




Season Outlook

BYU opens the 1987–1988 basketball season with its leading scorer (20.1) from last year, 6-9 junior Michael Smith, a unanimous All-WAC first-teamer. The other forward is 6-6 senior leaper Jeff Chatman (16.9 points), the only player who has been at BYU all four years of Ladell Andersen's career with the Cougars.

The offense rests on their capable shoulders but the Cougars will have to do without a 6-10 center (Tom Gneiting) who had the best field goal percentage (.631) in school history. Also departed is team leader Bob Capener, whose 12 points per game was as much as the other guards combined.

However, Coach Andersen and his staff have the best winning percentage in WAC history, causing him to modestly say, "I think our labors have been productive." Andersen goes on to say, "Barring injury, I feel this is one of the top teams I've had the privilege of coaching."

Why all the optimism?

It might well be BYU's unique category of "former player" the returned missionary. Last year there were five. This year, the welcome mat was rolled out for Andy Toolson, a 6-6 sophomore, who averaged 8.5 points as a freshman starter.

"Andy is one of the few missionaries I've seen come back in good shape," Andersen says. "His mission president (in Chile) let him go running everyday." Toolson will probably run more time on the front line than in backcourt since the only reserve back is 6-6 junior Alan Astle, who played sparingly last year.

Jim Usevitch, a 6-9 senior, will take over for Gneiting at center but there is no Greg Humphreys or Brent Stephenson available for backup duty.

The guard line features 6-5 senior Brian Taylor, who averaged nearly eight points a game, and the crowd-pleasing super frosh of a year ago—6-0 Nathan Call and 6-2 Marty Haws.

Call, the consumate playmaker type, will be asked to shoot more and speedster Haws probably will see action as both the point guard and shooting guard.

Beyond those eight is anyone's guess. Steve Schreiner, a 6-7 sophomore, played well at Dixie College but has been away from basketball two years. Three freshmen—Mark Clausen, Gary Trost and David Wolfe—are 6-9. Vince Bryan is 6-7 while Chris Lynch and Mike Herring are 6-5.


Others who could help in the future are missionaries David Astle, Mark Heslop, Chris Rasmussen, Alan Frampton, Todd Gentry and David Reeves.

But for now, the Cougars take the floor with excellent depth in the backcourt as opposed to last year's good depth on the front line, which produced a second-place WAC finish.

A lot will have to go right for the Cougars to challenge Wyoming and New Mexico for one of the top spots. But the motivation of the WAC Tournament in Provo could make the Cougars a darkhorse contender.

Coach Andersen keeps saying, "This team has a chance [to be good]. You always hope everything will fall into place and it doesn't happen often enough. But there's something about this team I like. I think it has a chance."

Ladell's Views

Question: What do you see as the team's strengths going into the 1987–1988 season?

Answer: We'll be a good shooting team and a better than average rebounding team. We'll make fewer errors and should be better conditioned. And I think we'll be one of the better free throw shooting teams around.

Question: Will you explain "fewer errors and better conditioning?"

Answer: Nathan Call and Marty Haws played a lot for freshmen and that will pay off. Our missionaries who returned at the start of last season have had a year to get back in shape.

Question: What is your biggest concern?

Answer: We'll need to be all those things I've mentioned to offset our lack of quickness and to offset the opponents' quickness we'll be facing night after night.

Question: How does the team shape up on defense?

Answer: I think we'll be as good defensively although we'll miss Tom Gneiting. He was as good a post defender as I've coached.

Question: How do you assess the 1987-1988 schedule?

Answer: We will wind up with a strong strength of schedule rating in Division I basketball. Montana State, Alabama-Birmingham and La Salle are picked to win their conferences. UCLA won the PAC-10 last year and Tulsa won the Missouri Valley. Miami is considered the third best independent behind DePaul and Notre Dame, while Central Connecticut State ranks sixth among the independents. When you add Utah State twice and Weber State, we'll have our hands full. You hope that kind of competition pays off at tournament time.

Question: What about the WAC—is Wyoming a shoo-in?

Answer: The WAC is as good as it's been in a decade. When Wyoming has all that talent back and yet some people are picking New Mexico to win, that says a lot for the conference. I like to think we will be in the chase for the title with those two and UTEP. I think there'll be one or two surprises. Utah and Colorado State will be stronger. Air Force has a much improved program. San Diego State will be knocking over some teams it shouldn't. With a coaching changeover, Hawaii is sort of a mystery team.

Question: What about the incoming players?

Answer: I feel good about the frosh class. They need time but in a few years there will be some solid players. We'd like to have some come through this year to bolster the front line but it's a luxury if freshmen help much.

Question: How does the front line shape up?


Answer: I look for both Jeff Chatman and Michael Smith to have excellent offensive years. And for minutes played, Jim Usevitch was our leading rebounder.

Question: Will there be a three- or, perhaps, a four-man rotation on the guard line?

Answer: Both Call and Haws will help in certain situations. Call is a quarterback type—a great thinker and halfcourt player. Haws has that speed and explosiveness to break presses and be a big factor fullcourt. We may use Brian Taylor some at the point, but he's probably better suited for the two (shooting) position. Andy Toolson will be a swing player. He can play anywhere. Of course, an injury would really change our plans.

Question: What are effects of the missionary situation on your program?

Answer: The missionary program does produce more mature, responsible young men. The challenge it presents for us is in the total number of scholarships. As we reserve space, so to speak, for the missionaries, it really limits the scholarships we can offer from year to year. Our balance is thrown off.




Alan Astle 44 6-6, 190 Pounds Junior, Guard Sacramento, California


Personal: Born 10/29/64 in Salt Lake City . . . parents are Ron and Ann Astle . . . older brothers, Ken and Clint, played for BYU's volleyball squad . . . was prep MVP and team captain for three years . . . had a prep GPA of 3.91 . . . undecided on major . . . served an LDS mission to England.

High School: Lettered in basketball three times at La Sierra High School . . . selected all-league three years; all city two years; all-metro two years; all-Northern California two years; BCI All-America . . . named MVP of the Rancho Cordova Tournament and MVP of the Del Oro Tourney . . . winner of the Jacquier Memorial Award . . . all-time leading scorer at La Sierra High with 1,578 points . . . academic achievements include Salutatorian and honor roll every semester of high school career . . . coached by Rick DiRegelo (Arizona St./ Sacramento St.).

He offsets his lack of height with hard work. He will be in much better condition this year. It normally takes a year after a mission to get in top shape. Almost a straight A student academically, and one of the greatest individuals I've met.






Nathan Call 10 6-0, 180 Pounds Sophomore, Guard Mission Viejo, California


Personal: Born 2/10/68 in Newport Beach, California . . . parents are Henry and JeNeal Call . . . brother, Burt, was a BYU baseball player in 1985 . . . recruited by Arizona, Pepperdine, Cal-Irvine, Hawaii and Utah in basketball.

High School: Averaged 13.8 points, 5.1 rebounds and 9.8 assists at Capistrano Valley High . . . team posted a 27-3 record and advanced to the CIF semi-finals . . . undefeated in league play . . . lettered four years in basketball and was first-team All-CIF, was Los Angeles Times All-Orange County and South Coast League MVP . . . named MVP of the Sonora Tournament and member of the all-tourney team at the Tournament of Champions . . . was All-America BCI . . . named All-South Coast League as a junior with team record of 22-7 and a CIF quarter-finalist . . . team was 24-4 and CIF semifinalist during sophomore year . . . 26-2 as a freshman with team in CIF semi-finals . . . football honors included first-team All-CIF, first-team All-Orange County and Co-MVP of South Coast League . . . hit .438 his senior year on the baseball team ... named Southern California Prep Athlete of the Year by the First Interstate Bank-Amateur Athletic Foundation coached by Mark Thornton (San Jose State).

Jeff Chatman 24 6-6, 205 Pounds Senior, Forward Talladega, Alabama


Personal: Born 11/22/65 in Talladega, Alabama . . . parents are Melvin and Ora Chatman . . . graduated from Munford High School with a 3.91 GPA . . . honored as the Scholar-Athlete of the Year . . . plans on majoring in business management with a minor in computer science.

High School: Led his Munford High team to the county and area championship twice . . . selected All-County three times and All-State twice . . . chosen MVP in the Alabama All-Star basketball game . . . placed second in the slam dunk contest . . . all-time career scoring and rebound leader at Munford . . . discovered by BYU while the Cougars were at the 1984 NCAA tournament . . . had 16 points, seven rebounds and 11 blocked shots at that prep all-star game and was named the game's MVP . . . coached by Leon Stephens (Jacksonville St.).

BYU: 1984-85: Slowed at the beginning of season by a severe ankle injury . . . led team in field goal percentage, making .529 of his attempts and was second in blocked shots with 12 for the season . . . played in 26 games his first year at BYU... sparked the Cougars at Colorado State, scoring eight points and pulling down three rebounds in just 18 minutes of playing time . . . snared eight rebounds in three consecutive games and had a career high vs. San Diego St. with nine rebounds . . . scored 32 points in a JV game vs. the College of Eastern Utah. 1985-86: Led the team in scoring in the season opener vs. Washington State with 22 points and just kept climbing from there . . . was originally slated to fill the sixthman position for BYU but was inserted into the starting lineup for the Utah State game in December and earned the WAC Player-of-the-Week honor and a place in the starting lineup...led the Cougars in scoring in 19 of BYU's 32 season and post-season games and scored in double figures in all but two games . . . was leading rebounder in four games with a high 12 rebounds . . . high scoring game for the season was vs. Hawaii when he had 30 points and led the team in field goal percentage with .545 . . . honors included honorable mention on the Associated Press and Sporting News All-America lists, first-team All-District 7, second-team All-WAC,

and a member of the All-Kactus Klassic and All-Cougar Classic teams. 1986–87: Second-leading BYU scorer . . . started every game . . . averaged 16.9 points per game . . . shot 51% from the floor . . . named to USBWA All-District VII team and selected second-team All-WAC . . . made All-Cougar Classic team . . . led team in free throw attempts (131) . . . had 29 points vs. Hawaii in the Mariott Center and 25 in tournament game vs. New Orleans . . . 
Marty Haws 21 6-2, 170 Pounds Sophomore, Guard Midvale, Utah



High School: Lettered in football, baseball, track and basketball at Hillcrest . . . was selected all-state wide receiver and all-state in basketball his junior and senior years . . . had 54 receptions for 1,033 yards and 19 touchdowns in football, and averaged 23 points and seven assists a game in basketball his senior year . . . was named Most Valuable Player in basketball and football by the Deseret News his senior year . . . selected to the 1983 Balley's High School All-America team for football and the 1984 Converse National High School All-American team for basketball . . . was 4A state champion in the 100-meter dash, 200-meter dash, and the long jump his senior year . . . played center field on the Hillcrest state champion baseball team his junior year . . . voted Most Inspirational Player . . . coached by Jim Jimas (BYU).

Ladell Andersen, Head Coach

Winning seasons and post-season success have become synonymous with BYU head basketball coach Ladell Andersen. Consider:

In 14 seasons as a collegiate head coach, Ladell has produced 12 teams with winning records and eight teams with 20 wins or more. In nine of those seasons, Andersen's teams have gone on to post-season play.

As head coach of the Utah Stars in the American Basketball Association (ABA), Andersen compiled the best two-year mark in ABA history 115-53 (.685), and his Stars won the

Western Division championship twice.

Ladell's BYU report card reads: 1) 4 national tournament appearances, 2 NCAA and 2 NIT (1 post season, 1 preseason). 2) 12-game winning streak (tied school record). 3) Winningest percentage in WAC history (44-20/4 seasons, WAC games only, for .688). 4) Coach of the Year (District 7) 1985–86. 5) Coached the West Team to first place in the Olympic Festival in Houston, the first time in five years that had occurred.

Almost 40 years ago, Ladell began his career in college basketball at Utah State on a make-good scholarship. Not content with simply making the starting five, he went on to

become a two-time All-Skyline selection at guard.

In 1951, Ladell graduated from Utah State and went on to play basketball in the Air Force while he was stationed at Sandia, New Mexico. In his two years there, Andersen accumulated more honors as he was selected All-Service. In 1952, he played in the Olympic playoffs at Madison Square Garden.

After Air Force ball, Ladell went on to play with the Denver Bankers of the National Industrial League and was named All-League twice before he retired as a player and took up coaching at the University of Utah in 1956.

Andersen's first coaching experience came as an assistant to Ute head basketball coach Jack Gardner. In addition to his basketball duties, Ladell coached the Ute golf team. He is a scratch golfer with a handicap that has been as low as two.

After five years at Utah, Andersen got his first crack at head coaching at Utah State in 1961.

He coached Aggie greats such as Wayne Estes, Cornell Green, Marv Roberts, Nate Williams, Shaler Halimon and Robert Loriski while becoming Utah State's all-time winningest coach (176-95/.649). His Aggie teams competed in five NCAA tournaments and one NIT.

In 1971, Andersen moved to the professional ranks and coached the ABA's Stars. In addition to winning two division championships, Ladell also was asked to coach the ABA all-stars twice. After the 1972–73 season, Ladell accepted Utah State's athletic directorship. At that point in time, it looked as if Andersen's outstanding coaching career was over.

During the next 10 years, Andersen still managed to make his mark on basketball. As the Aggie A.D., he championed Utah State's admission into the Pacific Coast Athletic Association. And for five years during that span, he also served on the important NCAA Division I Basketball Tournament Committee.

The 59-year-old Andersen has been BYU's head basket-ball coach since April, 1983. His record is 74-50.

He is a member of the National Association of Basketball Coaches' Board of Directors and serves as chairman of the prestigious All-America committee. Andersen, the originator of summer basketball camps in the Rocky Mountain area, still runs his own camp each summer at BYU. He also invented an adjustable basketball standard, called the "quick adjust." He is a volunteer worker at Utah State Prison.

Ladell and his wife Donna have five sons—Clint (co-owner of a construction company in Mesa, Arizona), Larry (head basketball coach at Snow College), Richie (a counselor at a youth detention center and an outstanding artist in Mesa, Arizona), Bob (assistant basketball coach at Southern Utah State College) and Jim (student at BYU). They also have 12 grandchildren.

Roger Reid, Asst. Head Coach

Roger Reid came to the BYU basketball program nine years ago and brought with him a wealth of experience both as an athlete and as a coach.

Under Coach Ladell Andersen, Roger has been responsible for BYU's defensive schemes. The 40-year-old Reid also has been coordinating BYU's recruiting efforts since he joined the staff in 1978. He has served as chairman (1980–81) of the recruiting committee for the National Association of Basketball Coaches. In 1981, he helped give basketball clinics throughout Australia for three weeks.

Last year, Roger was on the NABC committee to plan the national convention for the Final Four.

Reid was a star athlete at Springville High School, where he was studentbody vice-president and an all-state athlete. He was named MVP in the annual North-South all-star baseball game his senior year. Reid enrolled at BYU and was a member of the freshman basketball team and the Cougar baseball squad which made the trip to Mexico City.

He later transferred to the College of Eastern Utah, where he was a standout in both baseball and basketball. He was the team's MVP in baseball and twice was named to the junior college All-America team in that sport. From CEU, he moved to Weber State College and was a member of the Big Sky Conference championship basketball team coached by Dick Motta. Reid also received all-conference honors in baseball for two seasons.

From Weber State, he was drafted into professional baseball and spent four years as a shortstop with the Chicago White Sox and Atlanta Braves organizations, advancing as far as AAA ball.

Reid began his coaching career in 1971 as a basketball and baseball coach at Payson High School. His overall basketball record at Payson was 50-26. And the baseball team had a 35-11 mark under his direction.

In 1974, he joined the coaching staff at Clearfield High School, where he took the basketball team to the state tourna-



ment for the first time in five years. Clearfield's overall record was 60 wins and 24 losses during that period.

Throughout his prep coaching career, Reid's teams were known as tough defensive squads, despite the fact that the tallest player was only 6-4.

Reid is married to the former Diane Gardner, and they have three sons and one daughter: Randy, 17; Robbie, 13; Darren, 8; and Kelli Ann, 6.

He has served as first counselor in a bishopric and also has served on a high council in the LDS Church.

In the nine years Roger has been at BYU the teams have averaged 20 wins a year.

Western Athletic Conference

As the Western Athletic Conference enters its 26th year, it is enjoying increased national attention as a result of the successful athletic programs of its member institutions.

The league is the most geographically diverse in the country, spreading from the 7,000-foot heights of Laramie, Wyo., to the sea-level sprawls of Hawaii and San Diego. Each of the league's nine members adds to the flavor of the conference with its distinctive features. The WAC traditionally ranks in the top conferences in the nation in per-capita attendance at basketball games. And last year, BYU ranked fourth nationally in per-game attendance. Three other teams, New Mexico, Utah and UTEP, ranked in the top 25 nationally.

Founded July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. In September, 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

A major change occurred in July, 1978, when Arizona and

Arizona State left for the Pac-10. But on the same day, San Diego State made its official entry into the conference. Hawaii became the eighth member the following year, and the Air Force Academy entered in 1980.

One of the highlights in WAC history was BYU's winning the 1984 National Championship in football.

Based near Denver, Colorado, the WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney, who assumed the post in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Washington and Michigan State, is the fourth conference commissioner since the formation of the league.

Jeff Hurd serves as director of information for the WAC. Mark Hollis is an administrative assistant.

Carl Ingersoll, Assistant Coach

One of the most successful high school coaches in Utah during the 1970s was Carl Ingersoll, who joined the BYU staff

seven years ago.

Carl, 54, built his reputation as a successful coach mainly at American Fork High, where he directed the team for eight years. During his last six years there, Carl's teams reached the championship round of the state tournament four times and won the state title twice (1976 and 1979).

Ingersoll received the *Provo Daily Herald* Coach-of-the-Year award in 1976 and 1979 and also received several awards for his involvement with the Utah Cerebral Palsy

charity program.

After leaving American Fork, he spent a short time at Alta High School in Sandy, Utah, before joining BYU's staff as a graduate teaching assistant in 1980. He was the 1986 recipient of the "Coaches Award," presented by the Utah High School Basketball Coaches Association in appreciation for outstanding service and dedication to youth. The award was presented at the annual high school all-star game.

Ingersoll graduated from BYU in 1958 with a degree in zoology. He taught biology for 18 years at American Fork High, where he also was an assistant football and baseball

coach for several seasons.

He played one collegiate basketball season at the Branch Agricultural College (Southern Utah State) in Cedar City. He played two years while serving in the U.S. Army at Fort Bragg, N.C.

Carl has been involved with Cougar Basketball Camps since 1973 and has also helped in Medalist Clinics. In 1981, he was invited to participate with Kresimir Cosic in a basketball clinic in Yugoslavia, sponsored by Converse.

His father, D. Grant "Rags" Ingersoll, was an all-conference center for BYU in the 1920's, and at 6-4 was the tallest

player in the conference.

Carl has served as a bishop in the LDS Church. He is married to the former Gene Oborn of Payson, Utah. They have seven children. Four are married: Jeff, Jan, Jody, and Julie. Jillinda is a sophomore at BYU. The two youngest sons are Jarod and Jason. The Ingersolls have 10 grandchildren. They live in American Fork.

Pocatello High School in Idaho.



Brigham Young University

Brigham Young University is a private, church-sponsored institution which has earned an admirable reputation for successfully blending scholarly learning with moral and spiritual education.

BYU began modestly in 1875 as Brigham Young Academy with 29 elementary school students. It is now a fully accredited, internationally recognized university with a student body of nearly 27,000, making it the largest private university in the nation in terms of full-time students.

Academic excellence is increasingly evident as students and faculty show their competence. Almost three-quarters of the 1,300 full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees, and the university is accredited by more than 100 education, business, professional, and government organizations.

The J. Reuben Law School, founded just 14 years ago, is establishing a reputation as one of the elite top-40 law schools in the nation, with three of its graduates already selected as clerks to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Other highly respected programs include the School of Management, with its fifth-ranked accountancy department and top-rated MBA program; the computer-aided design/computer-aided manufacturing program, with state-of-the-art computer ability and a reputation for innovation; a large team of researchers in several disciplines studying coal's promise as an alternative to oil; the Ezra Taft Benson Agriculture Food Institute, which is contributing knowledge to help solve the world's food problems.

BYU's music and drama departments are also particularly noteworthy, as are its language programs, with an unusually extensive course offering, and its large number of faculty researching family issues.

BYU is committed to the idea of educating the whole person and has recently devised a new, rigorous general education program in keeping with that commitment. The GE curriculum consists of requirements in basic reading, writing and mathematics, arts and sciences and religion.

To fill the 14 semester hours of religion required, students can take courses ranging from the history of the LDS Church to comparative world religions. Four of the 14 credit hours are spent in study of the Book of Mormon, a text regarded by Mormons as scripture alongside the Bible.


The 631-acre campus is a superb facility. It is unusually clean and well-kept, with beautiful landscaping and spacious quads. The Lee Library, with more than two million volumes and a seating capacity of 4,000, is at the heart of the campus. The Harris Fine Arts Center features five theatres, two art galleries, nine pipe organs, 65 music practice rooms, a National Public Radio station, and a Public Broadcasting Service television studio. Laboratories all over campus boast up-to-date equipment and full computerization.

Academic accomplishments and physical facilities aside, many BYU students and faculty point to the character of its people and their commitment to traditional values as the school's most important attributes. Each student signs a Code of Honor, promising to abstain from alcohol, tobacco, tea and coffee and to be honest and chaste—all in accord with tenets of the LDS Church.

Although 98 percent of the student body is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Non-Mormons come from over 25 other denominations, and about 22 percent of the student body is married. Students come from every state (32 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. More than 8,000 students are bilingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a mission for the Mormon Church in another country.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with fall and winter semesters each being four months long, and the summer semester being divided into spring and summer terms.

With a seating capacity of 22,700, the Marriott Center is the nation's second-largest on-campus basketball facility. Only the 28,000-seat Carrier Dome, used by Syracuse for football and basketball, is larger. Kentucky's Rupp Arena is also a 23,000-seat facility, but is owned by the city of Lexington.

In the past BYU has been one of the best drawing teams in America. Since the Marriott Center opened in 1971, the crowds have averaged 18,353 per game. More than four million fans have watched BYU basketball games in the Marriott Center. The BYU single-season record for average attendance is 22,505, set during the 1980–81 season.

Last season, BYU ranked fourth nationally with an average of 18,939 per game. Only Syracuse, Kentucky and Louisville drew more fans than the Cougars.

A four-year-old addition to the Marriott Center is the four-sided scoreboard/message center. The board has capabilities of scorekeeping, timing, etc., in addition to an animated message board that will relay messages to the crowd. The Marriott Center also has acquired a lighting system capable of providing 250 foot candles of illumination.

Named after the nationally known businessman who was the major contributor, the J. Willard Marriott Center houses crowds for basketball, commencement exercises, concerts, pageants, devotionals and many other activities.

In 1972, 1977, 1979 and 1982, the Marriott Center served as the host for the NCAA Far West Regional playoffs. In March it 10.25

will host the WAC Tournament and future NCAA events are scheduled.

Physically, the building covers three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 X 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet and encloses 8 million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof, the height is nearly 10 stories.

There are roughly 10,100 chair seats in the building with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the seats are below the concourse.

Besides the usual locker rooms, training facilities, etc., the Marriott Center serves as ticket headquarters for most major campus events. It also provides offices for the basketball coaching staff.

President Jeffrey R. Holland

The seven-year administration of Brigham Young University President Jeffrey R. Holland has been characterized by commitment to excellence and the full realization of human potential.

In his mission statement for the University, Dr. Holland says all instruction, programs, and services at BYU "should make their own contribution toward the balanced development of the total person.

"Such a broadly prepared individual will not only be capable of meeting personal challenge and change but will also bring strength to others in the tasks of home and family life, social relationships, civic duty and service to mankind," he said.

The President considers sports and good sportsmanship as important elements in realizing full human potential. In his own career, he has successfully combined sports, scholarship and leadership responsibilities.

At Dixie High School in his home town of St. George, Utah, he was a student officer, a varsity athlete in football and basketball and a high honor graduate. He went on to become an honors student at Dixie College where he also served as captain of the school's conference champion basketball team.

After serving a two-year mission in Great Britain for the LDS Church (1960–62), President Holland enrolled at BYU, where he obtained a bachelor's degree in English with highest honors and a master's degree in religious education, graduating with distinction. While at BYU, he was designated an E.S. Hinckley Scholar and was elected to Phi Kappa Phi honor society. More recently, he was honored as a recipient of the University's Distinguished Alumni Service Award.

Dr. Holland obtained a second master's degree and a doctorate in American Studies at Yale University in 1973. He wrote his dissertation on "Mark Twain's Religious Sense: The Viable Years—1835 to 1883."

Preceding his appointment as president of BYU, Dr. Holland served more than four years as Commissioner of Education for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, with responsibilities for all of the Church's educational programs which reach more than 750,000 students worldwide. Prior to that, he was dean of Religious Instruction at BYU, and he has served as instructor and director at several LDS Institutes of Religion.

A popular speaker and writer, President Holland is noted for his keen sense of humor. He has had more than 50 articles and addresses published in both LDS and professional journals, including "Vital Speeches of the Day."

In the LDS Church, he has been a high councilor, a bishop, and a counselor in three stake presidencies. He also served as director of the Melchizedek Priesthood MIA program and as chairman of the Church's Young Adult Committee. He currently serves as a Regional Representative.


Dr. Holland is on the governing boards of the Deseret News Publishing Company, Commercial Security Bank and Bancorporation in Salt Lake City, and the Polynesian Cultural Center in Laie, Hawaii. He is president of the American Association of Presidents of Independent Colleges and Universities (AAPICU) and is on the board of directors of the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities (NAICU).

President Holland is married to his high school sweetheart, the former Patricia Terry of St. George, Utah. They are the parents of three children, Matthew, Mary Alice, and David.

Dean, Athletic Director

Dr. Clayne R. Jensen, Dean and Faculty Representative

Dr. Clayne Jensen is in his 14th year as Dean of the College of Physical Education, which encompasses BYU athletics. A respected and experienced administrator. Dr. Jensen served in the capacity of Professor and Assistant Dean for seven years before becoming Dean. He has served as BYU Faculty Athletic Representative since 1976 and was chairman of BYU's Athletics Advisory Board for seven years.



Dr. Jensen grew up in Gunnison, Utah. He obtained a bachelor's and master's degree from the University of Utah in 1952 and 1956, and his doctorate from Indiana University in 1963.

From 1953–55, he was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, and coached two all-Marine championship teams in track and field. He was a faculty member at Utah State (1956–64), member of Phi Kappa Phi, and recipient of the Briethbard Athletic Foundation Award (1955).

He is author or co-author of 16 books currently in print, and used in over 700 colleges and universities. He is a member and chairman of several professional boards and special committees dealing with physical education, athletics and related fields. He holds membership in five professional groups and has traveled in 44 states and 26 countries.

He served as a U.S. delegate to the International Olympic Academy in Olympia, Greece, and he is currently a member of the governing council of the NCAA, and is on the advisory board of the United States Sports Academy.

He has been included in 17 national and international biographies, including Who's Who in America, Who's Who in American Education, Outstanding Educators of America, and Noteworthy Americans.


Dr. Jensen is married to the former Elouise Henrie and they have four sons: Craig, Mike, Blake and Chris (three are former members of BYU's football team).

Glen Tuckett, Athletic Director

Most of the large strides in BYU's athletic program have come during Glen Tuckett's tenure as athletic director.


Since he assumed the directorship in July, 1976, the Cougars have claimed 11 athletic supremacy titles in the Western Athletic Conference and consistently have been ranked among the top-10 athletic programs in the country.

In 1985, he was inducted into the Utah Sports Hall of Fame.



In 1983, he was given the Dale Rex award, symbolic of the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah and the highest athletic honor given by BYU.

In 1977, Tuckett was president of the American Association



of Baseball Coaches and was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame in 1979. At the time of his retirement from coaching, he was the ninth winningest baseball coach in the NCAA.

A native of Murray, Utah, Tuckett was an all-around athlete at Murray High School. He played professional baseball for nine seasons, during which time he returned to the University of Utah to obtain a B.S. degree in 1953.

He launched his coaching career at West High School in Salt Lake City, where he worked with the football, basketball and baseball teams. In 1959, he joined the staff at BYU, serving as assistant football coach for six years and head baseball coach for 17 years. He obtained a master's degree from BYU in 1962 and a doctorate in 1978. In addition to his coaching, Tuckett taught health classes and was voted an outstanding teacher at BYU.

Tuckett was chosen as coach of the 1974 United States team which won the World Amateur Baseball Tournament, only the second time a USA team had won in the tourney's 27-year history. He was with KSL Radio for 10 years before his athletic director appointment.

Glen has served on the following committees: NCAA Committee on Committees, NCAA Television Committee, College Football Association Executive Committee, and College Football Association Television Committee.

A popular public speaker, Glen is often asked to speak to business, public and church groups. He is married to the former Josephine Whittaker of Stockport, England, and they have four daughters: Alison, Shannon, Kendall and Erin.



Review of Last Season

From the tipoff of the first game (Oklahoma in the NIT) to the final buzzer of an NCAA playoff game (New Orleans), the 1987 season was packed with more than its usual share of drama. Playing a challenging schedule (which included Notre Dame, Iowa, Pittsburg and Michigan State), the Cougars finished the year with a 21-11 record, a success by nearly any measure.

A second-place-or-worse pick by the WAC media and coaches before the season got underway, the Cougars finished a strong second behind WAC champion UTEP. Moreover, the WAC tournament was won by Wyoming, a team the Cougars beat twice during the regular season. Five of the WAC teams, including BYU, went into post-season tournament play (BYU, UTEP and Wyoming to the NCAA, Utah and New Mexico to the NIT).

In terms of games won, the Cougars' 1987 season was the best record since 1981. But the season was streaky. Six of the Cougar losses were of the back-to-back variety, while the wins came in the form of an eight-game stretch and a pair of four-game streaks. The Mountain Cats proved to be a good road team, posting an 11-7 record away from home.

As for the tournament play, BYU was involved in what might be broadly defined as five tournaments: the Coca-Cola NIT, their own Cougar Classic, the Cable Car Classic, the WAC tournament and the NCAA Mideastern tournament at Birmingham. Overall, the Cats were 4-4 in tournament play, and were champions of the Cable Car.

Although they did not range as far from home as usual, the Cougars did play in Norman (Oklahoma), South Bend (Notre Dame), Iowa City (Iowa), Santa Clara (California), Birmingham (Alabama) and all the usual WAC stopovers. In all, BYU played before 445,856 fans, not to mention some large national and regional television audiences. In the Marriott Center on campus they drew a shade under 19,000 fans per game, about a 12% increase over the previous season. The largest home crowd of the year was 22,676 fans for the second go-round with rival Utah.

A study of the combined statistics for the 32 games reveals the Cougars had a statistical edge over opponents in nearly every category: field goal percentage, free throw shooting, rebounding, assists, blocked shots and steals. In fact, only five other BYU teams have had a better field goal percentage for the season, and only two other former teams have had better free throw shooting (.746 completion) for a season.

Individually, the first player to be mentioned is **Michael Smith**, the 6-91/2 sophomore forward, who made the Cougars get up and go on offense. The California sophomore finished the year with 643 points, enough to vault him into fourth place among those players with the "most points scored in one season." Only **Devin Durrant** (1983–84) and **Danny Ainge** (1981) have scored more points in a season.

Smith led the team in scoring (20.1), rebounding (8.5), free throw shooting (90%) and three-point shooting (49%). Other leaders were Tom Gneiting in field goal shooting (62%), Brian Taylor in assists (118), Jeff Chatman in blocked shots (40) and Bob Capener in steals (32).

As a team, the Cougars led the WAC in scoring offense (81.6 points per game), rebound margin (4.2), free throw

shooting (.749) and were runners-up in turnover margin and defense against the three-point play.

While **Smith** had a tremendous sophomore season on the court, he also graded high in the classroom. In addition to his first-team all-conference honors, Michael was first-team Academic All-American with a 3.5 GPA in pre-medicine. Teammate **Jeff Chatman** was named second-team in the nine-school conference selections.

The 1986–87 season was Coach Ladell Andersen's fourth as head coach of the Cougars, and he improved his record at BYU to 74-50 (.597).

All in all, '87 was one of the better seasons the Cougars have had in recent years.

Cougar Basketball History

The roots of BYU's basketball program extend back to near the turn of the century, although it wasn't until 1917 that the Cougars joined the Rocky Mountain Faculty Athletic Conference and started keeping track of wins and losses.

A look back at the humble beginning of BYU basketball reveals a completely different set of events than exist today. For instance, in those days, the Cougars played their home games in the gym on the third floor of the Training School building on lower campus.

Seating capacity in that gym was about 700. For the "big" games, fans would perch themselves in windows, on ladders

and on top of lockers along the wall.

E.L. Roberts was coach of the Cougars from 1918–20 and compiled a 14-7 record. He was followed by Alvin Twitchell, who coached from 1921–25 and had a 44-20 record. Roberts again took the reins of the Cougar program for the 1926–27 season and helped champion the change that eventually eliminated the center jump after every basket.


In 1928, BYU moved its home games to the Women's Gym on University Avenue, where the seating capacity was nearly double that of the other facility. Provo's local radio station (KOVO) carried one of the first-ever broadcasts of a basketball game. Two-handed push shots were in vogue. And BYU landed its first All-American, Elwood Romney.

Some of the coaches who handled the Cougar program during the "Women's Gym" era were G. Ott Romney (1928–35), Edwin R. Kimball (1936, 1939–41), Fred "Buck" Dixon and Floyd Millet (1942–49).

An unforgettable chapter in the chronicle of BYU basketball was written between 1946 and 1950, when the Cougars played their home games on the floor of the Springville High School gymnasium. Seating capacity in that gym was listed at 1,200, although officials discovered it could actually hold 1,700 with some scrunching together of bodies.

Despite the handicaps, the Springville Gym was the site for some outstanding basketball. Some of the players who displayed their skills in the old gym were Joe Nelson, Mel Hutchins, Roland Minson, Utah's Arnie Ferrin and Vern Gardner, Denver's Vince Boryla, and Utah State's Ladell Andersen, just to mention a few.

Forced out of the Springville Gym in 1950, the Cougars had to go searching for a temporary home while the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was under construction. The University of Utah graciously offered its home floor—the 6,000-seat Einer Nielsen Fieldhouse.

Pre-season games were played in the Springville Gym that year, but once Skyline Conference action began, all games were played 45 miles away in Salt Lake City.

As transients, the Cougars didn't suffer much. They split with the Utes, 2-2, and captured the conference championship. They also went on to win the National Invitational Tournament in Madison Square Garden.

That was only the second year for Coach Stan Watts, a man who molded BYU's program into one of the nation's finest. Coach Watts was inducted into the Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., in 1986.

At long last, BYU's team moved into the 10,200-seat Smith Fieldhouse in December of 1951. Coach Watts coached every one of the 246 games played in the Fieldhouse over the next 20 years. Large crowds enjoyed some of the finest basketball teams in the country during that era, including another NIT championship team from BYU in 1966.

The demand for more seats prompted school officials to begin planning construction of the 23,000-seat Marriott Center which, at the time, was the largest on-campus basketball arena in the nation. It opened officially in December of 1971 with a sellout crowd. Average attendance at home games that year was more than 21,000.

Some of the BYU players to receive All-America honors in recent years include Dick Nemelka, Kresimir Cosic, Danny Ainge and Devin Durrant. Ainge also won the Eastman and Wooden Awards, given to the outstanding collegiate basket-ball player in the country.

Game Statistics


A play-by-play account will be furnished at the end of each half. Complete halftime, final and individual statistics and other material will be offered both during and after the game.






