The Marriott Center



With a seating capacity of 22,700, the Marriott Center is the nation's second-largest on-campus basketball facility. More than three million fans have watched Cougar basketball in the arena since it opened 14 years ago.

Only the 28,000-seat Carrier Dome used by Syracuse for football and basketball is larger. Kentucky's Rupp Arena is also a 23,000-seat facility, but it is owned by the city of Lexington.

Last year, BYU's per-game attendance at home was 21,448, third best in the country. The BYU single-season record for average attendance is 22,506, set during the 1980–81 season. Since the Marriott Center opened in 1971, the crowds have averaged 18,461 per game.

A new look in the Marriott Center last year was a foursided scoreboard/message center. The board has capabilities of scorekeeping, timing, etc., in addition to an animated message board that will relay messages to the crowd.

In its planning stages, the Marriott Center was to be located as close to the center of campus as possible; it had to be flexible enough to serve other major activities; and it had to seat as many spectators as possible.

Named after the nationally known businessman who was the major contributor, the J. Willard Marriott Center houses crowds for basketball, commencement exercises, concerts, pageants, devotionals and many other activities.

In 1972, 1977, 1979 and 1982, the Marriott Center served as the host for the NCAA Far West Regional playoffs.

Physically, the building covers three acres. The outside dimensions are 280×340 , or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet and encloses 8 million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof, the height is nearly 10 stories.

There are roughly 10,100 chair seats in the building with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the seats are below the concourse.

Besides the usual locker rooms, training facilities, etc., the Marriott Center serves as ticket headquarters for most major campus events. It also provides offices for the basketball coaching staff.

Brigham Young University



The Wasatch Range serves as a backdrop to the BYU campus and the J. Reuben Clark Law School.

Brigham Young University is a private, church-sponsored institution which has earned an admirable reputation for successfully blending scholarly learning with moral and spiritual education.

BYU began modestly in 1875 as Brigham Young Academy with 29 elementary school students. It is now a fully accredited, internationally recognized university with a student body of nearly 27,000, making it the largest private university in the nation in terms of full-time students.

Located in Provo, Utah, at the western foot of the Wasatch Mountains, BYU is 45 miles south of the Salt Lake City headquarters of its sponsor—The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormons).

Almost 75 percent of the 1,300 full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees, and the university is accredited by more than 100 education, business, professional and government organizations.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with fall and winter semesters each being four months long and

the summer semester being divided into spring and summer terms.

Although 98 percent of the student body is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed, or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Non-Mormons come from over 25 other denominations, and about 22 percent of the student body is married. The 1,500 foreign students come from more than 70 countries. Over 8,000 students are bilingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a mission for the Mormon Church in another country.

In addition to the regular student body on the Provo campus, BYU serves other students at the BYU-Hawaii campus in Laie, Hawaii, through the Study Abroad programs supervised by BYU faculty members in Austria, England, Israel and Hawaii and through the BYU Division of Continuing Education, which enrolls more than 350,000 in its courses each year.



Ladell's Views

1. BYU lost eight lettermen, including its top four scorers. How will the loss of these players change your strategy this year?

"It automatically changes the personality and look of this year's team. Our general philosophy will not change as far as defense is concerned, and we'll have to figure out an efficient way of scoring."

2. What is your evaluation of the talent on this year's team?

"Our guard situation is very solid, with seniors Scott Sinek and Marty Perry and juniors Chris Nikchevich and Richie Webb—all have considerable playing experience. We have one front line player back from last year's 20-game winning team, and that is Carl Pollard, who played a great deal of junior varsity ball and some varsity ball. We redshirted Timo Saarelainen; he'll be a senior and is an excellent player. Alan Pollard is returning from a mission; he is a freshman and hasn't had any playing experience as yet. We recruited two junior college players and five freshmen and have one transfer returning from a mission. We hope the mixture is good for a competitive team."

3. Your guard situation looks healthy. But what about the inside game?

"The inside game will have to be developed. I've always believed in getting the best close shots to the basket as we can possibly get. You'll see the offense flow in that direction."

4. You signed a couple of junior college players. How will they fit into the picture this year?

"With the loss of our front line, we are counting heavily on Eric Kellogg of Imperial Valley Junior College and Brian Fink out of Ricks College, both 6-8 players, and hopefully they will contribute heavily this year."

5. How would you evaluate the crop of incoming freshmen?

"They look like a fine bunch of prospects with average size. Each of them has special talents which we hope to develop to the fullest."

6. Redshirt Timo Saarelainen will be back for his senior year. How do you see him contributing?

"Timo is a talent that we've really not seen very much of; he's been talked about but really hasn't played a lot. I'm looking forward to having him have his best year since he started playing basketball."

7. What will be the strengths and weaknesses of this year's club?

"Our strength is an experienced back court. The weaknesses are the inexperience of our front line."

8. How would you rate this year's schedule? "BYU always has a very competitive schedule and I

rate this year's schedule as being very difficult."

9. How do you view the WAC race this year?


"There is no apparent Big Three, Big Two or Big One this year, at least going into the year."

10. How do you feel about the WAC's post-season tournament, now that you've had a chance to participate in it?

"It is a valuable tool for the league as a whole, and I think it will grow in popularity and be something that the fans will look forward to. The structure may have to change, depending on our experience with different phases of the tournament. But, all in all, I think it'll work out to be an outstanding event."

11. You got 20 victories in your first season as BYU's head coach. Is that a realistic goal again this year?

"I don't know if it is realistic, but at this point that is not our top priority. We could win 20 games if our team can become a good defensive club."

1984-85 Outlook


For a coach who doesn't believe in rebuilding years, Ladell Andersen has quite a bit of reconstructing to do after losing his top four scorers from last year to graduation and missions.

The 55-year-old Andersen has four returnees who have seen starting time, but three of them are guards. Gone from the 20-11 team of last year are All-American forward Devin Durrant (27.9 ppg) and All-WAC forward Brett Applegate (14.5 ppg and 11.4 rpg). Also absent this year because of mission calls will be center Jim Usevitch (7.8 ppg), forward Mike Smith (8.0 ppg), guard Brian Taylor (2.7 ppg) and guard Alan Astle (1.3 ppg).

The core of returning players consists of Scott Sinek (7.5 ppg), Chris Nikchevich (6.8 ppg) and Marty Perry (2.8 ppg), all guards. Redshirt Timo Saarelainen saw some starting time at forward two years ago and should pick up some of the offensive scoring burden. He redshirted last year to play with the Finnish Olympic team, where he has been the leading scorer for several years.

Although the guard situation looks healthy, the big void is inside, where 80 percent of BYU's scoring and rebounding was produced last year. To help sure up that area, Andersen will be looking to several transfers and returnees.

"We expect immediate help from frontline transfers Eric Kellogg (Dickinson State, N.D.) and Bryan Fink (Ricks College). A lot will also depend on the development of the Pollard brothers (Alan and Carl)," says Andersen.

Kellogg is a 6-8 forward, and Fink is a 6-8 center/forward. Alan Pollard, a 6-9 freshman forward who redshirted in 1982 before serving a mission to Sweden, returned in July and is trying to work back into shape. His brother, Carl, saw some action at center toward the latter part of last season.

A late addition to the Cougar roster was 6-10 transfer/returned missionary Tom Gneiting, who played one year at Ricks College before serving an LDS mission.

Incoming freshmen who might be asked to help inside are forwards Jeff Chatman (6-6) and Anthony Matthews (6-5). Incoming guards Marty Haws (6-2) and Andy Toolson (6-6) will add some quickness and height respectively to the Cougar roster. Haws was the Utah State high school 100-yard dash champion last year.


Richie Webb, a 6-5 junior guard, saw some action last year and could help with his fine outside shooting and passing.

Once again, the Cougars will be up against one of the finest schedules in the country. They open the season Nov. 30 at the Stanford Invitational against LaSalle. Then, after battles with in-state rivals Utah State and Weber State, they host the Cougar Classic.

PAC-10 powers UCLA and Washington come to Provo in December. Then the Cougars attend the Cotton States Classic in Atlanta. During the tough WAC slate, the Cougars take time off Feb. 23 to play Notre Dame in South Bend, Ind. The WAC's second post-season tournament is scheduled for March 4-9.

Ladell Andersen, Head Coach



Even after a 10-year layoff from coaching, Ladell Andersen proved he still knows how to win in the profession.

In his first season as head coach at BYU, Andersen led the Cougars to a 20-win season and their first NCAA appearance since 1981.

The 55-year-old Andersen was named BYU's 12th head basketball coach in April, 1983, replacing Frank Arnold. He had served 10 years as Athletic Director at Utah State University before coming to BYU but kept pace with basketball in many ways. From 1977–82 he served on the prestigious NCAA Basketball Tournament Committee. At USU he championed the Aggies' entry into the Pacific Coast Athletic Association.

In the college ranks, Ladell's teams have won 20 or more games seven of the 11 years he has been coaching and have been in seven post-season tournaments.

From 1970–72, he guided the Utah Stars of the American Basketball Association to two western division titles and coached the ABA all-stars both years.

His 115-53 (.685) record with the Stars was the winningest two-year mark in league history. Among the noteables he coached with the Stars were Zelmo Beaty, Ron Boone and Willie Wise.

From 1961–1971, Andersen became the winningest coach in Utah State history with a 176-95 (.649) record. Andersen won 20 or more games six times at USU. Some of the Aggie greats he coached included Wayne Estes, Cornell Green, Marv Roberts, Nate Williams and Shaler Halimon.

Prior to being named head coach at USU, Andersen was an assistant to Jack Gardner at Utah from 1956-61. At Utah Andersen, whose handicap has been as low as two, coached the U of U golf team.

Following his 1951 graduation from Utah State, Ladell played two years of service ball at Sandia, N.M., made the all-fourth Army and All-Service teams and was in the Olympic playoffs at Madison Square Garden. After his service commitment, he played with the Denver Bankers in the National Industrial League of the AAU and was an all-league guard for two years.

Andersen entered Utah State on a make-good scholarship basis for the 1947 Aggies. He not only cracked the starting lineup but also became a two-time All-Skyline quard

Among Andersen's assistants who have gone on to head coaching assignments are Dale Brown, Phil Johnson and Dutch Belnap and many outstanding high school coaches.

Ladell married the former Donna Jensen of Fort Shaw, Mont., in 1951, and they have five sons: Clint (owns a construction company in Mesa, Ariz.), Larry (head basketball coach at Snow College), Richie (studies art at BYU), Bob (owns a business marketing an adjustable basketball standard originally invented by Ladell) and Jim (studies communications/public relations at BYU).

Roger Reid, Assistant Head Coach

It's been six years since Roger Reid joined the BYU basketball staff, and those years have been some of the most successful in the history of the school.

Since 1978, when the 36-year-old Reid came to BYU, the Cougars have won three WAC championships and averaged 20 wins a season. He has also served as chairman (1980-81) of the recruiting committee for the National Association of Basketball Coaches. In 1981 he helped give basketball clinics throughout Australia for three weeks.

A native Utahn, Reid was an outstanding athlete at Springville High School, where he was student body vice-president and all-state athlete. He was named MVP in the annual North-South all-star baseball game his senior year.

Reid enrolled at BYU and was a member of the freshman basketball team and the Cougar baseball squad which made the trip to Mexico City.

He later transferred to the College of Eastern Utah and was selected MVP on the school's baseball team. Twice he was named to the Junior College All-America team in that sport.

From CEU he moved to Weber State College, where he was a member of the Big Sky Conference championship basketball team coached by Dick Motta. Reid also received all-conference honors in baseball for two years. He was graduated from Weber State in 1968.

Reid then went on to spend four years as a shortstop in professional baseball with the Chicago White Sox and Atlanta Braves organizations.


Reid began his coaching career in 1971 as basketball and baseball coach at Payson High School. His overall basketball record at Payson was 50-26. And the baseball team had a 35-11 mark under his direction.

In 1974 he joined the coaching staff at Clearfield High School, where he took the basketball team to the state tournament for the first time in five years. Clearfield's overall record was 60 wins against 24 losses during that period.

Throughout his prep coaching career, his teams were known as tough defensive squads, despite the fact that the tallest player was only 6-4.

Reid is married to the former Diane Gardner, and they have three sons and one daughter: Randy, 14; Robbie, 10; Darren, 5; and Kelli Ann, 3.

He has served as first counselor in a bishopric and has also served on a high council in the LDS Church and is now executive secretary in his ward.





Carl Ingersoll

Five years ago Carl "Rags" Ingersoll left the head coaching position at Alta High School in Salt Lake City to join the BYU staff.

Ingersoll, 51, is a 1958 graduate of BYU and is a veteran of several successful high school teams in Utah prep circles. He came to BYU in 1980 as graduate teaching assistant.

Perhaps Carl is best known for his eight-year stint as head basketball coach at American Fork High School. In his last six years at American Fork, his teams reached the championship round four times and won the state title twice (1976 and 1979).

Ingersoll was named the Provo Daily Herald Coach-ofthe-Year in 1976 and 1979 and also received several awards for his coaching involvement in the Utah Cerebral Palsy Charity program.


Ingersoll was graduated from BYU with a degree in zoology. He taught biology for 18 years at American Fork High, where he was also an assistant football coach for several seasons.

He played one collegiate basketball season at the Branch Agricultural College (Southern Utah State) in Cedar City. He played two years while serving in the U.S. Army at Fort Bragg, N.C.

Wayne McGhee


A newcomer on the Cougar coaching staff this year is Wayne McGhee, who is in charge of the junior varsity program.

President Jeffrey R. Holland

In his four years as president of Brigham Young University, Dr. Jeffrey R. Holland has made "excellence" his byword for all areas of the University.

Early in his tenure as ninth president of BYU, Dr. Holland initiated a \$100 million, five-year fund-raising campaign entitled "Excellence in the '80s." It is designed to strengthen all areas of the University. At the halfway point of the campaign earlier this year, half of the \$100 million had been raised.

"We cannot do everything at BYU," President Holland has said. "Perhaps we will not even continue to pursue all of the things we've tried to do in the past. But what we choose to do, we intend to do superbly well."

That same philosophy carries over to athletics at BYU. "It (athletics) has a legitimate place, and, like everything else in the college experience, if it's going to be done, it should be done well," he says.

A St. George, Utah, native, Dr. Holland was a standout performer on the Dixie High School basketball and football teams. He later became captain of the conference-champion Dixie College basketball team.

After serving a two-year mission in Great Britain for the LDS Church (1960-62), President Holland enrolled at BYU, where he obtained a bachelor's degree in English with highest honors and a master's degree in religious education, graduating with distinction. While at BYU, he was designated an E.S. Hinckley Scholar and was elected to Phi Kappa Phi honor society. More recently, he was honored as a recipient of the University's Distinguished Alumni Service Award.


Dr. Holland obtained a second master's degree and a doctorate in American Studies at Yale University in 1973, where he was a Yale University Fellow. He wrote his dissertation on "Mark Twain's Religious Sense: The Viable Years—1835 to 1883."


Preceding his appointment as president of BYU, Dr. Holland served more than four years as Commissioner of Education for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latterday Saints, with responsibilities for all of the Church's educational programs which reached more than 750,000 students worldwide. Prior to that, he was dean of Religious Instruction at BYU, and he has served as instructor or director at several LDS Institutes of Religion.

A popular speaker and writer, President Holland is noted for his keen sense of humor. He has had more than 50 articles and adresses published in both LDS and professional journals, including "Vital Speeches of the Day."

In the LDS Church, he has been a high councilor, a bishop, and a counselor in three stake presidencies. He also served as director of the Melchizedek Priesthood MIA program and as chairman of the Church's Young Adult Committee.

President Holland serves on the governing boards of the Deseret News Publishing Company, Commercial Security Bancorporation, Intermountain Health Care, Inc., all in Salt Lake City, and the Polynesian Cultural Center in Laie, Hawaii. He also serves as a director of the American Association of Presidents of Independent Colleges and Universities (AAPICU).





He and his wife, Patricia Terry Holland, also of St. George, have three children: Matthew, Mary Alice and David.




Athletic Administration

Dr. Clayne R. Jensen, Dean and Faculty Representative

Dr. Clayne Jensen is in his 11th year as dean of the College of Physical Education, which encompasses BYU athletics. A respected and experienced administrator, Dr. Jensen served in the capacity of professor and assistant dean for six years before becoming dean. He has served as BYU faculty representative since 1976 and is a member of BYU's Special Events and Athletics Advisory Board.

Born March 17, 1930, in Gunnison, Utah, Dr. Jensen graduated from the University of Utah in 1956 and obtained his doctorate from Indiana University in 1963. From 1953-55 he was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, and coached two all-Marine championship teams in track and field. He was a faculty member at Utah State (1956-64), member of Phi Kappa Phi and recipient of Briethbard Athletic Foundation Award (1955). He is author or co-author of 16 books currently in print, and used in over 700 colleges and universities. He is a member and chairman of several professional boards and special committees dealing with physical education, athletics and related fields. He holds membership in five professional groups and has traveled in 44 states and 24 countries. Several summers ago he served as a U.S. delegate to the International Olympic Academy in Olympia, Greece.

He has been included in 17 national and international biographies, including "Who's Who in American Education," "Outstanding Educators of America" and "Noteworthy Americans."



Dr. Jensen is married to the former Elouise Henrie and they have four sons: Craig, Mike and Blake (all former members of BYU's football team) and Chris.


Glen Tuckett, Athletic Director

Most of the large strides made in BYU's athletic program have come during Glen Tuckett's tenure as athletic director. Since he assumed the directorship in July of 1976, the Cougars have claimed eight supremacy titles in the Western Athletic Conference. In 1983, he was given the Dale Rex award, the highest athletic honor given by BYU. He has also been inducted into the BYU Hall of Fame for his successful coaching of the baseball team for 17 years, during which time his teams won 13 division baseball titles, three WAC championships and two NCAA District 7 crowns. Twice his teams went to the College World Series.

Tuckett was president of the 1977 American Association of Baseball Coaches and was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame in 1979. He was, at the time of his retirement, the ninth winningest baseball coach in the NCAA.

Raised in Murray, Utah, Tuckett was an all-around athlete at Murray High School. He played professional baseball after graduation but obtained a B.S. degree from the University of Utah in 1953. He came to BYU in 1959, serving as assistant football coach for six years and baseball coach for 17 years. He obtained a master's degree from BYU in 1962 and a doctorate in 1978. He was voted an outstanding teacher at BYU.

Tuckett is a counselor in the Edgemont Stake Presidency. He is married to the former Josephine Whittaker



of Stockport, England, and they have four daughters: Alison, Shannon, Kendall and Erin.

Several away games are carried live each season on KBYU-TV, as well as coverage of the annual Cougar Classic.



Western Athletic Conference

As the Western Athletic Conference enters its 22nd year, it is enjoying increased national attention as a result of the successful athletic programs of its member institutions. Last year, two WAC teams, BYU and UTEP, were invited to participate in the NCAA basketball tournament.

The league is the most geographically diverse in the country, spreading from the 7,000-foot heights of Laramie, Wyo., to the sea-level sprawls of Hawaii and San Diego. Each of the league's nine members adds to the flavor of the conference with its distinct personality.

Founded July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. In September, 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

A major change occurred in July, 1978, when Arizona and Arizona State left for the Pac-10. But on the same day, San Diego State made its official entry into the conference. Hawaii became the eighth member the following year, and the Air Force Academy entered in 1980.



1983-84 Season Summary



Devin Durrant is BYU's second-leading all-time scorer.

Despite playing one of the toughest basketball schedules in the country, the Cougars managed to put together a 20-win season and win a trip to the NCAA post-season tournament under first-year head coach Ladell Andersen.

Teams like Kentucky, Georgetown, UCLA, Notre Dame, Virginia Commonwealth, Alabama-Burmingham, Utah State, Weber State and Oregon highlighted the non-WAC schedule, while the WAC slate included powerful teams like UTEP and New Mexico.

The Cougars held their own against the tough competition, winning games against Virginia Commonwealth, Oregon, Weber State, UTEP, Notre Dame and New Mexico. In the first round of the NCAA tournament, BYU upset Alabama-Burmingham at Burmingham. However, the Cougars were knocked out of the tournament by eventual final-four participant Kentucky.

In the WAC, the Cougars compiled a 12-4 record and finished second behind UTEP. Only a last-second loss at Wyoming kept BYU from staying in the WAC race. BYU's luck faltered in the WAC's first post-season tournament, and the Cougars lost to New Mexico in the semi-final round.

Individually, the Cougars were led again by All-American Devin Durrant. Durrant finished the season among the nation's scoring leaders averaging 27.9 points per game. He also averaged an incredible 39.5 minutes of playing time per game.

The first-team Academic All-American broke his own school record for the number of free throws attempted (307) and made (242) in a season. He also broke records for the most points made in a season (866), most points

per game (27.9) and most field goals made in a season (312). He also set a bundle of career school records.

Teammate Brett Applegate was among the nation's leaders in rebounding, finishing the season with an average of 11.4 caroms per game. His 14.5 points per game was the second-best total on the team. He joined Durrant on the All-WAC first team.


A big surprise for BYU was the play of center Jim Usevitch toward the latter part of the season. The 6-9 sophomore became a dominating force in the final games. His best game was a 25-point, 11-rebound performance against UTEP.

It seemed as if much of the team's success fluctuated with the performance of the guards. Scott Sinek and Chris Nikchevich averaged 7.5 and 6.8 points respectively. Marty Perry and Brian Taylor also saw frequent action and sparked the team on several occasions.

Mike Smith started much of the season in the high post and finished with an average of 8.0 points per game.

Once again, the Cougars were a big draw at home. Nearly 322,000 fans watched the games in the Marriott Center for an average of 21,448 per game—the fourth best in school history. Overall, BYU played before more than 500,000 spectators during the year.

Players opting to serve church missions at the conclusion of the season were Jim Usevitch, Mike Smith, Brian Taylor and Alan Astle.



Cougar Basketball History



The Men's Gym on the third floor of this building was the Cougars' first home.

The roots of BYU's basketball program extend back to near the turn of the century, although it wasn't until 1917 that the Cougars joined the Rocky Mountain Faculty Athletic Conference and started keeping track of wins and losses.

A look back at the humble beginning of BYU basketball reveals a completely different set of circumstances than exist today. For instance, in those days, the Cougars played their home games in the gym on the third floor of the Training School building on lower campus.

Seating capacity in that gym was about 700. For the "big" games, fans would perch themselves in windows, on ladders and on top of lockers along the wall.

E.L. Roberts was coach of the Cougars from 1918–20 and compiled a 14-7 record. He was followed by Alvin Twitchell, who coached from 1921–25 and had a 44-20 record. Roberts again took the reins of the Cougar program for the 1926–27 season and helped champion the change that eventually eliminated the center jump after every basket.

In 1928, BYU moved its home games to the Women's Gym, where the seating capacity was nearly double that of the other facility. Provo's local radio station (KOVO) carried one of the first-ever broadcasts of a basketball game. Two-handed push shots were in vogue. And BYU landed its first All-American, Elwood Romney.

Some of the coaches who handled the Cougar program during the "Women's Gym" era were G. Ott Romney (1928–35), Edwin R. Kimball (1936, 1939–41), Fred "Buck" Dixon and Floyd Millet (1942–49).

An unforgettable chapter in the chronicle of BYU basketball was written between 1946 and 1950, when the Cougars played their home games on the floor of the Springville High School gym. Seating capacity in that gym was listed as 1,200, although officials discovered it could actually hold 1,700 with some crunching together of bodies.

Despite the handicaps, the Springville Gym was the site for some outstanding basketball. Some of the players who displayed their skills in the old gym were Joe Nelson, Mel Hutchins, Roland Minson; Utah's Arnie Fer-

rin and Vern Gardner; Denver's Vince Boryla; and Utah State's Ladell Andersen, just to mention a few.

Forced out of the Springville Gym in 1950, the Cougars had to go searching for a temporary home while the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was under construction. The University of Utah graciously offered its home floor—the 6,000-seat Einer Nielsen Fieldhouse.

Pre-season games were played in the Springville Gym that year, but once Skyline Conference action began, all games were played 45 miles away in Salt Lake City.

As transients, the Cougars didn't suffer much. They split with the Utes, 2-2, and captured the conference championship. They also went on to win the National Invitational Tournament in Madison Square Garden.

That was only the second year for Coach Stan Watts, a man who molded BYU's program into one of the nation's finest.

At long last, BYU's team moved into the 10,200-seat Smith Fieldhouse in December of 1951. Coach Watts coached every one of the 246 games played in the Fieldhouse over the next 20 years. Large crowds enjoyed some of the finest basketball teams in the country during that era, including another NIT championship team from BYU in 1966.

The demand for more seats prompted school officials to begin planning construction of the 23,000-seat Marriott Center which, at the time, was the largest on-campus basketball arena in the nation. It opened officially in December of 1971 with a sell-out crowd. Average attendance at home games that year was more than 21,000.

Since the opening of the Marriott Center, four coaches have been at the helm. Stan Watts retired in 1972 after winning 431 games. He was followed by Glenn Potter (1972–75) and Frank Arnold (1976–83).

Last season marked the beginning of the Ladell Andersen era at BYU. The veteran coach left the athletic director positon at Utah State and became the 12th coach at BYU.



Press row tickets for all home games will be limited to working members of the press, radio, television, visiting information directors, and college scouts.


Press passes will be issued on an individual game basis and requests must be received in the Sports Information Office no later than three days before the game.
