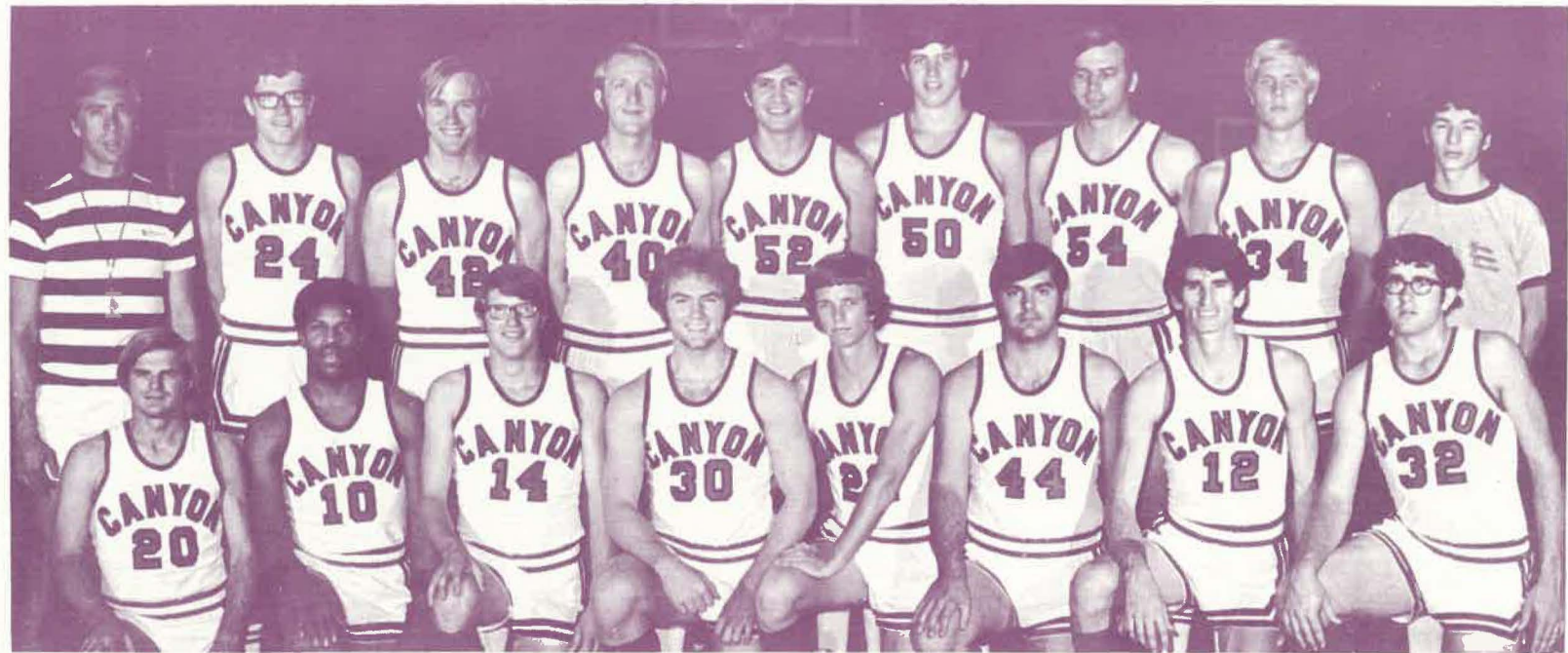

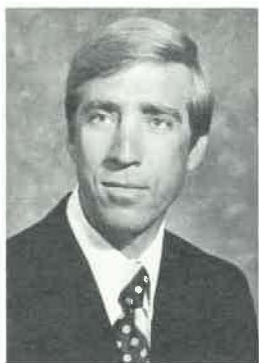

COACH LINDSEY



Coach Ben Lindsey will be starting his eighth year as head mentor over the Antelopes. During this period of time the Lopes have established themselves as a formidable foe in never failing to win in double figures.

Lindsey's over-all record as a coach is 98-85 with his best effort being 1969-70 when his charges went 21-5 in regular season play before bowing out in the district playoffs.

Last season the Lopes came through a rebuilding year in fine fashion as they carved out a 17-11 regular season record which was costly, however, as starting center Rudy Santa Cruz and starting guard David Everett missed the loss to Regis in the district playoffs due to injuries.

Coach is a native of the valley as he was born in Glendale, Arizona and has spent most of his years in the Phoenix area.

Before becoming basketball coach at Grand Canyon College, Mr. Lindsey spent three years at Phoenix Christian High School where he was head basketball and baseball coach.

Coach is an alumnus of GCC, class of '62, where he excelled in basketball and baseball. During this time "Big Ben", a sharpshooting forward, broke four school scoring records, two of which still stand. His most points in one season, 510, and most points per game, 23.2, were broken in 1966-67 by Wayne Bateman. His most points in a single game, 44, and most points in a three year career, 1235, may be hard for future players to match.

Since receiving a bachelors degree at Grand Canyon, Coach has earned a masters degree from Arizona State University, where he is currently doing work toward a doctorate.

Coach's wife, Jerri, is also an alumnus of GCC and has earned a masters degree from Arizona State University. They have two sons, Yancy and Randall, and a daughter, Mandy.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



Coach Dave Brazell is in his 22nd season at Grand Canyon College. A native of Arkansas, Coach is a graduate of Harrison High School in Arkansas, State College of Arkansas, and the University of Arkansas. His doctoral work was completed at Arizona State University.

For 14 years Dr. Brazell coached the basketball team in addition to his job of Athletic Director and Baseball Coach. During this time, the Antelopes won 151 games while losing 134. The best record was 1958-59 when the hardwood crew was undefeated, winning all 20 games.

Last year's baseball team was 41 and 14 against some of the toughest teams in the country. The local nine was ranked in the top ten in the nation in the college division for almost the entire season. The Antelopes again qualified for the District Tournament - a feat they have accomplished every year since becoming eligible for the playoffs - but lost in the finals of the Area Tournament as the Antelopes were shooting for a second straight national tournament spot.

Over the past five seasons the Antelopes are 193-70. This next season promises to be another exciting one with the locals playing close to a 48 game schedule with about 40 of these on the home diamond.

Dr. Brazell is active in numerous professional organizations. He is past Chairman for the Men's Athletic Division of the Southwest District of the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation, also a past president of the Arizona Association for Health, Physical Education, and Recreation.

SEASON'S OUTLOOK

Nine lettermen, including four seasoned starters, will be returning from last year's 17-12 team which earned the Antelopes their second playoff berth since becoming N.A.I.A. members four years ago.

It would appear that the Lopes will again have all of the ingredients necessary for another winning season. The addition of several new players to go with those returning could enhance things even more.

Rudy Santa Cruz, the Lopes' 6'7" center who missed the last five ball games of the last season with an injured knee, is back after surgery and appears to be ready to play. 6'5" all-district forward, Jim Irvine, is also back as is 6'4" forward Rod Baxter, and 5'11" guard Gene Helton, all of which were starters the whole season long. Other experienced returnees are 6'7" Gary Bretz, 6'3" Steve Dunse, 6'3" Rob Babcock, 5'10" Bernie Teague, and 6'5" Craig Darrington.

Newcomers who are sure to boost the over-all strength are 6'5" Earl Wilcox, 6'5" Gary Lansman, 6'3" Greg Wolf, 6'3" Truett Forrest, and 6'9" Bayard Forrest.

The Antelopes will have one of their tallest teams ever as no less than eight players will be 6'5" or over with three of those topping 6'7". It is hoped that this improvement in height will enable the Lopes to overcome last year's deficiency in rebounding where they trailed their opponents 43.0 to 47.8 in rebounds per game.

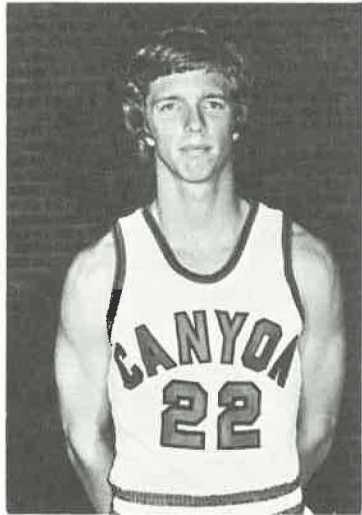
It is also anticipated that the addition of Wilcox, who averaged 10.8 PPG as a sub in 1969-70, Lansman 15 plus for York J.C., and Bayard Forrest, who tallied 27 plus as a prep star, will give the Lopes added scoring punch.

The most reliable strength, however, should again be the Antelope's superb defense. The district's top defensive team last year, the Lopes will undoubtedly place much emphasis on this important aspect of their game.

If the machinery fits together properly and the right kind of leadership emerges, it could be an enjoyable season.
