

COVERING THE BADGERS

PRESS ROW: Wisconsin's working facilities for press-radio-television are located on the west side of the Wisconsin Fieldhouse.

WORKING TICKETS: All requests for Press Row tickets must be placed with the Sports Information Office. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pickup at the Press Will Call window at Gate 2. Working press tickets contain assigned seat locations. Telecopier service will be available to members of the working press by the appropriate servicing organizations.

RADIO: Each station admitted for broadcasting will be issued three tickets. Radio facilities are located in the second balcony of the west side. Tickets are mailed upon acceptance. If tickets are not mailed, they may be picked up in advance at the Sports Information Office, or from the Press Will Call window.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Floor passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service, and television photographers. Photographers may work from either the north or south ends and the west side of the court.

PARKING: A limited number of parking passes for Lots 18 and 19 are available to working people only. They will be issued as requested.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: Media representatives may interview Wisconsin players in the Reinke Room after each game in the Wisconsin Fieldhouse following interviews of both coaches.

Players also are available for interviews each day prior to practice in the Fieldhouse (dependent upon class schedules). Practice starts each day at 2:45 p.m. and ends at 5:15 p.m. Requests should be made through the Sports Information Office in advance.

COACHES INTERVIEWS: Bill Cofield will meet with media representatives following each game after a short cooling off period in the Reinke Room of the Wisconsin Fieldhouse.

Best time to interview Coach Cofield on a daily basis is prior to practice at 2:00 p.m. in the Fieldhouse. He can also be reached at his office telephone (AC 608 262-4597) from 11:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. daily, and following practice by calling the Fieldhouse Coaches Office (AC 608 263-6943).

YOUR HOSTS in Wisconsin Fieldhouse and at all University of Wisconsin athletic events are **Jim Mott**, Sports Information Director, and **Bob Leu**, Radio-TV Director.

Jim Mott is a Madison native and has B.A. degrees in Zoology and Journalism from the University of Wisconsin. As an undergraduate, he served as Wisconsin's basketball team manager for four years, earning a major "W" award for his work.

Jim is a past president of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) and the Madison Pen and Mike Club. He was named to the CoSIDA Hall of Fame in 1979.

He and his wife **Dorothy** are the parents of three sons—**William 18**, **David 15**, and **Eric 13**.

Bob Leu joined Wisconsin's Athletic Department staff as Radio-TV Director in September, 1973 from WHA-TV where he had served as producer-director and director of sports.

He's a Milwaukee native and a 1960 graduate of the University of Wisconsin with a Bachelor of Arts degree in speech.

Bob is the producer of Wisconsin's post-season football, basketball, and hockey highlight films, does color commentary on the Badger football broadcasts, and is the producer-host of Badger Football which is seen each season on the state's public television stations.

He and his wife **Janis** are the parents of daughters **Dawn 21**, **Amie 18**, and a son **Adam 9**.

Bob is a past president of the Madison Pen and Mike Club.

Hirsch Guides Wisconsin Athletic Program

Elroy Hirsch is in his 12th year as Wisconsin's Director of Athletics and he's the guiding force behind one of the finest athletic programs for men and women in the United States today.

A study of Wisconsin's Big Ten participation in 15 sports for men and 12 for women listed the Badgers fifth overall in men's and fourth in women's competition for the 1979-80 school year.

The Wausau native came back to Wisconsin — where he gained collegiate fame as a star sophomore running back in leading the Badgers to a No. 3 ranking during the 1942 football season — from the Los Angeles Rams on February 28, 1969.

His original appointment as athletic director slated to end in 1979, was first extended in 1974 by the school's athletic board through June 30, 1984, and again in April, 1979 through June 30, 1988 by Chancellor **Irving Shain** upon recommendation of the Athletic Board.

Athletic Board Chairman Professor **Frederick W. Haberman**, commented, "This extension is, of course, a mark of confidence by our university administration and by the Athletic Board.

"Mr. Hirsch has earned our support. His services to the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics and to the University in general are very valuable. Under his leadership we have never had a deficit budget, we have been phenomenally successful at the box office, we have received more private funds than ever before, we have upgraded the physical plant considerably, we have maintained competitive status in almost all our sports and we have been consistently free of scandal.

"He has presided over a program that is educationally responsible and fiscally efficient and has done so with dignity that befits a great university."

Chancellor Shain stated in a letter to Hirsch, "I am very pleased to take this present action. My own observations certainly support the opinion of the Athletic Board that you are one of the outstanding athletic directors, not only in the Big Ten, our 'home' conference, but also in the country at large. I am personally, as well as professionally, delighted to have you as a member of our university staff."

Hirsch commented, "I'm extremely pleased with the decision. It's just wonderful."

He said his major objectives for the decade ahead are "coping with inflation and acquiring proper funding for women's athletics. My other ambition is to have Wisconsin in a football bowl game."



Following the 1942 season when the Badgers posted an 8-1-1 record, Elroy played at Michigan in 1943 as a Marine trainee, — football, basketball, track and baseball — to become the only athlete at Michigan ever to win an "M" in four sports in one season.

Elroy had a highly successful professional football career that started in 1946 as a half-back with the Chicago Rockets of the post-war All-American Conference. Later, he put in nine great seasons with the Los Angeles Rams as one of the all-time great ends.

He's been named to the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame, (1965), to professional football's Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio (1968), to the National Football Hall of Fame in New York (1974), and to the Madison Sports Hall of Fame (1977).

He's also a member of the all-time NFL All-Star team for his play as end and flanker with the Los Angeles Rams that served to change the game from one of two-way players to offensive and defensive specialists under free substitution.

Elroy and his wife, **Ruth**, have two children — son **Win Stephen**, Los Angeles, and daughter **Patricia Caroline**, a senior at Wisconsin.

HEAD COACH BILL COFIELD

William L. "Bill" Cofield begins his fifth season as head basketball coach at the University of Wisconsin. His 1979-80 unit posted a 15-14 overall record, the first winning team the Badgers have had since 1973-74. The Badgers also posted a 7-11 conference record and recorded six wins against post-season tournament teams.

Bill, a 40-year-old native of Carrier Mills, Illinois, became the Badgers ninth basketball coach on March 16, 1976 and has posted a 46-64 record in his four years.


This past summer he spent two weeks in Managua, Nicaragua instructing physical education teachers and coaches on the fundamentals of coaching a basketball team.

Bill played collegiately at Casper Junior College in Casper, Wyoming and McKendree College in Lebanon, Illinois, where he earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Physical Education. He received his master's degree in Physical Education from Kentucky in 1967.

His first coaching assignment was at H.E. Davis Junior High School in Cleveland, Ohio in 1963. After two years he was named to coach East-Technical High School in Cleveland, where his team went 20-1 in 1965-66.

His first year of collegiate coaching came at Kentucky State College, where he spent one year as an assistant before being named to head the Lincoln University of Pennsylvania team. His two-year record of 38-12 included two conference championships and NAIA play-off berths. His 1968-69 team reached the NAIA finals.

Bill moved to Praire View A&M in Praire View, Texas and posted a 57-48 record in four years. His 1972-73 squad went 19-8 and placed second in the Southwestern Athletic Conference.



Cofield became the nation's first black athletic director and head coach at a predominately white institution of higher learning by accepting both positions at the College of Racine in 1973. Following a 14-15 season the school went out of business.

Bill joined the University of Virginia staff, where he served as an assistant under head coach Terry Holland for two seasons prior to accepting the Wisconsin job.

Bill and his wife **Shirley** are the parents of three daughters, **Kimberly** 19, **Staci** 18, **Kena** 16 and a son **Clay** 15.



ASSISTANT COACH WILLIAM "BO" RYAN



William "Bo" Ryan joined the Wisconsin basketball program on the same day that Bill Cofield accepted the head coaching job.

The 32-year-old Chester, Pennsylvania native was head coach at Sun Valley, Pennsylvania High School when he accepted the Wisconsin job. He had previously served as an assistant to Cofield at the College of Racine in 1973-74.

Bo was in charge of the Wisconsin defense last season, which held opponents to 65.9 points per game, a mark that has been bettered only once in almost thirty years. The Badgers limited Big Ten opponents to just 65.3 points, their best effort since the 1952 campaign.


After Cofield named two new assistants this spring, he named Bo the top assistant and coordinator of recruiting for the Wisconsin program.

Bo was a high scoring guard for Wilkes College in Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania for four years. He was captain and Most Valuable Player during his senior year. He still holds two school records—most points scored in a conference game (43) and most field goals scored in a single game (18). He graduated in 1969 with a degree in Business Administration and later did graduate work at Villanova.

In 1975 Bo was named Delaware County Coach of the Year as he guided the Sun Valley team to a second place Philadelphia Suburban 2 League finish despite the fact that his tallest starter was 6-1. The 1976 squad was the first Sun Valley team ever to appear in the state tournament.

Bo and his wife Kelly have three children—Megan 5, William Francis III 2 and Matthew, eight months.

ASSISTANT COACH KEN JOHNSON



Ken Johnson was named to the Wisconsin coaching staff on May 15 and begins his first year with head coach Bill Cofield.

The 36-year-old Johnson had been head coach at Elgin Larkin High School in Elgin, Illinois since 1973 and prior to that had been an assistant (1966-69) and head basketball coach (1969-73) at Hinsdale Central High School in Hinsdale, Illinois. His overall coaching record stands at 169-106, including a 101-42 mark at Hinsdale.

Johnson is a 1966 graduate of UW-La Crosse with a Bachelor of Science degree in English, and received his master's degree in Educational Administration in 1978. He played on the UW-La Crosse basketball team which reached the NAIA tournament in Kansas City in 1964 and 1965.

Ken and his wife Vicki Marie are the parents of one son, Chad Ryan, 2.

ASSISTANT COACH DON GOSZ

Don Gosz joins the Wisconsin basketball staff on a part-time basis as an assistant coach and scout. He replaces former assistant coach Todd Landrum, who accepted a position at Ohio State.

Gosz, a 1960 graduate of UW-Oshkosh with Bachelor of Science degrees in History, English and Physical Education, ended his 19-year high school coaching career with a 256-203 record.


Most recently **Gosz** coached at Whitefish Bay Dominican High School, where his last three teams compiled a 72-3 record. His overall five year mark at Dominican was 99-22. His 1978 and 1979 teams were WISAA Class A state champions, with his 1980 squad finishing third.

His previous coaching jobs included stints at St. Mary's Springs High School in Fond du Lac and Prairie du Chien Campion.

VARSITY RESERVE COACH KENT EVENSTAD


Kent Evenstad is in his second year with the Badger basketball program as head coach of the Varsity Reserve squad. Last year **Kent** led his team to a 13-2 record.


GRADUATE ASSISTANT TODD KUCKKAHN

HISTORY OF THE WISCONSIN FIELDHOUSE

The Wisconsin Fieldhouse was a project of then Athletic Director George Little when he arrived at Wisconsin in 1925 and it became a reality in 1930.

In 1927, Little proposed to the athletic council and regents the plan under which the fieldhouse was to be constructed. This proposal met the approval of the board, after two previous attempts had failed; one of those having passed the legislature only to be vetoed by Governor Zimmerman.

The original layout had contemplated a \$650,000 building to house both an indoor training facility for intercollegiate teams and the required program of physical education. The portion to be used for intercollegiate athletics was estimated at \$385,000.

This intercollegiate portion is represented in the present facility that houses both the basketball teams and wrestling squad. Its actual cost was somewhat more than estimated totaling \$434,000 with construction completed in September of 1931.

The structure would be a part of Camp Randall Stadium, standing on the south end of the field, with concrete stands built against its north wall. The fieldhouse contained a basketball floor with a seating capacity of 12,000, a complete track facility, and room for indoor football and baseball training.

In April of 1976, the state Building Commission approved \$718,000 for the renovation of the fieldhouse. The project was aimed mainly at improving the seating facility and allowing for other activities to be presented in the building. Permanent bleachers were added to the north, south, and west sides of the court with portable seats and a stage area on the east side. This effort brought the seating capacity to 12,204. New locker rooms and a training facility were constructed under the west side seats and the existing locker rooms were renovated. A new lighting system was added in 1977 to make the Wisconsin Fieldhouse one of the best facilities in the Big Ten.



1980-81 WISCONSIN BASKETBALL OUTLOOK

The Badgers posted a 15-14 overall record in 1979-80 to mark the first winning season since the 1973-74 campaign went 16-8. The Badgers compiled a 7-11 record in the Big Ten campaign for an eighth place finish.

The Badgers lost five lettermen from last year's squad, most notably 6-7 forward Joe Chrnlich and 6-1 guard Wesley Matthews. Chrnlich ended his four-year Badger career as the school's second leading rebounder and seventh leading scorer. Matthews, who passed up his senior campaign to apply for the NBA draft as a hardship case, became the school's second leading scorer in under three seasons.

Matthews cashed in on his NBA gamble, as he was the fourteenth player chosen in the draft by the Washington Bullets. Matthews became only the third Badger basketball player to be chosen on the first round of the NBA draft. Chrnlich also made some impressions, as he was chosen on the fourth round by the New York Knicks and promptly opened some eyes in the California Summer League.

Also gone from last year's squad are guards Arnold Gaines and Bob Jenkins, and center Mark Newburg. Gaines was co-captain as a junior and the team MVP his sophomore year. Jenkins and Newburg spelled relief off the bench.

The Badgers return a solid nucleus of three starters despite their heavy loss. Seniors Claude Gregory, Larry Petty and Dan Hastings are back for their final year after starting all of last season. Gregory and Petty have played in 83 games to date (fourth on the all-time list), while Hastings has appeared in 78 games.

The Badgers return five other lettermen that were the heart of the Badger bench last season. The list includes guards John Bailey and Greg Dandridge, and forwards Keith Mitchell, Mike Kreklow and Gary Zinkgraf.

Claude Gregory is a definite all-American candidate and the Wisconsin attack will be centered around him. The 6-8, 220 pound Gregory has moved into fifth place in both scoring and rebounding on the all-time Badger list. Barring injuries, Gregory should move to the top spot in both categories sometime this year.

Gregory averaged 18.4 points per game, second on the team to Matthews' 19.6, and led the team in rebounding for the second straight year. He finished sixth in the Big Ten scoring derby and tied for third in rebounding. He was a third team all-Big Ten choice last year.

The man in the middle was the key to the Badgers' defensive success last year. At 6-9, Larry Petty is not a top offensive threat, but his continuous improvement on defense kept the Badgers in most of their games last year. Petty averaged 8.7 points and 6 rebounds a game, but more importantly, opponents shot just .462 and scored 65.9 points per game.

Captain Dan Hastings started 25 of the 27 games he played in last season and averaged 6.3 points. He finished second to Matthews in assists and was the most dependable ball handler on the team. His poise and leadership ability should be evident throughout the 1980-81 season.

Junior John Bailey and sophomore Greg Dandridge could find themselves starting much of the season after having good years in 1979-80. Dandridge, the former

state "Player of the Year" is the best defensive guard on the squad and is one of the best ball handlers in the Badger lineup. Dandridge is being groomed for the point guard spot this fall and is expected to be a starter this winter.

Bailey has as much ability as anyone on the squad, but must work on his consistency on both ends of the floor to become effective. In his only start of the year, John scored eight points on long shots. Bailey is tabbed for action at the wing position.

Playing at the other wing may be sophomore forward Mike Kreklow. Kreklow, the runner-up to Dandridge for "Player of the Year" honors, saw action in 24 games last year. Kreklow has outstanding ability and is the team's best shooter. He will be Wisconsin's "designated shooter" this winter.

Wisconsin has led the Big Ten in rebounding the past two years, but with Chrnlich gone, the team lacks depth at the power positions. Keith Mitchell and Gary Zinkgraf are returning lettermen, but neither one is ready to step into a starting role.

Mitchell played in every game last year at both forward and center. He has the physical ability to make contributions at both ends of the court this year.

Zinkgraf has seen action in just nine games in his first two years. Severe ankle injuries have plagued Zinkgraf throughout his career. Despite the pain, Gary scored 6 points and had 6 rebounds in eleven minutes against Morgan State last year. He is recovering from corrective surgery and could become a major factor in the next two seasons.

The Badgers looked to the forward position when they signed recruits this spring. 6-8 James

Hildebrand, built in the mold of Michigan State's Ron Charles, is a great jumper and has all the tools to become a good player as a freshman. He averaged 15 points a game last year and was named to a high school all-American team.

Herb Lake, at 6-6 can play either forward or guard, but with his ball handling ability and quickness, he will be tried at guard. He averaged 25 points a game last year and was a high school all-American. He is expected to make a major contribution as a freshman.

Leroy Stahl is 6-7, but weighs just 180 pounds. He needs to work on the weights and be more physical to become a quality Big Ten forward. He has a soft shooting touch and is a good jumper.

Dwayne "Pete" Renfroe is the only pure guard signed by the Badgers. At 6-3, he has excellent speed and quickness. He is an intelligent player who needs only experience to become a top player for the Badgers.

The Badgers played a difficult schedule last year, but fared well against some of the stronger teams. Post-season tourney teams beaten by the Badgers included Marquette, Indiana, Ohio State, Minnesota and Iowa. Wisconsin recorded a 7-11 mark against eleven tournament-bound foes and lost five of the games by five points or less. On the season, the Badgers lost four overtime games and five others by five points or less.








