

The Marriott Center



With a seating capacity of 22,700, the Marriott Center is the nation's second-largest on-campus basketball facility. Nearly 3.5 million fans have watched Cougar basketball in the arena since it opened 14 years ago.

Only the 28,000—seat Carrier Dome, used by Syracuse for football and basketball, is larger. Kentucky's Rupp Arena is also a 23,000—seat facility, but it is owned by the city of Lexington.

In the past BYU has been one of the best drawing teams in America. Since the Marriott Center opened in 1971, the crowds have averaged 18,401 per game. The BYU single-season record for average attendance is 22,506, set during the 1980–81 season. A two year old addition to the Marriott Center is the four-sided scoreboard/message center. The board has capabilities of scorekeeping, timing, etc., in addition to an animated message board that will relay messages to the crowd.

In the planning stages, the Marriott Center was to be located as close to the center of campus as possible; it had to be flexible enough to serve other major activities; and it had to seat as many spectators as possible.

Named after the nationally known businessman who was the major contributor, the J. Willard Marriott Center houses crowds for basketball, commencement exercises, concerts, pageants, devotionals and many other activities.

In 1972, 1977, 1979 and 1982, the Marriott Center served as the host for the NCAA Far West Regional playoffs.

Physically, the building covers three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 X 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet and encloses 8 million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof, the height is nearly 10 stories.

There are roughly 10,100 chair seats in the building with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the seats are below the concourse.

Besides the usual locker rooms, training facilities, etc., the Marriott Center serves as ticket headquarters for most major campus events. It also provides offices for the basketball coaching staff.

Brigham Young University



Brigham Young University rests at the base of the 12,000-foot Wasatch Mountains.

Brigham Young University is a private, church-sponsored institution which has earned an admirable reputation for successfully blending scholarly learning with moral and spiritual education.

BYU began modestly in 1875 as Brigham Young Academy with 29 elementary school students. It is now a fully accredited, internationally recognized university with a student body of nearly 27,000, making it the largest private university in the nation in terms of full-time students.

Located in Provo, Utah, at the western foot of the Wasatch Mountains, BYU is 45 miles south of the Salt Lake City headquarters of its sponsor—The Church of Jesus Christ of Latterday Saints (Mormons).

Almost 75 percent of the 1,300 full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees, and the university is accredited by more than 100 education, business, professional and government organizations.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with fall and winter semesters each being four months long and the summer semester being divided into spring and summer terms.

Although 98 percent of the studentbody is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed, or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Students who are not members of the Mormon faith come from over 25 other denominations, and about 22 percent of the studentbody is married. The 1,500 foreign students come from more than 70 countries. Over 8,000 students are bilingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a mission for the Mormon Church in another country.

In addition to the regular student body on the Provo campus, BYU serves other students at the BYU-Hawaii campus in Laie, Hawaii, through the Study Abroad programs supervised by BYU faculty members in Austria, England, Israel and Hawaii and through the BYU Division of Continuing Education, which enrolls more than 350,000 in it courses each year.



Ladell's Views

1. The three main guards from last year's team are gone. Going into the season, who does it appear will be the main contenders for that position?

"In the early going, it looks like Richie Webb, Averian Parrish, Mike Maxwell and Bobby Capener are the main contenders for that posi-

tion."

2. You recruited mainly in the junior college ranks. Will these three players (Averian Parrish, Brent Stevenson and Greg Humphreys) be called upon to contribute heavily this year?

"The three junior college transfers must help our team this year for us to be successful. They will be an integral part of whatever we do

this year."

3. Averian Parrish (junior college All-American) mainly played forward last year. Do you plan to use him in that position or at big

guard?

"Averian Parrish in a very talented basketball player and can play any position on the floor. He could play front line or back court. At the present time, I'm planning to swing him to the front and back court, and there's a good chance he will play a lot of guard this year."


 Your last two small forwards (Devin Durrant and Timo Sarelainen) have been among the nation's scoring leaders. Will your

offense again showcase the small forward?


"Hopefully, this year's team will have a more balanced scoring attack; and the junior college transfers and some of our younger players that were here last year, being a year older, will make us have more of a scoring balance among our entire squad."

5. How does the center position appear at this time?

"Other than the center jumping position, we really don't refer to our players as centers, forwards and guards as much as we do front court and back court. We feel that we have several fine prospects to man our front line positions. In fact, one of the strengths of this year's team will be the depth we will have in our front line. Tom Gneiting and Alan Pollard both have had great experience as a sophomore and freshman last year and are in much better physical condition and should play with more confidence this year. A player that showed great promise last year was Jeff Chatman, who is stronger and will also play with more confidence this year, to go along with Bryan Fink,

Bob Cochran, Brent Stephenson, Greg Humphreys and swing man Averian Parrish.

6. What would you consider to be the strengths and weaknesses of this year's group?

"The strengths of this year's team would be more depth, better overall shooting and stronger rebounding. The weakness would be overall team quickness."

7. How would you rate your schedule this season?

"Our schedule this year is, as usual, just excellent. And we'll have to be ready every outing."

8. How do you see the WAC race this season?

"I believe the WAC race should be very interesting this year because I think as many as six teams have a good shot at the title. New Mexico has most of their team back. UTEP will be strong. Utah finished up strong last year, as well as the Air Force Academy. I feel like we'll be in the thick of things because of the very fine junior college recruiting class that we have coming in."

9. How would you evaluate your incoming freshmen?

"We have two freshmen, Mark Heslop and Chris Rasmussen, who will be in a learning situation this year. Both men seem to be outstanding shooters."

10. Are there any walkons who may contribute on the varsity this eason?

"There's always the possibility of a walk-on such as Bob Cochran last year, who earned a scholarship and is on our squad this year. We hope that we can find several that would be in his class. That would be very difficult because Bob's such a fine player."

11. How would you describe your offensive and defensive philoso-

phies with this year's team?

"My offensive philosophy has always been an up-tempo type of offense. However, with playing the 45—second clock in every game this year and on into tournaments, we could see a more conservative approach, trying to use the clock to our best advantage. Defensively, this team, because of lack of quickness, might tend to play more zone and keep our big fellows near the basket. However, I've always been a man-to-man teaching coach."





1985-86 Outlook

Injuries and mission calls played havoc with Cougar basketball fortunes last year. As a result, BYU found itself struggling at the start of the season, winning 12 of 16 in the middle, then fading at the finish with an overall 15–14 record. This time around, Coach Ladell Andersen and his staff will be looking for more stability and more consistency from a squad that contains nine returning lettermen.

Gone from the 1985 team are the top three scorers of last season, including Timo Saarelainen, who averaged 22.0 points per game and was named the WAC's most valuable player. And a church mission call claimed freshman standout Andy Toolson. Scott Sinek, a starter most of the past three seasons, will be missed on the guard line, along with Marty Perry. Those four averaged more than 45 points per game between them last season, about 60 percent of the scoring output.

Even with the balance of the team returning, there will have to be some major retooling for the 1985–86 season. To help bring the club up to strength, the Cougar staff acquired three promising junior college transfers and two fine prospects from the prep ranks. Two or three of the five could provide immediate help.

Two of the three junior college transfers are coming to BYU from the 1985 junior college national championship team at Dixie College (St. George, Utah). Newcomer Averian Parrish (6–5) was named MVP at the national tournament, and Dixie teammate Brent Stephenson (6–9) was named All-American and was also one of the most highly recruited players in the State. A third transfer, Greg Humphreys (6–7) from Snow College (Ephraim, Utah) played in the same conference (ICAC) with Parrish and Stephenson. Parrish led the league in scoring (25.9 points per game), and Humphreys was runnerup (23.2). Humphreys was the leading rebounder in the conference (9.7), and Stephenson was a 60 percent shooter from the field. With these three aboard, the BYU outlook should improve markedly.

While not too much can be expected from a team that as yet has not played together, the combination of new transfers and returning lettermen will give the Cougars a new look. The battle for starting positions on the front line will be intense. Sophomore Alan Pollard (6–9) averaged nearly 28 minutes of play per game his freshman year. Another sophomore, Jeff Chatman (6–6), was in 26 games for an average of 15 minutes of play. Junior Tom Gneiting (6–10) saw a lot of time at center last season, which should give BYU seasoning for this year.

There will be one senior returning on the guard line. Richie Webb (6–5) averaged 13 minutes of play per game last year. A mission returnee, Bob Capener (6–3), will also be vying for a guard spot. But the Cougars could use some more help, some more fire power on the guard line.

Coach Andersen is also making room for two high school recruits who will figure in the Cougars' future. Guard Mark Heslop (6–5) was an outstanding all-around athlete at Ogden High School, and Chris Rasmussen (6–7) is one of the better players to come out of Montanna (Butte High School) in recent years. But Andersen may be looking for immediate help for this year.

Overall, the Cougars will be working with a new mixture of talent. It appears the challenge will be to come up with some scoring punch, plus some consistent shooting from the free throw line. Last season the Cougars dropped several games because they weren't steady at the free throw line. Given the right combination of factors, BYU could improve on last year's record.

Ladell Andersen, Head Coach



Winning has become a habit for Ladell Andersen, head coach at Brigham Young University. In the 12 years he has coached on the college level, he has had 10 winning seasons. Two other years in the professional ranks produced the same winning results.

The 56-year-old Andersen was named BYU's 12th head basketball coach in April, 1983, replacing Frank Arnold. He guided BYU to a 20–11 record in his first season.

Andersen had served 10 years as Athletic Director at Utah State University before coming to BYU but kept pace with basketball in many ways. From 1977–82 he served on the prestigious NCAA Basketball Tournament Committee. At USU he championed the Aggies' entry into the Pacific Coast Athletic Association.

In the college ranks, Ladell's teams have won 20 or more games seven of the 12 years he has been coaching and have been in seven post-season tournaments.

From 1970–72, he guided the Utah Stars of the American Basketball Association to two western division titles and coached the ABA all-stars both years.

His 115–53 (.685) record with the Stars was the winningest two-year mark in league history. Among the noteables he coached with the Stars were Zelmo Beaty, Ron Boone and Willie Wise.

From 1961–1971, Andersen became the winningest coach in Utah State history with a 176–95 (.649) record. Andersen won 20 or more games six times at USU. Some of the Aggie greats he coached included Wayne Estes, Cornell Green, Marv Roberts Nate Williams and Shaler Halimon.

Prior to being named head coach at USU, Andersen was an assistant to Jack Gardner at Utah from 1956–61. At Utah Andersen, whose handicap has been as low as two, coached the U of U golf team.

Following his 1951 graduation from Utah State, Ladell played two years of service ball at Sandia, N.M., made the all-Fourth Army and All-Service teams and was in the Olympic playoffs at Madison Square Garden. After his service commitment, he played with the Denver Bankers in the National Industrial League of the AAU and was an all-league guard for two years.

Andersen entered Utah State on a make-good scholarship basis for the 1947 Aggies. He not only cracked the starting lineup but also became a two-time All-Skyline guard.

At one point in Ladell's long career, he participated in 11 consecutive national tournaments as a player, as an assistant coach and as a head coach. He is now a member of the National Association of Basketball Coaches, the ruling board of basketball coaches in the United States, and chairs the prestigious All-America Committee. Ladell was the originator of summer basketball camps in the Rocky Mountain area. Now there are hundreds of similar basketball camps.

Among Andersen's assistants who have gone on to head coaching assignments are Dale Brown, Phil Johnson and Dutch Belnap and many outstanding high school coaches.

Ladell married the former Donna Jensen of Fort Shaw, Mont., in 1951, and they have five sons: Clint (owns a construction company in Mesa, Ariz.), Larry (head basketball coach at Snow College), Richie (a talented artist in Mesa, Ariz.), Bob (owns a business marketing an adjustable basketball standard originally invented by Ladell) and Jim (studies communications/public relations at BYU). Ladell and his wife have 11 grandchildren.

Roger Reid, Assistant Head Coach

In the seven years Roger Reid has been a member of the BYU coaching staff, BYU has experienced some of its great-

est accomplishments.

Since 1978, when the 38-year-old Reid came to BYU, the Cougars have won three WAC championships and averaged nearly 20 wins a season. Roger has been head recruiting coordinator and also has been given the team defensive responsibility by Coach Andersen. He has served as chairman (1980-81) of the recruiting committee for the National Association of Basketball Coaches. In 1981 he helped give basketball clinics throughout Australia for three weeks.

A native Utahn, Reid was an outstanding athlete at Springville High School, where he was student body vicepresident and an all-state athlete. He was named MVP in the annual North-South all-star baseball game his senior year. Reid enrolled at BYU and was a member of the freshman basketball team and the Cougar baseball squad which made

the trip to Mexico City.

He later transferred to the College of Eastern Utah and was selected MVP on the school's baseball team. Twice he was named to the Junior College All-America team in that sport. From CEU he moved to Weber State College, where he was a member of the Big Sky Conference championship basketball team coached by Dick Motta. Reid also received all-conference honors in baseball for two years. He was graduated from Weber State in 1968.

Reid then went on to spend four years as a shortstop in professional baseball with the Chicago White Sox and Atlanta

Braves organizations.

Reid began his coaching career in 1971 as basketball and baseball coach at Payson High School. His overall basketball record at Payson was 50-26. And the baseball team had a 35-11 mark under his direction.


In 1974 he joined the coaching staff at Clearfield High School, where he took the basketball team to the state tournament for the first time in five years. Clearfield's overall record was 60 wins against 24 losses during that period.

Throughout his prep coaching career, his teams were known as tough defensive squads, despite the fact that the

tallest player was only 6-4.

Reid is married to the former Diane Gardner, and they have three sons and one daughter: Randy, 15; Robbie, 11; Darren, 6; and Kelli Ann, 4.

He has served as first counselor in a bishopric and has also served on a high council in the LDS Church.





Carl Ingersol

Six years ago Carl "Rags" Ingersoll gave up a successful high school coaching career to join the BYU staff.

Ingersoll, 51, is a 1958 graduate of BYU and is a veteran of several successful high school teams in Utah prep circles. He came to BYU from Alta High School in 1980 as graduate teaching assistant.

Perhaps Carl is best known for his eight-year stint as head basketball coach at American Fork High School. In his last six years at American Fork, his teams reached the championship round four times and won the state title twice (1976 and 1979).

Ingersoll was named the Provo Daily Herald Coach-of-the-Year in 1976 and 1979 and also received several awards for his coaching involvement in the Utah Cerebral Palsy Charity program.

Ingersoll was graduated from BYU with a degree in zoology. He taught biology for 18 years at American Fork High, where he was also an assistant football coach for several seasons.



Charles "Chic" Hess


The newest member of BYU's coaching staff, Charles "Chick" Hess, brings with him a vast amount of experience on both the high school and college levels.

Hess came to BYU on a graduate teaching assistantship last year after serving as an assistant basketball coach at BYU-Hawaii for two years. During those two seasons, BYU-Hawaii compiled a 43-22 record, the best two-year mark in the school's history.

Prior to coaching in Hawaii, Hess coached from 1974 to 1982 at Lebanon High School in central Pennsylvania, where his record was 158-57. He was coach-of-the year in the Lancaster-Lebanon League three times. From 1972 to 1974, he coached at Loyolsock Township High School (Williamsport, Pa.) team, compiling a 34-12 record. He also had a 38-12 record while coaching from 1969 to 1972 at Medill Bair High School (Philadelphia).

Hess received B.S. (1967) and Master's (1972) degrees from East Stroudsburg University. He currently is working on a doctorate at BYU. Hess has had several articles published in coaching journals and has participated in several clinics. He helped establish a couple of exhibition basketball teams comprised mainly of elementary and junior high school youths. Perhaps his most noted former player is NBA center

Hess and his wife, Linda, have three children: Christine, 15; Rebecca, 12; and Stephen, 8.

President Jeffrey R. Holland

In his five years as president of Brigham Young University, Dr. Jeffrey R. Holland has made "excellence" his byword for all areas of the university.

Early in his tenure as ninth president of BYU, Dr. Holland initiated a \$100 million, five-year fund-raising campaign entitled "Excellence in the '80s." It is designed to strengthen all areas of the university. After three years of the campaign, nearly 75 percent of the money has been raised.

"We cannot do everything at BYU," President Holland has said. "Perhaps we will not even continue to pursue all of the things we have tried to do in the past. But what we choose to

do, we intend to do superbly well."

That same philosophy carries over to athletics at BYU. "It (athletics) has a legitimate place, and, like everything else in the college experience, if it's going to be done, it should be done well," he says.

A St. George, Utah, native, Dr. Holland was a standout performer on the Dixie High School basketball and football teams. He later became captain of the conference-champion

Dixie College basketball team.

After serving a two-year mission in Great Britain for the LDS Church (1960–62), President Holland enrolled at BYU, where he obtained a bachelor's degree in English with highest honors and a master's degree in religious education, graduating with distinction. While at BYU, he was designated an E.S. Hinckley Scholar and was elected to Phi Kappa Phi honor society. More recently, he was honored as a recipient of the University's Distinguished Alumni Service Award.

Dr. Holland obtained a second master's degree and a doctorate in American Studies at Yale University in 1973, where he was a Yale University Fellow. He wrote his dissertation on "Mark Twain's Religious Sense: The Viable Years—

1835 to 1883."

Preceding his appointment as president of BYU, Dr. Holland served more than four years as Commissioner of Education for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, with responsibilities for all of the Church's educational programs which reached more than 750,000 students worldwide. Prior to that, he was dean of Religious Instruction at BYU, and he has served as instructor or director at several LDS Institutes of Religion.

A popular speaker and writer, President Holland is noted for his keen sense of humor. He has had more than 50 articles and addresses published in both LDS and professional jour-


nals, including "Vital Speeches of the Day."


In the LDS Church, he has been a high councilor, a bishop, and a counselor in three stake presidencies. He also served as director of the Melchizedek Priesthood MIA program and as chairman of the Church's Young Adult Committee. He

currently serves as a Regional Representative.

President Holland serves on the governing boards of the Deseret News Publishing Company, Commercial Security Bancorporation, Intermountain Health Care, Inc., all in Salt Lake City, and the Polynesian Cultural Center in Laie, Hawaii. He also serves as a vice-president of the American Assoication of Presidents of Independent Colleges and Universities (AAPICU) and is a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association's (NCAA) President's Commission.

He and his wife, Patricia Terry Holland, also of St. George, have three children: Matthew, Mary Alice and David.







Dean, Athletic Director

Dr. Clayne R. Jensen, Dean and Faculty Representative


Dr. Clayne Jensen is in his 12th year as dean of the College of Physical Education, which encompasses BYU athletics. A respected and experienced administrator, Dr. Jensen served in the capacity of professor and assistant dean for seven years before becoming dean. He has served as BYU faculty athletic representative since 1976 and was chairman of BYU's Special Events and Athletics Advisory Board for seven

years.

Born March 17, 1930, in Gunnison, Utah, Dr. Jensen graduated from the University of Utah in 1956 and obtained his doctorate from Indiana University in 1963. From 1953-55 he was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, and coached two all-Marine championship teams in track and field. He was a faculty member at Utah State (1956-64), member of Phi Kappa Phi and recipient of Briethbard Athletic Foundation Award (1955). He is author or co-author of 16 books currently in print, and used in over 700 colleges and universities. He is a member and chairman of several professional boards and special committees dealing with physical education, athletics and related fields. He holds membership in five professional groups and has traveled in 44 states and 26 countries. Several summers ago he served as a U.S. delegate to the International Olympic Academy in Olympia, Greece, and he is currently on the governing board and the international faculty of the U.S. Sparta Academy.

He has been included in 17 national and international biographies, including "Who's Who in America," "Who's Who in American Education," "Outstanding Educators of American Education,"

ica" and "Noteworthy Americans."



Dr. Jensen is married to the former Elouise Henrie and they have four sons: Craig, Mike, Blake and Chris (three are former members of BYU's football team).

Glen Tuckett, Athletic Director

Most of the large strides made in BYU's athletic program have come during Glen Tuckett's tenure as athletic director.


Since he assumed the directorship in July of 1976, the Cougars have claimed nine supremacy titles in the Western Athletic Conference and consistently have been ranked among the top-10 athletic programs in the country.

In 1983, he was given the Dale Rex award, symbolic of the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah and the highest athletic honor given by BYU. He has also been inducted into the BYU Hall of Fame for his successful coaching of the baseball team for 17 years, during which time his teams won 13 division baseball titles, three WAC championships and two NCAA District 7 crowns. Twice his teams went to the College World Series.

Tucket was president of the 1977 American Association of Baseball Coaches and was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame in 1979. He was, at the time of his retirement, the ninth winningest baseball coach in the NCAA.

Raised in Murray, Utah, Tuckett was an all-around athlete at Murray High School. He played professional baseball for nine years. He obtained a B.S. degree from the University of Utah in 1953.

He launched his coaching career at West High School in Salt Lake City, where he coached football, basketball and baseball. In 1959 he joined the staff at BYU, serving as assistant football coach for six years and head baseball coach for 17 years. He obtained a master's degree from BYU in 1962 and a doctorate in 1978. He was voted an outstanding teacher at BYU. He also was a color commentator with KSL Radio for 10 years before his athletic director appointment.



Glen has served on the following committees: NCAA Committee on Committees, NCAA Television Committee, College Football Association Executive Committee, College Football Association Television Committee and NCAA Post-Season Football Committee.

Tuckett is a counselor in the Edgemont Stake Presidency. He is married to the former Josephine Whittaker of Stockport, England, and they have four daughters: Alison, Shannon, Kendall and Erin.

Western Athletic Conference

As the Western Athletic Conference enters its 23rd year, it is enjoying increased national attention as a result of the successful athetic programs of its member institutions. Last year, two WAC teams, UTEP and San Diego State were invited to play in the NCAA basketball tournament. New Mexico was a participant in the National Invitational Tournament.

The league is the most geographically diverse in the country, spreading from the 7,000–foot heights of Laramie, Wyo., to the sea-level sprawls of Hawaii and San Diego. Each of the league's nine members adds to the flavor of the conference with its distinctive features. The WAC traditionally ranks in the top conferences in the nation in per-capita attendance at basketball games.

Founded July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. In September, 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

A major change occurred in July, 1978, when Arizona and Arizona State left for the Pac-10. But on the same day, San Diego State made its official entry into the conference. Hawaii became the eighth member the following year, and the Air Force Academy entered in 1980.

One of the highlights in WAC history was BYU's winning the 1984 National Championship in football.

Based in Dever, Colorado, the WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney, who assumed the post in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Washington and Michigan State, is the fourth conference commissioner since the formation of the league.

Jeff Hurd serves as director of information for the WAC and is assisted by Mark Hollis.





1984-85 Season Summary



WAC player-of-the-year Timo Saarelainen led the Cougars in scoring with a 22.0 point-per-game average.

If the Cougars could have thown out the first five and last four games of the 1984–85 season, everyone would have considered it a year to remember. As it was, the Cougars' slow start and slow finish produced a decent-but-mediocre 15–14 season that was full of highs and lows.

Perhaps the first game of the season set the tone for the remainder of the year. The Cougars were leading LaSalle 73–71 with only eight seconds remaining in the game. A LaSalle player was fouled and hit the first of two free throws. The second attempt missed, however, and another LaSalle player tipped in the winning basket.

In all, BYU played in four overtime contests and lost three of them. Two of those "extra inning" affairs went three overtimes, and the Cougars came out on the short end both times.

On the bright side, however, BYU defeated eventual NIT champion UCLA 89–81 and knocked off then-unbeaten Washington 84–75. The Cougars also topped WAC champion UTEP 62–60 and took the Miners into three overtimes before losing 97–86 in El Paso.

Individually, senior Timo Saarenainen had an outstanding year. The 6–6 forward averaged 22.0 points per game and was named the WAC player-of-the-year. He was slowed all year, however, by a knee problem and defenses that double and sometimes triple-teamed him. He scored a season-high 41 points against New Mexico in Albuquerque and led the team in scoring 21 of the 29 games.


Senior guard Scott Sinek shook off an early-season injury and ended the year as the second-leading scorer on the squad with a 10.1 point-per-game average. He also often drew the tough defensive assignments.

A big surprise for the Cougars was the play of freshman Andy Toolson. The 6–6 guard/forward showed great shooting touch while averaging 8.5 points and 18 minutes of play per game. He hit a key jumper against Utah State that sent the game into overtime. At the end of the season, Toolson announced plans to serve a two-year church mission.

Jeff Chatman was another freshman who saw a lot of playing time. The 6–6 forward sprained an ankle on picture day and missed most of the pre-season workouts. When he finally worked his way into the lineup, he contributed with his great leaping ability and soft jump shot.

Still another freshman, Alan Pollard, contributed in a big way. A starter in all but one game, Pollard averaged 7.7 points and 7.8 rebounds per game. He pumped in 16 points in the win over UCLA and pulled down 13 rebounds at New Mexico.

In WAC play, BYU finished in a tie for third place with Colorado State and New Mexico with 9–7 records. UTEP was the eventual winner, and San Diego State was runnerup. BYU was in contention for the championship after the first half of the season but two close losses at New Mexico (76–74) and UTEP (97–86 in 3 overtimes) seemed to take the wind out of the Cougars' sails. After those games, BYU won only two of its next six games.



Scott Sinek was a four-year starter at BYU.





Cougar Basketball History



BYU's first basketball home was on the third floor of this building.

The roots of BYU's basketball program extend back to near the turn of the century, although it wasn't until 1917 that the Cougars joined the Rocky Mountain Faculty Athletic Conference and started keeping track of wins and losses.

A look back at the humble beginning of BYU basketball reveals a completely different set of circumstances than exist today. For instance, in those days, the Cougars played their home games in the gym on the third floor of the Training School building on lower campus.

Seating capacity in that gym was about 700. For the "big" games, fans would perch themselves in windows, on ladders and on top of lockers along the wall.

E.L. Roberts was coach of the Cougars from 1918–20 and compiled a 14–7 record. He was followed by Alvin Twitchell, who coached from 1921–25 and had a 44–20 record. Roberts again took the reins of the Cougar program for the 1926–27 season and helped champion the change that eventually eliminated the center jump after every basket.

In 1928, BYU moved its home games to the Women's Gym, where the seating capacity was nearly double that of the other facility. Provo's local radio station (KOVO) carried one of the first-ever broadcasts of a basketball game. Two-handed push shots were in vogue. And BYU landed its first All-American, Elwood Romney.

Some of the coaches who handled the Cougar program during the "Women's Gym" era were G. Ott Romney (1928–35), Edwin R. Kimball (1936, 1939–41), Fred "Buck" Dixon and Floyd Millet (1942–49).

An unforgettable chapter in the chronicle of BYU basketball was written between 1946 and 1950, when the Cougars played their home games on the floor of the Springville High School gym. Seating capacity in that gym was listed as 1,200, although officials discovered it could actually hold 1,700 with come crunching together of bodies.

Despite the handicaps, the Springville Gym was the site for some outstanding basketball. Some of the players who dis-

played their skills in the old gym were Joe Nelson, Mel Hutchins, Roland Minson; Utah's Arnie Ferrin and Vern Gardner; Denver's Vince Boryla; and Utah State's Ladell Andersen, just to mention a few.

Forced out of the Springville Gym in 1950, the Cougars had to go searching for a temporary home while the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was under construction. The University of Utah graciously offered its home floor—the 6,000—seat Einer Nielsen Fieldhouse.

Pre-season games were played in the Springville Gym that year, but once Skyline Conference action began, all games were played 45 miles away in Salt Lake City.

As transients, the Cougars didn't suffer much. They split with the Utes, 2–2, and captured the conference championship. They also went on to win the National Invitational Tournament in Madison Square Garden.

That was only the second year for Coach Stan Watts, a man who molded BYU's program into one of the nation's finest.

At long last, BYU's team moved into the 10,200–seat Smith Fieldhouse in December of 1951. Coach Watts coached every one of the 246 games played in the Fieldhouse over the next 20 years. Large crowds enjoyed some of the finest basketball teams in the country during that era, including another NIT championship team from BYU in 1966.

The demand for more seats prompted school officials to begin planning construction of the 23,000—seat Marriott Center which, at the time, was the largest on-campus basketball arena in the nation. It opened officially in December of 1971 with a sell-out crowd. Average attendance at home games that year was more than 21,000.


Since the opening of the Marriott Center, four coaches have been at the helm. Stan Watts retired in 1972 after winning 431 games. He was followed by Glenn Potter (1972–75) and Frank Arnold (1976–83).

It was two years ago that the Ladell Andersen era began at BYU. The veteran coach left the athletic directorship at Utah State and became the 12th coach at BYU.



A play-by-play account will be furnished at the end of each half. Complete halftime, final and individual statistics and other material will be offered both during and after the


