in '96-97 can be attributed in large part to the team's outstanding defensive play. The Badgers led the Big Ten in scoring defense (55.3 ppg in all games and 56.8 ppg in league games) and field goal percentage defense (.378 and .397). Their overall scoring defense figure and their overall field goal percentage defense figure both ranked fourth nationally. Their overall .378 field goal percentage defense mark ranked in a tie as the 10th-lowest figure nationally since the NCAA began keeping such records in 1978.

The Badgers' .397 field goal percentage defense mark in Big Ten play fell just short of Michigan's league-record .394 set in 1995 (records maintained since 1974). The 1996-97 Wisconsin squad and the '95 Wolverines are the only two schools in Big Ten history to hold league foes to less than 40-percent shooting.

Michigan State (twice) and Iowa were the only teams to have shot better than 50 percent from the floor

against Wisconsin in '96-97.

By allowing league opponents to score only 56.8 points per game, Wisconsin became the first Big Ten team to allow conference opponents fewer than 60 points per game since Illinois allowed just 55.7 points per contest in 1985.

#### DON'T COUNT 'EM OUT

Since Dick Bennett arrived in Madison, the Badgers have shown a remarkable ability to come back and win games after being down in the second half.

The Badgers have come back from at least a three-point second-half deficit to win 13 games in the Bennett era (that is 37 percent of the school's wins under Bennett). Six of those 13 second-half comebacks had the Badgers erasing double-figure deficits.

#### BADGERS' BEST = FOES' WORST

Some of Wisconsin's best defensive performances in '96-97 resulted in the worst offensive outings of the year for Badger opponents. In fact, Wisconsin's defense held six different opponents to their worst field goal shooting performance of the season. (It is worth noting that Big Ten champion Minnesota's two worst field goal shooting games of the season came against the Badgers). The list includes:

Purdue (.302), Feb. 15 Illinois (.279), Jan. 25 Penn State (.263), Jan. 18\* Minnesota (.364), Jan. 2 Brown (.184), Dec. 7 UNC-Wilmington (.261), Nov. 30

\*Penn State also shot .263 vs. Mount St. Mary's on Nov. 23.

#### HOUSE OF HORRORS

The 1996-97 season was the last full campaign in which Wisconsin

will play its games in the UW Field House, home of Badger basketball since 1930. Wisconsin will open the new, \$76 million Kohl Center (seating capacity 16,500) in mid-January of 1998.

The Badgers, however, made the most of their final full season in the Field House. Wisconsin compiled a 12-2 record at home in '96-97, including a season-ending sevengame homecourt winning streak. Wisconsin's defense was especially stingy at the Field House in '96-97. Consider ...

- opponents shot only .361 from the field.
- the Badgers allowed only 50.1 points per game, and Minnesota was the only opponent to score at least 60 points.
- only four opponents shot 40 percent from the field.

#### TWO'S THE LIMIT

Wisconsin has dropped two straight contests nine times in the Dick Bennett era. The Badgers, however, have never lost more than two in a row under Bennett. All but two of the two-game skids were ended at the UW Field House. The most recent two-game losing streak ended with the 66-65 upset win over No. 2-ranked Minnesota on March 8.

#### THE STREAK REACHED SIX

Wisconsin put together its first sixgame win streak in Big Ten play since 1951 during February of 1997.

During their six-game win streak, the Badgers ...

- Defeated Michigan, Northwestern, Illinois, Purdue, Penn State and Iowa in succession.
- Outscored opponents 57.2-47.8.
- Held four foes to fewer than 50 points.
  - Held foes to .375 from the field.
  - Outrebounded foes 36.5-26.7.

#### **REBOUNDING WAS KEY**

Wisconsin's ability to control the boards was a key factor in its success in 1996-97. The Badgers were 12-3 in games in which they outrebounded their opponent.

Wisconsin's rebounding totals, especially on the offensive end, were very instrumental in its six-game win streak. During that streak, the Badgers held an 85-46 edge on the offensive glass.

#### FEWER THREES, MORE WINS

Wisconsin was 10-0 in '96-97 in games in which it attempted 12 or

fewer three-point field goals. In those games, the Badgers shot .445 from the field, .404 from three-point range and averaged 63.3 points.

When the Badgers took more than 12 three-pointers, they were 8-10 and shot .390 from the field, .317 from beyond the arc and averaged 56.7 points.

#### LEADING INDICATORS

A number of statistical patterns developed during the season that provided a good indication as to whether or not the Badgers would win. Wisconsin was:

- 12-0 in '96-97 when leading at halftime.
- 9-0 in '96-97 when holding foes to fewer than 50 points.
- 16-3 in '96-97 when holding foes to fewer than 60 points.
- 4-1 in '96-97 when it shot better than 50 percent from the floor.
- 12-2 in '96-97 when it outshot its foe from the field.

#### TOUGH IN THE TIGHT ONES ...

Wisconsin has been very successful in its close games during the Dick Bennett era. The Badgers put together a 5-2 record in 1996-97 in games decided by five points or less.

#### ... AND AGAINST THE BEST

Wisconsin enjoyed success against some of the nation's top teams in 1996-97. The Badgers were 5-2 against teams ranked in the top 25 at the time of the game.

Those wins included a pair of 17-point victories over Illinois, a 13-point win over Indiana, a five-point win over NIT champion Michigan and a one-point triumph over Final Four participant Minnesota. The Badgers were 7-6 during the regular season against teams that made the '97 NCAA Tournament field.



# BADGER VICTORIES

#### A PROVEN WINNER

Dick Bennett has guided Wisconsin to two of the school's eight winningest seasons in his first two years as head coach.

The Badgers won 17 games in Bennett's first season after many "experts" figured Wisconsin would struggle to reach 10 wins. Last season Wisconsin advanced to the NCAA Tournament behind the school's first 18-win regular season since 1915-16, the school's first 11-win Big Ten campaign since 1941 and the UW's first six-game Big Ten winning streak since 1951.

During the squad's six-game win streak, the Badgers outscored Michigan, Northwestern, Illinois, Purdue, Penn State and Iowa by an average of 57.2-47.8 points per game and held four of those opponents to fewer than 50 points.



#### **BUCKY BADGER**

Badgers in various forms have been recognized as the school mascot for decades. The version currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white letter sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by artist Art Evans. At that time, the badger went by names like Benny, Buddy, Bernie, Bobby and Bouncey. Art Lentz, the department's publicity director, had the idea to bring the mascot to life.

The original badger mascot was too vicious to control. On more than one occasion, the live badger escaped handlers at UW football games before a sideline hero recaptured the animal with a flying tackle. It was decided in the interest of fan and player safety that Wisconsin's mascot be retired to the Madison Zoo. The Badger Yearbook replaced the live badger with a small racoon named Regdab (Badger spelled backward) and passed it off as a "badger in a racoon coat."

In 1949, a student in the university's art department, Connie Conrad, was commissioned to mold a paper-mache badger head. Gymnast and cheerleader, Bill Sagal, of Plymouth, Wis., was directed by homecoming chair Bill Sachse, to wear the outfit at the homecoming game. A contest was staged to name the popular mascot. The winner was Buckingham U. Badger, or Bucky. The name apparently came from the lyrics in a song which encouraged the football team to "buck right through that line."

Bucky Badger has persevered through the years, even surviving a threat by then assistant attorney general, Howard Koop, in 1973. He suggested that Bucky be replaced by Henrietta Holstein, a loveable and productive cow. Koop argued that "kids love cows. A generation could grow up supporting the university and Henrietta Holstein." Koop's effort to overthrow Bucky failed.

Bucky's most recent brush with fame came in the spring of '96 when he was crowned champion (by fan voting) of ESPNet Sports Zone's mascot competition conducted via the Internet.





The last time a Dick Bennett-coached team surrendered 100 points in a game, Ronald Reagan was in the White House, Sam Okey was nine years old, and the 45-second shot clock was in its first season. And Shawn Hood was a junior guard at Cleveland State - the same school which would go on to national fame just weeks later with an NCAA Tournament "Sweet 16" appearance.

The date was Feb. 8, 1986. Hood's squad, rolling toward an eventual 29-4 finish, was set to play host to Bennett's first UW-Green Bay team. The Vikings romped to a 103-64 win behind five players in double figures. One of those five was Hood, who registered 12 points in 20 minutes of

In spite of Hood's role in the lopsided verdict, Bennett saw fit to bring him on board as an assistant coach at Wisconsin nine years later.



#### **BOXING BANNERS**

Wisconsin dominated the NCAA boxing scene for practically the entire 28 years (1933-60) that the school sponsored the sport. The Badgers, who owned an incredible 105-8-10 all-time record at home, won eight NCAA team titles (the banners still hang in the UW Field House) and 38 individual championships.

Ironically, the most famous boxer ever to perform in the UW Field House was not a collegian; the legendary Cassius Clay — later Muhammad Ali — fought in the 1959 Pan American Games trials held in the Field House. Clay lost in the finals to a Marine Corps southpaw named Amos Johnson.





# Quadruple Double-double

There have been a number of noteworthy "double-doubles" in Wisconsin basketball history, but only once in the school's 99-year hoops history have four players reached double figures in points and rebounds all in the same game. It happened in Madison on Dec. 12, 1970. Leon Howard (15 points, 11 rebounds), Gary Watson (19-14), Glen Richgels (15-17) and Clarence Sherrod (25-10) each accomplished the feat in a 94-83 victory over Loyola University (New Orleans).

That Badger squad, coached by John Powless, went on to establish school records by averaging 86.3 points and 52.8 rebounds per game in 1970-71. Both of those marks stand to this day. Earlier that season, the Badgers defeated Michigan Tech 114-70 in a game in which they pulled down a school-record 79 rebounds.


# CHRISTIAN STEINMETZ, SR.

# GEORGE LEVIS





Michael Finley (right) helped lead Wisconsin basketball into a new era of success when the Badgers made the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1947 during Finley's junior season of 1993-94.

That team, under second-year coach Stu Jackson, began the season by winning its first 11 games. The Badgers spent a school-record 13 straight weeks in the Associated Press poll, with their highest ranking being 12th in early January. Prior to that season, Wisconsin had not been ranked in the A.P. poll since January of 1976.

The '93-94 Badgers featured senior guard Tracy Webster and freshman center Rashard Griffith, in addition to Finley. The program sold out every home game that season, a first in school history.

#### Comeback Kids

The largest known comeback in school history occurred on Jan. 5, 1976 when Wisconsin rebounded from a 22-point deficit in an 82-81 overtime victory over Ohio State at the UW Field House. The Badgers were outscored 27-5 during a nine-minute stretch in the first half and trailed 47-25 with 3:21 left in the period before mounting their comeback.





#### It Had Been A While

Since Dick Bennett's arrival in Madison, the Badgers have registered a number of accomplishments not seen at Wisconsin in many years. Here are a few:

- The '96-97 Badgers became the first team at Wisconsin to win 18 regular season games since 1915-16.
- Wisconsin's win over Indiana last season snapped a 31-game Badger losing streak to the Hoosiers.
- Bennett became the first UW coach to win his Big Ten debut (51-46 over Michigan in '96) since Walter Meanwell in 1912.
- Wisconsin earned a bid to the NCAA Tournament last season for only the second time in 50 years.
- The '97 squad was the first at the UW to win 11 Big Ten games since the '41 NCAA champions were 11-1 in conference play.
- Wisconsin's winning record in league play last season was its first since the 1974 team was 8-6 in Big Ten action.
- The Badgers have won more Big Ten games (19) over a two-year period than any Wisconsin teams since the 1941 and 1942 squads were 11-1 and 10-5, respectively, in back-to-back years.
- Wisconsin's win at Illinois on Feb. 3, 1996 was the school's first in Champaign since 1981.

# ALL-TIME COACHES

# James C. Elsom (1899-1904)

Record of 25-14 (.641) in six years at UW ... UW-Madison professor of physical education and physical therapy from 1894-1936 ... oversaw first Wisconsin teams as "coach" ... died in 1949.

# Emmett Angell (1905-08)

Record of 43-15 (.741) in four years at UW ... coached Chris Steinmetz, UW's first all-American in 1905 ... owns highest winning percentage of any Badger coach ... coached UW's first two conference titles (1907 and 1908) ... a driving force in establishing basketball at Wisconsin and in Western Conference (now the Big Ten).


# Haskell Noyes (1909-11)

Record of 26-15 (.634) in three years at UW ... guided Badgers to 23-2 homecourt record during his tenure.

# Walter Meanwell (1912-17; 21-34)

Record of 246-99 (.712) in 20 years at UW ... second-winningest coach in Badger history ... Badgers were 92-9 in his first six years, including one of school's two 20-win seasons in 1915-16 ... his 1911-12 and 1913-14 Badgers were both 15-0, the only two undefeated seasons in UW history ... coached two first-team all-Americans (George Levis and Bud Foster) ... a 1959 inductee into Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame ... coached Wisconsin to eight undisputed or shared Big Ten titles ... legendary coach credited with launching modern basketball's emphasis on finesse and offensive strategy ... his famous "criss-cross,

pivot and pass" offense utilized all five players and featured short passes, the revolutionary criss-cross and weave, pivot in motion and screens for the shooter ... known as the "Little Doctor", he held a medical degree from Maryland and Ph.D from Wisconsin ... practiced medicine in Madison until his death in 1953.



# Guy Lowman (1918-20)

Record of 34-19 (.642) in three years at UW ... coached UW to Big Ten title in his first season (1918) ... coached Badger football (1918) and baseball (1918, 1921-32) teams, as well ... directed UW Department of Physical Education for 26 years ... died in 1943.

# Harold "Bud" Foster (1935-59)

Record of 265-267 (.498) in 25 years at UW ... school's all-time winningest coach ... guided Badgers to school's first two NCAA
Tournaments, including 1941 NCAA title ... coached three — Gene Englund, John Kotz and Don Rehfeldt — first-team all-Americans ... a 1964 inductee into Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame ... coached Badgers to one of school's two 20-win seasons in 1941 (team had season-ending 15-game winning streak) ... first-team all-America player in 1930.

# John Erickson (1960-68)

Record of 100-114 (.467) in nine years at UW ... fourth-winningest coach in Wisconsin history and ranks third in school annals in Big Ten wins (52) ... prior to 1997, his '62 squad was last at UW to win 10 Big Ten games ... his 1961-62 team's .708 (17-7) winning percentage is highest at Wisconsin in the last 47 years.

# John Powless (1969-76)

Record of 88-108 (.449) in eight years at UW ... prior to 1997, his '74 Badgers were school's last team to register a winning record (8-6) in conference play ... best season was 1973-74 when Badgers were 16-8 ... coached nine NBA draft choices at UW, most of any Badger coach ... has attained ranking as No. 1 tennis player in the world in singles and doubles for senior men 55 and older ... color commentator on Badger basketball TV broadcasts since 1989.

# ALL-TIME COACHES (CONT.)

# Bill Cofield (1977-82)

Record of 63-101 (.384) in six years at UW ... coached four (Wes Matthews and Joe Chrnelich in 1980, and Claude Gregory and Larry Petty in 1981) Badgers who were NBA draft picks.

# Steve Yoder (1983-92)

Record of 128-165 (.437) in 10 years at UW ... third-winningest coach in school history ... also had third-longest tenure of any Wisconsin coach ... took Badgers to two NITs, including school's first postseason appearance (1989) since 1947 ... coached Badger stars Rick Olson, Danny Jones, Tracy Webster and Michael Finley.

# Stu Jackson (1993-94)

Record of 32-25 (.561) in two years at UW ... guided Badgers to school's first NCAA Tournament bid (1994) since 1947 ... became first Wisconsin coach to take teams to back-to-back postseason tournaments ... left Wisconsin in summer of 1994 for front office position with NBA's expansion Vancouver Grizzlies.

# Stan Van Gundy (1995)

Record of 13-14 (.481) in one year at UW ... named head coach in summer of 1994 after two years as assistant to Stu Jackson ... recruited and signed Sam Okey to play at UW ... now an assistant coach to Pat Riley with Miami Heat.
