**STAN WATTS, Head Coach**

Brigham Young University has enjoyed an overflowing of basketball fame in recent years, and a healthy share of the credit for such deserving distinctions must be given Stan Watts. In Stan's eyes basketball coaching is a fine art, and he gives it the same artistic devotion. It has been eight years since he took over the coaching duties at BYU, and his teams have been a regular part of the national picture.

In the short span of seven seasons, BYU teams coached by Stan have: (1) won a National Invitational Tournament title, (2) produced two Skyline champions and (3) have yet to finish below third place in the MSAC basketball standings. Coach Watts' well-drilled teams have never lost more games than they have won in any season of play. In fact, Stan is one of seven coaches in the country to win over 100 games his first five years of college coaching.

Stan started his career at Murnay High School (Utah) where he was an all-around star. He continued his education at Weber Junior College where he was a standout performer in the major sports. Stan transferred to BYU in 1936, and before he had graduated two years later, had garnered two letters each in football, basketball, and track. In 1938 he was awarded a trophy as the outstanding athlete at BYU for that year.

Following graduation, Coach Watts was named to the coaching staff at Millard County High School. A second move found him at Dixie Junior College, and later he was appointed head basketball coach at Jor-

dan High. He was at Jordan for only two seasons, but his cage teams tied for the Big Nine championship both years.

In 1947 he came to BYU as freshman coach of both football and basketball. A year later he was made assistant basketball coach and assistant director of athletics. In 1949 he succeeded Floyd Millet as head basketball coach.

At the present time he is District Seven representative on the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee and a member of the National Basketball Board. He has penned several articles on the game, and his penetrating observation has been put to special use at several basketball clinics.

### BOB BUNKER, Assistant Coach

Last fall Bob Bunker was appointed assistant basketball coach and freshman basketball coach, the latter is a post he has held for the last four seasons.

Bob is a Utah State graduate (1937) and captained the Aggies' conference football champions in 1936. He also won his share of honors on the USAC basketball court. Following graduation he joined the coaching staff at South Cache High School.

During World War II he served more than five years in the Army. He was commissioned a captain and served overseas in the European Theatre of Operations.

Bob returned to coaching after the war, taking a post as basketball coach at Preston High School (Idaho). Between 1947 and 1949, Coach Bunker's teams won a state championship (1945) and finished second in the state finals (1947).

Coach Bunker came to BYU in 1949 as assistant football coach to Charles "Chick" Atkinson. He held this post until he was appointed assistant basketball coach last year.

## The Outlook:

### CATS MEASURE SHORT

The 1956-57 season at Brigham Young is one of those infrequent years when BYU cage fortunes temporarily dip for rebuilding purposes. This anticipated drop below par is accompanied by the usual shortages. There is a shortage of veteran lettermen, of tested personnel, of height, and other ingredients necessary for a front-runner. Consequently the Cougars aren't expected to floor a team that is a threat in the accepted sense.

Coach Stan Watts, who has yet to come up with more losses than wins in seven seasons at BYU, faces some major personnel problems. Graduation took the heart out of the team that finished in second place last year. Powering the Brighams last year were such standouts as Terry Tebbs, Little All-American who averaged 20 points a game; Herschel "Soup" Pedersen, the Y's 6-6 pivot ace; Ed Pinegar, Blaine Anderson, Dave Lewis and other key players. With these boys gone, the Cats must fill a most prodigious void.

Another problem Watts is wrestling with is height. While most of the major college teams in the country are snaring taller players, the Cougar timber seems to be dropping off. It's likely Stan's starting five will average 6-11/2, which indicates the Brighams may be in for a beating on the boards.

Stan will have only six returned lettermen to work with, and the distribution favors the forward position. John Benson (6-4), Lynn Rowe (6-3 1/2), Jack Anderson (6-6), and Hal Jensen (6-3) are all concentrated at forward. While there is good depth and height here, Benson is the only regular, and he could be headed for all-conference honors. A tremendous rebounder, Benson holds the current fieldhouse rebounding record with 26 recoveries in one game. Harry Anderson (5-11) and Tom Steinke (5-10) are the only letter winners at guard, and the center spot is without a letterman. Three sophomores will be vying for the pivot.

Another indication of the moulding job necessary is seen in the fact that 10 players or more than half the number on the 1957 roster, are sophomores.

The large turnover in personnel may also change the team's offensive pace. With Tebbs out of the picture, Stan may be forced to modify the fast break that had the Cougars scoring 77.2 points a game (a record high) last season. Without the height to control the boards, the Cats may lean more to a control game.

Coach Stan Watts has never had a team finish below third place in the Skyline standings, but the exception may take place in '57.

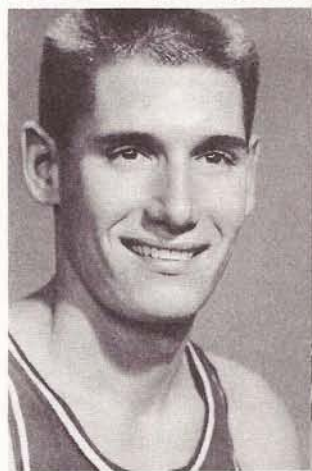

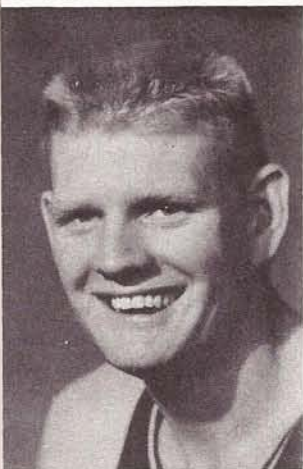
## PLAYER PROFILES
