




There's Nothing Else Like It

isconsin fans are legendary for their support of Badger athletics. It's no different when it comes to basketball. Since the beginning of the 1998–99 season, the first full year the Kohl Center was open, the UW has ranked no lower than 11th nationally in attendance. Last year, for the third consecutive season, every ticket was sold prior to the beginning of the season. The Badgers' capacity average attendance of 17,142 was good for seventh-highest in the country and tops in the Big Ten. The Kohl Center is once again sold out for the 2006–07 season.


Another milestone for the UW was the creation of the "Grateful Red" student section prior to the 2002–03 season. Each of the 2,051 student season-ticket holders receives a red and white tie-dyed t-shirt. For four straight years student season tickets have sold out prior to the beginning of the season. This year more than 4,800 students took part in the lottery for season tickets.

In 2003, Sports Illustrated on Campus named Madison the No. 1 Sports College Town in the country saying, "For good teams, good times and good cheer, there's no place like the home of the Badgers."

No wonder the Badgers are 108-17, including 72-5 under Bo Ryan, at the Kohl Center.







Wisconsin enters the 2006-07 season with 52 consecutive sellouts at the Kohl Center. Every ticket has been sold for this season, meaning that by the end of 2006-07, that streak will be up to 71 straight games.

or the last eight years, March has meant a couple different things to the people of Wisconsin. The weather turns warmer, spring break rolls around and the Badgers head off to the NCAA tournament.

UW is one of just nine teams in the country that can say it has been to eight straight NCAA tourneys entering the 2006-07 season. Not only do the Badgers get an invite to the "Big Dance," but they usually stick around. Over the past seven years,

Wisconsin has racked up 11 NCAA tournament victories resulting in a Final Four appearance in 2000, the 2003 Sweet 16, and the Elite Eight showing in 2005.


Wisconsin earned a No. 6 seed in the Syracuse Regional in the 2005 NCAA

> Tournament. In the first and second rounds in Oklahoma City, UW defeated Northern Iowa and Bucknell to advance to its second "Sweet 16" in three seasons. The Badgers found themselves one step from the Final Four after beating

NC State in the regional semifi-

nals. Their run through the tournament ended, however, with a hard-fought 88-82 loss to eventual national champion North Carolina.

Head coach Bo Ryan is the first coach to lead UW to NCAA appearances in five consecutive seasons. His seven NCAA tournament victories are the most of any UW head coach.



Bo Ryan is the only UW head coach in school history to lead the Badgers to five NCAA tournament appearances. His seven NCAA tourney wins are also a school record.







he numbers from the last five years speak for themselves: 112 wins, 55 conference victories, 56 national television appearances, a 72-5 record at the Kohl Center. But the smaller numbers are the ones that speak volumes about the Bo Ryan era: five NCAA tournament appearances, two Big Ten regular-season cham-

pionships, two Sweet 16 appearances, one Big Ten tournament title and one appearance in the Elite Eight.

Since Bo Ryan arrived, the Badgers have had a first-team All-Big Ten selection every year. That includes 2004 when junior Devin Harris became the first UW player to be named Big Ten Player of the Year since 1950.




All five Badgers were consensus (coaches and media) selections.

Wisconsin has finished among the top four in the Big Ten standings in each of the last five seasons and its 55 combined wins in those years is second only to Illinois during that span. For the first time in school history (2002–05), UW won at least 11 conference games four years in a row

UW has proven to be a player on the national scene as well as on a conference level. The Badgers are one of just nine teams in the country to have played in eight straight NCAA tournaments and are among the top 20 in the country in winning percentage over the last five seasons.



Wisconsin has averaged 22.4 wins per season over the last five years, including a school-record 25 victories in both 2003-04 and 2004-05.

Devin Harris was named 2004 Big Ten Player of the Year as well as Big Ten tournament MVP. He led the Badgers to a 12-4 record in conference play and scored a tournament championship game-record 29 points in UW's title game win over Illinois.

Badgers in the NBA

The 2005–06 NBA season was a very successful one for two former Badgers, Michael Finley and Devin Harris, now playing in the NBA.

Finley, in his 11th NBA season and first with the San Antonio Spurs, played in 77 games, averaging 10.1 points. The two-time all-star raised his game in the playoffs, starting four of the seven games in the Western Conference Semifinals and averaging 10.6 points in 37.0 minutes of action. The Spurs' season ended in that round, however, due largely to the

play of Finley's fellow UW alum and former teammate.

Harris, in his second NBA season with the Dallas Mavericks, showed marked improvement during the regular season, raising his scoring, rebounding and assist averages, as well as his shooting percentage, from his rookie campaign. Injuries took their toll, however, and he was limited to just 56 games.

Harris started to get back in the groove in the Mavs' first-round sweep of the Memphis Grizzlies. After losing Game 1 of the Western Conference Semifinals to the San Antonio Spurs, Dallas head coach Avery Johnson inserted Harris into the starting lineup, looking for a spark. He got one as Harris averaged 20.7 points in Dallas' next three games, all victories.

The Mavericks won the series in seven games as Harris started the final six, averaging 12.7 points and 31.6 minutes. In the Western Conference Finals against Phoenix, Harris started all six games and averaged 11.0 points, including a career-high 30 in Game 1. Dallas took the series in six games and advanced to the NBA Finals, making Harris just the second former Badger to appear in the Finals.

Reborn To Run

"DeSagana Diop snagged the rebound and swung it to Devin Harris, who shifted into fifth gear like somebody activated a jet pack on his back. Even though four Spurs had a

headstart on him, Harris roared past them like a Kentucky Derby horse.



Wisconsin is a fixture on the national television scene

Rans of Wisconsin basketball are lucky enough to be able to follow Badger basketball from anywhere around the country. Of the UW's 161 games in the past five years, 126 have been televised. That includes 56 national television appearances, in which Wisconsin has gone 34-22. It is no different this season.

As of press time, at least 23 of Wisconsin's 31 games will be televised in 2006–07, either nationally, regionally or locally. Every Big Ten game in 2007 will be televised.

UW will make at least 10 appearances on national TV during the regular season. The Badgers will play in the South Padre Invitational on Nov. 24 and 25. Their game against Missouri State will be televised by CSTV and if UW wins, its next game will also be on CSTV.

Wisconsin will again take part in the ACC-Big Ten Challenge this year, hosting Florida State on Nov. 28 on ESPN2. Two other non-conference games will be nationally televised, Dec. 9 at Marquette and Dec. 16 vs. Pittsburgh. Both games will be carried by ESPN.

During the Big Ten season, at least six of the Badgers' games will be on national TV. On Jan. 9, UW hosts Ohio State on ESPN. Wisconsin's game at Illinois on Jan. 20 will also be shown on ESPN. When the Badgers travel to Iowa on Jan. 28, that game will be on CBS.

Two more appearances on ESPN follow in February, at home against Iowa (Feb. 10) and at Michigan State (Feb. 20). The Badgers play at Ohio State on Feb. 25 in a CBS game. UW's regular-season finale at home against the Spartans could also be picked up by CBS or ESPN.

Badgers Giving Back





UW travels the country to fill out its schedule

The Wisconsin men's basketball team travels to a number of great locales and historic arenas to play its games. In addition to all the wonderful college towns and famous gyms around the Big Ten, the Badgers' non-conference schedule is filled with tremendous road trips to all regions of the country.

Within the past few seasons, UW has made trips to Las Vegas, Atlanta, Cincinnati, Philadelphia, Maryland, Cleveland, Alabama, Malibu, New Jersey, North Carolina and Pittsburgh for road games. The Badgers have also played in-season tournaments in Hawaii (Big Island Invitational) and St. Thomas (Paradise Jam).

Wisconsin will play in a number of in-season tournaments in the upcoming seasons. This year, the Badgers will travel to South Padre Island in Texas for the South Padre Invitational (Nov. 24–25). In 2008, UW has a return trip planned to the Paradise Jam. The following season, Wisconsin will be off to Hawaii for the prestigious Maui Invitational. The Badgers will also participate in the ESPNU Classic in Orlando on Thanksgiving weekend in 2010.

In addition to scheduled non-conference games and in-season tournaments, Wisconsin has also been around the country due to its regular NCAA tournament appearances. The Badgers have been placed in Washington, D.C., Spokane, Wash., Minneapolis, Milwaukee, Oklahoma City, Syracuse and Philadelphia in recent years.





The Badgers Face Some of the Nation's Toughest Teams

esides a grueling Big Ten schedule that often includes the top teams in the country, Wisconsin faces a number of highly ranked teams during the nonconference season and in tournament play. The Badgers have played 33 ranked teams in the past five seasons, including 13 games against teams ranked in the top 10.


In the past two seasons, UW's schedule has been ranked among the toughest in the country. Last year the Badgers faced 13 teams ranked among the RPI's top 50 and their regular-season schedule was ranked eighth-toughest in the country according to the RPI. In 2004-05, Wisconsin played 17 games against teams ranked in the top 65 and had the 11thtoughest schedule in the nation.


This season, UW faces at least nine teams that played in the postseason in 2006, including six NCAA tourney teams (Southern, Winthrop, Marquette, UW-

Milwaukee, Pitt and Pacific), during its non-conference schedule. In all, the Badgers will play 14 games against teams that participated in the 2006 NCAA Tournament.

The Kohl Center



The home for Wisconsin basketball is the Kohl Center, the third-largest (17,190) arena in the Big Ten Conference.

The facility is named after U.S. Sen. Herb Kohl, a 1956 UW-Madison graduate who donated \$25 million toward the arena's construction. Kohl's gift is the single largest private donation in UW history.

Former all-Big Ten basketball player Albert "Ab" Nicholas and his wife, Nancy Johnson Nicholas, pledged \$10 million toward the project. For their generosity, the facility's practice gymnasium is called the Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion.

The Kohl Center, which cost \$76.4 million, also is home to UW women's basketball, ice hockey and numerous concerts, shows and sporting events.

Among the well-known dignitaries and performers who have already appeared at the Kohl Center are Elton John and Billy Joel, The Eagles, 'N Sync, Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers, Shania Twain, the Moody Blues, John Mellencamp, Yanni, Cher, the Dave Matthews Band and the Dalai Lama.

In 2004, the Kohl Center added an impressive scoreboard, with 9x14-foot video replay boards on all four sides. A ring beam was also installed around the circumference of the arena at the first balcony level.


The basketball floor was also refinished and given a new design, as shown in the picture at top right. The practice gym floor, on page 26, was also refinished to match the arena court.









The offices include separate offices for the head coach, three assistant coaches and the director of basketball operations. There is also a reception area as well as a large conference room that houses the video editing equipment.

Basketball Locker Room




The men's basketball team enjoys a spacious 2,200-square-foot locker room with a number of amenities. The state-of-the-art locker areas have been designed with the needs of student-athletes in mind, including team organizational meetings and a social area.

The room is equipped with the latest technology, including a video system and drop-down screen for film study, as well as a desktop computer. In the back lounge area are a number of leather couches and a 70-inch, flat-screen television.

The locker area itself, separated from the lounge area by a smoked glass door, is very spacious and provides ample area for the players to get ready for practices and games. The shower area is adjacent to the locker area.












The University of Wisconsin Strength and Conditioning Program is committed to providing the ultimate training experience for each student-athlete. Our goal is to enhance the strength, speed, agility and conditioning of each athlete, while reducing the incidence of basketball related injuries. We take a proactive approach to accomplishing this through individual athlete evaluations and program design, Olympic lifting exercises and movement specific functional training. This is accomplished in a safe, yet competitive environment, where each student-athlete is encouraged to strive for personal excellence.



Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Centers

The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center, named after Wade and Betty Fetzer, provides for the academic needs of more than 700 student-athletes at the University of Wisconsin. The center, located in the Dave McClain Athletic Facility, is home to both the academic advising and learning support staffs of the Office of Academic Services.

The 15,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art facility is fully wireless and features a large open study area that is surrounded by nine small to mid-sized classrooms, a 55-seat auditorium, staff offices, a computer lab and a canteen area. The open study area has 30 individual carrels as well as several study tables. The state-of-the-art computer lab, under coordinator Jim Eisenmann, allows student-athletes to work on assignments, access online library or course materials and check their e-mail. The computer lab also has several checkout laptop computers for student-athletes who are traveling for competitions and other team-related activities.

The center features a staff of five advisors, four learning specialists, a life skills coordinator and a tutor coordinator. The staff monitors academic eligibility and progress while providing study groups for selected courses, access to tutors, and hosting a variety of academic and career planning events throughout the year.

A new Fetzer Center location, in the Kohl Center, opened in October of this year. Located just down the hall from the men's locker room. the 3,000-square-foot office serves as a convenient resource for student-athletes who practice at the Kohl Center and/or live in the southeast campus area. The Center includes a computer lab, quiet study room, private study rooms and staff offices. The Fetzer is a WiFi area and is open daily from 8–10 p.m.

Under the supervision of assistant athletic director Doug Tiedt, the advising staff of Chris Butler, Jerry Darda, Mary Weaver-Klees and Alan Zussman as well as tutor coordinator Jill Hadfield work along with learning specialists Dan Ott, Toni O'Keefe and Nancy Gatyas to render quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience. CHAMPS/Life Skills Coordinator Kelli Richards oversees programs in career and personal development as well as community outreach.

The staff, including program assistant Nancy Kreklow, has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and learning specialists. Sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the student-athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The staff takes a personal approach to each student-athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways on the national, conference and university level. The annual Student-Athlete Academic banquet recognizes student-athletes off the field of play by honoring over 200 athletes with a 3.5 or better grade point average. Additionally, the annual CHAMPS Cup competition recognizes the teams that succeed academically and are involved in community and campus events.

UW CHAMPS: A Program of Excellence

HAMPS (Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success) is a total development program that uses athletics as a preparation for success in life. Under the direction of Kelli Richards, the goal of the CHAMPS program is to support student development initiatives that enhance the quality of the student-athlete experience within the university setting.

The UW's CHAMPS program was selected as one of four 2005 Program of Excellence recipients. The award is presented annually to schools that have displayed a highly effective and pervasive program benefiting their student-athletes in the five components of the program.

CHAMPS provides support and opportunities for UW student-athletes in the following areas:

Athletic Excellence

 The student-athlete advisory committee (SAAC) works with the CHAMPS program to make sure all of the student-athletes' needs and concerns are being addressed.

Academic Excellence

- Through the Fetzer Academic Center, advisors, tutors, mentors and learning specialists are available to all student-athletes.
- A one-credit, 10-week course available to freshman and sophomore student-athletes discusses issues that many incoming college students face in their transition, such as time management, alcohol abuse and nutrition.
- Scholarships and internships are available through the NCAA for student-athletes continuing their education.
- The Academic Excellence Banquet is held each April to recognize the many academic achievements of our student-athletes.


Personal Development

Career Development

- Workshops on various career topics are offered to student-athletes throughout the year. Topics include writing resumes and cover letters, interviewing tips, networking strategies, dining etiquette and job search strategies.
- Career assessment and career counseling is available for individuals as they work to declare a major and gain experience within their career field.
- UW Athletics partners with the National W Club and the Wisconsin Alumni Association as well as local corporations to assist student-athletes in finding jobs and internships as well as assisting in networking and career opportunities.
- UW Athletics hosts Career Night every January. This event is a networking dinner and career fair for all junior and senior student-athletes.
- Corporations also host information sessions and screening interviews within the Fetzer Center for student-athletes.

Community Service

- The CHAMPS coordinator organizes individual and team community service requests.
- Opportunities for involvement through one-time events as well as on-going volunteer opportunities in the Madison area.
- UW has structured programs, such as Bookin' It With Bucky. Through this program, athletes are scheduled to read in fourth grade Madison classrooms to encourage literacy and continued learning.

CHAMPS Cup

The CHAMPS Cup is an all-sport competition, rewarding teams who exemplify all aspects of the student-athlete. Student-athletes earn points for their teams in six categories:

Academic Achievement

Teams receive points for their team GPA, scoring at least 925 mark in the Academic Progress Rate (APR) as well as points for individual academic all-conference honors.

Athletic Achievement

Teams that place in the top three of their conference are awarded points based on their finish. Conference champions—100 points; second place—90 points; third place—80 points.

Personal Enhancement

Teams or individuals earn points for attending any CHAMPS/Life Skills on-campus event related to personal development.

Community Outreach

Community service done as a team, with other student-athletes or individually, will be rewarded.

Badger Pride

Points are awarded to teams that go the extra mile to support their fellow student-athletes by attending each other's sporting events. Each team will choose one competition in their traditional season that it will label as Badger pride night. Any athletes who attend this competition will receive points, individually or as a team.

SAAC Participation

Teams will earn 10 points for each meeting they have two representatives in attendance.

The Scoring System:

Individual Points—Individuals will earn 100

points for their team for each individual effort. At the end of each week, the points will be divided by the number of studentathletes on the active roster for each sport.

Team Points—Team efforts, defined as 70 percent participation or 20 members, for all categories earn 100 points per event. All mandatory events require 100 percent participation in order to receive points.

Reward

One men's and one women's team will be recognized as the overall winners at the Academic Excellence Banquet in April. The men's and women's team with the highest GPA as well as the team with the most community service points will also be recognized at the banquet.

Sports Medicine

isconsin's sports medicine staff provides all UW student-athletes with high quality health care. The sports medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of a team of physicians, dentists, athletic trainers and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention and treatment of injuries to Badger student-athletes is supervised by a team of 12 full-time and three graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the sports medicine program focuses on injury prevention. The staff also utilizes functional measures, measures physiological capacity and outlines programs to improve flexibility.


A full-time nutritionist provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of student-athletes.

The sports medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane rehabilitation pool and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, the Natatorium, the UW Field House and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

Returning Class

With just one senior departing from last year's roster, UW is returning 87.1 percent of its minutes, 90.0 percent of its points and 93.1 percent of its rebounds this season. Here is a look at how that stacks up among Big Ten teams:

Of the teams that made the NCAA tournament in 2006, only Wisconsin and defending national champion Florida return at least 90 percent of their scoring and rebounding.

The Champ is Back

Senior Alando Tucker led the Big Ten in scoring in league games (20.0 ppg.) last year and scored at least 20 points in 10 of the Badgers' 16 conference games. The last Wisconsin player to lead the Big Ten in scoring in conference games was Don Rehfeldt in 1950.

1,500-Point Club

Tucker has scored 1,501 points in his career, good for seventh place on UW's all-time scoring list. The four players who rank sixth through ninth on that list (Mike Wilkinson, Tucker, Kirk Penney and Devin Harris) all played for current Wisconsin head coach Bo Ryan.

On to 2,000

Tucker needs 499 points (he scored 588 in 2005-06) to become just the second Badger in history to score 2,000 points in his career. Michael Finley is UW's all-time leading scorer with 2,147 career points. Among UW players, only Finley (1,593) had more career points entering his senior season than Tucker does.

That's Not All

Besides being among UWs top 10 in career scoring, Tucker is also among the top 10 in these career categories:

Field Goals - 7th (542)
Free Throws - 7th (356)
Free Throw Atts. - 4th (568)
Tucker holds the school record for offensive rebounds in a season (86).


Big Men Are Back

Besides Tucker, UW returns six frontcourt players (Butch, Chappell, Stiemsma, Landry, Gullikson and Krabbenhoft) who combined have played in 205 games, logged 2,857 minutes, scored 883 points and grabbed 674 rebounds in the past two seasons. Butch and Chappell started 30 of 31 games during the 2005-06 season.

Taylor Makes His Run

Senior guard Kammron Taylor needs 255 points (he scored 439 in 2005-06) to become the 31st player in school history to record 1,000 career points.

An honorable mention All-Big Ten selection a year ago, Taylor reached double figures in 24 of the Badgers' 31 games and had seven 20-point outings. He was

the team's second-leading scorer (14.2 ppg) and led the squad in minutes played (34.3 mpg).

And His Mark

Taylor led the Badgers with 67 3-point field goals, tied for eighth-most on UW's single-season list. He also paced Wisconsin in free-throw percentage (.829), the 10th-best single-season mark in school history.

New Faces

Wisconsin will welcome three scholarship freshmen in 2006. Jason Bohannon, a 6-2 guard from Marion, Iowa, was named his state's "Mr. Basketball" as a senior. Bohannon scored nearly 1,700 points in his three-year career, the most in Cedar Rapids-Marion metro history.

Trevon Hughes, a 6-2 point guard from Rosedale, N.Y., and J.P. Gavinski, a 6-11 center from Wisconsin Dells, also join the team. Hughes prepped at St. John's NW Academy in Wisconsin and averaged 22.2 points as a senior. Gavinski averaged just over 20 points for the Dells. Both earned all-state honors.



Junior forward Brian Butch led the Badgers in rebounding (6.0 rpg.) and was third on the team in scoring (9.9 ppg.) last year. Butch is one of seven players on UW's roster standing at least 6-7.

Preseason Accolades

With nearly everyone back and three outstanding recruits coming in, the Badgers are receiving plenty of attention in the preseason rankings. FOXSports.com has Wisconsin seventh in its preseason poll. Andy Katz of ESPN.com lists the UW eighth.

Summer "Vacation"

Wisconsin took part in a 10-day tour of Italy in August, playing five games during the trip. The Badgers won all five contests, outscoring their opponents by an average of 23.8 points. Alando Tucker paced the Badgers with 21.2 points per game while guards Kammron Taylor (10.8 ppg.) and Michael Flowers (10.2 ppg.) also averaged in double figures.

UW also took in a number of historical sights during their trip to Rome, Florence and Lake Como. The Badgers visited the Vatican, the Colosseum and the Leaning Tower of Pisa, among other breathtaking sights.

Making it a Habit

UW earned its eighth straight bid to the NCAA tournament last year, a school record. Michigan State is the only other Big Ten team that has been to the NCAA tournament eight straight years. The Badgers

are one of nine teams that made their eighth straight tourney appearance in 2006. The others are: Arizona, Duke, Florida, Gonzaga, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan State and Texas.

A Winning Tradition

The Badgers have won at least 19 games in each of Bo Ryan's five seasons and have averaged 22.4 wins per season under Ryan. In the 103 seasons prior to Ryan taking over, Wisconsin won at least 19 games in a season only four times.

Conference Matters

In Bo Ryan's five seasons as UW head coach, the Badgers have amassed 55 Big Ten victories. Only Illinois, with 61 conference wins, has more over that span. Wisconsin has finished no worse than fourth in the Big Ten in Ryan's five seasons. That five-year stretch is the best for UW since 1914-18.

Home Cooking


In Bo Ryan's five seasons as Wisconsin's head coach, the Badgers have compiled a 72-5 record at the Kohl Center, including a 38-2 record in Big Ten home games. The team's overall home winning percentage (.935) is the fifth-best in the country during that span. UW's two losses in conference home games is the fewest of any team in a BCS conference.

Packed House

For the third year in a row, all tickets for Wisconsin's home games were sold out prior to the start of the season. Last season, the Badgers ranked seventh nationally (and tops in the Big Ten) in average attendance. The Badgers have a string of 52 consecutive sold-out games at the Kohl Center.

Tidbits

- Wisconsin has had a first-team all-conference player five years in a row (Alando Tucker 2006, Mike Wilkinson 2005, Devin Harris 2004, Kirk Penney 2002-03). Prior to 2002, UW had just two consensus first-team All-Big Ten choices since 1952 (Michael Finley in 1993 and Joe Franklin in 1968).
- Wisconsin averaged 71.1 points per game in 2005-06, its highest scoring average since the 1994-95 season. The Badgers were 15-3 last season and are 71-5 under Bo Ryan when scoring at least 70 points.
- UW led the Big Ten in fewest turnovers per game at 11.6. That is the fifth-best average in school history. Bo Ryan-coached teams account for four of the top five turnover averages in UW annals.



Senior guard Kammron Taylor averaged 14.2 points per game last season and paced the Badgers in 3-point and free-throw shooting.

has been doing one thing better than anyone else in the college basketball coaching ranks: winning games. His .765 winning percentage (495-152) over his 22-year career is by far the best among active Division I coaches with at least 20 years under their belt. His 495 career victories place him 17th among active Division I head coaches and his 112 wins at UW are the fourth-most in school history.

In his five seasons at Wisconsin, Ryan has led the Badgers to heights not reached in Madison in many years. Each season further establishes UW as a major player on the national scene and Ryan as one of the top coaches in the country.

The accomplishments during Ryan's first five seasons are varied and impressive. The Badgers won a school-record 25 games in back-to-back seasons (2003-04 and 2004-05). They have five NCAA tournament appearances, advancing to two Sweet 16s and the Elite Eight in 2005. In 2002, Ryan's first season, Wisconsin earned a share of the Big Ten title for the first time since 1947. The next year, UW won the title outright, securing back-to-back championships for the first time since 1923 and 1924. Not to be outdone, Ryan led the Badgers to their first Big Ten tournament title in 2004.

Prior to Ryan's arrival in Madison, Wisconsin had never won more than 22 games in a season. Ryan's teams have averaged 22.4 wins in his five seasons.

Wisconsin's success in Big Ten play under Ryan is unparalleled in school history. He is the first coach in conference history to lead a team to at least 11 Big Ten wins in each of his first four seasons. Prior to his arrival in 2001, UW had won at least 11 conference games just seven times, and only once since 1941. Ryan's .688 (55-25) winning percentage in conference games is the third-best of any Big Ten coach in history with more than 50 games coached.

Ryan has also made his mark in the postseason. He is the only coach in school history to have led UW to five NCAA tournament appearances. Ryan's seven NCAA tournament wins are a school record and he is the first coach in UW history to lead a team to two Sweet 16 appearances.

In Ryan's five seasons, the Kohl Center has become one of the toughest places to play in America. The Badgers have compiled a 72-5 home record under Ryan, including a 38-2 mark in Big Ten games. Over the last five seasons, that is the fifthbest home record in the country. From Dec. 7, 2002 to Jan. 24, 2005 Wisconsin did not lose a home game, setting a school record with 38 consecutive wins, a streak that was the longest in the country.

Individual success has followed team success as a number of Ryan's players have earned honors. UW and Illinois are the only two teams to have had a first-team All-Big Ten selection in each of the last five seasons (Kirk Penney – 2002-03, Devin Harris – 2004, Mike Wilkinson – 2005 and Alando Tucker - 2006). Harris, the fifth pick in the 2004 NBA Draft, was also named the 2004 Big Ten Player of the Year and was a consensus second-team All-American. He was a finalist for every major national player of the year award and finished second for the Bob Cousy Award.

Last year, Ryan guided the Badgers to a fifth consecutive NCAA tournament appearance and a share of fourth place in the Big Ten, the No. 1 RPI conference in the country. UW won at least 19 games for the fifth straight season and finished 9-7 in

the Big Ten. Wisconsin also won the season-opening Paradise Jam.

In 2004-05, Ryan was named one of 20 finalists for the Naismith Coach of the Year Award. Despite returning just one starter from the previous year's team, he led the Badgers to an appearance in the 2005 NCAA Tournament Elite Eight and a school record-tying 25 wins. UW finished third in the Big Ten with an 11-5 mark and advanced to the Big Ten tournament title game for the second consecutive season. Wisconsin finished the season ranked 10th in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll, its highest final ranking in history.

In 2003-04, Ryan led Wisconsin to a 25-7 record, setting a school record for wins in a season and posting the school's highest winning percentage since the 1941 team won the NCAA title with a 20-3 mark. The Badgers' 12-4 mark in the Big Ten was good enough to earn the second seed in the conference tournament. UW went on to win the Big Ten tournament for the first time in school history, defeating No. 1 seed Illinois, 70-53, in the final. For the second time in school history, UW was ranked in the Associated Press poll every week during the season. Those accomplishments came in spite of UW losing its second-leading scorer, Alando Tucker, for all but four games and having just four players see action in all 32 games.

The year before, Ryan and the Badgers set a school record with 24 wins and earned an outright Big Ten title and a trip to the NCAA tournament Sweet 16. The outright conference championship was UW's first since 1947 and the 12 league

wins tied a school record set in 1912 and tied in 1914. Ryan earned his second Big Ten Coach of the Year award, becoming the first coach in league history to be so honored in each of his first two seasons.

In his first season, 2001-02, Ryan led an undermanned UW team to an improbable share of its first Big Ten championship in 55 years. Ryan had to juggle a lineup consisting of only eight scholarship players, including five players that had seen

very limited or no action at all on the collegiate level. Though it took a period of adjustment, by mid-December the team had started to gel and would go on to win 15 of its final 20 regular-season games and earn a share of the Big Ten title. One of those victories, a 64-56 win over Iowa, was Ryan's 400th as a collegiate coach.

Ryan has experience as a Division I head and assistant coach, as well as a Division III head coach and is well-respect-

ed throughout the college basketball world. At the 2004 Final Four, he was honored with the NABC Guardians of the Game Award for Service. The goal of the Gaurdians of the Game program is to focus attention on the positive aspects of basketball and the role coaches play in the lives of student-athletes, in addition to the contributions coaches make to their communities. Ryan is also one of four head coaches on the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Issues Committee.

Ryan came to Wisconsin from UW-Milwaukee, where he spent two seasons coaching the Panthers to their first back-to-back winning seasons in eight years. UWM, 8-19 overall the year before Ryan arrived, was 15-14 and 15-13, respectively, in Ryan's two years at the controls. The program also experienced a 161-percent home attendance increase in his first season, including the three largest crowds in the history of the school's home facility.

It was during his 15-year tenure at UW-Platteville (1984-99), however, that Ryan firmly established himself as one of the country's top coaches. He guided the Division III school to a phenomenal 353-76 (.822) overall record and, in his final 12 seasons, the Pioneers:

- Won four national championships (1991, 1995, 1998 and 1999)
- Compiled a 314-37 (.895) record
- Won eight WIAC titles
- Were the winningest NCAA men's basketball team of the 1990s (all divisions) with a 266-26 (.908) record
- Compiled a 30-5 NCAA Division III tournament mark
- Never won fewer than 23 games
- Compiled a 157-7 (.957) record on their home floor
- Set the all-time single-season Division III scoring defense mark (47.5 ppg) in 1996–97

Ryan was named the National Association of Basketball Coaches Division III Coach of the Year four times. In addition he was tabbed the Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference's Coach of the Year on six occasions.

Ryan took over at UW-Platteville following eight seasons (1976-84) as an assistant coach to Bill Cofield and Steve Yoder at Wisconsin.


Held in high esteem by colleagues, Ryan has won two gold medals as an assistant coach, first with Virginia head coach Pete Gillen and the gold medal-winning North squad at the 1993 U.S. Olympic Festival, and also with former Atlanta Hawks coach Lon Kruger and the United States gold medal winner at the 1995 World University Games.

Ryan was born on Dec. 20, 1947, just outside of Philadelphia in Chester, Pa. He attended Wilkes (Pa.) University, where he starred as a high-scoring guard and earned a bachelor's degree in business administration in 1969. Ryan was inducted into the Wilkes Athletic Hall of Fame on June 1, 2003.

Upon completion of his collegiate career, Ryan did graduate work at Villanova before accepting an assistant coaching position at the College of Racine (Wis.). Ryan accepted his first head coaching job at Philadelphia's Sun Valley High School, where he was named the Delaware County Coach of the Year after directing his team to a second-place finish in the Philadelphia Suburban League. His 1976 club was the first Sun Valley High team to qualify for the state tournament. While in Philadelphia in the early '70s, Ryan was a teammate of Vince Papale, the inspiration for the movie "Invincible," on a championship touch football team.

Ryan is the author of three books on coaching basketball: Passing and Catching: A Lost Art; How to Run the Swing Offense; and Applying and Attacking Pressure. He also has produced five basketball instructional videos.

Ryan and his wife, Kelly, are the parents of five children: Megan, Will, Matt, Brenna and Mairin.

Ryan Receives NABC Guardians of the Game Award

Bo Ryan received the prestigious 2004 NABC Guardians of the Game Award for Service. The Guardians of the Game is a national awareness and education program led by the NABC. The goal of the program is to focus attention on the positive aspects of basketball and the role coaches play in the lives of student-athletes, in addition to the contributions coaches make to their communities.

"I'm honored to be the recipient of an award that represents giving back to the people in our communities," Ryan said. "At an early age, I saw how many people benefited from the work my parents and others did in our hometown. They never expected anything in return but always enjoyed seeing the smiles on the faces of those they helped through their kind gestures. That has always been an inspiration to me."

The Guardians of the Game program emphasizes four core values: advocacy, leadership, service and education. The NABC presents one award in each of these categories to a member coach each year. Ryan, who is active in the Salvation Army, the Boys and Girls Club of Madison, Buckets for Hunger, the UW Children's Hospital and the William S. Middleton Memorial Veterans Hospital, among other charities, received the service award. According to the NABC, "this award winner selflessly gives to those in need and gives the extra effort to make a difference in the lives of their neighbors through volunteerism and giving."

UW-Platteville Names Court After Ryan

The University of Wisconsin-Platteville announced in September that it will honor Bo Ryan by naming the Williams Fieldhouse basketball court "Bo Ryan Court." Ryan coached the Pioneers to four national titles and was named national coach of the year four times.

"I was very fortunate to be at UW-Platteville during a time of great support from the fans and community as well as tremendous players and assistant coaches," Ryan said. "We were the recipients of a lot of cooperation and goodwill throughout the Platteville community. My family and I will cherish the 15 years we spent in Platteville the rest of our lives."

Ryan made UW-Platteville the premier basketball program during his 15-year tenure, which included four NCAA Division III national championships. He recorded a 353-76 record at UW-Platteville from 1984-99 and his .822 winning percentage was the best in the history of NCAA Division III basketball.

UW-Platteville will officially dedicate the floor on Jan. 27, 2007 at halftime of the game vs. UW-Eau Claire. UWP Chancellor David Markee said in announcing the plan, "We are extremely excited and honored to recognize Bo for his accomplishments and the success of the teams. His teams brought such positive recognition for UWP both on and off the court."

Ryan guided the Pioneers to eight conference titles and nine straight NCAA III playoff appearances. UW-Platteville won national titles in 1991, 1995, 1998 and 1999. His 1992 squad also advanced to the Final Four, where it placed third. In all, the Pioneers were 30-5 in NCAA tournament play.

In his last 12 seasons as the Pioneers' leader, Ryan guided his team to 314-37 record, including a phenomenal 157-7 record in Williams Fieldhouse. UW-Platteville was the winningest team of all of college basketball during the 1990s, with a 226-26 record (90.9 percent). Ryan's 1996-97 club set the all-time NCAA record (all divisions) for fewest points allowed at 47.5 ppg. He was named national coach of the year four times and WIAC coach of the year on six occasions.

In Good Company

Bo Ryan has led Wisconsin to success not seen in Madison for a long time, specifically the time of Walter "Doc" Meanwell.

Meanwell coached the Badgers for 20 seasons in the early part of the 20th century. His teams won eight Big Ten titles and and lost just one game during his first three seasons. Meanwell was inducted into the Basketball Hall of Fame in 1959.

Many of the Badgers' accomplishments under Ryan have not been matched since the days of Meanwell. Among them are:

- The 2002 and 2003 Badgers won back-to-back Big Ten titles for the first time since 1923-24.
- Ryan reached 100 career victories at Wisconsin (138 games) faster than anyone in school history besides Meanwell (111 games).
- The 2003-04 Badgers were the first UW team to record an undefeated season at home since Meanwell's team went 12-0 in 1929-30.
- Ryan's Badgers have also accomplished a couple things Meanwell's teams did not.
- The 2002-05 Badgers were the first to win at least 11 conference games four seasons in a row.
- Wisconsin's 55 Big Ten victories over the past five seasons are the most in school history, surpassing the 1912-16 total by one.

reg Gard, a veteran of 13 seasons with Wisconsin coach Bo Ryan, is in his sixth season on the Badger basketball staff as an assistant coach.

"Greg is one of the most thorough and organized coaches I have ever been around," Ryan said. "His attention to detail and his ability to communicate that to the student-athletes separates him from other coaches."

Gard serves as the Badgers' recruiting coordinator in addition to on-floor coaching duties, opponent scouting and game preparation, and the constructing of future Badger game schedules. He is also the director of the Badger Boys Basketball Summer Camps.

Gard came to the Badgers after spending the previous two seasons as Ryan's assistant at UW-Milwaukee, where he had responsibilities in scouting, summer basketball camp operations and on-floor coaching, as well as involvement with recruiting.

Previously, Gard served as an assistant coach to Ryan at UW-Platteville from 1993-99. During Gard's years on the Pioneer staff, UW-Platteville compiled a 161-13 (.925) record and won three NCAA Division III titles, five straight Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WIAC) championships and appeared in six consecutive NCAA Tournaments. In his final year at UW-Platteville, Gard served as Ryan's top assistant in charge of recruiting, basketball camp operations and scouting. He also worked as an advisor in the university's admissions office.

Prior to joining Ryan's staff in Platteville, Gard spent three seasons at Southwestern High School and one at Platteville High School, where he served in junior high and assistant varsity coaching capacities.

Gard is a 1995 graduate of UW-Platteville with a degree in physical and health education. He and his wife, Michelle, have two children, Mackenzie and Isaac.





Assistant Coach Gary Close

ary Close, entering his 20th season in Division I, begins his fourth season with the Badgers. Close was an assistant for 16 years at Iowa and Stanford before joining UW's staff in the spring of 2003.

"From the first time I met Gary at Stanford, I knew he was someone with exceptional teaching and coaching skills," Head Coach Bo Ryan said. "The University of Wisconsin will benefit greatly from his addition to our staff and we are looking forward to working together for many years to come."

Close spent three years as the head coach of Regina High School in Iowa City, leading them to two state tournament appearances, and as the Director of Basketball Operations for Championship Productions in Ames, Iowa.

Prior to that, he spent 13 years as an assistant at Iowa under Tom Davis. During that time, the Hawkeyes made nine NCAA tournament appearances, advancing to the "Sweet 16" twice and the regional final once. At Iowa he coached 13 future NBA choices including B.J. Armstrong, Roy Marble, Acie Earl, Matt Bullard, Ricky Davis and Ryan Bowen. A respected shooting coach, Iowa shot better than 48.0 percent from the field five times during his tenure, including a school-record .528 in 1987-88. In his second season with the Badgers, 2004-05, UW set a school record with 250 3-point field goals made.

Close was also an assistant for three years under Davis at Stanford. In his first season, Stanford won 19 games, the most at the school since 1961-62. He was also part of the staff that was responsible for recruiting the Cardinal's all-time leading scorer, Todd Lichti.

A veteran of a number of international tours, Close served as the assistant to Davis on a Pac-10 all-star team that toured Australia in 1985. During the summer of 1995, he served as cohead coach for a Big Ten all-star team on an eight-game tour in Europe.

Under Close's direction in 1996, the People-to-People Sports team became the first American team to win the Malgrat International Tournament in Malgrat, Spain. In 1997, Close coached a team comprised of current and former Iowa players to a perfect 6-0 record on a six-game tour in Germany.

A native of Moorestown, New Jersey, Close earned a bachelor's degree in business-agricultural with a minor in physical education (1978) and a master's degree in athletic administration and coaching (1982) from Arizona State. Close, his wife Kellie and their son Sam live in Middleton.





Assistant Coach Howard Moore

Rormer University of Wisconsin basketball player Howard Moore begins his second season as a Badger assistant this year. Moore played for UW from 1990-95 and was part of the 1993 NIT team and 1994 NCAA Tournament team.

"We're proud to announce the return of one of the most popular figures in Badger basketball, this time in the coaching ranks," Head Coach Bo Ryan said. "Howard knows the campus and the climate of the University and that will definitely be an advantage on the recruiting trail just as his knowledge as a coach and teacher will be a benefit on the floor."

Moore spent last season as an assistant at the University of Loyola-Chicago, handling off-campus recruiting and working primarily with the team's post players. The Ramblers, who were 9-20 overall and 4-12 in the Horizon League in 2003-04, went 13-17 last season, including 8-8 in the Horizon League. They won six of their last seven

games, losing to UW-Milwaukee in the Horizon League Tournament

Prior to joining the Loyola staff, Moore was an assistant under Tim Buckley at Ball State for one season. At Ball State, Moore helped the Cardinals become the top three-point field percentage defense team in the Mid-American Conference, limiting foes to .315 shooting from beyond the arc. On the recruiting trail, Moore helped land what was considered by many experts to be the top class in the MAC.

Before his stint at Ball State, Moore served as the head offcampus recruiter and also mentored the guards and post players at Bradley from 2000-03. In that stretch he helped mold Phillip Gilbert and James Gillingham into All-Missouri Valley Conference selections. Moore also served as an administrative assistant at Bradley in 1999-2000.

After a two-year stint as an assistant boys varsity coach at Taft High School, Moore commenced his collegiate coaching career as an assistant at the University of Chicago.

Moore played at UW from 1990-95, playing for Steve Yoder, Stu Jackson and Stan Van Gundy. The Badgers earned an NIT bid in 1991, Moore's redshirt season. His sophomore year, Wisconsin returned to the NIT and as a junior, he was a part of UW's first NCAA tournament team in 47 years.

Moore played in 47 games as a Badger, including 21 as a senior. He represented the Big Ten by touring Argentina with a group of league all-stars in 1994. Moore, who was the recipient of the University of Wisconsin African-American Alumni Association Student Leadership Award in 1993, graduated from Wisconsin in 1995 with a bachelor's degree in African-American Studies.

A 1990 graduate of Taft High School in Chicago, Moore guided his team to the Chicago Public League semifinals as a senior and was named to the Chicago Public League Hall of Fame in 1999.

Moore, his wife, Jennifer, and their son, Jerell, live in Madison.


Perez-Guerra moved to Kansas City, Mo., to join Sports Rehabilitation

108 Years of Wisconsin Basketball

he Wisconsin men's basketball program begins its 109th season in 2006–07. Following is a chronological list of highlights from the first 108 years of UW basketball.

December, 1898

Six years after the advent of the new sport of basketball, Bob Burdick, John Mapel, Carl Sillman, Paul Stover and Captain Walter Hirschberg make up the first Wisconsin Badger basketball team. Dr. J.C. Elsom is the first UW coach.

Jan. 21, 1899

Wisconsin plays its first game and falls to the Milwaukee Normal Alumni, 25-15, in Milwaukee.

March 4, 1899

The Badgers play their first home game. The Milwaukee Normal Alumni edge Wisconsin, 13-10, and the Badgers finish their first season 0-3.

Feb. 15, 1900

Wisconsin defeats Wayland Academy, 25-15, for the first victory in school history.

March, 1902

After completing a 10-game schedule (all on the road), the Badgers finish the year

with a 7-3 record, their first winning season.

Dec. 2, 1904

Emmett Angell coaches the Badgers for the first time and watches his team rout Sparta's Company C, 75-10. Christian Steinmetz scores 50 points in the victory to set a premodern, single-game scoring mark.

January, 1905

The Badgers make their first road trip to the East and come home with a 2-6 mark after games in New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania and Ohio.

Spring, 1905

Christian Steinmetz finishes the season with 462 points, setting a Wisconsin season scoring mark that would stand for 61 years. Steinmetz is later named the Badgers' first All-American.

March 15, 1907

Wisconsin defeats Purdue, 37-10, to secure an 11-3 record and a share of the school's first Big Ten championship.

March 16, 1912

First-year coach Walter Meanwell, known as the "Little Doctor," guides the Badgers to a 32-21 win over Indiana to complete an unbeaten season at 15-0. Wisconsin wins

the Big Ten title outright and will win or share the conference crown seven more times before Meanwell's coaching career ends in 1934.

March 16, 1918

Despite dropping a 19-11 decision to Minnesota, first-year coach Guy Lowman's Badgers win the school's sixth Big Ten championship in 12 years.

Dec. 18, 1930

The Badgers defeat Penn, 25-12, in the dedication game for the new Wisconsin Field House.

Fall, 1934

Harold "Bud" Foster, a former All-America player for the Badgers, takes over as head coach. Foster will hold that position for 25 years, longer than any other basketball coach in school history.

Spring, 1935

In his first season as head coach, "Bud" Foster leads the Badgers to the Big Ten title with a 15-5 record.



The UW Field House opened on Dec. 18, 1930 as Wisconsin defeated Penn 25-12.

March 29, 1941

The "Cinderella" Badgers, lower division finishers in the Big Ten just one year earlier, top Washington State, 39-34, to win the NCAA tournament. The UW's John Kotz is named tournament MVP. Team captain Gene Englund is the Big Ten MVP and earns All-America honors.

Spring, 1942

Wisconsin has the Big Ten MVP for the second straight season when John Kotz earns the award. Kotz also garners All-America kudos.

March, 1947

The 15-5 Big Ten champion Badgers are invited to play in the NCAA Eastern Regionals in New York's Madison Square Garden. Wisconsin takes third place in the East by squeaking past Navy, 50-49, after losing the opener, 70-56, to CCNY.

Feb. 28, 1949

Junior Don Rehfeldt takes 37 shots in a 70-47 trouncing of Iowa. Rehfeldt's 37 field goal attempts still stand as a single-game Wisconsin record.

Spring, 1950

After being named the Big Ten's MVP, Don Rehfeldt becomes Wisconsin's last All-American to date. He finishes his career as the school's all-time leading scorer with 1,169 points. Rehfeldt also is picked second overall in the NBA Draft.

Jan. 3, 1953

Center Paul Morrow grabs what remains a schoolrecord 30 rebounds in a 50-46 victory over Purdue.

Jan. 27, 1962

Despite Boilermaker Terry Dischinger's UW Field House-record 50 points, the Badgers defeat Purdue 89-86.

March 3, 1962

The Badgers defeat a topranked Ohio State squad (86-67) that features all-Americans John Havlicek and Jerry Lucas, as well as reserve forward Bob

Knight. The powerful Buckeyes see their 47-game winning streak come to an end.

March 11, 1963

Senior Ken Seibel earns the team's MVP award for the third consecutive season. He remains the Badgers' only three-time MVP.

March 8, 1965

Ken Barnes scores a school-record 42 points, along with 23 rebounds, in a 92-73 loss to Indiana. Barnes' mark stands alone until Michael Finley matches it in December of 1994.

March 11, 1967

With 12 seconds remaining in the season finale against Illinois, sophomore Chuck Nagle makes a layup to tie Christian Steinmetz as the school's single-season scoring leader with 462 points. Fouled on the play, Nagle converts the free throw and sets the record.

Dec. 9, 1967

The Badgers set a school single-game scoring record with a 120-82 win over Southern Methodist.

March 2, 1968

Senior Joe Franklin pulls down a career-high 27 rebounds in a 104-84 victory over Purdue— his final game at the UW Field House. Franklin ends his collegiate career one week later having amassed 858 boards for what still is a school-record 11.9 rebounds per game.

March 9, 1968

Only one year after Chuck Nagle snaps Wisconsin's 62-year-old single-season scoring mark set by Christian Steinmetz, Joe Franklin registers 30 points in the season finale at Northwestern to finish the campaign with a school-best 544 points.

March 13, 1971


Senior co-captain Clarence Sherrod scores 27 points in a season-ending loss at Michigan to finish the year with 570 points. It is the third time in five seasons that the Badgers have a new all-time single-season scoring leader.

Jan. 5, 1976

The Badgers record the largest comeback in school history when they erase a 22-point (47-25) deficit and gain an 82-81 overtime victory over Ohio State at the UW Field House.

March 3, 1979

Guard Wes Matthews hits a halfcourt shot as time expires as the Badgers defeat Magic Johnson and eventual NCAA champion Michigan State 83-81 at the UW Field House.



Joe Franklin averaged a UW record 11.9 rebounds per game for his career. In his last home game, he pulled down a career-high 27 boards.



Danny Jones is one of just three Badgers (Michael Finley and Devin Harris are the others) to have scored more than 600 points in a season. That season (1989), he led the UW to its first-ever NIT appearance.

Dec. 30, 1979

The Badgers connect on 32 of 43 field goal attempts (.744) to set a single-game school record and defeat Army 78-54.

March 10, 1981

Claude Gregory scores 29 points and grabs 17 rebounds in his last game as a Badger. He leaves the school as Wisconsin's career leader in points (1,745) and rebounds (904).

Dec. 2, 1985

In a non-conference matchup with San Francisco State, senior Rick Olson makes 17 field goals in a 90-61 Badger victory. Olson's 17 field goals tops the previous school record of 16 set nearly 27 years earlier by Bob Litzow.

March 9, 1986

Setting a school record by starting every game (112) in his four-year career, Rick Olson guides Wisconsin past Northwestern, 70-68. Olson scores 26 points in the game and misses becoming the school's career scoring leader by nine points. However, he does become the UW's single-season scoring champion with 571 points.

Feb. 16, 1987

In one of the most infamous games in school history, the Badgers take eventual NCAA champion Indiana to three overtimes before falling 86-85 at the UW Field House before a capacity crowd and national television audience.

March 8, 1987

Mike Heineman scores 20 points, grabs seven rebounds and hands out nine assists in his final game as a Badger. Heineman ends his career as Wisconsin's all-time assist leader with 388.

Dec. 14, 1988

The Badgers record the widest margin of victory in school history with an 89-34 win over Denver at the UW Field House.

March 15, 1989

The Badgers, under Coach Steve Yoder, make their first-ever appearance in the National Invitation Tournament and defeat New Orleans, 63-61, at the UW Field House. It is Wisconsin's first postseason appearance since the 1947 NCAA Tournament.

March 20, 1989

Danny Jones scores 24 points in the season finale against St. Louis. His 611 points establishes a new single-season school scoring record.

Feb. 15, 1990

Danny Jones snaps Wisconsin's career scoring mark against Ohio State. Jones ends his career with 1,854 points.

March 13, 1991

The Badgers make their second NIT appearance in three years and defeat Bowling Green 87-79 (OT) at the UW Field House. Wisconsin, however, is eliminated from the tournament five days later by Stanford.

March 25, 1992

Former New York Knicks coach Stu Jackson is hired as Wisconsin's 11th head coach.

Feb. 13, 1993

Sophomore Michael Finley goes head-to-head with Purdue All-American Glenn Robinson. Finley scores 33 points and adds a Big Ten-record 10 steals but the Boilermakers prevail 90-87 in double overtime behind Robinson's 42 points.

March 17, 1993

Wisconsin qualifies for its third National Invitation Tournament in five years but loses 77-73 to Rice in the first round at the UW Field House.

Nov. 22, 1993


The Badgers are ranked 25th by the Associated Press, their first national ranking by the A.P. since January of 1976.

March 17, 1994

Led by Michael Finley, Tracy Webster and Rashard Griffith, Coach Stu Jackson's Badgers defeat Cincinnati 80-72 in the school's first NCAA tournament game since 1947. Wisconsin is eliminated two days later by Missouri.

Dec. 10, 1994

Michael Finley scores a school record-tying 42 points in a 92-76 loss at Eastern Michigan. Finley registers 33 points in the second half to set the school mark for points in a half.



Michael Finley scored a school record-tying 42 points against Eastern Michigan in 1994. Later that year, he would extend his career points record to 2,147. Finley is the only Badger player to tally more than 2,000 points in a career.

Jan. 14, 1995

Michael Finley breaks Danny Jones' school career scoring mark in the first half of the Badgers' 74-67 win at home over Minnesota. Finley goes on to finish his career with 2,147 points.

March 31, 1995

Dick Bennett is hired from UW-Green Bay as Wisconsin's 13th head coach, replacing Stan Van Gundy.

June 28, 1995

Forward Michael Finley becomes Wisconsin's first first-round NBA draft choice since 1980 when he is selected 21st overall by Phoenix.

March 13, 1996

Coach Dick Bennett's Badgers defeat Manhattan 55-42 in the first round of the National Invitation Tournament at the UW Field House. The Badgers are eliminated five days later by Illinois State.

Jan. 4, 1997

Wisconsin snaps a 31-game losing streak to Indiana with a 71-58 victory over the Hoosiers at the UW Field House. Wisconsin leads 17-0 before Indiana scores.

Feb. 26, 1997

Seven-foot center Paul Grant sets a school record with a 15-for-15 performance at the free throw line in a 49-48 victory over Iowa at the UW Field House.

March 8, 1997

The Badgers lock up the school's second NCAA tournament bid in 50 years with a 66-65 upset win over No. 2-ranked Minnesota at the UW Field House. It is the UW's first win over a first or second-ranked opponent since 1962.

March 14, 1997

The Badgers lose 71-58 to Texas in the first round of the NCAA tournament at Pittsburgh's Civic Arena.

June 25, 1997

Paul Grant becomes UW's second firstround NBA draft choice in three years when he is selected 20th overall by Minnesota.



The Badgers, a No. 8 seed in the 2000 NCAA Tournament, made a cinderella run to the Final Four that year. Wisconsin defeated No. 9 seed Fresno State, No. 1 seed Arizona, No. 4 seed LSU and No. 6 seed Purdue on its way to the RCA Dome in Indianapolis.

Jan. 14, 1998

The Badgers play the final game in the UW Field House and record a 76-57 win over Penn State.

Jan. 17, 1998

Wisconsin opens the new, \$76 million Kohl Center with a 56-33 triumph over Northwestern before 16,697 fans, including Sen. Herb Kohl.

Dec. 14, 1998

The Badgers enter the media and coaches top-25 polls for the first time since December of 1994.

Dec. 27, 1998

Wisconsin's 10th straight win gives the school a 12-1 record for only the second time since 1929-30.

Jan. 31, 1999

The Badgers achieve the school's highest national ranking (11th by A.P.) since 1962.

March 1, 1999

Sophomore guard Mike Kelley becomes the first Badger to be named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year.

March 7, 1999

UW receives its fifth NCAA Tournament bid and second in the four-year Dick Bennett

era. The Badgers also earn their highest tournament seed (fifth) ever.

March 12, 1999

The Badgers drop a 43-32 decision to Southwest Missouri State in the first round of the NCAA tournament in Charlotte, N.C.

March 1, 2000

Guard Mike Kelley becomes Wisconsin's career steals leader in a 62-46 win at Northwestern.

March 12, 2000

Wisconsin receives its sixth NCAA tournament bid and third in the five-year Dick Bennett era.

March 16-18, 2000

Wisconsin defeats ninth-seeded Fresno State and top-seeded Arizona in the first and second rounds of the NCAA tournament in Salt Lake City, Utah. The wins allow the UW to advance to the Sweet 16 for the first time ever.

March 23-25, 2000

The Badgers advance to the Final Four after defeating fourth-seeded and 10th-ranked LSU in the West Regional semifinal and Big Ten rival and sixth-seeded Purdue in the regional title game in Albuquerque, N M $\,$

The win over the Boilermakers ties the school single-season record (22) set by the 1998-99 squad.

Guard Jon Bryant is named the West Regional MVP and guard Mike Kelley and forward Andy Kowske are named to the all-West Regional team.

Upon their return to Madison on the night of the 25th, the Badgers are greeted by 20,000 screaming fans at a rally in Camp Randall Stadium.

April 1, 2000

The Badgers' amazing NCAA tournament run ends in the semifinals at the Final Four with a 53-41 loss to eventual national champion Michigan State.

Nov. 29, 2000

The Badgers defeat 13th-ranked Maryland 78-75 in overtime at the Bradley Center in Milwaukee. Following the game, Dick Bennett tells the team he has coached his last game and formally announces his retirement the next day. Assistant head coach Brad Soderberg takes over as UW's 14th head basketball coach.



Bo Ryan was named the 15th head coach in Badger basketball history on March 29, 2001. Since that time, Wisconsin has made five NCAA tournament appearances, won two Big Ten titles and one Big Ten tournament title. Ryan has amassed 112 wins and boasts a 72-5 mark at the Kohl Center in five years.

Jan. 29, 2001

Wisconsin ascends to the No. 10 spot in the Associated Press top 25, the school's highest ranking since it was seventh on Dec. 11, 1962.

March 11, 2001

Wisconsin receives its third consecutive NCAA tournament bid and the seventh in school history.

March 15, 2001

The Badgers fall 50-49 to Georgia State in the first round of the NCAA tournament in Boise, Idaho.

March 29, 2001

After announcing on March 19 that Brad Soderberg will not be retained as head coach, UW Director of Athletics Pat Richter hires William "Bo" Ryan from UW-Milwaukee as the 15th head coach in Badger basketball history.

Jan. 12, 2002

Freddie Owens hits a runner with 25 second left in the game to give Wisconsin a 64-63 win over Michigan State in East Lansing. The win snapped the Spartans' Big Ten-record 53-game home winning streak.

Feb. 13, 2002


Behind Charlie Wills' 17 points, the Badgers defeat Indiana 64-63 in Bloomington. The victory is UW's first at Assembly Hall since 1977, a span of 22 games.

Feb. 27, 2002

Wisconsin clinches a share of its first Big Ten title since 1947 with a 74-54 win over Michigan at the Kohl Center. Devin Harris and Kirk Penney each score 21 points and hit four three-pointers. With the victory, the Badgers earn the No. 1 seed in the Big Ten Tournament for the first time in school history.

March 5, 2002

Head coach Bo Ryan is named the Big Ten Coach of the Year, becoming the first UW coach to receive the honor. Kirk Penney is also a unanimous first-team all-league selection, just the fifth Badger since 1948 to earn unanimous first-team honors.



Devin Harris made one of two free throws with 0.4 seconds remaining to give the Badgers a 60-59 win over Illinois in the 2003 season finale, clinching the UW's first outright Big Ten title since 1947.

March 15, 2002


Seniors Travon Davis and Charlie Wills become the first UW players to appear in four NCAA tournaments as the Badgers defeat St. John's 80-70 at the MCI Center in Washington, D.C. Wisconsin falls to eventual national champion Maryland, 87-57, two days later.

March 5, 2003

Point guard Devin Harris hits the gamewinning free throw with 0.4 seconds remaining to give Wisconsin a 60-59 win over Illinois and its first outright Big Ten title since 1947.

March 11, 2003

For the second consecutive season, Bo Ryan is named the Big Ten's Coach of the Year. He is the only coach in league history to win the award in each of his first two seasons. Kirk Penney is also a repeat first-team All-Big Ten selection, the Badgers' first back-to-back first teamer since 1951-52.



Freddie Owens' 3-pointer with one second left completed a 13-point comeback against Tulsa and pushed Wisconsin to the Sweet 16 of the 2003 NCAA tournament.

March 16, 2003

Wisconsin earns a school-record fifth straight bid to the NCAA tournament. The Badgers are seeded fifth in the Midwest Region, matching their best-ever seed.

March 20, 2003

The Badgers defeat Weber State 81-74 in the first round of the NCAA tournament in Spokane, Wash. The win is the 23rd of the season for UW, breaking the school record of 22. It also marks the first time in school history that Wisconsin has won NCAA tournament games in consecutive seasons.

March 22, 2003

Junior Freddie Owens hits a 3-pointer with one second left to cap the greatest comeback in school history and give the Badgers a 61-60 win over Tulsa and a berth in the "Sweet 16." Wisconsin had trailed 58-45 with 3:36 remaining before outscoring the Golden Hurricane 16-2 the rest of the way.

Jan. 24-Feb. 4, 2004

Junior Devin Harris scores 97 points over a three-game span, setting a UW record. Harris just misses becoming the first UW player in history to record three straight 30-point games, scoring 30 vs. Illinois (Jan. 24), 29 at Ohio State (Jan. 28) and a career-high 38 vs. Minnesota (Feb. 4). The 38-point effort is tied for the fourth-most by a Badger.

March 10, 2004

The Big Ten announces that UW junior Devin Harris has been named conference player of the year. Harris is the first Badger to earn the award since Don Rehfeldt in 1950.

March 14, 2004

Wisconsin defeats Illinois 70-53 at the Conseco Fieldhouse in Indianapolis to win the 2004 Big Ten Tournament, the first tourney title in UW history. Devin Harris is named the tournament's most outstanding player and Mike Wilkinson joins him on the all-tournament team. The Badgers defeated Minnesota in the quarterfinals and Michigan State in the semis.

March 19, 2004

Almost exactly a year after erasing a 13-point deficit to win a second round game in the 2003 NCAA Tournament, the Badgers rally from a 13-point, second-half deficit to defeat Richmond, 76-64, in the first round of the 2004 NCAA Tournament in Milwaukee. The victory is UW's 25th of the season, breaking the school record for wins in a season, set just the year before.

Jan. 5, 2005

Behind Zach Morley's career-high 22 points stemming mostly from 6-of-8 3-point shooting, the Badgers defeated Purdue 77-68 for their first win in West Lafayette since 1972, a streak of 29 straight losses. It was the first loss to Wisconsin at home for the Boilermakers under Gene Keady.

Jan. 16, 2005

Down 59-51 with two minutes remaining, UW scores the game's final 11 points to rally past No. 12 Michigan State 62-51 at the Kohl Center. Kammron Taylor's runner in the lane with 31 seconds left proved to be the game-winner.

March 25, 2005


Wisconsin came back from two 10-point deficits and got a game-high 22 points from Alando Tucker in defeating 10th-seeded N.C. State for its second trip to the Elite Eight in the past five years.

March 4, 2006

Alando Tucker scores 10 points in UW's Big Ten conference finale against Iowa and becomes the first Badger to lead the league in scoring since Don Rehfeldt in 1950. Tucker averaged 20.0 points in 16 games.

March 12, 2006


Wisconsin is selected to make its eighthstraight appearance in the NCAA tournament, a school record. UW is one of nine schools nationally to accomplish the feat. The eighth-seeded Badgers drew ninthseeded Arizona in the first round of the Minneapolis Regional.



In 2006, Alando Tucker became the first Badger player to lead the Big Ten in scoring since Don Rehfeldt in 1950. Tucker averaged 20 points for Wisconsin, which made its eighth-straight appearance to the NCAA tournament.


1907-08 (10-2 Overall / 7-1 Big Ten)

The 1907-08 team led Wisconsin to back-to-back Big Ten titles for the first time in program history. It's 27-14 win against Illinois at the UW Field House clinched it. But after beating Chicago by 20 points earlier in the season, UW dropped back-to-back contests to the Maroons, including a two-point decision in the Big Ten title playoff game.

1912-13 (14-1 Overall / 11-1 Big Ten)



Wisconsin extended its winning streak to 29 games during the 1912-13 season before dropping the season finale at Chicago, 23-10. The 23 points were the most given up by UW the entire season. Wisconsin had won its previous 23 Big Ten contests.

For head coach Walter Meanwell it was the second of three consecutive Big Ten titles to begin his career at Wisconsin. Meanwell led UW to eight Big Ten titles in his 20 seasons with the program.



In his first season as head coach at Wisconsin, Guy Lowman led the Badgers to a 14-3 record and their second Big Ten championship in three seasons. UW survived an opening loss to Northwestern by winning nine of its next 10 games. Wisconsin split with NU, Chicago and Minnesota during the year and went 7-1 in games decided by five points or less.

1920-21 (13-4 Overall / 8-4 Big Ten)



UW coach Walter Meanwell began his second tenure with Badgers by winning the program's eighth Big Ten title. Wisconsin lost two of its first three Big Ten contests, but finished 7-2 down the stretch. UW went 2-4 on the road in the Big Ten, but didn't lose a single game all year at the UW Field House (9-0).

The 1920-21 season marked the second year for Big Ten newcomers Michigan and Ohio State. UW would play its first game against Michigan State the following year.

1922-23 (12-3 Overall / 11-1 Big Ten)



The 1922–23 squad won 11 of its final 12 ball games to grab a share of the Big Ten title. No Big Ten team managed to score more than 19 points against the Badgers. UW's only loss in Big Ten play was a 17-13 decision at Purdue. The Badgers downed the Boilermakers, 20-19, at UW Field House later that season.

UW ended the 1923 season with seven consecutive victories, including a 35-17 win over Indiana in the season finale. That win was one of seven throughout the year in which Wisconsin scored twice as many points as its opponents.

Two losses to Michigan during the season wouldn't prevent Wisconsin from winning its 11th Big Ten championship. The Badgers went 10-0 against the rest of the league, including a 6-0 mark in games decided by five points or less. This season marked the last of head coach Walter Meanwell's eight Big Ten titles. He would coach the next five seasons before handing the program over to Harold "Bud" Foster.

1934-35 (15-5 Overall / 9-3 Big Ten)



Harold "Bud" Foster helped Wisconsin win its fourth Big Ten title in a row following a coaching change at the beginning of the season. His Badger squad won seven of its final eight contests to grab a share of its 12th Big Ten championship. Along the way, UW earned four wins by two points or less and another by 10 in overtime. Two of the team's three losses came at the hands of Purdue, including a 43-24 decision in the season finale.

1940-41 (20-3 Overall / 11-1 Big Ten)



Led by a pair of All-Americans -- Gene Englund and John Kotz -- and a defense-minded coach (Bud Foster) who taught a disciplined brand of basketball, Wisconsin won its only NCAA basketball title in 1941.

The Badgers opened the season with three straight wins, but dropped three of their next five games, including its conference opener against Minnesota. But the UW won its last 15 games, including three in the NCAA tournament, capped by a five-point win over Washington State in the championship game played in Kansas City, Mo.

In 1947, the Wisconsin Badgers won their 14th Big Ten championship and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the second time in the program's history.

Wisconsin's national title dreams were dashed following its loss to CCNY at Madison Square Garden. UW led 26-10 in the first half of that contest, but was outscored 43-19 in the second half. Exner Menzel paced the Badgers with 15 points.

Ben Selbo's basket in the final seconds propelled the Badgers to a 50-49 win over Navy in the East Regional consolation game. Bobby Cook scored a game-high 21 points to lead Wisconsin.

To clinch a share of the 2002 Big Ten championship, Wisconsin had to win its last six regular-season games - something that hadn't been done since 1941. But a two-point, overtime win against 16th-ranked Ohio State ignited the Badgers and a 20-point win over Michigan at home sealed the deal for UW to hoist the Big Ten championship trophy for the first time in over 50 years.

Wisconsin earned the league's No. 1 seed in the conference tournament. The Badgers also advanced to their fourth consecutive NCAA tournament, earning a No. 8 seed in the East Region.

Head Coach Bo Ryan recorded the most successful first year in Wisconsin basketball history. He became the 10th coach in conference history to win a league title in his first season and became the first Badger coach to be named Big Ten Coach of the Year. Ryan

was also named national coach of the year by Collegeinsider.com.

Kirk Penney was a consensus firstteam all-conference selection, just UW's fifth since 1948. He was UW's leading scorer at 15.1 points per game. Devin Harris, in his freshman season at Wisconsin, chipped in 12.3 points per game and led the team with 43 steals and 18 blocked shots.









Wisconsin's five starters—Mike Wilkinson, Alando Tucker, Devin Harris, Freddie Owens and Kirk Penney—all averaged more than 10 points per game in a season in which the Badgers set a school record for victories in a season (24) and posted its best winning percentage (.750) since 1949–50. UW earned the outright league championship for the first time since 1947, tied a school record with 12 Big Ten victories and won back-to-back Big Ten titles for the first time since 1923 and '24.

Head coach Bo Ryan became one of three coaches in league history to win conference titles in each of his first two seasons. The Badgers earned their highest seed in the NCAA tournament (5) and advanced to the Sweet 16 before losing to top-ranked Kentucky in the Regional Semifinals.



Penney became the first Badger since 1952 to earn first-team honors in consecutive seasons. In his final year at Wisconsin, Penney averaged 16.2 points (led the team) and 6.0 rebounds per game (second to Wilkinson, 6.8 rpg.)

Harris made the gamewinning free throw against Illinois in the regular season finale to clinch the title. Then against Tulsa in the NCAA tournament, the Badgers staged the greatest comeback in school history, rallying from 13 points down with 3:36 remaining to beat Tulsa 61-60.

1941 - NCAA Champions

East Regional (Madison, Wis.)

Wisconsin 51, Dartmouth 50

The Badgers began their quest for the national championship by rallying in the second half to down Dartmouth. UW trailed 24-22 at halftime and didn't regain the lead until late in the second half. A pair of baskets by Gene Englund and two free throws by John Kotz put Wisconsin up 51-46 with just over a minute remaining. Dartmouth scored the game's final four points, including a desperation field goal from near half-court as the final gun sounded. Englund and Kotz finished with 18 and 15 points, respectively, to lead the Badgers, while three-time Ivy League scoring champion Gus Broberg paced Dartmouth with 20 points.

Wiscoinsin 36, Pittsburgh 30

Wisconsin avenged a 36-34 home loss to Pittsburgh earlier in the season with a 36-30 victory over the Panthers in the NCAA East Regional title game. This time down four at halftime, the Badgers opened the second half with a 22-8 run to put the game out of reach. Only one Pittsburgh player, Eddie Straloski managed to score more than four points in the contest. He had 12. Gene Englund and John Kotz led Wisconsin with 11 and 10 points respectively.

NCAA Championship (Kansas City, Mo.)

Wisconsin 39, Washington State 34

Wisconsin's 15th consecutive win — a five-point decision over Washington State — netted the Badgers the NCAA crown. The Cougars led 10-8 and 12-9, but the Badgers rallied to take a 13-12 lead on a pair of baskets by John Kotz and never trailed again. Wisconsin took a 21-17 lead to the locker room at halftime. Kirk Gebert scored Washington State's first three field goals in the second period to help the Cougars pull even at 24-24, but free throws by Kotz and Ted Strain and baskets by Gene Englund and Charles Epperson gave the Badgers a comfortable 30-24 lead. Gebert pitched in three more field goals to help the Cougars narrow the margin to 34-32, but the Badgers nailed down the title on a field goal by Kotz and a free throw by Strain. Englund had 13 points to pace the victors, while Kotz totaled 12 points and was selected tournament MVP. Gebert led the Cougars with a game-high 21 points. Wisconsin ended the season with a 20-3 record.

Playing in their first NCAA tournament since 1947, the ninth-seeded Badgers posted a first-round victory over 25th-ranked and eighth-seeded Cincinnati. Wisconsin was led by Michael Finley (22 points, four assists, three steals) and Rashard Griffith (22 points, 15 rebounds). Griffith, who entered the game as a 56 percent free throw shooter, was 12 of 14 from the line. The Badgers jumped to a 10-2 lead, extended the advantage to 36-23 and were up 40-32 at halftime. Cincinnati rallied to take a 55-54 lead with just under 10 minutes left, but the Badgers went on a 22-12 run to put the game out of reach. 
East Regional (Pittsburgh, Pa.)

West Regional (Salt Lake City, Utah)

Wisconsin 66, Fresno State 56

Guard Jon Bryant connected on a school record-tying seven threepoint field goals to lead the Badgers to a 66-56 first-round NCAA Tournament win over Fresno State at the West Regional in Salt Lake City, Utah. Andy Kowske added 14 points and 14 rebounds for the UW and Duany Duany contributed 12 points on four three-pointers.

Wisconsin 66, Arizona 59

Four Badgers scored in double figures and Wisconsin forced 17 turnovers to upset top-seeded and fourth-ranked Arizona 66-59 in the second round of the 2000 NCAA Tournament in Salt Lake City, Utah. Andy Kowske registered 10 points and 12 rebounds and limited Wildcat center Michael Wright to just four field goal attempts in 37 minutes. Mark Vershaw had 15 points for the UW, while Maurice Linton added 14 and Jon Bryant 12.

West Regional (Albuquerque, N.M.)

Wisconsin 61, LSU 48

Wisconsin put on one of its best defensive performances of the Dick Bennett era in a 61-48 victory over fourth-seeded LSU in the West Regional semifinals at The Pit in Albuquerque, N.M. Jon Bryant paced the Badgers with 16 points, while Stromile Swift and Jabari Smith each had 12 points for the Tigers. Wisconsin's suffocating defense forced 23 LSU turnovers and held the Tigers to .362 field goal shooting. It was LSU's lowest offensive output of the season.

Wisconsin 64, Purdue 60

Wisconsin advanced to the Final Four for the second time in school history with a hard-fought 64-60 victory over Big Ten-rival and sixth-seeded Purdue in the West Regional final at The Pit in Albuquerque, N.M. Jon Bryant made five three-point field goals and scored a game-high 18 points on his way to West Regional Most Outstanding Player honors. Andy Kowske added 14 points and eight rebounds and was named, along with Mike Kelley, to the West Regional all-tournament team. The Badgers took three of four games against the Boilermakers on the season.


Final Four (Indianapolis, Ind.)

Wisconsin's magical run to the Final Four ended with a 53-41 semifinal loss to season-long nemesis and eventual national champion Michigan State at the RCA Dome in Indianapolis. Roy Boone scored 18 points but he was the only Badger to tally more than six points in the game. Morris Peterson paced the Spartans with 20 points. The Badgers forced 14 Spartan turnovers, but were outrebounded 42-20. It was the fourth time during the 1999-2000 season that Michigan State defeated the Badgers.

Georgia State 50, Wisconsin 49



Midwest Regional (Spokane, Wash.)

Wisconsin 81, Weber State 74

Led by a terrific all-around game from senior Kirk Penney, fifth-seeded Wisconsin defeated No. 12-seed Weber State, 81-74, in the first round of the 2003 NCAA Tournament in Spokane, Wash. Penney scored 21 points and added nine rebounds and five assists while playing all 40 minutes. The Badgers used a 9-0 run to end the half with a 41-26 lead. Wisconsin maintained that advantage most of the second half, leading $70_{7}56$ with just over three minutes left. Weber State's Jermaine Boyette scored 10 of his 25 points in the final 42 seconds but WSU could get no closer than five points down the stretch.


Wisconsin 61, Tulsa 60

The Badgers trailed 58-45 with 3:36 remaining before outscoring Tulsa 16-2 the rest of the way. A Devin Harris three-pointer started an 11-0 UW run that pulled Wisconsin within two with 1:16 left. The teams traded baskets before the Badgers forced Tulsa into a shot clock violation with 12 seconds left. Harris then brought the ball upcourt, came off a high pick, drove to the middle of the lane and found a wide-open Owens on the left baseline. 



Penn State's Calvin Booth hit a 15-footer to give the Nittany Lions a 51-50 edge with 1:32 remaining, but freshman forward Maurice Linton nailed a nine-foot jumper with 3.7 seconds left to play and the 10th-seeded Badgers advanced with a 52-51 decision.

Wisconsin faced league champion Illinois in the second round and fell behind 26-10 at the half. The resilient Badgers, however, staged an incredible second-half comeback and took a 46-45 lead with 6:14 left to play before Illinois countered with an 11-0 run that finally put the game out of reach.

Figuring they needed at least one Big Ten tournament win to qualify for the NCAA tournament, the Badgers opened the league tourney with a 51-41 victory over Northwestern in the first round. UW led the Wildcats from start to finish.

Wisconsin then squared off against Purdue in the quarterfinals. The Badgers jumped out to a 10-point lead just two minutes into the game and never trailed.

UW then met Michigan State in the semifinals for the second straight season. Though the Spartans grabbed a 34-21 halftime lead, the Badgers made a run that cut the MSU lead to 49-44 with 5:29 remaining to play. The league-champion Spartans held UW to just two points the rest of the way.

Wisconsin took on Iowa in a quarterfinal game. After falling behind 25-23 at halftime, the Badgers shot a blistering .737 from the field in the second half and went on to win 74-60.

Just as they had the year before, the Badgers faced the league champion (this time Michigan State) in their second game. The teams played to a 22-22 tie after the first half, but the Badgers, who shot a then-season low .293 from the floor, scored only 19 points in the second half.

The Badgers got off to a nice start in their quarterfinal matchup with Indiana, pulling out to a 28-19 lead with 4:38 left in the first half. Indiana closed to within four points (28-24) at the break.

The Hoosiers then continued their momentum by beginning the second half on a 17-2 run. Wisconsin closed the IU lead to 54-49 with 2:04 remaining, but never again came closer than that.

2002 - Quarterfinalist

March 8

Iowa 58, Wisconsin 56

Wisconsin entered the 2002 Big Ten Tournament as the No. 1 seed for the first time in school history after winning a share of the Big Ten regular-season title.

 \overline{UW} held a 26-21 lead at halftime, but Iowa came back to grab a 39-37 lead with 10:14 to play. Though the Badgers led by six with 3:42 left, the Hawkeyes scored 10 of the final 12 points of the game to win.

2003 - Quarterfinalist

Ohio State 58, Wisconsin 50

For the second consecutive season, Wisconsin entered the Big Ten tournament as the No. 1 seed but lost in the quarterfinals. The Badgers fell to No. 8 seed Ohio State, 58-50.

UW struggled from the field for the entire game, connecting on just 18-53 shots (.340), its second-worst shooting performance of the season. Kirk Penney led Wisconsin with 14 points while Alando Tucker chipped in 13.

The Badgers swept through the 2004 tournament, earning their first conference tourney title.

UW faced Minnesota in the quarterfinals and got a combined 43 points from Devin Harris and Mike Wilkinson to defeat the Gophers 66-52.

Michigan State was up next in the semifinals, the third meeting between the teams in 2004. Harris made a late trey to put UW in front. MSU's Maurice Ager answered with a bucket but Wilkinson put the Badgers ahead for good with two free throws with 49 seconds left.

UW opened the final vs. Illinois on a 16-6 run and never led by less than seven points after that. Harris scored a tournament championship-record 29 points and was named the tourney's most outstanding player. Wilkinson had 53 points in the three games and was named to the all-tournament team.

The Badgers led by two at the half, but allowed an 11-2 run to the Hoosiers to begin the second half. A Ray Nixon dunk off an offensive rebound gave UW a 46-45 lead with 7:41 left. A late 7-0 run by the Hoosiers put Indiana on top for good as Wisconsin couldn't get within four points the rest of the way. Alando Tucker led UW with 20 points despite spending most of the first half in foul trouble. Brian Butch just missed a double-double with 12 points and nine rebounds.




FIRST ROUNDERS

Wisconsin has had six first-round NBA draft choices through the years. In 2004, Devin Harris became the highest Badger drafted since 1950 when the Washington Wizards selected him with the fifth overall pick. He was then traded to the Dallas Mavericks. Prior to that, the two most recent first-round selections were Paul Grant in 1997 and Michael Finley in 1995. Wes Matthews was a first-rounder in 1980, Albert Henry was chosen in the first round in 1970 and Don Rehfeldt was the second pick overall in 1950.

Michael Finley

Former Badger standout Michael Finley completed his first season with the San Antonio Spurs in 2006 after spending the previous eight with the Dallas Mavericks. Finley has spent 11 years in the NBA while playing for three teams.

Finley averaged 10.1 points and made a team-high 110 3-pointers for a team that captured its fifth division title in six seasons. Starring mostly in a sixth-man role, Finley was the fourth-leading scorer on the team. He was the Spurs' leading freethrow shooter at 85.2




percent, handed out 116 assists and logged over 2,038.

San Antonio earned the top-seed in the 2006 NBA playoffs. But after a 4-2 series victory over the Sacramento Kings, the Spurs dropped a seven-game series to Devin Harris' Dallas Mavericks. Finley averaged 10.5 points in the postseason and was the team's third-leading rebounder, averaging 3.8 boards per game.

A two-time NBA All-Star, Finley has averaged 18.2 points and 4.9 rebounds over his career (812 games). He led the NBA in minutes played in 1999-2000 and has averaged at least 38.0 minutes per game in seven of his 11 seasons.


In 2002, he represented the USA at the World Basketball Championships in Indianapolis. There, he led Team USA in minutes (25.1 mpg) and free-throw percentage (19-22, .864) and was second on the squad with 13.0 points per game.



Devin Harris

After being named the Big Ten Player of the Year in his senior season at Wisconsin, Devin Harris was selected fifth overall by the Washington Wizards in the 2004 NBA Draft. He was traded later that day to the Dallas Mavericks and has had two successful seasons with the Mavs.

Harris enjoyed a sophomore season in which he saw an increase in his average points, rebounds, assists and minutes per game. Despite missing more than 20 contests during the regular season with an injury, he returned in



time for Dallas' magical run to the NBA Finals. Harris earned 15 starts during the postseason and was one of only three Dallas players to appear in all 23 games.

In his first four starts of the playoffs, and against Michael Finley's San Antonio Spurs, Harris averaged 19.3 points. He scored a career-high 30 in game one of the Western Conference Finals against the Phoenix Suns and started three games of the NBA Finals against the Miami Heat.

Harris started the first 19 games of the 2004-05 season for Dallas and was named the "got milk?" Western Conference Rookie of the Month for November.

That year, he played in 76 games during the regular season and averaged 5.7 points and 2.2 assists. He ranked second in the league in steals per 48 minutes (3.15).

Harris averaged 9.9 points during the 2005-06 season and 3.2 assists. He played in 56 games and earned four starts.

Rashard Griffith

The only Wisconsin Badger in the last 30 years to average a double-double for an entire season (17.2 ppg./10.8 rpg., 1994-95), Rashard Griffith continues to tour the professional leagues in Europe

Griffith became the highest paid rookie in the European league when he accepted a \$600,000 salary offer by Tofas Bursa prior to the 1996-97 season. He has remained in Europe ever since.

Griffith led Tofas Bursa to the 1997 Turkish National Championship. He was named the league's Most Valuable Player that season after averaging 17.9 points and 10.9 rebounds.

Griffith would go on to win six consecutive national titles, though not all of them came with Tofas Bursa. He added an Israeli national championship, two Italian national championships and two more Turkish titles in the following years.

From 1996-2003, over a span of seven seasons, Griffith scored over 2,800 points, pulled down over 1,800 rebounds and shot over 60 percent from the field.



Kirk Penney

Kirk Penney left Wisconsin as a twotime first-team All-Big Ten selection and sixth-leading scorer in school history. Now eighth on the all-time scoring list, Penney has been playing profesional basketball for the past three years.

Penney has had brief stints in the NBA with both the Miami Heat and Los Angeles Clippers. In 2004-05, Penney earned honorable mention all-league while playing for the Asheville Altitude in the NBA's Developmental League.

Last year, Penney played in Israel for Maccabi Tel Aviv, one of the top pro teams in Europe. Recently he signed on to play for Zalgiris Kaunas, a

Lithiuanian team termed "Northern Europe's most traditional power" by euroleague.net.

Penney has played extensively for his home country New Zealand in international play, including two Olympic Games appearances and two World Basketball Championships. Penney led New Zealand in scoring during the 2006 World Championships, averaging 13.7 points.



Mike Wilkinson

After playing with the Utah Jazz summer camp following his graduation from Wisconsin, Mike Wilkinson signed with Aris B.S.A. Basketball Club in Thessaloniki, Greece where he's completed one season. Wilkinson averaged 11 points and was the leading rebounder (6.2 rpg.) on a team that finished 15-11 on the year.

Wilkinson was a first-team All-Big Ten selection during his senior year at Wisconsin. In 2005, he helped lead UW to a school-record tying 25 wins and a spot in the NCAA tournament Elite Eight. He finished his career ranked among the top 10 in UW history in 11

categories including sixth on the school's all-time scoring list and third on the career rebounding list.




Zach Morley


Zach Morley helped lead Aguas De Valencia-Gandia to a runner-up finish at the 2006 LEB2 Championships in Spain this past season. Morley was the second leading scorer and rebounder on a team that finished 21-9 during the regular season. He averaged 14.1 points and 6.1 rebounds with the team while shooting 55 percent from the floor.

Morley averaged 8.1 points and 6.3 rebounds in his two season with the Badgers. He was named to the Big Ten All-Tournament Team in his senior season of 2005 and helped UW advance to the NCAA tournament Elite Eight.





Don Rehfeldt was the first Wisconsin Badger to eclipse the 1,000-point plateau. He's also the last UW player to earn first-team All-America honors (1949–50). Rehfeldt was the Big Ten's Most Valuable Player in 1950 when he averaged nearly 20 points per game.

24. Tim Locum — 1,077

Two-time team captain (1989–90 and 1990–91) ... two-year starter ... currently fourth on all-time NCAA list for 3-point field goal percentage (.472) among players who have made at least 200 shots from beyond the arc ... holds UW record for career three-point field goals made ... led Badgers in three-point field goal percentage in each of his last three seasons ... tied for team lead in steals with 33 in 1989-90.





2005-06 Season Review



Wisconsin advanced to the NCAA tournament for the eighth straight season. Only nine teams in the country have been to that many consecutive NCAA tournaments entering the 2006-07 season.

- Wisconsin finished the 2005-06 season 19-12 overall and 9-7 in the Big Ten, good for a share of fourth place. The Badgers earned an at-large bid to the NCAA tournament, receiving a No. 9 seed. UW lost to eighth-seeded Arizona, 94-75, in the first round in Philadelphia, Pa.
- UW earned its eighth straight bid to the NCAA tournament, a school-record. Michigan State is the only other Big Ten team that has been to the NCAA tournament eight straight years. The Badgers are one of nine teams that made their eighth straight tourney appearance in 2006. The others are: Arizona, Duke, Florida, Gonzaga, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan State and Texas.
- The Badgers have won at least 19 games in each of Bo Ryan's five seasons and have averaged 22.4 wins per season under Ryan. In the 103 seasons prior to Ryan taking over, Wisconsin won at least 19 games in a season only four times.
- In Bo Ryan's five seasons as UW head coach, the Badgers have amassed 55 Big Ten victories. Only Illinois, with 61 conference wins, has more over that span.
- Wisconsin has finished no worse than fourth in the Big Ten in Ryan's five seasons. That five-year stretch is the best for UW since 1914-18.
- The Badgers' current six-year run with better than .500 records in Big Ten play is the longest for UW since 1912-18.

- Among Big Ten teams, Wisconsin was tied with Penn State for the fewest number of seniors and juniors on its roster with four. Eight of the 11 teams in the league had at least four seniors on their rosters.
 Wisconsin and LSU were the only teams in the NCAA tournament with just one senior on their rosters.
- Prior to the start of the NCAA tournament, the Badgers' strength of schedule
 was ranked eighth in the country, toughest
 in the Big Ten according to the RPI rankings.
- Wisconsin was 7-7 against teams in the 2006 NCAA Tournament field. The Badgers defeated UNC Wilmington, Marquette and UW-Milwaukee, lost to Pittsburgh, Illinois and Arizona and split with Iowa, Indiana, Michigan State and Ohio State.
- Junior Alando Tucker was named first-team All-Big Ten this year, marking the fifth consecutive season that Wisconsin has had a consensus first-team selection. Prior to 2002, UW had just two consensus first-team All-Big Ten choices since 1952 (Michael Finley in 1993 and Joe Franklin in 1968).
- Tucker was also the fourth different Badger to be honored in the last four years. Kirk Penney (2002 and '03), Devin Harris (2004) and Mike Wilkinson (2005) were the other UW first-teamers.

- Two other Badgers were honored when the Big Ten announced its awards. Junior guard Kammron Taylor was an honorable mention All-Big Ten choice and Joe Krabbenhoft was named to the league's All-Freshman team.
- Tucker led the Big Ten in scoring in league games (20.0 ppg.) and scored at least 20 points in 10 of the Badgers' 16 conference games. The last Wisconsin player to lead the Big Ten in scoring in conference games was Don Rehfeldt in 1950.
- Tucker has scored 1,501 points in his career, good for seventh place on UW's all-time scoring list. The four players who rank sixth through ninth on that list (Mike Wilkinson, Kirk Penney, Tucker and Devin Harris) all played for current Wisconsin head coach Bo Ryan.
- Besides being among UW's top 10 in career scoring, Tucker is also among the top 10 in these career categories:




- Wisconsin scored 80 points against Minnesota, reaching the 80-point plateau for the ninth time in 2005-06. UW averaged 71.1 points per game last season, its highest scoring average since the 1994-95 season. The Badgers were 15-3 last year and 71-5 under Bo Ryan when scoring at least 70 points.
- Wisconsin, which finished the season at Michigan State and at Iowa, was the only Big Ten team to play consecutive road games with just one day in between last season. UW ended the season playing four NCAA tournament teams on the road or at neutral sites.
- On the season, UW grabbed a schoolrecord 400 offensive rebounds. The Badgers led the Big Ten in offensive boards, averaging 12.9 per game.
- UW led the Big Ten in fewest turnovers per game at 11.6. That is the fifth-best average in school history. Bo Ryan-coached teams account for four of the top five turnover averages in UW annals.

- In the win over Minnesota on Feb. 26, the Badgers had four players (Alando Tucker, Kevin Gullikson, Kammron Taylor and Joe Krabbenhoft) score in double figures. Wisconsin is 43-3 under Bo Ryan when at least four Badgers score in double figures.
- The win over Minnesota was the ninth time during the 2005-06 season in which UW trailed in the second half and came back to win. Last season, the Badgers' record was 7-2 in games decided by six points or less. Over the last two years, Wisconsin's record is 14-3 in such games.
- Alando Tucker suffered a nasal injury against Wake Forest on Nov. 29 and wore a custom-made protective mask for 13 games. In those games he averaged 18.2 points and shot .428 (92-of-215) from the field and .455 (45-of-99) from the free throw line. He played without the mask in the final 13 games of the season and averaged 19.4 points per game, shooting .474 (93-of-196) from the field and .621 (59-of-95) from the line.
- Wisconsin went 93-36 (.721) in senior Ray Nixon's four years. Only Mike Wilkinson, with 93 wins in his four years, had a hand in as many wins as Nixon. He played in 82 UW victories, second-most in school history behind Wilkinson's 93.



Alando Tucker led the Big Ten in scoring and was a consensus first-team all-conference selection. He led the Badgers to the title in the season-opening Paradise Jam, averaging 22.7 points over the three games.

- Wisconsin used the same starting lineup in 29 of its 31 games last season. The only deviations were against Indiana when Michael Flowers started in place of Brian Butch (2/8) and Jason Chappell (3/10).
- Junior guard Kammron Taylor averaged 8.4 points and 24.0 minutes per game as a sophomore and had 10 double-digit scoring performances. Last season, Taylor was second on the Badgers in scoring at 14.2 ppg. and led the squad in minutes played (34.3 mpg.) He reached double figures in 24 of the Badgers' 31 games and had seven 20-point outings.
- Taylor led the Badgers with 67 3-point field goals, tied for eighth-most on UW's single-season list. He also paced Wisconsin in free throw percentage (.829), the 10th-best single-season mark in school history.
- Sophomore forward Brian Butch led the team in rebounding (6.0 rpg) and was third on the team in scoring (9.9 ppg), starting all but one game last season. This follows a freshman season in which Butch scored just 33 points and grabbed 20 rebounds in Big Ten play.
- Junior forward Jason Chappell entered the 2005-06 season having played just 59 minutes and scored just 18 points in his career. Last year Chappell started 30 games and was third on the team in rebounding.
- Sophomore guard Michael Flowers was the Badgers' best perimeter defender. As the team's sixth man, Flowers averaged 24.5 minutes per game and led the team with 39 steals. Over the last six games of the season, Flowers averaged 8.3 points.
- Wisconsin received large contributions from a pair of true freshmen last season. Joe Krabbenhoft and Kevin Gullikson combined to average 31.9 minutes per game in Big Ten play.
- Krabbenhoft averaged 18.7 minutes during conference play, grabbing 5.1 rebounds per game. That was the secondbest rebounding average in league play among freshmen. He also ranked fourth in assists among freshmen.
- Gullikson averaged 4.7 points, 3.3 rebounds and 17.4 minutes over the last 12 games. In the first 19 games of the season, Gullikson played a combined total of 19 minutes, scoring nine points and grabbing four rebounds.
- UW shot .471 (24-of-51) from the field against Minnesota on Feb. 26, improving to 13-1 last season (75-8 under Bo Ryan) when shooting better than 45.0 percent from the field. The Badgers were also 18-0 last year when having a better shooting percentage than their opponents.



Kammron Taylor was the second-leading scorer on the Badgers and was a consensus third-team All-Big Ten selection. He averaged 14.2 points per game and led the UW in assists, 3-pointers made, 3-point percentage and free throw percentage.

- In its 19 wins last season, Wisconsin shot .471 from the field. In its 12 losses, the Badgers shot just .372 from the field. Kevin Gullikson was the only Badger to shoot better than 40.0 percent from the field in the 12 losses.
- The Badgers made a season-high 29of-36 (.806) free throws against Minnesota. It was the second time in the 2005-06 season that UW made better than 80.0 percent of its free throws. Wisconsin was 10-1 last season (42-4 under Bo Ryan) when attempting at least 25 free throws.
- The Badgers ranked third in the league in field goal percentage defense in league games (.416). UW was 15-2 when limiting its opponent to less than 45.0 percent shooting from the field last season.
- Junior guard Kammron Taylor hit a 3pointer as time expired to lead the Badgers to a 54-51 win over UNC Wilmington on Dec. 12. Earlier in the season, against Eastern Kentucky, Taylor drained a long trey with 3.3 seconds left in the first overtime to send the game to a second OT.
- UW defeated Norfolk State, Eastern Kentucky and Old Dominion to win the 2005 Paradise Jam Tournament title in St. Thomas, USVI on Nov. 18-21. Alando Tucker was named the tournament's MVP and was joined on the all-tournament team by Kammron Taylor.



Game Credentials

Wisconsin uses an online credentialing system for both men's basketball and football. For instructions on how to use the online system, please contact Brian Lucas or Anne Franken in the UW Athletic Communications Office (608-262-1811). No emailed, faxed, mailed or telephone requests for credentials will be accepted. Upon receipt of applications, appropriate credentials are either mailed, or made available at the Athletic Communications Office or with the parking attendant (white vehicle) at the entrance to Lot 91 off of Bedford Street, just east of the Kohl Center.

Credentials will be issued according to the following priority guidelines: 1) National publications and newspapers filing for the following day's publication. 2) Newspapers designated by the visiting sports information director. 3) Television and radio stations originating a live broadcast. 4) Television and radio stations covering for nightly news. 5) All other requests will be evaluated on a space-available basis, with preferences given to those who regularly cover Wisconsin basketball.

Spouses, dates, children and other non-workers are not allowed in any of the media areas.

Scouting Tickets

As per Big Ten policy, professional basket-ball scouts must purchase tickets through the UW Ticket Office (1-800-GO-BADGERS or 608-262-1440).

Parking

A limited number of media parking passes are available. They will be issued on a priority basis similar to the guidelines for the issuance of credentials. Media parking at the Kohl Center is on the East side of the building along Frances Street as well as in Lot 91 and lot 46 (corner of Frances and Johnson). The media entrance is on the northeast corner of the Kohl Center.

Visiting Radio

Each visiting radio station admitted for broadcast should contact the UW Athletic Communications Office at least one week prior to the game they wish to cover. If credentials are not mailed, they may be picked up at the Athletic Communications Office. Visiting radio talent works from a courtside location at the Kohl Center.

Photographers

The University of Wisconsin follows NCAA and Big Ten guidelines regarding event photography. Floor photo passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service and television photographers. Photographers must display their credentials prominently at all times and must work from either the southeast or northwest corners of the baseline. Photographers are not permitted along the length of the floor.

Practice Coverage

Wisconsin basketball practices for the fall semester will run from approximately 1:30-4:30 p.m. Practice will be open to the media after 3:30 p.m. Members of the media are asked to watch Kohl Center practices from the arena seats and practices in the Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion from the designated seating on the south side of the facility. Still and video photographers shooting practice are asked to remain off the court, on the baselines, and away from the vicinity of workouts. Gameday practice sessions are closed.

Player Interviews

Badger players are normally available for interviews after practices once before each game during the season.

All interviews should be arranged through the Athletic Communications Office. Please contact Brian Lucas at 608-263-5052 or prior to the end of practice to secure interviews. No interviews will be granted the day of a game, with the exception of postgame interviews.

Players' telephone numbers will not be made available to the media, and players have been instructed not to conduct interviews when contacted by phone without prior approval from a member of the Athletic Communications Office. For out-of-town reporters, requests for collect-call telephone interviews may be made with Brian Lucas of the Athletic Communications Office.

Coach Ryan Interviews

Head coach Bo Ryan will normally be available for interviews for approximately 15-20 minutes after practice.

Additionally, Ryan holds a weekly media conference throughout the season. These sessions are generally at 1 p.m. in the media room at the Kohl Center. Live video streaming of these press conferences will be available on the UW athletic department website, UWBADGERS.COM.

Contact Brian Lucas in the Athletic Communications Office to arrange an interview with Bo Ryan.

Big Ten Teleconference

The Big Ten will hold a weekly teleconference with the league's head coaches beginning in December. Coach Ryan will be available on this teleconference between 10:10-10:20 a.m. Contact Brian Lucas or the Big Ten Conference (847-696-1010) for details.

Press Row Services

The primary working area (approximately 40 seats) for the media at the Kohl Center is located on the second level (Section 208) on the east side of the floor. There also is an auxiliary media area in Section 210 of the Kohl Center that can accommodate an additional 20 seats. Television and radio broadcasters all work from the court level location.

Media are provided with several statistics monitors. Halftime boxes and play-by-play are delivered to both working media locations by the Athletic Communications staff.

Media Workroom

The Kohl Center is equipped with a large media workroom that contains the following:

- · postgame interview area
- numerous working locations from which media can file stories
- platform for video cameras
- · copy machine
- pre-game dining area
- kitchenette area where a pregame meal is served

Pregame notes, statistics and game programs are also available in the workroom.

Media may store personal belongings in the workroom from the time they arrive at the Kohl Center until after the game.

The workroom is located at the northeast corner of the arena with access to and from the press areas. To access the workroom from outside the arena, just enter through the media gate and proceed down the stairs on your right.

Telephones

All requests for installation of phone lines should be made to Dominic Osterhaus at the Kohl Center (608-265-8546). Cost per line per event is \$100 (\$140 for an unrestricted analog line or an ISDN line). Seating locations are determined by the UW Athletic Communications Office. Several courtesy phones in the media room will be made available by the UW Athletic Communications Office.

Internet Access

Wireless internet access is available for working media in the Kohl Center bowl (press row) and in the Kohl Center media room. Please see Brian Lucas or a member of the UW Athletic Communications staff for instructions on how to access the wireless network.

Postgame Procedures

Head coaches and selected players will be made available in the media workroom's interview area following each home game. Generally, the visiting coach and/or players will be available first, followed by Badger coach Bo Ryan and Wisconsin players.

Contact Brian Lucas of the Athletic Communications Office for postgame procedures on the road (vary from school to school). The Wisconsin locker room is closed to the media at home and on the road.

Wisconsin Locker Room — Located at court level in the Kohl Center (northwest corner of the arena).

Visitors Locker Room — Located at court level in the Kohl Center (southwest corner of the arena).

Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion (practice facility) — Attached to the west side of the Kohl Center.

The Badger Web site is maintained internally by a dedicated team of technical experts and an experienced editorial staff.


The Athletic Department site is the most visited one on the UW-Madison campus, averaging more than 5.4 million page views monthly.






Student Life












- Allen Centennial Gardens is a two-acre site of a historic Victorian home that once served as a residence for university deans.
- Babcock Hall Dairy Store (top left) is the place to stop to purchase many kinds of eats and treats. It's famous ice cream is also available at Memorial Union and Union South.
- The solemn bronze Lincoln that casts his gaze toward the state capitol was placed on Bascom Hill in 1909 (bottom left).
- The Red Gym (top) is a National Historic Landmark built in 1894. The restored and historically preserved building now serves as a student and visitor center.
- Space Place is a public education center that provides hands-on activities, lively presentations and information lectures.
- The historic Washburn Observatory, which sits atop Observatory hill, overlooking Lake Mendota, is open to the public for viewing the evening skies.



The Wisconsin Film Festival features more than 100 independent films, documentaries, experimental films and shorts from around the world.







Chancellor John D. Wiley



ohn D. Wiley, chancellor of the University of Wisconsin–Madison, is the 27th leader of the university. He assumed office January 1, 2001.


From 1994-2000, Wiley served as the university's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. From 1989–94, Wiley was dean of the UW-Madison Graduate School and the university's senior research officer. From 1986-89, he served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering.

In his campus-level positions, Wiley has represented the institution for a variety of external constituencies, including alumni groups, the boards of trustees of university-affiliated foundations and other organizations, domestic and international interuniversity cooperatives, chambers of commerce and service clubs, the state legislature and governmental bodies, the UW System Administration, and the UW System Board of Regents. He also has been deeply involved in fundraising from individual and corporate donors, and charitable foundations.

As provost, Wiley was chief operating officer and deputy chancellor, working closely with deans, faculty, academic staff and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution. As graduate school dean, Wiley oversaw all aspects of graduate study, grant submission, agency liaison, research infrastructure and centers, and technology transfer.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964; attended graduate school at UW–Madison as an NSF Fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968 to 1974 and then spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Wiley joined the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975. His research and teaching focused on a variety of topics related to semiconductors and other materials and processes important to the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers,



including the Center for X-ray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982 to 1986, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.

Wiley currently serves as the president of the Big Ten Conference Council of Presidents/Chancellors.





Director of Athletics Barry Alvarez



Barry Alvarez is in his third year as UW Director of Athletics, but his first without the additional title of head football coach.

For 16 years (1990-2005), Alvarez guided Wisconsin's football fortunes. He piloted the Badgers to three Big Ten Conference and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998-99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (118-73-4 record).

Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one conference institution. His 8-3 (.727) record in bowl games with the Badgers is the best in college football history (among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances). The 2004 AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year, he also was the 1993 national coach of the year, a two-time Big Ten coach of the year and a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

In 2004-05, Alvarez served as athletic director and football coach and has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison.

He is a 1969 graduate of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.



Senior Associate Shawn M. Eichorst




Associate Director Terry Gawlik

A Winning Athletic Program

In 2005-06, the University of Wisconsin won an astounding three NCAA championships in the same school year. The Badgers also added a national title by the women's lightweight rowing team and three individual national championships.

The men's cross country started the season off by winning its fourth national title in program history in November. Senior Simon Bairu won his second consecutive individual title.

In March, the women's hockey team won its first NCAA title. It was just the second NCAA post-season appearance and first run at the Frozen Four for the Badgers.

Wisconsin became the first school in NCAA history to win both the women's and men's ice hockey championships when the Badger men won the program's sixth title two weeks after the women.

The women's lightweight varsity eight crew won its third consecutive title at the Intercollegiate Rowing Association National Championships in 2006.

Junior Chris Solinsky earned two individual national titles in 2006. He won the 3,000 meters at the NCAA indoor championships for the second consecutive year and added the 5,000-meter title at the NCAA outdoor championships.



Badger fans are some of the best in the nation and they annually show it by supporting their teams. Wisconsin is the only NCAA Division I school in the nation that has six sports that rank in the NCAA's top 20 for home attendance.


The UW has earned much national recognition for its college spirit including being named the "Best College Sports Town" by Sports Illustrated on Campus.

Since 1993, the UW has hosted six NCAA championships and one NCAA men's basketball regional. Madison will also be the site of a hockey regional in 2008.

The Badgers played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey Frozen Four in 1993, 1997 and 2006. All three events were sellouts including the 2006 crowd that saw Wisconsin win the national title.

Wisconsin played host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1993 and 1998. The Badgers shattered the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event both years.

The UW was also the site of the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship. The event was the first national championship held at University Ridge Golf Course and the first women's championship shown live on national television.

The NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament came to Wisconsin in 2002 when the Badgers played host to a regional in the Kohl Center.

Wisconsin Traditions

Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region. but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission.

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness.

Big Ten universities provide in excess of \$89 million in athletic scholarship aid to more than 8,400 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women.

In 2005-06, the Big Ten distributed over \$117 million in revenues to its 11 member institutions. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

Big Ten Universities ...

- are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.
- have more than four million living alumni and over 300,000 undergraduate students attending Big Ten universities.
- house on their campuses nine of the nation's 30 largest academic libraries. Conference libraries hold more than 66 million book volumes and institutions freely share their materials with other league members.
- host more than 70 Nobel laureates as faculty, students, researchers or alumni
- enroll students of whom over 40 percent have graduated in the top 10 percent of their high school class, while 74 percent graduated in the top quarter of their class.

Big Ten Athletics ...

- since 1992, the Big Ten has created in excess of 2,000 new opportunities for women student-athletes and established 28 new women's teams.
- based on the federal graduation rate average for the 1995-98 freshman classes, Big Ten student-athletes graduated at 70 percent compared to 62 percent for all Division I student-athletes. As a conference, student-athletes tend to graduate at rates consistent with the general student body (71 percent). In 2006, the NCAA also introduced a new calculation—the Graduation Success Rate (GSR)—that accounts for transfer student-athletes. The Big Ten's GSR was 81 percent compared to the Division I average of 76 percent.
- recognized 1,992 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2005-06 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged nearly 1,700 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.
- has claimed at least four team national championships in seven of the last nine full seasons, including six national titles during 1999-2000 alone, the most for the conference in more than a decade. Big Ten national champions in 2005-06 included Northwestern women's lacrosse and three national crowns for Wisconsin in men's cross country and men's and women's ice hockey. The conference has also produced team national crowns in the sports of basketball, fencing, field hockey, football, golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, synchronized

BIG TEN 9-11 SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Following the national tragedy on Sept. 11, 2001, the Big Ten, through its intercollegiate athletic department revenues, pledged a \$1 million scholarship contribution to assist the families of those affected by the terrorist attacks. The Big Ten made a presentation to Lumina Foundation for Education and the Citizens' Scholarship Foundation of AmericaTM (CSFA) to provide undergraduate and graduate degree scholarships at Big Ten member institutions. The conference's donation is called the "Big Ten 9-11 Scholarship Fund." The \$1 million contribution will be drawn from conference reserves, which are generated as a result of football and men's basketball participation in NCAA, bowl and regular season television opportunities.

swimming, tennis, volleyball and wrestling over those nine seasons.

- led all conferences with nine institutions appearing among the top 30 in the 2005 Excellence in Athletics Cup, which was established in 2004 by the Laboratory for the Study of Intercollegiate Athletics at Texas A&M to recognize all-around achievement in athletics. The athletic departments for all NCAA Division I schools were evaluated based upon on-field success, graduation rate indicators, gender equity indicators and efficiency in using financial resources. While conferences were not ranked in the second annual study, the Big Ten was rated as the best among the six major conferences in the initial Excellence in Athletics Cup. The conference ranked among the top two in four categories including first in overall graduation rates and achieving gender equity and second in African-American student-athlete graduation rates and NCAA post-season competition.
- showcased more than 300 events that were televised nationally, regionally and locally last year, representing over 600 hours of programming.
- are among the national attendance leaders in football, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball. During 2005–06, more than 8.2 million fans attended Big Ten home contests in those sports.



Did You Know?


- Madison is one of only a few cities in the world built on an isthmus. Downtown Madison is set on a narrow strip of land between two glacial lakes—Lake Mendota and Lake Monona. A total of five area lakes, plus more than 250 parks and 120 miles of designated bike routes within the city limits provide an abundance of year-round outdoor activities, from hiking, biking, swimming and sailing to cross-country skiing, ice skating, and ice fishing.
- The Wisconsin State Capitol is the city's signature landmark. No building in Madison may be built higher than the 284-foot white granite dome of the Capitol, which is modeled after our nation's Capitol.
- State Street, a one-mile pedestrian mall linking the Capitol Square to the beautiful lakeside campus of the University of Wisconsin, is lined with diverse ethnic eateries, eclectic boutiques, galleries, coffeehouses and more.
- Famed architect Frank Lloyd Wright spent his childhood years in Madison and returned to live in the area at the height of his international fame. The Madison area is home to a generous selection of Wright-designed buildings.
- Ecologist Aldo Leopold, conservation pioneer John Muir, play-wright Thornton Wilder, novelist Jacquelyn Mitchard, actor/comedian Chris Farley, Olympians Beth and Eric Heiden, composer/performer Ben Sidran, professional golfers Jerry Kelly, Sherri Steinhauer and Steve Stricker and NASCAR's Matt Kenseth are other notable people associated with Madison.

- UW Arboretum, a 1,260-acre nature preserve on the southern half of Lake Wingra used for research, education and recreation
