2023 HIGHLIGHTS

- Voted the Baseball Writers' Association of America (BBWAA) American League Manager of the Year, his first career BBWAA Manager of the Year Honor; became the fourth Orioles manager to win the award, joining Buck Showalter (2014), Davey Johnson (1997), and Frank Robinson (1989).
- Voted the *Sporting News* AL Manager of the Year by fellow American League managers for the second consecutive year.
- Named the Mo Gaba Sportsperson of the Year by *PressBox*.
- Completed his fifth season as Baltimore's manager with an AL-best 101-61 record, the first time since 1997 that the Orioles claimed the top seed in the AL.
- Led the O's to their 10th AL East title and first since 2014, as well as their first playoff berth since the 2016 AL Wild Card.
- Guided the Orioles to their first 100-win season since 1980 and tied the 1971 team for the fourth-most wins in club history (since 1954); joined Earl Weaver as the only O's skippers to manage a team to a 100-win campaign.
- Has managed the Birds to their first back-to-back winning seasons since 2013-14.
- Collected his 291st managerial win on August 20 at Oakland, tying Johnny Oates for fifth in Orioles history; notched his 292nd managerial win on August 23 vs. Toronto, moving into sole possession of fifth in Orioles history.
- Earned his 300th managerial win on September 4 at Los Angeles-AL, joining Earl Weaver (1,480), Buck Showalter (669), Paul Richards (517), and Hank Bauer (407) as managers with 300 wins in an O's uniform.
- Managed his 700th game with the Orioles on September 22 at Cleveland, joining Weaver (2,541), Showalter (1,353), Richards (1,063), and Bauer (726) as Orioles managers to reach 700 career games.

MANAGERIAL/COACHING CAREER

Led the O's to an 83-79 record in 2022, his first winning season as manager and the club's first winning campaign since 2016... Finished second in voting for BBWAA 2022 American League Manager of the Year...Voted the *Sporting News* 2022 American League Manager of the Year by fellow AL managers...Named *Baseball America's* 2022 MLB Manager of the Year...Collected his 200th career managerial win on September 1, 2022 at Cleveland...Earned his 100th career managerial win on June 6, 2021 vs. Cleveland...Led the Orioles to a 25-35 record during the 2020 COVID-19 shortened season, a .417 win percentage, the highest by an O's club since 2017...The 2019 season marked his first Major League managerial post following 16 professional seasons in the coaching ranks and four professional seasons as a player...Named the 20th manager in Orioles history on December 14, 2018...Previously served as the Chicago Cubs bench coach in 2018, his second season in that role (also 2014)...Spent three seasons as the Cubs' first base coach from 2015-17, and also served as Chicago's Director of Player Development from August 2012-13, after joining the Cubs in December of 2011 as their Minor League Field Coordinator...The Cubs qualified for the postseason four times during his tenure, including winning the franchise's first World Series title in 108 years in 2016...Prior to joining the Cubs, spent nine seasons in the Marlins organization...Served as Marlins bench coach from June 2010 through 2011, and served as Miami's interim manager on June 19, 2011 against Tampa Bay, following the resignation of manager Edwin Rodriguez...Began 2010 as the Marlins Minor League Infield Coordinator, after serving the previous five seasons (2005-09) as a manager across three different levels of the Marlins minor league system...Served as Double-A Jacksonville's manager during 2009, leading the Suns to the Southern League Championship...Following the season, he managed the Mesa Solar Sox in the Arizona Fall League...In 2008, served as the manager at Class A-Advanced Jupiter, and in 2007, was the manager at Double-A Carolina...Managed Class-A Greensboro from 2005-06, the team that he received his professional coaching start with in 2003, serving as Greensboro's Hitting Coach for the second half of the 2003 season and all of 2004 before being promoted to manager.

ELROD HENDRICKS (1940-2005)

No one logged more time in an Orioles uniform than Elrod Hendricks. For 37 seasons, Hendricks opened the year in an O's jersey as a player or coach, 16 more years than Brooks Robinson or Cal Ripken, Jr. He spent 45 years on the field in organized baseball, the last 28 of them as the O's bullpen coach. Hendricks served as a catcher for the Orioles from 1968 until he was traded to the Cubs during the 1972 season, and again from 1973 until he was traded to the Yankees during the 1976 campaign. He was named the bullpen coach following the 1977 season, but was activated in each of his first two seasons as a coach.

- Began his coaching career at his alma mater, Concordia University (TX), in 2007, where he served as the Pitching Coach and Recruiting Coordinator.
- He then spent four seasons with the University of Alabama, two as a Volunteer Assistant (2008-09) and two as the Director of Baseball Operations (2010-11).
- With the Crimson Tide, the team appeared in the NCAA Tournament each season, including reaching the NCAA Super Regional in 2010.
- Also at Alabama, French was the Director of Community Outreach, and helped the baseball program win the university's 2010 Community Outreach Award; the award is given annually to the university's athletic team that puts in the most community service hours in an academic year; the baseball program registered over 1,000 hours of community service in the 2009-10 academic year.
- Spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Florida International University (2012-13) and two at Division II Lee University in Cleveland, Tenn. (2014-15).

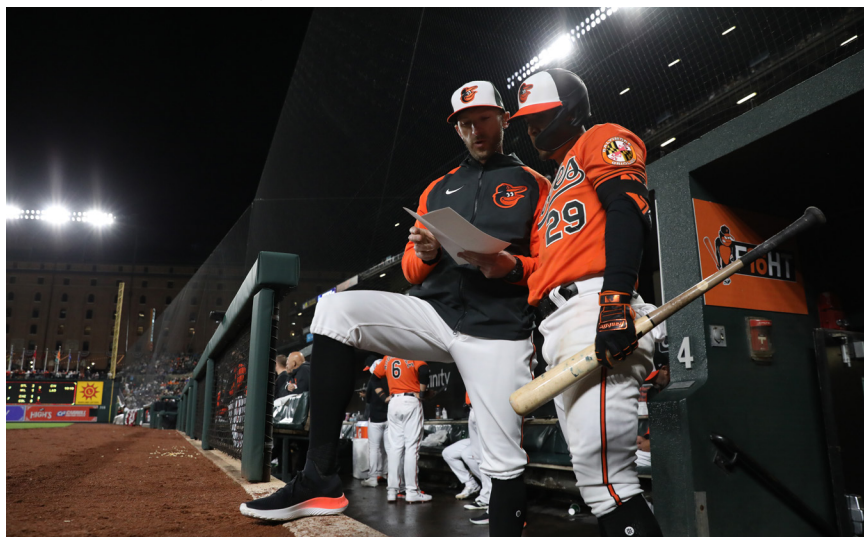

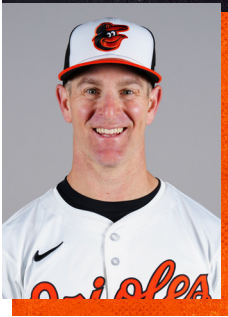

Sherry begins her second season as Senior Director of Field Operations after being promoted to the position in January of 2023. She spent the the 2021-22 seasons as Director of Field Operations after serving as Orioles Head Groundskeeper for 14 seasons from 2007-20. Sherry was the first female head groundskeeper in Eastern League history when she was named to that post for the Trenton Thunder in February of 2004, and twice was runner-up for the Eastern League's top groundskeeping award. In 2006, the Thunder honored her with a bobblehead, depicting her riding a tractor.

In February of 2016, Sherry was named the recipient of the Mary Pickersgill Award for Women's Leadership in Business by the Star-Spangled Banner Flag House. Established in 2012, the award honors a woman who demonstrates leadership in her community, exemplifies innovation in her chosen field, and has the power to inspire others. She was also named the 2019 recipient of the prestigious Dick Ericson Founders' Award, which is awarded annually to a STMA member who effectively manages sports fields and their facility, exhibits the qualities of a true team leader, and who positively impacts the sports turf industry. Sherry, along with MLB and Discovery Education, has worked with local schools to introduce students to a variety of intriguing science and STEM concepts related to her job as Director of Field Operations.

A native of New Castle, Del., Sherry graduated from the University of Delaware with a degree in agriculture. She worked for several golf courses in Delaware and with the University of Delaware's Research and Education Center, testing new herbicides, prior to joining the Orioles in 2001 as the Assistant Head Groundskeeper.

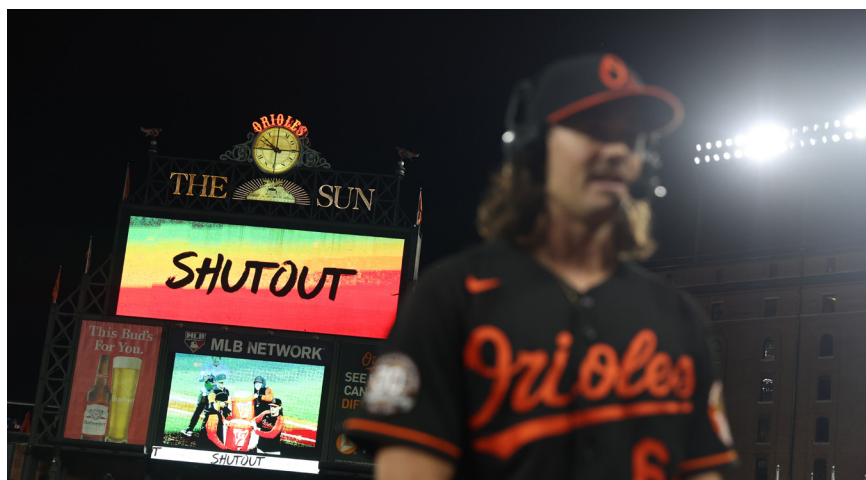

- Appeared on his third straight Opening Day roster and second with the O's
- Became the first player in O's history (since 1954) and eighth MLB player since at least 1901 with multiple stolen bases in a team's first two games of a season; also became the first player in O's history and the 14th player since 1901 with at least four stolen bases in his first two games to begin a season
- Homered in back-to-back games for the first time in his career from 4/3-4
- Hit a 112.4 mph single on 4/15 at CWS, the hardest-hit ball of his career
- Scored a run in a career-high seven straight games from 4/23-30; also tallied an RBI in a career-best five straight games from 4/12-16
- Drew two walks in a game for the first time in his career on 6/26 vs. CIN
- Recorded his first career inside-the-park home run in the second inning on 8/20 at OAK; marked the first inside-the-park homer by an Oriole since Trey Mancini on 7/28/22 vs. TB; also marked his first homer since 4/30 at DET
- Reached base safely in nine of his 11 September starts
- Became the ninth Oriole in team history to steal at least 20 bases in the team's first 68 games and the first since Nate McClouth (23) in 2013
- Became the sixth player in Orioles history to steal 30+ bases in back-to-back seasons, joining Cedric Mullins (2021-22), Brian Roberts (2006-09), Corey Patterson (2006-07), Al Bumbry (1979-80), and Luis Aparicio (1963-64)
- His 67 stolen bases the last two seasons are the fourth-most in MLB, while his 16 DRS in that span are tied for fifth-most among MLB shortstops, per *Sports Info Solutions*
- Ranked tied for sixth in MLB in average sprint speed at 30.1 ft/sec, per *Statcast*

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

2022: Made his second career Opening Day roster and first with the Orioles; spent the entire season on the active roster for the first time in his career...Set career highs in nearly every category including games (150), runs (63), hits (109), doubles (25), triples (7), home runs (13), extra-base hits (45), RBI (50), walks (27), and stolen bases (35)...His 142 starts at shortstop were the most by an Oriole since J.J. Hardy's 159 in 2013...Led the American League and ranked second in MLB with 35 stolen bases; became the third Oriole (fourth occurrence) to lead the AL in steals, joining Brian Roberts (2007) and Luis Aparicio (1963 & 1964), and the sixth O's player (eighth time) since 2000 with at least 35 stolen bases...Won the Fielding Bible Award as the best defensive shortstop in MLB, per *Sports Info Solutions*; tied for second on the O's, ranked second in the AL, and third among MLB shortstops with 14 Defensive Runs Saved; marked the second-most DRS by an Orioles shortstop since tracking began in 2012 (J.J. Hardy, 18, 2012)...Led AL shortstops and was tied for fourth among MLB shortstops with 11 Outs Above Average, per *Statcast*; his OAA were the most by an O's shortstop since tracking began in 2016...Ranked third on the O's and seventh among AL shortstops with 2.8 fWAR, per *FanGraphs*...Finished fourth on the Orioles and seventh among AL shortstops with 3.3 bWAR, per *Baseball Reference*; his 2.4 dWAR was tied for third in the AL and tied for seventh in MLB, and was the most by an O's player since Manny Machado had 2.7 in 2016 and most by an Orioles shortstop since J.J. Hardy had 2.8 in 2012...Tied for second in MLB with seven triples; became the first Oriole with at least seven triples in one season since Brian Roberts and Adam Jones in 2008...Became the first Orioles shortstop with at least 45 extra-base hits since J.J. Hardy in 2013...His 30.1 ft/sec Sprint Speed was tied for seventh in MLB, per *Statcast*; his 69 Bolts were sixth...Delivered a walk-off hit-by-pitch in the 10th inning against Matt Moore on 7/4 vs. TEX; was his first career walk-off of any kind and the first walk-off hit-by-pitch in extra innings in Orioles history (since 1954)...Hit a game-tying solo home run in the ninth inning off of Colin Poche on 7/27 vs. TB; marked his first career game-tying homer in the ninth inning-or-later...Homered twice and drove in five runs, both career highs, on 8/2 at TEX; his first home run in the third inning came on an 0-2 pitch, the first such long ball of his career...Set a career high with five hits on 8/12 at TB, finishing 5-for-5 with two doubles, two runs scored, and two RBI; became the first O's batter with a five-hit game since Cedric Mullins on 6/5/21 vs. CLE, the first Orioles shortstop with five hits since J.J. Hardy on 5/6/12 at BOS, and the third Oriole (since 1954) with a five-hit game from the nine spot in the lineup, joining Rich Dauer (6/2/80 vs. MIL) and Mark Belanger (5/11/74 at CLE)...Broke a 2-2 tie with a one-out, three-run double in the eighth inning of the Little League Classic on 8/21 vs. BOS...Slashed .246/.304/.435 (30-for-248) with 28 of his 45 extra-base hits on the road compared to .195/.229/.321 (48-for-246) at home...Batted .277/.327/.489 (26-for-94) with 11 extra-base hits and 17 RBI in August; marked his first career month with 10+ RBI

2021: Claimed off waivers from San Diego on 8/5 and made his Orioles debut on 8/6 vs. TB...Had a career-long 11-game hitting streak from 8/10-20, tied for the fourth-longest streak by an O's batter in 2021 and was the second-longest streak in the majors at the time; also had a career-long 15-game on-base streak from 8/1-20...Hit safely in 23 of 31 games with an at-bat after joining the Orioles and slashed .280/.328/.421 (30-for-107); 10 of his 30 hits with the O's went for extra bases (2 HR, 7-2B, 3B)...His 18 hits in his first 14 games with the Orioles were the most by an Oriole in his first 14 games with the franchise since Tim Beckham recorded 29 hits in that span in 2017; became the 27th player in club history (since 1954) to record at least 18 hits in his first 14 games with the O's...Had seven multi-hit performances in 31 games with an at-bat after joining the O's; had just three multi-hit efforts in his first 79 career games...Drew seven walks in 116 plate appearances with the Orioles for a 16.57 PA/BB, compared to just two walks in 93 plate appearances with the Padres for a 46.50 PA/BB...His 30.4 ft/sec Sprint Speed ranked tied for fifth in MLB, according to *Statcast*; one of nine qualified players with a Sprint Speed of at least 30.0 ft/sec in 2021...His 10 stolen bases ranked tied for seventh among rookies...Played five different defensive positions with the Orioles: 18 games (12 starts) at 2B, 17 games (15 starts) at SS, one start in LF, one start in RF, and one game at 3B...Placed on the 60-day Injured List (right lumbar inflammation) on 9/14, ending his season.

2020: Acquired by the San Diego Padres on 6/30 for OF Junior Perez...Made his Major League debut on 8/13 at LAD, starting in left field and batting ninth...Recorded his first career hit, a pinch-hit double, on 8/27 at SEA...Collected his first career multi-hit game and RBI on 8/28 at COL (2-for-5, 2B, RBI)...Appeared in 22 games (six starts) for the Padres during the season...Named to the Padres Wild Card roster vs. STL, but did not play.

2019: Played the entire season at Triple-A Las Vegas, setting career-highs in batting average (.289), slugging (.504), OPS (.834), runs (95), hits (154), home runs (19), RBI (78), extra-base hits (62), and strikeouts (145)...Led Oakland's farm system in triples, tied for second in hits, and ranked third in stolen bases (24)...Selected to the *SiriusXM All-Star Futures Game*...Named a Pacific Coast League Mid-Season All-Star...Named the Athletics No. 8 prospect by *Baseball America* following the season.

2018: Spent the full season with Triple-A Nashville, his first experience at the Triple-A level...Played in a career-high 131 games and recorded a career-high 16 triples...His triples were the most among all minor leaguers...His 25 stolen bases were tied for the second-most in the Athletics farm system...Led all Pacific Coast League shortstops in games, total chances (509), assists (340), and errors (23).

2017: Began the season with Class A-Advanced Tampa and named a Florida State League Mid-Season All-Star...Promoted to Double-A Trenton and appeared in 30 games, recording 16 extra-base hits and a .906 OPS...Acquired by the Oakland Athletics on 7/31 along with OF Dustin Fowler and RHP James Kaprielian from the Yankees in exchange for RHP Sonny Gray and international slot money...Finished the season with Double-A Midland, appearing in 30 games...For the season, hit .296 with 14 doubles, 10 triples, eighth home runs, 46 RBI, and 24 stolen bases in 60 games at the Double-A level and was named a *Baseball America* Double-A All-Star...His 52 combined stolen bases were tied for the most among all minor leaguers, while he was also one of 11 minor leaguers to reach double figures in doubles, triples, home runs, and stolen bases...Played for Toros del Este in the Dominican Winter League following the season...Named the Athletics No. 3 prospect by *Baseball America* following the season.

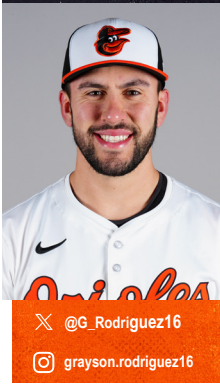
