

MEDIA CREDENTIALS

Media credentials are issued to members of the working media only. Working space at the media tables is assigned on a first-come, first-served basis. Please call in advance to allow phone lines to be assigned. There is no charge for parking.

Requests for credentials should be made either in writing or by phone to the Athletic Media Relations Office, Florida Atlantic University, 777 Glades Road, Boca Raton, FL 33431, (561) 297-3163. Working members of the media are asked to present press credentials at the main entrance where they will be directed to seating.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Per NCAA guidelines, still photographers and videographers will be allowed to shoot from designated areas only. Photographers must sit or kneel while shooting. To ensure proper lighting, strobe lights are recommended. Photographers are advised to consult with the FAU Athletic Media Relations Office at least three weeks prior to set-up.

MEDIA SERVICES

The media entrance to all FAU athletic events at FAU Arena is at the main entrance. It opens 60 minutes prior to the scheduled start time. The media room is located to the right of the main entrance. Programs, media guides and game notes are available prior to the game, and complete statistical packages are distributed in the media room and at courtside. Drinks, telephones and a fax are also available in the media room.

PHONE LINES

For opponents, there will be one courtesy line and a \$100 charge for additional lines. All requests for phone lines must be made at least one month in advance and should be directed to the Athletic Media Relations Office.

For interviews during the season with the coach, staff members or players, contact the media relations office. Mornings are the best times for interviews.

Practice times change and are open to the media if advance arrangements are made through the Athletic Media Relations Office. Please make arrangements at least one day prior to attending practice. Post-game interviews with the home and visiting coach will take place in the media room.

Before the end of the game, all media covering the game should make their requests for post-game player interviews with a member of the FAU Athletic Media Relations staff. Then, with the coach's approval, they will be brought to the media room following the interview session with the coaches.

FILING REPORTS: PRINT MEDIA/ PHOTOGRAPHERS

All members of the print media will have access to phone lines after the game to file reports.

PHONE INTERVIEWS

Contact the respective Athletic Media Relations personnel to arrange phone interviews with coaches or players. All interviews will be arranged according to players' class, study and practice schedules. Players will be asked to return all phone calls. The Athletic Media Relations Office will not release player telephone numbers.

2007-08 PROSPECTUS

The third-most conference wins by a first-year Sun Belt school (10), advancing to the semifinal of the Sun Belt Conference Tournament and the most prolific offensive attack in school history made the 2006-07 season a success for the Florida Atlantic University men's basketball team. But second-year Head Coach Rex Walters wants it to be only the beginning.

"We took steps in the right direction," said Walters. "We had some issues throughout the year but we played some real good basketball in February and March."

The outlook wasn't always so bright for Florida Atlantic last season. The team started the year with only eight healthy players for the first four games and got off to a 0-4 start. The injury woes worsened in game five at North Florida, as the Owls dressed only seven players, but came away with the season's first victory.

From there, the season grew brighter by the day. FAU tacked on two more wins following the win over UNF to climb within a game of .500. After a loss to UCF, the Owls bounced back to win their first-ever Sun Belt Conference game, 91-87 against Troy at FAU Arena on December 13.

With two more wins, one at home against UMKC on December 23, and one on the road against conference foe Florida International on December 28, the Owls had won 7-of-10 and were back to .500 at 6-6.

The next two months were up and down for FAU. The team never won or lost more than two games in a row from December 30 to February 3, but on February 6 the team rattled off five-consecutive wins, including conference wins at home over Florida International, New Orleans and South Alabama, and a monumental victory at perennial powerhouse Western Kentucky.

The Owls opened SBC Tournament play with a 91-88 win over Florida International, a game played at FAU Arena by virtue of FAU's fifth-place regular-season finish.

The season came to a close in the semifinals of the SBC Tournament, as the Owls lost the rubber match with WKU in a hard-fought contest, but the Owls made an impact in the Sun Belt.

As the Owls begin preparation for the 2007-08 season, it's no surprise that health is the top priority on Coach Walters' list. The team struggled with injuries throughout 2006-07, and after losing two of the program's best players in DeAndre Rice and Brent Crews, the Owls will need the full complement of players to build off last season's success.

The offense was extremely proficient last season, as the Owls scored the most points in program history and finished 14th in the nation in field goal

percentage. But defensively the team struggled and was a point of emphasis in the off-season for Coach Walters.

"We have to get better in our transition and one-on-one containment defense," said Walters. "It was just too easy for teams at times last season.

You win with defense. Everywhere I've been it's been a priority, because good defense leads to scoring opportunities."

GUARDS

The guard positions have been impacted heavily by the graduation of Crews, who compiled the second-most assists in FAU history, and Rice, who was one of the most skilled offensive players in FAU history. Paul Graham (Jr.) is the only starter who returns among the three guard spots, but Sean Alarcon (Sr.) and Eni Cuka (So.) both saw playing time last season and will compete for playing time this season. In addition, there are three new faces joining the backcourt corps. Redshirt freshmen Xavier Perkins and Sanchez Hugley combine with junior college transfer Carderro Nwoji to give FAU a massive influx of talent.

"In my mind we lost the best offensive player in the league from a season ago (in Rice), and that's saying something with the talent in the Sun Belt," said Walters. "There are so many great players in this league, but he was special."


Graham had a breakout season as a sophomore, doubling his point production and improving in nearly every statistical category. He finished 15th in the Sun Belt in scoring in 2006-07, and was amazingly consistent on the offensive end (10+ points in all but three games). In addition to his scoring touch, Graham added 3.31 assist/game and had the league's seventh-best assist-to-turnover ratio.

"Paul made significant improvements in his first two years. He's added some size and is great offensively in transition," said Walters. "Ideally I'd like to lock him into one position, but he's shown the ability to play all three guard spots."

Alarcon, Holley and Cuka each saw action in various roles last season both as starters and as reserves, and will push for bigger roles this season.

"Sean does everything we ask of him, Avery is a playmaker and Eni was limited last season after transferring so we're excited to see what he can do with a full season," said Walters.

The ability of some of the new faces to adapt to the Owls' complex offense will ultimately shape the look of FAU's backcourt.

"Cardero is probably the one with the most to learn in a short timeframe," Walters said. "He has to learn the offense, know how the coaching staff wants the plays to be run and learn all of the subtleties of each of his teammates on the court. I know he can really defend and push the basketball up the court, but he has to get to the point where it's instinct rather than thinking."

Hughley and Perkins were on last year's squad, but injuries bumped the start of their careers to this season after each took a redshirt.

"There's going to be a learning curve taking what they were able to do in practice and executing it in a game situation," said Walters. "Xavier was very consistent last season each and every practice, and both will come into this season with an understanding of what we do and how we try to accomplish it."

FORWARDS

The frontcourt has a bit more experience than the backcourt, returning four forwards from a season ago, all of whom are seniors. They are joined by three newcomers in Sammy Hernandez, who transferred to FAU in the spring of 2007 from George Mason, Brett Royster and Jamal Owens.

"All three newcomers are high-level athletes," said Walters. "We hope Jamal will grow into a similar style player to Jeff Parmer, a guy who can play down low or step outside and handle the basketball. Brett is a tenacious shot blocker who has worked hard offensively and continued to improve. If healthy, both will have a significant impact on this team."

"Sammy is a winner. He expects to win every time out. He's a great post defender and he's strong down low. He's really going to help our team rebounding, which is another area that I felt needed to improve. We need to limit teams to one shot each trip down the floor."

The trio join Second-Team All-Sun Belt player Carlos Monroe (Jr.), the only player to finish in the top eight in both scoring and rebounding in the SBC. Monroe, who also led the conference in field goal percentage, was a dominant force down low last season and posted 11 double-doubles, tying an FAU single-season record.

The Owls will also welcome back three senior forwards in Parmer, who averaged 9.9 points and 5.5 rebounds and at times showed the ability to carry the offensive load last season, Derrick Simmons, the only four-year senior on the squad, and Seydou Kone.

"Derrick is a great energy guy. He makes things happen whether it's as a starter or off the bench," said Walters. "Jeff is a guy who can score 20 points on any given night and we want more of that this season."

Kone was limited by injuries during his first season as an Owl, but managed to appear in 25 games as a reserve.

2007-08 SEASON

The Owls will once again challenge themselves with a difficult schedule, starting with a seven-game road trip to start the season.

The road swing includes the three-game Daytona Beach Exempt Tournament where FAU will face Stetson, USF and Cleveland State November 16-18. In addition, the Owls will travel to Rhode Island to open the season on November 9, Boston College

on November 12 and Kansas on November 28.

"I think you have to play the high majors to show the team what it's like to be at that level, which is where we're trying to get," said Walters. "You have to show them what it takes to be at that level and how hard it is to win on the road. Those games will be a good indicator for this program and hopefully we'll have some success and give ourselves a boost."

A lot of things have to go right in order for a team to win a conference title. The list of needs can be overwhelming at the start of the season if it isn't broken into more manageable pieces.

"We talk about being champions of that day. Seize the moment and take advantage of the opportunities presented. It starts with individual workouts and goes on throughout the season," said Walters. "If we do that, we have a chance to contend."


Coach Walters also feels that the program needs the continued support of its growing fan base, which includes the students at FAU.

"The crowds last year really helped create some excitement, especially with the Burry the Burrow promotions," said Walters. "We have to springboard off that excitement level and take advantage of our great location and play hard for the fans. We want to make FAU Arena the place to be on a game night. Our players really feed off the fans, especially the student section. We want make them proud of their basketball team."

FAU Arena, which underwent a \$10 million renovation during the summer, features renovated locker rooms, lobby and restrooms, a new scoreboard, chair back seating on the west sideline and an enhanced exterior. In addition, a new team store is located in the lobby and a ticket booth has been added in front of the Arena to minimize congestion inside the Arena.

"Our coaching staff gained a real selling point this summer," said Walters. "A lot of very exciting things are happening at FAU thanks to Frank T. Brogan (FAU President) and Craig Angelos (Athletics Director). They did their jobs, and now it's time for us to do ours."

Rex Walters

Rex Walters was named the sixth head men's basketball coach at Florida Atlantic University on April 28, 2006. The promotion from associate head coach came after one season of working side-by-side with Matt Doherty in laying a foundation for college basketball in Boca Raton.

Walters joined the FAU staff on April 20, 2005. One year and eight days later, he became a head coach for the first time in his coaching career.

In his first season at the helm, Walters guided Florida Atlantic to its second consecutive winning season. It's the first time the program posted back-to-back winning campaigns since the team had three straight years of winning basketball from 1989-90 to 1991-92.


In 2006-07, the Owls won 10 Sun Belt Conference games, the third-most for a first-year Sun Belt member.

The team also scored 2,321 points on the year, the most in FAU history. DeAndre Rice and Carlos Monroe were named Second Team All-Sun Belt, the first student-athletes honored with a major postseason distinction under Walters' direction.

With Walters on the sidelines in 2005-06, Florida Atlantic closed its tenure in the Atlantic Sun Conference with a 15-13 record overall and the program's best conference record at 14-6. The 15 victories were a five-win improvement over 2004-05, when the Owls went 10-17 overall.

Prior to Florida Atlantic, Walters' first collegiate coaching job came at Valparaiso, a two-year stint as an assistant under Homer Drew. The 2003-04 Hornets were 18-13 overall and finished first in the Mid-Continent Conference with a record of 11-5.

The following season, Walters' second on the bench, Valparaiso went 15-16, earning third place in the MCC with a 10-6 mark. His coaching



career began in 2002-03 in Overland Park, KS, where he served as an assistant coach for the Blue Valley Northwest High School team that reached the Kansas Class 6A State Tournament.

Walters' pedigree for coaching began as a player, receiving tutelage from some of the game's legendary coaches. Roy Williams at the University of Kansas and the NBA's Chuck Daly, Larry Brown and Pat Riley all mentored Walters during his years as a player.

He first made his name known in college, starring for two seasons at Kansas. In 68 starts under Williams, he averaged 15.6 points per

game, leading the Jayhawks in scoring during both his junior and senior campaigns.

KU combined to go 56-12 overall in 1991-92 and 1992-93, winning back-to-back Big Eight titles and reaching the 1993 Final Four. Walters was named to the All-Big Eight team both seasons and was Big Eight Male Athlete of the Year as a senior in 1993.

As a junior, Walters averaged 16.0 points per game as the Jayhawks went 27-5. In his senior season, KU had a record of 29-7, with Walters scoring at a clip of 15.3 points per game.

Walters was an outstanding scorer from all areas of the court at Kansas, shooting nearly 51% from the field, 42% from three-point range and 85% at the free throw line. His college career originally began at Northwestern University, where he earned honorable mention from the Big 10 in 1989-90 after leading the team in scoring (17.6 ppg), three-point shooting (47.3%), free throw shooting (79.4%) and assists (125) as a sophomore.

It was during his senior season at Kansas that Walters made his first connection with Doherty, who joined the team as an assistant coach. The two reunited again for Doherty's single season at FAU, opening the door for Walters' move to the top.

After graduating from Kansas in 1993 with a B.S. in education, Walters was taken by New Jersey as the 16th overall pick in the 1993 NBA Draft. He went on to play seven seasons in total with the Nets, Philadelphia 76ers and Miami Heat, averaging 4.6 points and 1.7 assists per game in 13.7 minutes.

Walters averaged a career-best 6.8 points per game for Philadelphia in 1996-97, and made 67 career starts in 335 games. His career assist-to-turnover ratio was nearly two-to-one.

He was New Jersey's top three-point shooter in 1994-95 (36.2%) and Philadelphia's top long-range marksman in 1996-97 (38.5%). A

constant competitor who is always ready for the game, Walters averaged 12.8 points and 7.3 assists per game in eight starts for the 76ers to end the 1995-96 season.

Walters' professional career spanned nine seasons in total, ending in 2002 after playing internationally for two years and winning an American Basketball Association title with the Kansas City Knights.

A native of Omaha, NE, Walters and his wife, Deanna, have four children: Addison (10), Drew (8), Riley (5) and Gunner (3).



Mike Balado came to Florida Atlantic University in the summer of 2005 as a coach with in-depth knowledge of junior college and South Florida prep basketball. After one season, he was the first assistant hired by first-year head coach Rex Walters.

Balado's background has paid significant dividends for FAU, with all eight newcomers for 2006-07 having a prior connection to Florida, including seven who have attended South Florida high schools and/or junior colleges. In addition, his ability to speak fluent Spanish makes him a valuable resource when recruiting internationally.

From 2003 to 2005, Balado coached at Miami Dade College, where he helped lead the Sharks to consecutive winning seasons. Among his responsibilities were coordinating recruiting, scouting, travel and academic maturation. He also assisted with scheduling and budgeting.

In 2003-04, MDC posted a 17-13 record and then went 27-5 in 2004-05 on its way to winning the Southern Conference Championship. That 27-5 mark was the best in school history.

MDC was ranked among the top-three teams in the state throughout the 2004-05 campaign. Balado recruited four of MDC's 2004-05 all-conference selections, including the conference player of the year.

Prior to MDC, Balado was an assistant coach at Nova Southeastern University for the 2002-03 season.

master's of education in exercise and sport science from Augusta State in 2000.



Jeff Guin begins his second season as an assistant coach at Florida Atlantic University. He was the first new staff member hired by head coach Rex Walters last year. He will work with the post players, focus on recruiting in Florida and the Midwest, serve as staff contact for Roundballer's Club, oversee budget issues, and be responsible for scheduling.

Prior to joining the FAU staff in May 2006, Guin spent three seasons as an assistant coach at Western Illinois, where the 2004-05 team improved by eight wins over his rookie season. His primary duties at WIU were recruiting, individual instruction, scouting, team travel and academic advising.

Guin served in an administrative role with the University of Illinois from 1997 to 2003, where he concentrated his efforts on scouting, tape exchange, day-to-day office operations, and directing the Illini summer basketball camps.





of the year nominations and two naval certificates of achievement, as well as a letter of commendation and the Naval Good Conduct Award.







2002 NCAA TOURNAMENT





THIS DATE IN FAU HISTORY

FLORIDA ATLANTIC BASKETBALL 2007.08

November 18, 1988 Florida Atlantic, at the Division II level, plays its first men's basketball game and defeats Palm Beach Atlantic, 111-62.

February 28, 1994 In the second to last game of its first season at the Division I level, Florida Atlantic upsets North Carolina State, 75-71, in Raleigh, NC.

December 1, 1998 Florida Atlantic pulls off the biggest upset in school history when it defeats Oklahoma State, 83-81, in Stillwater, OK. The Cowboys enter the game undefeated, ranked in the top-10 and 87 straight non-conference wins at home. The clinching bucket comes with four seconds left when Gary Durant steals an inbounds pass and scores to break an 81-81 tie.

March 1, 2002 Robert Williams, a sophomore, makes a free throw with six seconds left in the championship game of the Atlantic Sun Tournament to break a 75-75 tie. The Owls hold on and win 76-75 to claim the school's first A-Sun title. The win gives Florida Atlantic an automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament, the team's first such appearance.

March 14, 2002 As a no. 15 seed in the Southeast Region, Florida Atlantic plays its first-ever NCAA Tournament game. Taking on Alabama, the Owls run off 15 straight points in the first half and lead at the break. The Crimson Tide holds off the Owls' upset bid with an 86-78 victory.

December 3, 2002 Florida Atlantic defeats the University of Miami, 74-73, in overtime at FAU Arena. The victory is the first for FAU against the Hurricanes, snapping a 15-game winless streak.

February 26, 2004 Earnest Crumbley sets a trio of team records. He scores 39 points and connects on 11 three-pointers to set game records. He also becomes FAU's all-time leading scorer in the process. Crumbley, who played from 2000-04, still holds all three records.

February 26, 2005 In his final game as an Owl, Mike Bell scores 18 points to become the fifth player in team history to score 1,000 points. His career total of 1,001 points makes him just the second player in FAU history with 1,000 points and 500 rebounds (514).

April 18, 2005 Matt Doherty, the 2001 Associated Press Coach of the Year, is named the fifth men's basketball head coach in Florida Atlantic's history. Rex Walters is named associate head coach shortly afterward on April 20, 2005.

April 28, 2006 Rex Walters becomes the sixth men's basketball head coach at Florida Atlantic, earning a promotion from associate head coach after just one season.

December 13, 2006 FAU wins its first Sun Belt Conference game, 91-87, against Troy. Derrick Simmons scored 21 points to lead the Owls to victory.

February 21, 2007 The Owls defeat South Alabama 79-69 for their 10th conference win. The total is the third-most in Sun Belt history for a first-year member.

February 28, 2007 In the program's first Sun Belt Conference tournament game, the Owls defeated Florida International at FAU Arena, 91-88 in overtime.


My name is Sean Alarcon. I'm a guard for Florida Atlantic University. I have played and will again play where my idol played. It was like walking on air.

I'm a forward for Florida Atlantic University.



THIS IS THE SUN BELT CONFERENCE



FAU's swimming and diving team won the University's first Sun Belt Conference Championship in 2006, repeated in 2007.

While there are 31 NCAA conferences that sponsor multiple sports, the Sun Belt is one of only eleven to participate in the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) and Division 1-A football, now known as the Football Bowl Subdivision. The Sun Belt was formed in 1976 with six members competing in four men's sports, and today comprises 13 institutions of higher learning while sponsoring 19 championship sports for men and women. The conference has influence in a region that carries significant importance, as its membership is spread out over eight states that represent 113 total electoral votes. Thus, if you carry the Sun Belt, you are almost half way to the White House!

The Sun Belt Conference enters its 32nd season in 2006-2007 with a proud history of athletic and academic success. The conference sponsors 10 women's sports — basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball; and nine men's sports — baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, swimming and diving, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field.

Each of the 19 sports has seen numerous team and individual accomplishments, and 12 Sun Belt Conference schools are currently graduating its student athletes at a rate higher than their school's student body. All Sun Belt schools are committed to excellence in the 21st century, and facility upgrades and expansion are occurring on virtually every campus.

Because of its status as a member of the Division 1-A football coalition, the Sun Belt Conference has a permanent seat on the NCAA's 16-member Board of Directors. As a result, the conference has a crucial voice on some of the most pressing issues in college athletics and will always have a role in the implementation of any future NCAA legislation and guidelines.

The conference continues to utilize television to grow and promote the league. Adding volleyball, baseball and softball to the conference's television package has resulted in more national and regional television exposure for the league than at any time in its history. The conference's regional television package enables live telecasts of Sun Belt events to reach over 20 million households. Additionally, ESPN televised the conference's men's basketball championship game for the 27th straight season in 2007, marking its longest affiliation with any conference in the country.

The Sun Belt Conference has partnered with XOS Technologies, Inc. to deliver a full-service, customized, public and premium web site to

provide fans with a broad range of real-time information and content about the conference's athletic teams. The Sun Belt is one of the few conferences in the nation to provide video highlights and features on its website from each of the league's respective championships. This technology serves as a great recruiting tool for schools by enabling anyone in the world with internet access to view the conference's championship events, and fans in five different countries viewed the conference's most recent soccer championship.



Prominent Sun Belt alumni include United States Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice (Denver), NFL Hall of Fame football player "Mean" Joe Greene (North Texas), Arizona Diamondbacks All-Star baseball player Luis Gonzalez (South Alabama), former member of the United States Senate and House of Representatives John Breaux (Louisiana-Lafayette), country music superstar Tim McGraw (Louisiana-Monroe), and actor Andy Garcia (Florida International).

The conference's first 30 years have also produced numerous individual national champions along with Olympic track medalists including Earl Bell, Tom Hill and Al Joyner (Arkansas State), Hollis Conway (Louisiana-Lafayette), and Tayna Lawrence (Florida International). Old Dominion's Anne Donovan received the Naismith Trophy recognizing the nation's top women's basketball player in 1983, helped the United States win the Olympic gold medal in 1984, and helped the Lady Monarchs capture the national championship in 1985 (one of eight women's Final 4 appearances by Sun Belt schools: Old Dominion — 1983, 1985; Western Kentucky — 1985, 1986, 1992; Louisiana Tech — 1994, 1998, 1999). Sun Belt teams have also participated in the men's NCAA Final 4 (UNC-Charlotte in 1977), the College World Series (Louisiana-Lafayette in 2000), the women's College World Series (Louisiana-Lafayette in 1993, 1995, 1996, 2003), and had 10 players selected in the first round of the NBA Draft.

The Sun Belt Conference is led by Commissioner Wright Waters, who is in his eighth full year as commissioner. He was named the conference's fourth commissioner in February of 1999 following the tenures of Vic Bubas (1976-1990), Jim Lessig (1990-1991), and Craig Thompson (1991-1998). The league's annual all sports champion is awarded the Vic Bubas Cup, named after the conference's first commissioner.

The conference office has been headquartered in downtown New Orleans since 2000 after moving from suburban Metairie, La., where it had been based since 1991. Prior to moving to the "Big Easy," the league was based in Tampa, Fla., from 1977-1991. The original conference office was located in Charlotte, N.C., from 1976-77.

President Brogan has been a champion of public education all his life. He considers his most important achievement as commissioner of education to have been building greater accountability into Florida's public school system, and he is a strong advocate of accountability in higher education as well. President Brogan and his twin brother, John, were born in Cincinnati, Ohio, the youngest of six children. The first member of his family to graduate from college, President Brogan received a bachelor's degree in education *magna cum laude* from the University of Cincinnati in 1976. Two years later, he moved to Florida to teach at Port Salerno Elementary School on the Treasure Coast. He continued his education at FAU earning a master's degree in education in 1981. In rapid succession, he became dean of students at Indiantown Middle School, assistant principal and then principal at Murray Middle School, Martin County's elected superintendent of schools,

for FAU include supporting its continued growth as an important center of teaching, research and public service activities; increasing access to higher education across the University's seven-county service region; encouraging diversity in FAU's student body, faculty and staff; supporting world-class research initiatives; fostering close, mutually supportive relationships with the communities the University serves; and making FAU an ever-stronger engine of economic development for South Florida.

In addition to championing education, President Brogan has served as a leader for other important causes. During the

past few years, he has become especially involved in the fight against cancer—a disease that claimed the life of his first wife, Mary. He has used his remarkable speaking ability to crusade in the fight against breast cancer and he currently serves as statewide chairman of Florida's Dialogue on Cancer. He has received a public service award from the Pioneers in Prostate Cancer.

For 2007-08, President Brogan was named to the NCAA Board of Directors for Division I. He also serves as vice president of the Sun Belt Conference's Executive Committee, which provides oversight for the conference through approval of conference-wide rules/legislation, the conference office budget and tournament championship sites and other duties.

Levow is a professor and associate chair for Broward programs in the department of Computer Science and Engineering at Florida Atlantic. He joined FAU in 1970 with the charge of establishing the University's first program in computer science housed in the mathematics department. He later transferred to the computer systems department and then

joined the computer science department when it was formed.

He has served terms as chair of mathematics and computer science and engineering. Most recently, he was responsible for developing the undergraduate degree program in information engineering technology for students with an AS degree in computing technology.

Upon Levow's arrival at FAU he became involved in faculty governance and has three times served as head of the

university/faculty senate. He has also served the University in a variety of advisory roles on issues related to computing.

Dr. Levow earned his bachelor's and doctoral degrees in mathematics and applied mathematics, respectively, from the University of Pennsylvania. Prior to FAU he held positions in industry and at the University of Hawaii.



CRAIG ANGELOS
was named director of Athletics at Florida Atlantic University in July 2003, assuming oversight responsibility for the institution's 17-team intercollegiate athletic programs. Since that time the total number of sports has grown to 18 and the department services more than 500 student-athletes.

Angelos enthusiastically embraced his multi-faceted role and has moved at a rapid pace to take the program to newer heights, by working with President Brogan, FAU students and staff. His philosophy for running a successful intercollegiate athletic program is built on four fundamental principles: institutional control, academic excellence, fiscal integrity and winning championships.

He took over a young athletic department and immediately negotiated entrance into the Sun Belt Conference (one of the 11 1-A conferences) and developed a plan and to lead the institution's transition from NCAA Div. I-AA to I-A. He initiated the University's brand identity campaign which came to conclusion in 2005 and has become a revenue stream for both the University and athletics. Along the way, a television contract was secured in 2004 that saw ESPN and Fox Sports become regulars at both home and away football contests; something FAU has repeated year after year. The department also became the fourth university within the state of Florida to have an all-sports apparel deal with Nike, joining Florida State, Florida and Miami. In 2005-06 the bar of success was raised with seven of the 10 sponsored FAU sports advancing to postseason play. In all, FAU captured five conference women's championships and was one of just

eight schools nationally to capture five or more women's championships. His leadership in 2006-07 saw the Owls flourish in the department's first full-season in the Sun Belt Conference and the Atlantic Soccer Conference.

During Angelos' tenure, the Owls have captured 12 conference titles and FAU has represented the University in postseason competition 17 times. Four individuals earned All-America status while two earned Academic All-America honors. The department's commitment to a holistic approach to student athlete excellence shows with more than 35% of the student-athletes maintaining a 3.0 GPA and with the National Consortium for Academics and Sports honoring FAU as an Academics and Sports Outreach and Community Service Program Honor Roll member in 2005. This was made possible in part due to the recent creation of a Champs/Lifeskills program that assists the student-athletes development in the areas of academic and athletic excellence, personal and career development and community service.

Perhaps, most significantly, under Angelos' leadership the department has been able to develop a balanced budget plan and has witnessed a steady rise in community involvement and donor commitment providing more scholarship dollars each year.

His complete renovation of fundraising measures has resulted in major gift increases of 400%, an Owl Club fund increase of 130% and an increase in special event revenue of 150%. Angelos' efforts to market the teams, build a fan base and showcase the University on national television have greatly enhanced the overall image of the athletics program.

Angelos has also hired two new basketball coaches. In April 2005, he brought Matt Doherty back to the college ranks. In just one season, men's basketball revenues tripled and attendance more than doubled. That foundation, laid by both Angelos and Doherty, was continued in 2006-2007 by former associate head coach and newly

hired head coach Rex Walters. Attendance continued to climb and under Walters' direction the Owls hosted the first round of the Sun Belt Conference tournament in a basketball environment that is unmatched in the Owls 18-year history.


Almost immediately after his arrival at FAU, Angelos initiated a master plan and review of all athletic facilities. His plan's implementation began in the fall of 2006 with a new \$4.5 million track and field complex that opened in the spring of 2007 and welcomed fans with the first spring game being played in April on the new field. Weeks prior to the track opening celebration, a \$10 million renovation began on the arena called home by the men's and women's basketball team as well as volleyball. Perhaps the gem of the projects includes the plan of building an on-campus football venue that would solidify the athletic department's position among top-tier institutions. More importantly, the entire University would benefit by his vision of developing an "innovation village" that would create much needed additional student housing, retail establishments, additional parking, and a hotel and conference center.

Prior to coming to FAU, he was the deputy director of Athletics and chief operating officer at Indiana University. While there, he supervised many aspects of the athletic department including the football program and was


instrumental in negotiating a Nike contract for 23 of its 24 sports. Previously, he was at the University of Miami (FL) for eight years, serving in a variety of positions but primarily as the second in command under UM's athletics director Paul Dee. Prior to Miami, he spent three years at the NCAA as a legislative assistant interpreting the association's rules and regulations. He has served as an intercollegiate athletics administrator for nearly 16 years.

A graduate of the Creighton University School of Law in Omaha, NE, Angelos worked for a short time in a mid-size litigation firm in Los Angeles, CA. However, he ultimately decided to combine his legal background and his love for athletics and gravitated towards a career in intercollegiate athletics. During his undergraduate years at Brigham Young University in Provo, UT, Angelos was the starting first baseman on the varsity squad. He later played for one year in the Italian professional baseball league in Buttrio, Italy.

The 45-year-old Angelos and his wife, Kristin, have been married for 22 years. They will gain another intercollegiate prospective in 2007-08 as their eldest daughter Alayna (18) joins the women's basketball team at BYU. The couple has five other children, Alexis (15), Abigail (12), Austin (10), Aaron (7) and Alivia (4).



BASEBALL... used one of the nation's most powerful offenses to reach the conference tournament in the team's first year in the Sun Belt. For the first time in program history, the team had two individuals finish with a .400-plus batting average, and Robbie Widlansky broke FAU's single-season mark with a .430 average. He was also named the Sun Belt's Player of the Year after posting one of the best offensive seasons in Sun Belt history and earned Louisville Slugger All-American honors. The Owls finished in the top-10 in the nation in batting average, runs scored, home runs per game and slugging percentage, while FAU hurlers ranked eighth in strikeouts per nine innings. In total seven players were offered professional baseball contracts.



MEN'S BASKETBALL earned the no. 6 seed in the Sun Belt Conference Tournament, thanks to the conference's most efficient offensive attack in terms of field goal percentage. The Owls led the conference in assists and had two athletes voted onto the All-Conference Second-Team. FAU hosted a First Round Sun Belt Tournament game against Florida International, picking up a 91-88 overtime win in Head Coach Rex Walters' postseason debut. The other highlight win during the season was a 78-73 triumph at perennial power Western Kentucky.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL saw Head Coach Chancellor Dugan pick up win no. 100 against Akron on November 17, 2006. She is just the second FAU women's basketball coach to reach the century mark, joining Wayne Allen, who finished with 167 wins. Dugan was also nominated for the Palm Beach County Coach of the Year award. The Owls picked up their first Sun Belt win against New Orleans at the FAU Arena.



CHEER TEAM performs regularly at home and away football games, men's and women's basketball home games and is a constant at community events. The squad, shorthanded due to injury, placed 12th at nationals in 2007 and performed an exhibition at King of the Jungle in Fort Lauderdale. The team finished second in 2001 and 2003 at the NCA competition and owns a national pairs championship.

CROSS COUNTRY finished 5th on the women's side and 11th on the men's at the Sun Belt Championships under Head Coach Alex Smolka. The women had two runners who narrowly missed qualifying for the NCAA National Championships with strong showings at the NCAA Regional. The women's team won three meets during the year, while the men earned one victory and three top-three finishes.

DANCE has garnered national attention in the last few years. The squad performs at football and basketball games, as well as pep rallies and charitable events, featuring dozens of routines and nearly as many creative outfits and dance styles. The program placed second in the nation in 2005 at the National Dance Association competition and helped raise money for programs such as Breast Cancer Awareness during the 2006-07 season.


FOOTBALL played the nation's fourth most difficult non-conference schedule. The experience gained got the Owls off to a threatening Sun Belt start, startling many who had picked the league's newcomer last. FAU finished 4-3 in the Belt and were in the hunt for a bowl appearance late into the season. The Owls played before a record crowd at Clemson, faced off against Steve Spurrier and also traveled to Kansas State and Oklahoma State. The inexperienced team showed maturity and ability with several players, specifically Frantz Simeon, being listed among the nation's statistical leaders. At season's end, Nello Faulk worked out for several NFL teams and attended the Jaguar's mini-camp. Two players continued to shine in Europe and Lawrence Gordon returned to the CFL.



MEN'S GOLF had three top-five finishes in its first season under Angelo Sands, who was hired on Nov. 17, 2006 as the head coach. The Owls have seven projected returners, giving the 2007-08 squad a veteran presence that will help boost the program under the direction of Sands.

WOMEN'S GOLF

finished third at the Sun Belt Conference Tournament under the guidance of Head Coach Joan Joyce. The Owls had an individual take top honors three times in 2006-07, and the team won the Cincinnati Springs Invitational. Sophomore Praewnapa Phol-Uayporn earned All-Conference honors and was a strong candidate for the NCAA Regional.



MEN'S SOCCER


had an eventful year under Head Coach Kos Donev. The team advanced to the finals of the Atlantic Soccer Conference Tournament in its first year in the league. FAU would end the season with a 7-9-1 record and place two players on the All-Atlantic Soccer Conference second team.



WOMEN'S SOCCER

had a seven-game winning streak at one point and posted eight more shutouts on the way to earning the no. 4 seed in the Sun Belt Championship Tournament. The Owls advanced to the second round before falling to eventual conference champion Denver. FAU placed three on all-conference teams and two on the all-tournament team. A 2-1 win over rival Miami highlighted the 2006 campaign.

SOFTBALL won both the regular season and postseason Sun Belt Championships and swept the Sun Belt's Player, Pitcher and Coach of the Year awards. The Owls had the highest RPI of any team not invited to participate in an NCAA Regional. It was just the second time since 1999 that FAU did not participate in a regional. The Owls won three games on Championship Saturday to emerge from the loser's bracket as conference champions, their 10th postseason title in the last 11 years.



MEN'S TENNIS saw the development of standout freshman Olivier Sajous, as he rocketed up the national rankings to no. 63, the highest ranking ever for an FAU individual. The Owls played every opponent tough, despite a roster made entirely of newcomers, with seven defeats by the slimmest of margins (4-3) and nearly upset the no. 2 seed Middle Tennessee, in the Sun Belt Tournament's opening round under the direction of second-year Head Coach David Komie.

WOMEN'S TENNIS earned a spot in the Sun Belt Conference Tournament under Head Coach Mary Dailey in the team's first season as a conference member. All but one of the squad's top six performers are projected to return. The Owls claimed victories over Central Arkansas, Dartmouth, New Jersey Tech, Duquesne, Sacred Heart, Siena and Arkansas State in 2006-07.



WOMEN'S TRACK AND FIELD earned 8th place finishes at both the indoor and outdoor Sun Belt Championships under Head Coach Alex Smolka. Owl freshman Friederike Feil won two events and was named Freshman of the Year and Outstanding Women's Track Performer at the indoor championships. During the outdoor campaign, the Owls produced three automatic qualifiers for the NCAA East Regional.

VOLLEYBALL advanced to the Sun Belt Conference Tournament in the team's first season as a conference member. The team will be the first to play in the newly renovated FAU Arena, which underwent a \$10 million facelift over the summer. Head Coach Jody Brown is approaching his 200th win at FAU.

SWIMMING AND DIVING defended their Sun Belt Conference crown and had a swimmer advance to the NCAA Championships for the third time in the last four years. Head Coach Steve Eckelkamp and Diving Coach Ashelye Henyan both earned Women's Coach of the Year honors. The men's team finished fifth at the Sun Belt Championship and broke three school records during the season.



DR. MICHELLE DOMAS BROWN was named the director for the Student-Athlete Center for Academic Excellence in 2005. Brown, who reports to the Dean for Undergraduate Studies, oversees the student athlete center for academic excellence,

serves as a liaison between the athletic and academic communities at FAU and is responsible for coordinating the NCAA's Academic Progress Rate (APR) initiatives. Her primary objective is to ensure that student-athletes have the resources and support structure in place to reach their educational goals.

Brown has been at FAU since 1997. Before taking her position with the SACAE in October 2002, she was an assistant director for Freshman Programs. Throughout her tenure at FAU, she has worked with students in many capacities focusing on their personal development and academic success.

The balance between academics and athletics has been a very important part of Brown's life.

Brown earned a full athletic scholarship in volleyball at West Virginia University. She had a successful athletic career, earning several awards, including GTE Region-2 All-Conference Academic First Team and the Atlantic-10 All-Conference First Team. Brown continues to hold individual WVU records in career digs and service aces. She graduated with honors in four years with a bachelor of arts in international studies and foreign languages.

Having earned the Atlantic-10 Post Graduate Scholarship and a graduate teaching position, she continued her education by earning a master of arts in foreign language from West Virginia University. In 1995, Brown married Jody Brown and returned to Boca Raton where her husband became FAU's head volleyball coach. While working full-time at FAU, she earned her doctorate in education in educational leadership, higher education administration.

Dr. Brown and Jody have one son, Kaja (3).



QUENTIN BALL joined the Florida Atlantic University academic staff in fall 2005, after a one-year stint at Saint Peter's College. His primary responsibilities include coordinating the academic efforts for the football team. Ball came to FAU from Saint Peter's College in Jersey City, New Jersey, where he was the academic/athletic coordinator. His main role at Saint Peter's was to determine and certify the eligibility of student-athletes. Additionally, he

was responsible for the advisement of all student-athletes and monitored every student-athlete's degree progression. He served as the CHAMPS/ Life Skills Coordinator and assisted with the SAAC. Outside of his athletic department duties he served on the President's Enrollment Council and was a charter member of the First Year Experience Committee.

Prior to Saint Peter's, Ball worked at USF for nearly two years in a similar role. There he primarily advised the men's and women's basketball student-athletes. He was involved in many of the changes that took place throughout the growth of the athletic academic program during the time the school was selected to join the Big East Conference. Additionally, Ball was the practice


coordinator and floor manager when USF hosted the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament 1st and 2nd Round.

FLORIDA ATLANTIC UNIVERSITY is committed to each student-athlete as a total person.

Participation in athletics is important, but it represents only one aspect of a student-athlete's college experience. Student-athletes at Florida Atlantic University have the opportunity to participate in one of the top athletic programs in the country. More importantly, they have the opportunity to earn a degree from an outstanding academic institution, one that will provide them with the necessary skills and experiences to find success and fulfillment well beyond college.

The University's commitment to the student-athlete is a dual one. Participation in the athletic arena is not viewed as an obstacle to the attainment of one's educational goals, rather it is seen as a complementary

activity. Each supports the other. Athletic excellence is stressed, but academic achievement is never compromised.

The University realizes that student-athletes are required to commit a large percentage of their personal time to University-sponsored athletic activities. For this reason, the University recognizes the need for a support program for its intercollegiate athletes. The Student-Athlete Center for Academic Excellence is designed to assist all student-athletes in achieving their educational goals.

Academic counselors work collaboratively with faculty and campus advising centers to ensure that student-athletes are taking the appropriate classes and making progress toward their degrees. Counselors also work with students on a variety of learning enhancement activities, including study skills and time

management strategies. In addition to individualized counseling, a comprehensive tutorial program is also available to student-athletes through the Academic Center. Tutors come highly recommended by faculty and they are generally available to work with students in all subject areas.

The Student-Athlete Center for Academic Excellence also coordinates community outreach and "life skills" activities for FAU student-athletes. FAU takes considerable pride in the accomplishments of our student-athletes in the community. In fact, the FAU Athletic Department was recognized recently by the National Consortium of Academics and Sport as one of the top universities in the country for commitment to community service.

CHAMPS/Life Skills Program

Florida Atlantic's CHAMPS/Life Skills Program made a transition in 2006-2007 from a program that was administered through the Center for Academic Excellence to one that is embraced by the entire athletics department.



PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

The Student-Athlete Center for Academic Excellence offers a variety of personal development programs for student athletes. In recent years, FAU's personal

development programming has been conducted through a series of workshops designed to help students not only make a successful transition to college life, but also to prepare them for success beyond FAU once they graduate. Recent workshops have focused on time management, study skills, drug and alcohol awareness, gambling, financial planning, sport psychology, health and wellness topics and better interview techniques.

FAU's Life Skills program also includes sections for the First Year Experience course (SLS 1501) that are specifically designed for freshmen student-athletes. While the curriculum



for these classes will follow the traditional SLS model that is currently in place at FAU, certain topics (e.g., time management, freshmen transitional issues, drug and alcohol education, communicating with the media,

etc.) are taught in a manner that will help meet the unique needs of the student-athlete population. Students' involvement with this class has had a positive impact on their academic performance and helps them build a community.

STUDENT-ATHLETE ADVISORY COUNCIL (SAAC)



Each athletic team at FAU has at least two representatives on the Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC), a leadership and service organization that exists for the betterment of the student-athlete experience. SAAC meetings provide students with a vehicle to express any concerns they

may have with existing practices and to offer suggestions for improvements in the future. The SAAC also organizes a wide variety of community outreach activities each semester. Senior soccer player Megan Coyne served as president of FAU's SAAC in a year that saw SAAC participate in several outreach events including fundraisers for the American Cancer Society and for the University of New Orleans. Coyne was also selected by the Sun Belt Conference to represent its 11 members at the National SAAC Meetings. SACC organized a holiday party and donated gifts to a community of underprivileged youth, worked a YMCA haunted house and visited several local elementary schools. In 2007-2008 Chris Eberhart (baseball) will serve as the SAAC president, Jarrid Smith (football) vice president, Jessica Badder (women's soccer) secretary and Brittney Comer (women's soccer) will serve as the treasurer.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT

Michael Boeke was hired at Florida Atlantic in October of 2007 as an associate AD of Business Operations. She will be responsible for overseeing and managing the FAU budget. Along with handling and managing North Florida's budget, she was responsible for a number of initiatives that furthered the athletic program. She also worked in ticket sales as well as media relations for the former Orlando Wahoos of the National Pro Fastpitch League of softball in 1997. She began her career in media relations, as an intern for Florida Citrus Sports and the Chicago White Sox during spring training. Along with that, she volunteered in media relations for the World Cup and Olympic Soccer Trials.

A native of Chicago, IL, Boeke received her bachelor's degree in exercise sports science with a specialty in sports management from the University of Florida in 1995.

Melissa Dawson became Florida Atlantic University's Associate Athletic Director and Senior Women's Administrator June 1, 2001. She is the University's first person to hold the SWA position, in a full-time capacity, demonstrating the University's commitment both to growth and to the development of women's sports.

Since coming to Florida Atlantic, Dawson has placed her fingerprints on the quality of game operations. Included in her overall plan to improve facilities was the recent addition of a track complex and to bring the arena back on-line after a complete renovation. She also works hand-in-hand with the training and equipment rooms to encompass the needs of the entire athletic department. She supervises several individual teams and spearheads the department's efforts to assure the equity and student welfare of the entire department, many times taking the lead from the SAAC committee, which she sponsors.

Dawson came to FAU from Florida State University. While the title of SWA is new for her, the inner working of college athletics is not. The Inverness, FL native held various positions at FSU during her 12-year tenure. She began as an equipment manager for the Seminoles and continued her career in an administrative role, primarily working with women's volleyball, basketball and softball. She graduated in April of 1992, from Florida State, with a bachelor of science in physical education.

The following fall, Dawson's title changed once again to Assistant Home Event Manager, a position that provided her the opportunity to coordinate all invitationals, conference championship and NCAA tournaments hosted by FSU.

She was again promoted in August of 1993 to Assistant Director of Athletic Facilities and Operations, a position she held until her departure from FSU for FAU. As FSU's Assistant Director of Facilities, Dawson directly supervised the daily operations of volleyball, soccer and softball and assisted in the daily game operations for tennis and swimming. She also served as the manager for eight athletic facilities was the liaison between FSU and Nike and supervised an equipment staff of five, all while earning a master of science in athletic administration in April of 1996.

She has served as the tournament director or assistant tournament director for ACC Championships, NCAA Regional Championships, a 24-team softball tournament and the 1996 NCAA Division I Women's Tennis Championship.

Ed Hayward came to FAU in March 1996, with the daunting task of establishing a strong compliance office while preparing and guiding the University through the NCAA Self Study. He accomplished task one and has proved invaluable as both a certification officer and as an ear for coaches, players and administrators, especially in problem resolution.

Hayward was rewarded in the winter of 1999 with a promotion to Associate AD at which time he assumed the responsibility of overseeing several sports. He has been a constant through the administrative changes.

Hayward came to FAU after serving as Florida International University's Compliance Retention and Academic Support Athletic Coordinator from January 1992 to February 1996.

While at FIU, he was directly responsible for the academic support of 240 student-athletes, evaluation of incoming transcripts, intervention and retention group for at-risk students, the academic study hall program and interpretation of NCAA bylaws and rules.

Terry Mohajir was named Florida Atlantic University's Associate Athletics Director for Development in December 2004, and assumed new responsibilities in December of 2006 as the Associate AD for External Relations. The added responsibilities of overseeing development, marketing, ticket sales, corporate sales and the media relations department are both a compliment to his ability to raise unrestricted dollars necessary to balance the athletic department's budget and the need to centralize efforts.

Since coming to Florida Atlantic he has been heavily involved in creating a comprehensive fundraising program with a focus on major gifts, the annual fund and special events. Since Mohajir arrived, the department has enhanced the major gift program 400 percent, and has increased Owl Club giving 130 percent. In addition, the special events revenues have increased 150 percent. He also coordinates all fundraising efforts for the proposed 170 million dollars worth of facilities expansions.

Mohajir joined the staff after serving in a similar role at the University of Missouri-Kansas City from 1997-2004. As the assistant athletics director for external relations at UMKC, Mohajir oversaw all marketing and promotions, sports information, fundraising, radio and TV contracts, corporate sales, tickets and event operations. While at UMKC, Mohajir was responsible for a 450 percent increase in the educational athletics endowment. He oversaw an 80 percent increase in sponsorships and an 89 percent upswing in the athletics fund


Coming to FAU marks his return to the college ranks but, his first without dual responsibility of





Athletic Facilities



THE TOM OXLEY ATHLETIC CENTER

Tom Oxley, a local businessman, FAU alum and avid polo enthusiast, stepped forward with a donation that allowed the athletic center to become a reality. The 54,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art facility houses the football locker room, training room, weight room, meeting rooms and coaches' offices. The Oxley Center also houses individual locker rooms for women's track, soccer, softball and volleyball, as well as the respective coaches' offices. The athletics director and administrative staff also call the Oxley Center home. All FAU students are welcome to use the computer study labs and classrooms. The facility overlooks the baseball "B" field, FAU Field, FAU Softball Stadium, the Boca Raton Airport and two football practice fields.



TENNIS COURTS

FAU's men's and women's tennis programs make use of two tennis facilities. The newly renovated FAU courts complete the athletic complex, with six lighted courts nestled among FAU Stadium, the Aquatic Center and FAU Field. The two programs also utilize Patch Reef Park, a facility that houses 17 lighted tennis courts and locker rooms for both teams.



TRACK AND FIELD COMPLEX

FAU Track opened on January 11, 2007 and was available for immediate use by FAU's indoor/outdoor track and cross country programs, as well as the entire student body. The \$4.2 million project features FieldTurf in the center of the eight-lane track, along with four long jump pits, a high jump area and two pole vault pits. FAU Track is located directly behind FAU Arena and east of FAU Softball Stadium.

Facilities



BASEBALL STADIUM

FAU Stadium is home to one of the most respected and successful programs in NCAA baseball history. The Owls, who were ranked as high as no. 8 nationally in 1999, utilize both FAU Stadium and the "B" field, which is used primarily as a practice facility. The "B" field was the original home of the baseball program, but with growing support, FAU Stadium was constructed in 1991. Plans are once again in the works for a new baseball facility as part of Florida Atlantic's efforts to maintain top-notch athletic facilities. FAU Stadium features AAA baseball lighting, is known as the best playing surface in South Florida and recently received an endorsement from Cal Ripken Jr. FAU fans enjoy the beach/picnic atmosphere along each foul line where beach chairs, coolers and family fun are a staple.



FOOTBALL PRACTICE FIELDS

The two full-sized football practice fields behind the Oxley Center are used not only by the Owls' booming football program, but by several other teams within the athletic department as a means for strength training and conditioning. The field features a commemorative memorial, dedicated to the program's first senior class in 2004.



SOCER CHAMPIONSHIP PLAYING FIELD

FAU Field was completed as part of a 10-year development program to create five on-campus soccer fields in conjunction with the Greater Boca Raton Beach Tax District. FAU hosted the Atlantic Sun Conference women's soccer championship in 2000 and 2003, and the University has served as a practice site for several international teams, Team USA and the women's soccer professional combines. Recently, the U.S. Under-20 team faced Guatemala on FAU Field in front of 1,600 fans.



AQUATIC CENTER

The Aquatic Center features an Olympic-sized meter pool and is home to FAU's men's and women's swimming and diving programs. The pool has hosted the Independent Collegiate Conference Swim Meet and has served as the winter training facility for hundreds of collegiate swimmers and features a diving well for one and three meter events. The dive team also utilizes the facilities at the Coral Springs Aquatic Center for platform practice and competition.



FAU ARENA


FAU Arena opened its doors to women's basketball in 1984. Men's basketball and women's volleyball joined FAU Arena as tenants in 1988. The facility seats 5,000 and underwent a \$10 million renovation in the summer of 2007. In addition to a new roof, renovated men's and women's locker rooms and an upgraded exterior, chair backs were added to the bleachers and a new video scoreboard was hung to give FAU Arena an exciting new feel as the programs grow in the Sun Belt Conference.

SOFTBALL STADIUM

FAU Softball Stadium houses the most successful program in Florida Atlantic's history. Through the assistance of FAU football, Hooters, Inc. and the State of Florida Title IX fund, the Owls can continue their success in one of the top facilities in the country. The Owls, who recently captured their 10th postseason conference championship in the last 11 years, play on a field lined with palm trees and a beautiful view of South Florida sunsets. The stadium is complete with concession stands, a press box and a covered batting cage along with recently remodeled dugouts.


Short first met Coach Schnellenberger after he transferred from the University of Georgia and became a student manager at the University of Miami, where Schnellenberger was coaching.






