




Head Coach: Roger Reid (Weber State '68) enters his 7th season as head coach, his 18th season overall at BYU; 136-58 (.701) record in 6 years as head coach

Assistant Coach: Tony Ingle (Huntingdon '76) is in his 7th year at BYU; was head coach at Alabama-Huntsville and Gordon College (NAIA)

Assistant Coach: Lynn Archibald (Fresno State '68) is in his 2nd year at BYU; was head coach at Idaho State and Utah

Restricted-Earnings Coach: Russ Zaugg (Weber State '85) is in his 2nd year at BYU; was head coach at Springville (UT) High

Season Outlook

This season will be more of a rebuilding year than any of the previous six for BYU Coach Roger Reid.

Aside from graduating two starters, two key players opted for LDS Church missions to increase the tally to eight lettermen lost.

Gone via graduation are starting forwards Mark Durrant and first-team All-Western Athletic Conference performer Russell Larson, both of whom completed stellar four-year careers.

Departed for missions are guard Robbie Reid (Greece), an All-WAC Defensive Team member, and promising center Bret Jepsen (Tennessee), who was projected to start.

Center **Kenneth Roberts**, 6-8 and guard **Randy Reid**, 6-2, are the top hopes among the eight lettermen returning from last year's 22-10 squad which posted a 13-5 record for a second place tie in the WAC and qualified for the NCAA post-season tournament.

"We have so much inexperience and many question marks," says Coach Reid. "We won't have an idea until we play some ball games. Ken and Randy give us great experience to build around.

"Ken is a great player. It is unbelievable what he does. He has a tough chore every night."


Roberts has started the past two seasons at center and will likely play the spot again as a senior, pending the challenge from redshirt senior **Jermaine Thompson**, 6-8, and Finnish sophomore **Jarkko Ahlbom**, 6-10.

An important addition will be small forward **Bryon Ruffner**, a 6-6 junior, who was a junior college All-American last season and was the 1991 Big West Conference Freshman of the Year at Utah State prior to serving a mission.

"We are going to be relying heavily on Bryon at the three position and some at four," says Reid. "We expect him to step in and continue his progression. He gives us a dimension with a true wing player we have been lacking."

Lettermen who could contribute are redshirt sophomore **Justin Weidhauer**, 6-7, sophomore **Grant Berges**, 6-8 and junior **Jeff Campbell**, 6-9.

At guard, Reid, a senior who was Academic All-America, will be relied upon heavily and could move back to the point-guard position he played as a sophomore. He was among the nation's leaders in free throws last season at .851 and has made 83

percent of his 301 career attempts.

With the shortage at guards, a pair of freshmen, **Todd Christensen**, 6-1, and **Nathan Cooper**, 6-5, have a good opportunity for playing time.

"Todd and Nathan are part of our youth movement and rebuilding," says Reid. "They are an unknown commodity."

Three other guards who provide depth and help a great deal in practice are senior **Bryan Hofheins**, 5-10; junior **Matt Lohner**, 6-1; and **Lance Archibald** (no relation to the coach), a 6-3 freshman who redshirted prior to a mission.

"We are excited about the squad, even though there are several teams in the WAC which have better personnel. But you don't win on paper."

Reid has turned the magic in the previous six seasons, amassing a 136-58 record with 20-win seasons each year, a 74-28 WAC record, which is the best league history at .726, five NCAA berths, an NIT berth, three WAC regular-season titles and two league post-season crowns.

In his six seasons as head coach, Roger Reid has achieved the best winning percentage in the history of the Western Athletic Conference at 74-28 (.725) and one of the top home-court marks in the country at nearly 90 percent (80-10).

During that span, he has averaged 23 victories per season, won three Western Athletic Conference titles and two WAC Tournaments.

He's taken BYU to five NCAA Tournaments and to an NIT berth.

"Roger does an excellent job teaching fundamentals. The Cougars don't take bad shots and don't make turnovers. They're solid and well coached." Frank Layden, President, Utah Jazz

The 22-10 marks of the last two years saw the Cougars battling for WAC titles in the final weekend of the season.

This year marks his biggest rebuilding job yet but time and victories have proven Reid will keep succeeding despite the name changes and players coming and going for missionary work.

The energetic, ultra-positive former pro baseball player became the 11th head coach in BYU history in March, 1989.

His first season (1989-90), Reid won 21 games with a 6-7 center. He tied for the Western Athletic Conference title (21-9) with a team picked sixth. He was WAC Coach of the Year and District Coach of

the Year by both the coaches and media.

His team set a school record for threepoint shooting and was eighth in the nation in that category. Home attendance averaged more than 19,000 to watch a 15-0 season

The 1991 team featured Shawn Bradley, who was named to the nation's All-Freshman Team and set a frosh record for blocked shots



with 5.2. He was MVP of the WAC Tournament, which BYU won for the first time ever.

Coach Reid's team--picked fifth in the WAC--finished second and then defeated Virginia in the NCAA Tournament in going 21-13.

"Roger is thorough, organized and disciplined.

Bradley had been expected to return from a church mission for the 1993-94 season but chose instead to enter the NBA draft, where he was the number-two selection.

The third year BYU was 25-7, tying for the regular season title and winning the tournament again. Reid was the WAC and District Coach of the Year. The 1991-92 team went 25-9 and tied for the WAC crown.

Reid, a 1968 graduate of Weber State, arrived at BYU in 1978--when the Cougars were coming off five losing seasons. During his first year as an assistant BYU won the WAC championship. In his 11 seasons as an assistant, BYU averaged 20 wins a year and won four WAC titles.

The 48-year-old Reid also had been coordinating BYU's recruiting efforts since he joined the staff. He worked under Frank Arnold as a graduate assistant for a few months and then was five seasons as an assistant coach.

In the six years with Ladell Andersen, Roger was responsible for BYU's defensive schemes as the assistant head coach.

He has served as chairman (1980-81) of the recruiting committee for the National Association of Basketball Coaches. In 1981, he helped give basketball clinics in Australia for three weeks.

Reid is on the Collegiate Committee of USA Basketball and is on the NABC Legislation Committee, serving as liaison between the board of directors and the WAC coaches.

Reid has been on the NABC committee to plan the national convention as well as on the Awards Committee.

"I think he's one of the best coaches in college basketball---he's very, very underrated. He maintains a level of intensity which is good for the college game. Roger doesn't get enough credit for what he does at BYU."

Born Aug. 3, 1947, Reid was a star athlete at Springville (Utah) High, where he was student body vice-president and an all-state athlete. He was MVP in the annual North-South all-star baseball game.

Reid enrolled at BYU in 1964 and played freshman basketball and baseball. In order to pursue basketball, he transferred to Carbon College (now the College of Eastern Utah), where he was a standout in both sports. He was the team's MVP in baseball and named a Junior College All-American.

Reid moved to Weber State and was a member of the Big Sky Conference championship basketball

team coached by Dick Motta. He also was all-conference in baseball two seasons.

From Weber State, he was drafted into professional baseball and spent four years as a shortstop with the Chicago White Sox and Atlanta Braves farm systems, advancing to AAA ball.

Reid began his coaching career in 1971 as the basketball and baseball coach at Payson (Utah) High. His basketball record was 50-26 in three seasons and his baseball teams were 35-11.

In 1974, he moved to Clearfield (Utah) High and took the basketball team to the state tournament for the first time in five years and was 60-24.

Throughout his prep coaching career, Reid's teams were known as tough defensive squads, despite the fact that the tallest player was 6-4.

Reid married Diane Gardner in 1966 and they have five children: Randy, who has started three years for the Cougars; Robbie, currently on a church mission in Greece, David, who died in 1980; Darren; and Kelli.

In April, 1990, he had both hips replaced and in the summer of 1995 had ankle surgery.

"I've known Roger a long time. Coaching is one thing but sensitivity, spirituality and caring are special qualities. He has all of them plus is an excellent coach. If I had a son, I'd make sure one of his final visits would be to BYU."

Tony Ingle



The constant besides the head coach in BYU's 23 wins per year the last six seasons is assistant Tony Ingle.

Ingle is BYU's veteran assistant who gave up a Division One head coaching job to help the Cougars to six postseason appearances.

He tells the story of hearing on the radio

about good friend Roger Reid being appointed head coach. He rushed home to tell his wife, forgetting about his children, who were at an ice cream store.

The two had become friends in 1981, when the Cougars got to the championship game of the NCAA Regional in Atlanta.

"I've admired Roger Reid since day one," Ingle recalls. "He's the only reason I ever would have left the job I had."

Ingle, 43, grew up in Dalton, Ga., graduating from North Whitfield High. At Dalton Junior College he was student body vice president, team captain and won the best hustle and free throw shooting awards. In two years his team went 61-10 and ranked as high as second and fifth in the NJCAA.

At Huntingdon College in Montgomery, Ala., Ingle was a captain two years. He received a physical education degree in 1976 and a master's degree from North Georgia in 1980.

He was an assistant one year at Northwest Whitfield and was head coach a year at Southeast Whitfield. For seven seasons at Cherokee High in Canton, Ga., he was 107-47 and was the Atlanta Journal and Constitution AAAA Coach of the Year in 1982.

In three years (1985-88) as head coach at

Gordon Junior College in Barnesville, Ga., his team were 60-33, scoring more than 100 points 23 times and going to the state playoffs each year.

After being named the Atlanta Tipoff Club JC Coach of the Year in 1988, he moved to Alabama-Huntsville. His 10-18 first-year record was the school's most wins in five years and eight of the losses were to nationally ranked Division II schools or Division I teams.

Ingle has directed dozens of basketball camps and worked at the BYU camp several times prior to becoming a Cougar coach.


Tony and his wife, Jeanne, were married in 1974. They have five children: Eliott plays at Calhoun Junior College in Decateur, Ala.; Sunshine, Golden, Tony, Jr. and Israel.

The children have performed basketball dribbling and ball-handling routines as the "little Nuggets" at halftime shows for a number of NBA games and have a half-hour video tape (Dribbling to Dreams) on basketball skills.

"We're lucky to have Tony," says Coach Reid. "It's hard to believe someone can be so humorous and yet so serious and knowledgeable about basketball."

"We are fortu-

nate to have Lynn," says Coach Roger Reid. "I've always been impressed with his work ethic and his outstanding recruiting ability. Plus, he's been a head coach and understands both roles. He gives us outstanding experience in every aspect of basketball."

At Idaho State, he had a 69-68 record after being the youngest head coach in the NCAA. In six years at Utah he was 98-85, won a Western Athletic Conference title, received two NCAA bids and played in two National Invitational Tournaments.

"Arch is a class guy," says Arizona State Coach Bill Frieder. "He'd be a great addition to any program."

At ASU, Archibald directed much of his attention to directing the Sun Devils' up-tempo offense, which was among the school's best in points scored and in three-point shooting.

The 50-year-old Archibald arrived in the summer of 1994 in time to go with the Cougars to Slovenia, where he saw some of Europe's best young players.

Archibald was born in Logan and lived in Oregon and California. He graduated from Torrance High. He played at Utah State his freshman year and El Camino Junior College his sophomore year.

He transferred to Fresno State, where he obtained a bachelor's degree in 1968.

The next year he was head coach at Sierra Vista High in Baldwin Park, Calif., and then head coach two years at Los Amigos High in Fountain Valley, Calif.

During the 1971-72 season Archibald was an assistant at Long Beach State and spent a year at Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo, where he obtained a master's degree.

It was on to UNLV for three seasons and to Southern California for one. He was head coach at Idaho State for five years (1978-82), an assistant at Utah in 1983 and then head coach from 1983-89.

He and his wife, Anne, have three children: Damon is a senior on the Albertson College basketball team in Idaho; Lee Anne is a student at BYU; and Beau will play basketball at Washington State next season.

Back for a second season is limited-earnings coach **Russ Zaugg**, who played for Roger Reid at Clearfield High.

With scouting visits no longer allowed, Russ is heavily involved in analyzing video tapes to prepare reports on opposing teams.

A native of West Point, Utah, Zaugg played two years of junior varsity ball at Utah

State and served a church mission in La Paz, Bolivia.

He graduated from Weber State in 1985 with a

degree in physical education and a minor in Spanish. His master's degree is from USU in English (1992).

For six years he was the tennis coach and an assistant football and basketball coach at Davis High in Kaysville. The past three years he was the head basketball coach at Springville High.

He married Dawn McEntire and they have a daughter, Danielle, who plays soccer at Springville

High, and two sons.


Assistant trainer Steve Pincock will be working with the men's basketball program this season. A former student trainer at BYU, he was the trainer and strength coach at Snow College two years.

Pincock graduated from Rick College, went to Utah State and graduated from BYU in 1990. He

was a three-time All-American in powerlifting.

Greg Jacobsen is in his third season as a manager. He attended Springville (Utah) High and served a church mission in Curitiba, Brazil. He is married to Lesley Berrett and is majoring in business management.

Spencer Tueller is in his first season as a manager. He is a junior from Sandy, Utah, and served a mission to Brisbane, Australia. He is majoring in health science.

Brigham Young University



Brigham Young University is a private churchsponsored institution which has earned an admirable reputation for successfully blending scholarly learning with moral and spiritual education.

BYU began modestly in 1875 as Brigham Young Academy with 29 elementary school students. It is now a fully accredited internationally recognized university with a student body of 27,000.

Academic excellence is increasingly evident as students and faculty show their competence. More than three-quarters of the 1,300 full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees, and the university is accredited by more than 100 education, business, professional and government organizations.

Admission standards for students continue to rise as competition for acceptance increases. The average ACT composite score for entering BYU freshmen is now 27, and the average grade point for new students is 3.7. BYU is consistently in the top 15 ranking for National Merit Scholars in attendance.

The J. Reuben Clark Law School is establishing a reputation as one of the elite top-40 law schools in the nation, with three of its graduates already selected as clerks to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Other highly respected programs include the School of Management, with its fifth-ranked accountancy department and top-rated MBA program; the computer-aided design/computer-aided manufacturing program, with state-of-the-art computer ability and a reputation for innovation; a large team of researchers in several disciplines studying coal's promise as an alternative to oil; the Ezra Taft Benson Agriculture Food Institute, which is contributing knowledge to help solve the world's food problems.

The music and drama departments are also particularly noteworthy, as are its language programs, with their unusually extensive course offerings, and a large number of faculty researching family issues.

To fill the 14 semester hours of religion required, students can take courses ranging from the history of the LDS Church to comparative world religions. Four of the 14 credit hours are spent in study of the Book of Mormon, a text regarded by Mormons as scripture, along with the Bible.

The 631-acre campus is a superb facility is unusually clean and well-kept, with beautiful landscaping and spacious quads. The Lee Library, with more than two million volumes and a seating capacity of 4,000, is at the heart of the campus.

The Harris Fine Arts Center features five theaters, two art galleries, nine pipe organs, 65 music practice rooms, a National Public Radio station and a Public Broadcast Service television studio. Laboratories all over campus boast up-to-date equipment and full computerization. A Museum of Art was completed in 1993.

In addition to the Provo and Laie, Hawaii, campuses, BYU will have Study Abroad programsthis year in Russia, China, Japan, Austria, England, France, Italy, Spain, Guatemala, Chile, Australia, Africa and at the university's Jerusalem Center.

BYU students and faculty point to the character of its people and their commitment to traditional values as the school's most important attributes. Each student signs a Code of Honor, promising to abstain from alcohol, tobacco, tea and coffee and to be honest and chaste--all in accord with tenets of the LDS Church.

Although 98 percent of the student body is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Non-Mormons come from over 25 other denominations, and about 22 percent of the student body is married. Students come from every state (32 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. More than 8,000 students are bilingual, many having learned a foreign language while serving a mission for the LDS Church.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2-) with fall and winter semesters each being four months long, and the summer being divided into spring and summer terms.

The university traces its roots to Utah's rich pioneer heritage. In establishing the original school on October 16, 1875--first known as Brigham Young Academy--on a little over one acre of land in what is today downtown Provo, Brigham Young, then second president of the LDS Church, charged that all secular learning at the institution should be fused with teachings from the scriptures.

No longer an obscure primary school in a little pioneer town, BYU is a world-renowned center of learning that remains true to that original charge from its namesake.

One of the academy's first principals, Karl G. Maeser, echoed President Young's directive in his own

belief that even the multiplication tables should be taught with the Spirit of God.

Despite steady growth during those early years, the fledgling institution was nearly overcome by a series of setbacks, including persistent financial problems and the destruction by fire of the school's original building in 1884.

The campus eventually moved to a new location on Provo's University
Avenue, where new facilities were completed in 1891.

As its high school and college curriculum improved and strengthened, the academy offi-

cially became Brigham Young University on Oct. 23, 1903.

In 1909, under the administration of George H. Brimhall, work began on the Maeser Memorial Building, the first of many structures on "Temple Hill," the university's present site.


Throughout the administrations of Franklin S. Harris and Howard H. McDonald, the university gradually increased its enrollment and facilities.

President Ernest L. Wilkinson, who began his tenure in 1951, oversaw the university's greatest era of physical growth, greatly increasing both the number of buildings and the size of the student body. He also started the school's doctoral program in 1957.

President Dallin H. Oaks' administration, begun in 1971, saw a deepening and refining of the scholastic mission of BYU, which by then had an enrollment of 26,000. His commitment to academics has continued during the administrations of Presidents Jeffrey R. Holland and Rex E. Lee as the university maintains its quest to provide excellent instruction in a gospel-centered atmosphere.

BYU is located 45 miles south of Salt Lake City in Provo, Utah, a city of 92,000 in a valley of 300,000, and is situated 4,560 feet above sea level.

The campus sits at the western base of the Wasatch Mountains, part of the Rocky Mountain Range. The valley offers a beautiful setting, with 11,750-foot Mount Timpanogos north of the campus and 23-mile-long Utah Lake on the west.



Campus Leaders

President Merrill J. Batemen

Merrill J. Bateman, takes over as BYU's 11th president on Jan. 1, 1996, replacing Rex E. Lee, who has had continuing health problems.

Elder Bateman had been
Presiding Bishop of The
Church of Jesus Christ of
Latter-day Saints and will be a
member of the First Quorum
of the Seventy.



He had been a member of

the Second Quorum of Seventy since June of 1992 and Presiding Bishop since April, 1994.

Prior to his call as a General Authority, Elder Bateman, 59, headed his own consulting and capital management companies.

A native of Lehi, Utah, he earned a bachelor's degree in economics at the University of Utah and went on to receive his doctorate in that subject from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Earle in his career, Elder Bateman was an instructor at the Air Force Academy and later a professor at BYU. He also was dean of the School of Management at BYU.

Elder Bateman has served as a missionary, bishop, stake high councilor, stake president and regional representative. He is married to Marilyn Scholes and they are the parents of seven children.

Advancement Vice President R.J. Snow

Dr. R.J. Snow is in his sixth year as a BYU vice president after being mission president in South Africa for three years.

He was born in St. George, Utah, and attended elementary school there before moving to Washington, D.C. He returned to attend Dixie College, obtaining an associate degree in 1957.



After a church mission in

France, he obtained bachelor's (1962) and master's degrees (1964) from the University of Utah.

Dr. Snow completed another master's degree and a doctoral degree (1967) at Northwestern and did

post-doctoral work at Oregon and Harvard.

He taught political science at UC-Santa Barbara from 1967-73 and from 1973-84 taught at Utah, where he also was Director of the Hinckley Institute of Politics and then Vice President of University Relations and Student Affairs.

He was in private business three years before going to South Africa. Dr. Snow has been active in a variety of civic organizations, including board member of the Utah Symphony, LDS Hospital, Salt Lake and Provo United Way, and the Provo-Orem Chamber of Commerce.

He is married to the former Marilyn Melville and they are the parents of four children.

Athletic Director Rondo Fehlberg

Former BYU All-American wrestler Rondo Fehlberg replaced retiring Clayne Jensen as athletic director during the summer of 1995 and is an assistant vice president.

Fehlberg, 45, has spent 16 years as an attorney and executive in the oil business. For the past three years, he has been vice president of International New Ventures at Pennzoil.



A native of Worland, Wyo., Fehlberg received a Bachelor of Arts degree from BYU in 1976. He served an LDS mission in Germany (1974-75) before attending BYU's J. Reuben Clark Law School, where he received a Juris Doctor degree in 1979.

He was a three-time WAC champion and had a career record of 74-11-1, including 34 pins He compiled a 23-2 record as a senior at 150 pounds and placed fifth at the 1972 NCAA Championships. That earned him All-America status and won BYU's Competitor Award. In 1987, he was inducted into the BYU Athletic Hall of Fame.

Three other brothers--Wayne, Reed and Paulalso wrestled for the Cougars. Reed was a 1994 inductee into BYU's Athletic Hall of Fame.

In 1979, Fehlberg joined the law firm of Davis, Graham & Stubbs in Denver. In 1982 he went to work for Standard Oil in Denver and later in Houston. In 1988, he began working for British Petroleum Exploration in London.

Fehlberg married Mary Bloxham of Pinedale, Wyo., and they have five sons and a daughter.

Athletic Personnel

Pete Witbeck, Associate AD

Alan "Pete" Witbeck has been involved with BYU 46 years.

Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, came to BYU in 1949 as a long distance runner on the track team. He acquired bachelor's (1952) and master's (1954) degrees before joining the P.E. staff in 1955.



Witbeck was coach of the freshman basketball team from 1958-64. During that time, his teams posted a 62-9 record, losing only three times the last three years Witbeck was coach.

The 1963-64 Kittens were undefeated and ranked first in the nation among freshmen teams. That group went on to win the NIT title in 1966. Witbeck was given the Dale Rex Memorial Award, given annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the state.

As a member of that NIT championship team, he was inducted into BYU's Hall of Fame in 1980. He also is a member of the Raymond Sports Hall of Fame (1990) and the Utah Old Time Athletes Hall of Fame (1994).

Witbeck joined the varsity staff in 1964 as Stan Watts' top assistant. During Witbeck's tenure, teams won five Western Athletic Conference championships in eight years and were nationally ranked.

He has been the right hand to the athletic director since 1972. Some of his responsibilities include overseeing athlete eligibility, game management and serving as liaison between BYU, the NCAA and the WAC. He also has authored a book on racquetball.

He and his wife, Kathy, have three children.

Mike King, Asst. AD

Mike King has been the Cougars' business manager 16 years and became an assistant AD in 1989. He had been controller and director of financial services at BYU-Hawaii.



King was athletic business manager at Idaho State from 1974-

78 and managed the ISU Minidome from 1970-74. He received a B.A. degree at Idaho State in

1970. He his wife, Jeannette, have four children.

Val Hale, Asst. AD

and publications coordinator for the Athletic Department from 1982 through 1987.


He was a cum laude graduate at BYU in 1981 and received an M.A. in communications in 1987. Hale and his wife, Nancy, have three children.

BYU's Cougar Club has grown into one of the nation's most prestigious and effective booster organizations. Its membership of more than 4,000 makes it twice as large as any other WAC booster group.

Some of the Cougar Club services include funding recruiting trips, sponsoring the spring football game and pre-season basketball game and honoring present and past athletes at an annual banquet and with an Athletic Hall of Fame.

Other assistance includes providing tutorial help, purchasing special non-budgeted equipment, providing post eligibility scholarships, and sponsoring satellite broadcasts and television replays.

Cougar Club members donate annually to the BYU athletic program. In return, contributors receive passes for parking, football and basketball year-books, monthly newsletters and other benefits.

KSL Radio

For more than 44 years, BYU fans have been following Cougar athletics via 50,000-watt KSL Radio (1160 AM), located in Salt Lake City.

The "Voice" of the Cougars is play-by-play man Paul James, a veteran broadcaster with 45 years' experience. An Ogden High and Utah graduate, James began radio work in 1950.

For six years, he broadcast Utah basketball and football games before joining the staff at KSL Radio and Television in July of 1965. This is his 31st season doing BYU games.

Paul Ruffner, BYU's center from 1968-70, provides the color commentary. He was second team All-WAC in 1969. The next season he had 37 points and 18 rebounds in a game against Georgia.

KSL-TV/Blue & White Sports Network

Cougar sports fans turn to KSL Television, Utah's NBC affiliate, for live telecasts of many BYU basketball and football games. Nationally recognized sportscaster Craig Bolerjack handles the play-by-play.

A graduate of the University of Kansas, "Boler" also will call the action for several national ESPN basketball productions again this season.

Former Cougar star and NBA pro Michael Smith makes his debut at the color analyst position. An Academic All-American, Smith was an explosive and

flamboyant forward for BYU from 1983-89 before he was selected as a first-round draft pick by Boston.

In 1995, KSL-TV became the flagship station for the Blue & White Sports Network. Operated in partnership with BYU, KSL and KBYU-TV, this network is one of the largest university-affiliated syndication systems in the country.

A group of BYU and WAC basketball and football games is distributed via satellite to television stations and cable systems in nearly every state from Hawai'i to Maine--reaching more than 40-million households nationwide. Call 378-8455 for more information.

KBYU-TV

The tradition continues between KBYU and Cougar basketball.

Owned and operated by the university, KBYU-TV provides primary TV production facilities and crew for most BYU Sports broadcasts.

Veteran broadcaster Jay Monsen, BYU's athletic electronic media coordinator, is the play-by-play voice for most KBYU telecasts.

With state-of-the-art facilities and award-winning professional staff, KBYU has developed a respected reputation for top quality sports productions.

Major networks and local affiliates alike employ KBYU staff, crew and facilities for sports broadcasts.

KBYU owns and operates a fully-equipped, 48foot remote production truck, designed to meet the highest standards and requirements.

Traveling with expert full-time engineers and technicians, the KBYU mobile truck has a full complement of on-board audio and video equipment with chip cameras, long lenses, one-inch and beta tape machines, color monitor layout, DVE, still store, and both InfiNIT and Chyron 4200 graphics. Marriott Center

Going into its 25th season, the Marriott Center is one of the nation's largest on-campus basketball facilities with a capacity of 22,700.

Since the Marriott Center opened in 1971, more than six million fans have watched BYU basketball games. The BYU record for average attendance is 22,506 during the 1980-81 season.

Last season, BYU ranked fifth nationally in paid attendance behind Syracuse, Kentucky, North Carolina and Arkansas.

An addition to the Marriott Center for 1993-94 was an eight-sided 26-foot wide by 16-foot high score-board which features four large video walls designed to show live game action and instant replays. The scoreboard has four fully animated matrix boards. New display panels at the scorer's table were added this year.

The video screens are made up of 16 video cubes containing a projector and operated by a processor which creates a large number of special-effect capabilities.

In 1972, 1977, 1979 and 1982, the Marriott Center served as host for the NCAA Far West Regional playoffs. It also has been used many times for state high school tournaments.

Physically, the building covers three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 by 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet and encloses eight million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof, the height is nearly 10 stories.

There are 10,100 chair seats in the building with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the seats are below the concourse.

Besides six locker rooms, the Marriott Center houses coaches' offices and the special events staff. It also serves as ticket headquarters for major campus events and includes a hospitality room, player's lounge, training room, weight room, video room and a Cougar Club room.

Western Athletic Conference

The 10-member Western Athletic Conference is the most geographically diverse league in the country, spreading from the 7,000-foot heights of Laramie. Wyo., to the sea-level sprawls of Hawaii and San Diego.

Next season, the WAC expands to 16 teams and will include competition with San Jose State, UNLV, Tulsa, Rice, Texas Christian and Southern Methodist.

The WAC traditionally ranks in the top conferences in the nation in per-capita attendance at basketball games. Last year, BYU ranked fifth nationally in per-game attendance, New Mexico was ninth and Utah 21st.

Founded July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. In September, 1967. Colorado State and UTEP were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

A major change occurred in July, 1978, when Arizona and Arizona State left for the Pac-10. But, on the same day. San Diego State made its official entry into the conference. Hawai'i became the eighth member the following year; the Air Force Academy entered in 1980; and Fresno State in 1992.

The WAC is led by Commissioner Karl Benson, who took over in the summer of 1994 from Joe Kearney. The former graduate student and assistant baseball coach at Utah has worked at the NCAA and been been commissioner of the Mid-American Conference four years.

Margie McDonald, director of the High Country Athletic Conference until it became part of the WAC in 1991, is deputy commissioner. Jeff Hurd and John

Bobby Dibler is in his third season as supervisor of basketball officials. Dibler is a 1965 graduate of UTEP.

Dibler was a junior college All-American in Amarillo before playing at UTEP. He has officiated in six conferences and in 15 consecutive NCAA Tournaments. Dibler worked the championship games in 1982 and 1985.

The WAC office has been in the Denver area since the conference's beginning, with the exception of a two-year stay in Phoenix from 1964-66.

Hoop History

A look back at the humble beginning of BYU basketball reveals a completely different set of events than exist today. For instance, in those days, the Cougars played their home games on the third floor of the Training School building on lower campus.

Seating capacity in that gym was about 700. For the "big" games, fans would perch themselves in windows, on ladders and on top of lockers along the wall.

E.L. Roberts was coach of the Cougars from 1918-20 and was followed by Alvin Twitchell, who coached until 1925. Roberts again took the reins of the Cougar program for the 1926-27 season and helped champion the change that would eliminate a jump after every basket.

In 1928, BYU moved its home games to the Women's Gym on University Avenue, where the capacity was nearly double that of the other facility.

Provo's local radio station (KOVO) carried one of the first-ever broadcasts of a basketball game. Two-handed push shots were in vogue. And BYU landed its first All-American, Elwood Romney.

Some of the coaches who handled the Cougar program during the "Women's Gym" era were G. Ott Romney (1928-35), Edwin R. Kimball (1936, 1939-41), Fred "Buck" Dixon and Floyd Millet (1942-49).

An unforgettable chapter in the chronicle of BYU basketball was written between 1946 and 1950, when the Cougars played their home games on the floor of the Springville High School gymnasium. Seating capacity in that gym was listed at 1,200, although officials discovered it could actually hold 1,700 with some scrunching together.

Despite the handicaps, the Springville Gym was the site for some outstanding basketball. Some of the players who displayed their skills in the old gym were Joe Nelson, Mel Hutchins, Roland Minson; Utah's Arnie Ferrin and Vern Gardner; Denver's Vince Boryla; and Utah State's Ladell Andersen, just to mention a few.

In 1950, the Cougars had to go searching for a temporary home while the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was under construction. Utah graciously offered its home floor-the 6,000-seat Einer Nielsen Fieldhouse.

Non-league games were played in the Springville Gym that year, but once Skyline Conference action began, all games were played 45 miles away.

As transients, the Cougars didn't suffer much. They split with the Utes, captured the league title and went on to win the National Invitational Tournament in New York City.

That was only the second year for Coach Stan Watts, a man who molded BYU's program into one of the nation's finest. Coach Watts was inducted into the Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., in 1986.

At long last, BYU's team moved into the 10,200-seat Smith Fieldhouse in December of 1951. Coach Watts coached every one of the 246 games played in the Fieldhouse over the next 20 years. Large crowds enjoyed some of the finest basketball teams in the country during that era, including another NIT title in 1966.

The demand for more seats prompted school officials to begin planning construction of the 23,000-seat Marriott Center which, at the time, was the largest on-campus basketball arena in the nation.




Statistics will be furnished at the end of each half and coaches are available in the press room 10 minutes after the game.
