WELCOME, PRESS

PRESS PASSES — Requests for working passes should be made directly to Sports Information Director a week prior to the game. Women are not allowed in the press box, and the area is reserved for those actually covering the game. Drivers, and others who may accompany those covering the game, will be asked to sit elsewhere.

PRESS BOX — The BYU press box is located on the west side of the playing floor, and is reached through entry of sections AA on the north end of the floor. All parking in the immediate vicinity of the fieldhouse is reserved. Parking permits should be requested in advance.

BROADCASTING BOOTHS — Three radio booths are available, including one reserved for the visiting station which is designated the official station by the visiting team.



THE OUTLOOK

Like all basketball coaches, Stan Watts admits he has some problems. But the 1965-66 season isn't the year he will be shopping around for a trade.

Even though the Cougars will be without the services of John Fairchild, the 6-8 All-American who led the team in scoring and rebounding for two seasons—

Even though half the fire power from last year's club is gone (four of the departing players averaged 48.8 points per game)-

Even though there isn't, at this writing, a standout

replacement at center-

And even though there are only two playing sophomores moving up from last year's freshman team-

Stan Watts can find a good measure of satisfaction in the general outlook. As a matter of fact, with a few more props here and there, Watts would need less effort to conceal his well-contained opti-

mism. Here's why:

There is a good supply of talent, depth and height in the Cougar ranks this year. On the guard line BYU has such regulars as Dick Nemelka (6-0) and Jeff Congdon (6-1), plus good reserve strength in Jim Jimas (6-1) and Ken James (6-3). The forward line will be manned with the likes of Neil Roberts (6-5), the irrepressible Steve Kramer (6-4), and Gary Hill (6-4). At the post the Cougars will have three players towering in the neighborhood of 6-11, including returning letterman Craig Raymond who has the most experience in fitting into Watts' patented fast-break.

That should be enough talent to get the Cougars moving, and there are several newcomers who can, with more experience, fortify the club in spots

where it is needed.

The only players moving up from the freshman team are center Jim Eakins (6-11,) guard Randy Schouten (6-0) and forward LeRoy Maughan (6-8). Eakins, playing the post to the hilt, had a 23.3 scoring average. Schouten finished with a 16.8 scoring mean. Maughan, an excellent prospect, missed the frosh season because of a knee operation.

Orville Fisher (6-11) is a transfer from Canada, and Paul Loveday (6-9), who played his college ball at Bakersfield, Calif., just recently returned from a

church mission.

While the available talent is promising, it is difficult to evaluate the loss of a player of Fairchild's stature. The great shooting, rebounding and general finesse of Fairchild (who is now with the Los Angeles Lakers) was a major reason for the Cougars' fine season last year.

Watts' current team is well-balanced and seems to have all the necessary ingredients of an aboveaverage ball club. And yet it remains for the Cougars

to prove themselves.



WATTS AND COMPANY

After 16 years as head coach of Brigham Young University's Cougars, Stan Watts can look back on some fond memories. Watts, one of the most respected men in the coaching profession, has literally

built a basketball empire at BYU.

Now in his 17th season as head coach of the Cougars, Watts is a believer in colorful, fast-break basketball. BYU's great basketball tradition thrives on this type of game, and that may be one reason that the school's cage tradition and Watts are one and the same thing. Stan hand picks his own schedule, and year after year his teams have faced the elite in the college basketball world.

in the college basketball world.

Watts is one of a handful of coaches in the country to win over 100 games in his first five years of coaching college ball. It is also worth noting that the trophy case in the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse contains one NIT trophy (1951), plus four conference championships. Stan can recall with some satisfaction the fact that BYU is the only team in the history of the WAC not to have at least one losing season of conference play.

An author and lecturer as well as basketball coach, Stan has written the book, "Developing an Offensive Attack in Basketball." Over 14,000 copies of the book have been sold since its publication in 1959. He is also a regular contributor to magazines and per-

iodicals on the subject of basketball.

A native of Murray, Utah, Stan grew up in the little community just south of Salt Lake City. He was an all-around athlete at Murray High and Weber State before moving on to Brigham Young University. Watts won honors in three sports with the

Cougars.

He began his coaching career in 1938 at Millard High School where he was head coach in three sports; football, basketball and track. In 1941 he moved to Dixie College as athletic director and head basketball coach. He returned to the high school ranks in 1945 as head basketball coach at Jordan High. Two years later he joined the staff at BYU as head baseball and assistant basketball coach. The head coaching job in basketball opened in 1949 and his long tenure at the Cougar helm began.

Since that time Watts' teams have rolled up a 292-182 record in 16 seasons of top-flight basketball.

Stan is a past member of the National Basketball Board, and he is currently fourth vice-president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches. He has also served on the UPI rating board from the Rocky Mountain region. Among other interests, Stan heads BYU's annual coaching clinic and annual youth clinic.

Stan and his wife, the former Emily Kelly have been married for over 25 years. Their four children are Janice (Mrs. Dennis Jones), Susan, 20, Judy, 16, and Howard, 12.

PETE WITBECK, ASSISTANT

Pete Witbeck will be in his second season as assistant to Stan Watts, but his coaching experience goes back several years. Most BYU fans will remember Witbeck as coach of the freshman basketball teams that rolled up many impressive seasons.

If won-loss records can tell the story of a coach's success, Witbeck's five years with the Kittens were near-perfect. His last three years were probably his best, as the Kittens won 38 of 41 games played. His 1963-64 team boasted such stalwarts as Neil Roberts, Gary Hill, Jim Jimas, Craig Raymond, and Ken James, and averaged 109 points a game, while winning all 14 games.

Hired initially as a scout for Watts' varsity, Witbeck did so well that he was named freshman coach in 1959. His coaching experience in amateur ball boasted several championships. He coached AAU teams in Salt Lake City which entered and won sev-

eral tournaments.

A native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, Witbeck was a distance runner for the Cougar track teams of 1950-52. He lettered for three years in the mile and two-mile.

An outstanding paddleball player, Witbeck stays in top condition throughout the year. His scouting and recruiting trips take him all over the United States. It is hard to estimate how much travel he really does, but it has been estimated that his basketball trips carry him over 50,000 miles a year. And, that does not include the 25,000-mile trip that the Cougars took to Latin America last summer.

GARY EARNEST, FRESHMEN

The name of Gary Earnest appears quite often in the basketball record books at BYU. The former Cougar star is now in his second year as the freshman basketball coach.

A native of Longview, Washington, Earnest was an all-stater in basketball, winning three letters in basketball, as well as in baseball and football.

After high school, Earnest joined the Marines for a three-year hitch. While in the Marine Corps, he was "discovered" by Pete Witbeck, and lured to BYU. His record at BYU was very impressive.

For three years, he was a regular for the Cougars, and in 1961, was All-Skyline Conference. He scored over 1,000 points in his three seasons, averaging 14.4

points a game.

Upon graduation from BYU in 1961, Earnest coached at Rich High School in Randolph, Utah. His only year there, Rich was 24-3, finishing third in the state playoffs. From there, he moved over to Moapa Valley High School in Overton, Nevada. His team

there placed second in the state finals with a 19-2 record. Soon after that season, he came back to his alma mater.

His win-loss record after two years of coaching

in high school and one at BYU is 53-8.

Earnest is married to the former Ruth Robinson of American Fork. They have two sons, Edward Kent, 2½, and Steven Kyle, 1.

ROD KIMBALL, TRAINER


A kind of patriarch of athletic teams at B.Y.U., Rod Kimball has spent more than 26 years in his assignment as team trainer. As the father figure for


the Cougars, Rod's duties range from cut man to moulder of team morale.

Besides being one of the most popular men on campus, Rod is perhaps the most traveled man in Provo. Besides the usual game junkets with the teams, Rod has been to Europe four times, South America twice, and Hawaii once.

A native of Jordan Utah, Rod was an outstanding athlete and student leader in college. He is a former LDS bishop, and he and his wife, LaNeve, have 12 living children.

DICK NEMELKA, Guard, 6-0, 175, 22, Senior, Salt Lake City, Utah—Certainly one of the finest all-around ball players in BYU history . . . a starter since his first game as a sophomore, Dick is All-America candidate for the Cougars, as demonstrated by his 35 and 39 point tallies in the season openers . . . aggressive, good thinker, blessed with finesse and court savvy, Dick is an uncanny shot and is a tiger on defense Nemelka averaged 10.8 points per game as a sophomore, 15.4 on WAC championship team of last year . . . second team All-WAC . . . was high-point man in six of the Cougars' games last season . . . hit for 31 against USU, 28 against Creighton . . . a versatile athlete, Dick plays shortstop on BYU baseball team . . . came to BYU from West High (Salt Lake City) . . . an excellent student (psychology major), Dick has been WAC All-Academic for two seasons . . . single.



1965 REVIEW

Labels are often misleading, but it seems safe to tag last year's basketball season at BYU as the best the Cougars have ever had.

Despite the anti-climactic finish in the NCAA regionals at the tail end of the season, the Cougars ac-

complished the following:

—won undisputed claim to the WAC championship, the first conference crown for the Cougars since 1957.

—finished the season with a 21-7 mark, percentage-wise the best at BYU in many, many years.
—ranked sixth nationally in the final wire service

poll of the season.

 finished second only to Miami (Fla.) as the team with the most prolific scoring offense in college basketball.

—won 17 straight home games before bowing to

UCLA in the regional playoffs.

Even though the Cougars fell flat in their effort to "put the cherry on top" in the regionals, it's an established fact that they scored points like few other teams in the country. In 11 of the 28 games played, they scored 100 or more points.

Prior to the regionals, the Cougars had lost ball games to only four teams: Wichita, DePaul, Arizona and New Mexico. Three of these teams earned spots

in post-season tournaments.

Individually, four players shot 50% or better from the field, and all of the school's offensive records were re-written.

If any one player deserves to be singled out as the key performer, it would have to be John Fairchild. The quiet, 6-8 center from Encinitas, Calif., finished a two-year career at BYU by eclipsing half a dozen records.

Fairchild, who was named "player of the year" in the WAC, led the team in scoring and rebounding for the second straight year. He worked in 602 points, was credited with 348 rebounds, and 49 per cent effective from the floor. In a two-season span he scored 1,109 points, had 678 rebounds, both school records.

Four other Cougars came up with new school marks last year: Steve Kramer, junior forward, set a school record with a .533 shooting average; senior Bob Quinney set a new free throw standard with 90 per cent accuracy; and Mike Gardner set a career mark at BYU with a steady 45 per cent shooting percentage for three varsity seasons.

As a whole, the team shot 48 per cent from the field and 74 per cent from the free throw line. They averaged 52 rebounds per game, two more than

their opponents.

Dick Nemelka, who finished behind Fairchild in scoring, averaged 15.4 points per game in his junior year. Steve Kramer, who led the team in shooting accuracy, was second behind Fairchild in the rebounding department with 195 for the season.

From time to time last year injuries and illness dulled the Cougars' attack, but in most cases the club didn't break stride.

Marquette, a club that played some of the better teams in the nation last year, including UCLA, St. Johns, and Minnesota, selected BYU as the best team the Warriors faced this season.

Counting the two games played in the NCAA regional finals at Provo, the Cougars played before more than 150,000 fans at home in 1964-65 season. The exact figure is 153,689 for 15 home games.

SUMMER TOUR

Post-season barnstorming tours are a favorite activity of many collegiate athletic teams. At BYU it is almost a part of the curriculum.

Last summer five of the teams at BYU traveled to Mexico, Europe, and South America. By far the most successful of the trips was the basketball trip to Latin America. The cagers traveled over 20,000 miles, won 19 of 22 games, and averaged over 85 points a game doing it.

Twelve players, Coach Stan Watts, Assistant Coach Pete Witbeck, Trainer Rod Kimball, and Dr. Wendell Vance made the junket. BYU won its first two games before falling to Chile's Catholic University 82-72. From there they reeled off 14 straight wins before getting stopped by Corinthians of Brazil

The tour had several goals. First, there was a great opportunity to build international relations through athletic competition. Secondly, the trip greatly aided the missionary efforts of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Naturally, the trip helped Watts evaluate his material for the coming year, since he took two freshmen and two red-shirts with him. Lastly, the tour offered many of the boys a once-in-a-lifetime chance to travel all over two continents.

Watts' starting lineup for much of the trip consisted of Jeff Congdon and Dick Nemelka at the guards, Neil Roberts and Steve Kramer at the forwards, and either Craig Raymond or Jim Eakins at the center spot.

Nemelka was the leading scorer for the trip with 422 points, a 20.0 average. He broke the 30 point mark on five occasions and was BYU's leading scorer in 14 of the 22 games. Kramer also scored well, averaging 17.8 per game, followed by Roberts and Congdon at 11.6.

In Brazil, basketball fans called Watts the "Father of the One-Handed Jump Shot," a technique his players exhibited during a similar trip to South America in 1950. Whereever the Cougars went, the reception was the same—very enthusiastic. The fans were rabid sports enthusiasts and supported their local teams very well. In Montevideo, Uruguay, BYU and the Mantevideo All-Stars played before a crowd which Coach Witbeck estimated at 10,000.

This will be BYU's second appearance at the Quaker City Tournament. In 1962, the Cougars came in second to St. Joseph's.






