


isconsin fans are legendary for their support of Badger athletics. It's no different when it comes to basketball. Since the beginning of the 1998–99 season, the first full year the Kohl Center was open, the UW has ranked no lower than 11th nationally in attendance. Last year, for the fourth consecutive season, every ticket was sold prior to the beginning of the season. The Badgers' capacity average attendance of 17,190 was good for seventh-highest in the country and second in the Big Ten. The Kohl Center is once again sold out for the 2007–08 season. Season ticket holders renewed their tickets at a rate of 99.5 percent this season, an all-time high.

Another milestone for the UW was the creation of the "Grateful Red" student section prior to the 2002–03 season. Each of the 2,051 student season-ticket holders receives a red and white tie-dyed t-shirt. For five straight years student season tickets have sold out prior to the beginning of the season. This year a record 7,590 students took part in the lottery for season tickets.

In 2003, Sports Illustrated on Campus named Madison the No. 1 Sports College Town in the country saying, "For good teams, good times and good cheer, there's no place like the home of the Badgers."








The 2006–07 season was a memorable one for the Wisconsin men's basketball team. Here is a list of notable accomplishments for the Badgers last year:




All six Badgers were consensus (coaches and media) selections.

Wisconsin has finished among the top four in the Big Ten standings in each of the last six seasons and its 68 combined wins in those years is second only to Illinois during that span. UW has won at least 11 conference games in five of Ryan's six seasons and has finished first or second in the league in four of those campaigns.

UW has proven to be a player on the national scene as well as on a conference level. The Badgers are one of just nine teams in the country to have played in nine straight NCAA tournaments and are among the top 15 in the country in winning percentage over the last six seasons.



Wisconsin has averaged 24.6 wins per season over the last five years and has won at least 25 games in three of those seasons.

the country that can say it has been to nine straight NCAA tourneys entering the 2007–08 season. Not only do the Badgers get an invite to the "Big Dance," but they usually stick around. Over the past eight years, Wisconsin has racked up 12 NCAA tournament victories resulting in a Final Four appearance in 2000, the 2003 Sweet 16, and an Elite Eight showing in 2005.

Last season, UW entered the NCAA tournament with a 29-5 record and a No. 2 seed in the Midwest Region. That is the highest seed the program has ever received.

Wisconsin earned a No. 6 seed in the Syracuse Regional in the 2005 NCAA Tournament. In the first and second rounds in Oklahoma City, UW defeated Northern Iowa and Bucknell to advance to its second "Sweet 16" in three seasons. The Badgers found

themselves one step from the Final Four after beating NC State in the regional semifinals. Their run through the tournament ended, however, with a hard-fought 88-82 loss to eventual national champion North Carolina.

Head coach Bo Ryan is the first coach to lead UW to NCAA appearances in six consecutive seasons. His eight NCAA tournament victories are the most of any UW head coach.





Bo Ryan is the only UW head coach in school history to lead the Badgers to six NCAA tournament appearances. His eight NCAA tourney wins are also a school record.



Badgers in the NBA

The 2006–07 NBA season was a very successful one for two former Badgers, Michael Finley and Devin Harris, now playing in the NBA.

Finley, in his 12th NBA season and second with the San Antonio Spurs, helped the Spurs win the 2007 NBA Title. The two-time all-star played every regular-season game for the Spurs, starting 16 and averaging 9.0 points and 2.7 rebounds. During San Antonio's playoff run, Finley and his veteran presence were invaluable. He started all 20 playoff games, averaging 11.3 points and 2.9 rebounds while shooting .419 from 3-point range.

Harris, in his third NBA season with the Dallas Mavericks, continued to show the improvement that made him one of the most dangerous players during the 2006 playoffs. After starting just 23 games in his first two seasons combined, Harris started 61 in 2006–07 and averaged career highs in minutes, points, assists, rebounds, field goal percentage and free throw

In the playoffs, Harris was one of the few bright spots in Dallas' first-round upset loss to the Golden State Warriors. He averaged 13.2 points and 5.0 assists while



shooting .492 from the floor. In the summer, Harris was rewarded with a five-year contract extension worth roughly \$42 million.

This season, Wisconsin will add a third alum to the NBA as Alando Tucker starts his professional career with the Phoenix Suns. Tucker was drafted by Phoenix in the first round of the 2007 NBA Draft (29th overall). In Summer League action, Tucker led Phoenix and ranked 15th in the league in scoring at 17.4 points per game.

All three former Badgers reside in the Western Conference. And they'll probably be battling each other for conference supremacy as the Mavericks, Suns and Spurs had the top three records in the NBA last season.





Wisconsin is a fixture on the national television scene


Rans of Wisconsin basketball are lucky enough to be able to follow Badger basketball from anywhere around the country. Of the UW's 197 games in the past six years, 156 have been televised. That includes 71 national television appearances, in which Wisconsin has gone 44-27.

This season it gets even better for Badger fans as every game, even exhibitions, will be televised. So now fans of UW men's basketball don't have to miss a single game!

The main reason for that is the creation of the Big Ten Network, a joint venture between the Big Ten and Fox Sports. The network will broadcast at least 20 UW games nationally this season.

Wisconsin will make at least nine appearances on either ESPN or ESPN2 during the regular season. That starts with the highly anticipated Big Ten-ACC Challenge game at Duke on ESPN. Three other non-conference games will be broadcast by ESPN2 (Wofford, Marquette and Texas).

During the Big Ten season, at least five of the Badgers' games will be on ESPN or ESPN2. Those include Illinois (Jan. 10), Michigan (Jan. 22), Purdue (Jan. 26), Indiana (Jan. 31) and Michigan State (Feb. 28). Two other games, at Ohio State at the end of February and at home against Penn State in the beginning of March, are wildcard games and will be picked up by ESPN, CBS or the Big Ten Network.

THE BIG TEN NETWORK




In June 2006, the Big Ten announced the creation of the Big Ten Network, a national

network devoted to Big Ten athletic and academic programs. Available to all cable and satellite providers nationwide, with most programs offered in stunning high-definition television (HDTV), the network allows fans to see their home teams, regardless of where they live.

The Big Ten Network launched its inaugural season on Aug. 30, 2007 with football, men's and women's basketball, a nightly studio show, classics and coaches shows, along with more Olympic sporting events and exposure for women's sports than has ever been aired on any other network.

For men's basketball, the Big Ten revealed an unparalleled television lineup in September, with every home game appearing on television for the first time in conference history. Overall, no fewer than 235 men's basketball games, including home, away and neutral contests, will be featured on CBS Sports, an ESPN platform or the Big Ten Network beginning with exhibition play in October.

Badgers Giving Back







The Wisconsin men's basketball team travels to a number of great locales and historic arenas to play its games. In addition to all the wonderful college towns and famous gyms around the Big Ten, the Badgers' non-conference schedule is filled with tremendous road trips to all regions of the country.

Within the past few seasons, UW has made trips to Las Vegas, Atlanta, Cincinnati, Philadelphia, Maryland, Cleveland, Alabama, Malibu, New Jersey, North Carolina, Georgia and Pittsburgh for road games. The Badgers have also played in-season tournaments in Hawaii (Big Island Invitational), St. Thomas (Paradise Jam) and South Padre Island (South Padre Invitational).

Wisconsin will play in a number of in-season tournaments in the upcoming seasons. In 2008, UW has a return trip planned to the Paradise Jam. The following season, Wisconsin will be off to Hawaii for the prestigious Maui Invitational. The Badgers will also participate in the ESPNU Classic in Orlando on Thanksgiving weekend in 2010.

In addition to scheduled non-conference games and in-season tournaments, Wisconsin has also been around the country due to its regular NCAA tournament appearances. The Badgers have been placed in Washington, D.C., Spokane, Wash., Minneapolis, Milwaukee, Oklahoma City, Syracuse, Philadelphia and Chicago in recent years.



Great Competition

The Badgers Face Some of the Nation's Toughest Teams

Besides a grueling Big Ten schedule that often includes the top teams in the country, Wisconsin faces a number of highly ranked teams during the non-conference season and in tournament play. The Badgers have played 39 ranked teams in the past six seasons, including 17 games against teams ranked in the top 10.

In the past three seasons, UW's schedule has been ranked among the toughest in the country. Last year the Badgers faced 14 teams ranked among the RPI's top 50 and their regular-season schedule was ranked 25th-toughest in the country according to the RPI. In the previous two seasons, Wisconsin's schedule was ranked eighth and 11th, respectively.

This season, UW travels to two of the toughest road venues in the country when it plays at Duke (Nov. 27) and at Texas (Dec. 29). The Badgers also welcome Marquette and Georgia to the Kohl Center. In all, the Badgers will play 13 games against teams that participated in postseason play in 2007.












BASKETBALL FACILITIES

The Kohl Center

Albert "Ab" Nicholas and his wife, Nancy Johnson Nicholas, pledged \$10 million toward the project. For their generosity, the facility's practice gymnasium is called the Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion.

The Kohl Center, which cost \$76.4 million, also is home to UW women's basketball, ice hockey and numerous concerts, shows and sporting events.


Among the well-known dignitaries and performers who have already appeared at the Kohl Center are Elton John and Billy Joel, The Eagles, 'N Sync, Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers, Shania Twain, the Moody Blues, John Mellencamp, Yanni, Cher, the Dave Matthews Band and the Dalai Lama.


In 2004, the Kohl Center added an impressive scoreboard, with 9x14-foot video replay boards on all four sides. A ring beam was also installed around the circumference of the arena at the first balcony level.

The basketball floor was also refinished and given a new design, as shown in the picture at the top of this page. The practice gym floor, on page 30, was also refinished to match the arena court.



Basketball Locker Room



The room is equipped with the latest technology, including a video system and drop-down screen for film study, as well as a desktop computer. In the back lounge area are a number of leather couches and a 70-inch, flat-screen television.

The locker area itself, separated from the lounge area by a smoked glass door, is very spacious and provides ample area for the players to get ready for practices and games. The shower area is adjacent to the locker area.







Feeding the Badgers



The Kellner Club is one of the latest additions to the Kohl Center and another area that benefits Wisconsin's student-athletes. Teams that practice at the Kohl Center, including the men's basketball team, utilize the Kellner Club for post-practice meals.

The Kellner Club was opened in 2005–06 as a place that donors could have dinner prior to Kohl Center events. The Kohl Center teams began using the area for their meals during the summer of 2006.

The Kellner Club is located on the second level of the Kohl Center, on the north end. The north side of the room is completely covered with windows looking out onto Dayton Street and downtown Madison, including the Capital. The room has seating capacity for 132 people.

Quality food and service is provided by the Department of Athletics' food and beverage staff. The staff has a full working kitchen in the Kohl Center in which the meals are prepared.





Our goal is to enhance the strength, speed, agility and conditioning of each athlete, while reducing the incidence of basketball related injuries. We take a proactive approach to accomplishing this through individual athlete evaluations and program design, Olympic lifting exercises and movement specific functional training. This is accomplished in a safe, yet competitive environment, where each student-athlete is encouraged to strive for personal excellence.



Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Centers

The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center, named after Wade and Betty Fetzer, provides for the academic needs of more than 700 student-athletes at the University of Wisconsin. The center, located in the Dave McClain Athletic Facility, is home to both the academic advising and learning support staffs of the Office of Academic Services.

A new Fetzer Center location, in the Kohl Center, opened in October of 2006. Located just down the hall from the men's locker room. the 5,000-square-foot office serves as a convenient resource for student-athletes who practice at the Kohl Center and/or live in the southeast campus area. The Center includes a computer lab, quiet study room, private study rooms and staff offices and is staffed by at full-time advisor and learning specialist during normal hours. The Fetzer is a WiFi area and is open daily from 8–10 p.m.

The 15,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art facility at the McClain Center is fully wireless and features a large open study area that is surrounded by nine small to mid-sized classrooms, a 55-seat auditorium, staff offices, a computer lab and a canteen area. The open study area has 30 individual carrels as well as several study tables. The computer lab, under coordinator Jim Eisenmann, allows student-athletes to work on assignments, access online library or course materials and check their e-mail. The computer lab also has several checkout laptop computers for student-athletes who are traveling for competitions and other team-related activities.


The UW Academic Serivces Staff consists of eight advisors, four learning specialists, a life skills coordinator and a tutor coordinator. The staff monitors academic eligibility and progress while providing study groups for selected courses, access to tutors, and hosting a variety of academic and career planning events throughout the year.

Under the supervision of assistant athletic director Doug Tiedt, the advising staff of Mary Weaver-Klees, Alan Zussman, Chris Butler, Jerry Darda, Jill Hadfield, David Sedor and Bridget Warren, along with tutor coordinator David Mattison work along with learning specialists Dan Ott, Toni O'Keefe, Nancy Gatyas and Denise Kalscheur to render quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience. CHAMPS/Life Skills Coordinator Kelli Richards oversees programs in career and personal development as well as community outreach, along with her role as an academic advisor.

The staff, including program assistant Nancy Kreklow, has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and learning specialists. Sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the student-athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The staff takes a personal approach to each student-athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways on the national, conference and university level. The annual Student-Athlete Academic banquet recognizes student-athletes off the field of play by honoring over 200 athletes with a 3.5 or better grade point average. Additionally, the annual CHAMPS Cup competition recognizes the teams that succeed academically and are involved in community and campus events.

UW CHAMPS: A Program of Excellence

HAMPS (Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success) is a total development program that uses athletics as a preparation for success in life. Under the direction of Kelli Richards, the goal of the CHAMPS program is to support student development initiatives that enhance the quality of the student-athlete experience within the university setting.

The UW's CHAMPS program was selected as one of four 2005 Program of Excellence recipients. The award is presented annually to schools that have displayed a highly effective and pervasive program benefiting their student-athletes in the five components of the program.

CHAMPS provides support and opportunities for UW student-athletes in the following areas:

Athletic Excellence

 The student-athlete advisory committee (SAAC) works with the CHAMPS program to make sure all of the student-athletes' needs and concerns are being addressed.

Academic Excellence

- Through the Fetzer Academic Center, advisors, tutors, mentors and learning specialists are available to all student-athletes.
- A one-credit, 10-week course available to freshman and sophomore student-athletes discusses issues of transitioning to college such as career interests, diversity on campus, as well as identity development.
- Scholarships and internships are available through the NCAA for student-athletes continuing their education.
- The Academic Excellence Banquet is held each April to recognize the many academic achievements of our student-athletes.

Personal Development

- The UW CHAMPS program requires all studentathletes to attend three personal development activities each year.
- Workshops are offered for teams and larger groups on topics such as safe sex, fiscal responsibility, alcohol, peak performance, multiculturalism and many others.
- Opportunities for team and individual leadership development are also available through both the UW and the NCAA.

Career Development

- Workshops on various career topics are offered to student-athletes throughout the year. Topics include writing resumes and cover letters, interviewing tips, networking strategies, dining etiquette and job search strategies.
- Career assessment and career counseling is available for individuals as they work to declare a major and gain experience within their career field.



Sports Medicine


isconsin's sports medicine staff provides all UW student-athletes with high quality health care. The sports medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of a team of physicians, dentists, athletic trainers and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention and treatment of injuries to Badger student-athletes is supervised by a team of 12 full-time and three graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the sports medicine program focuses on injury prevention. The staff also utilizes functional measures, measures physiological capacity and outlines programs to improve flexibility.

A full-time nutritionist provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of student-athletes.

The sports medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane rehabilitation pool and an onsite x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.



Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, the Natatorium, the UW Field House and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.





Returning Class

Despite losing three starters from last year, UW returns 59.9 percent of its minutes, 70.1 percent of its rebounds, 62.3 percent of its assists and 48.6 percent of its scoring from last year's squad. The Badgers have seven players on their roster (Brian Butch, Michael Flowers, Greg Stiemsma, Marcus Landry, Joe Krabbenhoft, Kevin Gullikson and Jason Bohannon) that have scored at least 10 points in a game during their UW career. Five returnees (Butch, Flowers, Krabbenhoft, Landry and Bohannon) averaged at least 15.0 minutes per game last season

Bouncing Back

Senior Brian Butch has started 59 games over the last two seasons but missed the last six games of 2006-07 with an elbow injury. Butch was invited to and participated in the 2007 Pan-Am Games tryouts on July 12-14 at Haverford College near Philadelphia, his first basketball action since sustaining the injury. He is healthy heading into the start of preseason practice.

Twice as Nice

Butch and classmate Michael Flowers have combined to play more than 3500 minutes in their careers. Butch has started 59 of the Badgers' 67 games over the past two seasons and Flowers started all 36 games a year ago.

Another to 1,000?

Butch needs 301 points to become the 32nd Badger to score 1,000 points in a career. He would also be the sixth UW player to hit the 1,000-point mark during Bo Ryan's tenure. In the 10 years prior to Ryan's arrival, Wisconsin had just five players reach 1,000 career points. Four of the top 10 scorers in school history played for Ryan.

Taking It Away

Butch isn't the only one looking to climb UW's career record lists. Flowers enters this season tied for ninth in school history in career steals with 113. He probably won't surpass Wisconsin's career steals leader Mike Kelley (275), but he has a chance to move into second place. Flowers is 70 behind Tracy Webster (183). He recorded 58 steals a year ago.

And Giving It Back

Flowers can also move into the top 10 on UW's all-time assists list this season. After leading the team with 105 assists last season, he enters 2007-08 with 181 in his career. Rick Olson is 10th in UW history with 259 career assists. Only five players rank among the top 10 in both assists and steals in Wisconsin history.



Who's Gone?

Wisconsin loses three seniors, all starters, from last year's record-setting team. Wing player Alando Tucker was the Badgers' leading scorer the last three years and a consensus first-team All-American and Big Ten Player of the Year as a senior. Guard Kammron Taylor was a second-team All-Big Ten choice last year and scored more than 1,000 points as a Badger. Big man Jason Chappell started all but one game over the past two seasons and played more than 1,200 minutes in his career.

Good Omen?

The last time UW lost a Big Ten Player of the Year from the preceding season was in 2004-05. All-American Devin Harris was named conference player of the year in 2003-04 and left school early to enter the NBA draft. The 2004-05 Badgers went on to tie a school record with 25 wins and advance to the Elite Eight of the NCAA tournament.



Junior Joe Krabbenhoft has played in every game during his UW career and had nearly the identical number of points (174) and rebounds (173) last year.

Making it a Habit

UW earned its ninth straight bid to the NCAA tournament in 2007, a school-record. Michigan State is the only other Big Ten team that has been to the NCAA tournament nine straight years. The Badgers are one of nine teams to make their ninth straight tourney appearance in 2007. The others were: Arizona, Duke, Florida, Gonzaga, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan State and Texas.

A Winning Tradition

Wisconsin has won at least 24 games in four of the last five seasons. Prior to the 2002-03 season, UW had never won more than 22 games. The Badgers' 123 victories over the last five seasons are tied for 15thmost in the country over that span.

Conference Matters

UW also won school-record 13 Big Ten games in 2007. The former record was 12 conference victories, set in 1912 and tied in 1914, 2003 and 2004. Wisconsin has won 68 league games over the past six seasons, trailing only Illinois (70) among Big Ten teams.

The Badgers' record (13-3) was good for second place in the conference. That

is the fourth time in Bo Ryan's six seasons that UW has finished either first or second in the league. From 1963–2001, Wisconsin's best Big Ten finish was a tie for third.

This is the fifth time in six seasons under Bo Ryan that UW has won at least 11 Big Ten games. Prior to 2001–02, Ryan's first season, Wisconsin had reached 11 conference wins just seven times in 97 previous league campaigns.

Home Cooking


Wisconsin ended the season with 22 consecutive home wins, the fifth-longest active streak in the country. That is also the fourth-longest streak in school history. In six seasons under Bo Ryan, the Badgers are 91-5 in the Kohl Center, the third-best home record in the country. In Big Ten home games, UW is 46-2 under Ryan. The two losses in conference home games are the fewest of any team in a BCS conference over that time frame.

Packed House


For the fifth consecutive year, all tickets for Wisconsin's home games were sold out prior to the start of the season. Last season, the Badgers ranked seventh nationally (and second in the Big Ten) in average attendance. Counting the 18 sellouts this season, the Badgers have a string of 89 consecutive sold-out games at the Kohl Center.

Tidbits

- UW ranked 10th in the country in scoring defense, allowing just 57.9 points per game. Only four teams reached the 70-point plateau against Wisconsin last season.
- The Badgers made a school-record 583 free throws while their opponents attempted just 526 free throws. The Badgers averaged 23.6 free throw attempts per game, tops in the Big Ten. UW is 58-5 under Bo Ryan when getting to the line at least 25 times.
- On the season the Badgers averaged 15.3 personal fouls per game, 14th in the country. Michael Flowers and Joe Krabbenhoft were the only Badgers to foul out of a game last season, both doing so in the season finale vs. UNLV.
- UW ranked 11th in the country in turnovers, averaging just 11.3 per game last season. That is tied for the third-best average in school history. Four of the five lowest turnover per game averages in UW history are Bo Ryan-coached teams.
- Wisconsin scored at least 70 points in 20 games last season and finished second in the Big Ten in scoring offense, averaging 70.2 points per game. Under Bo Ryan, UW is 91-5 when scoring at least 70 points.



Senior Michael Flowers, a member of the Big Ten's All-Defensive team in 2007, is currently tied for ninth on UW's career steals list (113).

Each season further establishes UW as a major player on the national scene and Ryan as one of the top coaches in the country. His Badger teams have compiled a 142-55 (.721) record, already placing him third on Wisconsin's all-time wins list (behind basketball hall-of-famers Bud Forster and Walter Meanwell).

Last season, Ryan joined the exclusive 500-win club, making him one of 15 active Division I head coaches with at least 500 wins. With a career record of 525-158 (.769), Ryan is second only to North Carolina's Roy Williams in terms of winning percentage among coaches with at least 500 victories.

The accomplishments during Ryan's first six seasons are varied and impressive. He has led UW to the four winningest seasons in school history, including a school-record 30 victories in 2006–07. Prior to Ryan's arrival in Madison, Wisconsin had never won more than 22 games in a season. Ryan's teams have averaged 23.7 wins in his six seasons.

The Badgers have appeared in the NCAA tournament in each of Ryan's six seasons, advancing to two Sweet 16s and the Elite Eight in 2005. Last year, UW earned a No. 2 seed, the highest in school history. Ryan's eight NCAA tournament wins are a school record and he is the first coach in UW history to lead a team to two Sweet 16 appearances.

Wisconsin's success in Big Ten play under Ryan is unparalleled in school history. His .708 (68-28) winning percentage in conference games is the best of any Big Ten coach in history with at least five years in the league. In 2002, Ryan's first season, Wisconsin earned a share of the Big Ten title for the first time since 1947. The next year, UW won the title outright, securing back-to-back championships for the first time since 1923 and 1924. Not to be outdone, Ryan led the Badgers to their first Big Ten tournament title in 2004.

He is the first coach in conference history to lead a team to at least 11 Big Ten wins in each of his first four seasons. Prior to his arrival in 2001, UW had won at least

11 conference games just seven times, and only once since 1941. The Badgers have at least 11 conference wins in five of his six seasons, including a school-record 13 last year.

In Ryan's six seasons, the Kohl Center has become one of the toughest places to play in America. The Badgers have compiled a 91-5 home record under Ryan, including a 46-2 mark in Big Ten games. Over the last six seasons, that is the third-best home record in the country. From Dec. 7, 2002 to Jan. 24, 2005 Wisconsin did not lose a home game, setting a school record with 38 consecutive wins, a streak that was the longest in the country.

Individual success has followed team success as a number of Ryan's players have earned honors. UW is the only team to have had a first-team All-Big Ten selection in each of the last six seasons (Kirk Penney in 2002–03; Devin Harris in 2004; Mike Wilkinson in 2005; and Alando Tucker in 2006–07). Harris, the fifth pick in the 2004 NBA Draft, was also named the 2004 Big Ten Player of the Year and was a consensus second-team All-American. He was a finalist



for national player of the year and finished second for the Bob Cousy Award. Last year, Tucker became just the third consensus first-team All-American in school



history, winning the Big Ten Player of the Year and Senior CLASS awards and joining Kevin Durant of Texas as the only players to be finalists for every major national player of the year award.

Last year Ryan led Wisconsin to one of the most successful seasons in school history. In addition to the school-record 30 wins, UW spent 17 weeks ranked in the top 10. On Feb. 19, 2007, the program achieved its first-ever No. 1 ranking. The Badgers' 13 Big Ten wins were also the most in school history and earned them a second-place finish in the conference. They advanced to the finals of the Big Ten tournament for the third time in the last four years. Wisconsin was a No. 2 seed in the NCAA tournament, the best seed in school history.

For those many accomplishments, Ryan was recognized by a number of national organizations. He received the 2007 Clair Bee Coach of the Year Award, which honors the active men's Division I basketball coach who has made the most significant positive contributions to his sport during the preceding year. Ryan also received the Adolph Rupp Cup as the national coach of the year from the Commonwealth Athletic Club of Kentucky. He was also a finalist for a number of other national Coach of the Year awards, including the Naismith Award.

In 2005–06, Ryan guided the Badgers to a fifth consecutive NCAA tournament appearance and a share of fourth place in the Big Ten, the No. 1 RPI conference in the country. UW won at least 19 games

for the fifth straight season and finished 9-7 in the Big Ten. Wisconsin also won the season-opening Paradise Jam.

In 2004–05, Ryan was named one of 20 finalists for the Naismith Coach of the Year Award. Despite returning just one starter from the previous year's team, he led the Badgers to an appearance in the 2005 NCAA Tournament Elite Eight and a school record-tying 25 wins. UW finished

third in the Big Ten with an 11-5 mark and advanced to the Big Ten tournament title game for the second consecutive season. Wisconsin finished the season ranked 10th in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll, its highest final ranking in history.

In 2003–04, Ryan led Wisconsin to a 25-7 record, setting a school record for wins in a season and posting the school's highest winning percentage since the 1941


team won the NCAA title with a 20-3 mark. The Badgers' 12-4 mark in the Big Ten was good enough to earn the second seed in the conference tournament. UW went on to win the Big Ten tournament for the first time in school history, defeating No. 1 seed Illinois, 70-53, in the final. For the second time in school history, UW was ranked in the Associated Press poll every week during the season. Those accomplishments came in spite of UW losing its second-leading scorer, Alando Tucker, for all but four games and having just four players see action in all 32 games.

The year before, Ryan and the Badgers set a school record with 24 wins and earned an outright Big Ten title and a trip to the NCAA tournament Sweet 16. The outright conference championship was UW's first since 1947 and the 12 league wins tied a school record set in 1912 and tied in 1914. Ryan earned his second Big Ten Coach of the Year award, becoming the first coach in league history to be so honored in each of his first two seasons.


In his first season, 2001–02, Ryan led an undermanned UW team to an improbable share of its first Big Ten championship in 55 years. Ryan had to juggle a lineup consisting of only eight scholarship players, including five players that had seen very limited or no action at all on the collegiate level. Though it took a period of adjustment, by mid-December the team had started to gel and would go on to win 15 of its final 20 regular-season games and earn a share of the Big Ten title. One of those victories, a 64-56 win over Iowa, was Ryan's 400th as a collegiate coach.

Ryan has experience as a Division I head and assistant coach, as well as a Division III head coach and is well-respected throughout the college basketball world. At the 2004 Final Four, he was honored with the NABC Guardians of the Game Award for Service. The goal of the Guardians of the Game program is to focus attention on the positive aspects of basketball and the role coaches play in the lives of student-athletes, in addition to the contributions coaches make to their communities. Ryan is also one of four head coaches on the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Issues Committee.

Ryan came to Wisconsin from UW–Milwaukee, where he spent two seasons coaching the Panthers to their first back-to-back winning seasons in eight years. UWM, 8-19 overall the year before Ryan arrived, was 15-14 and 15-13, respectively, in Ryan's two

years at the controls. The program also experienced a 161-percent home attendance increase in his first season, including the three largest crowds in the history of the school's home facility.

It was during his 15-year tenure at UW-Platteville (1984–99), however, that Ryan firmly established himself as one of the country's top coaches. He guided the Division III school to a phenomenal 353-76 (.822) overall record. Ryan was named the National Association of Basketball Coaches Division III Coach of the Year four times. In addition he was tabbed the Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference's Coach of the Year on six occasions.

Ryan took over at UW–Platteville following eight seasons (1976-84) as an assistant coach to Bill Cofield and Steve Yoder at Wisconsin.

Held in high esteem by his colleagues, Ryan has won two gold medals as an assistant coach, first with Virginia head coach Pete Gillen and the gold medal-winning North squad at the 1993 U.S.

Olympic Festival, and also with former Atlanta Hawks coach Lon Kruger and the United States gold medal winning team at the 1995 World University Games.

Ryan was born on Dec. 20, 1947, just outside of Philadelphia in Chester, Pa. At Chester High School, he was a football teammate of current San Diego Chargers defensive coordinator Ted Cottrell. He attended Wilkes (Pa.) University, where he starred as a high-scoring guard and earned a bachelor's degree in business administration in 1969. Ryan was inducted into the Wilkes Athletic Hall of Fame on June 1, 2003.

Upon completion of his collegiate career, Ryan did graduate work at Villanova before accepting an assistant coaching position at the College of Racine (Wis.). Ryan accepted his first head coaching job at Philadelphia's Sun Valley High School, where he was named the Delaware County Coach of the Year after directing his team to a second-place finish in the Philadelphia Suburban League. His 1976 club was the first Sun Valley High team to qualify for the state tournament.

Ryan is the author of three books on coaching basketball: *Passing and Catching: A Lost Art; The Swing Offense*; and *Applying and Attacking Pressure*. He also has produced five basketball instructional videos.

Ryan and his wife, Kelly, are the parents of five children: Megan, Will, Matt, Brenna and Mairin.

UW-Platteville Names Court After Ryan

On Jan. 27, 2007, the University of Wisconsin–Platteville honored Bo Ryan by naming the Williams Fieldhouse basketball court "Bo Ryan Court." Ryan coached the Pioneers to four national titles and was named national coach of the year four times.

"I was very fortunate to be at UW-Platteville during a time of great support from the fans and community as well as tremendous players and assistant coaches," Ryan said. "We were the recipients of a lot of cooperation and goodwill throughout the Platteville community. My family and I will cherish the 15 years we spent in Platteville the rest of our lives."

Ryan made UW-Platteville the premier basketball program during his 15-year tenure, which included four NCAA Division III national championships. He recorded a 353-76 record at UW-Platteville from 1984-99 and his .822 winning percentage was the best in the history of NCAA Division III basketball.

Ryan guided the Pioneers to eight conference titles and nine straight NCAA Div. III playoff appearances. UW-Platteville won national titles in 1991, 1995, 1998 and 1999. His 1992 squad also advanced to the Final Four, where it placed third. In all, the Pioneers were 30-5 in NCAA tournament play.

In his last 12 seasons as the Pioneers' leader, Ryan guided his team to a 314-37 record, including a phenomenal 157-7 record in Williams Fieldhouse. UW–Platteville was the winningest team of all of college basketball during the 1990s, with a 226-26 record (90.9 percent). Ryan's 1996–97 club set the all-time NCAA record (all divisions) for fewest points allowed at 47.5 ppg. He was named national coach of the year four times and WIAC coach of the year on six occasions.



In Good Company

Bo Ryan has led Wisconsin to success not seen in Madison for a long time, specifically the time of Walter "Doc" Meanwell. Meanwell coached the Badgers for 20 seasons in the early part of the 20th century. His teams won eight Big Ten titles and lost just one game during his first three seasons. Meanwell was inducted into the Basketball Hall of Fame in 1959.

Many of the Badgers' accomplishments under Ryan have not been matched since the days of Meanwell. Among them are:

- The 2002 and 2003 Badgers won back-to-back Big Ten titles for the first time since 1923-24.
- Ryan reached 100 career victories at Wisconsin (138 games) faster than anyone in school history besides Meanwell (111 games).
- The 2003-04 Badgers were the first UW team to record an undefeated season at home since Meanwell's team went 12-0 in 1929-30.
- The 2006-07 Badgers' 7-0 start to the Big Ten season was UW's best since going 12-0 in league play in 1914.

Ryan's Badgers have also accomplished a couple things Meanwell's teams did not.

- The 2002-05 Badgers were the first to win at least 11 conference games four seasons in a row.
- Wisconsin's 68 Big Ten victories over the past six seasons are the most in school history, surpassing the 1912-17 total by five.
- The 2006-07 Badgers recorded the best start to a season in school history (21-1) surpassing Meanwell's 1915-16 team (20-1).

reg Gard, a veteran of 14 seasons with Wisconsin coach Bo Ryan, is in his seventh season on the Badger basketball staff as an assistant coach.

"Greg is one of the most thorough and organized coaches I have ever been around," Ryan said. "His attention to detail and his ability to communicate that to the student-athletes separates him from other coaches."

He also worked as an advisor in the university's admissions office.

Prior to joining Ryan's staff in Platteville, Gard spent three seasons at Southwestern High School and one at Platteville High School, where he served in junior high and assistant varsity coaching capacities.

Gard is a 1995 graduate of UW-Platteville with a degree in physical and health education. He and his wife, Michelle, have two children, Mackenzie and Isaac.





Assistant Coach Gary Close

ary Close, entering his 21st season in Division I, begins his fifth season with the Badgers. With 17 years of experience at Iowa and Wisconsin, Close is the third-longest tenured active Big Ten coach trailing only Tim Izzo (MSU) and Bruce Weber (Illinois).

"From the first time I met Gary at Stanford, I knew he was someone with exceptional teaching and coaching skills," Head Coach Bo Ryan said. "The University of Wisconsin will benefit greatly from his addition to our staff and we are looking forward to working together for many years to come."

Close, named one of the top 25 assistant coaches in the country by Rivals.com in 2007, spent three years as the head coach of Regina High School in Iowa City, leading them to two state tournament

appearances, and as the Director of Basketball Operations for

Championship Productions in Ames, Iowa.

Prior to that, he spent 13 years as an assistant at Iowa under Tom Davis. During that time, the Hawkeyes made nine NCAA tournament appearances, advancing to the "Sweet 16" twice and the regional final once. At Iowa he coached 13 future NBA players including B.J. Armstrong, Roy Marble, Acie Earl, Matt Bullard, Ricky Davis and Ryan Bowen. A respected shooting coach, Iowa shot better than 48.0 percent from the field five times during his tenure, including a school-record .528 in 1987-88. In his second season with the Badgers, 2004-05, UW set a school record with 250 3-point field goals made.

Close was also an assistant for three years under Davis at Stanford. In his first season, Stanford won 19 games, the most at the school since 1961-62. He was also part of the staff that was responsible for recruiting the Cardinal's all-time leading scorer, Todd Lichti.

A veteran of a number of international tours, Close served as the assistant to Davis on a Pac-10 all-star team that toured Australia in 1985. During the summer of 1995, he served as cohead coach for a Big Ten all-star team on an eight-game tour in Furone

Under Close's direction in 1996, the People-to-People Sports team became the first American team to win the Malgrat International Tournament in Malgrat, Spain. In 1997, Close coached a team comprised of current and former Iowa players to a perfect 6-0 record on a six-game tour in Germany.

A native of Moorestown, New Jersey, Close earned a bachelor's degree in business-agriculture with a minor in physical education (1978) and a master's degree in athletic administration and coaching (1982) from Arizona State. Close, his wife Kellie and their children Sam and Ellen live in Middleton.





Assistant Coach Howard Moore

Rormer University of Wisconsin basketball player Howard Moore begins his third season as a Badger assistant this year. Moore played for UW from 1990-95 and was part of the 1993 NIT team and 1994 NCAA Tournament team.

"We're proud to announce the return of one of the most popular figures in Badger basketball, this time in the coaching ranks," Head Coach Bo Ryan said. "Howard knows the campus and the climate of the University and that will definitely be an advantage on the recruiting trail just as his knowledge as a coach and teacher will be a benefit on the floor."

Moore spent 2004-05 as an assistant at the University of Loyola-Chicago, handling off-campus recruiting and working primarily with the team's post players. The Ramblers, who were 9-20 overall and 4-12 in the Horizon League in 2003-04, went 13-17 in Moore's lone season, including 8-8 in the Horizon League. They won six of their last seven games, losing to UW-Milwaukee in the Horizon League Tournament semifinals.

Prior to joining the Loyola staff, Moore was an assistant under Tim Buckley at Ball State for one season. At Ball State, Moore helped the Cardinals become the top three-point field percentage defense team in the Mid-American Conference, limiting foes to .315 shooting from beyond the arc. On the recruiting trail, Moore helped land what was considered by many experts to be the top class in the MAC.

Before his stint at Ball State, Moore served as the head off-campus recruiter and also mentored the guards and post players at Bradley from 2000-03. In that stretch he helped mold Phillip Gilbert and James Gillingham into All-Missouri Valley Conference selections. Moore also served as an administrative assistant at Bradley in 1999-2000.

After a two-year stint as an assistant boys varsity coach at Taft High School, Moore commenced his collegiate coaching career as an assistant at the University of Chicago

Moore played at UW from 1990-95, playing for Steve Yoder, Stu Jackson and Stan Van Gundy. The Badgers earned an NIT bid in 1991, Moore's redshirt season. His sophomore year, Wisconsin returned to the NIT and as a junior, he was a part of UW's first NCAA tournament team in 47 years.

Moore played in 47 games as a Badger, including 21 as a senior. He represented the Big Ten by touring Argentina with a group of league all-stars in 1994. Moore, who was the recipient of the University of Wisconsin African-American Alumni Association Student Leadership Award in 1993, graduated from Wisconsin in 1995 with a bachelor's degree in African-American Studies.

A 1990 graduate of Taft High School in Chicago, Moore guided his team to the Chicago Public League semifinals as a senior and was named to the Chicago Public League Hall of Fame in 1999.

Moore, his wife, Jennifer, and their son, Jerell, live in Madison.





Enrique (Henry) Perez-Guerra Athletic Trainer



Joel Ott


Assistant Director, sixth year





109 Years of Wisconsin Basketball

The Wisconsin men's basketball program begins its 110th season in 2007–08. Following is a chronological list of highlights from the first 109 years of UW basketball.

December, 1898

Six years after the advent of the new sport of basketball, Bob Burdick, John Mapel, Carl Sillman, Paul Stover and Captain Walter Hirschberg make up the first Wisconsin Badger basketball team. Dr. J.C. Elsom is the first UW coach.

Jan. 21, 1899

Wisconsin plays its first game and falls to the Milwaukee Normal Alumni, 25-15, in Milwaukee.

March 4, 1899

The Badgers play their first home game. The Milwaukee Normal Alumni edge Wisconsin, 13-10, and the Badgers finish their first season 0-3.

Feb. 15, 1900

Wisconsin defeats Wayland Academy, 25-15, for the first victory in school history.

March, 1902

After completing a 10-game schedule (all on the road), the Badgers finish the year with a 7-3 record, their first winning season.

Dec. 2, 1904

Emmett Angell coaches the Badgers for the first time and watches his team rout Sparta's Company C, 75-10. Christian Steinmetz scores 50 points in the victory to set a pre-modern, single-game scoring mark.

January, 1905

The Badgers make their first road trip to the East and come home with a 2-6 mark after games in New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania and Ohio.

Spring, 1905

Christian Steinmetz finishes the season with 462 points, setting a Wisconsin season scoring mark that would stand for 61 years. Steinmetz is later named the Badgers' first All-American.

March 15, 1907

Wisconsin defeats Purdue, 37-10, to secure an 11-3 record and a share of the school's first Big Ten championship.

March 16, 1912

First-year coach Walter Meanwell, known as the "Little Doctor," guides the Badgers to a 32-21 win over Indiana to complete an unbeaten season at 15-0. Wisconsin wins the Big Ten title outright and will win or share the conference crown seven more times before Meanwell's coaching career ends in 1934.



Walter Meanwell won eight conference titles during his 20 years at UW.

March 16, 1918

Despite dropping a 19-11 decision to Minnesota, first-year coach Guy Lowman's Badgers win the school's sixth Big Ten championship in 12 years.

Dec. 18, 1930

The Badgers defeat Penn, 25-12, in the dedication game for the new Wisconsin Field House.

Fall, 1934

Harold "Bud" Foster, a former All-America player for the Badgers, takes over as head coach. Foster will hold that position for 25 years, longer than any other basketball coach in school history.

Spring, 1935

In his first season as head coach, "Bud" Foster leads the Badgers to the Big Ten title with a 15-5 record.

March 29, 1941

The "Cinderella" Badgers, lower division finishers in the Big Ten just one year earlier, top Washington State, 39-34, to win the NCAA tournament. The UW's John Kotz is named tournament MVP. Team captain Gene Englund is the Big Ten MVP and earns All-America honors.



The UW Field House opened on Dec. 18, 1930 as Wisconsin defeated Penn 25-12.



Head coach Harold "Bud" Foster visits with former UW All-American Don Rehfeldt. Foster coached the Badgers to their only national title in 1941.

Spring, 1942

Wisconsin has the Big Ten MVP for the second straight season when John Kotz earns the award. Kotz also garners All-America kudos.

March, 1947

The 15-5 Big Ten champion Badgers are invited to play in the NCAA Eastern Regionals in New York's Madison Square Garden. Wisconsin takes third place in the East by squeaking past Navy, 50-49, after losing the opener, 70-56, to CCNY.

Feb. 28, 1949

Junior Don Rehfeldt takes 37 shots in a 70-47 trouncing of Iowa. Rehfeldt's 37 field goal attempts still stand as a single-game Wisconsin record.

Spring, 1950

After being named the Big Ten's MVP, Don Rehfeldt becomes Wisconsin's last All-American until Alando Tucker in 2007. He finishes his career as the school's all-time leading scorer with 1,169 points. Rehfeldt also is picked second overall in the NBA Draft.

Jan. 3, 1953

Center Paul Morrow grabs what remains a school-record 30 rebounds in a 50-46 victory over Purdue.

Jan. 27, 1962

Despite Boilermaker Terry Dischinger's UW Field House-record 50 points, the Badgers defeat Purdue 89-86.

March 3, 1962

The Badgers defeat a topranked Ohio State squad (86-67) that features all-Americans John Havlicek and Jerry Lucas, as well as reserve forward Bob Knight. The powerful Buckeyes see their 47game winning streak come to an end.

March 11, 1963

Senior Ken Seibel earns the team's MVP award for the third consecutive season. He remains the Badgers' only three-time MVP.

March 8, 1965

Ken Barnes scores a school-record 42 points, along with 23 rebounds, in a 92-73 loss to Indiana. Barnes' mark stands alone until Michael Finley matches it in December of 1994.

March 11, 1967

With 12 seconds remaining in the season finale against Illinois, sophomore Chuck Nagle makes a layup to tie Christian Steinmetz as the school's single-season scoring leader with 462 points. Fouled on the play, Nagle converts the free throw and sets the record.

Dec. 9, 1967

The Badgers set a school single-game scoring record with a 120-82 win over Southern Methodist.

March 2, 1968

Senior Joe Franklin pulls down a career-high 27 rebounds in a 104-84 victory over Purdue— his final game at the UW Field House. Franklin ends his collegiate career one week later having amassed 858 boards for what still is a school-record 11.9 rebounds per game.

March 9, 1968

Only one year after Chuck Nagle snaps Wisconsin's 62-year-old single-season scoring mark set by Christian Steinmetz, Joe Franklin registers 30 points in the season finale at Northwestern to finish the campaign with a school-best 544 points.

March 13, 1971

Senior co-captain Clarence Sherrod scores 27 points in a season-ending loss at Michigan to finish the year with 570 points. It is the third time in five seasons that the Badgers have a new all-time single-season scoring leader.

Jan. 5, 1976

The Badgers record the largest comeback in school history when they erase a 22-point (47-25) deficit and gain an 82-81 overtime victory over Ohio State at the UW Field House.

March 3, 1979


Guard Wes Matthews hits a halfcourt shot as time expires as the Badgers defeat Magic Johnson and eventual NCAA champion Michigan State 83-81 at the UW Field House.

Dec. 30, 1979

The Badgers connect on 32 of 43 field goal attempts (.744) to set a single-game school record and defeat Army 78-54.

March 10, 1981

Claude Gregory scores 29 points and grabs 17 rebounds in his last game as a Badger. He leaves the school as Wisconsin's career leader in points (1,745) and rebounds (904).



Joe Franklin averaged a UW record 11.9 rebounds per game for his career. In his last home game, he pulled down a career-high 27 boards.



Danny Jones is one of just four Badgers (Michael Finley, Devin Harris and Alando Tucker are the others) to have scored more than 600 points in a season. That season (1989), he led the UW to its first-ever NIT appearance.

Dec. 2, 1985

In a non-conference matchup with San Francisco State, senior Rick Olson makes 17 field goals in a 90-61 Badger victory. Olson's 17 field goals tops the previous school record of 16 set nearly 27 years earlier by Bob Litzow.

March 9, 1986

Setting a school record by starting every game (112) in his four-year career, Rick Olson guides Wisconsin past Northwestern, 70-68. Olson scores 26 points in the game and misses becoming the school's career scoring leader by nine points. However, he does become the UW's single-season scoring champion with 571 points.

Feb. 16, 1987

In one of the most infamous games in school history, the Badgers take eventual NCAA champion Indiana to three overtimes before falling 86-85 at the UW Field House before a capacity crowd and national television audience.

March 8, 1987

Mike Heineman scores 20 points, grabs seven rebounds and hands out nine assists in his final game as a Badger. Heineman ends his career as Wisconsin's all-time assist leader with 388.

Dec. 14, 1988

The Badgers record the second-longest margin of victory in school history with an 89-34 win over Denver at the UW Field House.

March 15, 1989

The Badgers, under Coach Steve Yoder, make their first-ever appearance in the National Invitation Tournament and defeat New Orleans, 63-61, at the UW Field House. It is Wisconsin's first post-season appearance since the 1947 NCAA Tournament.

March 20, 1989

Danny Jones scores 24 points in the season finale against St. Louis. His 611 points establishes a new single-season school scoring record.

Feb. 15, 1990

Danny Jones snaps Wisconsin's career scoring mark against Ohio State. Jones ends his career with 1,854 points.

March 13, 1991

The Badgers make their second NIT appearance in three years and defeat Bowling Green 87-79 (OT) at the UW Field House. Wisconsin, however, is eliminated from the tournament five days later by Stanford.

March 25, 1992

Former New York Knicks coach Stu Jackson is hired as Wisconsin's 11th head coach.

Feb. 13, 1993

Sophomore Michael Finley goes head-tohead with Purdue All-American Glenn Robinson. Finley scores 33 points and adds a Big Ten-record 10 steals but the Boilermakers prevail 90-87 in double overtime behind Robinson's 42 points.

March 17, 1993

Wisconsin qualifies for its third National Invitation Tournament in five years but loses 77-73 to Rice in the first round at the UW Field House.

Nov. 22, 1993

The Badgers are ranked 25th by the Associated Press, their first national ranking by the A.P. since January of 1976.

March 17, 1994

Led by Michael Finley, Tracy Webster and Rashard Griffith, Coach Stu Jackson's Badgers defeat Cincinnati 80-72 in the school's first NCAA tournament game since 1947. Wisconsin is eliminated two days later by Missouri.

Dec. 10, 1994


Michael Finley scores a school recordtying 42 points in a 92-76 loss at Eastern Michigan. Finley registers 33 points in the second half to set the school mark for points in a half.

Jan. 14, 1995

Michael Finley breaks Danny Jones' school career scoring mark in the first half of the Badgers' 74-67 win at home over Minnesota. Finley goes on to finish his career with 2,147 points.

March 31, 1995

Dick Bennett is hired from UW-Green Bay as Wisconsin's 13th head coach, replacing Stan Van Gundy.



Michael Finley scored a school record-tying 42 points against Eastern Michigan in 1994. Later that year, he would extend his career points record to 2,147. That was the Wisconsin record until last season when Alando Tucker surpassed that mark.

June 28, 1995

Forward Michael Finley becomes Wisconsin's first first-round NBA draft choice since 1980 when he is selected 21st overall by Phoenix.

March 13, 1996

Coach Dick Bennett's Badgers defeat Manhattan 55-42 in the first round of the National Invitation Tournament at the UW Field House. The Badgers are eliminated five days later by Illinois State.

Jan. 4, 1997

Wisconsin snaps a 31-game losing streak to Indiana with a 71-58 victory over the Hoosiers at the UW Field House. Wisconsin leads 17-0 before Indiana scores.

Feb. 26, 1997

Seven-foot center Paul Grant sets a school record with a 15-for-15 performance at the free throw line in a 49-48 victory over Iowa at the UW Field House.

March 8, 1997

The Badgers lock up the school's second NCAA tournament bid in 50 years with a 66-65 upset win over No. 2-ranked Minnesota at the UW Field House. It is the UW's first win over a first or second-ranked opponent since 1962.

March 14, 1997

The Badgers lose 71-58 to Texas in the first round of the NCAA tournament at Pittsburgh's Civic Arena.

June 25, 1997

Paul Grant becomes UW's second firstround NBA draft choice in three years when he is selected 20th overall by Minnesota.

Jan. 14, 1998

The Badgers play the final game in the UW Field House and record a 76-57 win over Penn State.

Jan. 17, 1998

Wisconsin opens the new, \$76 million Kohl Center with a 56-33 triumph over Northwestern before 16,697 fans, including Sen. Herb Kohl.



The Badgers, a No. 8 seed in the 2000 NCAA Tournament, made a cinderella run to the Final Four that year. Wisconsin defeated No. 9 seed Fresno State, No. 1 seed Arizona, No. 4 seed LSU and No. 6 seed Purdue on its way to the RCA Dome in Indianapolis.

Dec. 14, 1998

The Badgers enter the media and coaches top-25 polls for the first time since December of 1994.

Dec. 27, 1998

Wisconsin's 10th straight win gives the school a 12-1 record for only the second time since 1929-30.

Jan. 31, 1999

The Badgers achieve the school's highest national ranking (11th by A.P.) since 1962.

March 1, 1999

Sophomore guard Mike Kelley becomes the first Badger to be named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year.

March 7, 1999

UW receives its fifth NCAA tournament bid and second in the four-year Dick Bennett era.

March 12, 1999

The Badgers drop a 43-32 decision to Southwest Missouri State in the first round of the NCAA tournament in Charlotte, N.C.

March 1, 2000

Guard Mike Kelley becomes Wisconsin's career steals leader in a 62-46 win at Northwestern.

March 12, 2000

Wisconsin receives its sixth NCAA tournament bid and third in the five-year Dick Bennett era.

March 16-18, 2000

Wisconsin defeats ninth-seeded Fresno State and top-seeded Arizona in the first and second rounds of the NCAA tournament in Salt Lake City, Utah. The wins allow the UW to advance to the Sweet 16 for the first time ever.

March 23-25, 2000

The Badgers advance to the Final Four after defeating fourth-seeded and 10th-ranked LSU in the West Regional semifinal and Big Ten rival and sixth-seeded Purdue in the regional title game in Albuquerque, N.M.

The win over the Boilermakers ties the school single-season record (22) set by the 1998-99 squad.

Guard Jon Bryant is named the West Regional MVP and guard Mike Kelley and forward Andy Kowske are named to the all-West Regional team.

Upon their return to Madison on the night of the 25th, the Badgers are greeted by 20,000 screaming fans at a pep rally in Camp Randall Stadium.

April 1, 2000

The Badgers' amazing NCAA tournament run ends in the semifinals at the Final Four with a 53-41 loss to eventual national champion Michigan State.

Nov. 29, 2000

The Badgers defeat 13th-ranked Maryland 78-75 in overtime at the Bradley Center in Milwaukee. Following the game, Dick Bennett tells the team he has coached his last game and formally announces his retirement the next day. Assistant head coach Brad Soderberg takes over as UW's 14th head basketball coach.

Jan. 29, 2001

Wisconsin ascends to the No. 10 spot in the Associated Press top 25, the school's highest ranking since it was seventh on Dec. 11, 1962.

March 11, 2001

Wisconsin receives its third consecutive NCAA tournament bid and the seventh in school history.

March 29, 2001

After announcing on March 19 that Brad Soderberg will not be retained as head coach, UW Director of Athletics Pat Richter hires William "Bo" Ryan from UW-Milwaukee as the 15th head coach in Badger basketball history.



Bo Ryan was named the 15th head coach in Badger basketball history on March 29, 2001. Since that time, Wisconsin has made six NCAA tournament appearances, won two Big Ten titles and one Big Ten tournament title. Ryan has amassed 142 wins and boasts a 91-5 mark at the Kohl Center in five years.

Jan. 12, 2002

Freddie Owens hits a runner with 25 seconds left in the game to give Wisconsin a 64-63 win over Michigan State in East Lansing. The win snapped the Spartans' Big Ten-record 53-game home winning streak.

Feb. 13, 2002

Behind Charlie Wills' 17 points, the Badgers defeat Indiana 64-63 in Bloomington. The victory is UW's first at Assembly Hall since 1977, a span of 22 games.

Feb. 27, 2002

Wisconsin clinches a share of its first Big Ten title since 1947 with a 74-54 win over Michigan at the Kohl Center. Devin Harris and Kirk Penney each score 21 points and hit four three-pointers. With the victory, the Badgers earn the No. 1 seed in the Big Ten Tournament for the first time in school history.

March 5, 2002

Head coach Bo Ryan is named the Big Ten Coach of the Year, becoming the first UW coach to receive the honor. Kirk Penney is also a unanimous first-team all-league selection, just the fifth Badger since 1948 to earn unanimous first-team honors.

March 15, 2002


Seniors Travon Davis and Charlie Wills become the first UW players to appear in four NCAA tournaments as the Badgers defeat St. John's 80-70 at the MCI Center in Washington, D.C. Wisconsin falls to eventual national champion Maryland, 87-57, two days later.

March 5, 2003

Point guard Devin Harris hits the gamewinning free throw with 0.4 seconds remaining to give Wisconsin a 60-59 win over Illinois and its first outright Big Ten title since 1947.

March 11, 2003

For the second consecutive season, Bo Ryan is named the Big Ten's Coach of the Year. He is the only coach in league history to win the award in each of his first two seasons. Kirk Penney is also a repeat first-team All-Big Ten selection, UW's first back-to-back first teamer since 1951-52.



Devin Harris made one of two free throws with 0.4 seconds remaining to give the Badgers a 60-59 win over Illinois in the 2003 season finale, cliniching the UW's first outright Big Tentible since 1947.

March 20, 2003

Wisconsin earns its fifth straight bid to the NCAA tournament and are seeded fifth in the Midwest Region. The Badgers defeat Weber State 81-74 in the first round of the NCAA tournament in Spokane, Wash. The win is the 23rd of the season for UW, breaking the school record of 22. It also marks the first time in school history that Wisconsin has won NCAA tournament games in consecutive seasons.

March 22, 2003

Junior Freddie Owens hits a 3-pointer with one second left to cap the greatest comeback in school history and give the Badgers a 61-60 win over Tulsa and a berth in the "Sweet 16." Wisconsin had trailed 58-45 with 3:36 remaining before outscoring the Golden Hurricane 16-2 the rest of the way.

Jan. 24-Feb. 4, 2004

Junior Devin Harris scores 97 points over a three-game span, setting a UW record. Harris just misses becoming the first UW player in history to record three straight 30-point games, scoring 30 vs. Illinois (Jan. 24), 29 at Ohio State (Jan. 28) and a career-high 38 vs. Minnesota (Feb. 4). The 38-point effort is tied for the fourth-most by a Badger.

March 10, 2004

The Big Ten announces that UW junior Devin Harris has been named conference player of the year. Harris is the first Badger to earn the award since Don Rehfeldt in 1950.

March 14, 2004

Wisconsin defeats Illinois 70-53 at the Conseco Fieldhouse in Indianapolis to win the 2004 Big Ten Tournament, the first tourney title in UW history. Devin Harris is named the tournament's most outstanding player and Mike Wilkinson joins him on the all-tournament team. The Badgers defeated Minnesota in the quarterfinals and Michigan State in the semis.

March 19, 2004

Almost exactly a year after erasing a 13-point deficit to win a second round game in the 2003 NCAA Tournament, the Badgers rally from a 13-point, second-half deficit to defeat Richmond, 76-64, in the first round of the 2004 NCAA Tournament in Milwaukee. The victory is UW's 25th of the season, breaking the school record for wins in a season, set just the year before.

Jan. 5, 2005

Behind Zach Morley's career-high 22 points stemming mostly from 6-of-8 3-point shooting, the Badgers defeated Purdue 77-68 for their first win in West Lafayette since 1972, a streak of 29 straight losses. It was the first loss to Wisconsin at home for the Boilermakers under then-coach Gene Keady.

Jan. 16, 2005

Down 59-51 with two minutes remaining, UW scores the game's final 11 points to rally past No. 12 Michigan State 62-59 at the Kohl Center. Kammron Taylor's runner in the lane with 31 seconds left proved to be the game-winner.

March 25, 2005

Wisconsin came back from two 10-point deficits and got a game-high 22 points from Alando Tucker in defeating 10th-seeded N.C. State for its second trip to the Elite Eight in the past five years.

March 4, 2006

Alando Tucker scores 10 points in UW's Big Ten Conference finale against Iowa and becomes the first Badger to lead the league in scoring since Don Rehfeldt in 1950. Tucker averaged 20.0 points in 16 games.

March 12, 2006

Wisconsin is selected to make its eighthstraight appearance in the NCAA tournament.

Nov. 20, 2006

Brian Butch and Alando Tucker appear on the cover of *Sports Illustrated*, marking the first time UW has ever been featured on the cover of the magazine.

Dec. 16, 2006

Tucker and Butch both score 20 points in the first half as Wisconsin defeats No. 2-ranked Pitt, 89-75. It is just the third time in school history UW has beaten the No. 2 team in the country.

Dec. 18, 2006

The Badgers are ranked fourth in the Associated Press poll, the highest ranking in school history up to that point.

Jan. 15, 2007

The Badgers move up to second in the Associated Press poll, the highest ranking in school history up to that point.

Jan. 28, 2007

Wisconsin defeats Iowa, 57-46, to win its school-record 17th straight game. UW went 67 days without losing a game. The Badgers' 21-1 record is the best to start a season in school history.

Feb. 19, 2007

With a 26-2 record and a 12-1 mark in Big Ten play, UW is ranked No. 1 in the Associated Press poll for the first time in school history.

Feb. 25, 2007

For the first time in Big Ten history, the top two teams in the Associated Press Poll square off as No. 2 Ohio State defeats No. 1 Wisconsin 49-48 in Columbus.

March 6, 2007

Alando Tucker is named Big Ten Player of the Year. He is the sixth Badger to win the award and second in the last four years.

March 10, 2007

With his first basket against Illinois in the Big Ten tournament semifinal, Alando Tucker passes Michael Finley to become UW's all-time leading scorer. Tucker finishes his career with 2,217 points, ninth-best in Big Ten history.

March 12, 2007

Wisconsin is awarded a No. 2 seed in the Midwest Region of the 2007 NCAA Tournament. That is the highest seed in school history.

March 28, 2007

Head coach Bo Ryan receives the Adolph Rupp Cup as the National Coach of the Year from the Commonwealth Athletic Club of Kentucky. Five days later, Ryan is selected as the Clair Bee Coach of the Year.

March 31, 2007


Alando Tucker is announced as the winner of the 2007 Lowe's Senior Class Award, presented annually to college basketball's outstanding NCAA Division I senior student-athlete. Tucker also receives the NABC Career Achievement Award two days later. Tucker is the first Badger to win a national player of the year award since 1918.



Alando Tucker (shown above at the Wooden Award ceremony with Candace Parker) led UW to a school-record 30 victories while being named a consesnus first-team All-American and winning the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award in 2006-07.

Wisconsin defeated Purdue, 37-10, on March 15, 1907 to earn the program's first Big Ten championship. The Badgers won eight of their last nine games, including the final five at UW Field House. Wisconsin didn't allow more than 30 points in any contest and avenged its Big Ten losses at home against Minnesota and Chicago.




The 1911–12 Badgers became the first undefeated team in school history and the first of three UW teams to be crowned Helms Foundation National Champions. Along the way, the Badgers outscored their opponents by an average of over 17 points per game. UW survived an overtime scare at Minnesota and won at Illinois and Indiana to clinch the title.

1907-08 (10-2 Overall / 7-1 Big Ten)



The 1907-08 team led Wisconsin to back-to-back Big Ten titles for the first time in program history. Its 27-14 win against Illinois at the UW Field House clinched it. But after beating Chicago by 20 points earlier in the season, UW dropped back-to-back contests to the Maroons, including a two-point decision in the Big Ten title playoff game.

1912-13 (14-1 Overall / 11-1 Big Ten)



Wisconsin extended its winning streak to 29 games during the 1912–13 season before dropping the season finale at Chicago, 23-10. The 23 points were the most given up by UW that season. Wisconsin had won its previous 23 Big Ten contests.

For head coach Walter Meanwell it was the second of three consecutive Big Ten titles to begin his career at Wisconsin. Meanwell led UW to eight Big Ten titles in his 20 seasons with the program.

1913-14 (15-0 Overall / 12-0 Big Ten)

The 1913-14 season was highlighted by a 50-0 shutout of Parsons in game three followed by a one-point victory over Illinois in game four. The "perfect game" remains the only shutout in Big Ten basketball history.

This season marked the last time a Badger team went undefeated. Badger coach Walter Meanwell improved to 44-1 in his first three years at Wisconsin. For the second time in three years UW was named Helms Foundation National Champions.



Wisconsin won its third Helms Foundation National Championship in 1916. The Badgers won five road contests in a three-day span near the beginning of the season and avenged its only loss to Illinois with a 20-point win at the UW Field House.

1920-21 (13-4 Overall / 8-4 Big Ten)



UW coach Walter Meanwell began his second tenure with the Badgers by winning the program's eighth Big Ten title. Wisconsin lost two of its first three Big Ten contests, but finished 7-2 down the stretch. UW went 2-4 on the road in the Big Ten, but didn't lose a game all year at the UW Field House (9-0).

The Badgers shared the crown with Michigan and Purdue. UW did not play the Boilermakers and swept the season series from the Wolverines.

1922-23 (12-3 Overall / 11-1 Big Ten)



The 1922–23 squad won 11 of its final 12 ball games to grab a share of the Big Ten title. No Big Ten team managed to score more than 19 points against the Badgers. UW's only loss in Big Ten play was a 17-13 decision at Purdue. The Badgers downed the Boilermakers, 20-19, at the UW Field House later that season.

UW ended the 1923 season with seven consecutive victories, including a 35-17 win over Indiana in the season finale. That win was one of seven throughout the year in which Wisconsin scored twice as many points as its opponents.


Two losses to Michigan during the season couldn't prevent Wisconsin from winning its 11th Big Ten championship. The Badgers went 10-0 against the rest of the league, including a 6-0 mark in games decided by five points or less. This season marked the last of head coach Walter Meanwell's eight Big Ten titles. He would coach the next five seasons before handing the program over to Harold "Bud" Foster.

1934-35 (15-5 Overall / 9-3 Big Ten)



Harold "Bud" Foster helped Wisconsin win its fourth Big Ten title in a row following a coaching change at the beginning of the season. His Badger squad won seven of its final eight contests to grab a share of its 12th Big Ten championship. Along the way, UW earned four wins by two points or less and another by 10 in overtime. Two of the team's three losses came at the hands of Purdue, including a 43-24 decision in the season finale.

1940-41 (20-3 Overall / 11-1 Big Ten)



Led by a pair of All-Americans -- Gene Englund and John Kotz -- and a defensive-minded coach (Bud Foster) who taught a disciplined brand of basketball, Wisconsin won its only NCAA basketball title in 1941.

The Badgers opened the season with three straight wins, but dropped three of their next five games, including its conference opener against Minnesota. But UW won its last 15 games, including three in the NCAA tournament, capped by a five-point win over Washington State in the championship game played in Kansas City, Mo.

Glen Selbo's basket in the final seconds propelled the Badgers to a 50-49 win over Navy in the East Regional consolation game. Bobby Cook scored a game-high 21 points to lead Wisconsin.

To clinch a share of the 2002 Big Ten championship, Wisconsin had to win its last six regular-season games - something that hadn't been done since 1941. But a two-point, overtime win against 16th-ranked Ohio State ignited the Badgers and a 20-point win over Michigan at home sealed the deal for UW to hoist the Big Ten championship trophy for the first time in over 50 years.

Wisconsin earned the league's No. 1 seed in the conference tournament for the first time in school history. The Badgers also advanced to their fourth consecutive NCAA tournament, earning a No. 8 seed in the East Region.

Head Coach Bo Ryan recorded the most successful first year in Wisconsin basketball history. He became the 10th coach in conference history to win a league title in his first season and became the first Badger coach to be named Big Ten Coach of the Year. Ryan was also named national coach of the year by Collegeinsider. com.

Kirk Penney was a consensus first-team all-conference selection, just UW's fifth since 1948. He was UW's leading scorer at 15.1 points per game. Devin Harris, in his freshman season at Wisconsin, chipped in 12.3 points per game.

Among the memorable victories were a win at Michigan State (snapping the Spartans' 53-game home winning streak) and a win at Indiana (UW's first in Bloomington since 1977).



Wisconsin's five starters—Mike Wilkinson, Alando Tucker, Devin Harris, Freddie Owens and Kirk Penney—all averaged more than 10 points per game in a season in which the Badgers set a school record for victories (24) and posted its best winning percentage (.750) since 1949–50. UW earned the outright league championship for the first time since 1947, tied a school record with 12 Big Ten victories and won back-to-back Big Ten titles for the first time since 1923 and '24.

Head coach Bo Ryan became one of three coaches in league history to win conference titles in each of his first two seasons. The Badgers earned their highest seed in the NCAA tournament (No. 5) and advanced to the Sweet 16 before losing to top-ranked Kentucky in the Regional Semifinals.

Penney became the first Badger since 1952 to earn first-team honors in consecutive seasons. In his final year at Wisconsin, Penney



Harris made the gamewinning free throw against Illinois in the regular-season finale to clinch the title. Then against Tulsa in the NCAA tournament, the Badgers staged the greatest comeback in school history, rallying from 13 points down with 3:36 remaining to win 61-60.

The Badgers went 16-1 at home, winning their last 13 at the Kohl Center, the beginning of the longest home winning streak in school history (38 games).

Dartmouth scored the game's final four points, including a desperation field goal from near half-court as the final gun sounded. Englund and Kotz finished with 18 and 15 points, respectively, to lead the Badgers, while three-time Ivy League scoring champion Gus Broberg paced Dartmouth with 20 points.

The Cougars led 10-8 and 12-9, but the Badgers rallied to take a 13-12 lead on a pair of baskets by John Kotz and never trailed again. Wisconsin took a 21-17 lead to the locker room at halftime. Kirk Gebert scored Washington State's first three field goals in the second period to help the Cougars pull even at 24-24, but free throws by Kotz and Ted Strain and baskets by Gene Englund and Charles Epperson gave the Badgers a comfortable 30-24 lead. Gebert pitched in three more field goals to help the Cougars narrow the margin to 34-32, but the Badgers nailed down the title on a field goal by Kotz and a free throw by Strain. Englund had 13 points to pace the victors, while Kotz totaled 12 points and was selected tournament MVP. Gebert led the Cougars with a game-high 21 points. Wisconsin ended the season with a 20-3 record.






Georgia State 50, Wisconsin 49

Michael Finley, then a sophomore, scored 23 points to lead the Badgers and set a new school record for points in a season with 620. That record would stand until the 2004 season when Devin Harris scored 624 points. Wisconsin recovered from a 13-point deficit in the second half to take a 66-62 lead with seven minutes remaining. But Rice scored the next eight points and the final seven points to walk away with the victory. Adam Peakes made a steal and a layup to put the Owls up for good in the final minute. He finished with 16 points and six rebounds.



Wisconsin head coach Dick Bennett's rookie year in the Big Ten Conference ended with a 77-62 loss to Illinois State at the UW Field House. The much shorter Redbirds outrebounded the Badgers 40-32 and outshot Wisconsin 47.3% to 37.9%. Maurice Trotter's 19 points and Rico Hill's 15 points helped offset a 28point performance from UW forward Sam Okey. Okey was the only Badger to reach double figures. The rest of the team combined to shoot 28.9 percent (11-for-38) from the floor.

Penn State's Calvin Booth hit a 15-footer to give the Nittany Lions a 51-50 edge with 1:32 remaining, but freshman forward Maurice Linton nailed a nine-foot jumper with 3.7 seconds left to play and the 10th-seeded Badgers advanced with a 52-51 decision.

Wisconsin faced league champion Illinois in the second round and fell behind 26-10 at the half. The resilient Badgers, however, staged an incredible second-half comeback and took a 46-45 lead with 6:14 left to play before Illinois countered with an 11-0 run that finally put the game out of reach.

Wisconsin 74, Iowa 60

March 6

Michigan State 56, Wisconsin 41

Wisconsin took on Iowa in a quarterfinal game. After falling behind 25-23 at halftime, the Badgers shot a blistering .737 from the field in the second half and went on to win 74-60.

Just as they had the year before, the Badgers faced the league champion (this time Michigan State) in their second game. The teams played to a 22-22 tie after the first half, but the Badgers, who shot a then-season low .293 from the floor, scored only 19 points in the second half.

Figuring they needed at least one Big Ten tournament win to qualify for the NCAA tournament, the Badgers opened the league tourney with a 51-41 victory over Northwestern in the first round. UW led the Wildcats from start to finish.

Wisconsin then squared off against Purdue in the quarterfinals. The Badgers jumped out to a 10-point lead just two minutes into the game and never trailed.

UW then met Michigan State in the semifinals for the second straight season. Though the Spartans grabbed a 34-21 halftime lead, the Badgers made a run that cut the MSU lead to 49-44 with 5:29 remaining to play. The league-champion Spartans held UW to just two points the rest of the way.

2001 - Quarterfinalist

March 9

Indiana 64, Wisconsin 52

The Badgers got off to a nice start in their quarterfinal matchup with Indiana, pulling out to a 28-19 lead with 4:38 left in the first half. Indiana closed to within four points (28-24) at the break.

The Hoosiers maintained their momentum by beginning the second half on a 17-2 run. Wisconsin closed the IU lead to 54-49 with 2:04 remaining, but never again came closer than that.

2002 - Quarterfinalist

March 8

Iowa 58, Wisconsin 56

Wisconsin entered the 2002 Big Ten Tournament as the No. 1 seed for the first time in school history after winning a share of the Big Ten regular-season title.

UW held a 26-21 lead at halftime, but Iowa came back to grab a 39-37 lead with 10:14 to play. Though the Badgers led by six with 3:42 left, the Hawkeyes scored 10 of the final 12 points of the game to win.

2003 - Quarterfinalist

March 8

Ohio State 58, Wisconsin 50

For the second consecutive season, Wisconsin entered the Big Ten tournament as the No. 1 seed but lost in the quarterfinals. The Badgers fell to No. 8 seed Ohio State, 58-50.

UW struggled from the field for the entire game, connecting on just 18-53 shots (.340), its second-worst shooting performance of the season. Kirk Penney led Wisconsin with 14 points while Alando Tucker chipped in 13.

March 14

Wisconsin 70, Illinois 53

The Badgers swept through the 2004 tournament, earning their first conference tourney title.

Top-seeded UW faced No. 10 Minnesota in the quarterfinals and got a combined 43 points from Devin Harris and Mike Wilkinson to defeat the Gophers 66-52. A 10-0 run in the first half gave the Badgers a lead they would never relinquish.

No. 3 seed Michigan State was up next in the semifinals, the third meeting between the teams in 2004. Harris, who led all scorers with 21 points, made a late trey to put UW in front. MSU's Maurice Ager answered with a bucket but Wilkinson hit the 20-point plateau for the second straight day and put the Badgers ahead for good with two free throws with 49 seconds left.

UW opened the final vs. top-seeded Illinois with a 16-6 run and never led by less than seven points after that. In the semifinals, Alando Tucker banked in a running 3-pointer as time expired to lift Wisconsin over No. 7 seed Iowa. Tucker finished with 20 points while Morley chipped in with 17.

In a rematch of 2004's championship game, Illinois held off a late UW charge to claim the title. The Badgers trailed by as many 16 points in the second half and rallied to cut the Fighting Illini lead to five down the stretch,

but could get no closer. No Badger scored in double figures and the two teams combined to shoot .308 from the field.

A late 7-0 run by the Hoosiers put Indiana on top for good as Wisconsin couldn't get within four points the rest of the way. Alando Tucker led UW with 20 points despite spending most of the first half in foul trouble. Brian Butch just missed a double-double with 12 points and nine rebounds.

Behind eight points from Michael Flowers, No. 2 seed Wisconsin jumped out to a 10-0 lead against No. 7 Michigan State in the quarterfinals. The Badgers never looked back, getting 21 points from Alando Tucker on their way to a 13-point win.

UW put together another impressive performance in disposing of sixth-seeded Illinois in the semifinals. With Michael Finley's mother in attendance, Tucker became UW's all-time leading scorer with his first basket of the game. He again led all scorers with 21 points and Kammron Taylor added 16, 14 in the second half.

In the final, Wisconsin and No. 1 seed Ohio State matched up for the third time this season. The game was a defensive struggle and the Badgers trailed by just


FIRST ROUNDERS

Wisconsin has had seven first-round NBA draft choices through the years. Alando Tucker was the latest, going 29th overall to the Phoenix Suns in the 2007 draft. In 2004, Devin Harris became the highest Badger drafted since 1950 when the Washington Wizards selected him with the fifth overall pick. He was then traded to the Dallas Mavericks. Prior to that, the two most recent first-round selections were Paul Grant in 1997 and Michael Finley in 1995. Wes Matthews was a first-rounder in 1980, Albert Henry was chosen in the first round in 1970 and Don Rehfeldt was the second pick overall in 1950.

Michael Finley

Former Badger standout Michael Finley recently completed his 12th NBA season and second with the San Antonio Spurs, helping the Spurs win the 2007 NBA Title.

The two-time all-star played every regular-season game for the Spurs, starting 16 and averaging 9.0 points and 2.7 rebounds. During San Antonio's playoff run, Finley and his veteran presence were invaluable. He started all 20 playoff games, averaging 11.3 points and 2.9 rebounds while shooting .419 from 3-point range.




4.7 rebounds over his career (894 games). He led the NBA in minutes played in 1999-2000 and has averaged at least 38.0 minutes per game in seven of his 12 seasons.

Prior to signing with San Antonio, Finley played for the Dallas Mavericks for eight and a half seasons. He averaged better than 20.0 points per game in five of those seasons and was named to the NBA All-Star team in 1999-2000 and 2000-01.

Finley was drafted in the first round (21st overall) in the 1995 NBA Draft by the Phoenix Suns. He was named to the All-Rookie team in 1995-96 and finished third in the 1997 Slam Dunk Contest.

In 2002, he represented the USA at the World Basketball Championships in Indianapolis. There, he led Team USA in minutes (25.1 mpg) and free-throw percentage (19-22, .864) and was second on the squad with 13.0 points per game.





Devin Harris

After being named the Big Ten Player of the Year in his senior season at Wisconsin, Devin Harris was selected fifth overall by the Washington Wizards in the 2004 NBA Draft. He was traded later that day to the Dallas Mavericks and has had three successful seasons with the Mavs.

Last season Harris continued to show the improvement that made him one of the most dangerous players during the 2006 playoffs. After starting


playoffs. After starting just 23 games in his first two seasons combined, Harris started 61 in 2006–07 and averaged career highs in minutes, points, assists, rebounds, field goal percentage and free throw percentage. In the summer, Harris was rewarded with a five-year contract extension worth roughly \$42 million.

Despite missing more than 20 contests during the 2005–06 regular season with an injury, he returned in time for Dallas' magical run to the NBA Finals. Harris earned 15 starts during the post-season and was one of only three Dallas players to appear in all 23 games.

In his first four starts of the playoffs, and against Michael Finley's San Antonio Spurs, Harris averaged 19.3 points. He scored a career-high 30 in game one of the Western Conference Finals against the Phoenix Suns and started three games of the NBA Finals against the Miami Heat.

Harris started the first 19 games of the 2004–05 season for Dallas and was named the "got milk?" Western Conference Rookie of the Month for November.

That year, he played in 76 games during the regular season and averaged 5.7 points and 2.2 assists. He ranked second in the league in steals per 48 minutes (3.15).



Alando Tucker

This season, Wisconsin will add a third alum to the NBA as Alando Tucker starts his professional career with the Phoenix Suns. Tucker was drafted by Phoenix in the first round of the 2007 NBA Draft (29th overall).

In Summer League action, Tucker led Phoenix and ranked 15th in the league in scoring at 17.4 points per game. He started all five games and led the Suns in minutes played. Tucker scored at least 13 points in each game, recording a high of 29 (on 10-of-19 shooting) in the Suns' 104-101 overtime loss to Philadelphia.



In 2006-07, Tucker had one of the most remarkable seasons in UW history to cap off one of the most spectacular Badger careers. Tucker was a consensus first-team All-American and earned the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award as the nation's top senior student-athlete. The Big Ten Player of the Year, Tucker averaged 19.9 points and led Wisconsin to a school-record 30 wins.

Tucker is UW's all-time and single-season scoring leader. He also holds career records for field goals, free throws, free throw attempts, offensive rebounds, games started, games played and minutes played.

Rashard Griffith

The only Wisconsin Badger in the last 30 years to average a double-double for an entire season (17.2 ppg./10.8 rpg., 1994-95), Rashard Griffith continues to tour the professional leagues in Europe. He has played in Turkey, Israel, Spain and Italy and this season will play for perennial Romanian League champion CSU Asesoft Ploiesti.

Griffith became the highest paid rookie in the European league when he accepted a \$600,000 salary offer by Tofas Bursa prior to the 1996-97 season. He has remained in Europe ever since.

Griffith led Tofas Bursa to the 1997 Turkish National Championship. He was named the league's Most Valuable Player that season after averaging 17.9 points and 10.9 rebounds.

Griffith would go on to win six consecutive national titles, though not all of them came with Tofas Bursa. He added an Israeli national championship, two Italian national championships and two more Turkish titles in the following years.

From 1996–2003, over a span of seven seasons, Griffith scored over 2,800 points, pulled down over 1,800 rebounds and shot over 60 percent from the field.



Kirk Penney

Kirk Penney left Wisconsin as a twotime first-team All-Big Ten selection and sixth-leading scorer in school history. Now eighth on the all-time scoring list, Penney has been playing professional basketball for the past four years.

Penney has had brief stints in the NBA with both the Miami Heat and Los Angeles Clippers. In 2004–05, Penney earned honorable mention all-league while playing for the Asheville Altitude in the NBA's Developmental League.

This year, Penney has returned to his native New Zealand and will play for the Harvey Norman Breakers

of the NBL. Last season, Penney played for Zalgiris Kaunas, the Lithuanian Federation Cup champion, and was named a Baltic League All-Star. Penney also played for Alba Berlin in 2007, the German regular season champions. In 2005-06, Penney played in Israel for Maccabi Tel Aviv, one of the top pro teams in Europe.

Penney has played extensively for his home country New Zealand in international play, including two Olympic Games appearances and two World Basketball Championships. Penney led New Zealand in scoring during the 2006 World Championships, averaging 13.7 points.



Mike Wilkinson

After playing with the Utah Jazz summer camp following his graduation from Wisconsin, Mike Wilkinson signed with Aris B.S.A. Basketball Club in Thessaloniki, Greece where he played two seasons.

Wilkinson averaged 11 points and was the leading rebounder (6.2 rpg.) on a team that finished 15-11 and advanced to the ULEB Cup Final in 2006. Last year Wilkinson averaged 12.3 points and 5.9 rebounds as Aris advanced to the Euroleague Top 16.

This summer Wilkinson signed with Khimki Moscow Region in Russia

and is teammates with former Duke star Daniel Ewing.

Wilkinson was a first-team All-Big Ten selection during his senior year at Wisconsin. In 2005, he helped lead UW to a school-record tying 25 wins and a spot in the NCAA tournament Elite Eight. He finished his career ranked among the top 10 in UW history in 11 categories including sixth on the school's all-time scoring list and third on the career rebounding list.



Zach Morley

Zach Morley is beginning his third season in Spain. This year he will suit up for Leche Rio Breogan Lugo after two seasons with Aguas De Valencia-Gandia.

Morley helped lead Gandia to a runner-up finish at the 2006 LEB2 Championships in Spain. Morley was the second leading scorer and rebounder on a team that finished 21-9 during the regular season. He averaged 14.1 points and 6.1 rebounds with the team while shooting 55 percent from the floor. Last year, Morley averaged 14.2 points and 7.0

rebounds.

Morley averaged 8.1 points and 6.3 rebounds in his two season with the Badgers. He was named to the Big Ten All-Tournament Team in his senior season of 2005 and helped UW advance to the NCAA tournament Elite Eight.



Andreas Helmigk

Andreas Helmigk is making a name for himself in his native Austria. Helmigk was an all-star last season as his team, Allianz Swans Gmunden, won the Austrian League championship.

In 2005–06 Helmigk played for Worthersee Piraten and was named to Eurobasket.com's All-Domestic Team. He had also played for Worthersee prior to attending UW, playing just the first and third quarters in order to retain his amateur status.





2006-07 Season Review



Alando Tucker set the UW career and singleseason scoring records last season on his way to becoming a consensus first-team All-American.

- UW won school-record 13 Big Ten games. The former record was 12 conference victories, set in 1912 and tied in 1914, 2003 and 2004. Wisconsin has won 68 league games over the past six seasons, trailing only Illinois (70) among Big Ten teams.
- The Badgers' record (13-3) was good for second place in the conference. That is the fourth time in Bo Ryan's six seasons that UW has finished either first or second in the league. From 1963-2001, Wisconsin's best Big Ten finish was a tie for third.
- This is the fifth time in six seasons under Bo Ryan that UW has won at least 11 Big Ten games. Prior to 2001-02, Ryan's first season, Wisconsin had reached 11 conference wins just seven times in 97 previous league campaigns.
- UW earned its ninth straight bid to the NCAA tournament in 2007, a schoolrecord. Michigan State is the only other Big Ten team that has been to the NCAA tournament nine straight years. The Badgers are one of nine teams to make their ninth straight tourney appearance in 2007. The others were: Arizona, Duke, Florida, Gonzaga, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan State and Texas.

The Badgers won a school-record 30 games last season, surpassing the former record by five games. UW was one of just nine teams in the country to win at least 30 games last season and its .833 winning percentage was ninth-best in Division I.

• The No. 2 seed Wisconsin received in the NCAA tournament was the highest in school history, surpassing the fifth seed UW earned in 1999 and 2003. The Badgers are 8-6 in the NCAA tournament under Bo Ryan with first-round wins in five of his six seasons.

-

- The Badgers were ranked in the Associated Press Top 10 for 17 weeks last year, including the last 14 in a row. Heading into 2006-07, UW had spent a total of six weeks in the A.P. top 10 in school history.
- UW won a school-record 17 consecutive games from Nov. 24-Jan. 31. That is the longest single-season streak in school history and was tied for the third-longest in the country last season.
- For the third time in the last four years, the Badgers advanced to the Big Ten tournament final. After going 4-6 in the first six years of the tournament, UW is 7-3 over the last four years. The Badgers defeated Michigan State and Illinois before losing to No. 1 Ohio State in the final. Seniors Alando Tucker and Kammron Taylor were named to the all-tournament team.
- UW ended the season with 22 consecutive home wins, the fifth-longest active streak in the country. In six seasons under Bo Ryan, the Badgers are 91-5 in the Kohl Center, the third-best home record in the country. In Big Ten home games, UW is 46-2 under Ryan.
- The Badgers went 19-0 at home last season, a school record for home wins in a season. It was the second undefeated home campaign for UW under Bo Ryan. Wisconsin went 15-0 at the Kohl Center in 2003-04. That was UW's first undefeated home season since 1929-30.
- Senior Alando Tucker was named a firstteam All-American by the Associated Press, NABC, USBWA, ESPN.com, Sl.com and

The Sporting News. He is just the third UW player to earn consensus first-team All-America honors, joining Gene Englund (1941) and John Kotz (1942).

- With his first basket against Illinois in the semifinals of the Big Ten tournament, Tucker passed Michael Finley to become Wisconsin's all-time leading scorer. Tucker finished with 2,217 career points, fifth-best among active players and ninth in Big Ten history.
- Tucker became the first Badger player since 1918 (when William Chandler was named Helms Foundation Player of the Year) to earn a national player of the year award when he won the 2006-07 Lowe's Senior CLASS Award. The honor is presented annually to the nation's top senior. Tucker was also a finalist for every national Player of the Year award (Wooden, Naismith, Rupp, USBWA, NABC).
- Bo Ryan became the first Wisconsin men's basketball coach to win national Coach of the Year honors when he received both the Adolph Rupp Cup and the Clair Bee Award at the 2007 Final Four.
- Alando Tucker was named the Big Ten Player of the Year by both the media and the coaches. Tucker is just the sixth Badger to win the award, but the second in the last four years (Devin Harris won in 2004).

Wisconsin was ranked No. 1 in the Feb. 19 Associated Press poll, the first time in school history it claimed the top spot. UW was the first Big Ten team to lead the A.P. poll since Illinois in 2004–05.

- Three other Badgers were honored when the Big Ten announced its awards. Senior guard Kammron Taylor was a consensus second-team all-conference selection while juniors Brian Butch (coaches) and Michael Flowers (media) earned honorable mention. Flowers was also selected to the coaches' All-Defensive Team.
- Wisconsin has won at least 24 games in four of the last five seasons. Prior to the 2002-03 season, UW had never won more than 22 games. The Badgers' 123 victories over the last five seasons are tied for 15thmost in the country over that span.

Coverage Guidelines

Game Credentials

Wisconsin uses an online credentialing system for both men's basketball and football. For instructions on how to use the online system, please contact Anne Franken in the UW Athletic Communications Office (608-262-1811). No emailed, faxed, mailed or telephone requests for credentials will be accepted. Upon receipt of applications, appropriate credentials are either mailed, or made available at the Athletic Communications Office or with the parking attendant (white vehicle) at the entrance to Lot 91 off of Bedford Street, just east of the Kohl Center.

Credentials will be issued according to the following priority guidelines:

1) National publications and newspapers filing for the following day's publication.

2) Newspapers designated by the visiting sports information director. 3) Television and radio stations originating a live broadcast. 4) Television and radio stations covering for nightly news. 5) All other requests will be evaluated on a space-available basis, with preferences given to those who regularly cover Wisconsin basketball.

Spouses, dates, children and other non-workers are not allowed in any of the media areas.

Scouting Tickets

As per Big Ten policy, professional basketball scouts must purchase tickets through the UW Ticket Office (1-800-GO-BADGERS or 608-262-1440).

Parking

A limited number of media parking passes are available. They will be issued on a priority basis similar to the guidelines for the issuance of credentials. Media parking at the Kohl Center is on the East side of the building along Frances Street as well as in Lot 91 and lot 46 (corner of Frances and Johnson). The media entrance is on the northeast corner of the Kohl Center.

Visiting Radio

Each visiting radio station admitted for broadcast should contact the UW Athletic Communications Office at least one week prior to the game they wish to cover. If credentials are not mailed, they may be picked up at the Athletic Communications Office. Visiting radio talent works from a courtside location at the Kohl Center.

Photographers

The University of Wisconsin follows NCAA and Big Ten guidelines regarding event photography. Floor photo passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service and television photographers. Photographers must display their credentials prominently at all times and must work from either the southeast or northwest corners of the baseline. Photographers are not permitted along the length of the floor.

Practice Coverage

Wisconsin basketball practices for the fall semester will run from approximately 4:30-7 p.m. Practice will be open to the media after 6 p.m. Members of the media

are asked to watch Kohl Center practices from the arena seats and practices in the Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion from the designated seating on the south side of the facility. Still and video photographers shooting practice are asked to remain off the court, on the baselines, and away from the vicinity of workouts. Gameday practice sessions are closed.

Player Interviews

Badger players are normally available for interviews after practices once before each game during the season.

All interviews should be arranged through the Athletic Communications Office. Please contact Brian Lucas at 608-263-5052 or prior to the end of practice to secure interviews. No interviews will be granted the day of a game, with the exception of postgame interviews.

Players' telephone numbers will not be made available to the media, and players have been instructed not to conduct interviews when contacted by phone without prior approval from a member of the Athletic Communications Office. For outof-town reporters, requests for telephone interviews may be made with Brian Lucas of the Athletic Communications Office.

Coach Ryan Interviews

Head coach Bo Ryan will normally be available for interviews for approximately 15-20 minutes after practice.

Additionally, Ryan holds a weekly media conference throughout the season. These sessions are generally at 12:30 p.m. in the media room at the Kohl Center. Live video streaming of these press conferences will be available on the UW athletic department web site, uwbadgers.com.

Contact Brian Lucas in the Athletic Communications Office to arrange an interview with Bo Ryan.

Big Ten Teleconference

The Big Ten will hold a weekly teleconference with the league's head coaches beginning in December. Coach Ryan will be available on this teleconference between 10:10-10:20 a.m. Contact Brian Lucas or the Big Ten Conference (847-696-1010) for details.

Press Row Services

The primary working area (approximately 40 seats) for the media at the Kohl Center is located on the second level (Section 208) on the east side of the floor. There also is



an auxiliary media area in Section 210 of the Kohl Center that can accommodate an additional 20 seats. Television and radio broadcasters all work from the court level location.

Media are provided with several statistics monitors. Halftime boxes and play-byplay are delivered to both working media locations by the Athletic Communications staff.

Media Workroom

The Kohl Center provides a large media workroom that contains the following:

- postgame interview area
- numerous working locations from which media can file stories
- · platform for video cameras
- · copy machine
- pre-game dining area
- kitchenette area where a pregame meal is served

Pregame notes, statistics and game programs are also available in the workroom.

Media may store personal belongings in the workroom from the time they arrive at the Kohl Center until after the game.

The workroom is located at the northeast corner of the arena with access to and from the press areas. To access the workroom from outside the arena, just enter through the media gate and proceed down the stairs on your right.

Telephones

All requests for installation of phone lines should be made to Dominic Osterhaus at the Kohl Center (608-265-8546). Cost per line per event is \$100 (\$140 for an unrestricted analog line or an ISDN line). Seating locations are determined by the UW Athletic Communications Office. Several courtesy phones in the media room will be made available by the UW Athletic Communications Office.

Head coaches and selected players will be made available in the media workroom's interview area following each home game. Generally, the visiting coach and/or players will be available first, followed by Badger coach Bo Ryan and Wisconsin players.

Contact Brian Lucas of the Athletic Communications Office for postgame procedures on the road (vary from school to school). The Wisconsin locker room is closed to the media at home and on the road.




Student Life





hancellor John D. Wiley has more than four decades of experience with the University of Wisconsin-Madison, having been a graduate student, a professor, and an administrator during his illustrious university career. Assuming office on January 1, 2001, he is the 27th person to lead the university since its founding in 1848.


As UW-Madison's chief executive officer, Wiley is responsible for the overall vision and direction of the university. A prominent figure in higher education, he chairs both the Big Ten Council of Presidents and Chancellors and the board for the Council on Higher Education Accreditation, and is a member of the

National Security Higher Education Advisory Committee. He also serves on several local and community boards, including the William T. Evjue Foundation and the Greater Madison Chamber of Commerce. He also has been deeply involved in fundraising from individual and corporate donors and charitable foundations.

From 1994–2000, Wiley served as UW–Madison's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. In this role as the university's chief operating officer and deputy chancellor, he worked closely with deans, faculty, academic staff, and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution. Prior to becoming provost, he was dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer, and from 1986–89, he served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at UW–Madison as a National Science Foundation Fellow, receiving master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968–74, and then spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Joining the UW–Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975, Wiley began a productive career in teaching and research, focusing on topics related to




semiconductors and other materials and processes important to the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers, including the Center for X-ray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982–86, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.



Director of Athletics Barry Alvarez



arry Alvarez is in his fourth year as Director of Athletics at the University of Wisconsin and second without the additional title of head football coach. Alvarez, who began his career as athletic director in April of 2004, served as athletic director and football coach in 2004–05 and in 2005–06.

Alvarez's first year as Director of Athletics (without the football duties) was a memorable one as Wisconsin won four national titles (men's cross country, men's and women's hockey and women's lightweight rowing) during the 2005–06 athletic campaign. The Badgers also won five conference titles.

The UW maintained its winning ways in 2006-07 with the men's track and field team winning its first NCAA title. The women's hockey team repeated as NCAA champions as Wisconsin finished 16th in the Directors' Cup rankings.

Badger student-athletes also showed their capabilities off the field of play during the fall of 2007 when they registered the highest cumulative grade point average for a fall term in department history. Thirteen teams also finished with record high grade point averages for either the fall or spring semester.

Alvarez guided Wisconsin's football fortunes for 16 seasons (1990–2005). He has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison. He piloted Wisconsin to three Big Ten and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998–99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (118-73-4 record)

Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one con-


ference institution. His 8-3 (.727) record in bowl games with the Badgers is the best in college football history (among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances). The 2004 AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year, he also was the 1993 national coach of the year, a two-time (1993 and 1998) Big Ten coach of the year and a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

Alvarez is a 1969 graduate of the University of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003

Alvarez and his wife, are co-campaign chairs in the effort to bring a Gilda's Club, a free support center for families dealing with cancer, to Madison. Alvarez also serves on the board of directors for the MACC Fund (Mideast Athletes Against Childhood Cancer).

Executive Senior Associate Shawn M. Eichorst


Shawn M. Eichorst is in his second year as senior associate athletic director. Eichorst's responsibilities include oversight of men's basketball, academic services, compliance, legal and contractual matters as well as liaison with UW campus administration, the Athletic Board, the Big Ten Conference and state government.

Vince Sweeney, senior associate athletic director for external relations, has been part of the UW Athletic Department's administrative team for 17 years. Associate Director Marija Pientka

Marija Pientka, who has directed the operations of the Badger Fund since its inception, was promoted to associate athletic director for development in 2006. In addition to overseeing the department's fundraising and development activities, including the Badger Fund, she also supervises men's and women's tennis and the spirit squad and serves as the liaison with the Wisconsin Alumni Association.

A Winning Athletic Program

n 2006-07, the University of Wisconsin continued its winning ways, claiming two NCAA championships. The Badgers also added two individual national titles and won four conference crowns.

Wisconsin won the 2007 NCAA Indoor Men's Track & Field Championship, crowning the first national title for a UW track and field team. The title was also the first-ever for a Big Ten Conference team.

Senior Chris Solinsky earned two individual national titles in 2007. He won the 5,000 meters at the NCAA indoor championships and claimed his second consecutive title in the 5,000 meters at the NCAA outdoor championships.

The women's hockey team became the first UW program to repeat as NCAA champions since 1985 when it won the 2007 title. The Badgers claimed their second straight title, becoming the third school to repeat at national champions.

Wisconsin also won Big Ten titles in men's cross country, men's indoor track and field and men's outdoor track and field as well as the WCHA title in women's hockey.

Five UW programs also set records for most wins in a season—men's basketball (30), women's basketball (23), football (12), women's hockey (36) and wrestling (19).





NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP HOSTS















Since 1993, the UW has hosted six NCAA championships and one NCAA men's basketball regional. Madison will also be the site of a hockey regional in 2008.

The Badgers played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey Frozen Four in 1993, 1997 and 2006. All three events were sellouts including the 2006 crowd that saw Wisconsin win the national title.

Wisconsin played host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1993 and 1998. The Badgers shattered the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event both years.

The UW was also the site of the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship. The event was the first national championship held at

University Ridge Golf Course and the first women's championship shown live on national television.

The NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament came to Wisconsin in 2002 when the Badgers played host to a regional in the Kohl Center.

Wisconsin Traditions

Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

This is the Big Ten Conference



The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission.

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide approximately \$94 million in direct financial aid to more than 8,400 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

Big Ten Universities

- are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.
- have more than four million living alumni and over 300,000 undergraduate students attending Big Ten universities.
- house on their campuses 10 of the nation's 35 largest academic libraries. Collectively, conference libraries hold nearly 70 million bound volumes and the institutions work collaboratively to build and share their resources with other league members.

Big Ten Athletics

• Over the past two years, the Big Ten has reached a series of milestone media agreements to provide the conference with its greatest television exposure ever, including extensions with CBS (for basketball) and ABC/ESPN (for football, basketball and volleyball) and the creation of the Big Ten Network, a national network devoted to Big Ten athletic and academic programs.

The Big Ten Network operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year since it launched in August of 2007. It will showcase a wide array of sports as well as original programming produced by conference institutions and represents a 20-year partnership between the Big Ten and Fox. The conference's new media agreements will result in the broadcast of more than 500 events nationally and regionally beginning with the 2007-08 academic year, compared to 300 events in the final year of the previous agreements.

- Since 1992, the Big Ten has created in excess of 2,000 new opportunities for women student-athletes and established 28 new women's teams.
- The NCAA collects two types of graduation rates—the federal graduation rate, which accounts for all entering freshmen who receive aid and graduate within six years. and the Graduation Success Rate (GSR), which reflects the mobility of student-athletes by accounting for transfers. Based on the most recent federal graduation rate average for the 1996-99 entering freshmen classes, Big Ten student-athletes graduated at 71 percent. In comparison, the student body at conference institutions graduated at 73 percent while all Division I studentathletes graduated at 62 percent. The Big Ten's GSR was 82 percent compared to the Division I average of 77 percent.
- The Big Ten recognized 2,018 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2006–07 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged more than 1,800 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.

BIG TEN NETWORK

Launched in August 2007, the Big Ten Network is dedicated to covering the Big Ten Conference and its 11 member institutions.

The Big Ten Network will provide unprecedented access to an extensive schedule of conference sports events and shows; original programs in academics, the arts and sciences; campus activities; and associated personalities. Sports programming will include live coverage of more major men's and women's events than ever before, along with news, highlights and analysis, all complemented by hours of university-produced campus programming.

The network is available to all cable and satellite carriers and television distributors nationwide, with most programs offered in stunning high-definition television. The Big Ten Network is a joint venture between subsidiaries of the Big Ten Conference and Fox Cable Networks.



- The Big Ten claimed seven team national championships during the 2006-07 season, just one shy of the conference record of eight national titles established during the 1955-56 campaign, while also finishing as the runner-up in five other sports. The Big Ten has earned at least four national crowns in eight of the last 10 seasons. Big Ten national champions in 2006-07 included Michigan State men's ice hockey, Minnesota wrestling, Northwestern women's lacrosse, Penn State fencing and men's gymnastics and Wisconsin women's ice hockey and men's indoor track and field. The conference has also produced team national crowns in the sports of basketball, cross country, field hockey, football, golf, soccer, softball, synchronized swimming, tennis and volleyball over the last decade.
- Big Ten Conference schools are among the national attendance leaders in football, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball. During 2006–07, more than 8.7 million fans attended Big Ten home contests in those sports.




Did You Know?


- ▶ Madison is one of only a few cities in the world built on an isthmus. Downtown Madison is set on a narrow strip of land between two glacial lakes—Lake Mendota and Lake Monona. A total of five area lakes, plus more than 250 parks and 120 miles of designated bike routes within the city limits provide an abundance of year-round outdoor activities, from hiking, biking, swimming and sailing to cross-country skiing, ice skating, and ice fishing.
- ➤ The Wisconsin State Capitol is the city's signature landmark. No building in Madison may be built higher than the 284-foot white granite dome of the Capitol, which is modeled after our nation's Capitol.
- ▶ State Street, a one-mile pedestrian mall linking the Capitol Square to the beautiful lakeside campus of the University of Wisconsin, is lined with diverse ethnic eateries, eclectic boutiques, galleries, coffeehouses and more.
- ▶ Famed architect Frank Lloyd Wright spent his childhood years in Madison and returned to live in the area at the height of his international fame. The Madison area is home to a generous selection of Wright-designed buildings.
- ▶ Ecologist Aldo Leopold, conservation pioneer John Muir, play-wright Thornton Wilder, novelist Jacquelyn Mitchard, actor/comedian Chris Farley, Olympians Beth and Eric Heiden, composer/performer Ben Sidran, professional golfers Jerry Kelly, Sherri Steinhauer and Steve Stricker and NASCAR's Matt Kenseth are other notable people associated with Madison.
