OUTLOOK

For the third straight, frustrating season Stan Watts is confronted with another "building year" . . . and he must fashion this year's squad from relatively green timber.

What happened to the members of last year's fourth place club (15-11 record for the season) and the would-be-members of Watts' '60 unit?

Three of the five starters for '59—Roy Thacker, 6-5 center; John Nicoll, 6-5 all-conference forward; and 6-2 guard Mac Madsen—graduated. The team's most prolific scorer, 6-5 forward Bob Skousen (462 points, 17.7 scoring average) accepted a mission call and is now in Australia. Two reserve guards are also in the mission field, and Timo Lampen, the Finnish frosh star who figured as a starter at forward, remained in his homeland to help his country's Olympic team.

Only two players who can lay claim to regular or semi-regular service last year are back for '60. Guard Gary Earnest, who tallied 360 points as a sophomore last year, and Dave Eastis, hook-shooting pivot man, form the experience backbone of the club. Earnest is one of the smoothest, most versatile players in the league, while Eastis is the workhorse-type center who combines dedication with great ability.

If Earnest and Eastis hold their present positions, and there is every indication they will, the Cougars will have only three positions to fill on the starting five.

There are three other lettermen on the squad—Frank Berrett, Bert Myers and Valoy Eaton, but they didn't log much playing time in '59. The rest of the team is made up of transfers and sophomores.

There are only three seniors listed on Watts' 20-man roster, and there may be fewer than that by the time the season starts. The reserves carried over from last year, however, may blossom forth now that there are some vacancies to fill.

Since the battle for positions is wide open at this writing, we won't bother to list the candidates.

Team speed should be better than last year, but experience could prove to be a major soft spot for the Cougars. Overall height is below average, since all of the taller players are only sophomores. The club's ability to score is still a question, but it's unlikely it will be able to match the 41 per cent field goal shooting of the '59 team.

If BYU can somehow come up with a clicking first unit, plus some dependable reserves, there's a chance Watts & Company may knock over a few teams. But with the schedule they've got this year, they'll do very well to break even in their 26 games.

By way of summary: if the Cougars are to take any prizes this year, they will have to do it the hard way.

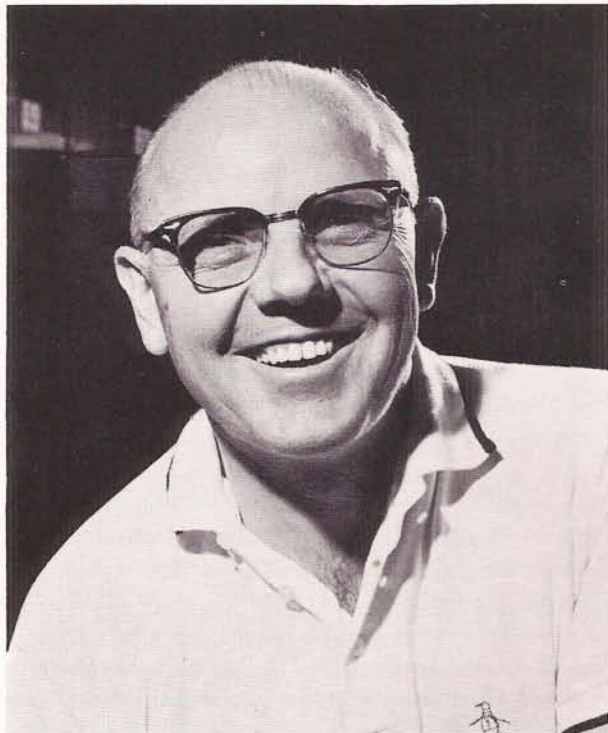

STAN WATTS



Basketball and Stan Watts are one and the same thing at Brigham Young University. The sedate, gentlemanly roundman at BYU, in the eyes of fans and critics alike, is the head and heart of the school's basketball tradition. He is respected not only for his knowledge of the game, but for his accepted position in the ranks of the coaching profession.

Watts, the dean of Skyline coaches, is now in his 11th season with the Cougars, and he has yet to know a losing season. In fact, he has never finished out of the first division in the ten, rugged winters his teams have been competing on the conference hardwoods.

Stan is one of seven coaches in the country to win over 100 games in his first five years of college ball, and the trophy case in the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse contains one NIT championship cup and three conference title trophies.

The Watts-coached clubs at BYU have always been colorful and offensively-geared to good basketball. Stan handpicks his own schedule, and a year seldom passes but what the Cougars' don't touch both coasts, seeking out the best competition in the country. This year's schedule is a good example of the calibre of opponents the Brighams are after.

Stan began his own athletic career at Murray High

School, where he was an outstanding prep athlete. Later he enrolled at Weber Junior College in Ogden, Utah, where he won letters in all of the major sports. In 1936 he transferred to BYU, a school where he was destined to play an important role in Cougars' future athletic program. Before he graduated in 1938, he won two letters each in football, basketball and track. He climaxed his career in college by winning the trophy given the outstanding senior athlete.

Watts first stop as coach was at Millard County High School, and a second move took him to Dixie Junior College in St. George. Later he was appointed head basketball coach at Jordan High in Salt Lake County. In two seasons with the Beetdiggers his cage teams tied for the Big Nine championship.

In 1946 he came to BYU as freshman coach of both football and basketball. A short time later he was named assistant basketball coach and assistant director of athletics. And in 1949 he succeeded Floyd Millett as varsity basketball coach.

Stan has held several executive positions related to college basketball, and he has been the featured guest at several basketball clinics. He is a prolific writer of specialized articles on the cage game, and just recently had a book published on offensive basketball.

One of Watts' proudest moments came three years ago when the Cougars overcame several major obstacles to win the conference championship. As a result Stan was named "Coach of the Year" in the mountain league.

Coach of the University's successful freshman basketball teams for the past four years, Bob Bunker joins the varsity staff this season as an assistant to Star Watts. Part of his new assignment will be to coach a junior varsity squad for the Cougars.

Coach Bunker was appointed frosh coach four years ago, although he had been working with the first-year squads for some time. He enjoyed several successful seasons, and in a two-year span his teams lost only three games.

Bob, a very likeable, warm personality, graduated from Utah State University in 1936. While at Logan he captained the Aggies' conference football champions and was a key player on the Ag basketball court.

Coach Bunker's first coaching assignment was at South Cache High School in Northern Utah. During World War II he served five years in the Army. He was commissioned a captain and served overseas in the European Theatre of Operations, and he is still active in the Reserves.

Following the war, Bob returned to coaching. He was head basketball, football and track coach at Preston High (Idaho). Between 1945 and 1949 his teams won a state championship and finished second in the state finals.

Coach Bunker came to BYU in 1949 as an assistant football coach to Charles "Chick" Atkinson. He was a member of the football staff until 1956, when he was appointed to the Cougars' basketball staff.

Another campus figure who has been associated closely with BYU basketball is Alan "Pete" Witbeck, who is taking over the freshman coaching duties this season. Pete steps into the coaching assignment previously held by Bob Bunker.

Prior to the 1959-60 season Pete's main chore on the staff was that of scouting BYU's cage opponents, a job he did with keen-eyed dedication.

Witbeck is a faculty member in the department of physical education within the College of Recreation, Health and Physical Education, and Athletics. His main area of instruction has been in the area of skills for majors.

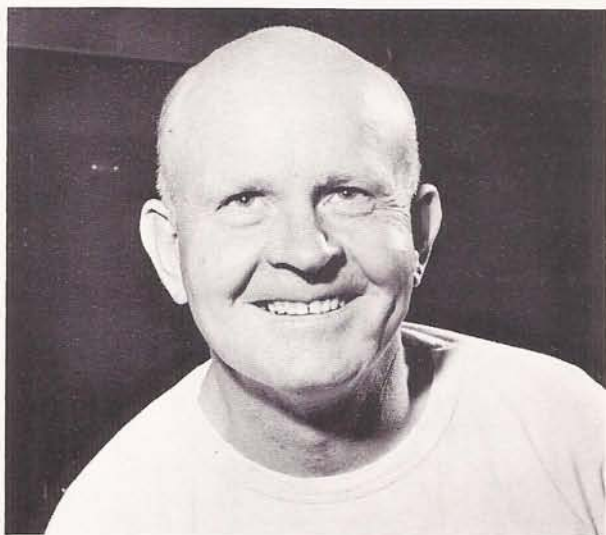
Pete lettered in track at BYU as a distance runner, and his coaching experience includes teams in industrial and amateur leagues in Utah.
