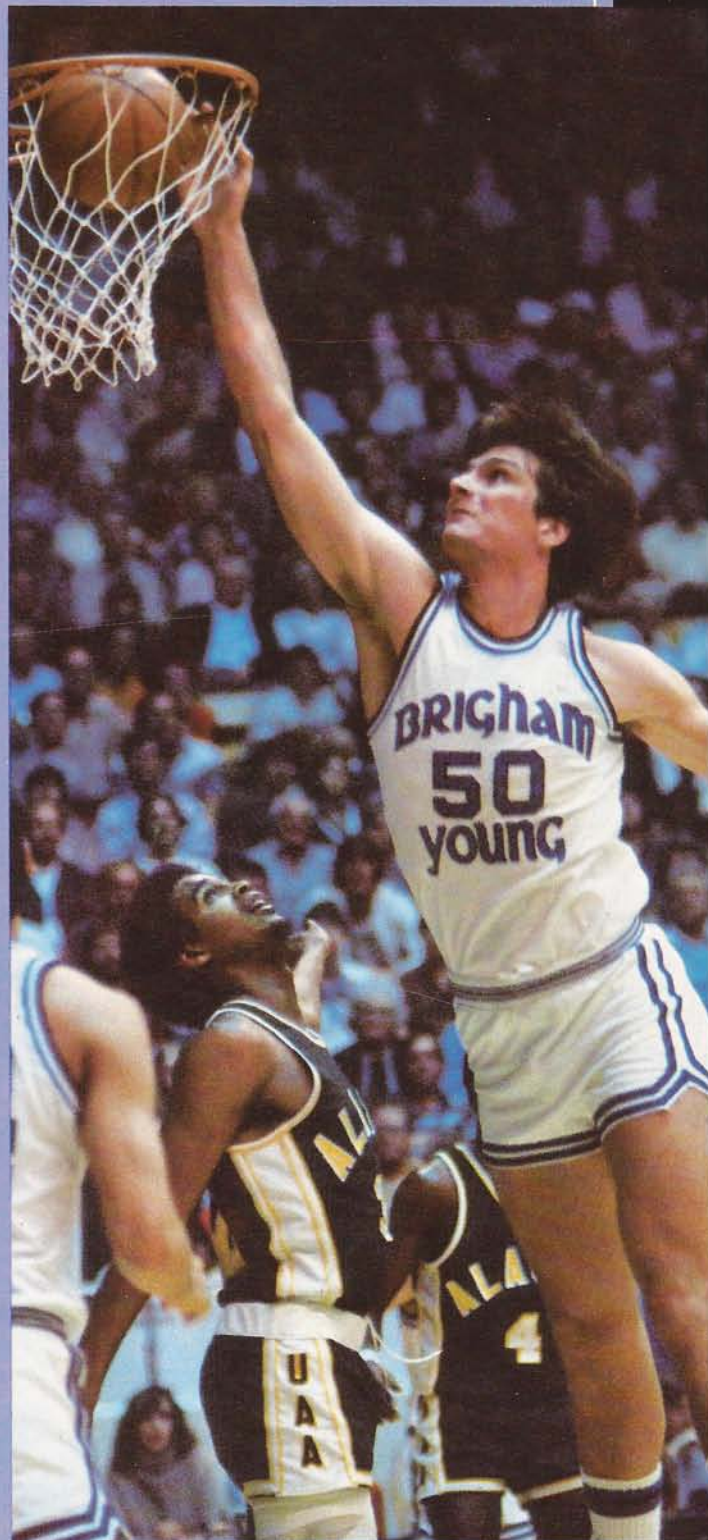
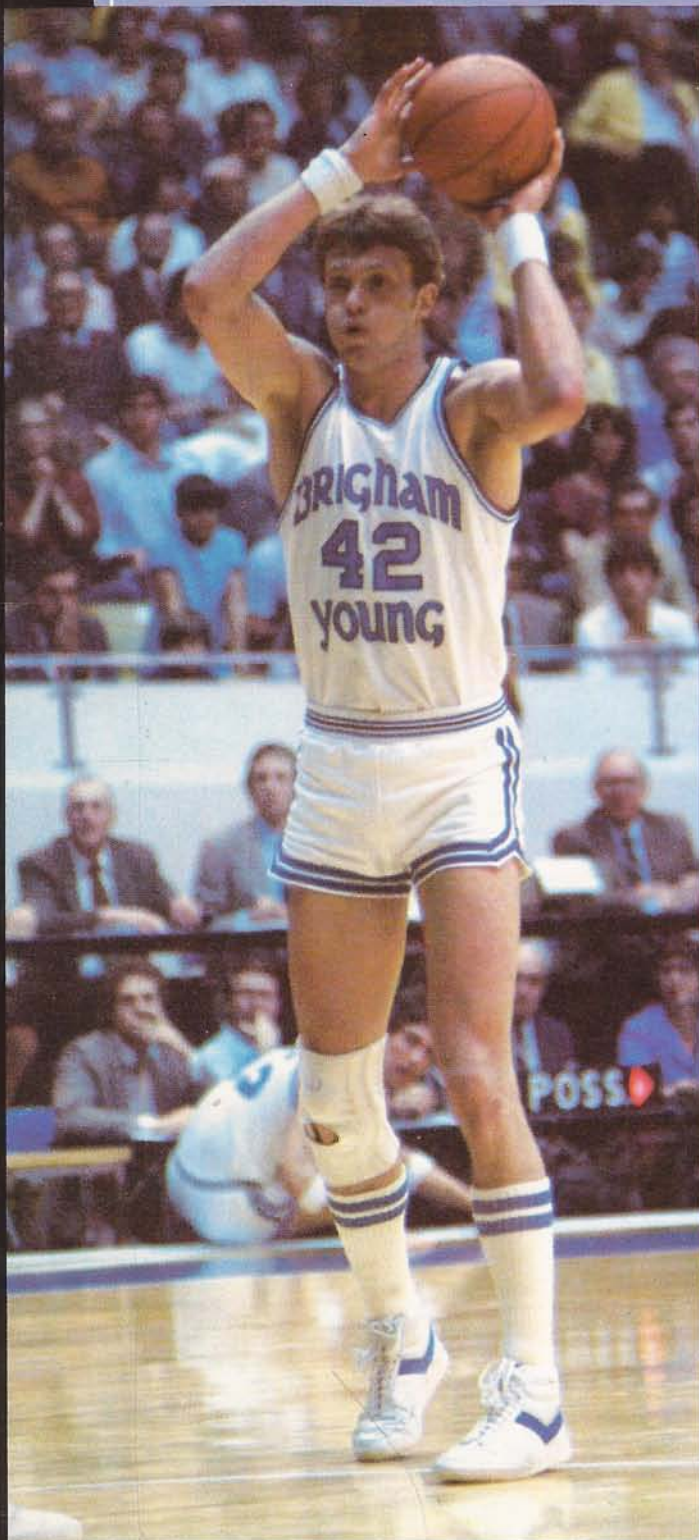

# The Marriott Center

This year more than 300,000 fans will attend Brigham Young University basketball games in the Marriott Center, the nation's second largest on-campus basketball facility.

Only the 28,000-seat Carrier Dome, used by Syracuse for football and basketball is larger. The 23,000-seat Rupp Arena is used by Kentucky for its home games, but the facility is owned by the city of Lexington.

The Marriott Center's seating capacity is listed as 22,700, but crowds as large as 23,106 have filled the arena to watch the Cougars' "run-and-gun" style of basketball.

Last year, an average of 21,224 fans attended BYU's 15 regular-season games. The largest average attendance for one season was 22,506 during the 1980-81 season.

Once again, the facility is sold out on a season ticket basis. And it is anticipated that by the end of the season more than three million spectators will have watched Cougar basketball in the Marriott Center since it was opened in 1971.

In its planning stages, the Marriott Center was to be located as close to the center of campus as possible;

it had to be flexible enough to serve other major activities; and it had to seat as many spectators as possible.

Named after the nationally known businessman who was the major contributor, the J. Willard Marriott Center houses crowds for basketball, commencement exercises, concerts, pageants, devotionals and many other activities.

In 1972, 1977, 1979 and 1982, the Marriott Center has served as the host for the NCAA Far West Regional playoffs.

Physically, the building covers three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 x 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet and encloses 8 million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof the height is nearly 10 stories.

There are roughly 10,100 chair seats in the building with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the seats are below the concourse.

Besides the usual locker rooms, training facilities, etc., the Marriott Center serves as ticket headquarters for most major campus events. It also provides offices for the basketball coaching staff.

## Brigham Young University

Founded in 1875 and dedicated to the education of the whole person, Brigham Young University strives to prepare its students for successful professional careers and personal lives by providing a proper balance between academia and religious instruction.

BYU is sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon) and, with its enrollment of 26,000 students, is the largest privately owned university in the country.

More than 1,250 full-time faculty, 67 percent of whom hold doctorates from colleges throughout the United States and several foreign countries, instruct in 150 subject areas in the university's 13 colleges and graduate schools.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with Fall and Winter semesters each being four months long and the summer semester being divided into Spring and Summer terms.

Utah Valley, located approximately 45 miles south of Salt Lake City, provides the backdrop for the 646-acre BYU campus. The 12,000-foot-high Wasatch Range rises immediately to the east of the campus, and Utah Lake can be seen only a few miles to the west.

Although 98 percent of the studentbody is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed, or national origin, provided they meet

the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Nonmormons come from over 25 other denominations, and around 22 percent of the student body is married. The Provo campus is also very cosmopolitan, with students coming from every state (30 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. Over 8,000 students are bi-lingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a two-year mission for the Mormon Church in another country.

Of the ethnic groups on campus, the American Indians have the largest representation, numbering more than 500 and coming from 61 tribes. There are also Chicanos, Blacks, Orientals, and others, all applying their own particular perspective of life to their academic programs, and providing a rich, intercultural learning atmosphere for all students.

In addition to the regular student body on the Provo campus, BYU serves other students at the BYU-Hawaii Campus in Laie, Hawaii, through the Study Abroad programs supervised by BYU faculty members in Austria, England, Israel, and Hawaii, and through the BYU Division of Continuing Education, which enrolls more than 350,000 in its courses each year.

The university is supported from funds appropriated by the LDS Church and from tuitions and gifts.

# Arnold Answers Questions on 1982-83 Team

Considering BYU's losses through graduation, how will this affect the Cougar offense?

We have lost, either by graduation and/or missions, five outstanding players who started for us at one time or another; Steve Trumbo, Fred Roberts, Greg Ballif, Craig Christensen and Mike Maxwell. Roberts and Trumbo were outstanding forwards, players with exceptional ability inside. Consequently, for the past two years our offense featured an internal game. This year we intend to move Greg Kite to the low post where we believe he will be more effective. Our present forwards will be considerably smaller than in the past.

On the other hand, I feel our present forwards will be better outside shooters and passers, so we will try to design an offense to take advantage of the particular skills of the players. Simply, this will mean a low post offense with perimeter players executing more driving and outside shooting.

How can BYU compensate for losses on defense and rebounding?

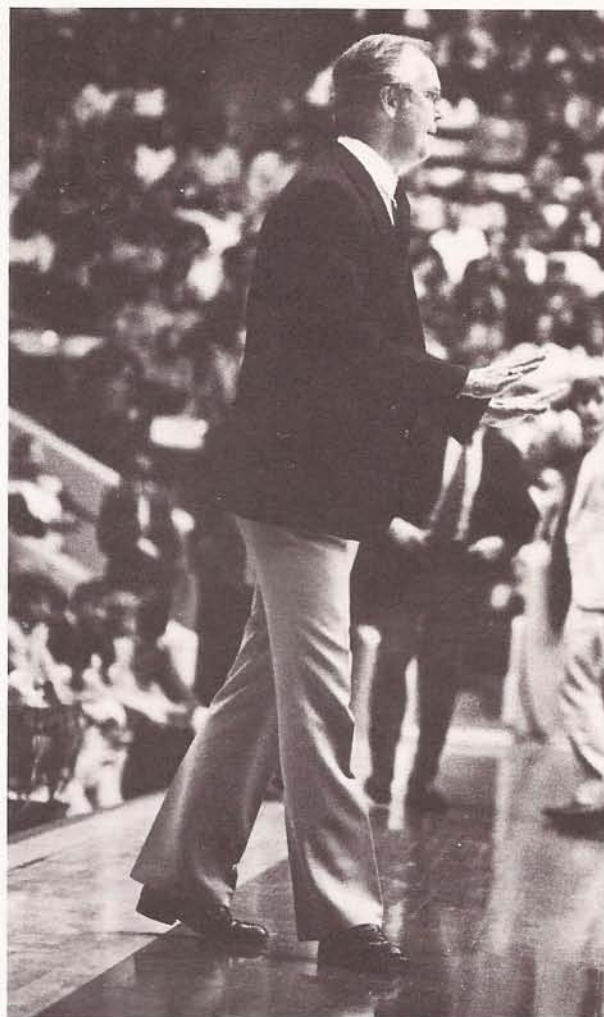
Last year our defense against the field goal was ninth in the nation, holding opponents to a .426 field goal percentage. Also, our rebound margin over opponents was ranked third in the nation with an 8.0 rebounding margin. We're proud of these marks, and must credit Roberts and Trumbo for our strength in both areas. Now, with the loss of those two, I have a concern for our defense and rebounding efforts this year. Since we will be smaller overall, this should enable us to play a little more man-to-man than in past seasons. We are also hoping that Greg Kite will pick up some slack in rebounding. Besides Kite, I feel that Devin Durrant, Gary Furniss and Brett Applegate can do a respectable job on the boards. As I see it, these two areas will be the key to our success this season.

What do you consider to be the team's strengths this year?

While defense and rebounding may be question marks, I feel our strengths will be our shooting and passing. I sense significant strides in these two areas, taking into account the players returning, plus the addition of our new recruits.

To what extent will the new personnel affect the Cougars' offensive attack?

As mentioned previously, we will be smaller but a bit quicker. Our attack, therefore, will be more perimeter oriented than inside. If we can get the ball off the defensive backboards reasonably well, we should be better on our fast break attack. Defensively, we will probably be more man-to-man oriented than in the past couple of years. That, of course, will be determined by the kind of opponent we will be facing in a given game.



Will the team's backcourt be stronger?

Our guard line, which consists of six players, all either freshmen or sophomores, are, overall, pretty good passers, dribblers and shooters. While young, they have better than ordinary talent. They will be very exciting players to watch.

What kinds of lineups—combinations of starters, etc.—are you contemplating?

At this writing, it appears the competition for positions will be tougher than last year. For example, a tremendous battle for the big forward spot involves Gary Furniss and Brett Applegate. Durrant, Saarelainen and Kevin Nielsen are scrapping for the small forward position. All six guards are in the thick of the battle for the two guard slots. Kite has the inside track at center, although he doesn't have it locked up. We're going to double Furniss in both the big forward and center positions.

At this writing, too, the starting lineup is wide open. If Devin and Timo, for example, play particularly well, and our guard play does not come up to expectations, we will consider using one of them at the big guard position. However, we will not even consider that eventuality until three or four weeks into the season. Whatever the lineup, I expect it will be smaller and quicker than last year's.

## How would you evaluate the coming season?

Because we lost two all-conference players, plus three part-time starters, it is reasonable to conclude we're headed for a rebuilding year. We are young, but we are talented, and I have stated before that I would rather have talent than experience. However, our schedule is so demanding that I will feel very fortunate to win as many games (17) as we did last year. December could very easily take its toll in the win-loss column. It is conceivable UCLA, Iowa and St. John's will all be ranked in the top ten, and we play all three within the first 30 days of the season. If we can get through those first 30 days without too much trauma, I believe we'll be a respectable club by conference time.

## How have some of the players progressed during the off-season?

Greg Kite, for one, spent 6-8 hours a day developing his overall game. With the change in our offense, and with the work he has done this summer, we fully expect Greg to show the most improvement on the club. Frankly, he is a key to the success we might enjoy this season. Marty Perry also had an outstanding summer, improving his shooting. With Marty's passing and dribbling ability, he's a legitimate candidate for a starting position. Scott Sinek had shoulder surgery, and at this writing is a bit behind the others. Gary Furniss had to work exten-

sively this summer to earn money to return to school. He also suffered a severe ankle sprain midway through the summer, and then was married in late summer. These three factors kept him from playing a great deal of ball. Timo Saarelainen had a good, full summer of basketball competing with the Finnish National team in tournaments worldwide. Devin Durrant returned from his mission in April. He, too, worked hard, and he is a bit ahead of most when they return.

## What is your evaluation of the Cougars' traditionally tough schedule?

Our schedule affords us some of the best competition in the country. On paper, it appears the Western Athletic Conference will be up this year. As for our pre-season schedule, it continues to improve in the quality of competition with each passing year. As mentioned before, we may face three nationally ranked teams in the early going. In addition, our local fans will see teams like Providence and Princeton play in the Marriott Center. Mississippi, too, had a good club last year. Our road games will include Michigan State and either St. Joseph's or Wake Forest in the Holiday Festival. Utah State and Weber State both had fine recruiting years. So, overall, I can't remember a more difficult preseason schedule since I have been at BYU. As a result, we must be patient. In time the schedule will help us become a fine basketball team.

# 1982-83 Outlook

One of the most difficult basketball schedules BYU has ever faced causes some concern for eighth-year Coach Frank Arnold. But he believes the changes, new personnel, and a few key developments could eventually lead the Cougars to success.

Arnold likens this year's team to that of 1978-79 when Danny Ainge was a sophomore and Devin Durrant was a freshman on a squad which lost to San Francisco in the NCAA tournament. Durrant, a two-year starter, is back with the Cougars after returning from an LDS mission to Spain. Also returning is center Greg Kite, another two-year starter, and guard Scott Sinek (starter most of last year), so there is plenty of starting experience.

But Arnold says all of the starting slots are open, although it may be difficult to dislodge someone of Kite's 6-11, 250 stature. Kite's success is one of the keys Arnold points to if the team is to be a success. Other key factors include, how much help Kite gets on the boards, the effectiveness of BYU's man-to-man defense, and how the Cougars fare during pre-season action.

BYU opens the season hosting one of the toughest back-to-back tandems in the nation, UCLA and Iowa (Nov. 26-27). Then the Cougars play difficult road games against Michigan State and a Holiday Festival field at Madison Square Garden beginning with St. John's. The other teams in the Dec. 27-29 New York tourney are St. Joseph's and Wake Forest.

The change to a man-to-man defense from several zones is a result of five lettermen lost, including All-Western Athletic Conference power forwards Fred Roberts and Steve Trumbo. A smaller, quicker lineup will replace Roberts and Trumbo, but offensively this means Kite will post up low while the other Cougars execute a perimeter, driving game.

"We are young and inexperienced, but we have talent and I have always said I would rather have talent than experience," says Arnold. "We have a fine passing and shooting team, but we will give up some in rebounding."

The rebounding assistance Kite needs could come from either Durrant (6-7), Gary Furniss (6-8), or junior college transfer Brett Applegate (6-7½). All of these players have good shooting range. Durrant has had multiple games in double figures, but the question is how well he performs after a two-year mission. Furniss has exceptional touch for a big man, according to Arnold, but he is recovering from knee, ankle and hand injuries suffered this past year. Applegate was the juco player-of-the-year while playing at Snow College (Ephraim, Utah), and gained more exposure with a collegiate all-star team in Asia this past summer.

Furniss and Applegate could battle for the big forward slot, while Durrant battles 6-6 Timo Saarelainen and 6-7 Kevin Nielsen for the small forward spot. Durrant and Saarelainen also have the talent to play in a big guard role, too.

But the backcourt competition centers around a six-deep unit of talented dribblers, passers, and shooters. Sophomores Sinek (6-2) and Bob Capeaner (6-4) are the most seasoned in BYU competition, but sophomore Marty Perry (6-1) learned

Arnold's system well as he redshirted last year after transferring from the University of Florida. Arnold says Perry is the quickest of the six backcourt players.

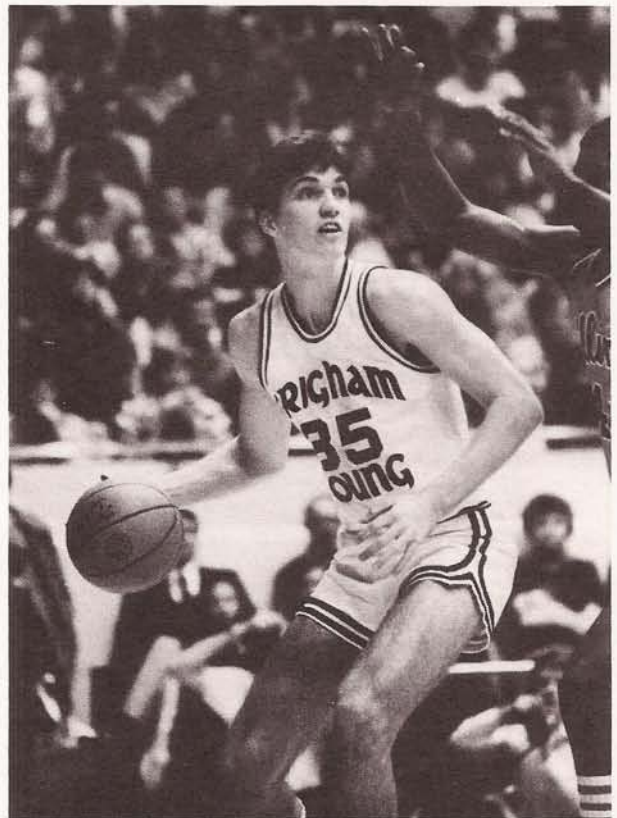
Freshmen Chris Nikchevich (6-2) or Brian Taylor (6-4) are slick ball handlers who could fit in the scheme easily, while freshman Paul Drecksel's (6-3) play depends on how he recovers from back surgery, plus the transition from prep frontcourt to college backcourt.

Among the big men vying for position on the team are squadman Von Alleman (6-9), and freshmen Alan Pollard (6-9) and Jim Usevitch (6-9).

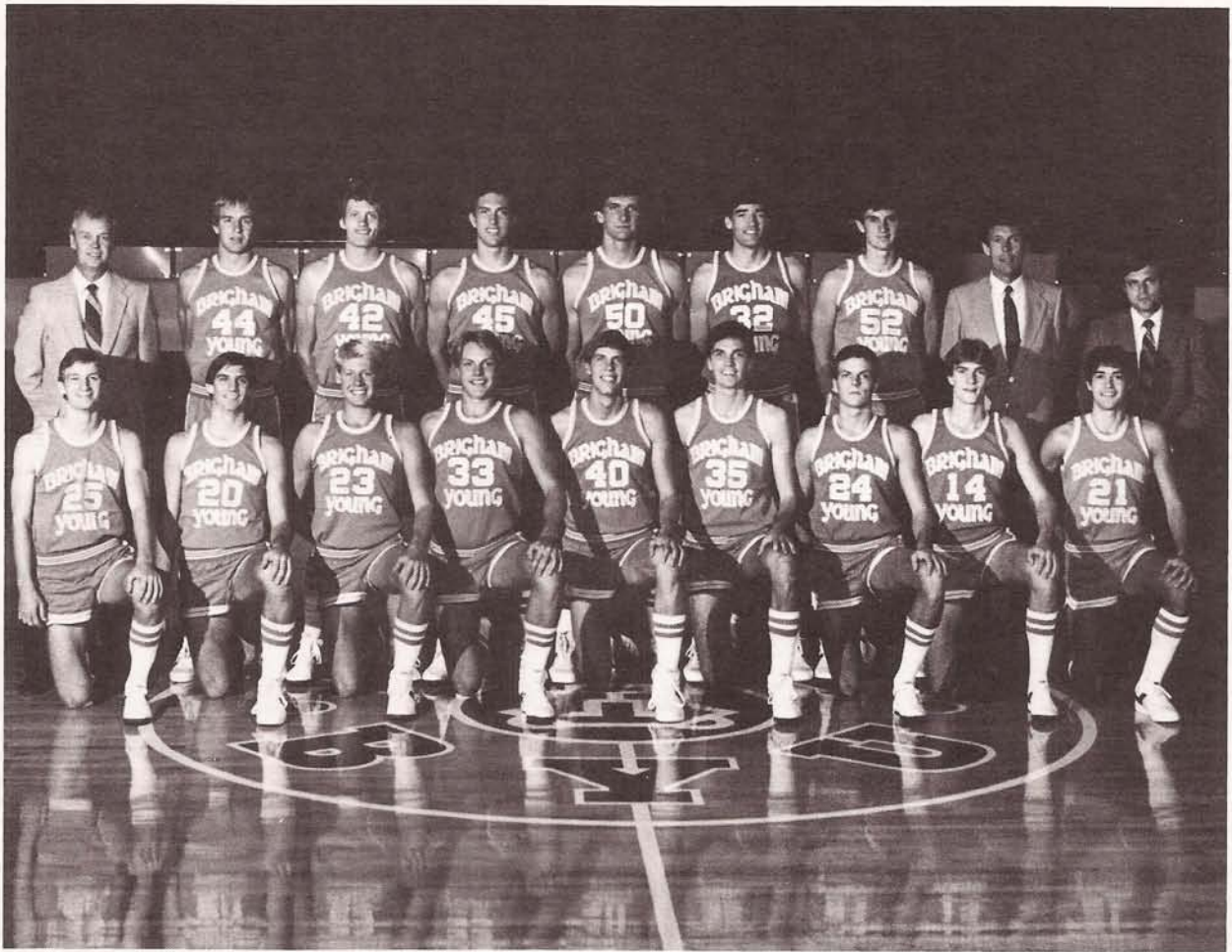
"This is the first time I've had 15 players on grant-in-aid," says Arnold. "We hope to find seven or eight quality players who will be ready, but how soon we do that is the question."

Unfortunately, only eight of the 15 players have any varsity playing time. Among the things working in favor of the Cougars is that 15 of the 29 regular season games are in the 22,700-seat Marriott Center where BYU has a 110-35 (.759) win-loss record, including three seasons of undefeated home play (1972-79-81). In addition to the 2½-million fans who have pushed the Cougars in the 11-year history of the second largest on-campus basketball arena in the nation (Syracuse seats 28,000), Arnold has been successful as a coach.

In his eight years with the Cougars, Arnold has fashioned a 122-80 (.604) record and needs to win 17 of this year's 29 games to remain above .600. But he points out the difficulty of this year's schedule will make it difficult for the team to win 17 games like last season.

# **Head Coach: Frank Arnold**

**122-80 Record  
Eighth Year  
(Idaho State '56)**

**Best time to call Coach Arnold:  
11 a.m.–Noon, 1:30–2:30 p.m.**

With a 122-80 record to his credit, eighth-year head coach Frank Arnold now ranks third on the list of BYU coaches with the most wins. His .604 winning percentage also ranks among the best of previous Cougar coaches.

BYU's basketball program has again risen to national prominence under Arnold's tutorship. In the last four seasons the Cougars averaged 22 wins per year, with three NCAA tournaments and one NIT appearance. In the last five years the Cougars won more games than any Western Athletic Conference team both in WAC play and in all games, while playing one of the most vigorous schedules in the country.

Arnold, 48, was an assistant coach under John Wooden at UCLA before coming to BYU in 1976. He is well known for his technical knowledge of the game, his broad coaching background, and his dedication to basketball.

His basketball knowledge has been shared in clinics conducted in such countries as China, Italy, Spain, Canada, Yugoslavia and, most recently, Venezuela. The China tour was with the U.S. All-Star team in 1979. He also conducts camps and clinics during the summer months in Provo.

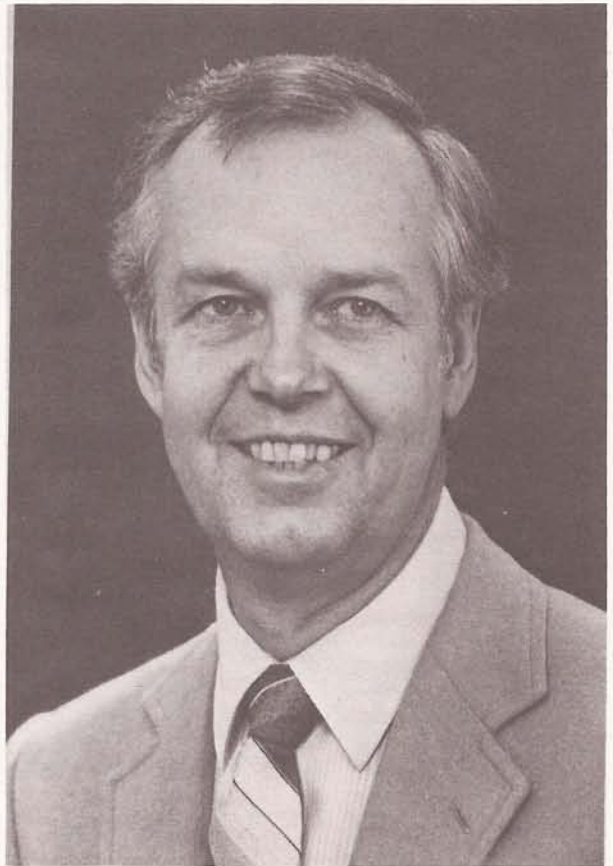
Besides being a proficient coach, Arnold has authored a technical book on man-to-man defense and an autobiography entitled *Rise and Shout*. Honors given Arnold include being selected Coach-of-the-Year in the WAC for both 1979 and 1980 by *Basketball Weekly*. He was also selected Coach-of-the-Year by WAC coaches and athletic directors in 1980.

As an assistant at UCLA from 1971–75, Arnold was a part of three NCAA championships. While with the Bruins, he was responsible for recruiting and scouting and was in charge of the junior varsity program.

Although Frank has altered some of his philosophies since coaching in the WAC, a lot of his ideas remain the same.

"I set forth three criteria for an athlete: outstanding ability, a sincere desire to get a degree, and fine citizenship."

Born October 1, 1934 in Ogden, Utah, Arnold graduated from Pocatello High School in 1952 and then graduated from Idaho State University in 1956. His first coaching job came at Payette, Idaho, in 1956–57. Arnold then accepted the head coaching job at Provo's B.Y. High in 1958 and began work on his master's degree. He obtained his master's in physical education in 1960 and coached at the BYU laboratory school through 1962.



Arnold began serving as a graduate assistant at the University of Oregon in 1962–63, working on his doctorate. He then accepted the head coaching job at Pocatello High for 1963–64.

In 1964 he took over as the head basketball coach at Clark Junior College in Vancouver, Washington, where he remained until 1966. From 1966–71, he served as an assistant basketball coach at Oregon before he began coaching at UCLA in 1971.

Elected to the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) Board of Directors in July 1980, Arnold is currently serving as Chairman of the NABC Officials Committee, newly appointed Chairman of the NABC Recruiting Committee and this year, also begins service on the NABC Committee on Academics. In addition, elected to ABA USA Men's Games Committee as one of a five-man player selection committee for all U.S. international competition (i.e. Pan American and Olympic Games). The last three summers he has participated as a member of a special sub-committee of the NCAA Recruiting Committee to review proposed recruiting legislation.

Arnold is married to the former Bee Wright of Provo. She obtained her bachelor's and master's degrees from BYU and is a former faculty member of the College of Family Living. Frank and Bee have five children: Kelley (22 and a senior at BYU), Kristyn (20 and a junior at BYU), Kipline (17), Gibson (14) and Kaline (10).

Presently, Arnold is a member of the BYU 13th Stake high council.

# Roger Reid

Now in his fifth year as a member of the Cougar basketball staff, Roger Reid, a 35-year-old graduate of Weber State ('68) was named assistant coach during the 1978-79 BYU season.

He was a past chairman (1980-81) of the recruiting committee for the National Association of Basketball Coaches. In 1981 he helped give basketball clinics throughout Australia for three weeks.

A native Utahn, Reid was an outstanding athlete at Springville (Utah) High School where he was student body vice-president and all-state athlete. He was named MVP in the annual North-South All-Star baseball game his senior year.

Reid enrolled at BYU where he was a member of the freshman basketball team and also made the trip to Mexico City with the Cougar baseball team.

Transferring to College of Eastern Utah, Reid was selected as the MVP on the school's baseball team and twice was named to the Junior College All-America team in baseball.

From CEU he moved to Weber State College, where he was a member of the Big Sky Conference championship basketball team coached by Dick Motta. Reid also received all-conference honors in baseball for two years.

Reid spent four years as a shortstop in professional baseball with the Chicago White Sox and Atlanta Braves organizations.

Reid began his coaching career in 1971 as a basketball and baseball coach at Payson High School. His overall basketball record at Payson was 50-26, and the baseball team had a 35-11 mark under his direction.



In 1974 he joined the coaching staff at Clearfield High School, where he took the basketball team to the state tournament for the first time in five years.

Clearfield's overall record was 60 wins against 24 losses during that period.

Throughout his prep coaching career, his teams were known as tough defensive squads, despite the fact that the tallest player was only 6-4.

Reid is married to the former Diane Gardner, and they have three sons and one daughter; Randy, 12; Robbie, 8; Darren, 3; and Kelli Ann, 18 months.

He serves as first counselor in a bishopric and has also served on a high council in the LDS Church.

# Carl Ingersoll

The newest member of Frank Arnold's full-time staff is Carl "Rags" Ingersoll who joined the staff in 1981.

Ingersoll, 49, is a 1958 graduate of BYU and is a veteran of several successful high school teams in Utah prep circles. In 1980 he served as BYU's graduate teaching assistant.

His last post on the high school level was at Alta (Sandy, Utah) where he was head coach in 1980. However, Carl is best noted for his eight-year head coaching success at American Fork High.

In his last six years at American Fork, his teams reached the championship round four times, winning the state title twice (1979 and 1976).

Ingersoll was named the Provo Daily Herald Coach of the Year in 1976 and 1979, and also received several awards for his coaching involvement in the Utah Cerebral Palsy Charity program.

Ingersoll graduated from BYU with a degree in zoology. He taught biology for 18 years at American Fork High, where he was also an assistant football coach for several seasons.

Carl played one collegiate basketball season at the Branch Agricultural College (Southern Utah State) in Cedar City. He played two years while serving in the U.S. Army at Fort Bragg, N.C.

Carl has been involved with Cougar Basketball Camps since 1973 and has also helped in Medalist Clinics. In 1981 he was the only American consultant coach invited to participate in a basketball clinic



in Yugoslavia sponsored by Converse.

Carl's father, D. Grant "Rags" Ingersoll, was an all-conference center for BYU in the 1920s, and at 6-4 was the conference's tallest player.

Carl currently serves as a bishop for the LDS church.

Coach Ingersoll is married to the former Gene Oborn of Payson, Utah. They have seven children—two are married, and Jody, 20 (a statistician for BYU's basketball team), Julie, 19 (a freshman at BYU), Jillinda, 14, Jarod, 8, and Jason, 7, in addition to four grandchildren. The Ingersolls live in American Fork.

# Junior Varsity Coaches

Serving this season as part-time coaches for the junior varsity are Harry Anderson and Steve Craig.

Anderson, 48, was an original member of Frank Arnold's staff beginning in 1974-75 at BYU, but left before last season to enter private business. Anderson returns to the Cougars on a part-time basis with responsibilities to the jayvee team as well as doing some scouting for the varsity.

Before coming to BYU Anderson previously coached for 10 years at Orem High and at Utah Technical College in Provo-Orem for the four years previous to joining Arnold's staff.

He also coached at St. Anthony, Idaho and in Midvale (Hillcrest) on the prep level and was BYU graduate assistant on the basketball team following his athletic career.

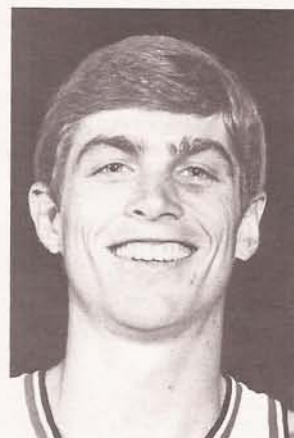
Anderson served a mission to England following a distinguished career for BYU in basketball and track. He played on Skyline Conference championship teams coached by Stan Watts in 1955 and 1957.

Craig, 26, played for BYU from 1975-1981, having served an LDS mission to El Salvador in that interim. Craig was a four-year letterman for the Cougars in basketball and helped BYU to a pair of Western Athletic Conference titles (1979 and 1980). He also was active in prep volleyball, football and baseball at Beverly Hills High School in California. Craig, a native of Los Angeles, was drafted by the Philadelphia 76ers following his senior year at BYU, but ended up playing the 1981-82 season with the Lancaster Lightening of the Continental Basketball League in Pennsylvania.

Craig underwent foot surgery this past Fall before committing to serve in the BYU coaching ranks. He married the former Marie Osmond in June 1982.

## Chuck Stiggins, Strength Coach

Chuck Stiggins is in his third year as strength and conditioning coach for the BYU basketball and football teams. Stiggins, 29, is a member of the board of directors for the National Strength and Conditioning Association and was Region Five Conditioning Coach of the Year in 1981.

The Colorado Springs, Colo. native attended Afcet International High School in Brussum, the Netherlands and played football for Ricks College and Southern Utah State. He served an LDS mission to Ohio and received his bachelor's (1977) and master's (1978) from BYU and is currently working on his doctorate.

Stiggins, who serves as a consultant to other BYU athletic programs, is "incredibly valuable behind the scenes to our strength and conditioning of our team," says BYU Coach Frank Arnold. Stiggins works with the Cougar cagers six and one-half months out of the eight months the team is on campus.

Stiggins is married to the former Rebecca Allen.



# President Jeffrey R. Holland

Dr. Jeffrey R. Holland, the ninth president of Brigham Young University, took office Aug. 1, 1980, succeeding Dr. Dallin H. Oaks who now serves as a justice on the Utah Supreme Court.

A St. George, Utah, native, Dr. Holland was a varsity athlete, student officer and high honor graduate at both Dixie High School and Dixie College in his hometown. He served a volunteer mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Great Britain from 1960–62. Upon returning to the United States, President Holland enrolled at BYU where he obtained a bachelor's degree in English with highest honors and a master's degree in religious education, graduating with distinction. While at BYU, he was designated an E. S. Hinckley Scholar and was elected to Phi Kappa Phi honor society. More recently, he was honored as a recipient of the University's Distinguished Alumni Service Award.

Dr. Holland obtained a second master's degree and a doctorate in American Studies at Yale University in 1973 where he was a Yale University Fellow. He pursued scholarly interests in Mark Twain, writing his dissertation on "Mark Twain's Religious Sense: The Viable Years—1835 to 1883."

Before becoming president of BYU, Dr. Holland served more than four years as Commissioner of Education for the LDS Church, with responsibilities for all of the Church's educational programs which reach more than 750,000 students worldwide. Prior to that, he was dean of Religious Instruction at BYU, and he has served as an instructor or director at LDS Institutes of Religion.

The BYU president is a popular speaker and is noted for his keen sense of humor. More than 30 of his articles and addresses have been published in LDS magazines and professional journals, including *Vital Speeches of the Day*.

In the LDS Church, he has been a high counselor, a bishop, and a counselor in three stake presidencies. He also served as director of the Melchizedek Priesthood MIA program and as chairman of the Church's Young Adult Committee.

President Holland serves on the governing boards of the Deseret News Publishing Co., the LDS Hospital and Intermountain Health Care, Inc., the Polynesian Cultural Center in Laie, Hawaii, Commercial Security Bank Corporation and Commercial Security Bank. He also is a director of the American Association of Presidents of Independent Colleges and Universities (AAPICU).

He and his wife, Patricia Terry Holland, also of St. George, have three children: Matthew, Mary Alice and David.

An experienced and respected administrator, Dr. Clayne Jensen is beginning his eighth year as dean of the College of Physical Education, which encompasses BYU athletics . . . Glen has invested himself in the very productive side of athletics . . . as an athlete (amateur and professional), as coach, as a teacher and as an administrator . . . he has brought vigor and vitality to his assignments, and he uses his varied talents to push the wholesome, worthwhile programs in athletics . . . he is acknowledged as one of the foremost leaders in his field . . . Tuckett is a native of Murray, Utah, where he was an all-around athlete at Murray High . . . he entered professional baseball after graduation, but continued his studies at the University of Utah where he obtained his B.S. degree in 1953 . . . ## Western Athletic Conference

They celebrated the 20th birthday of the Western Athletic Conference this past summer, which is anyway of saying the nation's most geographically spread league has come of age. Initially, when the league came into being July 1, 1962, there were six charter members. Today the WAC extends from Laramie, Wyo., to El Paso, Tex., to San Diego, Calif., to Honolulu, Hawaii. Moreover, today's league now has nine members.

The biggest change in the makeup of the league came in July 1978, when Arizona and Arizona State left for the Pac-Ten. But on the same day, San Diego State made its official entry on the scene. Then Hawaii became the eighth member the following year, and the Air Force entered the WAC in July of 1980.

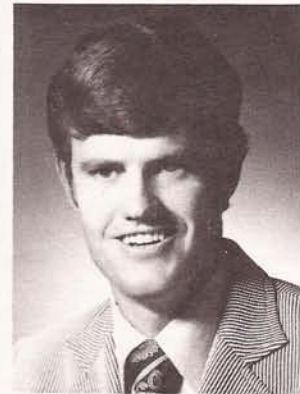
One of the rewards of being in the WAC is the league's affiliation with the Holiday Bowl in San Diego. The league winner receives an automatic bid to the post-season bowl against a ranking at-large team.

Now that the league has expanded to nine members, the WAC stretches from the pine tree forests of Utah, Colorado, and Wyoming to the desert southwest of West Texas and New Mexico, to the coastal surfs of California and Hawaii.

Founded on July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah, and Wyoming. In September 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

Based in Denver, Colorado, the WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney, who assumed his current position in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Michigan State, and Washington, is the fourth conference commissioner since the formation of the league.

Nurdy Jensen serves as director of information for the WAC and is assisted by Dee Menzies. John Adams is supervisor of football officials, and Irv Brown is supervisor of basketball officials.

# 1981-82 Basketball Season Roundup

Pushed by the play of a talented front court, the 1981-82 BYU basketball team achieved a 17-13 record. They did not win a fourth consecutive NCAA play-off berth, but finished the season convincingly enough to earn an invitation to play in the NIT.

Paced by center Greg Kite and forwards Fred Roberts and Steve Trumbo, the Cougars averaged 37.3 rebounds per game while holding opponents to 29.3. That difference of eight per game was fourth best in the nation last year.

The frontline first asserted themselves against 7-4 Ralph Sampson and the Virginia Cavaliers in the Hall of Fame Tip-off Classic (first NCAA game of the season). Playing on national television, BYU won the rebound battle 35-32 and almost won the war. The Cougars chipped their way back from a 38-26 halftime deficit, catching the Cavs, then nudging ahead on a three-point play by Gary Furniss with 46 seconds left. Virginia went on to win, but Sampson was limited to 14 points and 7 rebounds.

The Virginia loss was one of nine games played by BYU which were decided by three points or less. The snakebit Cougars lost seven of those games, four on last-second shots. Had BYU gone 5-4 in those close contests they would have claimed a fourth consecutive 20-game winning season.

The Cougars' biggest achievement of the year may have come when they joined the "We-beat-UCLA-at-the-Pavilion" Club with a 79-75 victory at Westwood. It was only the Bruins' 14th loss at Pauley Pavilion in 256 games. The Cougars also became one of the limited number of teams to have defeated the Bruins in back-to-back encounters. In the 1982 NCAA play-offs Danny Ainge and BYU handed the Bruins their worst defeat in 17 years, 78-55.

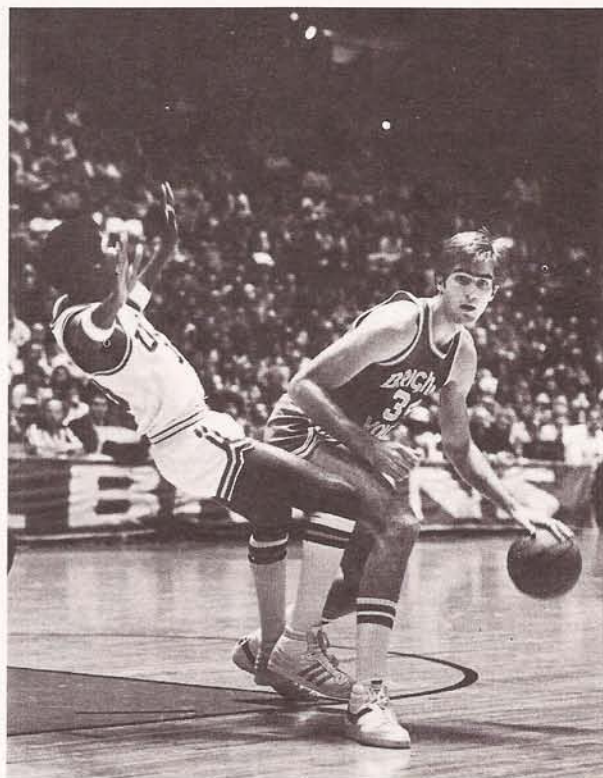
Other BYU achievements included winning their own Cougar Classic for the fourth consecutive time and tying for top honors in competition with the other schools in Utah.

Idaho State fell to the Cougars in the first game of the Classic, giving BYU its 100th victory in the Marriott Center. Western Carolina brought a 5-0 record into the championship game, only to be pushed to its first loss, 86-63.

BYU compiled a 3-3 record against the three teams which finished ahead of them in the WAC. The Cougars lost both games to nationally-ranked conference champion Wyoming. In the Provo encounter the Cougars dropped one of their "last-second" games, bowing 27-25 to the Cowboys on a tip-in at the buzzer.

BYU was the only team in the conference to sweep both games from conference co-runner-up Texas-El Paso. The Cougars split with the other conference runner-up, San Diego State, turning in perhaps their most impressive game in the win, a 106-66 decision paced by Scott Sinek's career-high 25 points.

Sinek's effort was timely for the Cougars, who had experimented with three different backcourt combinations during the season. The San Diego win was sandwiched between wins against Hawaii and UTEP, and undoubtedly aided the Cougars in securing the NIT bid.

Besides finding a backcourt combination, other personnel problems included playing the Colorado State game (the Cougars' first WAC loss) without Steve Trumbo, due to a question of academic eligibility.

Injuries to Sinek and Craig Christensen compounded the backcourt difficulties. And a third guard, Mike Maxwell, was not at full strength after coming off a major knee operation.

Seniors Trumbo and Roberts were the team leaders. Trumbo finished 12th in the nation in rebounding with an 11.5 average. He had the fourth best rebounding season ever by a Cougar, and closed his career fourth on the rebounding list. He took down 17 or more rebounds in six games while at BYU, a feat only Kresimir Cosic bettered.

Roberts finished as the second leading scorer in school history, behind Danny Ainge. He shot a career average 55 percent from the field, the second best Cougar mark ever. His career rebound total was also third on the all-time charts at BYU. Roberts also finished high in the school books in points per game, most field goal attempts, most field goals made, number of free throws, and number of free throws made.

Trumbo and Roberts were unanimous selections to the first team All-WAC squad and Roberts made the Basketball Writers' District Seven team. During the four seasons they played for BYU, the Cougars won more games (86 of 119) and had the best winning percentage (.723) of any four-year span in the school's history.
