COVERING THE BADGERS

- PRESS ROW: Wisconsin's working facilities for press-radio-television are located on the west side of the Wisconsin Fieldhouse.
- WORKING TICKETS: All requests for Press Row tickets must be placed with the Sports Information Office. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pickup at the Press Will Call window at Gate 2. Working press tickets contain assigned seat locations. Telecopier service will be available to members of the working press by the appropriate servicing organizations.
- RADIO: Each station admitted for broadcasting will be issued three tickets. Radio facilities are located in the second balcony of the west side. Tickets are mailed upon acceptance. If tickets are not mailed, they may be picked up in advance at the Sports Information Office, or from the Press Will Call window.
- PHOTOGRAPHERS: Floor passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service, and television photographers. Photographers may work from either the north or south ends and the west side of the court.
- PARKING: A limited number of parking passes for Lots 18 and 19 are available to working people only. They will be issued as requested.
- PLAYER INTERVIEWS: Media representatives may interview Wisconsin players in the Reinke Room after each game in the Wisconsin Fieldhouse following interviews of both coaches.
- Players also are available for interviews each day prior to practice in the Fieldhouse (dependent upon class schedules). Practice starts each day at 2:45 p.m. and ends at 5:15 p.m. Requests should be made through the Sports Information Office in advance.
- COACHES INTERVIEWS: Steve Yoder will meet with media representatives following each game after a short cooling off period in the Reinke Room of the Wisconsin Fieldhouse.
- Best time to interview Coach Yoder on a daily basis is prior to practice at 2:00 p.m. in the Fieldhouse. He can also be reached at his office telephone (AC 608 262–4597) from 8:30 to 11:00 a.m. daily, and following practice by calling the Fieldhouse Coaches Office (AC 608 263–6943).

YOUR HOSTS in the Wisconsin Fieldhouse and at all University of Wisconsin athletic events are **Jim Mott**, Sports Information Director, and **Bob Leu**, Radio-TV Director.

Jim Mott is a Madison native and has B.A. degrees in Zoology and Journalism from the University of Wisconsin. As an undergraduate, he served as Wisconsin's basketball team manager for four years, earning a major "W" award for his work.

Jim is a past president of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) and the Madison Pen and Mike Club. He was named to the CoSIDA Hall of Fame in 1979.

He and his wife **Dorothy** are the parents of three sons—William 20, David 17, and Eric 15.

Bob Leu joined Wisconsin's Athletic Department staff as Radio-TV Director in September, 1973 from WHA-TV where he had served as producer-director and director of sports.

He's a Milwaukee native and a 1960 graduate of the University of Wisconsin with a Bachelor of Arts degree in speech.

Bob is the producer of Wisconsin's post-season football, basketball, and hockey highlight films, does color commentary on the Badger football broadcasts, and is the producer-host of Badger Football which is seen each season on the state's public television stations.

He and his wife Janis are the parents of daughters Dawn 23, Amie 20, and a son Adam 11.

Bob is a past president of the Madison Pen and Mike Club.

Hirsch Guides Wisconsin Athletic Program

Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch is in his 14th year as Wisconsin's Director of Athletics and he's the guiding force behind one of the finest athletic programs for men and women in the United States today.

Wisconsin's men's and women's athletic programs have consistently ranked in the Big Ten's first division during his tenure over the past twelve years.

The Wausau native came back to Wisconsin — where he gained collegiate fame as a star running back in leading the Badgers to a No. 3 ranking during the 1942 football season — from the Los Angeles Rams on February 28, 1969.

His original appointment as athletic director slated to end in 1979, was first extended in 1974 by the school's athletic board through June 30, 1984, and again in April, 1979 through June 30, 1988 by Chancellor **Irving Shain** upon recommendation of the Athletic Board.

Chancellor Shain stated in a letter to Hirsch, "I am very pleased to take this present action. My own observations certainly support the opinion of the Athletic Board that you are one of the outstanding athletic directors, not only in the Big Ten — our 'home' conference, but also in the country at large. I am personally, as well as professionally, delighted to have you as a member of our university staff."

His career has been one of success.

Wisconsin fans, especially the older generation, remember him as a triple threat halfback on **Harry Stuhldreher's** 1942 football team that won eight games, lost only to lowa, and tied Notre Dame.

Hirsch's play as a 19-year-old sophomore on Wisconsin's 1942 football team carried the Badgers to the brink of the national championship that season. Only a 6-0 defeat by lowa City deprived the Badgers of Big Ten and national championships. The Wausau native rushed for 766 yards on 141 carries — his best was 174 yards on 22 attempts vs. Missouri — and his overall contribution added 226 yards passing, 390 yards on receptions and runbacks of punts, kickoffs, and interceptions plus nine touchdowns, five by rushing and four by passing.

He played at Michigan in 1943, as a Marine trainee, and he not only played football, but basketball, track, and baseball. He won his "M" in each sport, the only athlete ever to accomplish such a feat at Michigan.

He had a successful professional football career, first as halfback with the Chicago Rockets of the post-war All-America Conference, and later with the Los Angeles Rams for nine seasons as one of the all-time great ends.

It was at end that "Crazylegs" was to attain new heights in his career. The Rams, in transition to the modern passing game, often split him wide as a receiver and finally moved him permanently to end—establishing him as the first flanker.

In 1951, **Hirsch** displayed all his talents as he put together one of the finest seasons in National Football League history. He gained 1,495 yards on receptions, an all-time record approached only by **Bobby Mitchell** of the Washington Redskins (1,436 yards in 1963) and **Hirsch** had only twelve games to set the record, not 14, like **Mitchell**!

That same season **Hirsch** caught 17 touchdown passes to tie the league record set by **Don Hutson** of the Packers in 1942. He also caught at least one touchdown pass through 11 consecutive games over the 1950 and 1951 seasons.

Elroy complied a total of 343 passes caught for 6,299 yards and 53 touchdown catches during his career with the Rams before retiring from active NFL play following the 1957 season.

He was a successful executive with the Rams, first as general manager of the team, and later as assistant to the president of the team, a job he relinquished to accept the job as Wisconsin athletic director.

He's been named to the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame (1965); to professional football's Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio (1968); to the National Football Hall of Fame in New York (1974); and to the Madison Sports Hall of Fame (1977).

He's also a member of the all-time NFL All-Star team for his play as end and flanker during his nine year career with the Los Angeles Rams.

Elroy and his wife, Ruth, are the parents of son Win Stephen, Los Angeles, and daughter Patricia Caroline, a recent University of Wisconsin-Madison graduate.

Steve Yoder

Steve was named Wisconsin's tenth head basketball coach in mid-April, coming to the school from Ball State University where he had compiled a five year record of 77–62 as head coach.

He was named the Mid-American Conference "Coach-of-the-Year" for both the 1980–81 and 1981–82 seasons. The 1980–81 Ball State team shared the MAC title with three other schools and gained an NCAA tournament berth by winning the conference's post-season tournament.

Ball State compiled an overall 17–11 record during the past season including a 12–4 conference record that gave them the MAC championship. The Cardinals lost to Northern Illinois 79–75 in overtime in the MAC post-season tournament title game-with the winner advancing to the NCAA meet.

Steve is a native of Plymouth, IN and 1958 graduate of Plymouth High School. He attended Illinois Wesleyan University on a basketball and baseball scholarship, winning four letters in baseball and two in basketball before graduating in 1962. He received his master's degree from St. Francis College in Fort Wayne, IN., in 1970.

He started his coaching career at Glen Ellyn, IL., junior high school, and in 1965 took an assistant's position in basketball at Plymouth, IN.

He became head coach at Plymouth in 1967 and proceeded to guide the school to three conference titles, three sectional crowns, a pair of regional titles, and two finishes among the top ten teams in state rankings over a six year period.

Steve was named Indiana's District One "Coach-of-the-Year" in 1973, and he then accepted a job as assistant coach at Furman University. He came back to Indiana in 1975 as head coach at Mishawaka's Penn High School.

He then became assistant basketball coach at Ball State in 1976 and a year later became head coach at the school.

Meet the Staff

ASSISTANT COACH RICK BOWEN

Rick Bowen comes to Wisconsin with Steve Yoder after serving as an assistant coach at Ball State and spending nine years as a high school head coach. **Rick** tutors the Badgers' inside players and scouts Wisconsin's opponents.

The eldest son of former Indiana governor Dr. Otis R. Bowen, **Rick** coached three Indiana high schools: East Central in Brecksville (1977–81); Northwood in Nappanee (1971–75); and Pierceton (1970–71).

Rick's 1970–71 Pierceton squad posted a 16-5 record, and his 1971–72 Northwood team earned the Northern Lakes Conference championship.

A 1966 graduate of Indiana University, **Rick** completed his masters degree at St. Francis College at Fort Wayne, Ind. in 1972. He served with the United States Army in Vietnam as a combat medic and earned a bronze star.

Rick and his wife Sandra have two sons, Matthew, 11, and Michael, 8.

ASSISTANT COACH BRAD McNULTY

Brad McNulty comes to Wisconsin from Ball State University where he served as an assistant coach to **Steve Yoder** for five years. The Kokomo, Indiana native is responsible for coaching the Badger perimeter shooters and coordinating Wisconsin's recruiting.

Brad joined the Ball State staff in 1976 after graduating from Purdue. After spending one year as a graduate assistant, Brad was named full-time assistant coach in 1977 upon the promotion of Steve Yoder to head coach.

Brad is the son of Carl McNulty, one of Indiana's most successful high school basketball coaches. The elder McNulty has been a head coach in the Hoosier state for 27 years, the last 13 in Kokomo, and ranks among the top ten active coaches in Indiana in victories.

As a prep star **Brad** garnered second-team all-state honors and was a threetime North Central Conference selection. He opted for Purdue on a basketball scholarship, but injured his knee and served four years as a Boilermaker student assistant coach.

ASSISTANT COACH WILLIAM "BO" RYAN



Assistant Coach **William** "Bo" **Ryan** came to Wisconsin in March of 1976 on the day that Bill Cofield was named head coach of the Badgers basketball program. He works closely with the Basketball Boosters Club.

The 34-year-old native of Chester, PA., did yeoman service in keeping the Wisconsin basketball program coordinated during last spring's coaching transition.

"Bo" was in charge of Wisconsin's defense during the 1979–80 and 1980–81 seasons both were among the best in the school's modern history — and he played a vital role in recruiting.

He was captain and most valuable player during his senior season at Wilkes College in

Wilkes-Barre, Pa. He was a high scoring guard and still holds two school records — most points in a conference game (43) and most field goals in a single game (18). **Bo** graduated in 1969 with a bachelor's degree in Business Administration and later did graduate work at Villanova.

After serving as an assistant at Racine College, he went to Sun Valley High School, where he was named Delaware County Coach of the Year guiding his team to a second place finish in the Philadelphia Suburban 2 League. His 1976 squad was the first from the school to make it to the state tournament. **Bo** and his wife **Kelly** have three children — **Megan**, 7, **William Francis III**, 4,

GARY ZINKGRAF GRADUATE ASSISTANT

Gary returns to help coach the Badgers following his four years of action on the court. He played in 14 games last year averaging 1.9 points per game and 1.7 rebounds per game from the forward spot. He saw only limited action his first two years due to an ankle problem, but returned his junior year to play in 15 games. **Gary** was named to the Big Ten All-Academic First Team following last season, after being named to the second team after his junior year. He served as a tri-captain of the 1981–82 team.

STUDENT MANAGERS BO JENSEN

Perry "Bo" **Jensen** starts his second year with the Badger Varsity after working with the Reserve squad in 1980–81. **Bo** is a 1979 graduate of Racine Park High School and is currently a senior majoring in Secondary Education at Wisconsin. **Bo** hopes to teach and coach basketball after graduating.

BRIAN VIVONA

Brian starts his second year with the Badger squad. He is a native of Chicago, IL and lettered four years as a statistician at St. Patrick High School. Brian is majoring in Wildlife Management.

JOE CLARK

Joe Clark begins his first year as manager of the Badger team. The Janesville Craig graduate lettered in tennis and basketball in high school. He participated in the Wisconsin state tennis tournament in doubles competition.

ROD STAUFFACHER

Rod Stauffacher is a graduate of Madison Holy Name High School, where he lettered in 3 sports. **Rod** was on two state championship cross country teams, and was all-conference in basketball. He also ran track. Rod hopes for a career in sports administration.

TIM SEIFRIZ

Tim is in his first year as manager for the Badgers. The Madison native was a statistician for the 1982 Wisconsin State High School Champions, Madison LaFollette. **Tim** is enrolled in pre-business.

HISTORY OF THE WISCONSIN FIELDHOUSE

The Wisconsin Fieldhouse was a project of then Athletic Director George Little when he arrived at Wisconsin in 1925 and it became a reality in 1930.

In 1927, Little proposed to the athletic council and regents the plan under which the fieldhouse was to be constructed. This proposal met the approval of the board, after two previous attempts had failed; one of those having passed the legislature only to be vetoed by Governor Zimmerman.

The original layout had contemplated a \$650,000 building to house both an indoor training facility for intercollegiate teams and the required program of physical education. The portion to be used for intercollegiate athletics was estimated at \$385,000.

This intercollegiate portion is represented in the present facility that houses both the basketball teams and wrestling squad. Its actual cost was somewhat more than estimated totaling \$434,000 with construction completed in September of 1931.

The structure would be a part of Camp Randall Stadium, standing on the south end of the field, with concrete stands built against its north wall. The fieldhouse contained a basketball floor with a seating capacity of 12,000, a complete track facility, and room for indoor football and baseball training.

In April of 1976, the state Building Commission approved \$718,000 for the renovation of the fieldhouse. The project was aimed mainly at improving the seating facility and allowing for other activities to be presented in the building. Permanent bleachers were added to the north, south, and west sides of the court with portable seats and a stage area on the east side. This effort brought the seating capacity to 12,204. New locker rooms and a training facility were constructed under the west side seats and the existing locker rooms were renovated. A new lighting system was added in 1977 to make the Wisconsin Fieldhouse one of the best facilities in the Big Ten.

1982-83 BADGER BASKETBALL OUTLOOK

Steve Yoder prepares for his first year as Wisconsin's tenth Basketball Coach with a squad that includes six lettermen — one senior and five sophomores — plus six freshmen. No doubt the Badgers will be one of the nation's youngest teams this season. The returning lettermen are headed by Greg Dandridge, the lone senior, and sophomores Brad Sellers, Cory Blackwell, Scott Roth, John Ploss, and Jack Hippen.

Sellers led the Badgers in scoring last season with a 14.0 average and in rebounding with 9.4, while **Blackwell** ranked second in scoring with 13.5 points and ranked third in rebounding at 5.1. Both started as freshmen and the 6-foot-11 **Sellers** ranked 12th in the Big Ten Conference with 14.2 points per game and **Blackwell** 16th at 13.0

Roth, a 6–7 forward, came off the bench much of the time during his freshman campaign and averaged 4.2 points and 1.9 rebounds per game. He tallied a last second 22-foot basket that gave the Badgers a 65–63 win over Michigan on the road to open the 1982 Big Ten season.

All three — Sellers, Blackwell, and Roth — gained valuable experience last year and they'll have to face playing as veterans, not sophomores, as there are no juniors or seniors at the inside positions.

The Badgers front line will be bolstered by the return of sophomores **John Ploss** and **Jack Hippen. Ploss** saw considerable action during his freshman year while spelling Keith Mitchell at center. However, he's had off-season surgery on both knees, and he may need extra time to work his way in playing shape.

Hippen saw spot action last year, but has impressed with his intensity and physical style of play this year.

The freshman group is headed by **Rick Olson**, a 6–1 guard from Madison LaFollette's state high school

He averaged 28 points per game as a prep senior and in last summer's large school All-Star basketball game logged 35 points.

Among the other freshmen are **Randy Maerz**, 6–7 forward from Stoughton (17 points, 12 rebounds and five assists per game); **Gregg Steinhaus**, 6–8 center from Portage (17.8 points and 10.6 rebounds per game); **Jay Laszewski**, 6–8 center from Stevens Point (18.3 points per game); **Jim Smith**, a 6–6 guard who was player of the year in Toledo, OH (averaging 23.0 points per game); and **David Miller**, a 6–4 guard who averaged 20 points per game playing at Chicago Vocational a year ago.

Yoder observes, "I've never had such an inexperienced team. This team is going to have to be an extremely close-knit group because they're going to have some tough times. They're too young. Even so, since they appear to want to work hard, they could become very competitive despite their lack of experience.

"They have good enthusiasm, but it's tough to maintain enthusiasm for forty minutes and 28 games."

Wisconsin's only returning guard is senior Greg Dandridge and he'll be competing with Olson, Miller, and possibly Smith for starting assignments in the backcourt.

If one of the forwards — **Roth** or **Blackwell**, is switched to guard, the likelihood of a freshman starting there becomes less.

Sellers will be the key inside.

Yoder notes, "It is more important to have a center on defense than on offense. Sellers is not as muscular and strong as some of the big men he must defend in the conference, so he will have to use his quickness to advantage.

"We have to be concerned about defending against those big people, so he'll have to play defense at the center position."

The Badger coach continued, "I think people are going to be pleasantly surprised at the attitude of the players and how hard they'll compete.

"I don't know what column we'll end up in — the "W" or the "L".

"It's always that way starting over. These kids aren't used to winning. But I think they've learned a lot. Few have had their kind of experience.

"It would give them confidence to have some success early to see that all their hard work would have results."

Wisconsin finished last in the Big Ten in 1981–82 with a 3–15 record and overall the Badgers were 6–21 overall. Wisconsin has seen just one winning season in the last eight — 1979–80 and the Badgers haven't won a conference title since 1947.

Elimination Round Expands NCAA Tourney

An elimination round involving eight conference champions boosts this year's NCAA basketball tournament to a record 52 teams.

The NCAA will retain its 48-team regional field (24 conference teams, 24 at large). The field will include the four winners of the pre-tournament round held March 15, 1983. Those winners will be placed as number-12 seeds in each of the four regionals. The losers will be awarded the same receipts as a first round loser.

The pre-tournament pairings match the Ivy League against the East Coast Conference and the Midwestern City Conference against the ECAC Metro South in one double-header. The other double-header pits the ECAC North against the Mideastern Athletic Conference and the TransAmerican Conference will play the Southwestern Athletic Conference.

The NCAA says the expanded field affords every team that meets the criteria for automatic qualification a chance to compete for the tourney crown.

Early Tender Signing

An early signing period for basketball national letters of intent was approved by the Collegiate Commissioners Association this past summer.

Under the change, member institutions will have two times for tendering high school basketball players — Nov. 10–17, 1982, and April 13 – May 15, 1983.

The purpose of the change is to alleviate pressure on the high school players who are ready to make a commitment to the college of their choice.

The dual signing dates are open to all prospective recruits who have completed their junior year and have visited college campuses. Athletes may sign during either period and no one is forced to sign in the first period.

EXPERIMENTS: Three Points and Shot Clocks

The times and distances are far from standardized, but this season several conferences are experimenting with rules designed to stimulate both play and fan interest. The most notable rule changes are the 3-point shot and the shot clock.

Nine conferences opted for the 3-point shot. Six conferences, including the Atlantic Coast, set the shot distance at 19 feet, while the Big Sky voted for a distance of 22 feet. The Big Ten and Missouri Valley compromised at 21 feet.

The 3-point lines are measured from the rim. Big Ten coaches figure this will add an exciting new dimension to offenses and pull teams out of zone defenses.

Other conferences are going one step farther by instituting shot clocks. The shot times vary from 30 to 45 seconds and some leagues will stop their shot clocks altogether in the waning minutes of the game. For example the ACC will play with a 30 second shot clock which will be shut off in the final four minutes, while the Big East will experiment with a 45 second timer which will be turned-off for the final five minutes. Some conferences won't start their clocks until the offense crosses the center line.

In non-conference December games, the Big Ten will play its rules at home, the opponent's rules on the road. Independents and teams from conferences that didn't approve rule changes will switch from game to game.
