Jays Care Foundation, the charitable arm of the Toronto Blue Jays, uses baseball to teach life skills and create lasting social change for children and youth all across Canada. In 2023, Jays Care proudly impacted over 59,000 children and youth in every province and territory, running programs to level the playing field for Canadian kids facing barriers, including:

- Children and youth living with disabilities
- Indigenous children and youth
- Girls without access to sport
- Children and youth living at or below the poverty line



## OUR NATIONAL PROGRAMS

## CHALLENGER BASEBALL:

Challenger Baseball is Jays Care's adaptive baseball program, run in partnership with Little League Canada and Baseball Canada, specifically designed to empower children, youth, and adults living with physical and/or cognitive disabilities. The program teaches athletes living with disabilities the core life skills inherent to baseball, including teamwork, communication, determination, resiliency, inclusion, support, and courage. Challenger Baseball ensures every athlete has the opportunity to play in a fun and safe environment where they learn to become more independent, build confidence, improve their communication skills, and set and achieve their own personal goals.

## GIRLS AT BAT:

Girls At Bat is an initiative designed to help girls across the country set lofty goals and pursue them with tenacity. Jays Care Foundation has partnered with communities, schools, and non-profit organizations to help increase female participation and retention in sport, using an eight to 12 week baseball and/or softball program as the vehicle. Partners apply to implement the program and receive robust training, coaching resources, equipment, some financial support, and remote and in-person support to launch and sustain their programs.


## FIELD OF DREAMS:

To play is to learn! Field Of Dreams is Jays Care's granting program dedicated to baseball infrastructure development that provides a safe space for children and youth to develop life skills through sport. The Field Of Dreams program provides funding to design, refurbish, and build safe spaces for children and youth across Canada. Over the past 10 years, Jays Care has invested nearly $\$ 15$ million into 163 safe spaces across 10 provinces and two territories.

## INDIGENOUS ROOKIE LEAGUE:

Using baseball as a tool to engage children, youth, and adults in regular inter-generational play, Indigenous Rookie League enhances connections between all community members through creating safe spaces for communities to join together and play. This program increases mental health outcomes for children and youth in Indigenous communities while providing opportunities for the sharing of culture and development of life skills.

RBI:
RBI is a baseball for development program based in schools across the country. Through working with local schools, school boards and organizations, RBI removes any barriers that students may face to participate in baseball. Participating schools receive trained coaches, equipment and uniforms so that students are fully prepared to participate in structured league play and championship tournaments. In the spring, students participate in weekly practices and games where they learn all of the basic rules, fundamentals, and lifelessons that come from the game of baseball. In the summer, students will receive daily baseball instruction and athletic play, along with a wide range of engaging activities.

## CLUB OFFICERS



## MARK SHAPIRO

 PRESIDENT \& CEOMark Shapiro is one of the few Major League Baseball executives that has experience in all facets of the game - baseball, business, and league operations - over the course of a career that spans more than 30 years.
Mark was appointed President \& CEO of the Toronto Blue Jays in November 2015, a role that oversees the organization's business and baseball operations and represents ownership at the league level.
Mark is responsible for the expansion of the Blue Jays' systems and capabilities in several areas, including player development, high performance, strategy, and analytics. He has championed two significant capital projects in his tenure: upgrading the team's Spring Training home in Dunedin, FL with the Player Development Complex, an industry-leading performance facility; and the renovations to Rogers Centre, transforming the stadium to a ballpark. Under Mark's leadership, the Blue Jays have reached the postseason four times: 2016, 2020, 2022, and 2023.
Mark's baseball career began in 1992 in Cleveland, where he spent 24 seasons. He joined Cleveland as an assistant in baseball operations and quickly progressed into a senior leadership role as Director of Minor League Operations, before becoming Vice President of Baseball Operations \& Assistant General Manager in 1999. Mark was named Executive Vice President \& General Manager in 2002 and held that position until he was appointed Team President in 2011.
Following both the 2005 and 2007 seasons, Mark was named the Sporting News "Executive of the Year," and was the only active General Manager in MLB at that time to win the award twice. In 2005, he was also named "Executive of the Year" by Baseball America.
Beyond his extensive work in the front office, Mark has been involved in key baseball initiatives at Major League Baseball for more than a decade. He currently sits on the league's Competition Committee; On Field Committee; Long-Term Strategic Planning Committee; and Revenue Sharing Definitions Committee. In addition, he is a member of the Board of Directors for Jays Care Foundation, the charitable arm of the Toronto Blue Jays.
A Baltimore native, Mark played four years of football at Princeton University, where he earned a bachelor's degree in history. He lives in Toronto with his family.


## ROSS ATKINS executive vice president, baseball operations \& GENERAL MANAGER

Ross Atkins was named the seventh General Manager of the Toronto Blue Jays on December 3, 2015. Prior to that, he spent his entire professional career with the Cleveland Guardians' organization after being selected in the 38th round of the 1995 draft as a right-handed pitcher and joining Cleveland's front office in 2000 following his playing career. Ross spent 15 seasons in Player Development, most recently as Vice President of Player Personnel, overseeing all elements of Cleveland's Player Development system. He previously served as Director and then Vice President of Player Development from 2007 to 2010 and 2011 to 2014, respectively. His ascension in the Cleveland system also included three seasons (2004 to 2006) as the Director of Latin American Operations. Ross spent four years playing baseball for Wake Forest University where he received a bachelor's degree in economics and was a member of the ACC honor roll. He now resides in Toronto with his wife, Christine, and their two daughters, Jane and Marita.

## TORONTO BLUE JAYS OWNERSHIP

On March 26, 1976, the American League granted an expansion franchise to a group consisting of Labatt Breweries, Imperial Trust Limited and The Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce. Both Labatt Breweries and Imperial Trust each controlled $45 \%$ of the team. The C.I.B.C. had the other $10 \%$ of the club. Imperial Trust was a holding company set up by the late R. Howard Webster, who was instrumental in the granting of the franchise in 1976. The Webster family still maintained their share of the ownership until selling their $45 \%$ to Labatt in November, 1991. The ownership then consisted of John Labatt Limited, 90\% and Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce, 10\%. In June of 1995 John Labatt Limited was purchased by Interbrew S.A., Belgium's leading brewer.
In September of 2000, local ownership returned to the Toronto Blue Jays as Rogers Communications Inc. purchased 80\% control of the franchise. John Labatt Limited (Interbrew) maintains a 20\% interest while The Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce relinquished their stake. In January of 2004 Rogers Communications Inc. acquired the remaining $20 \%$ of the Club. Rogers Communications Inc. now owns $100 \%$ of the Toronto Blue Jays Baseball Club.
On November 29, 2004, the Toronto Blue Jays reached an agreement with Sportsco International to acquire the former SkyDome. The purchase price for the stadium, now known as Rogers Centre, was approximately $\$ 25$ million (CDN).


## BEN COLABRESE <br> EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT, FINANCE

Beginning his seventh season with the Toronto Blue Jays, Ben Colabrese is a key ownership liaison and is responsible for all club financial matters including MLB and ownership reporting, capital management, and payroll. Ben joined the Blue Jays in 2018 from the club's parent company, Rogers Communications. He has been with Rogers since 2015, previously holding the roles of VP \& GM of Mobilicity (acquired by Rogers in 2015), then Senior Vice President, Finance for the X1 Syndication Program. Before his most recent tenure at Rogers Communications, Ben was the Chief Financial Officer of Pelmorex Media Inc. / The Weather Network (2013-2014) and prior to that, Vice President, Corporate Development at Rogers (2005-2013) where he was responsible for all merger and acquisition activity, completing more than 30 transactions. Ben is a member of the Board and Audit Committee Chair for Enthusiast Gaming and has been a past Board Member for Vecima Networks and Perk.com.


## MARNIE STARKMAN

 executive vice president, business operationsMarnie Starkman is entering her 15th season with the Toronto Blue Jays and her first leading the club's entire business operations portfolio, including fan experience, marketing, facilities, strategy and analytics, partnerships, people operations, communications, ticketing, technology, and Florida Operations. Throughout her Blue Jays tenure, she has held progressively senior roles, starting in 2009 overseeing game entertainment, before adding promotions and marketing in 2010 and 2016, and expanding to co-leader of business operations in 2019.
Since joining the Blue Jays executive team, Marnie has steered the club through a remarkable journey and transformation. She was a key leader in navigating the club through the COVID-19 pandemic, including the well-documented 2021 season where the team hosted home games in three different ballparks. Since 2022, Starkman has co-led the more than $\$ 300$ million multi-year Rogers Centre renovations, transforming the iconic 33-year-old stadium into a modern ballpark with best-in-class fan experiences and player facilities.
Beyond the Blue Jays, Marnie is a leader in Major League Baseball and throughout the sports industry. She has represented the American League on various MLB committees and is a current board member for the Baseball Assistance Team (BAT), a non-profit organization that supports members of the baseball family in need of financial or medical assistance. Starkman is a 2018 recipient of the One of 5 to Watch Award, presented annually to five Canadian sports business professionals who have achieved remarkable career success prior to their 40th birthdays.
Prior to joining the Blue Jays, Marnie worked for Maple Leafs Sports \& Entertainment and Dome Productions. Born and raised in the Greater Toronto Area, Marnie holds degrees from York/Toronto Metropolitan University, the University of Toronto, and Sheridan College.


## MARIO R. COUTINHO VICE PRESIDENT, STADIUM OPERATIONS \& SECURITY

Mario Coutinho was named to his current role in October 2005. He oversees event staff, medical, and security operations, including investigations, threat/risk assessments, BCP, and emergency response planning for Blue Jays home games, concerts, and special events. Mario is one of the club's longest-tenured employees, beginning in 1982 in a part-time game day role and joining the club full-time in 1989 as Manager, Game Operations. The Blue Jays were named in a contest conducted in June and July of 1976. Over 30,000 individual entries were received, suggesting over 4,000 names for the new American League club. From the list of names submitted, specially-appointed panels of judges selected ten names to submit to the Board of Directors. The Directors chose the name "Blue Jays" from that list and announced their decision on August 12th, at which time the team officially became the Toronto Blue Jays Baseball Club.
A total of 154 people submitted the name "Blue Jays" and a drawing was held to select a grand prize winner from those who submitted the name. Dr. William Mills of Etobicoke, Ontario, won a pair of season tickets for 1977 and an all-expenses paid trip for himself and his family to watch the Blue Jays at spring training in Dunedin, Florida. Nine runners-up also won season tickets.

## STIEB'S NO-HITTER

## SEPTEMBER 2, 1990 AT CLEVELAND - TORONTO 3, CLEVELAND 0

Dave Stieb chalked up his first no-hitter and the first in franchise history as he blanked the Cleveland Indians on a sunny Sunday afternoon at Cleveland Stadium before a crowd of 23,640.
The game ended as Cleveland's Jerry Browne sent a fly to right field where Junior Felix put the squeeze on it.
Stieb had a season-high nine strikeouts and walked four over his 122-pitch afternoon.
There were no tough plays and only a couple of well hit balls. The closest the Tribe came to a hit was Ken Phelphs pulling a liner about three feet foul to open the 8th inning.
The Blue Jays and Stieb got their offensive support from Fred McGriff who hit two solo home runs, and from Manny Lee who doubled home Kenny Williams in the 5th inning.
Stieb had previously gone 8.2 innings, three times, protecting no-hitters. He had back-to-back attempts in September 1988: on September 24 at Cleveland Stadium, Julio Franco had a bad-hop single over second baseman Manny Lee's head. In his next start, September 30 vs. Baltimore at Exhibition Stadium, Jim Traber looped a single over first baseman Fred McGriff's outstretched glove hand. Both no-hit bids were lost on 2-2 pitches. Stieb also had a perfect game for 8.2 innings on August 4, 1989 vs. the Yankees at SkyDome. Roberto Kelly doubled to left to break it up.

- Finished 2nd in NL Manager of the Year voting in 2013 after guiding Dodgers from 12 games under .500 and 9.5 games out of first place in June to a division title by 11.0 games over Arizona...From June 22-Aug. 17, guided Dodgers on an historic 42-8 (.840) stretch, the franchise's best 50-game run in the Modern Era (since 1900)...According to the Elias Sports Bureau, the Dodgers' 42 wins were tied for 2nd-most by a Major League team in a 50-game span since 1900: the 1912 Giants, the 1941 Yankees, and the 1942 Cardinals also posted $42-8$ records during 50 -game runs, while the Cubs went 45-5 during a 50-game stretch in 1906.

## MINORS:

- Began his pro career in 2016 with 22 games for the GCL Blue Jays...Batted . 427 with a 1.183 OPS while driving in 36 runs en route to a Post-Season All-Star selection.
- Started the 2017 season with Class-A Lansing and slashed $.384 / .448 / .623$ over 70 contests...Was a Futures Game Selection and a Mid-Season All-Star.
- Jumped up to Advanced-A Dunedin in July of 2017 and played 40 games there to round out his season... Hit . 323 (53-for164) while with Dunedin, including 14 extra-base hits and 23 RBI.
- His honours at the end of 2017 included MiLB.com Organizational All-Star, Post-Season All-Star, MiLB.com Fans' Choice for Breakout Prospect, MiLB.com Staff Choice for Best Offensive Player, Baseball America Minor League All-Star, Baseball America Low Class-A All-Star, Midwest League MVP, and Midwest League Prospect of the Year.
- Played his entire 2018 campaign for Double-A New Hampshire...Slashed .286/.343/.453 with 61 extra-base hits and 32 steals over 131 games...Named an Eastern League Mid-Season All-Star and was a Futures Game Selection...Started at shortstop and went 1-for-3 to help the U.S. Futures to a 10-6 victory.
- Ranked 1st in the Eastern League in hits (154), 1st in doubles (43), 1st in runs (95), 1st in total bases (244), T-1st in triples (7), 2nd in steals (32), T-5th in RBI (74) and 10th in batting average (.286)...Batted . 346 (9-for-26) in six playoff games, including a double, two RBl and three stolen bases as the Fisher Cats claimed the Eastern League Championship.
- At the end of the season, was named an Eastern League Post-Season All-Star and an MiLB.com Organizational All-Star.


## 2019:

- Became the 1st player in team history to start his career with a hitting streak of 11 games, ahead of Jesse Barfield (8G in 1981) and Ryan Goins (8G in 2013)...Was also the 3rd longest by a player 21 years old or younger to begin a career, behind Rocco Baldelli (13G in 2013) and Eddie Murphy (12G in 1912)...Hit . 408 (20-for-49) with nine doubles and four homers over that 11-game stretch.
- Went 16 -for-42 (.381) when leading off the 1st inning (5-2B, 2HR, 3BB)...His . 381 AVG in such at-bats led the Majors (min. 40 PA ) and was the 7th highest by a rookie dating back to 1974 (when leadoff stats were first recorded)... His 1.065 OPS leading off for his team was 3rd highest that season and 3rd highest by a rookie all-time (courtesy STATS).
- The 17-game on-base streak to start his career was the longest in team history (Aaron Hill - 9G in 2005) and tied for the 2nd longest all-time to begin a career by a player 21 or younger (Rocco Baldelli - 24G in 2003; Bill Russell - 17G in 1969)
- His 29 extra-base in his first 43 games tied Ryan Braun (2007) for the 2nd most ever in a player's first 43 career games, trailing only Joe DiMaggio (31 in 1936).
- Had his contract selected from Triple-A Buffalo on July 29 and made his MLB debut that night at KC...Singled in his 1st at-bat, becoming the 33rd player in team history to pick up a hit in his 1st career AB.
- Hit his 1 st home run off of Jakob Junis on July 31 at KC, doing so at 21 years and 148 days old to become the youngest player in team history to homer from the leadoff spot...Also doubled and singled for his 1st three-hit game...Tied a team record with six hits in his first three career games (5th time).
- Connected for his 2nd home run on Aug. 4 at BAL, batting ahead of Cavan Biggio, forming the 1st set of rookie back-toback home runs in team history.
- On Aug. 5 at TB, homered again, doing so in back-to-back games for the 1st time in his career...Became the 2nd Blue Jay all-time to hit three home runs in his first eight career games, joining Carlos Delgado (1993).
- Singled and doubled on Aug. 6 at TB, becoming the 1st player in MLB history to record 10 extra-base hits in his first nine games (7-2B, 3-HR), surpassing Alvin Davis (9 in 1984), Trevor Story (9 in 2016) and Pete Alonso (9 in 2019).
- Recorded his 4th home run on Aug. 8 vs. NYY...Became the 8th Blue Jay to homer in his Rogers Centre debut.
- Had a double in nine straight games from July 31-Aug. 8, surpassing Derrek Lee (8G in 2000) and Yadier Molina (8G in 2016) for the longest in Major League history.
- His nine-game extra-base hit streak from July 31-Aug. $8(9-2 B, 4-H R)$ was the longest by a rookie since Ted Williams in 1939 (4th rookie all-time to do so).
- Singled twice and doubled twice on Aug. 12 vs. TEX for his 1st career four-hit game...Gave him 15 extra-base hits, the most in a player's first 15 career games in MLB history.
- At 21 years and 168 days old on Aug. 20 at LAD, established himself nationally in Los Angeles with two home runs off of Clayton Kershaw...Became the youngest Blue Jay all-time to hit a leadoff home run...In the 6th inning, hit his 2nd homer off of Kershaw (6th player to ever do so) for his 1st career multi-HR game.
- Finished a triple shy of the cycle on Aug. 24 at SEA and joined Carlos Delgado as the only Blue Jays to record eight home runs in their first 25 career games.
- Registered 39 hits in August, the most by a Toronto rookie in any calendar month (Alex Rios, Reed Johnson, Steve Staggs - 34), and the most by any Blue Jays batter since Melky Cabrera had 40 in April of 2014.

- Was hit by a pitch on Sept. 19 vs. BAL by Gabriel Ynoa and missed the remainder of the season due to concussion symptoms.


## 2020:

- Doubled twice on July 30 at WAS, becoming the 6th player in MLB history with 20+ doubles in his first 50 career games.
- Hit his 1st home run of 2020 on Aug. 6 at ATL...Was his 12th career homer, reaching the dozen homer mark the fastest in team history ( 53 games).
- Hit Toronto's 1 st home run at Sahlen Field in Buffalo, NY, on Aug. 11 vs. MIA...Homered in back-to-back games for the 1st time in 2020.
- Set a career high with five hits as he homered and singled four times on Aug. 12 vs. MIA...At 22 years old, became the youngest player in team history with a five-hit game, ahead of Roy Howell (23 in 1977), and the youngest to homer in three straight games...Also swiped two bases, becoming the only shortstop in the modern era with five hits, a home run and two stolen bases in the same game...The previous MLB player to accomplish such a feat was Andrew McCutchen on May 14, 2010 at CHC (5H, 1HR, 2SB).
- Belted a three-run homer on Aug. 14 vs . TB, becoming the youngest player in team history to homer in four consecutive games...Became just the 3rd player ever to record 38+ XBH in his first 59 games (Joe DiMaggio - 46; Cody Bellinger - 38).
- Went seven consecutive games with an extra-base hit and an RBI from Aug. 6-14, the longest streak by a shortstop since 1920 - when RBI became an official stat.
- Placed on the injured list with a right knee sprain from Aug. 16-Sept. 11...Among AL hitters at the time of his injury, ranked 2nd in AVG (.361), 4th in OPS (1.063), and 5th in SLG (.672).
- Strung together a 10-game hitting streak around his IL stint from Aug. 5-Sept. 12 (17-for-40, 2-2B, $5 \mathrm{HR}, 11 \mathrm{RBI}$ ), one shy of his career best (11G from July 29-Aug. 8, 2019).
- Recorded his 1st career triple on Sept. 20 at PHI...Also doubled giving him 42 career extra-base hits, tied for 5th most in MLB history by a player in his first 69 MLB games, behind Joe DiMaggio (50), Ted Williams (44), José Abreu (43) and Bob Meusel (43).
- Made his postseason debut in Game 1 of the ALWC on Sept. 29 at TB...Drove in Toronto's lone run with a sac fly in the 8th inning...Became the 2nd youngest player in franchise history to pick up a playoff RBI (Junior Felix - 22 in Game 3 and Game 4 of the 1989 ALCS vs. OAK).
- Tied for 1st in MLB (Trea Turner) with 58 multi-hit games while finishing 2nd with 191 hits, T-9th with 310 total bases, 15 th with a . 298 AVG, and T-15th with 102 RBI...His 25 stolen bases were tied for 9th most (1 CS).
- His 121 runs scored were the 2nd most in MLB, trailing only his teammate, Vladimir Guerrero Jr. (123).
- Led AL batters with 191 hits.
- Named an All-Star for the 1st time in his career, a reserve at shortstop...Went 0-for-1 while playing 4.0 innings at short.
- Became the only player in MLB history with $30+\mathrm{HR}, 200+\mathrm{H}, 20+\mathrm{SB}, 40+2 \mathrm{~B}, 100+\mathrm{RBI}, 100+\mathrm{R}$, and a .300 AVG in his first 162 career games.
- Doubled on April 4 at NYY for his 100 th career hit in what was his 78 th game, setting the franchise record for fewest games to reach 100 career hits (2nd: Alex Rios - 85 games).
- Hit his first two home runs of the season on April 6 at TEX, his 3rd career multi-homer game...Gave him a franchise-best 18 homers in his first 80 career games (2nd: Fred McGriff - 16)...His 47 XBH tied for 6 th most in MLB history by a player in his first 80 games ( 9 th with 187 total bases).
- Recorded a career-high five RBI on April 10 vs. LAA, tied for the most in a single game by a Blue Jays shortstop (last: Troy Tulowitzki - Aug. 10, 2016 vs. TB).

- Set personal bests with 43 doubles and 41 walks.
- Broke a 2-2 tie in the 8th inning on April 25 vs. BOS with his 1st career grand slam, the 1st slam by a Blue Jay in 2022.
- Connected for his 2nd career grand slam on June 22 at CWS, also doing so earlier in the season on April 25 vs. BOS.
- Strung together a career-high 13-game hitting streak from June 27-July 8, going 15-for-54 (.278) with six extra-base hits and six RBI (. 742 OPS).
- Plated a run with a sac fly in the 6th inning on July 30 vs. DET, marking the 200th RBI of his career...Became the 6th-fastest shortstop to reach 200 RBI in the post-war era, doing so in 334 games.

- Recorded his 42nd double of the campaign on Sept. 22 at TB, the most ever by a Blue Jays shortstop, surpassing Tony Fernández (41 in 1988).
- Went 48-for-119 (.403) with 11 doubles, one triple, seven home runs, and 27 RBI over 28 games in Sept. (. 689 SLG, 1.134 OPS)...Led all MLB hitters in Sept. in hits, extra-base hits, RBI, and total bases... His 48 knocks were the most ever by a Blue Jay in any calendar month (Tony Fernández - 47 in June 1986; Lloyd Moseby - 47 in Aug. 1983).
- Picked up his 1st career postseason hit with a single in the bottom of the 3rd during Game 1 of the ALWC vs. SEA on Oct. 7.

## 1991 ALL-STAR GAME

The 1991 All-Star Game was played at SkyDome (now Rogers Centre) in Toronto on Tuesday, July 9, 1991. It was the first time that the game had been held in Toronto and just the second time that it had been held outside of the United States (Montreal in 1982). Three Blue Jays players were selected to participate in the 63rd All-Star Game: second baseman Roberto Alomar, outfielder Joe Carter and pitcher Jimmy Key. As well, Manager Cito Gaston was a coach and Tommy Craig was named AL trainer. 52,382 fans came to SkyDome to watch the action unfold in person and millions more watched and listened to the Midseason Classic on television and radio. 56 players from both the National and American Leagues came to Toronto to participate. Of those 56 players, 49 saw action as the American League defeated the National League by a 4-2 count. Toronto pitcher Jimmy Key was credited with the win in his second career All-Star Game appearance. Joe Carter was 1-for-1 with a run scored and Roberto Alomar went 0-for-4. It was the fourth consecutive win for the American League dating back to 1988.

## MINORS:

- Signed on July 13, 2012 and made his professional debut with Class-A (short) Aberdeen..Also made three starts for Advanced-A Frederick.


## 2013:

- Reached the Majors in just his 2nd professional season, making five starts and 15 relief appearances during three stints with the Orioles...Entered the season as the O's 2nd-ranked prospect by Baseball America.

## BOSTON TEE OFF PARTY

The Toronto Blue Jays had a record-setting night on July 22, 2022 at Fenway Park in Boston. The Blue Jays beat their division rivals by a score of 28-5, setting franchise records in both hits (29) and runs. Additionally, their +23 run differential was also a franchise high for a single game, and nearly doubled their season mark to that point (+24 entering the night). They became the sixth team in the modern era (since 1901) to score at least 28 runs in a single game, two runs shy of the all-time record of 30 runs set by the Texas Rangers on Aug. 22, 2007 at BAL(1). Every starter in the Toronto lineup notched multiple hits and scored multiple runs, the first time that's been done in team history and the fourth time in the modern era.
Naturally, there were plenty of impressive individual efforts on the night. Lourdes Gurriel Jr. went 6-for-7 with a double, five RBI, and three runs scored. He joined Frank Catalanotto as the only players in Blue Jays history with six hits in a single game (May 1, 2004 at CWS (2)). Gurriel Jr. also became the third player in team history with at least five hits and five RBI in a game, joining Roy Howell (5H, 9RBI on Sept. 10, 1977 at NYY) and Yangervis Solarte (5H, 6RBI on May 3, 2018 (1) at CLE).
Raimel Tapia provided the most exciting moment of the night, racing around the bases for an inside-thepark grand slam in the 3rd inning. He joined Junior Felix as the only Blue Jays ever with an inside-the-park grand slam. He finished the game 3 -for-7 with a double, a homer, and a career-high six runs driven in.
Danny Jansen crushed a pair of home runs, a three-run shot in the 4th and a two-run blast in the 6th. The backstop notched career-highs in both RBI (6) and runs scored (4). With Jansen and Tapia each recording six RBI, it marked the first time in MLB history a team's number nine hitter and leadoff hitter each drove in six runs in the same game. The team also had three players drive in at least five runs each in a single game for the first time in Toronto history and the ninth time in MLB history (Jansen - 6, Tapia - 6, Gurriel - 5).

- Combined to hit .302 with 21 doubles, 10 triples, 24 home runs, 87 RBI, and 32 stolen bases at two levels in 2012 (Advanced-A Lancaster and Double-A Corpus Christi)...Earned Mid-Season and Post-Season All-Star honours...Following the season, was named an Organization All-Star by MiLB.com...Played for Mesa in the Arizona Fall League and hit . 286 (20-for-70) with four doubles, three triples, four home runs, and 14 RBI in 21 games...Named an AFL Rising Star.

- Named the AL Co-Player of the Week for the week of May 12, his 2nd career weekly award (also May 29-June 4, 2017)... In seven games, led all AL players in batting (.519, 14-for-27), hits (14), home runs (5), and OPS (1.711)...Three of his five homers were leadoff shots...During the week, recorded a hit in six straight at-bats, scored a run in six straight plate appearances and reached base in seven straight plate appearances.
- Recorded his 1st career inside-the-park home run on May 14 at DET in the 5th inning off Buck Farmer.
- Left the game in the 8th inning on May 24 vs . BOS and was placed on the 10-day injured list with a strained left hamstring from May 25-June 23...At the time of his placement on the IL, was leading the AL in homers (17), RBI (43), and total bases (119) while ranking 2nd in runs (41), SLG (.654), and OPS (1.032).

## 2020:

- Batted . 265 with six doubles, two triples, 14 home runs, 32 RBI, 24 walks, and a .899 OPS over 51 games.
- Walked, scored two runs, and hit a leadoff homer on Sept. 15 vs. TEX...Was his 11th career leadoff blast against the Rangers...Marked the 2nd most leadoff homers against any single opponent in MLB history (Rickey Henderson - 12 vs. CLE).
- Went 3-for-4 with two homers on Sept. 20 vs. ARI...Notched his 2nd career inside-the-park home run (also: May 14, 2019 at DET)...Was his 2nd multi-homer game of the season, also doing so in Game 2 of a doubleheader on Sept. 5 vs. LAA... Became the 3rd Astros player to record a multi-homer game that included an inside-the-park home run, joining Ken Caminiti (2x: May 22, 1993 at SD and July 3, 1994 vs. CHC) and Jimmy Wynn (July 30, 1967 vs. NYM).

## 2021:

- Held a . 907 OPS, the 2nd-best mark of his career (. 974 in 2019)...Produced a 1.077 OPS while playing in the outfield.
- Started the season on the injured list with a left oblique strain...Later sustained a quad injury while rehabbing...Activated on April 28.

## 2016:

## WILD LIFE:

- The Blue Jays wrapped up the 2023 regular season with an 89-73 record, 3rd place in the AL East...Claimed the 3rd AL Wild Card spot, entering the postseason as a Wild Card for the 2nd straight year and the 4th time overall.
- Toronto travelled to Minnesota for the best-of-three series...Outhit the Twins in both games but wound up with 3-1 and 2-0 losses...Dropped to 1-6 in Wild Card contests all-time.


## MANAGING EXPECTATIONS:

- John Schneider has gone 135-101 since taking over as Toronto's Manager last July...The . 572 win\% is the highest all-time by a Blue Jays Manager through his first two seasons (2nd: Cito Gaston - .566)...Became the only Manager in team history to reach the playoffs in each of his first two seasons at the helm.


## BINARY RESULTS:

- The Blue Jays kept opponents to one or no runs on an MLB-high 42 occasions during the regular season (2nd: LAD - 36)...The 42 contests set a club record, besting the 40 such efforts in 1991.


## PITCHING IN:

- Toronto pitchers combined for a 3.78 ERA in 2023, 2nd best in the AL behind Seattle's 3.74 mark (4th in MLB).. The 3.78 ERA was 7 th best in team history and the club's best since 2016 (3.78)...Recorded a franchise-record $\mathbf{1 , 5 2 8}$ strikeouts ( 1,468 in 2021) which was good for 2nd most in MLB this season (1st: MIN - 1,560)...Ranked 6 th in the AL in opponents' batting average (.241) and 7th in WHIP (1.25).

- The Blue Jays went 25-20 in one-run games...The . 556 win percentage ranked 2nd in the AL (1st: BAL - .652)... Went $54-44$ in games decided by three or fewer runs... The $.551 \mathrm{win} \%$ in such contests was 4 th among AL clubs and 7th best in team history.


## GAUS FOR EXCITEMENT:

- Kevin Gausman set a career high with 237 strikeouts (227 in 2021)...Were the most K's in the AL, behind only Spencer Strider (281) for the MLB lead, and were 4th most in a single season in team history.
- The righty also ranked 1st in the AL in K rate (31.1\%) and SO/9 (11.53) while finishing 4th in ERA (3.16), 6th in SO/BB (4.31), 10th in innings pitched (185.0), and 11th in WHIP (1.18)...Topped all AL pitchers with a 5.3 fWAR...Threw 100+ pitches on 18 occasions, tied with Blake Snell for the most in MLB.

## A CAREER YEAR FOR CHRIS:

- Chris Bassitt tossed 7.2 scoreless innings in his final start of the year, scattering five hits and a walk with a career-high-tying 12 strikeouts (also: June 29, 2023 vs. SF)... Struck out Aaron Judge with his final pitch of the night, reaching 200.0 innings pitched in a season for the 1st time in his career...Became the first Blue Jay to reach the mark since Marcus Stroman threw 201.0 innings in 2017...Was his 9th game of the season with at least 6.0 scoreless innings, matching Roger Clemens (1997) for the most in a single season in franchise history.
- The 34-year old reached a career-high with 16 wins (15 in 2022), tying him with Zach Eflin for the AL lead...Set more personal bests in games started (33), quality starts (21), and strikeouts (186)...Among AL pitchers, also ranked T-1st in starts, 2nd in quality starts, 2nd in innings pitched, 9th in ERA (3.60), 9th in AVG (.235), 10th in WHIP (1.18), and T-10th in strikeouts (186).


## STARTING SOMETHING:

- Toronto starters held a collective 3.85 ERA for the season, trailing only the Padres (3.69) and the Twins (3.82) for the best in MLB...Recorded a club-record 922 strikeouts (873 in 2021), 2nd most in the Majors to only Minnesota (970)...Recorded 70 quality starts, tied for 3rd most in the AL (T-5th in MLB)...Used an 8th different starter on the final day of the regular season season...The eight total starters tied Washington for the fewest in the Majors and was one off the fewest in team history (seven starters in 1994 and 2016)...Had four different starters make $31+$ starts over the course of the campaign, while no other team had more than two.


## SEEING ALL-STARS:

- The Blue Jays had five players named to the 2023 American League All-Star team, the 5th time they have had at least five such nods in team history ( 7 in 1993, 6 in 2022, 5 in 2006 and 2016).
- Whit Merrifield went 1-for-2 in the Midsummer Classic... Bo Bichette was 0 -for-1 with a sac-fly RBI...Vladimir Guerrero Jr. finished the day 0-for-2...Jordan Romano retired the only batter he faced...Kevin Gausman did not pitch in the contest.


## VLAD DOES THE DERBY:

- Vladimir Guerrero Jr. was crowned the 2023 Home Run Derby Champion in Seattle, becoming the 1st Blue Jay to ever win the event...The Montreal-born slugger also became the 2nd ever Canadian to be named champion, joining Justin Morneau (2008).
- The 24-year old joined his father, Vladimir Sr. (2007), as the only father-son duo to claim Derby titles...Mashed 72 homers on the day, and now trails only Pete Alonso (195) for the most career Home Run Derby blasts in MLB history with 163.
- The first baseman is one of just four players ever to win a league home run title (2021), win a Gold Glove Award (2022), and be named to three All-Star teams before turning 25, joining Hank Aaron, Johnny Bench, and Ken Griffey Jr.


## THE D-JAYS:

- The Blue Jays kept a . 988 fielding percentage this season (4th in the AL)...Made just one error over their final 12 contests...Played 107 error-free games in 2023, the most in team history (103 in 1990).
- According to Sports Info Solutions, Toronto fielders recorded a total of 82 Defensive Runs Saved, the most in the Majors (2nd: MIL - 68)... The group was led by an MLB-high 36 runs saved in center field, twice as many as any other team (2nd: PHI - 18)...Daulton Varsho finished 1st in MLB with 29 total runs saved (2nd: Fernando Tatis Jr. - 27)...Kevin Kiermaier and Varsho tied for 2nd among all center fielders with 18 DRS, one back of Brenton Doyle (19)...Alejandro Kirk (17) had the 2nd most runs saved by a catcher while Matt Chapman (12) ranked 3rd among third basemen.


## BO KNOWS BASE HITS:

- Bo Bichette recorded 175 hits, 4th most among AL batters, despite missing 25 games over two stints on the injured list...His 77 opposite-field hits led the Majors (2nd: Luis Arraez - 66)...Finished 3rd in the AL with a .306 batting average...Tied with Julio Rodríguez for the most games in the AL with 4+ hits at six, tied for 3rd with 15 games with $3+$ hits, and tied for 4 th with 52 multi-hit games...Went 4 -for- 8 during the AL Wild Card series in Minnesota via the first two multi-hit postseason efforts of his career.

## HARD-HITTING FACTS:

- Vladimir Guerrero Jr. led the club with 26 home runs and 94 RBI...Has held the team lead in homers for each of the past three seasons... Put 181 balls in play at 100+ MPH, tied with Rafael Devers for the most among AL batters (T-3rd in MLB)...Recorded his 1st career playoff extra-base hit with a double in Game 1 of the AL Wild Card Series in Minnesota.


## ONE NOTCH AT A TIME:

- Brandon Belt homered three times in his last four games of the season, giving him 19 dingers for the year, the 2nd most of his careeer (29 in 2021)...Went 29-for-101 (.287) with 23 runs scored, five doubles, 11 home runs, 17 RBI, and 18 walks over his last 30 contests (. 400 OBP, 1.063 OPS)...His 1.063 OPS and . 663 SLG from Aug. 1 to the end of the season was the best among AL hitters while he ranked T-8th in OBP (min. 100 PA)...His 4.45 pitches/PA topped all MLB batters (min. 300 PA)...His walk rate of 6.62 PA/BB was 5 th highest in the AL.


## NO DOME LIKE HOME:

- The Blue Jays went 43-38 at Rogers Centre...The . 531 win\% at home ranked 6th in the AL.
- Toronto batters finished 7 th in the AL in home OBP (.323), 9th in home AVG (.248), 9th in home OPS (.724), and 10th in home SLG (.401)... The pitching staff ranked 3rd among AL teams with a 3.68 home ERA, 3rd with a . 230 home opponents' average, and 5th with a 1.22 home WHIP.


## ROAD READY:

- The Blue Jays put together a 46-35 road record last season for a .568 win\%, tied for 3rd best in the AL (T-5th in MLB)...The 46 road wins were the 2nd most in a season in team history (47 in 1993).
- Blue Jays hitters ranked 2nd among AL clubs with a . 334 road OBP while sitting 3rd in road batting average (.263), road SLG (.431), and road OPS (.765)...The pitching staff finished 2nd in the AL in road ERA (3.88), 9th in road opponents' average (.252), and 10th in road WHIP (1.28).


## FEELING GEORGEOUS:

- George Springer played in 154 games in 2023, his 2ndhighest total for a single season (162 in 2016)...Over his last 49 games, batted .284 (56-for-197) with 30 runs scored, 11 doubles, eight homers, 30 RBI , and 22 walks (.815 OPS)... His 30 hits in Sept./Oct. tied for 7 th most in the AL.
- The 34-year-old right fielder celebrated his birthday with a leadoff home run on Sept. 19 at NYY...Was his 1st birthday blast and the 57th leadoff homer of his career... Joined José Cruz Jr. (April 19, 2000 vs. ANA) as the only players in team history to connect for a leadoff home run on his birthday.

## DOUBLE THE FUN:

- Matt Chapman recorded 39 doubles and 58 extra-base hits...Finished 4th in the AL in doubles (T-6th in MLB)... Ranked 2nd in the AL with a 56.4 hard-hit percentage (1st: Aaron Judge - 64.2) and was 3rd in average exit velocity at 93.4 MPH.


## ROMANO-MATIC:

- Jordan Romano converted 26 consecutive save opportunites from May 13-Sept. 22, the longest singleseason streak in franchise history (2nd: Tom Henke - 25 in 1991)... His 36 saves on the year were 2nd most in the AL (T-5th in MLB)...Has 97 career saves, 5th most in team history and 4th most all-time by a Canadian-born pitcher.


## A BERRÍ GOOD YEAR:

- José Berríos tied a career mark for the 5th time with 32 starts in 2023...Over 15 starts at home, went $6-6$ with a 3.30 ERA (33 ER/90.0 IP) and 93 strikeouts for a 1.17 WHIP...For the season, ranked 9th among AL pitchers in innings pitched (189.2), 10th in ERA (3.65), and 12th in strikeouts (184).


## QUITE A YEAR FOR YUSEI:

- Yusei Kikuchi set a career-high with 11 wins...Also set personal bests with 167.2 innings pitched, 181 strikeouts, and a 3.86 ERA...Pitched into the 5th inning in 31 of his 32 outings and allowed three earned runs or fewer on 24 occasions.


## DIVISIONAL DETAILS:

- The Blue Jays wrapped up the regular season with 15 straight division games (9-6)...Won 13 of their last 21 games vs. AL East clubs...Finished 21-31 against divisional opponents.

- Toronto went $30-16$ vs. NL clubs in 2023...The . 652 win\% in interleague games led the AL, tied the Dodgers for the best among MLB teams, and was 2 nd best in team history (14-6, . 700 win\% in 2021)...The 30 wins vs. NL teams set a club record (14 in 2021).


## CANADA'S TEAM:

- Toronto started the season with three Canadian-born players on its roster: Vladimir Guerrero Jr. (Montreal, QC), Zach Pop (Brampton, ON), and Jordan Romano (Markham, ON)...Marked the most Canadian-born players to make an Opening Day roster in team history.


## RECORD-BREAKING ROOF ROLLBACK:

- The Rogers Centre roof was open for the 1st time of 2023 on Wednesday, April 12 , for a $16^{\circ} \mathrm{C} / 61^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ first pitch...Was the earliest date to be open in the history of the building (since 1989), surpassing the previous mark of April 16, set in 2002.


## Welcome to the var-show:

- Daulton Varsho played in a career-high 158 games and reached the 20-homer mark for the 2nd time in his career...Recorded an MLB-high 29 defensive runs saved...His 18 DRS in center tied for 2nd most among center fielders while his 11 DRS in left were 3rd most among left fielders.

## KK'S BIG PLAYS:

- Kevin Kiermaier racked up an AL-high 83 hits while batting 9th (2nd: Leody Taveras - 76), the most by a Blue Jay since Alex Gonzalez's 110 knocks in 1998... Played in 129 contests, tied for the 2nd most of his career (151 in 2015).
- Claimed Play of the Week on three occassions this season (April 11 vs. DET, May 21 vs. BAL, June 1 vs. MIL)... Marked his first three career nods...Became the 4th player to win three Play of the Week Awards in a single season, joining Byron Buxton (2022), Lorenzo Cain (2019), and Riley Greene (2022)...Toronto players have claimed eight such awards, the most by any team since the inception of the award in 2019.


## GETTING RATIO'D:

- Danny Jansen extended his hitting streak to a career-high eight games before fracturing his middle finger on Sept. 1...Recorded career highs in doubles (15), homers (17), and RBI (53) for the season...His $5.06 \mathrm{AB} / \mathrm{RBI}$ clip was 9th best in the $A L$ (min. 200 AB ).


## AN AMAYZING YEAR:

- Tim Mayza put together a career-best 1.52 ERA, 3rd best among qualified AL relievers (5th in MLB), while making a career-high 69 appearances and throwing a career-high 53.1 innings... His 53 inherited runners led the AL (4th in MLB) while his 24.5 inherited runners scored percentage ranked 8th.


## WORKING LATE:

- Toronto scored 277 runs from the 7th inning on over the course of the regular season, 3rd most in the AL (4th in MLB)...Ranked 2nd with a . 260 team batting avearage in those frames (1st: HOU - .264).


## A START FOR THE AGES:

- Davis Schneider became the 4th player in team history to homer in his 1st career at-bat, going deep on Aug. 4 at BOS...Went on to bat .370 (30-for-81) with a .500 OBP over his first 25 contests...Among Blue Jays through their first 25 career games, ranked 1st in times on base (51), 1st in walks (19), T-1st in home runs, 2nd in extra-base hits (19), 3rd in RBI (20), and T-6th in hits (30)...His 1.315 OPS through his first 25 career games was the highest mark by any player in MLB history in the modern era (since 1901).

## MAKING HAY BY THE BAY:

- The Blue Jays blasted their way to a 20-1 win over the Rays on May 23 at Tampa Bay...The 20 runs were tied with a 20-11 win in Tampa Bay on June 25, 2002 for 4th most in team history...The 27 hits and +19 run differential were both 2nd highest in franchise history, trailing the 29 hits and +23 during a $28-5$ win on July 22, 2022 at BOS... Their collective .519 (27-for-52) batting average was the highest in a single game in team history $(.512$ (22-for-43) on June 24, 2008 vs. CIN).


## AN UNTRUE OUTCOME:

- Toronto batters did not strike out, draw a walk, or connect for a home run during their game on May 31 vs. MIL...Marked the 3rd time in team history for that to occur, also doing so on July 24, 1978 (G2) vs. SEA and May 11, 1979 vs. TEX...Had only happened two other times in MLB this century: Colorado on May 17, 2008 at DET and Oakland on July 1, 2014 at MIN.


## FREE PASS FACTS:

- Blue Jays batters drew multiple walks in 27 straight games from April 14-May 14, the longest singleseason streak in club history (23G from May 1-26, 1980), and their 2nd-longest overall (46G from Sept. 5, 1993 to April 27, 1994).


## WALK IT OUT:

- Blue Jays batters racked up nine walks on Sept. 5 at OAK, one shy of their season high ( 10 on April 1 at STL)... Six of those nine free passes were issued in the 7th inning alone, tied for their most in a single frame in team history (6 on April 18, 1997 at TEX; 6 on June 19, 1987 vs. MIL)...Cavan Biggio and Alejandro Kirk became the 1st pair of teammates in franchise history to each work multiple walks in the same inning.


## GOING LONG:

- Toronto walked off Boston, 4-3, in the 13th inning of their game on Sept. 16...Was the club's most innings played since the extra-inning rule changes took place in 2020.


## THE NEW JAYS:

- Cam Eden was selected to the Major League roster on Sept. 20, joining Hagen Danner, Spencer Horwitz, Nathan Lukes, Mason McCoy, and Davis Schneider as the six Blue Jays to make an MLB debut in 2023.

## TORONTO BLUE JAYS HISTORY

JOSÉE BAUTISTA



1977 - First Pitch: On April 7, 1977, 44,649 fans brave snow and freezing temperatures as the Blue Jays play their first ever regular season game, a 9-5 win over the Chicago White Sox at Exhibition Stadium.

## 1970s

The City of Toronto was awarded a franchise in the American League on March 26, 1976 and named Peter Bavasi Executive Vice-President and General Manager on June 18. On August 12, the "Blue Jays" were selected by Directors from over 4,000 names and 30,000 entries in a "Name the Team" contest. Roy Hartsfield became the first on-field Manager and catcher Phil Roof was purchased from the Chicago White Sox, becoming the first player in franchise history.
On March 11, 1977, the Blue Jays played their first spring training game, defeating the New York Mets in Dunedin, Florida, by a 3-1 score. On April 7, 1977, 44,649 fans braved snow and freezing temperatures as the Blue Jays won their first ever regular season game, 9-5, over the Chicago White Sox. Doug Ault became an instant hero, hitting two home runs in the contest. Their inaugural season included a 19-3 win over the Yankees, with Roy Howell collecting nine RBI, while the season total home attendance of 1,701,052 set a record for a firstyear expansion club.

Over the next two seasons, in 1978 and 1979, the Blue Jays saw several firsts. Jim Clancy got the $4-2$ victory in front of 44,327 fans on April 22, 1978, which is marked by the pitcher starting the first triple play in franchise history. On June 26, 1978, the Blue Jays exploded for a franchise-high 24 runs. Bobby Mattick became the team's second Manager on October 18, 1979. For his performance in 1979, SS Alfredo Griffin was named co-winner of the AL Rookie of the Year Award. From December 2-7, Toronto played host to the Winter Meetings, the first held outside the United States.

## 1980s

The 1980's represented a new phase for the franchise, as the club rose from an expansion team to a formidable AL East contender by the end of the decade. In 1980, still in the early years, the club set a franchise record with 67 victories while pushing attendance past six million, an expansion record. Field manager Bobby Cox took over the reins in 1982 and led the club to new heights in his four years as Manager. 1982 saw the team climb out of the basement for the first time in its history, winning 78 games to finish in a tie for 6th with Cleveland.
1983 marked a significant time as the Blue Jays finished over .500 for the first time in franchise history with an 89-73 record, good for 4th place and only nine games out of first. Notable performances included the first 100 RBI season by a Blue Jay (Willie Upshaw) and first 100-run season (Lloyd Moseby). The Blue Jays became only the second team in league history to win Player of the Week honours in three consecutive weeks, when Luis Leal, Dave Stieb, and Lloyd Moseby turned the trick in May. The enthusiasm for the club continued to build as a record 9,104 season tickets were sold for the 1984 season. Fans saw their club march up the standings for a second-place finish at 89-73, solidifying their position as AL East contenders. Over the course of the season, the Blue Jays claimed 19 one-run contests in a row, while Cliff Johnson set a then Major League record mark for pinch-hit home runs with his 19th career shot. All of this was witnessed by $2,110,009$ fans, which put the Blue Jays in elite company as just the 18th franchise to top two million fans in a season.

## PLAYOFF BOUND:

The ascent to AL East Champions was complete in 1985. On the second to last day of the regular season, the Blue Jays defeated the New York Yankees by a $5-1$ score to secure their first postseason berth. During the 1985 season a Blue Jays ticket was a hot commodity. On July 27 , the club saw average attendance top 30,000 per game for the first time. 47,686 fans showed up for an October 4th contest vs. New York to set a single game mark, while final attendance reaches a new high of $2,468,925$. Season ticket sales are capped at 11,500 .
The Blue Jays' first foray into the playoffs provided lots of drama and some solid learning experiences for future

years. Jumping out to 2-0 and 3-1 series leads vs. the AL West Champion Kansas City Royals, it appeared inevitable that the Blue Jays would make their first World Series appearance. Unfortunately, the Kansas City Royals had other ideas, coming from behind to become only the 5th club in Major League history to win a series after trailing 3-1. George Brett led the way, collecting several key hits while Jim Sundberg delivered the decisive blow off Blue Jays ace Dave Stieb, with a bases-clearing, windassisted triple off the top of the right-field fence in Game 7.
Heading into 1986, season tickets were capped at 14,000 as the club celebrated its 10th anniversary. On July 10, INF Damaso Garcia became the first player to record 1,000 hits in a Blue Jays uniform, while RHP Jim Clancy became the first to win 100 games for the franchise. SS Tony Fernandez became the first to record 200 hits in a season and RF Jesse Barfield earned the franchise its first Gold Glove award. The Blue Jays dropped to 4th place in the East with an 86-76 record, as Jimy Williams took over as team Manager.

## MVP:

George Bell cemented himself as the AL's best, posting a .308 average with 47 home runs and 134 RBI to earn the honour as AL MVP in 1987. He became the first Blue Jay ever selected by fans to appear in an All-Star Game. The Blue Jays set several club marks, including a 10 -home run game vs. Baltimore on September 14, with Ernie Whitt belting three. A franchise record 11-game winning streak began on June 2, while attendance soared to $2,778,429$, an all-time high for any AL East club. On Canada Day, a single-game record 47,828 fans packed their way into Exihibition Stadium in a contest vs. the New York Yankees. The season ended in shocking fashion as a 3.5 game lead was lost in the final week with seven consecutive losses. Four of the losses came to eventual champions, Detroit, all of them by one run, including two in extra innings. On the season's final day, LHP Jimmy Key lost a 1-0
battle to Frank Tanana with the lone run coming from a wallscraping home run to left field by OF Larry Herndon in the 2nd inning. Key injuries to C Ernie Whitt and SS Tony Fernandez down the stretch proved to be too much to overcome.
A 3rd place finish in 1988 (87-75) was highlighted by some individual accomplishments. George Bell began the season the same way he left off his 1987 MVP campaign, becoming the first player in Major League history to hit three home runs on Opening Day and the only player over the course of the season to earn two Player of the Week awards. Dave Stieb continued his dominance of AL hitters, flirting with no-hitters on three occasions, all three one-hitters, including back-toback one-hitters on Sept. 24 and 30. Incredibly, both games saw him lose the no-hitter with two outs in the 9th inning.

## A Significant change:

The 1989 season began with the naming of Paul Beeston as President on January 10. On May 15, with the team sitting at 12-24, Manager Jimy Williams was replaced by Cito Gaston on an interim basis. On May 28, the Blue Jays played their final game at Exhibition Stadium, defeating the White Sox, $7-5$. The team moved into the SkyDome and capped season tickets at 26,000. The SkyDome opened on June 5 with a $5-3$ loss to the Milwaukee Brewers. 49,501 watched the Blue Jays on September 16, setting a new single-season record for home attendance. The Blue Jays went on to post a 7749 record under Cito Gaston and clinched their second division title. Dave Stieb posted two more one-hitters, and came within one out of a perfect game vs. New York on August 4, when Roberto Kelly broke up the bid with a double.

## BEEN HERE BEFORE:

For the second time in five seasons, the Blue Jays were East Division Champions and fell in the Divisional Series, this time to the AL West Champion Oakland Athletics. The Blue Jays were no match for Rickey Henderson, who batted .400 in the series with a 1.609 OPS and a LCS record eight stolen bases in the five-game series. They were outscored, 31-16, with the Blue Jays only victory coming in Game 3 behind Jimmy Key.

## 1990s

The Toronto Blue Jays entered the 90's as an established contender, looking to build on regular season performances that had yet to yield playoff success. With the state-of-the-art SkyDome now their home, it was time to see this vision become reality.
In the first full season at SkyDome, and the first full season under Cito Gaston, the club came up just short of a postseason berth, finishing two games behind the Red Sox with an 86-76 record. The team set a Major League attendance record by passing the Dodgers' 1982 mark on September 19. Dave Stewart tossed SkyDome's first no-hitter on June 29 while pitching for the Oakland A's.

## AND THEN HE WAS PERFECT:

On September 2, 1990, Dave Stieb accomplished what had appeared so elusive in his career, tossing his first and only no-hitter vs. the Cleveland Indians. Jerry Browne lined out to right fielder Junior Felix to end the contest.
In December of 1990, the Blue Jays cemented a deal that changed the fortunes of the club, acquiring future Hall of Famer 2B Roberto Alomar and OF Joe Carter from San Diego in exchange for SS Tony Fernandez and 1B Fred McGriff. Another attendance mark was set

and the four-million fan barrier was broken as 4,001,526 saw the Blue Jays return to the postseason by winning the AL East with a 91-71 record. Tom Henke set a then record for consecutive saves with 25 . On May 1 in Texas, Nolan Ryan no-hit the Blue Jays for his 7th and final no-hitter. Chosen to host their first All-Star Game. 52,382 fans packed the SkyDome to see Jimmy Key pick up the win for the home side.

## THIRD TIME IS A CHARM:

The AL West Champion Minnesota Twins awaited the Blue Jays in the AL Championship Series. The Blue Jays came home to Toronto with a 1-1 series split, primed to make their first World Series appearance. Unfortunately, an 11-inning heartbreaker turned the series as Mike Pagliarulo homered off Mike Timlin to put the Blue Jays down, 2-1. In Game 5, the Twins finished off the series by scoring three runs in the 8th inning, winning, $8-5$, and sending the Blue Jays home early once again.
Newly acquired Jack Morris led the Blue Jays into the 1992 season by making his Major League record 13th consecutive Opening Day start. He tossed a complete game in a 4-2 win in Detroit. The Blue Jays set a Major League attendance record again in 1992 with $4,028,318$ fans and clinched their fourth playoff berth on October 3. Dave Winfield set a Blue Jays mark with 23 home runs as a DH while becoming the oldest player to register 100 or more RBI in a season.


In a highly entertaining series, the Blue Jays brought back-toback championships to Canada, defeating the Philadelphia Phillies in six games. The series was highlighted by a classic Game 4 contest in Philadelphia on October 20 that saw the Blue Jays overcome 12-7 and 14-9 deficits with a six-run 8th inning. 10 men came to the plate in the 8th, with Devon White tying the contest with a two-out RBI triple. Rickey Henderson provided the game-winning hit in a contest that took four hours and 14 minutes to play. In Game 6 in Toronto, the Blue Jays trailed the Phillies, 6-5, entering the bottom of the 9th. Phillies closer Mitch Williams allowed a walk to Henderson and a one-out single to Molitor before Joe Carter ended the series with a threerun home run to left field. The,
"Touch 'em all, Joe! You'll never hit a bigger home run in your life," quote was made famous by longtime Blue Jays announcer Tom Cheek.
The 1994 season ended prematurely on August 12 as a player strike began. It did not end until late April of 1995. The Blue Jays did not return to the postseason during the balance of the 90's, finishing as high as 3rd in 1998 and 1999. Paul Beeston was named Canada's Baseball Man of the Year in 1994, while Howard Starkman picked up the Robert O. Fishel award for Public Relations Excellence in 1996. The Blue Jays opened their 20th season in Las Vegas vs. Oakland, a season where Pat Hentgen began a string of three successive Blue Jays CY Young award winners, with Roger Clemens winning in 1997 and 1998.


Delgado: The first baseman played with the Blue Jays for 12 seasons, from 1993-2004. He is the all-time club leader in many offensive categories, inc/uding runs (889), doubles (343), home runs (336), RBI $(1,058)$ and walks (827).

## EXCELLENCE IS MEASURED:

The Blue Jays honoured George Bell and Dave Stieb by unveiling their names as the first on the Level of Excellence. Over the years, only the most prominent Blue Jays will see their names on the outfield facade. Joe Carter and Cito Gaston were added in 1999.
Cito Gaston ended a glorious run with the club after being relieved of his duties on September 24, 1997. During his tenure, the club won three divisional titles and two World Series.
Interleague Play began in 1997 with the Blue Jays playing the Montreal Expos in the regular season for the first time. The decade closed out with some significant accomplishments after Gord Ash assumed the role of General Manager in 1998. The same year, Tony Fernandez became the all-time hits leader and Roger Clemens became just the 11th pitcher in MLB history to record 3,000 strikeouts. Shawn Green became the first Blue Jay to post 30 home runs and 30 stolen bases in 1998. Pat Hentgen became the 4th Blue Jay to win 100 games and Billy Koch posted his 31st save in 1999 to set a then AL rookie record.

## 2000s:

Rogers Communications assumed control of the franchise in September of 2000. During the summer of the same year, the Blue Jays put on a

power display, becoming the first Major League team to have four players with 20 or more home runs before the All-Star break (Delgado, Batista, Mondesi, Cruz). The 134 home runs at home set a new AL mark and the 244 total home runs set a new franchise record. Carlos Delgado was named Sporting News Player of the Year.
The 2001 campaign saw the club open the season with one game vs. the Texas Rangers in Puerto Rico. Raul Mondesi pulled off the first straight steal of home in franchise history and Carlos Delgado assumed the franchise lead in home runs, passing Joe Carter. Jeff Frye hit for the cycle on August 17, joining Kelly Gruber as the only Blue Jays to accomplish the feat.

Carlos Delgado's team-record streak of 432 consecutive games played came to an end on August 4, 2002. Pat Gillick was enshrined on the Level of Excellence on August 7, 2002. The 2002 campaign came to a close with Eric Hinske named AL Rookie of the Year.
On June 15, 2003, Reed Johnson became only the fourth player in MLB history to hit a leadoff and walk-off home run in the same game. Roy Halladay won 15 straight decisions in 2003 on his way to a clubrecord 22 wins and a Cy Young award. On September 2, 2003,

Carlos Delgado banged out four home runs to become the 15th player in MLB history to accomplish the feat. Legendary broadcaster Tom Cheek had his streak of 4,306 consecutive games come to an end after the sudden passing of his father on June 3, 2004. Later in the season, Cheek was enshrined on the Level of Excellence.


Manager Carlos Tosca was relieved of his duties on August 8, 2004 and replaced by John Gibbons. The final day of the season was overshadowed by the sudden passing of longtime Blue Jay and current broadcaster John Cerutti.
Vernon Wells picked up a Gold Glove Award in 2004 and again in 2005. On April 4, 2005, Tom Cheek called back-to-back home runs by Orlando Hudson and Vernon Wells in his last game as a Blue Jays broadcaster; he later passed away on October 9, 2005.
After key signings of A.J. Burnett and B.J. Ryan in 2006, the team went on to post its best record of the decade, finishing in 2nd place with an 87-75 record. It marked the first time the Blue Jays placed higher than 3rd since the World Series winning clubs in 1992 and 1993. They saw five players go to the All-Star Game (Halladay, Ryan, Wells, Glaus, Rios).
The Blue Jays signed free agent Frank Thomas to a two-year contract in 2007. On June 28 in Minnesota, he became just the 21st player in MLB history to hit 500 career home runs, accomplishing the feat with a 1st inning home run off Carlos Silva.
Cito Gaston made his return to the dugout as he replaced John Gibbons as Manager with the team holding a 35-39 record. Gaston led the club to a 10-game winning streak in September, finishing with a 51-37 record the rest of the way in 2008. He was rewarded with a two-year contract following the season.
General Manager JP Ricciardi was replaced following the 2009 season by assistant Alex Anthopoulos on October 3. Aaron Hill and Adam Lind had stellar offensive seasons, earning both players a Silver Slugger Award. Hill also was named Comeback Player of the Year, while Lind was recognized as the AL's best Designated Hitter, picking up the Edgar Martinez Award.

## 2010s

In 2010, Jose Bautista won the Hank Aaron award and a Silver Slugger award, after setting a club mark with 54 home runs. He became just the 16th player in MLB history to record 54 home runs and the 7 th player to post 50 home runs, 30 doubles, and 100 walks in the same season. Overall, the team hit 257 home runs, tying for the 3rd highest total in MLB history. Brandon Morrow turned in one of the most impressive performances in franchise history on August 8 vs. Tampa Bay as his no-hit bid ended with two outs in the 9th inning. However, he finished with a one-hitter and 17 strikeouts. Cito Gaston was honoured in the final home game with a pregame ceremony on September 29, 2010.

## THE HALL IS CALLING:

Roberto Alomar, a 12-time All-Star and 10-time Gold Glovewinning second baseman, was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame by the Baseball Writers' Association of America on July 24, 2011 at the Clark Sports Center in Cooperstown, NY. The two-time World Series Champion donned

噱 nounced that they had On Sept. 18, 2012, the club anContract with the Buffalo Bisons of the International League (AAA). On Oct. 21, 2012, the Blue Jays released Manager John Farrell from his contract as he was hired by the Red Sox to take over that same position with them, an agreement reached by both teams. On Nov. 19, 2012, the Blue Jays and Marlins completed the biggest trade in baseball history, measured in number of players changing hands, as Toronto acquired RHP Josh Johnson, LHP Mark Buehrle, SS Jose Reyes, IF/OF Emilio Bonifacio, and C John Buck in exchange for C Jeff Mathis, SS Yunel Escobar, SS Adeiny Hechavarria, RHP Henderson Alvarez, LHP Justin Nicolino, OF Jake Marisnick, and RHP Anthony Desclafani. On Nov. 20, the Blue Jays hired John Gibbons as Manager to take over for John Farrell. Gibbons became the second person to have two tenures as Blue Jays Manager, along with Cito Gaston. General Manager Alex Anthopoulos made another big splash in the offseason by acquiring the 2012 NL Cy Young award winner, RHP R.A. Dickey, from the New York


Tom Cheek: Tom Cheek, who called the first 4,306 regular-season and 41 postseason games in Toronto Blue Jays history, was selected as the 2013 recipient of the Ford C. Frick Award, presented annually for excellence in broadcasting by the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum. Cheek, who passed away on Oct. 9, 2005, was honoured as part of Hall of Fame Weekend 2013 in Cooperstown, N.Y.

Mets on Dec. 17, 2012, along with C Josh Thole and C Mike Nickeas in exchange for two of Toronto's top prospects, C Travis d'Arnaud and RHP Noah Syndergaard, along with C John Buck and OF Wuilmer Beccera.
Major League Baseball and Baseball Commissioner Allan H. (Bud) Selig named the Toronto Blue Jays as the 2012 recipient of the Commissioner's Award for Philanthropic Excellence, which was created in 2010 to annually recognize an extraordinary charitable and philanthropic effort of an MLB club.
Toronto had four players participate in the 2013 All-Star game along with Manager John Gibbons, who was one of the coaches selected by Jim Leyland. OF Jose Bautista, 1B Edwin Encarnacion, LHP Brett Cecil, and RHP Steve Delabar represented the Blue Jays at the 2013 Classic at Citi Field. Delabar was the winner of the mlb.com Final Vote, becoming the first Toronto player to win with 9.6 million votes. On July 21, 2013, Carlos Delgado became the 9th member inducted into the Toronto Blue Jays Level of Excellence.
In July of 2013, Tom Cheek was inducted in the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum as the Ford C. Frick winner, having called the first 4,306 games in club history. Cheek also called the team's first 41 postseason contests, and his "Touch 'em all, Joe!" call still resounds in the hearts and minds of fans across the country. The lengendary broadcaster saw his name placed on the Level of Excellence in 2004 and passed away the following year after a lengthy and brave battle with brain cancer.
On Dec. 9, 2013, at the Winter Meetings, Roy Halladay signed a contract with the Blue Jays. This agreement ensured that the legendary right-hander retired as a Toronto Blue Jay. Halladay finished a distinguished 16 -year career with a record of 203-105 (. 659 winning percentage) in 416 games ( 390 starts) with an ERA of 3.38 . Roy is among the Blue Jays club leaders in many pitching categories, ranking 2nd in wins (148), strikeouts ( 1,495 ), and shutouts (15), 3rd in ERA (3.43), starts (287), complete games (49), and innings pitched (2,046.2). His 148-76 record as a Blue Jay resulted in a .661 winning percentage, the highest mark in club history.

Jose Bautista once again led the Majors in the 2014 fan voting $(5,859,019)$ and made his 5th consecutive appearance in the All-Star Game, joining Roberto Alomar as the only Toronto players to earn four consecutive starts. Bautista was named the AL captain for the Home Run Derby and was eliminated in the semi-final by the eventual winner, Yoenis Cespedes. His 10 homers in the 1st round were the most by any participant. On Sept. 8, 2014 vs. CHC, Bautista hit his 200th career homer as a Blue Jay, becoming just the 5th player in club history to accomplish the feat. Edwin Encarnacion led the Majors in May, 2014 with 16 HR, 22 XBH, a . 763 SLG, and was 2nd with 33 RBI. The 16 HR in May set a club record for any month and was the most by any player in May since Barry Bonds hit a MLB record 17 HR in 2001. The 16 homers in May were tied for 2nd on the all-time MLB list with Mickey Mantle (1956) and Mark McGwire (1998). It was the most hit in any month since Sammy Sosa hit 17 HR in August, 2001. Encarnacion's five multi-HR games in May tied an MLB record for most multi-HR games in any calendar month (Albert Belle: Sept., 1995 and Harmon Killebrew: May, 1959). He was named AL Player of the Month for May. On June 6, 2014 vs. STL, the Blue Jays celebrated the 25th anniversary of the Rogers Centre. Like they did back on June 5, 1989, they sent Jimmy Key to the mound to throw out the Ceremonial First Pitch to former catcher Ernie Whitt. Joining them to deliver the game's starting lineup was former Blue Jays Manager Cito Gaston, who managed the first game at the ballpark. On April 10, 2014 the Toronto Blue Jays announced the creation of the Howard Starkman Award to be presented annually to the Employee of the Year. Starkman officially retired on April 11 as the longest serving employee in the organization and was the inaugural recipient of the award named in his honour. On Sept. 10, the Toronto Blue Jays were named the winners of 2014 Steve Patterson Award for excellence in sports philanthropy, granted in recognition of the Jays Care Foundation's charitable and community efforts across Canada.

## RETURN TO THE PLAYOFFS:

In 2015, the Blue Jays had Josh Donaldson, Jose Bautista, and Russell Martin represent them in the 86th All-Star Classic. Donaldson was the MLB leading vote-getter, setting an all-time record after accumulating 14,090, 188 votes. He was the first Toronto third baseman and fourth Toronto infielder to win a fan election, joining Roberto Alomar (1991-94), John Olerud (1993), and Carlos Delgado (2003). For Bautista, it marked his 6th straight overall All-Star selection (2010-2015), his first time being chosen by the players. For the 5th straight year he was selected as a starter, the only Blue Jay to accomplish the feat. His six All-Star appearances also represent the most by any Blue Jay (Roberto Alomar-5, Joe Carter-5). Prior to the July, 2015 trade deadline, GM Alex Anthopoulos pulled off four separate deals as Toronto acquired Troy Tulowtizki and LaTroy Hawkins from the Rockies on July 28. The Jays also acquired David Price from the Tigers on July 30 before adding Ben Revere from the Phillies and Mark Lowe from the Mariners on July 31. After that point, Toronto posted a record of $40-18$ the rest of the way for the best record in baseball. On Aug. 31, 2015, Rogers Communications announced that Mark Shapiro had been appointed President and CEO of the Toronto Blue Jays and Rogers Centre, to take place following the completion of the team's 2015 season. Shapiro assumed the role from Paul Beeston, who retired at the end of the season. The team clinched its first division title since 1993 after defeating the Orioles in Baltimore by a score of 15-2 in Game 1 of a doubleheader on Sept. 30. The victory ended the longest active playoff drought by any team in professional sports, and marked the 6th division title in franchise history. The Blue Jays defeated the Texas Rangers in the best-of-five Division Series after trailng 2-0. In the finale, Jose Bautista put Toronto in front for good, crushing a three-run homer in the 7th inning to break a 3-3 tie. Toronto then lost their ALCS series vs. the Royals in six games. On Oct. 29, 2015, Alex Anthopoulos stepped down as Senior VP of Baseball Operations and GM. Vice President of Baseball Operations and Assistant GM, Tony Lacava was named Interim General Manager following Anthopoulos's departure.

On Nov. 19, 2015, Josh Donaldson became just the second player in franchise history to win the AL MVP Award (George Bell in 1987). Donaldson finished with 23 first-place votes ( 385 points overall), 81 more points than the 2nd place finisher, Mike Trout. On Dec. 3, 2015, Toronto named Ross Atkins as Executive Vice President of Baseball Operations and General Manager. He became the seventh GM in franchise history. Tony LaCava was then promoted to the position of Senior Vice President of Baseball Operations and Assistant GM after serving as the Interim GM.
In 2016, the Blue Jays secured the top Wild Card position after going 89-73, representing the seventh postseason in franchise history. It marked just the second time in club history to earn a postseason berth in consecutive seasons (last: 1991-1993). The Blue Jays defeated the Orioles at Rogers Centre in the Wild Card game on Tuesday, Oct. 4, after Edwin Encarnacion hit a walk-off three-run homer in the 11th inning. Toronto won the Division Series, 3-0, over Texas for their first ever postseason sweep. The Jays appeared in consecutive ALCS series in back-to-back seasons for just the second time in franchise history (1991-1993), but fell to the Cleveland Indians, 3-1, in the ALCS. Toronto drew 3,392,099 in attendance for an average of 41,878 , which represented the most in the AL and third most in the Majors (LAD - 45,720; STL - 42,525), their highest total since 1994 $(49,287)$. Aaron Sanchez led the American Leage in ERA at 3.00, becoming the 5th different Blue Jays pitcher to lead the AL in ERA, joining Roger Clemens (2x), Dave Stieb, Juan Guzman, and Jimmy Key. J.A. Happ was one of just three pitchers to finish the year with 20 wins (Rick Porcello-22, Max Scherzer - 20) as he became the 6th different 20-game winner in club history (8th time), joining Roy Halladay (2x), Roger Clemens (2x), Jack Morris, Pat Hentgen, and David Wells. It marked the second time that a left-hander recorded 20 wins in a season (David Wells - 20 in 2000). Edwin Encarnacion became the third player in club history to record four seasons of $35+$ HR and $100+$ RBI, joining Delgado ( 5 x ) and Bautista (4x). The Jays also averaged over 1 million viewers per game on TV nationwide (Sportsnet).

In 2017, Roberto Osuna and Justin Smoak represented the Blue Jays at the All-Star Game. At 22.352 years old, Osuna became the youngest player to appear in an ASG in team history. Smoak went 1 -for-1 with a walk to become the third Blue Jay to reach base more than once in a Midsummer Classic contest. The first baseman hit a career-high 38 homers in 2017, the most all-time by a Toronto switch-hitter. He also set an MLB record with 11 home runs in the 9th inning or later. Marcus Stroman became the 2nd pitcher in team history to win a Gold Glove Award (R.A. Dickey - 2013) and while leading the Majors in ground ball percentage (62.9). The team played in an AL-high 53 one-run games. Despite finishing 76-86, Toronoto led the AL in attendance, selling $3,203,886$ tickets.
In 2018, the season began with the retiring of a workhorse starter, as the late Roy Halladay had his number 32 lifted to the rafters on Opening Day. Lourdes Gurriel Jr. recorded multiple hits in 11 straight games from July 11-29. The multi-hit streak was the longest in team history and marked the seventh $11+$ game multi-hit streak since 1900. The shortstop took AL Rookie of the Month for July with a . 423 ( 30 -for- 71 ) average over the course of the month. Kendrys Morales also had a club-record streak as he homered in seven straight games from Aug. 19-26. The seven-game stretch was the longest ever by a switch-hitter and tied for 4th longest all-time, one back of the leaders. J.A. Happ was Toronto's lone representative at the All-Star Game and picked up the first save ever by a Blue Jay at the Midsummer Classic. Rowdy Tellez joined the club in September and became the first player in the live-ball era to have an extrabase hit in each of his first three MLB plate appearances. He then became the first player to record seven doubles in his first seven career games and tied an MLB record with 10 XBH in his first 40 PA. The team set a franchise record, using 63 different players to get through 2018.
Toronto wrapped up the decade with an average roster age of 26 years and 266 days in 2019, the second youngest in the Majors, as Charlie Montoyo took over as Manager. The average age of their position players was 25.298 , the youngest among all 30 clubs. The Blue Jays had an MLB-high 840 games played by rookies during the campaign and led all teams in rookie hits (535), doubles (115), home runs (97), RBI (284), walks (224), and extra-base hits (218). The club set team records in rookie doubles, homers, RBI, walks, and extra-base hits, having only more hits and games played in their 1977 inaugural season. They also became the first team ever to have double-digit home runs from six different rookies, surpassing the 1958 San Francisco Giants. Cavan Biggio recorded the third cycle in franchise history as he accomplished the feat on Sept. 17 in Baltimore. Bo Bichette set an MLB record with a nine-game doubles streak from July 31-Aug. 8, and became the first player to ever record 15 extra-base hits in his first 15 career games. Vladimir Guerrero Jr. led AL rookies with 126 hits and became the first rookie in team history to win two Player of the Week Awards. The 20 -year-old also became the youngest player to ever participate in the Home Run Derby and set an MLB record as he hit a total of 91 homers in the competition, surpassing Giancarlo Stanton's total of 61 in 2016.

## 2020s

The 2020 season was like no other. After the COVID-19 pandemic delayed Opening Day until July 24, the Blue Jays made Sahlen Field in Buffalo, NY, their "home" for the 60game season - the first season without Major League Baseball in Canada since 1968. Toronto managed to go 17-9 at home and finished with a 32-28 record, good enough for a Wild Card spot in the newly expanded 16-team postseason format. The Jays lost both playoff games in Tampa Bay, $3-1$ and 8-2, after making the postseason with the youngest average roster age of all 16 clubs. They were also the first team in 105 years to make the playoffs without a single player who had been in the Majors for at least 10 seasons. Toronto finished the 2020 campaign with a $.533 \mathrm{win} \%$, after a . $414 \mathrm{win} \% ~(67-95$ ) in 2019, for a year-on-year improvement of +.119 , the 2nd largest in team history. Teoscar Hernández slugged 16 home runs, tied for 5th most among AL batters while ranking 7th in SLG (.579) and 7th in OPS (.919). Lourdes Gurriel Jr. finished 6th in the AL with a . 308 batting average. Hyun Jin Ryu ranked 4th in the AL with a 2.69 ERA while 3rd in MLB with a 3.0 bWAR. Toronto was also named the recipient of the 2020 Allan H. Selig Award for Philanthropic Excellence, recognizing the club's Blue Jays Community Commitment, a $\$ 7.5$ million COVID-19 response plan that supported those disproportionately affected by the pandemic across Canada.
As border closures continued into 2021, the Blue Jays started a season south of the border for a second consecutive year. They played their first three homestands in Dunedin, FL, becoming the first team ever to hold a home opener in three different cities in three consecutive seasons. The club went 10-11 at TD Ballpark, then 12-11 at Sahlen Field, and finished 47-33 overall at home. The team returned to Rogers Centre on July 30 after 670 days away, the longest such stretch in MLB history. The Blue Jays became the 1st team to play home games in three different states/provinces in the same campaign. Toronto hitters connected for an MLB and franchise-high 262 home runs. Bo Bichette, Vladimir Guerrero Jr., Teoscar Hernández, and Marcus Semien were all named All-Stars for the 1st time in their careers. Guerrero Jr. tied Salvador Perez for the MLB home run lead at 48 , the most home runs in a season all-time by a player age 22 or younger, and became the youngest ever to win All-Star Game MVP. Bichette led the AL with 191 hits while his 29 homers were the most by a shortstop in team history. Semien ranked 1st in the Majors with 86 extra-base hits and his 45 home runs were the most in MLB history by a second baseman. Hernández finished 3rd in the Majors with 116

RBI and ranked 7th in the AL with a . 296 average. All four All-Stars also reached the 100-RBI plateau, marking the 1st time in club history to have four players do so in the same season. Guerrero Jr. and Semien ended up finishing 2nd and 3rd in AL MVP voting and each claimed a Silver Slugger Award, along with Hernández. Robbie Ray became the 1st Blue Jay to lead the Majors in strikeouts (248) and was the 6th in team history to lead the AL in ERA (2.84) as he claimed the AL Cy Young Award. Toronto's 91 wins finished 4th in the division and were one shy of a Wild Card spot, as the 2021 AL East was the first division since realignment in 1994 to have four 90-win teams.
Toronto played its home ball based out of Rogers Centre for the full 2022 campaign and returned to the playoffs once more, falling in two games to Seattle in the Wild Card round. Blue Jay batters led the Majors with a . 264 batting average and topped the AL in AVG, OBP, SLG, and OPS for the 1st time in team history. George Springer was named to his 4th All-Star team while Vladimir Guerrero Jr. became the 5th Blue Jay to be named a starter in consecutive years. Santiago Espinal, Alejandro Kirk, Alek Manoah, and Jordan Romano all made the Midsummer Classic for the 1st time in their careers. Manoah finished 3rd in Cy Young Voting as he ranked top-five in the $A L$ in wins, ERA, innings pitched, opponents' average, WHIP, and quality starts. Kirk became the 1st catcher in team history to win a Silver Slugger Award as he led all MLB catchers in both AVG and OBP. Bo Bichette finished the year strong with a club-record 48 hits in September and became the 1st Blue Jay ever to lead the AL in hits in multiple seasons.
The Blue Jays won 89 games under Manager John Schneider during his 1st full season at the helm in 2023, returning to the playoffs in consecutive campaigns for the first time since 2015-2016. For the 3rd time in four years, the club was swept in the Wild Card round, this time in Minnesota. Vladimir Guerrero Jr. was crowned the Home Run Derby Champion in Seattle, becoming the 1st Blue Jay to ever win the event. He was joined as an AL All-Star by Bo Bichette, Kevin Gausman, Whit Merrifield, and Jordan Romano. The pitching staff combined for a 3.78 ERA, 2nd best in the AL, while recording a club-record 1,528 strikeouts. Gausman led the way with a career-high and AL-best 237 strikeouts while finishing 3rd in AL Cy Young voting. The gloves shined as the defence played 107 error-free games, the most in team history, and recorded a total of 82 Defensive Runs Saved, the most in the Majors. Newly acquired Daulton Varsho finished 1st in MLB with 29 total runs saved.



PRIMARY LOGO (1977-1996)
Unveiled two months after the team was named, the Toronto Blue Jays original logo made its debut to the baseball world on October 8, 1976. The design is attributed to a team that includes draftsman Paco Belsué from Toronto's Savage Sloan Ltd. and Richard Walker from Labatts. It featured the stylized double-blue profile of a blue jay superimposed on a baseball accompanied by a red maple leaf symbolizing the team's status as the first and only Canadian team in the American League. The team name, surrounding the main elements, boasts its now-famous light blue split-lettering typography. The Blue Jays used this logo from their expansion season right through to the end of 1996, a span of twenty seasons. The logo was worn by six members of the National Baseball Hall of Fame and used by the team during five playoff appearances and two World Series titles.

## PRIMARY LOGO (1997 - 2002)

Designed by Major League Baseball, the Toronto Blue Jays announced the first logo change in team history on November 19, 1996 along with a set of brand new uniforms. The stylized double-blue blue jay head remained on a baseball, but now appeared with a modernized style and the addition of the colour grey. The maple leaf, once small and off to the right, was enlarged considerably and placed behind both the ball and the blue jay with the team name below in modified split-lettering. The Blue Jays used this logo for six seasons, including the on-field debut of Hall of Fame pitcher Roy Halladay and for back-to-back American League Cy Young Award winning seasons for Roger Clemens.

## PRIMARY LOGO (2003)

While it was only used as the primary logo for one season, the Blue Jays had previously used this logo as an alternate logo for the three seasons prior to its "call-up" in 2003. Originally unveiled for use on batting practice and Spring Training uniforms on February 1, 2000, the logo features a blue jay wrapped around a large red "T" while holding a yellow bat and tossing a ball into the air. It quickly found its way into the regular season rotation on both an alternate cap and jersey during the 2001 and 2002 seasons before it took center stage as the primary design. It was just one season but it was while wearing this logo that Roy Halladay took home the AL Cy Young Award in 2003.

## PRIMARY LOGO (2004-2011)

Featuring an updated blue jay characterized by a more determined look, the team unveiled a radical new logo, colour scheme, and uniform set on September 2, 2003. Created by Toronto-based Brandid, the new design placed an emphasis on black and graphite while eliminating red from the set. The logo incorporated a lighter shade of blue than used previously onto a blue jay head facing the left with the team name behind in bevelled lettering. The name of the team was abbreviated for the logo with only the name "Jays" shown in the design. The Jays used this design for eight seasons before replacing it following the 2011 season during which it was worn by two members of the National Baseball Hall of Fame and by Jose Bautista as he slugged a club record 54 home
 runs in 2010.

## PRIMARY LOGO (2012-2019)

In homage to their past, the Blue Jays brought back the classic look and feel of their original design when they unveiled a familiar new logo on November 18, 2011. Returning was the double-blue blue jay head placed on a red baseball, a maple leaf was as reintroduced, now larger than it was when it first appeared in 1977. Split-style lettering returned as well with a modernized, serif version of the original font. The entire logo encased within a double striped blue outline to mimic the splitstyled font. The Blue Jays have used this logo as their primary logo for eight seasons including two playoff appearances and will forever be linked to postseason home runs from Jose Bautista in 2015 and Edwin Encarnacion in 2016.

## PRIMARY LOGO (2020- )

Entering a new decade, the Blue Jays made some minor changes to their primary look. The baseball and team name were removed from the design to match the "logo for life" worn on each of the team's caps and jerseys. The shade of red used for the maple leaf was also darkened very slightly. The previous logo, words, ball, and all, wasn't eliminated completely, sticking around as the team's official secondary logo.


## HOME UNIFORMS

Paired with a royal blue cap and a white front panel, the original home and road jerseys were both pullover style with blue/white/blue trim around the collar and both sleeves with the original team logo front and center. At home, the Blue Jays wore a white uniform with "BLUE JAYS" arched across the chest in blue split-lettering over the logo. On the road, they went with a baby blue uniform with "TORONTO" in solid blue over the logo. While the road uniform would change annually for the first three seasons, the home design remained relatively unchanged until after the 1988 season.
For the 1978 season, the Blue Jays made a slight adjustment to their road uniform, the "TORONTO" wordmark arched across the chest was given a white outline to make it stand out more on the baby blue jersey.
In 1979, the Blue Jays changed the road uniform once again, this time replacing blue "TORONTO" lettering with "BLUE JAYS" in white to mimic the style worn on the home jersey. This design also helped the team recycle uniforms down to the club's Minor League affiliates also named "Blue Jays".
As the team moved to SkyDome in 1989, the Blue Jays redesigned their uniforms, moving away from the pullover style to a more traditional button-down jersey. The logo on the jersey had to be moved to the left side to accommodate the buttons. On the road, the team dropped the baby blues in favour of a traditional road grey and "TORONTO" now appeared across the jersey. For the first time, an all-blue cap was added and was worn exclusively for road games. Midway through the 1993 season the white front-panel caps used since 1977 were retired, leaving the team with just the one all-blue cap. In 1994, the Blue Jays added their first-ever alternate uniform to the mix, the same design but now a blue jersey with the team name in white to be worn at home and on the road with the blue cap.
Along with a new logo, three all-new uniforms were unveiled for the Blue Jays in 1997. Three stripes: blue, light blue, and red were on each arm with the new logo as a patch on the sleeve. The team name remained across the chest in a modernized version of the split-style lettering and the player's number appeared on the front of the jersey. The home and road uniforms both paired with a new all-blue cap featuring the new logo. A blue alternate jersey with "TORONTO" across the chest in red lettering was also added with its own blue cap which included a red visor. A second alternate uniform was added in 1999, a sleeveless jersey with a blue undershirt and the return of the team's logo to the front of the jersey.
Tweaks were made to the team's uniforms in 2001 as piping was added down the front of all jerseys. The road grey jersey got the most noticeable change as it now had blue sleeves in addition to the new blue piping. The sleeveless alternate from 1999 was updated as well, with a new logo featuring a blue jay wrapped around a red "T" on the front of the jersey as well as on the caps.
Slight changes were made to the uniforms in 2003 as all instances of the previous logo on the sleeves and caps were replaced with the new "T" logo to accommodate its promotion up to the primary team mark.
A major redesign in 2004 saw almost the total elimination of blue - from the caps which were now graphite grey at home and black on the road, as well as from the team's name on the uniforms. The new jerseys were free of any decoration with just the new "JAYS" logo across the front of the home white and alternate black jerseys, and "TORONTO" on the road greys, both slanted diagonally up to the right. New player name and number styles were also introduced. The graphite caps were replaced by the black caps full-time in 2005.

The road uniform received a makeover for the 2008 season, as the "TORONTO" logo across the chest was now in an entirely new styled font and back to being arched again. Player numbers are added below the team name and the team's logo is worn as a patch on the sleeve. There was also a retro return in 2008 as the Blue Jays introduced the Flashback Friday series of home games. The powder blue pullovers worn originally on the road in the 1980s along with the original caps were brought back for Friday night home games for three seasons.
From 2009 to 2011, to again promote themselves as Canada's Team, a red maple leaf was returned to the Blue Jays home white, road grey, and alternate black uniform for the first time in five seasons. The maple leaf was added as a patch to the sleeve of the three jerseys.
What's old is new again, and in 2012, the Blue Jays brought back their familiar look with a few modern twists. The original logo, colours, and lettering style all returned with a fresher look alongside matching home white, road grey, and alternate blue uniforms. A white-panel cap, similar to those worn from 1977-1993, also returned as an alternate option beginning during the 2015 season.
In honour of Canada's 150th anniversary, an all-red-andwhite version of the Blue Jays look was added as an alternate uniform in 2017. All logos and uniforms were removed entirely of blue and replaced with red, the striping on the pants was changed to red, and the cap was red with a red-and-white maple leaf on the crown.
A "new blue" was added for the 2020 season when the Blue Jays introduced their new alternate uniform with matching blue pants. A dark navy blue was used for all lettering and striping on this jersey which was paired with a brand new navy blue cap with a powder blue visor.

## TORONTO VS．KANSAS CITY（L，3－4）

As the Blue Jays entered postseason play for the first time，they faced the Kansas City Royals in the first ever best－of－seven American League Championship Series． The Blue Jays，who finished nine games ahead of the Royals in the loss column，were the favourites and had the benefit of the extra home game．

GAME \＃1：Dave Stieb lived up to superstar billing，shutting out the Royals on three hits through eight innings with no base runner advancing past second base．The Blue Jays struck quickly with two runs in the second，three in the third，and one in the fourth．The Blue Jays offense was sparked by two－RBI performances from Ernie Whitt and Tony Fernandez．

GAME \＃2：A much more even affair with the Blue Jays coming away with a 6－5，10－inning win．The Royals jumped out to a quick 3－0 lead after three innings primarily on the strength of a two－run homer by Willie Wilson in the 3rd inning．The Blue Jays took the lead on a George Bell sacrifice fly in the 8th．The Royals rallied， however，in the 9th on a pinch－hit home run by Pat Sheridan with the go－ahead run being delivered in the 10th on a Frank White single．Toronto won it in the bottom of
 the 10th on a two－out，two－run single by Al Oliver．On to Kansas City，the Blue Jays were up two games to none．

GAME \＃3：George Brett put on a baseball clinic，going 4－for－4 with two home runs，three RBI，and four runs scored en route to a 6－5 Royals win．Leading 5－2 after 4 innings，the Blue Jays squandered the lead for good in the 8th when Brett led off the inning with a single and eventually scored．

GAME \＃4：The Blue Jays moved to within one win of a World Series berth with a 3－1 come－from－behind victory．The Blue Jays won the game dramatically with three runs in the top of the 9th inning，with the big blow being a two－run pinch－hit double by Al Oliver．

GAME \＃5：Kansas City＇s Danny Jackson went the distance，scattering eight Toronto hits in a 2－0 win as the Royals scored a run in each of the first two innings．The Blue Jays still led the series，3－2．

GAME \＃6：The Blue Jays and Royals returned to Exhibition Stadium．Entering the 5th inning tied at 2－2，George Brett once again delivered the decisive blow with a solo homer．With 3.2 shutout innings of relief from Buddy Black and Dan Quisenberry， the Royals pulled even in the series for the first time at three games apiece．

GAME \＃7：Dave Stieb，the ace of the Toronto staff vs．the eventual Cy Young Award winner，Bret Saberhagen．The Royals came out on top，6－2，shellacking Dave Stieb for six runs in 5.2 innings with the diffence maker being a wind－assisted，bases－ clearing triple by Jim Sundberg to cap a four－run 6th inning．

The Kansas City Royals became only the 5th club in Major League history to trail a series three games to one and come back to win the series．The Blue Jays？They slumped immediately after scoring five runs in the 5th inning of Game 3，scoring only eight runs in the last 40 innings．

## AMERICAN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

## TORONTO VS．OAKLAND（L，1－4）

For the second time in five seasons the Blue Jays were American League East Division Champions．Toronto faced the Oak－ land Athletics，who had the best record in the Major Leagues in 1989.

GAME \＃1：The Blue Jays surrendered 2－0 and 3－1 leads as the Athletics scored three times in the 6th and twice in the 8th to win， $7-3$ ．In the 6th inning，Mark McGwire cracked a leadoff homer to tie the game，and two runs scored when Carney Lansford＇s double play ball was botched．Dave Stewart allowed five hits over eight innings for the win．

GAME \＃2：The Athletics tallied twice in the 4th inning and three time in the 6th en route to a 6－3 win．Rickey Henderson was a one－man wrecking crew，going 2 －for－ 2 with two runs scored and four stolen bases．Oakland right－hander Mike Moore allowed just three hits and an unearned run over seven innings of work．

GAME \＃3：The Blue Jays snapped a five－game postseason losing streak，dating back to 1985，with a convincing 7－3 win． The Blue Jays jumped on Athletics starter Storm Davis for four runs on four hits in the 4th inning and put the game away with another three runs in the 7th inning．Overcoming a 3－0 Athletics lead，Mookie Wilson and Tony Fernandez paced the Blue Jays with two hits each，the latter with two doubles．

GAME \#4: The Athletics took a commanding 3-1 lead in the series with a 6-5 win over the Blue Jays. Rickey Henderson was again a major catalyst with two home runs and four RBI. The Blue Jays collected 13 hits, 11 of which were singles, and

## TORONTO VS. MINNESOTA (L, 1-4)

GAME \#1: Toronto starter Tom Candiotti lasted just 2.2 innings and allowed five earned runs before being lifted in favour of David Wells. The Twins did not need to score another run. The Blue Jays rallied for one run in the 4th and three runs in the 6 th on five consecutive hits off Twins starter Jack Morris. Those four runs were all the Blue Jays could muster as they lost, 5-4, at the Metrodome.

GAME \#2: The Blue Jays took an early lead as they jumped on Twins starter Kevin Tapani, scoring three times in the first three innings. Rookie Toronto starter Juan Guzman lasted 5.2 innings, allowing four hits and just two earned runs before the ball was handed to the bullpen. Tom Henke and Duane Ward combined for 2.1 innings of shutout relief and six strikeouts. Devon White scored three of the five Toronto runs as the Blue Jays won their only 1991 ALCS game, 5-2, in Minneapolis.

GAME \#3: Joe Carter's 1st-inning home run and a Candy Maldonado double put the Blue Jays ahead 2-0 until the 6th, when the Twins were able to put their second run across the plate and tie the game, 2-2. Toronto starter Jimmy Key scattered five hits over six innings and allowed two earned runs. The game went into extra-innings and ended in dramatic fashion as Mike Pagliarulo, pinch-hitting for Scott Leius, homered to right off of Blue Jays reliever Mike Timlin. Toronto was retired 1-2-3 in their half of the 10th as the Twins defeated Toronto, 3-2, at SkyDome.

GAME \#4: Toronto starter Todd Stottlemyre allowed seven hits through 3.2 innings before exiting with the Jays trailing, 4-1. The Twins' Kirby Puckett hit his first home run of the series and Dan Gladden collected three RBI on three hits to pace Minnesota to a 9-3 win at SkyDome. It was Jack Morris' second win of the ALCS as he pitched eight innings and allowed just two runs.

GAME \#5: Kirby Puckett displayed his power once again as he homered in the 1st inning off Tom Candiotti to put the Twins ahead, 1-0. Toronto put together three runs in the 3rd and a pair in the 4th to take a 5-2 lead. However, Minnesota was able to post three runs in their half of the 6th inning and tie the game at five. Duane Ward was handed the loss for Toronto as he allowed three runs in the 8th. Toronto was shutdown by five shutout innings of Twins relief. Devon White, Roberto Alomar and Manuel Lee each collected a pair of hits in the losing effort as Minnesota took the American League crown with an 8-5 win.

## AMERICAN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

## TORONTO VS. OAKLAND (W, 4-2)

GAME \#1: Home runs were the story of the game as Oakland used three of them to beat the Blue Jays, 4-3. The A's scored three runs in the 2nd inning off Toronto starter Jack Morris on back-to-back homers by Mark McGwire and Terry Steinbach. The 3-0 lead stood until Pat Borders homered off Dave Stewart in the Blue Jays' 5th, followed by a Dave Winfield homer in the 6th to make it a 3-2 contest. John Olerud tied the score, 3-3, in the bottom of the 8th with a two-out single off reliever Jeff Russell, scoring Winfield who had doubled in the previous at-bat. Harold Baines broke the tie with a solo shot to lead off the 9th and Dennis Eckersley shut down the Blue Jays in the home half of the final frame to seal the 4-3 Oakland victory.

GAME \#2: The Blue Jays were able to rebound from a Game 1 loss as David Cone held the A's to just one run over 8.0 innings en route to a 3-1 win. Cone, the Major League's strikeout leader in 1992, fanned six as he collected his second career postseason victory. Mike Moore lasted seven innings in the losing effort for Oakland. Kelly Gruber doubled and hit a two-run homer in the 5th which proved to be the winning runs. Closer Tom Henke came on to close out the game in the 9th and earned his first ever postseason save.

GAME \#3: For the first time since 1985 vs. Kansas City, the Blue Jays put together a pair of wins in the postseason as they got past the A's, 7-5. Toronto starter Juan Guzman notched his second career LCS win in as many starts (1991 vs. Twins), lasting six innings before being lifted in favour of Duane Ward. Tom Henke claimed his second save in as many games. Despite being outhit, 13-9, by the A's, four of Toronto's hits went for extra-bases, including solo homers from Alomar and Maldonado.

GAME \#4: In what appeared at first to be a certain Oakland victory, the Toronto Blue Jays fought back to erase a five-run deficit late in the contest, sending the game into extra-innings. Oakland batted around and plated five runs in the 3rd inning as they jumped on Toronto starter Jack Morris. The A's added another run in the 6th to make it 6-1 score. Toronto began their comeback in the top of the 8th as they strung together five consecutive hits. By the end of the inning they trailed, 6-4. The A's were held off the board in the bottom of the 8 th. In the top of the 9 th, Devon White led off with a single that was misplayed, allowing him to get to third base. Roberto Alomar then homered off Dennis Eckersley to tie the game, 6-6. Toronto eventually won the game on a Pat Borders sacrifice fly and another Tom Henke save in the 11th for the 7-6 victory.

GAME \#5: Oakland starter Dave Stewart held the Blue Jays in check for nine innings, scattering seven hits and allowing just two runs as Oakland sent the series back to SkyDome. The complete game win was Stewart's first win of the 1992 postseason. The 6-2 loss for the Blue Jays ended their three-game win streak. David Cone took the $L$ for Toronto as he lasted just 4.0 innings before Jimmy Key made his first appearance of the 1992 playoffs. Ruben Sierra homered and drove in three runs for the A's. Devon White notched three hits on the day, including a double, in the losing effort.

GAME \#6: Toronto scored a pair of runs in the 1st inning on a Joe Carter home run off A's starter Mike Moore. The Blue Jays then added four more runs in the 3rd, including a Candy Maldonado three-run homer to put Toronto ahead, 6-0. Blue Jays starter Juan Guzman went seven innings, allowing just five hits and striking out eight before the ball was handed to Duane Ward in the 8th with the score Toronto 7, Oakland 1. The A's managed a run in the top of the 8th but the home town Blue Jays secured the win as Tom Henke tossed a perfect 9th, sending Toronto to its first ever World Series with a 9-2 win.

## WORLD SERIES

## TORONTO VS. ATLANTA (W, 4-2)

GAME \#1: In the first game of the 89th World Series, the Blue Jays suffered a 3-1 loss to the Atlanta Braves. Home runs were the story of the game as Toronto took an early 1-0 lead in the 4th inning on a Joe Carter solo homer off starter Tom Glavine. However, that was the only run Toronto scored. Jack Morris continued his shutout innings streak vs. the Braves, extending it to 18.0 innings until a three-run homer by catcher Damon Berryhill in the 6th inning ended the streak. Glavine went the distance for the Braves to become the first pitcher to toss a complete game in a World Series opener since Jack Morris accomplished the feat in 1984 vs. San Diego.

GAME \#2: Reserve catcher Ed Sprague proved to be the hero for the Blue Jays on this night at Fulton County Stadium. David Cone lasted just 4.1 innings, allowing four runs before exiting in favour of David Wells. Cone, however, contributed at the plate before being lifted with a pair of hits and an RBI. His two hits marked the first two-hit game by an AL pitcher in the World Series since Mickey Lolitch went 2-for-4 on October 3,1968 . Heading into the 8th inning, the Blue Jays trailed, 4-2. Following a run in the top of the 8th, Toronto entered the final inning trailing by one. After a Pat Borders fly out, rookie Derek Bell (pinch-hitting for Manuel Lee) walked. Ed Sprague, pinch-hitting for pitcher Duane Ward, then knocked a first-pitch offering from Jeff Reardon over the left-field fence to put the Blue Jays ahead, 5-4. Tom Henke was able to retire the Braves in the bottom of the 9th for the save.

GAME \#3: The game marked the first time the World Series had been played outside of the United States as the series moved to SkyDome. In another pitching duel, Steve Avery and Juan Guzman both went 8.0 innings. Atlanta was kept off the board in the 4 th with a splendid defensive effort. Devon White ran down a deep drive off the bat of David Justice that sent him into the wall to make the catch. White returned the ball to the infield where Terry Pendleton was doubled-up off first. The Blue Jays drew first blood in the bottom of the 4th inning as Joe Carter connected for his second homer of the series, a solo shot putting Toronto ahead 1-0. In the 6th inning, the Braves rallied to tie things at 1-1. Each team traded runs in the 8th, keeping the game knotted at 2-2. The Braves attempted a rally as Duane Ward came on to pitch the 9th. But after a key double play and a strikeout, the inning was over. In the home half of the 9th, Roberto Alomar led off with a single. After stealing second and a Dave Winfield sacrifice, Alomar stood at third with one out. Jeff Reardon came in to try to halt the Blue Jays' advance, but Candy Maldonado, with the bases loaded, hit a two-strike pitch to right-center field for a base hit, allowing Alomar to score the winning run.

GAME \#4: In what was the third consecutive one-run game of the 1992 World Series, the Blue Jays posted a 2-1 win behind a strong pitching effort from starter Jimmy Key. Key went 7.2 innings, allowing just five hits and one earned run while striking out six Braves batters. Toronto earned its first run in the 3rd inning as catcher Pat Borders continued his postseason hit streak with a solo homer to left. The Jays doubled their lead in the 7th as Devon White drove in Kelly Gruber from second base. Atlanta managed to score a run in their half of the 8th as Ron Gant led off with a double and eventually scored on a Mark Lemke groundout. Tom Henke came in to pitch the 9th for Toronto and tacked up a 1-2-3 inning for his second save of the series.

GAME \#5: The game began in similar fashion as the previous four. Entering the 5th inning, the contest was tied, 2-2. The Braves had collected a run in the 1st and 4th innings while the Blue Jays captured runs in the 2 nd and the 4th. The 5th frame went the way of the Braves as they crossed the plate five times to seal the victory and send the series back south for at least one more game. The Braves' half of the 5th inning began with two consecutive routine outs. An Otis Nixon single got the ball rolling and the Braves eventually loaded the bases on Toronto starter Jack Morris. Lonnie Smith stepped up to the plate and sent Morris' 1-2 offering over the right field wall for a grand slam, making the score 7-2. The score remained the same over the final four innings, making a winner out of John Smoltz.


GAME \#6: The Toronto Blue Jays made history as they captured their first ever World Series to bring the Commissioner's Trophy outside of the United States for the first time. The 11 -inning contest began with the Blue Jays scoring in the opening inning. Devon White led off the game with a single off starter Steve Avery. After a stolen base and a ground out by Alomar, White stood on third. Carter then drove him in with a sacrifice fly. Atlanta answered the call in its half of the 3rd as Deon Sanders scored his fourth run of the series. Toronto returned the favour immediately as it regained the lead with a run in the top of the 4th on a Candy Maldonado homer. The score remained that way until the bottom of the 9th when Atlanta shortstop Jeff Blauser tied the game, sending it into extra innings. The 10th inning proved to be uneventful. In the eleventh, the Blue Jays led off with Jimmy Key popping up for out number one. Devon White was hit by a Charlie Leibrandt offering. Alomar then singled to center, allowing White to move up to second. With two out, Dave Winfield stepped up to the plate and doubled down the left-field line, allowing White and Alomar to score for the 4-2 advantage. In the bottom of the 11th, Atlanta was able to score once with Key on the mound. Mike Timlin then came in to pitch for the Blue Jays with pinch-runner Smoltz on third and two out. Otis Nixon attempted a drag-bunt up the first-base line, which was fielded by Timlin who threw to Carter at first in time for the final out.

## AMERICAN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

## TORONTO VS. CHICAGO (W, 4-2)

GAME \#1: The Blue Jays took a 2-0 lead in the 4th inning when third baseman Ed Sprague tripled to right field with John Olerud and Paul Molitor on base. Chicago then used its half of the inning to produce three runs on two hits as they sent nine men to the plate. Toronto starter Juan Guzman managed to hold the White Sox in check for six innings but walked eight batters and stranded 11 runners before exiting with a 5-3 lead. Jack McDowell lasted 6.2 innings, allowing 13 hits and all seven Toronto runs before the White Sox relief corps came on to hold Toronto for the remainder of the game. Danny Cox worked a scoreless 7th and 8th while allowing a lone single to Ozzie Guillen. Duane Ward came out for the 9th and walked the first two batters before striking out the side to end the Chicago threat.

GAME \#2: Both clubs scored once in the opening inning, but it was the Blue Jays who prevailed as their two-run 4th provided the edge. The 3-1 win saw Toronto take a two games to none lead in the best-of-seven series. The 4th inning started with a pair of outs by Joe Carter and John Olerud. Paul Molitor then doubled off starter and loser Alex Fernandez. Next, Tony Fernandez singled to score Molitor and moved to second on the throw home. After an intentional walk to Ed Sprague, Pat Borders singled to second base but Joey Cora threw the ball away, allowing the third Toronto run to score. Dave Stewart worked six strong innings, surrendering just four hits (all singles) and one run for his seventh career ALCS win against no losses. Al Leiter was credited with a hold as he pitched the 7th and 8th innings before closer Duane Ward came in to save the game in the 9th.

GAME \#3: Nineteen-game winner Pat Hentgen started for Toronto but could not collect a win on this day as Toronto suffered its worst defeat of the series, losing 6-1. The Blue Jays were able to hold off the White Sox attack until the third inning when they sent 10 players to the plate and combined for five runs on five singles. Hentgen lasted just three innings plus two batters before he was removed in favour of Danny Cox. Toronto scored their lone run in the bottom of the 3rd as Rickey Henderson scored from third on a Devon White single. Wilson Alvarez, the Chicago starter, pitched a complete game for his first career ALCS victory as he allowed seven hits while issuing two walks and striking out six. Tim Raines provided most of the offensive support for Chicago, going 4-for-5 with a run scored.

GAME \#4: A two-run home run by center fielder Lance Johnson in the 2nd inning gave the White Sox a 2-0 lead over the Blue Jays. The light-hitting Johnson had not hit a home run since the 1992 regular season. Todd Stottlemyre, making his first start of the 1993 ALCS, lasted six innings for the home team but failed to hold onto a 3-2 lead that was handed to him in the 3rd when Toronto batted around on rookie starter Jason Bere. The right hander lasted just 2.1 innings before being pulled in favour of Tim Belcher. Stottlemyre allowed three more Chicago runs in the 6th, including a Frank Thomas solo homer and a Lance Johnson triple before departing. Roberto Alomar doubled home Henderson in the bottom of the 6th to cut the Chicago lead to $5-4$, but the visiting White Sox added a single run off AI Leiter in the 7 th and another off Mike Timlin in the 9th to seal the win by a 7-4 margin.

GAME \#5: As was the case with each of the previous four games, the team that scored first emerged victorious. This time, Toronto scored the opening run when Rickey Henderson crossed the plate in the 1 st inning after leading off the game with a double and a stolen base. Starting pitcher Jack McDowell allowed a Toronto run in the 2nd and 3rd before being lifted through just 2.1 innings. Meanwhile, Blue Jays starter Juan Guzman cruised through the first 4.1 innings without allowing a hit or a walk until Ellis Burks went deep to left field for what was the only blemish on Guzman's slate that afternoon. He lasted seven innings, permitting just two hits while walking one and striking out six. Roberto Alomar reached base in all five plate appearances (three hits, two walks) to lead the Toronto attack. Tony Castillo worked a scoreless 8th, allowing a single and a base on balls. Duane Ward had some difficulty in the 9th. He struck out Joey Cora and Frank Thomas following a single to lead off the inning by Tim Raines. The righty then issued a two-run homer to Robin Ventura that brought Chicago within two. With the tying run at the plate, Ward struck out Bo Jackson to end the game and preserve the 5-3 Toronto win.

GAME \#6: With his 7-0 record in ALCS play on the line, Blue Jays starter Dave Stewart provided the win which put Toronto into their second consecutive World Series as the Jays won, 6-3, over the White Sox. Toronto scored first with a pair of runs in the 2nd inning as a two-out single by catcher Pat Borders off Alex Fernandez cashed in John Olerud and Paul Molitor. The White Sox tied the game in the following frame when a bases-loaded walk by Frank Thomas and a fielder's choice by Robin Ventura scored two runs. Stewart managed to restrict the White Sox to just four hits and two earned runs before handing Duane Ward a 3-2 lead after 7.1 innings. Ward struck out the final two batters to end the eighth. The Blue Jays added to their lead as Devon White homered off reliever Scott Radinsky to make it a 4-2 contest. Toronto added two more runs before the inning was over as Paul Molitor tripled to center. Ward allowed his second home run of the series as Warren Newson hit a solo shot in the bottom of the 9th, but that was all the scoring that the Pale Hose could muster as the Blue Jays were crowned American League Champions for the second straight season.

## TORONTO VS. PHILADELPHIA (W, 4-2)

GAME \#1: For the first time in baseball annals, the World Series began on Canadian soil. The Blue Jays fell behind 2-0 in the 1st inning as Phillies catcher Darren Daulton singled home a pair of runs off starting pitcher Juan Guzman. After holding Philadelphia in check in the top of the 2nd, Toronto rallied with two runs of its own on four singles off Curt Schilling. Both teams traded solo runs in the 3rd and 5th to keep the score knotted at 4-4. With one out in the bottom of the 6th, John Olerud took a first-pitch offering from Schilling over the right-field fence for a solo home run, putting Toronto ahead by one. Toronto scored what proved to be the winning run in the bottom of the 7 th as four consecutive hits by Borders, Henderson, White and Alomar produced an 8-4 lead heading into the 8th. Al Leiter, who went on to be the winning pitcher, relieved Guzman to start the 6th and held the Phillies scoreless over 2.2 innings before turning the ball over to closer Duane Ward. Ward surrendered a run in the final inning as a Jim Eisenreich single scored John Kruk, who had led off the frame with a single and moved to second on an error. Ricky Jordan flied out to Joe Carter for the last out to put Toronto ahead, one game to none, with the 8-5 win.

GAME \#2: The big inning turned out to the Philly advantage on this night as a Jim Eisenreich three-run homer in the top of the 3rd capped a five-run frame that saw eight Philadelphia batters step up to the plate. Toronto starter and eventual loser, Dave Stewart, lasted six innings with all five earned runs coming in that third frame. Toronto answered the Philly onslaught with a pair of runs in the bottom of the 4th as Joe Carter connected for his first of two World Series home runs. Philadelphia starter Terry Mulholland allowed just three runs over 5.2 innings before handing the ball to the bullpen. Lenny Dykstra led off the 7 th inning with a solo homer off reliever Tony Castillo to stretch the Philly lead to three as the visitors were now ahead, 6-3. Toronto scored a lone run in the 8th as Paul Molitor led off with a double and eventually scored on a John Olerud sac fly. Philly relievers Roger Mason ( 1.2 innings) and Mitch Williams ( 1.2 innings) closed out the game to preserve the 6-4 win and even the series.

GAME \#3: The venue moved from SkyDome to Veteran's Stadium in Philadelphia for the next three contests. This game featured solid pitching by the Blue Jays combined with a potent offence. The visiting Blue Jays jumped on Philly starter Danny Jackson in the top of the 1st as Paul Molitor drove home a pair of runs with a triple. He later scored on a Carter sacrifice fly to right field. Molitor added a solo homer in the 3rd to make it 4-0. Starting pitcher Pat Hentgen pitched six innings and allowed just one run, that coming in the 6th as a two-out single by Eisenreich scored John Kruk who had reached base via a walk. The Blue Jays added another run in the top of the 6th as Roberto Alomar scored on a sac fly, after reaching base on a single and stealing second and third. Toronto continued to add to their lead as they scored three more runs in the 7th off reliever Ben Rivera Alomar finished the night with four hits while Molitor had three of his own to go along with three runs and three RBI. Duane Ward surrendered a solo homer to Milt Thompson in the 9th to make the final score Toronto 10, Philadelphia 3.

GAME \#4: In a slugfest, the Blue Jays put together one of the wildest comebacks in World Series history to beat the Phillies, 15-14, and take a 3-1 series lead. Toronto opened the scoring with three runs in the 1 st off Philly starter Tommy Greene. But the home team then took advantage of four 1st-inning walks by starter Todd Stottlemyre as they scored four times to move ahead, 4-3. Philadelphia added two more runs to their tally as Lenny Dykstra connected for his second homer of the series, a two-run shot in the next inning. The Blue Jays batted around in the 3rd and collected four runs to send Greene to the bench in favour of Roger Mason. Philadelphia then posted a five-run 5th that included home runs from Dykstra and Daulton to extend its lead to 12-7. Toronto countered with two runs in the top of the 6th as White and Alomar scored on a single and a ground out. The Phillies then added a run in the 6th and another in the 7th to make the score 14-9. However, the Phillies relief corps could not hold Toronto from making a comeback. In the top of the 8th, the Blue Jays sent 10 players to the plate. Devon White's triple with two out scored Pat Borders and Rickey Henderson to put Toronto ahead, 15-14. Mike Timlin started the 8th and struck out the first two batters he faced before Duane Ward came on to strikeout Dykstra to end the inning. In the 9th, Ward hurled a 1-2-3 inning for his second save of the series in a game that took four hours and 14 minutes to play and was the highest scoring game in World Series history. Tony Fernandez had five RBI in the game while White had four.

GAME \#5: Curt Schilling shutout Toronto, 2-0, in what was the second ever shutout of the Jays in the postseason. Pitted against Blue Jays ace Juan Guzman, he allowed just five hits (all singles) and struck out six Toronto batters for his first World Series win. The Phillies scored the only run they needed in the 1st inning when Dykstra, who had walked to lead off the game, scored on a John Kruk groundout. They added a second run in the very next inning as a pair of doubles cashed in Derren Daulton. In the eighth, the Blue Jays threatened with a pair of runners on base but a strikeout by Devon White, followed by a Roberto Alomar ground out, ended their attempt. Guzman was equal to the challenge as he went seven innings, allowing both Philly runs while fanning six. The win sent the series back to Toronto with the Blue Jays holding a 3-2 edge.

GAME \#6: Toronto started their quest for a second straight World Series Championship early as they notched three runs off Philly starter Terry Mulholland in the bottom of the 1st inning. A run in the 4th and a solo home run by Molitor in the 5th put Toronto up 5-1. Dave Stewart, the Toronto starter, held the Phillies to just one run over his first six innings. In the seventh, he surrendered a three-run homer to Lenny Dykstra, which was his fourth home run of the series. That led to Stewart being pulled from the game. Reliever Danny Cox came in with none out and surrendered two more runs before the Phillies were halted by Al Leiter. The damage had been done and Philadelphia was now leading, 6-5. After leaving the bases loaded in the 8th, Toronto made World Series history by erasing a one-run lead in the bottom of the ninth. Mitch Williams came in to start the inning and walked Rickey Henderson who led off. After a Devon White fly out, Molitor singled to centre to put runners at first and second. Right fielder Joe Carter then stepped up to the plate. On a 2-2 offering from Williams, Carter homered over the left-field wall for a three-run home run and propelled Toronto to its second consecutive World Series Championship with an 8-6 win.


## DIVISION SERIES

## TORONTO VS. TEXAS (W, 3-2)

GAME \#1: In Toronto's first post-season game since 1993, the team found itself down early as Texas got on the board first, scoring two runs in the 3rd inning. The Rangers then opened up a 4-1 lead after a two-run home run by Robinson Chirinos in the top of the 5th. Jose Bautista cut the lead to $4-3$, hitting a solo home run in the 6 th inning. That was as close as the Blue Jays came though, as Rougned Odor added his own solo shot in the 7th inning to seal a 5-3 victory for Yovani Gallardo and the Rangers.

GAME \#2: Both teams got on the board early as starters Cole Hamels and Marcus Stroman each allowed three runs over the first two innings. Toronto held a 4-3 lead entering the 8th inning until pinch-hitter Mike Napoli singled off of reliever Brett Cecil to score Delino DeShields to even the score at 4-4. The game remained tied until the 14th inning when the Blue Jays bullpen allowed two runs on four consecutive hits with two out in the inning. Toronto failed to respond in their half of the frame, giving the Rangers a commanding 2-0 series lead with the series heading to Texas.

GAME \#3: With their team facing elimination, Troy Tulowitzki and Marco Estrada each put together remarkable performances to force a fourth game, after a Blue Jays 5-1 win over Texas. Tulowitzki collected four RBI in the contest, including a three-run home run in the 6th inning to put Toronto ahead, 5-0. Starter Marco Estrada allowed just one run on five hits over 6.1 innings pitched to record the win, the team's first in the postseason since Game 6 of the 1993 World Series.

GAME \#4: Toronto took charge early, building a 7-0 lead behind starter R. A. Dickey, hitting three home runs off of Texas' Derek Holland before chasing him from the game in the 3rd inning. With two on in the 5th, Dickey exited the game with a 7-1 lead and David Price entered the game in relief. Despite allowing three runs over his 3.0 innings pitched, Price secured the win for Toronto, with Kevin Pillar adding three RBI in the 8-4 victory to send the series back to Rogers Centre.

GAME \#5: Facing their third straight elimination game, the Blue Jays found themselves down early after starter Marcus Stroman allowed two runs over the first three innings. Toronto cut into the lead with one run on a Jose Bautista RBI double in the 2nd frame. The score remained 2-1 until the 6th when Edwin Encarnacion connected for a solo blast to tie the game at two. The Rangers retook the lead in the next frame after the ball struck the bat of Shin Soo Choo during Russell Martin's throw back to pitcher Aaron Sanchez. The ball deflected up the third baseline, allowing Rougned Odor to score from third. Although initially sent back to third, after much deliberation between umpires and both managers, John Gibbons and Jeff Bannister, the run stood, allowing the Rangers to take a 3-2 lead with the Blue Jays playing the game under protest. In the bottom of the 7th, Toronto's first three batters reached base following three consecutive errors by Rangers infielders. Josh Donaldson tied the game, hitting a sac fly to score Kevin Pillar. With two on and one out, Jose Bautista hit a three-run home run to put Toronto ahead, 6-3. Relievers Aaron Sanchez and Roberto Osuna held the Rangers scoreless over the next two innings to secure the team's third consecutive win and claim the series, 3-2.

## AMERICAN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

## TORONTO VS. KANSAS CITY (L, 2-4)

GAME \#1: The Blue Jays opened the second round of the playoffs by being shutout by the Royals in Kansas City. Toronto starter Marco Estrada allowed three runs over his 5.1 innings, including a solo home run by Salvador Perez in the 4th. The Toronto offense was stymied by KC starter Edinson Volquez and the Royals bullpen, being held to just three hits in the game. Kansas City added two more runs late in the game to secure a $5-0$ victory and a 1-0 series lead.

GAME \#2: Looking to tie the series at one game apiece, Toronto turned to David Price in Game 2. The Blue Jays starter cruised through the first six innings, retiring 18 consecutive batters at one point to set a new club playoff record. With the Blue Jays leading 3-0 in the 7th, the Royals bats came alive, scoring five runs off of Price. Kansas City tacked on another run in the 8th inning to take a commanding 6-3 lead. The Blue Jays left nine men on base and were shutout over the final 3.2 innings by the Royals bullpen.

GAME \#3: Trailing 1-0 after the 1st inning, Toronto rallied and tagged Kansas City starter Johnny Cueto for eight runs, chasing him from the game in the 3rd. The Blue Jays took a 9-2 lead after a six-run 3rd inning, highlighted by a Troy Tulowitzki three-run home run and a two-run shot by Josh Donaldson. Toronto went on to add two more runs, including a solo home run by Ryan Goins, joining Donaldson and Tulowitzki as the only trio of Blue Jays teammates to each record three RBI in a single playoffs game in club history. The Royals struck for four runs in the 9th inning, but Toronto held on for an 11-8 victory.

GAME \#4: Toronto starter R.A. Dickey lasted only 1.2 innings, the shortest start by any Blue Jays starter in franchise postseason history, after allowing five runs, including four in the opening frame. The Jays plated two in the 4th off of KC starter Chris Young, the only runs they scored in the contest. Kansas City added nine runs over the final three innings to trounce the Blue Jays, 14-2, in a game that saw Toronto infielder Cliff Pennington enter the game as a reliever to record the final out of the eighth inning, becoming the first position player to pitch in the MLB postseason.

GAME \#5: Manager John Gibbons turned to Marco Estrada in hopes of keeping the season alive. Estrada did not disappoint, allowing just one run on three hits over 7.2 innings. Toronto held a one-run lead entering the 6 th frame before breaking out for four runs in the inning, with three of those runs driven in by a Troy Tulowitzki double. Toronto added two more runs in the game while the bullpen held the Royals to just one hit over the final 1.1 innings of the game to secure the victory and send the series back to Kanas City.

GAME \#6: In their fifth elimination game of the postseason, Toronto found itself down 2-0 after two innings as starter David Price surrendered two solo home runs. A solo shot by Jose Bautista in 4th cut the Jays' deficit in half. The Royals added another in the 7th inning before Bautista answered back with a two-run home run to tie the game, $3-3$, in the 7th inning, becoming the first Blue Jay in franchise history to record a multi-home run game in the postseason. Kansas City retook the lead in the top of the 8th as Eric Hosmer singled off of Roberto Osuna to drive home Lorenzo Cain for the 4-3 advantage. In the top of the 9th, Toronto had runners on second and third with none out but failed to drive home either runner as Wade Davis struck out two before inducing a groundout by Josh Donaldson to end the series.

## TORONTO VS. BALTIMORE (W, 1-0)

After clinching a playoff berth on the final day of the regular season, Toronto found itself hosting the club's first ever Wild Card game vs. the Orioles. The Blue Jays opened the scoring in the 2nd inning, courtesy of a Jose Bautista solo shot off of Baltimore starter Chris Tillman. The Orioles then took the lead in the following frame on a two-run home run by Mark Trumbo off of Toronto starter Marcus Stroman. In the bottom of the 5th, Ezequiel Carrera singled to drive home Michael Saunders, who doubled to open the frame. The game remained tied at two, forcing extra innings. In the bottom of the 11th inning, with two runners on and one out, Edwin Encarnacion hit a three-run walk-off home run off of Ubaldo Jimenez to send the Blue Jays to the ALDS.

## DIVISION SERIES

## TORONTO VS. TEXAS (W, 3-0)

GAME \#1: A rematch of the 2015 ALDS saw Toronto square-off at Texas. The game remained scoreless until the 3rd inning when the Blue Jays scored five runs with two outs, highlighted by a three-run triple by Troy Tulowitzki. Toronto added two more runs in the 4th and another three in the 9th, courtesy of a Jose Bautista three-run home run. Blue Jays starter Marco Estrada tossed eight scoreless innings before allowing a run in the 9 th ( $8.1 \mathrm{IP}, 4 \mathrm{H}, 6 \mathrm{~K}$ ), leading the Jays to a 10-1 victory and a 1-0 series lead.

GAME \#2: Looking to go up 2-0 in the ALDS, the Blue Jays struck first, opening the scoring in the 2nd inning on a two-run home run by Troy Tulowitzki. The Rangers got a run back in the 4th to cut Toronto's lead to one. The Blue Jays answered with three solo shots by Kevin Pillar, Ezequiel Carrera, and Edwin Encarnacion, off of Rangers starter Yu Darvish in the 5th inning to take a four-run lead. It marked the first time in club history to hit three home runs in a single inning in postseason play. Those five runs were all Toronto needed, winning the game, 5-3, to push Texas to the brink of elimination.

GAME \#3: For the first time in the series the Blue Jays found themselves trailing in a game, after the Rangers opened the scoring by plating a run in the 1st inning. By the end of the inning the Jays found themselves, once again, in the lead, this time by a 3-1 score after a two-run home run by Edwin Encarnacion and a Russell Martin solo shot. The two teams each struck again in the 3rd frame, with Texas adding another run, courtesy of an Elvis Andrus home run, and the Blue Jays responding with another two of their own. The Rangers then took a 6-5 lead in the top of the 6th inning, having scored all six runs off of Toronto starter Aaron Sanchez. The Blue Jays once again tied the contest up in their half of the inning, with Troy Tulowtizki scoring on a passed ball. Both teams failed to plate another run, forcing the game into extra innings. In the bottom of the 10th, Josh Donaldson led off with a double, followed by an Edwin Encarnacion intentional walk. Two batters later, Russell Martin grounded into a fielder's choice with Donaldson moving up to third base on the play. On the throwing error by Texas second baseman Rougned Odor, Donaldson scored to win the game in a walk-off to sweep the series, 3-0.

## AMERICAN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

## TORONTO VS. CLEVELAND (L, 1-4)

GAME \#1: For the second consecutive season Toronto found itself in the ALCS, facing the Indians in a playoff series for the first time in club history. The game remained scoreless until the 6th inning when Francisco Lindor hit a two-run home run off of Marco Estrada. Those two runs were the only ones scored in the game, with Toronto falling, 2-0, in the opening game. Estrada recorded his first career complete game in the loss, joining Jack Morris as the only Blue Jays pitchers in team history to throw a complete game in the postseason.

GAME \#2: The Blue Jays once again found themselves trailing Cleveland after the Indians scored a run in the 2nd inning. Toronto tied the game in the following frame before seeing the lead relinquished in the bottom of the 3rd. The Blue Jays could muster only three hits in the contest, falling 2-1 in the game and into an 0-2 hole in the ALCS for a second straight year.

GAME \#3: For the third consecutive game, the Indians opened the scoring, taking a 1-0 lead after the 1st inning. The Blue Jays responded in the 2nd, scoring a run of their own against the Cleveland bullpen, as starter Trevor Bauer was removed from the game after throwing only 21 pitches, which was due to a significant finger injury. After both teams exchanged runs, the Indians took the lead for good, scoring two more runs in the 6th off of Toronto starter Marcus Stroman. It marked the first time in franchise history that the Blue Jays found themselves down 0-3 in a post-season series.

GAME \#4: Facing elimination for the second time in the playoffs, Toronto turned to Aaron Sanchez to keep their playoff hopes alive. For the first time in the series, the Blue Jays scored first and had their first lead of the ALCS. Cleveland cut their lead to 2-1 after the 5th inning. That would be as close as they would get with Sanchez allowing only two hits over his 6.0 innings of work. The Jays added two runs in the 7th on an Edwin Encarnacion bases-loaded single. They then tacked on one more in the 8th via a sacrifice fly from Kevin Pillar to take the game, 5-1.

GAME \#5: For the fourth time over the five games, Cleveland jumped out to an early lead after scoring an unearned run in the 1st inning. Rookie Ryan Merritt shut the Toronto offense down for 4.1 innings, allowing only two hits. The Indians scored two more runs, both solo home runs off of Marco Estrada. The Blue Jays failed to muster any sort of offense, falling 3-0 in the game and 4-1 in the series.


## WILD CARD

## TORONTO VS. TAMPA BAY (L, 0-2)

GAME \#1: Holding a 32-28 record after a shortened 60-game season, the Blue Jays returned to the postseason as the 8th seed in the American League. In the new 16-team playoff format, Toronto travelled to Tampa Bay for the entirety of the best-of-three Wild Card Series. The Jays outhit the Rays, 5-4, in Game 1 but were handed a 3-1 loss. Rowdy Tellez had a pinch-hit single and scored the team's lone run on a Bo Bichette sacrifice fly in the 8th inning.

GAME \#2: The Rays used a six-run 2 nd inning to power their way to an $8-2$ victory and the series sweep. Mike Zunino hit a two-run homer and Hunter Renfroe belted a grand slam to cap Tampa Bay's 2nd-inning surge. Both of Toronto's runs came off of the bat of Danny Jansen, as he joined Jose Bautista as the only players in franchise history to record a multi-homer game in the playoffs.

## 2022

## WILD CARD

TORONTO VS. SEATTLE (L, 0-2)
GAME \#1: The Blue Jays reached the playoffs with 92 wins and the top Wild Card spot, playing host to the Mariners for the best-of-three series in a revamped, 12-team, postseason format. Luis Castillo make his mark for the M's as he tossed 7.1 shutout frames, leading to a 4-0 Seattle victory. Matt Chapman managed Toronto's only extra-base hit as he went 2-for-4 with a double.

GAME \#2: Toronto built up an 8-1 lead through five innings but was eventually ousted from the postseason as Seattle came back for a 10-9 win. The Blue Jays' offense was largely driven by Teoscar Hernández who belted a pair of home runs to finish 2-for-4 with four RBI and three runs scored. He joined Jose Bautista and Danny Jansen as the only players in franchise history to record a multi-homer game in the postseason.

## WILD CARD

## TORONTO VS. MINNESOTA (L, 0-2)

GAME \#1: Toronto finished the regular season with 89 wins and the final American League Wild Card spot, enough for a best-of-three series in Minnesota. The Blue Jays kept the Twins to a total of five hits in Game 1, but ultimately fell by a 3-1 final. Kevin Kiermaier drove in Toronto's lone run as he finished 2 -for-3 with a walk.

GAME \#2: The Blue Jays managed to generate nine hits but were blanked, 2-0, by Sonny Gray and five Twins relievers. Bo Bichette recorded his second multi-hit game of the series while Santiago Espinal, Alejandro Kirk, and George Springer all chipped in with a pair of singles each. Minnesota shortstop Carlos Correa had the club's lone RBI of the day, squeaking a bases-loaded single up the middle for the go-ahead run in the 4th inning.

Toronto's 16 -inning contest at Cleveland to begin the 2012 season was the longest Opening Day game in Major League history. The Blue Jays won, 7-4, in 16 innings after J.P. Arencibia broke the tie with a three-run home run.

## NATIONAL BASEBALL HALL OF FAME



Roberto Alomar

## SECOND BASEMAN

On July 24, 2011, Roberto Alomar was enshrined to the Baseball Hall of Fame. The second basemen was just the third Puerto Rican inductee, and the first Hall of Famer to be inducted as a member of the Toronto Blue Jays.
In five seasons with the Blue Jays from 1991 through 1995, Alomar displayed sparkling defense while winning five straight Gold Gloves. He was part of both World Series clubs, batting .373 across his 29 playoff games as a Blue Jay.
Alomar never hit less than .295 while with Toronto and finished third in the American League behind teammates John Olerud and Paul Molitor with a . 326 average in 1993. His five-year mark of .307 gives him the highest lifetime average of any player in Blue Jays history.
Over the course of his 17-year Major League career, Alomar hit . 300 with a .371 on-base percentage. He totaled 2,724 hits, 1,508 runs, 504 doubles, 80 triples, 210 home runs, 474 stolen bases, and 1,134 RBI.


## Tom Cheek

BLUE JAYS RADIO BROADCASTER
On July 27, 2013, Tom Cheek was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame as the 2013 recipient of the Ford C. Frick Award. This award is presented annually for excellence in broadcasting by the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum.

Cheek, who passed away on October 9, 2005, called the first 4,306 regular-season and 41 postseason games in Toronto Blue Jays history, including the club's two World Series victories, from Toronto's first contest until June 2, 2004. His wife, Shirley Cheek, was on hand with her family to accept the 2013 Ford C. Frick award for broadcasting excellence on behalf of her husband.
"Tom Cheek was the voice of summer for generations of baseball fans in Canada and beyond," said Hall of Fame President Jeff Idelson. "He helped a nation understand the elements of the game and swoon for the summer excitement that the expansion franchise brought a hockey-crazed nation starting in the late 1970s. He then authored the vocal narrative of a team that evolved into one of the most consistent clubs of the 1980s and 1990s. We are thrilled to celebrate Tom's legacy with baseball broadcasting's highest honour."
His call of Joe Carter's World Series-winning home run in Game 6 of the 1993 Fall Classic - "Touch 'em all, Joe! You'll never hit a bigger home run in your life." - quickly became embedded in the hearts of Blue Jays fans around the globe.


## Roy Halladay

## PITCHER

Eight-time All-Star Roy Halladay had his number raised to the rafters in a pregame Opening Day ceremony on March 29, 2018.

Doc's wife, Brandy, and two sons, Braden and Ryan, took the field with former Blue Jays players, Pat Hentgen, Chris Carpenter, Paul Quantrill, Scott Rolen, Jose Cruz Jr., Jason Fraser, Paul Spoljaric and Cito Gaston for the ceremony.
Halladay, who passed away in a plane crash on November 7, 2017, had his number 32 displayed as a commemorative patch on the left sleeve of all Blue Jays uniforms throughout the 2018 season.
"Through Roy's values, pride, work ethic, and perseverance, he epitomized what it means to be a Blue Jay. And while his legacy is clear, it goes far beyond the number on his back or his on-field accomplishments, serving as a shining example of how to live a meaningful life and positively impact others."

The recipients of this prestigious award are as follows: JOSÉ BAUTISTA (August 12, 2023), PAUL BEESTON (April 4, 2008), GEORGE BELL (April 9, 1996), JOE CARTER (July 30, 1999), TOM CHEEK (August 29, 2004), CARLOS DELGADO (July 21, 2013), TONY FERNANDEZ (September 23, 2001), CITO GASTON (July 30, 1999), PAT GILLICK (August 7, 2002), ROY HALLADAY (March 29, 2018), and DAVE STIEB (April 9, 1996).

## José Bautista <br> OUTFIELDER



JOSÉ BAUTISTA, was acquired by the Blue Jays on August 21, 2008, and soon became a household name and the cornerstone of the organization for the next decade. He set a single-season franchise record with an MLB-high 54 home runs in 2010, a season that saw him win three American League Player of the Week Awards and claim two American League Player of the Month bids while being named an All-Star for the first time in his career. From 2010 to 2015, Bautista hit more home runs than any other player while winning three Silver Slugger Awards (2010, 2011, 2014) and appearing in six straight MLB All-Star Games (2010-2015). For all his regular season success, the outfielder's biggest mark was made in 2015 as the club returned to the postseason for the first time in 22 years. During Game 5 of the 2015 ALDS against the Texas Rangers, Bautista's 7th-inning tie-breaking three-run home run and subsequent bat flip shook the foundation of Rogers Centre and brought the entire country to its feet. "Joey Bats" finished his 15-year Major League career with 344 homers and 975 RBI. He still ranks top-five in Blue Jays history in games (1,235), runs (790), home runs (288), RBI (766), walks (803), OBP (.372), SLG (.506), and OPS (.878).


## Paul Beeston

## CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

PAUL BEESTON, a Welland, ON. native, is one of the Toronto Blue Jays founding fathers. He was the first employee of the Toronto Blue Jays, joining the club on May 10, 1976, only a month and a half after the granting of the Franchise. He became Vice-President of Business Operations in 1977, Executive Vice-President, Business in 1984, President and Chief Operating Officer in 1989 and Chief Executive Officer in 1991. His hard work and dedication have been recognized by many and in 1988, was named a Member of the Order of Canada. He was elected to the Board of Directors of the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1998 and was inducted into the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame in 2002. From 1997 until 2002, Paul was President \& COO of Major League Baseball in New York City. He then returned to Toronto in 2002 and served on the board of a number of philanthropic endeavours. On October 14, 2008, he was appointed CEO of the Toronto Blue Jays on an interim basis, responsible for the day-to-day operations of the baseball club and Rogers Centre. On October 27, 2009, he had the interim tag lifted and was appointed CEO of the Toronto Blue Jays and Rogers Centre. Following the 2015 season, Paul retired as Mark Shapiro replaced him as President \& CEO of the Toronto Blue Jays and Rogers Centre.


## George Bell

OUTFIELDER
GEORGE BELL spent nine seasons with Toronto and ranks 3rd in club history in total bases $(2,201), \mathrm{RBI}(740)$ and extra base hits $(471)$. He is one of six players in the Club's history to have hit at least 200 home runs as a Blue Jay, ranking 6th with 202. In 1987, he was named the American League MVP, the first Blue Jay in club history to achieve the honour. That season he batted .308 with 47 home runs and 134 RBI. Made his first of two All-Star appearances in 1987 when he became the first Blue Jay ever voted to the starting lineup. During his nine seasons, was a four-time club MVP, the Sporting News AL and Major League Player of the Year in 1987, a three-time Sporting News Silver Slugger, a two-time Sporting News AllStar team selection and the American League Player of the Week eight times. He also set a Major League record, hitting three home runs in an Opening Day game on April 4, 1988 at Kansas City.


## Joe Carter

## OUTFIELDER

JOE CARTER ranks 5th in club history with 203 home runs but will forever be remembered for just one, the 9th-inning blast on October 23 to win the 1993 World Series. In 1,039 games from 1991 to 1997 with Toronto, he hit .257 with 578 runs scored, 218 doubles, 28 triples, 203 home runs, 736 RBI and 78 stolen bases. During his seven seasons he represented Toronto in five All-Star games including 1991 in Toronto, his first season with the Blue Jays after he was acquired from San Diego along with Roberto Alomar on December 5, 1990 in exchange for Tony Fernandez and Fred McGriff. Along with his tremendous on-field accomplishments, Joe and his wife were active off the field as the Diana \& Joe Carter Foundation operated the "Jumpin' with Joe" program which provided needy children throughout the Toronto area with a day at Teen-Ranch, Christian Youth Camp and tickets for a Toronto Blue Jays game where Joe would speak to all of the children. He worked with many other charities including Ronald McDonald House and also hosted an annual charity golf tournament. In his 16-year Major League career, Carter hit . 259 with 432 doubles, 396 homers and 1,445 RBI while playing for the Chicago Cubs (1983), Cleveland Indians (1984-1989), San Diego Padres (1990), Toronto Blue Jays (1991-1997), Baltimore Orioles (1998) and the San Francisco Giants (1998).

## Tom Cheek



## BROADCASTER

TOM CHEEK, who called the first 4,306 regular-season and 41 postseason games in Toronto Blue Jays history, was selected as the 2013 recipient of the Ford C. Frick Award, presented annually for excellence in broadcasting by the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum. Cheek, who passed away after a lengthy and brave battle with brain cancer on Oct. 9, 2005, was honoured as part of Hall of Fame Weekend 2013, July 26-29 in Cooperstown, N.Y. He stood as the radio voice of the Blue Jays and, as one fan wrote, the "soundtrack of summer in Toronto" since the club's inception through 2004. He broadcast 4,306 consecutive regular season games (and 41 postseason contests) from 1977 through the midway point of the 2004 season when he was called away from the booth first by the sudden passing of his father and later by his own personal health problems. The banner in the Level of Excellence bearing his name, first unveiled in formal ceremonies held on August 29, 2004, is adorned with the number 4,306. That pays tribute to his longevity as the iron-man of baseball broadcasting. A veteran of the radio industry, he first joined the Blue Jays prior to the club's inaugural season after spending three seasons working on Montreal Expos broadcasts. Tom had been calling the balls, strikes and home runs starting with Doug Ault's big blasts on Opening Day in 1977. His call of Joe Carter's dramatic home run to win the 1993 World Series - "Touch 'em all, Joe! You'll never hit a bigger home run in your life."- stands as one of the most memorable and famous moments in Canadian sports broadcasting history.

## Carlos Delgado

## FIRST BASEMAN

CARLOS DELGADO made his debut in 1993 and would remain with the club for 12 seasons, finishing as the franchise leader in home runs (336), RBI ( 1,058 ), walks (827), slugging percentage (.556), OPS (.949), runs (889), total bases $(2,786)$, doubles (343), extra base hits (690), times on base ( 2,362 ), hit-by-pitch (122), intentional walks (128) and at-bats per home run (14.9). The two-time All-Star (2000 and 2003) holds several Blue Jays single-season and career records. He won the Hank Aaron Award and Sporting News Player of the Year Award in 2000 and the Silver Slugger Award in 1999, 2000, and 2003. The first baseman finished his 17year career with 473 home runs and $1,512 \mathrm{RBI}$ across 2,035 games.

## Tony Fernandez

## SHORTSTOP

TONY FERNANDEZ is the franchise leader in games $(1,450)$, hits $(1,583)$, triples (72), and ranks 3rd in doubles (291), 3rd in AVG (.297), 4th in stolen bases (172), 5 th in runs $(704)$, 5 th in total bases $(2,198)$, and 6 th in walks $(439)$. He had four separate stints with the Blue Jays totalling 12 seasons and was a member of the 1993 World Series Champions where he led the team with nine RBI and batted .333 in the six World Series games. Fernandez was selected to five All-Star teams, including four with Toronto, and won four straight AL Gold Glove Awards at shortstop from 1986 to 1989 with the Blue Jays. He still ranks 11th on the all-time hits list for a Dominican born player (2,276 total).


Cito Gaston

## MANAGER

CITO GASTON led the Blue Jays to two World Championships, two American League Championships and four American League East titles in nine seasons as the Manager from 1989 to 1997. He began as the Blue Jays' hitting coach in 1981 where he groomed many young players including George Bell, Lloyd Moseby, Cecil Fielder, Jesse Barfield and Fred McGriff. In 1989 he served as the interim manager of the club before he was named the 5th manager in team history on May 31, 1989. Gaston had the honour of managing in two All-Star games, 1993 and 1994. During his years as manager he gave much of his time to charity events throughout Toronto including the annual Cito Gaston Golf Classic. Gaston returned to the Blue Jays for two seasons as hitting coach in 2000 and 2001. He was named Club Ambassador and Special Assistant to the President and CEO, along with former Blue Jay right-hander Pat Hentgen, in early 2007. On June 20, 2008, Gaston was named Manager of the Toronto Blue Jays, his 2nd stint as the club's skipper. In 2010, his last season as manager, he led the Blue Jays to an 85-77 record. Gaston has a club-high 913 victories as the Blue Jays manager (913-851 overall).

## Pat Gillick



## GENERAL MANAGER

PAT GILLICK, who was instrumental in building the organization from an expansion team in 1977 to World Series Champions in 1992 and 1993, was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown on July 24, 2011, along with the player he brought over from San Diego to Toronto, Roberto Alomar. He was the 6th man to be honoured by the Toronto Blue Jays to the Level of Excellence in August of 2002. Gillick began his career with the Blue Jays in 1976 as the VP of Player Personnel. He was responsible for the development of players like Dave Stieb, Jesse Barfield and Jimmy Key through the draft and utilized the Major League Rule 5 draft to secure talents such as Willie Upshaw, George Bell, Jim Gott and Kelly Gruber. Gillick was known for completing shrewd trades to acquire the likes of Alfredo Griffin, Damaso Garcia, Fred McGriff, Roberto Alomar, Joe Carter and assembling talent like Tom Henke, Devon White, Dave Winfield, Jack Morris and Paul Molitor. During his tenure, the Blue Jays produced 11 consecutive winning seasons from 1983 to 1993 and in that span, brought five American League East Division titles to Toronto, two American League championships and World Series titles in 1992 and 1993.

## Roy Halladay

## PITCHER

ROY HALLADAY was drafted by the Blue Jays as the 17th overall pick in 1995 out of Denver, CO. In only his second big league start in 1998, he took a nohitter into the ninth inning against the Tigers for a complete game win. When the 2000 season started, Roy began his year with the Dunedin Blue Jays, where his hard work, determination, and resilience resulted in him recreating himself as a pitcher, both physically and mentally. Over the 11 seasons that followed, Halladay cemented his imprint on the game as one of the greatest pitchers of his generation. His accomplishments included eight All-Star appearances and two Cy Young awards - one of six pitchers to win the honour in both the American and National Leagues. At the time of his retirement, he was the active Major League leader in complete games with 67 , including 20 shutouts.

## Dave Stieb

## PITCHER

DAVE STIEB is the franchise leader in wins (175), innings pitched (2873.0), strickeouts (1658), games started (408), shutouts (30) and complete games (103). The righty spent 15 seasons with Toronto, longer than any player in franchise history. He appeared in seven All-Star games and was the starting pitcher in both 1983 and 1984. Stieb recorded the only no-hitter in Blue Jays history on September 2, 1990 in Cleveland. In 1982, he was named the Sporting News Pitcher of the Year after a 17-14 season with a 3.25 ERA and led the league in innings (288.0) and complete games (20). Stieb was the Blue Jays Pitcher of the Year six times, a three-time winner of the AL Pitcher of the Month and a three-time winner of the AL Player of the Week.

## ALLAN H. SELIG AWARD FOR PHILANTHROPIC EXCELLENCE

The Allan H. Selig Award for Philanthropic Excellence, formerly known as the Commissioner's Award for Philanthropic Excellence, was created in 2010 to recognize the charitable and philanthropic efforts of MLB Clubs. The Toronto Blue Jays are one of just two clubs to have received the Award twice:
2012:
Honoured for the Toronto Blue Jays Baseball Academy, a series of initiatives to help support youth across Canada and provide them with opportunities on and off the field of play, including Rookie League, Field of Dreams, Super Camps and Instructional Clinics.
2020:
Acknowledged for their extensive efforts throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, including 8.1 million meals delivered to food insecure Canadians; 14,200 youth in Jays Care virtual programming; 1,500 teachers, youth leaders, and volunteers trained to run best-in-class virtual programming; 20,000 volunteer hours provided from Blue Jays, Jays Care, and Rogers staff from coast-to-coast-to-coast; and 2,000 adaptive equipment kits delivered to families of children living with disabilities (Challenger Baseball).

## CLUB AWARDS

## BOBBY MATTICK AND AL LAMACCHIA AWARDS

In 1996, the Blue Jays organization established two awards: the Bobby Mattick Player Development Award and the AI LaMacchia Scouting Award. The awards were created to acknowledge the dedication, success and work ethic of Blue Jays baseball operations personnel, attributes so aptly displayed by the awards' namesakes. The Bobby Mattick Award was named after the longtime baseball executive who had spent 25 years of his career with the Blue Jays. The late Bobby Mattick was responsible for the development of many of the young players who have gone through the Blue Jays system. As well as being Director of Player Development for many years he also managed the Major League Blue Jays for two seasons in 1980 and 1981. The Al LaMacchia Award was named after the veteran scout who spent 20 seasons with the Blue Jays. The late Al LaMacchia's scouting talents have been deeply etched in the Blue Jays short history. In 2003, the Blue Jays introduced a Community Service Award. In 2009, the Blue Jays began giving out an award for the Pro-Scout of the Year Award.

## HOME RUN TRIVIA

## PLAYER WHO HOMERED IN THEIR

 FINAL MAJOR LEAGUE AT-BATWILLIE AIKENS, April 27, 1985. He came to bat for last time, pinch-hitting at Texas in the 9th inning. Batting for Tony Fernandez against Tommy Boggs, Aikens crushed a dramatic game-tying, two-run homer and Toronto went on to win 9-8. Three days later, Aikens was "designated for assignment" winding up in the minor leagues.

## TWO IN ONE INNING, BATTER

JOE CARTER was the first Blue Jay to hit two home runs in one inning. He had his two on Oct. 3, 1993 at Baltimore in the 2nd inning.
EDWIN ENCARNACION became just the 2nd player in club history to hit two home runs in one inning. He had his two on July 26, 2013 vs. Houston in the 7th inning.

## 40 HOME RUN SEASONS

In 1999, CARLOS DELGADO with 44 home runs and SHAWN GREEN with 42 home runs, became the first Blue Jays tandem to each hit 40 or more home runs in the same season. In 2000, the Blue Jays again had two players, CARLOS DELGADO and TONY BATISTA, each hit 40 plus homers in a season. In 2015, JOSH DONALDSON hit 41 home runs while teammate JOSE BAUTISTA hit 40, marking the 3rd time in club history in which two teammates each hit 40. In 2021, VLADIMIR GUERRERO JR. clubbed 48 homers while MARCUS SEMIEN notched 45 , the 4 th time a pair of teammates have hit $40+$ homers and the first time they've each hit at least 45 . Overall the Blue Jays have had 11 different players, done 16 times, hit 40 or more home runs in a season. JOSE BAUTISTA hit a club-record 54 HR in 2010 and became just the 2nd Jay
to collect 40+ HR in back-to-back seasons, the first since CARLOS DELGADO (1999-2000). CARLOS DELGADO is the only Blue Jay player to hit 40 or more home runs in a season three times (1999, 2000, 2003).

## home runs by the first

TWO BATTERS OF GAME
DEVON WHITE and ROBERTO ALOMAR on August 18, 1991 at Detroit accomplished this feat for the first time in Blue Jays history. The second time occured on June 14, 2006 vs. Baltimore when ALEX RIOS and FRANK CATALANOTTO did so. The third such start came on May 22, 2016 at MIN, via homers from JOSE BAUTISTA and JOSH DONALDSON. The fourth occurence came on July 27, 2018 at CWS from CURTIS GRANDERSON and LOURDES GURRIEL JR.. The most recent instance involved MARCUS SEMIEN and BO BICHETTE on May 16, 2021 vs. PH.

## MOST PLAYERS WITH <br> 30 OR MORE HOME RUNS

The 2000 Blue Jays had four players hit 30-or-more home runs, which tied the MLB record at the time (MIN - five in 2019). It was then just the second time the feat had been accomplished in the AL as the Anaheim Angels also had four players hit 30-plus homers in the 2000 season.

## 20 HOME RUNS AT THE ALL-STAR BREAK

The 2000 Blue Jays became the first team in Major League history to have four players hit 20 -or-more home runs at the All-Star Break. CARLOS DELGADO hit 28, TONY BATISTA hit 24, RAUL MONDESI hit 22, and JOSE CRUZ Jr. hit 20.

The Toronto Blue Jays tied an American League record on September 4， 1992 at SkyDome by collect－ ing 10 consecutive hits in an eight－run 2nd inning against the Minnesota Twins．
The Blue Jays tied the mark set by the Boston Red Sox on June 2， 1901 and equalled by the Detroit Tigers on September 20， 1983.
The Major League record of 12 straight hits was set by the St．Louis Cardinals in 1920 and equalled by the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1930.
With one out in the 2nd，Toronto＇s Kelly Gruber reached on an infield single against Twins＇starter Kevin Tapani．Singles by Pat Borders and Manuel Lee scored Gruber to cut Minnesota＇s lead to 3－1．
Devon White doubled in a run and Roberto Alomar followed with a two－run single to give the Blue Jays a 4－3 lead．Joe Carter tripled home Alomar and scored on Dave Winfield＇s single off reliever Tom Edens．Winfield was thrown out at second for the inning＇s second out，but John Olerud singled and scored on Candy Maldonado＇s triple to open a 7－3 cushion．Gruber＇s bloop double to right－center scored Maldonado for the 10th straight hit．
Borders then flied to center to end the inning．
Toronto＇s previous club record was nine consecutive hits，set against California on July 3， 1992.

The Blue Jays franchise has connected 105 times for pinch-hit home runs during regular season games...Jesse Barfield on April 24, 1982 vs. Boston at Exhibition Stadium hit the Blue Jays' first pinch-hit grand slam...Alvis Woods in Toronto's first ever game, on April 7, 1977 vs. the Chicago White Sox, hit the first pitch of his first Major League career at-bat for the Blue Jays' first pinch-hit home run...Ed Sprague has the only pinch-hit home run in the postseason, which came on Oct. 18, 1992, Game 2 of the World Series vs. Atlanta...On June 30, 1999 vs. the Orioles, Willie Greene became the 16th player in AL history to hit home runs in consecutive pinchhit at-bats...In 2014, Colby Rasmus tied Willie Greene (1999) for the most PH-HR in a single season with three...The club record for most PHHR in a single season is nine, recorded in 2014... ## HOME RUNS, FIRST MAJOR LEAGUE AT-BAT

When AL WOODS batted for Steve Bowling in the 5th inning on Apr. 7, 1977, he became the 11th player in Major League history to hit a home run as a pinch-hitter in his first at-bat.
JUNIOR FELIX became the 11th Major League player to homer on his first big-league pitch on May 4, 1989 vs. California's Kirk McCaskill (solo).
J.P. ARENCIBIA became the 3rd Blue Jay to homer in his first MLB plate appearance and 2nd to do so on the first pitch, on Aug. 7, 2010, off Tampa Bay's James Shields (2R)...Became the 5th player in MLB history to hit two homers in his first game and was the first catcher to do so.
DAVIS SCHNEIDER became the 4th player in Toronto history to go deep in his first MLB plate appearance, launching a solo shot over the Green Monster off James Paxton on Aug. 4, 2023 at Fenway Park.

## WALK-OFF HOME RUNS (TOR - 91/OPP. - 106)

The Toronto Blue Jays have recorded 90 total walk-off home runs in franchise history...On July 30, 2017 vs. LAA, Steve Pearce capped a dramatic 9th-inning comeback with a walk-off grand slam as the Blue Jays overcame a 10-4 deficit to earn an 11-10 victory...Pearce hit a walk-off grand slam three days earlier in the Jays' $8-4$ win in 10 innings against OAK...That is the shortest span between walk-off grand slams by any player in Major League history, the previous shortest being 100 days by the Mariners' Jim Presley in 1986...Pearce, Presley, and Cy Williams for the 1926 Phillies are the only players to have hit two walk-off grand slams in the same season (courtesy of Elias)...There have been four walk-off grand slams in team history (Steve Pearce - 2x: 7/30/17 vs. LAA and 7/27/17 vs. OAK; Gregg Zaun - 9/6/08 vs. TB, 13th inning; George Bell - 9/4/88 vs. TEX, 9th inning)...On June 15, 2003 vs. CHC, Reed Johnson hit a leadoff home run and ended the game in the 10th inning with a walk-off blast, becoming then just the 4th player in MLB history to accomplish that feat...The most walk-off home runs hit in a single season by Toronto is six, accomplished in 2011 and again in 2019...In 2015, Josh Donaldson set a club record with three walk-off home runs...Cecil Fielder is the only Blue Jay to hit a pinch-hit walk-off home run, which he accomplished on Sept. 4, 1987 vs. SEA (10th inning-solo HR).

## WORLD SERIES RINGS

The Toronto Blue Jays commissioned Tiffany \& Co., the world-renowned purveyor of fine jewellery, timepieces, and arts of the table to design rings commemorating both their 1992 and 1993 World Series victories.

To commemorate the 1992 Blue Jays victory, the 14 karat gold ring's design features the team's logo: the head of a Blue Jay with a maple leaf on a baseball backdrop. The eye of the bird is set with a solitaire diamond. Sixteen diamonds representing each year of the club's history surround the bird and the maple leaf is enamelled in red to match the team's official colour. The inscription of World Champions 1992 wraps around the bezel. One side depicts the team's name - Toronto Blue Jays - set in two lines across the top. The 1992 World Series logo is set in a maple leaf with the inscription - Canada's 1st - positioned below the logo denoting the first Canadian World Series victory. The other side depicts the player's name and the jersey number, the American League logo and the team's 1992 season attendance record - 4,028,318 - positioned below the American League logo. Each side of the ring is accented with two rows representing the stitches of a baseball.
The 1993 World Series Championship ring features the symbols of the Toronto Blue Jays and Canada. A field of 45 diamonds in a pave style setting surrounds the Toronto Blue Jays' logo: the head of a Blue Jay enamelled in the team's official colours overlapping another Blue Jay in gold. The eye of the Blue Jay is set with a diamond solitaire stone. Two Maple Leafs, enamelled in red, symbolize Canada's back-to-back World Series victories. Two baseballs overlay each other in the background. Each ring is personalized with each player's name and jersey number, and incorporating the American League logo and the World Series logo with the inscription "Back to Back" and the years 92-93.

## PITCHERS AT THE PLATE

In 1997, with the introduction of Interleague Play, Blue Jays pitchers took their turn hitting. Woody Williams became the first Blue Jays pitcher to come to bat and also had the first hit, a single, in his second at-bat off Curt Schilling on June 13, 1997.
On June 21, 2003 at Montreal, Mark Hendrickson became the first Blue Jay pitcher to hit a home run in Interleague play (solo homer off Sunny Kim).
Marcus Stroman made his mark as the only other Toronto pitcher to go deep, hitting a solo home run off Julio Teheran in Atlanta on May 18, 2017. The home run followed up a blast by catcher Luke Maile, forming the first back-to-back home runs by battery mates in the post-DH era (courtesy Elias).

## JOE SCLAFANI <br> DIRECTOR, PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Joe Sclafani is entering his ninth season with the Blue Jays and his third as Director, Player Development, having served the prior three years as Assistant Director. He joined the organization after playing four years (2012-2016) in the Houston Astros organization, culminating in a Triple-A national championship in 2015. Sclafani participated in the Arizona Fall League in 2014, helping the team to the AFL championship. He was also a member of Team USA in the fall of 2015, taking home a silver medal in the inaugural Premier 12 tournament in Taiwan and Japan. In 2018, he was inducted into the "Wearers of the Green", Dartmouth College's Athletic Hall of Fame. In his current role, Sclafani leads the day-to-day operations and systems of the player development department, and helps drive the creation and implementation of development plans for each player in the Minor League system.


## CHARLIE WILSON

 director, minor league operationsBorn and raised in Toronto, Charlie Wilson graduated from Trinity College School in Port Hope, Ontario, in 1992. There he was a member of the school's football, rugby, and downhill skiing teams, and also played amateur baseball in Toronto in the summers. He then attended Bishops University in Lennoxville, Quebec. Wilson first joined the organization working the summer seasons in the Public Relations Department between 1993-1996, while continuing his post-secondary studies at Bishops University. Shortly after his graduation from Bishops, he joined the club's Baseball Operations Department as a Baseball Assistant, working specifically in player development and scouting, and was promoted to the position of Scouting Coordinator in December, 2000. Wilson worked in that capacity until August 20, 2003, when he was elevated to the position of Manager, Minor League Operations. On October 9, 2009, he was appointed to his current position where he oversees the day-to-day operations of the Blue Jays' farm system. Wilson was honoured with the 2015 Howard Starkman Award, granted annually to the Employee of the Year for the Toronto Blue Jays Baseball Club who best exemplifies the values of integrity, innovation, accountability, teamwork and a passion for winning. Residing in Toronto, he is married and has four children.


## REED KIENLE

ASSISTANT DIRECTOR, PLAYER DEVELOPMENT
Reed Kienle is going into his second season in this role. He has been with the Blue Jays since 2019, where he started as a PD Intern. Prior to joining the organization he completed his MBA with a certification in Business Analytics from Cal Poly - San Luis Obispo. In 2017, Reed finished his collegiate baseball career at Menlo College, a small NAIA school in Palo Alto, CA. From 2020 through 2022, he was heavily involved with the Blue Jays Minor League hitting department, working closely with the hitting coordinator and hitting coaches to drive innovative processes improvements as it related to the development of hitters. The native of Gilroy, CA, now resides in the Dunedin area and works out of the PDC.


## EDWIN ENCARNACION

## SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE ORGANIZATION

Edwin Encarnacion enters his second season in a coaching capacity within the Blue Jays organization. The native of La Romana, Dominican Republic, was selected by the Texas Rangers in the 9th round of the 2000 MLB First-Year Player Draft out of Manuela Toro High School in Caguas, Puerto Rico. Encarnacion enjoyed a 21-year professional career, suiting up for Cincinnati, Toronto, Cleveland, Seattle, New York (AL), and Chicago (AL) across 16 Major League seasons. The right-handed slugger appeared in 1,960 career MLB games, amassing 1,832 hits, 370 doubles, 10 triples, 424 home runs, and 1,261 RBI. He is also responsible for one of only two walk-off home runs in Blue Jays postseason history, as he broke a 2-2 tie in the 11th inning of the 2016 AL Wild Card game against the Orioles with a three-run blast into the seats in left, sending Toronto to the AL Division Series. The three-time All-Star ranks 3rd in Blue Jays history in home runs (239), 3 rd in OPS (.878), 6th in RBI (679), and 8th in runs scored (593). In 2021, Encarnacion opened up his own baseball academy (Encarnacion EDS) in the Dominican Republic.


## VICTOR MARTINEZ

SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE ORGANIZATION
Victor Martinez enters his second season as a Special Assistant in the Blue Jays organization. Born December 23, 1978 in Ciudad Bolivar, Venezuela, Martinez got his first taste of professional baseball in 1999 with Cleveland's Low-A squad in Mahoning Valley. The switch-hitter played 19 professional seasons, including 16 at the MLB level, spending time with Cleveland, Boston, and Detroit. Over 1,973 career big league games, Martinez piled up 2,153 hits, 423 doubles, three triples, 246 home runs, and 1,178 RBI, earning five AL All-Star nominations (2004, 2007, 2009-10, 2014) and a pair of Silver Slugger awards (2004 \& 2014). After his playing career, Martinez founded a 2,400-acre cattle operation called Victoria's Ranch, and watched his horse, King Guillermo, win the 2020 Tampa Bay Derby at odds of 49/1.


## JASON BERE <br> SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Jason Bere joined the Blue Jays organization in 2018 and has since served in the scouting department as well as a Special Assistant to Player Development. Born May 26, 1971 in Cambridge, MA, Bere began his coaching career in 2006 as a special assistant in baseball operations with Cleveland before serving as their Major League bullpen coach for the 2016 \& 2017 seasons. Bere played professionally for 15 years, including 11 at the Major League level, spending time with both Chicago teams, Cincinnati, Milwaukee, and Cleveland. He wrapped up his playing career in Buffalo in 2005 with the Triple-A Bisons, then a minor league affiliate of Cleveland. The righty made 211 MLB appearances ( 203 starts), going 71-65 with a 5.14 ERA while finishing 2nd in AL Rookie of the Year voting in 1993 and earning an All-Star nod in 1994.


## PAT HENTGEN <br> SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Born November 13, 1968 in Detroit, MI, Pat Hentgen has worked in the Blue Jays organization in a variety of roles since retiring from playing in 2004. He has served as a spring training instructor, a team ambassador, a Special Assistant to Player Development, and the Major League team's bullpen coach under John Farrell for the 2011 \& 2013 seasons. Selected by the Blue Jays in the 5th round of the 1986 draft, Hentgen spent 10 of his 14 MLB seasons with Toronto. Over 344 big league appearances ( 306 starts), he compiled a 131-112 record and a 4.32 ERA, earning three All-Star nods, winning a World Series Championship in 1993, and was named the first Cy Young Award winner in Blue Jays history in 1996. He sits 5 th all-time in franchise history in wins (107), games started (238), strikeouts $(1,028)$, and shutouts (9). Hentgen was inducted into the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame on June 18, 2016.


## PAUL QUANTRILL

SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO PLAYER DEVELOPMENT
A native of London, ON, Paul Quantrill spent six of his 14 Major League seasons with the Blue Jays, going 30-34 with a 3.67 ERA over 386 games ( 20 starts), the 6th-most games played in franchise history. He led the league in games played in four straight seasons (AL-2001 \& 2004, NL - 2002-03) and was named to the AL All-Star team in his final season with the club in 2001. The 55-year old has served as a coach for Team Canada during the World Baseball Classics in 2009, 2013, 2017, and 2023, and was inducted into the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame on June 19, 2010.


## TIM RAINES

SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO PLAYER DEVELOPMENT
Born September 13, 1959 in Sanford, FL, 2024 marks Tim Raines' 12th season with the Blue Jays and his seventh in this role. He previously held the position of Outfield/Baserunning Coordinator from 20132017. Raines was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame on July 30, 2017, and was also inducted into the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame in 2013. The outfielder spent 23 seasons in the Major Leagues with Montreal (1980-1990, 2001), Chicago-AL (1991-1995), New York-AL (1996-1998), Oakland (1999), Baltimore (2001) and Florida (2002). He hit . 294 (2,605 hits) with 170 home runs, 980 RBI, 808 stolen bases and a . 385 OBP. Among the all-time leaders, he ranks fifth in stolen bases, 38th in walks and is tied for 80th in hits. Raines had his \#30 uniform retired by the Expos on June 19, 2004. He made his managerial debut with Class-A Brevard County in the Expos' organization, posting a 53-72 record in 2004. He then spent three seasons in the White Sox' system, including two with the Major League club from 2005-2006. In 2005, Raines was the First Base Coach on the World Series Championship team and was Bench Coach in 2006. He now has four children and resides just outside of Phoenix, Arizona.


## DEVON WHITE <br> SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Devon White enters his second season as Special Assistant to Player Development. He made his coaching debut with the Triple-A Buffalo Bisons in 2017 and then moved into the role of Position Coach for the 2018-2022 campaigns. Prior to joining the Blue Jays, the centerfielder served as outfield and baserunning coordinator for Washington (2008-2010) and baserunning coordinator for the Chicago White Sox (20112012). The native of Kingston, Jamaica, was drafted by the Los Angeles Angels in 1981 and traded to the Blue Jays in 1990. He then won two World Series Championships with Toronto in 1992 and 1993, and added another ring with Florida in 1997. White was named an All-Star on three occasions during his 17-year Major League career, claiming seven Gold Glove Awards along the way.

## RYAN MITTLEMAN VICE PRESIDENT, PROFESSIONAL SCOUTING

Ryan Mittleman joined the organization in 2005 as Manager of Baseball Information in the communications department. He then moved into the scouting department in 2006 and spent the next five seasons as the Coordinator of Amateur Scouting. Mittleman became Assistant Scouting Director in 2011 before spending 2012 as a Pro Scout, and spent 2013-2014 as Coordinator of Advance Scouting and Video. Mittleman served as Major League Advance Scouting Coordinator from 2015-2016, providing advance scouting and handling in-game replay operations, was the Director of Professional Scouting from 2017-2023, and now enters his first year as Vice President, Pro Scouting. Born in Providence, Rhode Island, he has resided in Toronto since 1985. Mittleman excelled in hockey, playing on the US under-17 and under-18 teams, winning silver medals with both squads while leading the under-17 club in goals. He attended Boston College, and played Division I hockey for the Eagles from 1995-1997.


## SHANE FARRELL

 DIRECTOR, AMATEUR SCOUTINGShane Farrell is entering his fifth season with the organization, having joined the Blue Jays in January, 2020. He works with Tony Lacava to oversee the Amateur Scouting process and also collaborates with the High Performance, Research \& Development, and Player Development departments to advance information streams and help integrate players into the Blue Jays Minor League system. Farrell previously worked for the Chicago Cubs as a West Coast Crosschecker. He started in the Cubs' front office in 2012 as an Amateur Scouting Assistant before becoming an Area Scout in 2017. Farrell was raised in a baseball family - his father, John, is a former Blue Jays Manager; his older brother, Jeremy, is the Director of Player Development with the Cincinnati Reds; his younger brother, Luke, has pitched for the Royals, Reds, Cubs, Rangers, and Twins over the course of his six-year career; and Shane was drafted by the Blue Jays in the 46th round of the 2011 Draft. He currently resides in Dunedin, FL, with his wife, Elizabeth, and daughters, Payton and Palmer.


## JOSE "SANDY" ROSARIO DIRECTOR, INTERNATIONAL OPERATIONS

Jose Sandy Rosario Valdez resides in his hometown of Santo Domingo, Domincan Republic, with his wife and three chidren: Joshua, Claudia, and Sandy Jr. He played as an amateur in the Parallel League and served as a bullpen catcher for the DSL Pirates in 1994. He studied engineering at the University Autonoma of Santo Domingo and completed his degree in 2000. Rosario worked with the Montreal Expos from February, 2002 until October, 2006 as Director of Scouting and Development in the Dominican. He then went to the Mets as an Area Scout in November, 2006 until October, 2011. Rosario joined the Toronto Blue Jays as Director of Scouting, Dominican Republic in November of 2011, served as Director, Latin America Operations from February of 2016 until he was promoted to his current role of Director, International Operations on November 19, 2018. He has participated in the signings of players such as: Atahualpa Severino, Michael Martinez, Henry Mejia, Juerys Familia, Armando Rodriguez, Juan Jaime, Miguel Castro, Lourdes Gurriel Jr., Richard Ureña, Jose Fernandez, Yimi Cordero, and Vladimir Guerrero Jr.


## LORENZO PEREZ

SUPERVISOR, INTERNATIONAL SCOUTING
Lorenzo Antonio Pérez enters his second season as Supervisor, International Scouting. He was born on February 1, 1979 in Salcedo, Dominican Republic. Perez studied Business at OIM University and played amateur baseball. He has been an International Scout for 17 years, the longest tenure in Toronto's international scouting department. He has been covering México, Colombia, Venezuela and Panamá, and has played an integral role in the evaluation and signing of all Dominican players in the Blue Jays' system.

CREDENTIALS: To obtain media credentials to cover Toronto Blue Jays 2024 home games, please log on to http:// credentials.mlb.com. Credential requests for individual games must be submitted at least 24 hours in advance of the requested game date, subject to the discretion of the Toronto Blue Jays.
We will respond to your request as soon as possible. If you are not contacted by someone from our office, please email at least one day in advance, to confirm that you have credentials before arriving at the ballpark.
Credentials will be issued only to members of the working media 18 years of age and older. No spouses, guests or children of members of the media will be issued passes.
Media passes are not transferable. Media passes must be visible at all times and will be checked by stadium security.
Any violation of these guidelines will result in immediate revocation of the credential and future access. Only credentials issued by the Toronto Blue Jays, Major League Baseball or the BBWAA will be honoured.
SEASON CREDENTIAL APPLICATIONS: The Blue Jays will issue full-season credentials to those media members who cover the club on a regular basis throughout the season. Media will be asked to submit their requests for Blue Jays season media credentials through the MLB credential system under Toronto Blue Jays 2024 Season Credentials (RC only). All requests for season credentials must be submitted by March 29, 2024.
CREDENTIAL PICKUP: Members of the media can pick up approved daily credentials inside Gate 13 at Rogers Centre, photo identification is required. The media centre is located on the 300 level towards left field, and the broadcast booths are located on the 400 level behind home plate. Press Gate opens four hours prior to game time.
CLUBHOUSE ACCESS: The clubhouse is open to media with proper credentials for working purposes 3.5 hours prior to each game and closes at the start of batting practice. The clubhouse will re-open no later than 10 minutes following the final out of each game. Access to the visiting clubhouse is subject to the visiting club's guidelines.
FIELD ACCESS: Only credentialed media with field access will be allowed onto the field prior to the game. No media will be allowed in fair territory or beyond the first and third base bags. All non-uniformed personnel must clear the field at the conclusion of visitors batting practice unless that individual has credentials expressly for in-game field privileges (photo passes, pre-game ceremonies, etc.).
LIVE TRANSMISSIONS: Television and radio stations not holding broadcast rights for Blue Jays games will be allowed to transmit live reports prior to and after Blue Jays games. All live television shots will be done on the field. No live shots will be permitted from the clubhouses. No live transmissions inside the stadium by non-rights holders will be permitted while the rights holders are on the air or the game is in progress. Radio stations will be permitted to provide "scene setters" and score updates between innings but these reports may not continue once an inning is underway. Any violations of these policies will result in revocation of credentials.
AUTOGRAPHS: No member of the media may use their access to solicit autographs or equipment from players or staff of either participating team. Any autograph needs should be directed to the Communications Department. Failure to do so will result in the revocation of credential privileges and forfeiture of any items obtained.

NOTES \& STATISTICS: Game information is available in the media centre two hours prior to first pitch, as well, this information is available at www.mlbpressbox.com and www. bluejayspressbox.com.
MEDIA GUIDES: Media Guides are available upon request in the baseball media centre. As well, all MLB club media guides are available at www.mlbpressbox.com.
POST GAME PROCEDURES: Manager John Schneider will be available to the media immediately after the game in the Interview room adjacent to the Blue Jays clubhouse. Postgame interviews with the manager and players, conducted by the media with deadlines should be related to game comments.
FREELANCE: The Toronto Blue Jays do not credential freelance writers or photographers.
An exception can be made if, and only if, the writer or photographer is on assignment with a specific news organization, and all photographs taken are to be used for newsgathering purposes or official licensed products. It is the responsibility of the requesting affiliation to confirm receipt, and subsequent approval/denial of access to the game requested.
PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Credentials will be issued to those photographers on assignment for legitimate newsgathering organizations and those representatives of companies licensed by Major League Baseball.
INTERNET MEDIA/WEBSITES: Due to the growth of online services and our limited number of press box seats, the Blue Jays will only issue daily credentials to those websites affiliated with a recognized news gathering organization.
LOST CREDENTIALS: Those members of the media who lose their Blue Jays Credential will be asked to make a $\$ 50.00$ donation to the Jays Care Foundation prior to being issued a replacement credential.
INTERNET CONNECTION: We are pleased to offer both wireless and hard wire internet connections in the media centre and wireless connection in the photo dugouts. Please contact a member of the Communications Department for assistance.
MEDIA DINNING: Located on the 300 Level of the Media Centre, there is a $\$ 13.00$ CDN or $\$ 12.00$ US charge per meal. Media dining is open for service for 2.5 hours prior to first pitch to accredited members of the media.
MAJOR LEAGUE BASEBALL DRESS GUIDELINES: Clothing should be appropriate for a business casual work environment. No flip-flops, no t-shirts bearing offensive, disrespectful or inappropriate messages and no ripped jeans are permitted. Clothing bearing MLB club logos should not be worn in press areas. Sheer or see-through clothing, excessively short skirts, dresses or shorts are not permitted. Tank tops, muscle shirts, one-shouldered or strapless shirts as well as clothing exposing bare midriffs or visible undergarments are not permitted.

## 2024 REGULAR SEASON CLUB/MEDIA REGULATIONS

The following are Major League Baseball's regulations for Club/Media Relations. They are to be observed by all parties:

1. All accredited press, radio and TV representatives shall have pre-game access to the clubhouse from three hours and 30 minutes prior to game time until one hour prior to game time, except that: (a) the media shall not have access to the clubhouse when the club is on the field for batting practice; and (b) the media may not return to the home clubhouse once the home club has taken batting practice. No club may provide pre-game access prior to three hours and 30 minutes prior to game time. The media shall have access (outside of the clubhouse) to the home club's manager, players or coaches after home batting practice to discuss developments (such as lineup changes, injuries, and workouts) that occur after the clubhouse closes.
2. Absent unusual circumstances that require a team meeting immediately following a game, the working media shall have access to both clubhouses no later than 10 minutes following the final out of each game (including doubleheaders and day/night split admission games). When such unusual circumstances exist, and such instances are expected to be rare, the working media shall have access to the clubhouse no later than 20 minutes following the final out of the game. The Commissioner's Office reserves the right to require access to the clubhouse 10 minutes following the final out of all games if the "team meeting" exception is abused.
3. The working media's access following a game shall be for a period no longer than one hour unless reasonable access to players is not provided during that time; provided, however, that card-carrying members of the Baseball Writers Association of America ("BBWAA") will have unlimited access after the post-game opening of the clubhouse. If reasonable access is not provided, the clubhouse must remain open. Members of the media, other than BBWAA members, may make arrangements with the club PR Director for extended access.
4. Media credentials are not transferable.
5. Clubhouses, the dugouts and the field are off-limits except to appropriate club, Commissioner's Office personnel and media bearing appropriate credentials. Club credentials are not to be issued to unauthorized personnel. The Commissioner's Office reserves the right to revoke inappropriately issued credentials.
6. Players will be available to the media before and after games for interviews. These periods should not be limited except for the pre-game period described in \#1 above, and the post-game period described in \#2 above. Upon request by the media, players who had key roles in the first game of a doubleheader are to be made available for a time between games.
7. The trainer's room and players' lounge are off-limits to the media, but each club controls these areas, and it is vital these areas not be used as a sanctuary for players seeking to avoid the media. It is very important to our game that ALL players are available to the media for reasonable periods and it is the player's responsibility to cooperate.
8. Ropes or other restraining barriers are not permitted to bar the media.
9. A general code is to be observed by the media so uniformed personnel may do their work unimpeded. Media are to be allowed in foul territory, in an unrestricted manner, in an area that is to be not less than the territory between first and third bases, and which territory includes the area around the batting cage, except the dirt area around the batting cage.
10. Under no circumstances shall any club discriminate in any fashion against an accredited member of the media based upon race, creed, sex or national origin.
11. Physical abuse or threats directed to members of the media (and/or official scorers) by baseball personnel will not be tolerated. Disciplinary action, including fines and suspensions, will be considered in any cases that arise.
12. Visitors in the clubhouse, including accredited media members, should conduct themselves in a professional manner. There shall be no seeking of autographs, no touching or removing of equipment or personal items from lockers, and no sampling of players' food spreads. Clubhouses are work places. Clubhouse business should be conducted as expeditiously as possible with a minimum of disruption of regular game routines. Members of the media should not excessively linger in the clubhouse when not interviewing players. Members of the media who violate the code of conduct set forth in this paragraph shall be subject to sanctions, including the loss of their accreditation as provided for in paragraph 17 below.
While in the clubhouse, members of the media are expected to be doing business. Members of the media are expected to conduct themselves in a professional manner and to respect the privileges and environment of restricted areas and working press areas at all times. Any media member in violation of this conduct policy is subject to revocation of his or her privileges and may be subject to immediate ejection.
13. Live TV and/or radio interviews with uniformed personnel during the course of a game are not authorized or permitted, nor is attaching a microphone to any uniformed personnel permitted without approval from the Commissioner's Office. Microphones may not be placed in or adjacent to dugouts and/or bullpens in a manner that will allow uniformed personnel's remarks or conversations to be overheard during the course of a game without the prior approval of the Commissioner's Office.
14. Live telephone interviews are not allowed from the clubhouse or the field without prior approval of the club. Devices with digital photography capabilities are prohibited.
15. Telephones from both dugouts to the press box are to be maintained in working order for the purpose of providing information regarding special circumstances to the media during the course of a game. Explanations of injuries should be made as soon as possible (to both the media and fans in the stadium).
16. Any club whose personnel violate these regulations will be disciplined. Any member of the media who violates these regulations will lose his or her accreditation.
17. BBWAA members are not required to sign in for clubhouse or other restricted area access but may be logged in by club personnel, subject to individual club policies. Other accredited media may be required to sign in for clubhouse access, subject to individual club policies

# BROADCASTING 



## BUCK MARTINEZ <br> ANALYST

Buck Martinez returns for a 15th season in the broadcast booth after returning to the Blue Jays for the first time since managing the club in 2002. The 75 -year-old brings with him 57 years of baseball experience, including 20 years as a player, 42 years in broadcasting, and two as a manager. Beginning in 1967 when he was signed by the Philadelphia Phillies, Martinez spent 20 years as a catcher in professional baseball with the Kansas City Royals, Milwaukee Brewers and his final six seasons with the Blue Jays. He appeared in the postseason with Kansas City in 1976, batting . 333 in the five-game ALCS against the New York Yankees. Has written three books about his experiences with the Blue Jays, "From Worst to First" (1985), "The Last Out" (1986), and "Change-up" (2016). Among his 14 seasons associated with the Blue Jays, he served as manager for Toronto in 2001 and part of the 2002 season, compiling a 100-115 record. In 2006, he managed the United States team in the inaugural World Baseball Classic. He then took part in the next four WBC's as a colour commentator. Martinez' first experience with broadcasting came in 1982 when he covered the American League Championship Series, the World Series and the All-Star Game for the Telemedia Radio Network. His television broadcast career began in 1987 as a colour commentator for the Toronto Blue Jays on TSN. He began his work with ESPN radio and television in 1992, and in 1995, Martinez was awarded a Sports EMMY Award for his work on ESPN's coverage of Cal Ripken's 2,131st consecutive game. He worked as a television analyst for the Baltimore Orioles from 2003-2009, for which he won another EMMY, and has also served as a co-host of XM Radio's Baseball This Morning show on the MLB Home Plate channel. Martinez contributed colour commentary for Sunday afternoon games on TBS, as well as for the network's postseason coverage. Most recently, he has worked the All-Star game and the World Series over the last five seasons for MLB International and did do so again this past fall. In 2020, he took over as President of the Baseball Assistance Team (B.A.T.), which is dedicated to confidentially assisting members of the baseball family. In 2022, he was nominated for the Curt Flood Award, given annually to a former player who has demonstrated a selfless, longtime devotion to the Players Association and advancement of players' rights. In 2023, Martinez was named the winner of the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum's Jack Graney Award, presented annually to a representative of the media who has made a significant contribution to the game of baseball in Canada. A California native, Martinez attended Sacramento City College, Sacramento State University, and Central Missouri State University. He and his wife, Arlene, have been married for 47 years and now reside in New Port Richey, FL. They have one son, Casey, a 47th round pick by Toronto in the 2000 First-Year Player Draft, who is married to Jennifer and has three daughters, Zoe, Lara, and Genevieve.


## DAN SHULMAN

PLAY-BY-PLAY ANNOUNCER
Dan Shulman is in his second stint in the Blue Jays broadcast booth, having returned in 2016 after a 15 -year absence. The Toronto native began his broadcasting career locally in 1990 at CKBB in Barrie before moving to the FAN 1430 (now Sportsnet 590 The FAN) in 1991, where he hosted a number of shows, including Prime Time Sports, The Major League Report, and Baseball Today. He began serving as the Blue Jays' play-by-play commentator in 1995 alongside current Blue Jays announcer, Buck Martinez. Following his departure from Toronto's broadcast booth in 2001, he joined ESPN full-time after having worked for the network part-time beginning in 1995. The graduate of Western University was the voice of Wednesday Night Baseball (2002-2007), Monday Night Baseball (2008-2010), and served as ESPN's Sunday Night Baseball play-by-play announcer from 2011-2017. In addition, Shulman called ESPN Radio's MLB postseason from 1998 through 2022, including the World Series from 2011-2022. He has been a play-by-play voice for NCAA basketball for ESPN since 1995, including the network's signature Saturday Primetime games since 2007. Shulman has also covered two Olympics, calling hockey in Lillehammer, Norway in 1994, and basketball for the Tokyo games in 2021. Shulman has received many honours and accolades for his work, including being named the 2011 NSMA National Sportscaster of the Year in the US. He was the first two-time winner of the Sports Media Canada Broadcaster of the Year award (2000, 2007). Shulman was named the winner of the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame's Jack Graney Award in 2020, won the Canadian Screen Award as best play-by-play announcer in 2022, and is a two-time finalist for the National Baseball Hall of Fame's Ford C. Frick Award.


## JAMIE CAMPBELL <br> HOST, BLUE JAYS CENTRAL

Jamie Campbell got his start in sports broadcasting at CBC Sports in 1987. He was a sports anchor at CBC Edmonton from 1993 to 1997 before moving on to CJOH Ottawa for a year. In 1998, he became one of Sportsnet's original broadcasters and co-hosted the first edition of Sportscentral (now Sportsnet Central). He's hosted coverage of the Grey Cup, Super Bowl, NHL Draft, MLB All-Star Game, and MLB post-season. He called play-by-play for the Toronto Phantoms of the Arena Football League from 2002 to 2003, the CFL on Sportsnet in 2004, and was the play-by-play voice of the Toronto Blue Jays from 2005 to 2009. In 2010, at the Olympic Winter Games in Vancouver, millions of Canadians were watching when Campbell announced the country's historic first gold medal won in Canada by Alexandre Bilodeau. He also called the play-by-play for cycling at the London Olympics in 2012. Campbell has been part of the Blue Jays' broadcast team since 2005 and is in his 14th season as host of Blue Jays Central.


## JOE SIDDALL <br> ANALYST

Entering his 11th season with Sportsnet, Joe Siddall was a member of the Blue Jays radio team for four years before moving to television in 2018 as an analyst on Blue Jays Central alongside Jamie Campbell. For the second straight year, Siddall will split the upcoming season between the broadcast booth and Blue Jays Central. He spent the previous 12 years assisting the Detroit Tigers with batting practice for home games. Signed as a free agent by the Montreal Expos in 1987, Siddall played 13 years professionally as a catcher with Expos, Marlins, Tigers, and Red Sox (1988-2000), spending parts of four seasons in the Major Leagues with Montreal (1993, 1995), Florida, (1996), and Detroit (1998). He hit his lone Major League home run on August 7, 1998 off Seattle LHP Jeff Fassero at Tiger Stadium in Detroit. Born and raised in Windsor, Siddall attended Assumption High School before accepting a football scholarship to Central Michigan University as a quarterback. Joe and his wife (Dr. Tamara Siddall) have four children - Brooke, Brett, Mackenzie, and Kevin (deceased).


## BEN SHULMAN PLAY-bY-PLAY ANNOUNCER

Ben Shulman enters his first season as a full-time member of the Blue Jays broadcast team. Ben made his Blue Jays debut in 2022, doing play-by-play on a handful of games, then saw that role grow in 2023, when he called 30 games for the Sportsnet Radio Network and was also a part of the pre and postgame shows for 60 others. Ben previously did play-by-play for the Fort Wayne TinCaps (Padres High-A) in 2022, the Chatham Anglers of the Cape Cod Baseball League in 2021, and the Barrie Baycats of the Intercounty Baseball League in both 2018 and 2019. In the offseason, Ben has called Raptors 905 games on both radio and television the last two seasons. In addition, Ben called Little League World Series regionals for ESPN in 2022, has called college football and college basketball for the ACC Network, the SEC Network and ESPN+, and has called Canada Basketball games for both the men's and women's teams for Sportsnet. Ben is a graduate of Syracuse University's Newhouse School. While at Syracuse, Ben called numerous sports, including football, basketball, hockey, field hockey, lacrosse and soccer.


## CHRIS LEROUX ANALYST

Chris Leroux is beginning his first full season as colour analyst and his fourth in broadcasting. Beginning in 2018, he worked on the pre-game and post-game shows along with being a part-time colour analyst. Leroux spent 12 seasons in professional baseball while also playing a season in Japan. He spent parts of six seasons in the Major Leagues with the Marlins, Pirates, and Yankees from 2009-14. He was also a fixture with the Canadian National Team, playing in three World Baseball Classics and numerous tournaments around the world. Leroux attended Winthrop University in South Carolina as a catcher before converting to a pitcher in the summer of 2004 in the Cape Cod League playing for the Falmouth Commodores. He was drafted in the 7th round in 2005 by the Florida Marlins after undergoing Tommy John surgery two months prior. Leroux was born in Montreal but grew up in Mississauga.


LE BASEBALL DES BLUES JAYS


RODGER BRULOTTE PLAY-BY-PLAY ANNOUNCER (FRENCH)

Rodger Brulotte's association with the Expos began in 1969 as a member of the club's scouting department. The following year he was named administrative assistant to the director of scouting and player personnel, Mel Didier. Brulotte had also been in public relations and marketing as well as serving as the team's traveling secretary from 1977-1978. He spent 17 seasons with Jacques Doucet on the Expos' French radio network. For his work on television, more than 20 years at RDS analyzing Expos games, Major League baseball games, All-Star games and postseason games, he and his partner, Denis Casavant, were nominated twice for a Gemeaux Award for sports broadcasting. In 2013, Brulotte was honoured with the Jack Graney Award joining Jacques Doucet, Jerry Howarth and Tom Cheek as members of this elite group. As of August 2012, he joined TVA Sports Network as an analyst on the Blue Jays' French broadcasts. His hobbies are golf, books and movies.


## DENIS CASAVANT

PLAY-BY-PLAY ANNOUNCER (FRENCH)
Denis Casavant has been describing games for over 40 years, covering baseball, hockey, football, basketball and the Olympic Games. Casavant spent 17 seasons calling games for the Montreal Expos on the club's French radio network, including Dennis Martinez's perfect game on July 28, 1991. He began his broadcasting career in 1982 covering the Olympiques junior hockey team and the Ottawa Rough Riders for a radio station in Hull. Casavant produced and did play-by-play for Expos games from 1986-1989 and then joined RDS for television broadcasts where he covered the Expos and many other sports for nearly 25 years.

As the only sports and entertainment venue of its size and design in Canada, Rogers Centre is one of the most dynamic and versatile entertainment facilities in the world. From music and sport to trade and community events, some of the most iconic athletes, rock stars, entertainers, religious figures, and inspirational leaders have delighted audiences since the stadium's spectacular opening on June 3, 1989.
Formerly known as SkyDome, the venue was renamed Rogers Centre on February 2, 2005. Structurally, the building remains much the same today as it was when it opened in 1989; however, on July 28, 2022, the Toronto Blue Jays announced a multi-year $\$ 300$ million privately funded renovation that transformed Rogers Centre from a multi-purpose stadium into a ballpark. This phased project was by far the largest renovation in the building's history, though over the years, Rogers Centre has undergone smaller-scale changes, including widened concourses; updated suites; innovative lighting system; and new video, audio, and broadcast technology.
This impressive technology includes cutting-edge Daktronics video and ribbon boards debuted in 2022, replacing the old system that had been in place since 2005. The 10 mm LED videoboard includes an 8,076 square-foot display, with the centre screen measuring 47 feet tall, flanked by two lower wings stretching 258 feet. The 16 mm LED ribbon boards are 1,334 feet long, wrapping along the 300 level fascia. With the upgrade, resolution improved 2.5-times to 1080p HD.
The 2022 season also saw the introduction of a state-of-theart LED Musco lighting system, including brand new backend infrastructure, making Rogers Centre the first Major League ballpark (along with the Miami's LoanDepot Park) to have independent red, green, blue, and amber fixtures, enabling a lighting display of millions of colours and scene options. The previous system was installed in 2011, with original backend infrastructure from the building's opening, and with the new system, hydro consumption was reduced by two-thirds. With more than 2.5 kilometres of fiberoptics and 40,000 feet of copper wire instantaneously controlling 532 LED fixtures (47 colour-changing; four bullpen; and 16 ball trackers), stadium lights can even dance to the beat of music!
Beyond stadium audio and visual technology, the Blue Jays playing surface has evolved substantially throughout its history.
This included a major shift ahead of the 2016 season, with the infield retrofitted from its original state of four separate concrete pits filled with dirt to form each base, to an all-dirt infield. The new dirt infield allows for greater material depth, ensuring the best quality infield surface and more consistency across the league. Now approximately 12,000 square feet, the infield is made up of five distinct layers: the under fill the existing sand and gravel base below the concrete floor; a two-inch layer of pea gravel for excess water drainage; a four-inch layer of sub-angular sand to manage moisture; sixinches of baseball dirt made up of $60 \%$ sand, $20 \%$ clay, and $20 \%$ silt, processed specifically for baseball fields; and finally, top dressing - a loose layer of calcined and vitrified clay material. The pitcher's mound is constructed on a fibreglass dish that is lowered and raised by a hydraulic system.
The remainder of the field is a permanent AstroTurf $®$ Diamond Series turf system, installed for the 2022 season to improve safety and playability, replacing the previous convertible system introduced in 2015. It was updated again in 2024 as part of the second phase of Rogers Centre renovations and is made up of a Brock shock pad installed over the concrete subgrade, with turf on top made up of three fibres - polyethylene monofilament, slit film, and rootzone fibres and infilled with subangular sand and granulated rubber.
Rogers Centre's 2022-2023 offseason renovation completely redesigned the Blue Jays outfield to modernize the fan experience and add nuance to how the park plays. The stadium
was one of two remaining MLB venues to have both symmetrical outfield dimensions and wall heights, previously measuring 328 feet down the foul lines, 375 feet to the power alleys, and 400 feet to dead center field, with 10-foot-high walls. The new outfield walls added variations in heights, depths, and angles, creating a distinct and dynamic ballpark character.
While Rogers Centre has evolved into a baseball-first venue, the original engineering was some of the first of its kind. One of the unique original features was the ability to modify the 100 level bowl between two modes - baseball and football - to fit the needs of any event. Prior to the 2023-2024 renovations, the 100 level seats sat on a railway track system that could rotate within hours.
The most remarkable feature, still in use today, is a fully retractable roof converting the ballpark into an open-air venue and rotating back in less than 30 minutes to ensure that no event needs to be cancelled due to inclement weather. The roof system features a series of three moveable and one stationary panel, which takes approximately 25 minutes to open or close fully. The roof weighs 11,000 tons and covers an area of 339,343 square feet, with the highest point standing 282 feet above field level.
Architects Rod Robbie and Michael Allen designed the building and patented its retractable roof system. Preparation of the site began in April 1986, with ground-breaking in October of that same year. The last exterior concrete was poured in November 1988 and the first test of the moveable roof panels was performed in January 1989. More than 10,000 personyears of employment were created with the construction of Rogers Centre.
Legends is the exclusive food and beverage supplier of Rogers Centre.
Conveniently located in the heart of Toronto's vibrant downtown community, at the base of the CN Tower and close to the Entertainment and Financial Districts, the ballpark is easily accessible via the TTC and GO Transit.

## ROGERS CENTRE INTERESTING FACTS

- The entire Rogers Centre complex spans 12.7 acres ( 5.14 hectares). The building itself takes up 11.5 acres (4.66 hectares).
- The diameter of the building is 700 feet while the volume inside the stadium with the roof closed is 56.5 million cubic feet ( 1.6 million cubic meters).
- On average, it takes approximately 40 hours to convert the field from baseball to concert mode.
- Seating bowl capacity: approximately $\mathbf{3 9 , 1 5 0}$
- Suites: 120 suites are located on the 300 and 400 levels of the venue.
- Premium clubs: there are three premium clubs located beneath the 100 level seating bowl - TD Lounge, Rogers Banner Club, and the Blueprint Club - as well as Ticketmaster Lounge on the 300 level and TD Clubhouse on the 200 level
- The Toronto Blue Jays 1993 World Series Title was won on home turf at Rogers Centre (Saturday, October 23 vs. Philadelphia; 8-6)
- On March 17, 2002 Rogers Centre set a venue attendance record when it hosted 68,237 fans for WrestleMania X8.

The Blue Jays slugged their way to a 9-5 triumph over the Chicago White Sox in their April 7, 1977, debut.
Despite snow flurries before the game and near-freezing temperatures, 44,649 fans witnessed the exciting contest, which featured 16 hits by the Blue Jays and 15 by Chicago.
The Blue Jays played 968-games from April 7, 1977-May 28, 1989 at Exhibition Stadium posting a record of 492-476 with 23,213,567 fans passing through the turnstiles.

The Blue Jays are the only Major League Baseball team to have remained in the same Spring Training location throughout franchise history. Located at the corner of Douglas Avenue and Beltrees Street in Dunedin, FL, TD Ballpark has been the Spring Training home for the Toronto Blue Jays since the club's first season in 1977. It is also home to the Dunedin Blue Jays of the Florida State League (Class-A affiliate).
From 1977 to 1989, the Blue Jays played at Grant Field. The first ever Blue Jays game played there was on March 11, 1977 with the Blue Jays defeating the New York Mets by a score of 3-1. In 1990, the City of Dunedin built Dunedin Stadium at Grant Field for the Blue Jays, increasing the seating capacity from 3,417 to 6,106 . The project cost of approximately $\$ 2.4$ million, designed by the architect firm Johnston Dana Associates and built by Case Contracting Company.
On September 8, 2000, the City of Dunedin and the Blue Jays reached an agreement to keep the team in Dunedin for a minimum of 15 years. Under the new agreement, major renovations were made to Dunedin Stadium and a new Minor League facility was constructed. The $\$ 12.5$ million renovation was shared between the State of Florida, Pinellas County, the City of Dunedin, and the Blue Jays. The renovations to Dunedin Stadium began in February 2002 and were designed by the architectural firm HOK Sports + Venue + Event and built by J.A. Jones Construction. The changes to Dunedin Stadium included a new two-story building beyond the right field wall, which holds the Blue Jays clubhouse, training room, and weight room on the ground floor, with office space for the Major League club on the second floor. The visiting clubhouse was located on the third-base line and the bleacher seats along the right-field foul line were removed in favour of permanent seating. The dimensions of the stadium increased from 315 to 327 feet with a capacity of 5,509.
Construction on the Minor League facility was completed for the 2003 season. The Bobby Mattick Training Center was located on the same grounds of the Englebert Complex. Until 2018, the facility featured clubhouses, offices, a weight room, five full fields, and one half field.
In December of 2018, the Blue Jays announced a partnership between the City of Dunedin, Pinellas County, and the State of Florida for a $\$ 102$ million overhaul of the ballpark and Minor League facilities, keeping Dunedin as the Spring Training home of the Blue Jays for another 25 years. The renovation to the ballpark expanded capacity to 8,500 (including standing room only) and featured a brand-new Jays Shop, renovated suites, an air-conditioned bar, a family area, a $360^{\circ}$ boardwalk linking each side of the ballpark, an enhanced videoboard and speaker system, and refreshed concession stands and restrooms. On November 4, 2019, the Blue Jays officially renamed the newly renovated stadium TD Ballpark, building on a five-year sponsor relationship announced in early 2019. The grand opening of TD Ballpark took place on February 24, 2020 versus the Atlanta Braves.
The second major piece of the investment included a revolutionary Player Development Complex, featuring three new diamonds, a 10,000 square foot weight room, dedicated Major and Minor League clubhouses, pitching and hitting labs, a 3,000 square foot kitchen, variable depth pools, a sprint hill, and covered agility field. The new facility opened in the fall of 2020, at which point the Bobby Mattick Complex will be turned over to the City of Dunedin.
The largest spring exhibition game crowd in Dunedin prior to the 2020 renovation was 6,218, on Tuesday, March 27, 1990 between the Blue Jays and the Kansas City Royals, and on Wednesday, March 13, 1985 between the Blue Jays and the New York Mets. However, that mark was eclipsed during the 2020 Spring Training Home Opener at TD Ballpark, as 6,335 fans entered on February 24 to see the Blue Jays take on the Atlanta Braves in their newly renovated park. Three years later, as pandemic travel restrictions for Canadian baseball fans dissipated, a new record of 7,011 fans was established when the Blue Jays took on the Yankees for their 2023 Home Opener on February 26.

## glossary Of MEDICAL TERMS

ABDUCT - Movement of any extremity away from the midline of the body. This action is achieved by an abductor muscle.
AC JOINT - Acromioclavicular joint; joint of the shoulder where acromion process of the scapula and the distal end of the clavicle meet; most shoulder separations occur at this point.
ADDUCT - Movement of any extremity towards the midline of the body. This action is achieved by an adductor muscle.
ANTERIOR - In front of; the front surface of.
ANTERIOR CRUCIATE LIGAMENT (ACL) - A primary stabilizing ligament within the center of the knee joint that prevents hyperextension and excessive rotation of the joint. A complete tear of the ACL necessitating reconstruction could require up to 12 months of rehabilitation.
ANTI-INFLAMMATORY - Any agent which prevents inflammation, such as aspirin or ibuprofen.
ARTHROGRAM - X-ray technique for joints using air and/or dye injected into the affected area; useful in diagnosing meniscus tears of the knee and rotator cuff tears of the shoulder.
ARTHROSCOPY - A surgical examination of the internal structures of a joint by means of viewing through an arthroscope. An arthroscopic procedure can be used to remove or repair damaged tissue or as a diagnostic procedure in order to inspect the extent of any damage or confirm a diagnosis.
BONE SCAN - An imaging procedure in which a radioactive-labeled substance is injected into the body to determine the status of a bone injury. If the radioactive substance is taken up by the bone at the injury site, the injury will show as a "hot spot" on the scan image. The bone scan is particularly useful in the diagnosis of stress fractures.
CARTILAGE - Smooth, slippery substance preventing two ends of bones from rubbing together.
CAT SCAN - Use of a computer to produce a cross-sectional view of the anatomical part being investigated from $x$-ray data.
CHARLEY HORSE - A contusion or bruise to any muscle resulting in intramuscular bleeding.
CONCUSSION - Jarring injury of the brain resulting in dysfunction. It can be graded as mild, moderate or severe depending on loss of consciousness, amnesia and loss of equilibrium.
CONTUSION - An injury to muscle and tissues cause by a blow from a blunt object.
DEBRIDEMENT - Removal of non-healthy tissues and foreign material from a wound or burn to prevent infection and permit healing.
DELTOID MUSCLE - Muscles at the top of the arm, just below the shoulder, responsible for shoulder motions to the front, side and back.
DISC - A flat, rounded plate between each vertebrae of the spine. The disc consists of a thick fibering which surrounds a soft gel-like interior. It functions as a cushion for the spinal column.
FEMUR - Thigh bone; largest bone in the body.
FIBULA - Smaller of the two bones in the lower leg; runs from the knee to the ankle along the outside of the lower leg.
FRACTURE - Breach in continuity of a bone. Types of fractures include simple, compound, comminuted, greenstick, incomplete, impacted, Iongitudinal, oblique, stress or transverse.
GADOLINIUM MRI - The chemical gadolinium is injected into the joint being studied so as to enhance the diagnosis of the structure under investigation.
GLENOID - Cavity of the scapula into which the head of the humerus fits to form the shoulder girdle.
GRADE ONE INJURY - A mild injury in which ligament, tendon, or other musculoskeletal tissue may have been stretched or confused, but not torn or otherwise disrupted.
GRADE TWO INJURY - A moderate injury when musculoskeletal tissue has been partially, but not totally torn which causes appreciable limitation in function of the injured tissue.
GRADE THREE INJURY - A severe injury in which tissue has been significant, and in some cases totally, torn or otherwise disrupted causing a virtual total loss of function.
GROIN - Junction of the thigh and abdomen; location of muscles that rotate, flex and adduct the hip.
HEMATOMA - Tumor-like mass produced by an accumulation of coagulated blood in a cavity.

HYPEREXTENSION - Extreme extension of a limb or body part.
IMPINGEMENT SYNDROME - Pinching together of the supraspinatus muscle and other soft tissue in the shoulder. The most common (throwing) arm injury, which represents many pathologies and generall involves supraspinatus overuse.
INFLAMMATION - The body's natural response to injury in which the injury site might display various degrees of pain, swelling, heat, redness and/or loss of function.
LABRUM (Labrum Glenoidule) - The cartilage of the glenoid cavity in the shoulder. A lip-edge or lip-like structure.
LATERAL - To the outside of the body.
LIGAMENT - Band of fibrous tissue that connects bone to bone, or bone to cartilage and supports and strengthens joints.
MAGNETIC RESONANCE IMAGING (MRI) - Imaging procedure in which a radio frequency pulse causes certain electrical elements of the injured tissue to react to this pulse and through this process a computer display and permanent film establish a visual image. MRI does not require radiation and is very useful in the diagnosis of soft tissue, disc, and meniscus injuries.
MEDIAL - To the inside of the body.
MEDIAL COLLATERAL LIGAMENT (MCL) - Ligament of knee along the medial aspect that connects the femur to the joint.
MENISCUS - Crescent shaped cartilage, usually pertaining to the knee joint; also known as "cartilage." There are two menisci in the knee, medial and lateral. These work to absorb weight within the knee and provide stability.
METACARPALS - Five long bones of the hand running from the wrist to the fingers.
METATARSALS - Five long bones of the foot, running from the ankle to the toes.
POSTERIOR - At the back part, or rear of the body.
POSTERIOR CRUCIATE LIGAMENT (PCL) - A primary stabilizing ligament of the knee that provides significant stability and prevents displacement of the tibia backward within the knee joint. A complete tear of this ligament necessitating reconstruction could require up to 12 months of rehabilitation.
QUADRICEP MUSCLES "QUADS" - A group of four muscles of the front thigh that run from the hip and form a common tendon at the patella; they are responsible for knee extension.
ROTATOR CUFF - Comprised of four muscles in the shoulder area that can be irritated by overuse. The muscles are the supraspinatus (most commonly injured), infraspinatus, teres minor and subscapularis.
ROTATOR CUFF IMPINGEMENT SYNDROME - A microtrauma or overuse injury caused by stress. The four stages are: 1) tendenitis with temporary thickening of the bursa and rotator cuff 2) fiber dissociation in the tendon with permanent thickening of the bursa and scar formation 3) a partial rotator cuff tear of less than 1 cm and 4) a complete tear of 1 cm or more.
SHIN SPLINT - A catch-all syndrome describing pain in the shin that is not a fracture or tumor, and cannot be defined otherwise.
SPRAIN - Injury resulting from the stretch or twist of the joint and causes various degrees of stretch or tear of a ligament or other soft tissue at the joint.
STRAIN - Injury resulting from a pull or torsion to the muscle or tendon that causes various degrees of stretch or tear to the muscle or tendon tissue.
STRESS FRACTURE - A hair-line type of break in a bone caused by overuse.
SYNOVITIS - Inflammation of the synovial lining of a joint.
TENDINITIS - Inflammation of the tendon and/or tendon sheath, caused by chronic overuse or sudden injury.
TENDON - Tissue that connects muscle to bone.
TIBIA - Larger of the two bones of the lower leg and is the weight-bearing bone of the shin.
ULNAR NERVE - Nerve in the elbow commonly irritated from excessive throwing.
ULTRASOUND - An electrical modality that transmits a sound wave through an applicator into the skin to the soft tissue in order to heat the local area for relaxing the injured tissue and/or disperse edema.
