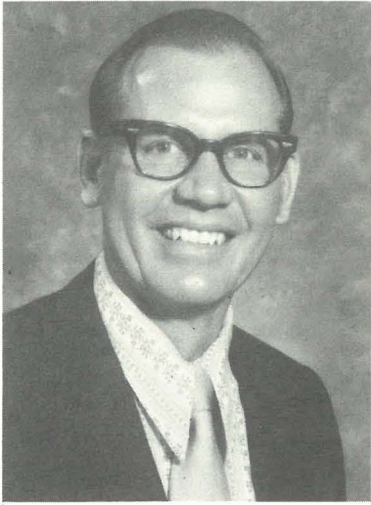

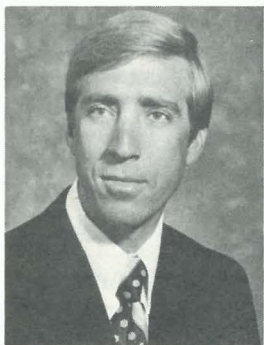

GRAND CANYON COLLEGE

Grand Canyon College, Arizona's only accredited church-related college, is a four year, liberal arts college with a current enrollment of 937. The college is large enough to have a strong academic program along with athletic activities. At the same time, it is small enough for the faculty and staff to know each student and to give personal assistance to each one enrolled. The college is distinctly Christian and seeks to contribute to the spiritual, moral, and intellectual growth of each student. Grand Canyon College is justifiably proud of the record of its athletic teams and the services of its coaching staff.

Now beginning its twenty-fifth year of service, Grand Canyon College seeks to continue to improve and expand its program that it may make an increasingly significant contribution in the field of Christian higher education. COACH LINDSEY



Coach Ben Lindsey will be starting his ninth year as head mentor over the Antelopes. During this period of time the Lopes have established themselves as a formidable foe in N.A.I.A. District 7, never failing to win in double figures.

Mr. Lindsey's overall record as a coach is 117-95 with his best effort being 1969-1970 when his charges went 21-5 in regular season play before bowing out in the district playoffs.

Last season the Lopes refused to bow, however, as they captured their first N.A.I.A. District 7 Championship by downing New Mexico Highlands 91-61 and Westminster-Utah 79-64. This title led to a free plane ride to Kansas City, Mo. and a chance to compete in the N.A.I.A. National Championship Tournament where the Lopes were clipped by Winona State 70-64. This was the third time that the Antelopes had qualified for the district playoffs in their five years of N.A.I.A. membership.

Coach is a native of the valley as he was born in Glendale, Arizona and has spent most of his 33 years in the Phoenix area. Before becoming basketball coach at Grand Canyon College, Mr. Lindsey spent three years as a high school coach where he directed football, basketball, and baseball teams.

Coach is an alumnus of GCC, class of '62 where he excelled in basketball and baseball. During this time "Big Ben", a sharpshooting forward, broke four school scoring records, two of which still stand. His most points in one season, 510, and most points per game, 23.2, were broken in 1966-67 by Wayne Bateman. His most points in a single game, 44, and most points in a three year career, 1,235, may be hard for future players to match.

Since receiving a bachelors degree at Grand Canyon, Coach has earned a masters degree from Arizona State University, where he is currently doing work toward a doctorate.

Coach's wife, Jerri, is also an alumnus of GCC and has earned a masters degree from Arizona State University. They have two sons, Yancy and Randall, and a daughter, Mandy.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



Coach Dave Brazell is in his 23rd season at Grand Canyon College. A native of Arkansas, Coach is a graduate of Harrison High School in Arkansas, State College of Arkansas, and the University of Arkansas. His doctoral work was completed at Arizona State University.

For 14 years Dr. Brazell coached the basketball team in addition to his job of Athletic Director and Baseball Coach. During this time, the Antelopes won 151 games while losing 134. The best record was 1958-59 when the hardwood crew was undefeated, winning all 20 games.

Last year's baseball team was 40 and 18 against some of the toughest teams in the country. The local nine was ranked in the top ten in the nation in the college division for almost the entire season. The Antelopes again qualified for the District Tournament - a feat they have accomplished every year since becoming eligible for the playoffs. After winning the District VII Tournament, the diamond crew proceeded to win the Area II Tournament against favored Sam Houston State, Southern University, and Lubbock Christian College. The Antelopes then advanced to the National Tournament and placed fifth.

Over the past five seasons, the Antelopes are 198-76. This next season promises to be another exciting one with the locals playing close to a 50 game schedule with about 40 of these on the home diamond.

Dr. Brazell is active in numerous professional organizations. He is past Chairman for the Men's Athletic Division of the Southwest District of the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation, also a past president of the Arizona Association for Health, Physical Education, and Recreation.

SEASON'S OUTLOOK

With the graduation of five lettermen, including four who saw action as starters, the Grand Canyon College Antelopes will be playing under the suspicious cloak of "a rebuilding year." The Lope's smooth working machine of last year will need several replacement parts if they are to successfully defend their title of N.A.I.A. District 7 champs. The Lopes walked off with the district title last season and competed for the first time ever in the N.A.I.A. championships in Kansas City.

Two key returning starters, however, should give Head Coach Ben Lindsey a good foundation to build on. Bayard Forrest, 6'10" center and Jim Irvine, 6'5" forward both hold the distinction of making first team all-district, Irvine in 1971-72 and Forrest last year. They were also the Lope's two top scorers last season with Forrest getting 17.2 PPG and Irvine 13.0 PPG. Forrest was also the district's top rebounder with 14.4 RPG and, according to Lindsey, Irvine was the district's best defensive player.

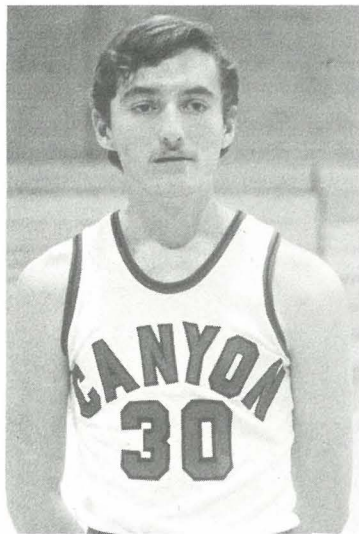
Other returnees who should see considerable action are 6'3" guard Rob Babcock, 6'2" guard Truett Forrest, 6'3" forward Steve Dunse, and 6'6" center Steve Vander Ploeg. Babcock, an outstanding shooter, will be finishing a fine four year career.

Two "redshirts" and two J. C. transfers will be the principle newcomers to watch as 6'0" guard Dave "Rave" Everett is back after a year's absence due to knee surgery and 6'5" Rodney Hightower becomes eligible after redshirting last spring. The new J. C. additions to the Antelopes are 6'5" guard Mike Haddow from East Los Angeles Junior College and 6'0" guard Scott Burdette from Mesa Community College. Haddow and Burdette were both starters on outstanding J. C. teams and should give the Lopes the strongest stable of guards since the era of Burnside, Swinford, and Nite. Another newcomer to watch will be Bayard and Truett's younger brother Jonas Forrest, a 6'6" freshman from Bandon, Oregon, who will likely see much action in this his first year.

According to Coach Ben Lindsey, the big question will be how quickly and how well the new and inexperienced players can fill the shoes of those who have graduated. "Quickness will be the best that we have ever had. We, of course, are going to make use of this in our defense (which has been tops in the district for the past two years) and if we can develop the necessary leadership and poise, we will be hard to beat."
