COACHING STAFF

STAN WATTS (BYU '38) Head Varsity Coach

Practically synonymous with Rocky Mountain baskeaball, Stan Watts is the dean of basketball coaches in the Rocky Mountain-Southwest. Now in his 16th season as head basketball coach at BYU, Stan is one of the most respected men in the profession. His following among basketball fans is as strong today as it was over 12 years ago when the Mountain Cats captured the NIT championship.

Watts is an exponent of exciting, fast-break basketball, and this brand of basketball has been a vital force behind the school's great basketball tradition. Part of this tradition stems from the fact Stan likes to schedule the big names in college basketball. His teams have played virtually every major team in the nation, and he has taken his teams to most of the top tournaments in the country, too.

Stan is one of a handful of coaches in the nation to win over 100 games in his first five years of college ball. It's worth noting that the trophy case in the fieldhouse contains one NIT championship, plus three conference championship trophies.

Watts first joined the athletic staff at BYU in 1946 as freshman coach in both football and basketball. He was later named assistant basketball coach, and in 1949 he was named head coach. Stan has coached college level football, track, baseball and basektball.

Born in Murray, Utah, Stan was an outstanding all-around athlete. He attended Weber College in Ogden, then enrolled at BYU where he won two letters each in football, basketball and track. In 1938, his senior year, he was named the Y's outstanding senior athlete.

Stan began his coaching career in the prep ranks at Millard County High School. He moved from there to Dixie College, and finally to Jordan High (Salt Lake City) where his teams tied for the Big Nine championship twice.

ALAN "PETE" WITBECK (BYU '52) Assistant Varsity Coach

A natural in the coaching field, Pete Witbeck is entering his first season as assistant to Stan Watts. Prior to his appoinnment last spring, Witbeck was the coach of BYU's vaunted freshman basketball team.

If a won-loss record can be used as a guage of success, Pete can certainly claim his share of coaching glory. Last year he guided the freshmen to a perfect 14-0 record. The year before his team had an 11-2 mark, and the year prior to that a 13-1 record.

Active in the game as a player, manager and coach, he got his first assignment on the staff as Watts' scout. He did the job so well that he was moved up as freshman coach in 1959.

A member of the faculty in the College of Physical Education, his main area of instruction is in the area of skills for majors.

A graduate of BYU, Pete won a letter as a distance runner for the Cougars, and his tasks since that time have included coaching teams in the industrial and amateur leagues.

GARY EARNEST (BYU '61) Freshman Coach

Certainly one of the smartest, best all-around basketball players BYU has had in this era, Gary Earnest joined the Cougar staff this year as freshman basketball coach.

A native of Longview, Wash., Earnest was an allstate basketball player in Washington. He lettered three years each in basketball, football and baseball.

Following three years in the Marines, Gary enrolled at BYU where he was a regular on the varsity for three years. He was all-conference guard in 1961, and during his three years on the varsity he scored more than 1,000 points. His overall scoring average was 14.4 points per game.

Earnest came to BYU from Moapa Valley High in Overton, Nev., where his team placed second in the state finals, had a 19-2 record. He previously coached at Rich High School in Randolph, Utah, where his team had a 24-3 mark, placed third in the state.

ROD KIMBALL, TRAINER

Probably more of a fixture in the BYU athletic department than any other person, Rod Kimball has spent all but one of the last 26 years as the Cougars'



athletic trainer. You can tape a lot of ankles, patch up a lot of players, and heal countless wounds in a quarter of a century, and that's just what he has done.

Besides overseeing the training needs of the teams, Rod dispenses humor, wisdom and other morale-building qualities along with physical therapy.

A native of Jordan, Utah, Rod was an outstanding athlete and student leader. He won letters at Utah State and BYU before joining the Cougars as athletic trainer. He has traveled countless miles with the Cougars since joining the athletic staff in 1937.

SEASON OUTLOOK

There is only way the Cougars can view the current outlook—with guarded optimism.

After several years of fighting the imbalances and inequities of the game, the Cougars suddenly find themselves with the makings of a good ball club; at least, everything seems to point to that conclusion. The Mountain Cats will have 26 games to prove how good they really are.

The rosy hue can be credited to two things: (1) a good supply of returning lettermen, and (2) a crop of sophomores that surpass in quality anything the Cougars have had in modern memory.

Looking first at the lettermen situation, there are seven of last year's nine lettermen back in the fold (forward Bill Blumenthal graduated, and forward Bill Ruffner may red-shirt because of an injury). The top five scorers from last year's squad, which was the highest scoring in BYU history, are back as a unit.

Pressing the veterans are five members of last year's undefeated freshman team (14-0) that scored an average of 109 points per game. While they overpowered all opposition as freshmen, the step into the varsity ranks is sure to be more complicated than might be imagined. They are still sophomores, and are still subject to sophomoric failings.


Heading the veteran contingent is center John Fairchild (6-8), the angular, smooth-moving pivot man who set scoring and rebounding records as a BYU junior. Forward Bob Quinney (6-5) and guard Mike Gardner (6-1) finished second and third in scoring last season. Two juniors, guard Dick Nemelka (6-0) and forward Steve Kramer (6-4), rounded out the starting five. Jeff Congdon (6-1) alternated as a starter on the guard line.

Playing behind Fairchild in the post will be Craig Raymond (6-11) one of the taller players in the WAC this year, and certainly one of the better prospects. Two of the finest forwards BYU has had come up through the ranks in recent years are Gary Hill (6-4) and Neil Roberts (6-5), both of whom averaged over 20 points a game as freshmen. The sophomore guards are Jim Jimas (6-1) and Ken James (6-3).

Looking at this collection of players, it should be safe to say the Cougars will have enough height, speed and fire power to remain competitive with most clubs. If there is one area that may need attention, it is defense. If the Cats can hold down the scoring of opponents, they will be even tougher to handle.

As for the Cougar schedule, it's typical of Watts' appetite for good opposition. The list includes Wichita, Ohio State, Creighton, Seattle, Utah State, Marquette, plus all WAC opponents, to mention a few.






