

ON THE COVER

Flanking head varsity coach Stan Watts are two forwards who could make a big difference in the 1961-62 season for the Cougars. They are (left) Bob Skousen, 6-4 junior from Mesa, Ariz., and Bruce Burton, 6-4 junior from Lomita, Calif.

Skousen recently returned from Australia, where he served a mission call for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Bob set a sophomore scoring record at BYU before he left on his mission, and it now appears he has returned with same touch intact.

Burton, a southpaw, was a regular on last year's club which finished the season with 15-11 record. Bruce scored consistently last year, was an excellent rebounder for the Cougars.



F R O S H

If BYU is following any kind of basketball cycle, chances are the Cougars should come up with the strongest team produced in the past three years. How strong remains to be seen. But it appears the building years Watts has silently endured in seasons past may have produced something more than a foundation.

On paper the Y's newest club has good team depth on the forward and guard lines, fair experience, fair height, and much promise for the future. Only two players on the 16-man roster are seniors, with the largest class representation among the juniors.

Looking at the team by position, the forward positions are well manned. Bob Skousen, (6-4) who set a sophomore scoring record before answering a mission call, hasn't lost a thing in his three year's absence from the college courts. Both of last year's forwards, Bruce Burton (6-4) and Jim Kelson (6-3), are back, along with three good sophomore prospects: Bill Blumenthal (6-4), John Alstrom (6-6), and Bill Wylie (6-6).

The spectacular play provided by Gary Ernest last year will be missing, but the guards should be deeper and better balanced. Regular Gary Batchelor (5-11) is back, as is semi-regular Bob Wilson (6-1). Ron Steinkne, who did not letter last year, is pressing for a starting berth, and Gene Kunz, who can play any position, has been moved over to give the position depth.

It's at center, where Watts has to find a replacement for durable Dave Eastis, that the picture is uncertain. Lloyd Johnson (6-6) is the only returning letterman, and looks like the best of four prospects. Stan Ashby (6-6), a transfer from Snow, could move in, as might Steve Merta, Bakersfield transfer, Bob Inglis (6-10), if he continues to improve, could help.

If Watts can come up with a smooth-working first team and also get steady support from the reserves, the Cougars could move back into the conference picture with force. But there is enough new talent to make this a difficult task for a team with only two seniors.



In the Intermountain area, basketball and Stan Watts are one and the same. The gentleman who guides the BYU basketball fortunes is the head and heart of the school's greatest athletic tradition.

The dean of the Skyline coaches, Stan is now in his 13th year as head varsity coach. The 1960 season was his only losing season in 12 years, and then he had to settle for fifth place. Considering the calibre of Skyline basketball, this is quite a tribute.

Stan is one of seven coaches in the country to win over 100 games in his first five years of college ball, and the trophy case in the George Albert Smith fieldhouse contains one NIT championship cup and three conference trophies.

In 1946 he came to BYU as freshman coach of both football and basketball. A short time later he was named assistant basketball coach and assistant director of athletics. And in 1949 he succeeded Floyd Millett as varsity basketball coach.

Stan has held several executive positions related to college basketball, and he has been the featured

head basketball coach at Jordan High in Salt Lake County. In two seasons with the Beediggers his cage teams tied for the Big Nine championship.

guest at several basketball clinics. He is a prolific writer of specialized articles on the cage game, and just recently had a book published on offensive basketball.

Watts-coached clubs at BYU have always been colorful and offensively-gearred to good basketball. Stan handpicks his own schedule, and a year seldom passes but what the Cats don't touch both coasts in meeting the best.

Stan began his own athletic career at Murray High School, where he was an outstanding prep athlete. Later he enrolled at Weber Junior College in Ogden, Utah, where he won letters in all of the major sports. In 1936 he transferred to BYU, a school where he was destined to play an important role in Cougars' future athletic program. Before he graduated in 1938, he won two letters each in football, basketball and track. He climaxed his career in college by winning the trophy given the outstanding senior athlete.

Watts first stop as coach was at Millard County High School, and a second move took him to Dixie Junior College in St. George. Later he was appointed

A veteran in the coaching ranks, Bob Bunker joined the varsity staff two years ago as an assistant to Stan Watts.

Bob, a very likeable, warm personality, graduated from Utah State University in 1936. While at Logan he captained the Aggies' conference football champions and was a key player on the Ag basketball court. Coach Bunker's first coaching assignment was at South Cache High School in Northern Utah. During World War II he served five years in the Army. He was commissioned a captain and is still active in the Reserves.

Coach Bunker came to BYU in 1949 as an assistant football coach to Charles "Chick" Atkinson. He was a member of the football staff until 1956, when he was appointed to the Cougars' basketball staff.

PETE WITBECK

Another campus figure who has been associated closely with BYU basketball is Alan "Pete" Witbeck, who is now in his third year as freshman basketball coach.

Prior to the 1959-60 season Pete's main chore on the staff was that of scouting BYU's cage opponents, a job he did with thorough dedication.

Witbeck is a faculty member in the College of Physical Education. His main area of instruction has been in the area of skills for majors.

Pete lettered in track at BYU as a distance runner,

and his coaching experience includes teams in industrial and amateur leagues in Utah.

ROD KIMBALL

Trainer Rod Kimball has served all but one of the last 23 years in this position. Long in experience and know-how, Rod is among the most well-known and liked men on campus.

A native of Jordan, Utah, Rod was an outstanding athlete and student leader at Jordan High. He won letters in two sports at Utah State and BYU in his college days, and in 1937 he was chosen as trainer for Cougar teams.

Since then he has traveled countless miles with BYU teams, conditioning athletes and attending their ills. Rod is justly proud of his family of six sons and six daughters.



LOCATION

Brigham Young University, which is located on 500 acres in the northeast section of Provo, is in the heart of Utah Valley. Provo is the third largest city in Utah. When joined with Orem (the city to the immediate north), it is classified by the federal government as a "standard metropolitan statistical area."




TUITION

That is, it has a twin city population of at least 50,000. Latest figures released by the government list the population of Provo-Orem area as 106,777 persons, more than half of whom reside within the central cities. Utah Valley is bordered on the west by Utah Lake, on the north by 14,000-foot Mt. Timpanogos, and the east by the Wasatch Mountain Range. Population within the Valley is over 115,000.

Yearly tuition and fees total \$260 for both in-state and out-of-state students. Room and board costs \$580 per year, and the total cost (estimated) for the school year is \$1,000, which includes moderate personal expenses.

CAMPUS

The campus major is located on a hill overlooking Provo and Utah Valley. There are 96 academic and housing buildings completed or under construction. BYU also has a 600-acre farm and a summer camp in Provo Canyon.



FUNDING

BYU was founded by Brigham Young as an academy in October 1875 under the leadership of Karl G. Maeser. In 1903 the school became a university. It is owned and operated by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (commonly called Mormon). It is the headquarters of the Church's widespread educational system.

ATHLETICS

BYU's Department of Athletics is a part of the College of Physical Education under Dean Milton F. Hartvigesen. With the exception of swimming, teams are represented in every sport. The school's intramural program offers basketball, football, badminton, golf, handball, horseshoes, softball, table tennis, tennis, volleyball, wrestling, swimming, skiing and track. The intramural program is financed by student fees.

CURRICULUM

Today BYU is the largest church related university in the nation. A liberal arts, vocational and scientific curriculum is offered by 11 colleges and the graduate school. They are: College of Biological and

Agricultural Sciences, College of Business, College of Education, College of Family Living, College of Fine Arts, General College, College of Humanities and Social Sciences, College of Nursing, College of Physical and Engineering Sciences, College of Physical Education, College of Religious Instruction, and the Graduate School. An Air Force ROTC Detachment is also functioning on campus. Doctoral programs are available in 11 departments, and an Honors Program commenced last year. BYU uses the semester system.



There is a tendency in sports to embellish the past in direct proportion to its distance from the present. But in spanning the years in the era following World War II it is evident BYU has produced its share of basketball greats.

One of the most memorable was **JOE NELSON** (47-50), the wiry forward who scored a total of 1,317 points in three seasons. Joe was a second team choice on the Helms All-America selection, and was a member of the college all-star team that toured the country with the Globetrotters.

Most experts agree, however, that **MEL HUTCHINS** (48-51) was the most colorful of all BYU players to gain AA recognition. Marvelous Mel was first team choice on the Look, Sporting News, Helms and Converse AA selections, and was voted MVP in the East-West game in New York.

A teammate of Mel's was **ROLAND MINSON** (49-51), who gave the fans as many thrills as any player in BYU history. Minson scored 619 points in NIT tourney won by the Cougars in 1951.

Another member of that illustrious team was **JOE RICHHEY** (50-53), a forward from St. Johns, Ariz. Joe was a second string choice in both Look and Collier's selection in '53. He also played on the West squad in the East-West game in Madison Square Garden. Judged the finest floor general in the post-war period is **HAROLD CHRISTENSEN** (50-53). Although no scoring sensation, Chris was his team's stabilizing force and set the plays in motion. As a sophomore he was a regular on the NIT team, and he played in the East-West game as a senior.

Helms choice on the second team of the AA selections in 1954 was **DEAN LARSEN** (52-54), who was also unanimous all-conference. Dean played with the college all-stars against the Globetrotters.

A DECADE AGO—The Cougars were at the summit of basketball with NIT championship. Starting five consisted of Joe Richhey, Roland Minson, Jerry Romney, Mel Hutchins, Coach Stan Watts and Harold Christensen.

TERRY TEBBS, (54-56), a mite of a player with big hands, came onto the scene the following year. Tebbs, who came to BYU as a freshman without the aid of a scholarship, was the first BYU player to be named to the UPI Little All-American team, an honor he gained two years in a row. The other half of the Mutt & Jeff duo was **HERSCHEL "BONES" PEDERSEN**.

JOHN BENSON (55-57) and **TOM STEINKE** (55-57) provided the spark for the BYU team that won the Skyline title in 1957. Both were all-conference. Benson was a fine rebounder and point-maker, while Steinke was a top scorer. Tom also made the UPI Little All-America team.

JOHN NICOLL (57-58) was one of the more recent standouts, a demon on the boards and under the basket. Last year **GARY EARNEST** and **DAVE EASTIS** (both 59-61) capped great careers, both as all-conference players.
