FRANK T. BROGAN PRESIDENT — FLORIDA ATLANTIC UNIVERSITY

Frank T. Brogan became the fifth president of Florida Atlantic University in March 2003. Previously, he was lieutenant governor of Florida, the state's commissioner of education, superintendent of schools in Martin County, Florida, and a principal, assistant principal, dean and fifth-grade teacher in Martin County public schools.

President Brogan and his twin brother, John, were born in Cincinnati, Ohio, the youngest of six children. The first member of his family to graduate from college, President Brogan received a bachelor's degree in education magna cum laude from the University of Cincinnati in 1976. Two years later, he moved to Florida to teach at Port Salerno Elementary School on the Treasure Coast. He continued his education at FAU, earning a master's degree in education in 1981. In rapid succession, he became dean of students at Indiantown Middle School, assistant principal and then principal at Murray Middle School, Martin County's elected superintendent of schools, Florida's commissioner of education (the youngest person ever to hold that office), and, in 1999, lieutenant governor on the Bush-Brogan ticket. He had just been elected to a second term as lieutenant governor when he decided to seek the presidency of his alma mater, FAU.

President Brogan has been a champion of public education all his life. He considers his most important achievement as commissioner of education to have been building greater accountability into Florida's public school system, and he is a strong advocate of accountability in higher education as well. His goals for FAU include supporting its continued growth as an important center of teaching, research and public service activities; increasing access to higher education across the University's six-county service region; encouraging diversity in FAU's student body, faculty and staff; supporting world-class research initiatives; fostering close, mutually supportive relationships with the communities the University serves; and making FAU an ever-stronger engine of economic development for South Florida.

In addition to championing education, President Brogan has served as a leader for other important causes. During the past few years, he has



become especially involved in the fight against cancer—a disease that claimed the life of his first wife, Mary. He has used his remarkable speaking ability to crusade in the fight against breast cancer, and he currently serves as statewide chairman of Florida's Dialogue on Cancer. He has received a public service award from the Pioneers in Prostate Cancer.

President Brogan is currently serving on the NCAA Division I Board of Directors. He is also president of the Sun Belt Conference Executive Committee, which provides oversight for the conference through approval of conference-wide rules/ legislation, the conference office budget and tournament championship sites in addition to carrying out other duties.

President Brogan is married to Courtney S. Brogan, who has a law degree from Florida State University. They are the parents of Colby John Brogan, born in 2005.



DR. ROY LEVOW NCAA FACULTY ATHLETICS REPRESENTATIVE

Dr. Roy Levow was named Florida Atlantic University's NCAA Faculty Athletics Representative by President Brogan in May 2007.

Levow's efforts will blend nicely with his relationships as the past president of the University Faculty Senate, a position that saw him hold a seat on the Board of Trustees.

Levow is a professor and associate chair for Broward programs in the department of computer science and engineering at Florida Atlantic. He joined FAU in 1970 with the charge of establishing the University's first program in computer science housed in the mathematics department. He later transferred to

the computer systems department and then joined the computer science department when it was formed.

He has served terms as chair of mathematics and computer science and engineering. Most recently, he was responsible for developing the undergraduate degree program in information engineering technology for students with an AS degree in computing technology.

Upon Levow's arrival at FAU he became involved in faculty governance and has three times served as head of the university/faculty senate. He has also served the University in a variety of advisory roles on issues related to computing.

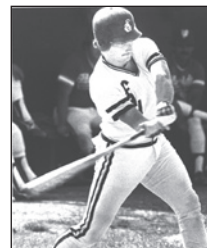

CRAIG ANGELOS DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Craig Angelos was named Director of Athletics at Florida Atlantic University in July 2003, assuming oversight responsibility for the institution's 17-team intercollegiate athletic programs. Since that time the total number of sports has grown to 18 and the department services more than 500 student-athletes.

Angelos has moved at a rapid pace to take the program to new heights, by working with President Brogan, FAU students and staff. His philosophy for running a successful intercollegiate athletic program is built on four fundamental principles: institutional control, academic excellence, fiscal integrity and winning championships. He immediately led the young athletic department through an entrance into the Sun Belt Conference (one of the 11 1-A conferences), developed a plan and led the institution's transition from NCAA Div. I-AA to I-A with an additional 23 football scholarships. Angelos has since witnessed the football program grow to the point of having its first home sellout, a conference championship, bowl berth and victory, all during the 2007 season. Along the way, television coverage of the burgeoning football program has been a key element of growth. Contracts have been in place since 2004 that has seen ESPN and Fox Sports become regulars at both home and away football contests as well as a strong relationship with CSS. The department also became the fourth university in the state of Florida to have an all-sports apparel deal with Nike, joining Florida State, Florida and Miami. In 2005-06 the bar of success was raised with seven of the 10 sponsored FAU sports advancing to postseason play. In all, FAU captured five conference women's championships and was one of just eight schools nationally to capture five or more women's championships. His leadership in 2006-07 saw the Owls flourish in the department's first full-season in the Sun Belt Conference and the Atlantic Soccer Conference. During Angelos' tenure, the Owls have captured 14 conference titles and FAU has been represented in postseason competition 18 times. Four individuals earned All-America status while three earned Academic All-America honors. The department's commitment to a holistic approach to student athlete excellence shows with more than 35% of the student-athletes maintaining a 3.0 GPA and with the National Consortium for Academics and Sports honoring FAU as an Academics and Sports Outreach and Community Service Program Honor Roll member in 2005. This was made possible in part due to the creation of a Champs/Lifeskills program that assists the student-athletes development in the areas of academic and athletic excellence, personal and career development and community service. Involved in university projects as well, Angelos initiated the University's brand identity campaign in 2005 which has now become a revenue stream for both the University and athletics.

Perhaps, most significantly, under Angelos' leadership the department has been able to develop a balanced budget plan and has witnessed a steady rise in community involvement and donor commitment providing more scholarship dollars each year. His complete renovation of fundraising measures has resulted in major gift increases of nearly 700% since 2003. This past academic year major gifts increased 33%, the Owl Club fund increased 100% and special event revenue increased 36%. Angelos' efforts to market the teams, build a fan base and showcase the University on national television have greatly enhanced the overall image of the athletics program.

He has continued to develop a close administrative and head coaching staff with 50% of the administrative staff coming on board since 2003 and eight head coaches being selected by Angelos. One of his most high profile searches culminated in the 2005 when Matt Doherty, former Notre Dame and North Carolina head coach was hired returning the former National Coach of the Year to the college ranks. In just one season, men's basketball revenues tripled and attendance more than doubled. His most recent hire, Mike Jarvis, former head



coach at Boston University, George Washington and St. John's, assumed the helm of the basketball program in the spring, with the knowledge that a return trip to the NCAA tournament is imminent. Basketball attendance has continued to climb while baseball took a major step forward with a season opening record crowd, which was surpassed mid-season with a standing room only attendance.

Almost immediately after his arrival at FAU, Angelos initiated a facilities master plan of all athletic facilities. His plan's implementation began in the fall of 2006 with a new \$4.5 million track and field complex that opened in the spring of 2007 and has now hosted two spring games and the University's first track meet. In the fall of 2008 the volleyball and basketball teams returned to a re-opened arena after a \$10 million renovation that included complete upgrades, including new locker rooms. Perhaps the gem of the facility projects includes a plan Angelos brought to the table as an "Innovation Village" that has been approved by the Board of Trustees. "Innovation Village" will include a 30,000-seat football stadium, 2,500 new bed spaces in student housing, retail and parking facilities which will benefit the entire University as it continues to strive to be a more traditional campus and first choice university.

Prior to coming to FAU, he was the deputy director of athletics and chief operating officer at Indiana University. While there, he supervised many aspects of the athletic department including the football program and was instrumental in negotiating a Nike contract for 23 of its 24 sports. Previously, he was at the University of Miami (FL) for eight years, serving in a variety of positions but primarily as the second in command under UM's athletics director Paul Dee. Prior to Miami, he spent three years at the NCAA as a legislative assistant interpreting the association's rules and regulations. He has served as an intercollegiate athletics administrator for nearly 17 years.

A graduate of the Creighton University School of Law in Omaha, NE, Angelos worked for a short time in a mid-size litigation firm in Los Angeles, CA. However, he ultimately decided to combine his legal background and his love for athletics and gravitated towards a career in intercollegiate athletics. During his undergraduate years at Brigham Young University in Provo, UT, Angelos was the starting first baseman on the varsity squad. He later played for one year in the Italian professional baseball league in Buttrio, Italy.

The 46-year-old Angelos and his wife, Kristin, have been married for 23 years. The couple has six children Alayna (19), Alexis (16), Abigail (13), Austin (11), Aaron (8) and Alivia (5).

ATHLETICS REVIEW

BASEBALL Baseball a traditional power—was one win away from playing for the Conference Championship title in 2008. The Owls are one of the most accomplished young programs nationwide-qualifying for five NCAA Regionals, including a Super Regional berth in 2002. The 2008 squad faced tough competition, hosting No. 5 nationally ranked North Carolina, as well as defending BIG EAST champions Rutgers, No. 29 New Orleans and No. 1 Miami. On April 9, the Owls defeated the top-ranked 'Canes 6-3 in Coral Gables to give FAU it's first-ever Division I win over a No. 1 ranked team in any sport. FAU ranked in the top-10 nationally in runs per game and homers. The high-powered offense was paced by the 2008 Sun Belt Conference Player of the Year Mike McKenna. Named an All-American by Collegiate Baseball, McKenna was one of six FAU players selected in the 2008 Major League Baseball Draft.

MEN'S BASKETBALL continues to show improvement and will be led by new head coach Mike Jarvis in 2008-09. The Owls had an impressive mid-season stretch last season that included dramatic wins over Troy, Denver and New Orleans. Later in the year, FAU would host and defeat rival FIU in the first round of the Sun Belt conference tournament. The Owls are led by Carlos Monroe, who has been named a "mid-major" All-American and has scored over 1,000 career points. Their young nucleus includes Paul Graham III and Carderro Nwoji, who both averaged double-digits in scoring.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL continues to work hard in a Sun Belt conference that is well known for its tough women's basketball teams. The Owls accomplished a couple of historical milestones in 2007-08. FAU picked up its first Sun Belt conference road win when the Owls defeated Louisiana-Lafayette in February. Later that month, the Owls defeated Florida International for the first time since 1996. FAU returns all of its starters from last year's team in 2008-09 and is bringing in a well regarded recruiting class.

MEN'S CROSS COUNTRY finished its season at the NCAA South Regional. In their second Sun Belt campaign, the men finished ninth at the Conference Championships. The team's finish, two spots better than last year's, was validation of the huge improvement the men made over the course of the season. They used the spring to continue to challenge each other and will run several track meets as unattached runners.

WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY began the season ranked 14th in the South Region, which marked the first time in the program's history to receive such recognition. The Owls finished fifth at the Sun Belt Championships, despite losing four of the five top runners from the previous season. The team continued its training throughout the winter and spring and will compete in distance events as part of the track team.

INDOOR AND OUTDOOR TRACK entered its second season in the Sun Belt Conference. The Owl women finished fifth in the Sun Belt indoor meet in February and would keep that momentum going into the outdoor season. Toyria Mattear became an automatic qualifier for the NCAA East Regional during the Florida Relays in the 400 meter hurdles. Fredericke Fiel would join her as a regional qualifier with a Sun Belt record time in the 3000 meter steeplechase at the Penn Relays.

CHEER performed at every game and saw their efforts flourish as the attendance at football games grew. The cheer squad helped to play host to the no. 6 ranked USF football team and a sell-out Lockhart Stadium crowd, a game that was also nationally televised. The team also traveled to Florida where they worked to create a spirited atmosphere as the visitors in a 90,000 plus seat stadium. Along the way, the team finished with a ninth-place video spot, five spots higher than its 2006-07 finish and the highest among Florida universities.

DANCE delights the fans who attend both the football and basketball games. The squad also joined the cheer team at the 2007 New Orleans Bowl where they performed for the Owl faithful and in some cases for those seeing the team for the first time in a nationally televised game.

MEN'S GOLF continues to compete hard under third-year head coach Angelo Sands. The Owls finished 12th in the Sun Belt Conference Championship and faced competitive competition throughout the year, facing teams such as Ohio State and Connecticut. FAU was able to defeat the Huskies back in February at Bear Lakes Country Club.

WOMEN'S GOLF finished six among all conference teams at the 2008 Sun Belt conference championship. Kim D'Andrea placed the highest among the Owl golfers at the event, finishing tied for 11th. Praewnapa Phol-Uayporn and June Bolme were named to the All-Conference team. Phol-Uayporn was also named Sun Belt golfer of the month in March after winning two tournaments and placing in the top-ten in the other two tournaments that month.

MEN'S SOCCER captured the program's first conference championship in 2007 in the Atlantic Soccer Conference after perennially challenging for the league title. This spring the Owls participated in a spring season that included match-ups against Vejle FC from the Danish first division and MLS opponents Real Salt Lake and the Colorado Rapids. The squad will return nearly every player on the championship squad including Phillip Lamarre who started each game in net, and leading goal-scorers Liam Ogle, Igor Santos and Shire Standnes.

FOOTBALL will look to defend the program's first Sun Belt Conference Championship with the same effort it put into preparing for the 2007 season. FAU will use the 2008 season to reach higher after becoming just the fourth school in the history of the Sun Belt to capture the crown and represent the league at the New Orleans Bowl. FAU also became the fastest start-up program to not only receive an invitation to a Bowl game, but prove victorious. Along the way, eight Owls earned all-league honors, all but one are scheduled to return this year. Tavious Polo earned Freshman All-America honors by the Football Writers Association. FAU will also enjoy the next two years as the program begins preparation for the development of an on-campus stadium.

WOMEN'S SOCCER has participated in nine-consecutive conference soccer championships and worked through a rash of injuries in '07. The squad fell to eventual conference tournament champion Denver in overtime in the Sun Belt Conference Championship. The Owls will use the spring to build the experience of the returners after losing the bulk of their offense to graduation.

SOFTBALL finished second in the Sun Belt conference in the regular season. The team hosted six tournaments in February and March and faced tough opponents such as South Carolina, Michigan, and Illinois. The Owls traveled to the Palm Springs Softball Classic in the middle of that stretch and faced Pac-10 foes Stanford and Oregon State, along with Hawaii and Pacific, and the U.S. Olympic Team. The Owls highlight of that tournament was a 3-0 win over LSU. FAU was a young team in 2008, and all but two starters will return for 2009, including pitchers Amber Barton and Rose Gressley.

MEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING faced some tough competition when they competed in the Georgia Tech Invite, as well as in meets against the University of Miami, Florida State and the University of Florida in preparation for the Sun Belt Conference Tournament, where the Owls finished fifth. Several freshman gained experience and will hope to improve on that finish next season.

WOMEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING fell just short of winning its third straight conference title, finishing second at the Sun Belt conference championships last winter. Senior Lauren Shue won the 1650 yard freestyle event and Bianca Murphy raced away with the 100 yard freestyle. Samantha Schlachterman was named Sun Belt Diver of the year. She along with Lauren Harvath and Lisa Thompson each competed in the NCAA Zone Diving Championships.

MEN'S TENNIS was ranked in the top-100 throughout the course of the year. A narrow loss to Denver cost the Owls the chance to compete in the Sun Belt championship match, they would go on to finish third. Olivier Sajous was named All-Conference after going a combined 16-5 in the number one and two singles.

WOMEN'S TENNIS faced top-25 teams in USF and Miami. The Owls defeated George Washington, Towson, and Columbia during the regular season and participated in the Sun Belt Conference Tournament. Most of the letterwinners from last year's team will return in 2009.

VOLLEYBALL returns all nine letterwinners for the 2008 season. The FAU career assists leader, Casey LaRocca, will return for her senior season and try and build on her 3,546 assists. Fellow senior, Katie Arvidson will continue to build on an outstanding career as the Owls get ready for their third season in the Sun Belt Conference in the fall, their first full season in the newly renovated FAU Arena.



MICHELLE BROWN, Ed.D. ASSOCIATE ATHLETICS DIRECTOR/DIRECTOR OF THE CENTER FOR ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Dr. Michelle Domas Brown was named the director for the Student-Athlete Center for Academic Excellence in 2005.

Brown, who reports to the Dean for Undergraduate Studies, oversees the student athlete center for academic excellence, serves as a liaison between the athletic and academic communities at FAU and is responsible for coordinating the NCAA's Academic Progress Rate

(APR) initiatives. Her primary objective is to ensure that student-athletes have the resources and support structure in place to reach their educational goals.

Brown has been at FAU since 1997. Before taking her position with the SACAE in October 2002, she was an assistant director for Freshman Programs. Throughout her tenure at FAU, she has worked with students in many capacities focusing on their personal development and academic success.

The balance between academics and athletics has been a very important part of Brown's life.

Brown earned a full athletic scholarship in volleyball at West Virginia University. She had a successful athletic career, earning several awards, including GTE Region-2 All-Conference Academic First Team and the Atlantic-10 All-Conference First Team. Brown continues to hold individual WVU records in career digs and service aces. She graduated with honors in four years with a bachelor of arts in international studies and foreign languages.

Having earned the Atlantic-10 Post Graduate Scholarship and a graduate teaching position, she continued her education by earning a master of arts in foreign language from West Virginia University. In 1995, Brown married Jody Brown and returned to Boca Raton where her husband became FAU's head volleyball coach. While working full-time at FAU, she earned her doctorate in education in educational leadership, higher education administration.

The University realizes that student-athletes are required to commit a large percentage of their personal time to University-sponsored athletic activities. For this reason, the University recognizes the need for a support program for its intercollegiate athletes. The Student-Athlete Center for Academic Excellence is designed to assist all student-athletes in achieving their educational goals.

Academic counselors work collaboratively with faculty and campus advising centers to ensure that student-athletes are taking the appropriate classes and making progress toward their degrees. Counselors also work with students on a variety of learning enhancement activities, including study skills and time management strategies. In addition to individualized counseling, a comprehensive tutorial program is also available to student-athletes through the Academic Center. Tutors come highly recommended by faculty and they are generally available to work with students in all subject areas.

Florida Atlantic University is committed to each student-athlete as a total person. Participation in athletics is important, but it represents only one aspect of a student-athlete's college experience. Student-athletes at Florida Atlantic University have the opportunity to participate in one of the top athletic programs in the country. More importantly, they have the opportunity to earn a degree from an outstanding academic institution, one that will provide them with the necessary skills and experiences to find success and fulfillment well beyond college.

The University's commitment to the student-athlete is a dual one. Participation in the athletic arena is not viewed as an obstacle to the attainment of one's educational goals, rather it is seen as a complementary

The Student-Athlete Center for Academic Excellence also coordinates community outreach and "life skills" activities for FAU student-athletes. FAU takes considerable pride in the accomplishments of our student-athletes in the community. CHAMPS/LIFE SKILLS PROGRAM



Florida Atlantic's CHAMPS/Life Skills Program made a transition in 2006-07 from a program that was administered through the Center for Academic Excellence to one that is embraced by the entire athletics department.

The Student-Athlete Center for Academic Excellence offers a variety

of personal development programs for student-athletes. In recent years, FAU's personal development programming has been conducted through a series of workshops designed to help students not only make a successful transition to college life, but also to prepare them for success beyond FAU once they graduate. Recent workshops have focused on time management, study skills, drug and alcohol awareness, gambling, financial planning, sport psychology, health and wellness topics and better interview techniques.



FAU's Life Skills program also includes the First Year Experience course (SLS 1501) to help students with the transition from high school to college. Incoming student-athletes enroll in the SLS 1503 course with students throughout the University. Topics covered include time management, freshmen transitional issues, drug and alcohol education, and diversity. Students' involvement with this class has had a positive impact on their academic performance and helps them build a community.

STUDENT-ATHLETE ADVISORY COUNCIL (SAAC)



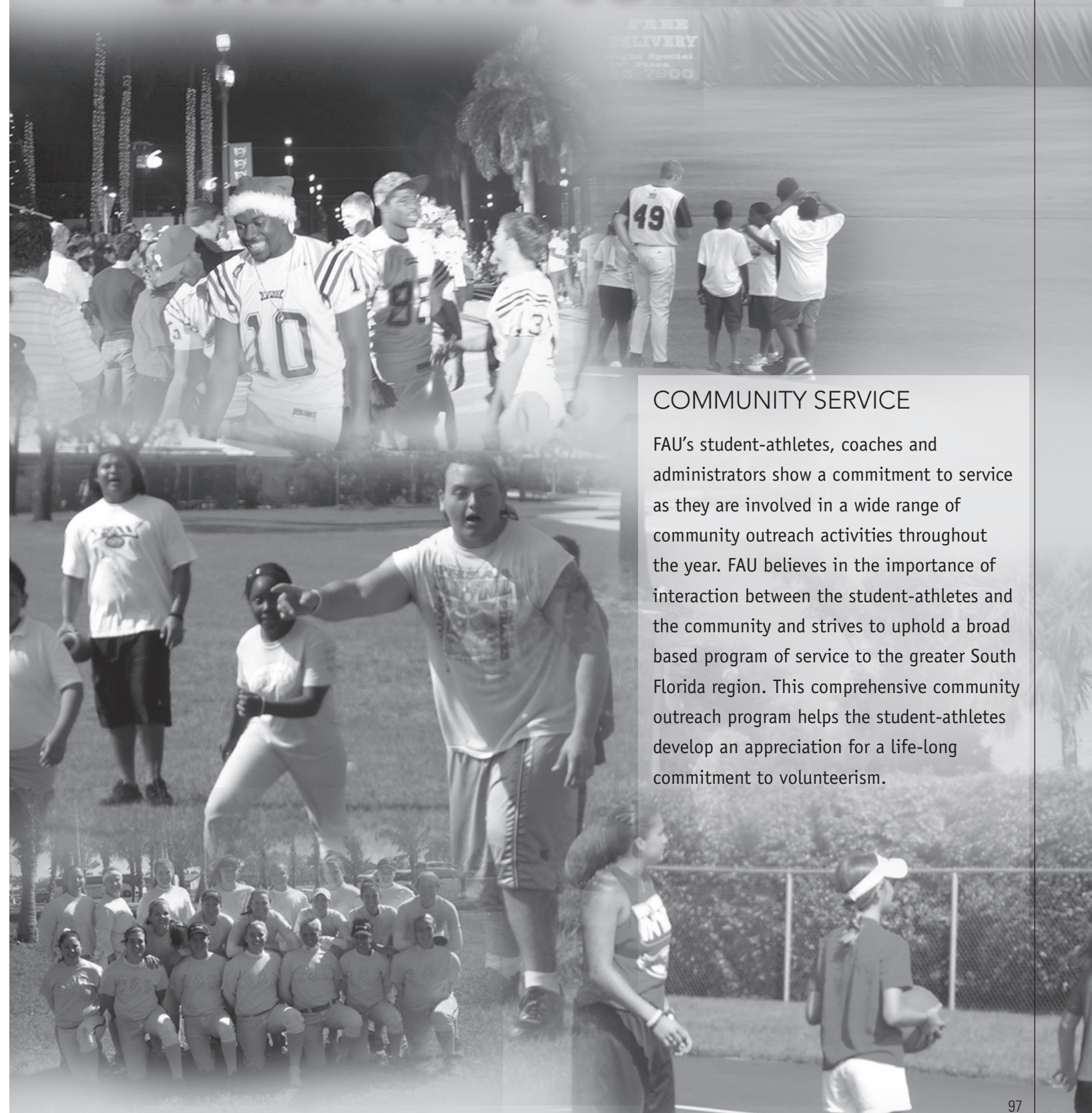
Each athletic team at FAU has at least one representative on the Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC), a leadership and service organization that exists for the betterment of the student-athlete experience. SAAC meetings provide students with a vehicle to express any concerns they may have with existing practices and to offer suggestions for improvements in the future. The SAAC also organizes a wide variety of community outreach activities each semester. Senior baseball player Chris Eberhardt served as president of FAU's SAAC in a year that saw SAAC participate in several outreach events including a fundraiser for the American Cancer Society. SAAC organized a holiday party and donated gifts to a community of underprivileged youth, worked a YMCA haunted house and visited several local elementary schools. In 2008-09 Adam Epstein (swimming) will serve as the SAAC president, Krystena Castro (volleyball) as the vice president. The 2008-09 treasure is Praewnapa Phol-Uayporn while the meeting secretary and media secretary are Brittany Comer and Jessica Badders, both from women's soccer.

This comprehensive community outreach program helps the student-athletes develop an appreciation for a life-long commitment to volunteerism.

ATHLETIC DEPARTMENT ADMINISTRATION

**MICHAEL BOELE****Associate AD, Business Operations**

Michael Boele was hired at Florida Atlantic in October of 2007 as an associate AD of Business Operations. She is responsible for overseeing and managing the FAU budget.

Boele arrived at FAU from the University of North Florida, where she was named the first business manager in UNF history in August of 2001. Along with handling and managing North Florida's

budget, she was responsible for a number of initiatives that furthered the athletic program. She was part of the reclassification team that was responsible for implementing UNF's strategic plan to move to Division I. She also led the initiative and supervised the process of changing the school's logo, and initiated budget reform which allowed the athletic department to increase their revenue.

Prior to her work at North Florida, Boele worked in sports and athletics at a number of different places. She was named athletic ticket manager at Drake University in 1998, two years later she was promoted to business manager. While she was there, she coordinated ticket sales for the women's basketball team's trip to the NCAA tournament in 2000 and 2001. She also worked in ticket sales as well as media relations for the former Orlando Wahoos of the National Pro Fastpitch League of softball in 1997. She began her career in media relations, as an intern for Florida Citrus Sports and the Chicago White Sox during spring training. Along with that, she volunteered in media relations for the World Cup and Olympic Soccer Trials.

A native of Chicago, IL, Boele received her bachelor's degree in exercise sports science with a specialty in sports management from the University of Florida in 1995.

**MELISSA DAWSON****Associate AD, Senior Woman Administrator**

Melissa Dawson became Florida Atlantic University's Associate Athletic Director and Senior Women's Administrator June 1, 2001. She is the University's first person to hold the SWA position, in a full-time capacity, demonstrating the University's commitment both to growth and to the development of women's sports.

Since coming to Florida Atlantic, Dawson has placed her fingerprints on the quality of game operations. Included in her overall plan to improve facilities was the recent addition of a track complex and brought the arena back on-line after a complete renovation. She also works hand-in-hand with the training and equipment rooms to encompass the needs of the entire athletic department. She supervises several individual teams and spearheads the department's efforts to assure the equity and student welfare of the entire department, many times taking the lead from the SAAC committee, which she sponsors.

Dawson came to FAU from Florida State University. While the title of SWA was new for her, the inner working of college athletics is not. The Inverness, FL native held various positions at FSU during her 12-year tenure. She began as an equipment manager for the Seminoles and continued her career in an administrative role, primarily working with women's volleyball, basketball and softball.

She graduated in April of 1992, from Florida State, with a bachelor of science in physical education.

The following fall, Dawson's title changed once again to Assistant Home Event Manager, a position that provided her the opportunity to coordinate all invitational, conference championship and NCAA tournaments hosted by FSU.

She was again promoted in August of 1993 to Assistant Director of Athletic Facilities and Operations, a position she held until her departure from FSU for FAU. As FSU's Assistant Director of Facilities, Dawson directly supervised the daily operations of volleyball, soccer and softball and assisted in the daily game operations for tennis and swimming. She also served as the manager for eight athletic facilities was the liaison between FSU and Nike and supervised an equipment staff of five, all while earning a master of science in athletic administration in April of 1996.

She has served as the tournament director or assistant tournament director for ACC Championships, NCAA Regional Championships, a 24-team softball tournament and the 1996 NCAA Division I Women's Tennis Championship.

**ED HAYWARD****Associate AD, Director of Compliance**

Ed Hayward came to FAU in March 1996, with the daunting task of establishing a strong compliance office while preparing and guiding the University through the NCAA Self Study. He accomplished task one and has proved invaluable as both a certification officer and as an ear for coaches, players and administrators, especially in problem resolution.

Hayward was rewarded in the winter of 1999 with a promotion to Associate AD at which time he assumed the responsibility of overseeing several sports.

Hayward came to FAU after serving as Florida International University's Compliance Retention and Academic Support Athletic Coordinator from January 1992 to February 1996.

While at FIU, he was directly responsible for the academic support of 240 student-athletes, evaluation of incoming transcripts, intervention and retention group for at-risk students, the academic study hall program and interpretation of NCAA bylaws and rules.

Hayward, who received his masters of science in sports administration in December of 1991 from St. Thomas University, came to Florida from Tennessee Technological University where he served as Admissions Counselor for the University's Office of Admissions from 1988 to 1990.

While at Tennessee Tech, he was responsible for gathering academic profiles of recently admitted students, the presentations to prospective students and their parents, community college and high school visits, and evaluation of transcripts.

Hayward, who received his B.A. with an emphasis in journalism in 1988 from Tennessee Tech University, became involved with the support and advisement of Foot Fraternity Inc (football) while working at Tech and continued his community support upon becoming a resident of Miami. He was a four-year letterman for the Golden Eagles ('83-'85, '97) and in the program's extended history is one of seven to rush for 1,000 yards (1,021 '85).

He has been a road race coordinator for the Miami Runners Club and has served on the board of directors. Hayward also volunteers for Boys Town of Florida, Miami division, and was a football coach for the North Miami Parks' Recreation Department.

Hayward resides in Miami with his wife, Lisa, and three children, Christian (12), Myles (9) and Virginia Brya (5).

**BRIAN MCNEELY****Associate AD**

Brian McNeely joined the staff at Florida Atlantic University in the winter of 2007 as an Associate Athletics Director, a position that works hand-in-hand with Athletics Director Craig Angelos as well as each the FAU administrative team members.

McNeely brought nearly 30 years of college athletic experience to a program that has been competing in baseball for less than 30 years basketball for less than 20 seasons and football for just eight.

His broad based experience as a collegiate football coach and as a president/CEO and founder of two corporations, will serve the department well as it continues to grow and strive for new successes.

McNeely began his coaching career at Butler County Community College in 1978-1979 as an assistant coach and as a head coach from 1982-84. He has also coached at Pratt Community College (1981), University of Kansas (1985), Garden City Community College where he served as the head Football Coach and Assistant Dean of Admissions from 1986-1991. McNeely then roamed the sidelines as Idaho State University's Head Coach from 1992-1996. McNeely then moved from an educational environment to non-for profit when he began fundraising and served as the director for Fellowship of Christian Athletes (1998-99). He returned to college athletics on a fulltime basis in 2000 when he served as the University of Colorado's Director of Football Operations/Recruiting. McNeely delved back into coaching at Indiana University where he served as the Assistant Head Football Coach and Recruiting Coordinator from 2002-2004.

Seeing a communication and research need for college recruiters, McNeely founded and serves as the CEO of a Sports Management company. He also serves as the President and Founder of Global Refuge International, an organization that provides international relief and developmental organization for acute medical care around the world. Two of his three children currently work for GRI.

McNeely has been married for 29 years and has three children (Shaunessy, Jaden and LoriAnne).

**TERRY MOHAJIR****Associate AD, External Relations**

Terry Mohajir was named Florida Atlantic University's Associate Athletics Director for Development in December 2004, and assumed new responsibilities in December of 2006 as the Associate AD for External Relations. The added responsibilities of overseeing development, marketing, ticket sales, corporate sales and the media relations department are both a compliment to his ability to raise unrestricted dollars necessary

to balance the athletic department's budget and the need to centralize efforts.

Since coming to Florida Atlantic he has been heavily involved in creating a comprehensive fundraising program with a focus on major gifts, the annual fund and special events. Since Mohajir arrived, the department has enhanced the major gift program 800 percent, and has increased Owl Club giving 400 percent. In addition, the special events revenues have increased 150 percent. He also coordinates all fundraising efforts for the proposed new \$65 million on-campus football stadium.

Mohajir joined the staff after serving in a similar role at the University of Missouri-Kansas City from 1997-2004. As the assistant athletics director for external relations at UMKC, Mohajir oversaw all marketing and promotions, sports information, fundraising, radio and TV contracts, corporate sales, tickets and event operations. While at UMKC, Mohajir was responsible for a 450 percent increase in the educational athletics endowment. He oversaw and 80 percent increase in sponsorships and an 89 percent upswing in the athletics fund donor base. There was also a 33 percent increase in ticket revenue under his direction. One of his more visible accomplishments was leading the fundraising and construction efforts for a new training room and strength and conditioning center.

Prior to working at UMKC, Mohajir was a football ticket sales and promotions account executive for the University of Kansas from 1996-97, and was an assistant offensive line and game-day special team's football coach for the Jayhawks from 1993-96. Mohajir graduated from Arkansas State with a major in sports management and a minor in marketing in 1993, where he was a starter on the football team. He earned a master's degree in sports management from the University of Kansas in 1997.

Mohajir and his wife, Julie, have two daughters, Maria (7) and Molly (5) and an infant son Marco.

**DEXTER LAMONT****Assistant Athletic Director of Marketing, Licensing and New Business Development**

Dexter LaMont was hired as director of marketing for Florida Atlantic University in July of 2002, and assumed new responsibilities in February 2005. As the Assistant Athletic Director, he is involved in all phases of the athletics department including overseeing key revenue external constituencies, the university licensing program, corporate sales, radio and television broadcast, ticket sales and all

marketing/promotions. His external role has also been extended as a member of the development team with a focus on major gifts and the annual fund.

Prior to joining FAU, LaMont served two years as the director of women's marketing and promotions at Oklahoma State University. His duties included the marketing management of all Cowgirl athletics, including game operations and public and community relations.

Prior to his appointment at OSU, LaMont was a marketing assistant at Florida State University for two years. His primary responsibilities included marketing management for volleyball, softball, and all other Seminoles Olympic sports. He also assisted in a similar capacity with football and women's basketball.

LaMont graduated from Florida State University in 1998, and is married to the former Shannon Edwards.

**KATRINA MCCORMACK****Assistant AD, Director of Media Relations**

Katrina McCormack came to Florida Atlantic University in July of 1991 with the responsibility of a one person NCAA Division II department that handled all media relations activity for 14 sports. Since that time, FAU has moved to Division I, joined the Atlantic Sun conference, set in motion a move to the Sun Belt Conference, and has added four additional sports.

The Media Relations Office has also grown to encompass two other full-time staff members and two interns. While McCormack primarily works with football, she also writes for several on-campus magazines, oversees the implementation of the website, broadcast outlets and day-to-day functions of the department.

She has enjoyed working NCAA Championship events for volleyball, softball, baseball, the national men's soccer championship, women's basketball, men's basketball, including the round of 16, and most recently served as media coordinator for the Division I-AA Football Semi-Final Championship. McCormack also spent the summer of 1996 working at the Olympics.

Prior to coming to FAU, the Florida native, worked two years as the Sports Information Director for the Sunshine State Conference. Her first year working in the field of sports information was as a graduate assistant at Austin Peay State University, fulfilling a one-year mentorship requirement by the United States Sports Academy, where she obtained a master's degree.

McCormack's undergraduate work was at Florida Southern College, where she was a member of a nationally ranked softball team, a team that appeared in three NCAA Regionals and one World Series during her four-year tenure. She graduated in 1988 with a degree in communications.

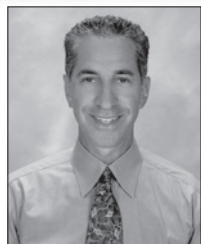


DR. GREGORY J. GILOT, M.D. TEAM PHYSICIAN

ATHLETIC FACILITIES

TOM OXLEY ATHLETIC CENTER

Tom Oxley, a local businessman, FAU alum and avid polo enthusiast, stepped forward with a donation that allowed the athletic center to become a reality. The 54,000 square-foot, state of the art facility houses the football locker room, training room, weight room, meeting rooms and coaches' offices. The Oxley Center also houses individual locker rooms for women's track, soccer, softball and volleyball, as well as the respective coaches' offices. The athletics director and administrative staff of FAU also call the Oxley Center home. All FAU students are welcome to use the computer study labs and classrooms. The facility overlooks the baseball "B" field, the FAU Soccer Field, FAU Softball Stadium, the Boca Raton Airport and two football practice fields.

SOCCER CHAMPIONSHIP PLAYING FIELD

FAU Field was completed as part of a 10-year development program to create five on-campus soccer fields in conjunction with the Greater Boca Raton Beach Tax District. FAU hosted the Atlantic Sun Conference women's soccer championship in 2000 and 2003 and the University has served as a practice site for several international teams, Team USA and the women's soccer professional combines. Recently, FAU faced the Colorado Rapids and Real Salt Lake during the MLS team's spring training at the FAU Soccer Complex.

TRACK AND FIELD COMPLEX

FAU Track opened on January 11, 2007 and was available for immediate use by FAU's indoor/outdoor track and cross country programs, as well as the entire student body. The \$4.2 million project features FieldTurf, a surface used by the FAU football team as it holds nighttime practices and the Owls annual spring game at the complex. The FieldTurf is surrounded by an eight-lane track, along with four long jump pits, a high jump area and two pole vault pits. In 2008, the Owl track team hosted its first meet, and will continue to do so on a yearly basis. FAU Track is located directly behind FAU Arena and east of the softball stadium.

TENNIS COURTS

FAU's men's and women's tennis programs make use of two tennis facilities. The FAU courts are recently renovated as part of the athletic complex, with six lighted courts nestled next to FAU Baseball Stadium, the Aquatic Center, and FAU Soccer Complex. The two programs also utilize Patch Reef Park, a facility that houses 17 lighted tennis courts and locker rooms for both teams.

FAU ARENA

FAU Arena opened its doors to women's basketball in 1984. Men's basketball and volleyball joined FAU Arena as tenants in 1988. The facility seats 5,000 and recently has been modernized with a \$10 million renovation in the summer of 2007 including a new roof, renovated men's and women's locker rooms, an upgraded exterior and renovated lobby as well as chair back seating and video scoreboard was installed. In the summer of 2008, further renovations were put in place, including club suites to give "The Burrow" an exciting new feel as the programs grow in the Sun Belt conference.



FOOTBALL PRACTICE FIELDS

Two full-sized football practice fields behind the Oxley Center are used for the Owls' booming football program. They are also used by several other teams within the athletic department for strength training and conditioning. The field features a memorial dedicated to the initial program builders.

SOFTBALL STADIUM

FAU Softball Stadium houses the most successful program in Florida Atlantic's history. Through the assistance of FAU Football, Hooters, Inc. and the State of Florida Title IX fund, the Owls can continue their success in one of the top facilities in the country. The Owls, who have won 10 postseason conference championships in the past 12 years, play on a field lined with palm trees and a beautiful view of South Florida sunsets. The stadium is complete with concession stands, a press box and a covered batting cage along with recently remodeled dugouts and is located behind the FAU Arena.



AQUATIC CENTER

The Aquatic Center features an Olympic-sized meter pool and is home to FAU's men's and women's swimming and diving programs. The pool has hosted the Independent Collegiate Conference Swim Meet and has served as the winter training facility for hundreds of collegiate swimmers and features a diving well for one and three meter events. The dive team also utilizes the facilities at the Coral Springs Aquatic Center for platform practice and competition.

BASEBALL STADIUM

FAU Stadium is home to one of the most respected and successful programs in recent NCAA baseball history. The Owls, who were ranked as high as no. 8 nationally in 1999, utilize both FAU Stadium and the "B" field, which is used as a practice facility. The "B" field was the original home of the baseball program, however with growing support FAU Stadium was constructed in 1991. Plans are once again in the works for a new baseball facility as part of Florida Atlantic's efforts to maintain top-notch facilities. FAU Stadium features AAA baseball lighting and is known as the best playing surface in South Florida and in 2008 hosted the largest crowd in the history of the ballpark when over 2,300 fans watched FAU play no. 1 Miami. FAU fans enjoy the beach/picnic atmosphere along the foul lines where beach chairs, coolers, and family fun are a staple.

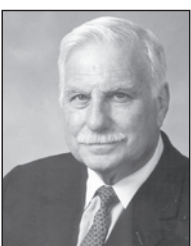

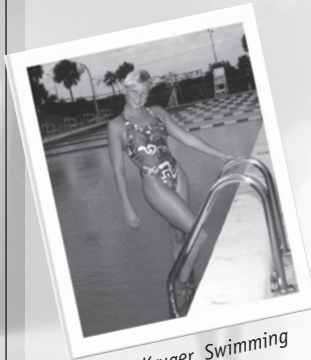


Charles E. Schmidt College of Science

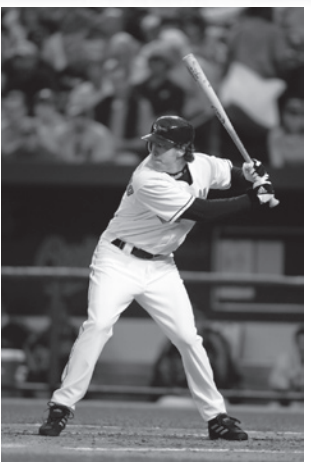
