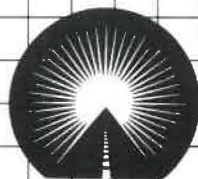

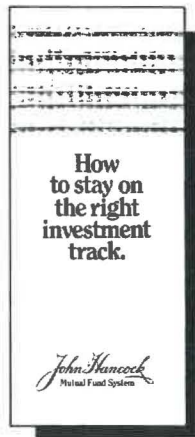

John Hernandez



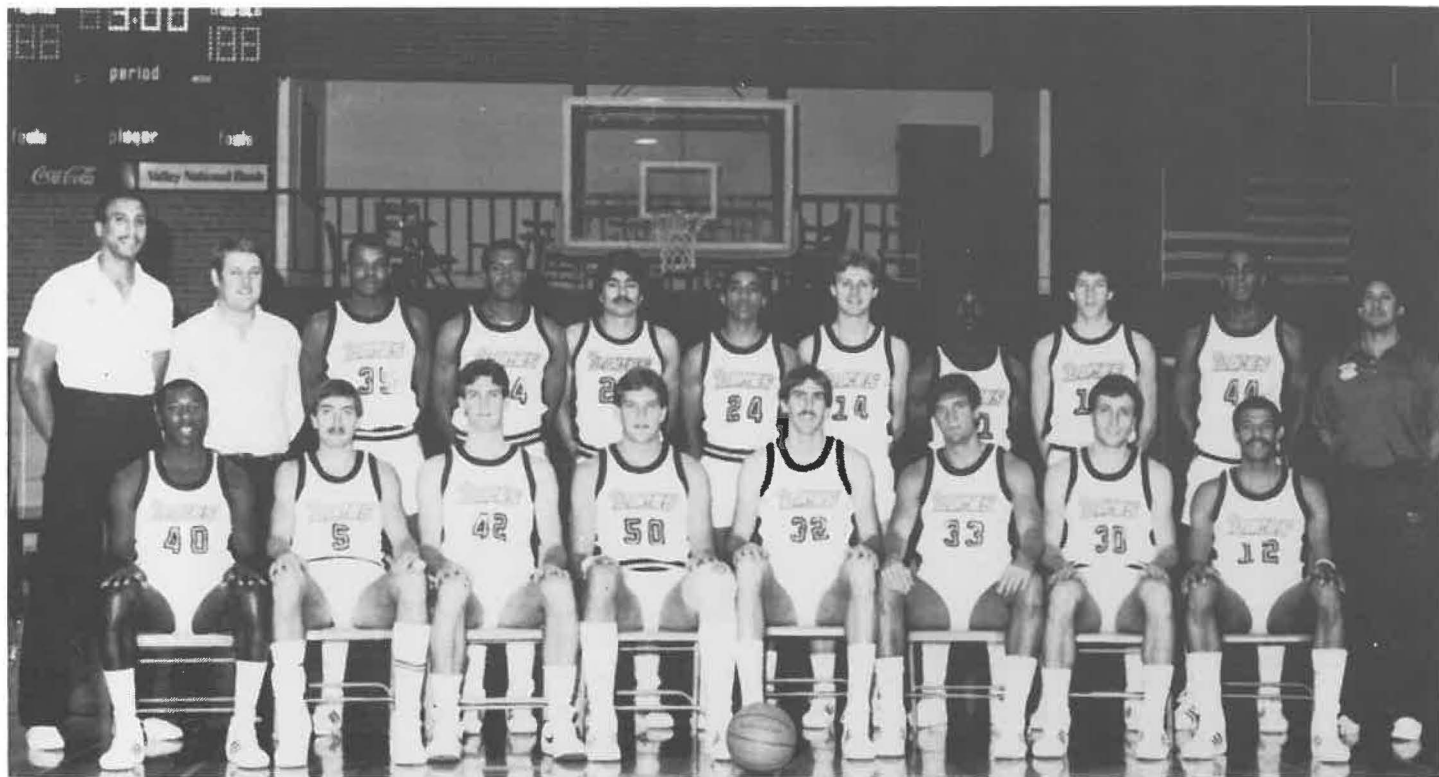
John Hernandez, like his fellow assistant, is also in his first year as an assistant here at Canyon. Unlike Kevin Steele though, John is no stranger to Grand Canyon. A 1979 graduate of Grand Canyon with a degree in Education, John spent four years here.

Upon graduation, John accepted a teaching position at Deer Valley High School here in the Phoenix area. Hernandez' coaching career in basketball has ranged from the small college level to high school. Hernandez was Head Coach for Deer Valley's girls varsity team before accepting a position as Head Coach at Southwestern Baptist Bible College for the 1983-84 season.

Hernandez accepted a tough task in trying to build a program at the small North Phoenix campus that as yet, does not have a gym in which to play home games. Last year, John put together a scrappy team and also brought about some changes at the local school. Southwestern played several preliminary games last year at Antelope gym prior to Canyon contests and also scheduled the first ever game between Grand Canyon and Southwestern Baptist Bible to take place later this year.

It was 10 years ago this season that the Grand Canyon College Antelope Basketball team won their first of two NAIA National Championships under the leadership of Head Coach Ben Lindsey. Now, with John Shumate at the helm, hopes are high that this season will bring new hope of national prominence in the NAIA. A combination of size, experience, and mobility have Canyon setting their sights high.

John Shumate returns for his second season with a fine recruiting year behind him. With the number of returning players sounding very much like the return of a year ago, Shumate assembled a quality list of local high school and junior college players to go along with some four year school transfers and three returning lettermen.

The 'Lopes had to replace the likes of players such as Bryan Williams (6-3, G 15.0 ppg), Billy Carter (6-3, G, 10.8 ppg), Cornell Staples (6-5, F, 10.3 ppg), John Graves (6-10, F, 9.0 ppg) and Mike Boatright (6-8, F, 6.6 rpg). Staples and Graves didn't finish the season last year because of academic problems.

With the task of rebuilding around three returners (Kevin Tucker, Jami Grindatto, and Ricky Davis), Shumate was able to corral three transfers who figure to be very big in the 'Lopes game plan. The biggest hopes probably lie in 7-0 center Dave Cecil, who comes to Canyon from the University of Utah where he played two years ago on a team that went all the way to the NCAA West Regional. Kevin Warren, a 6-3, 200 lb. guard, comes from Arizona State University and is the brother-in-law of Head Coach John Shumate. Warren played one season at the University of Pennsylvania before transferring to ASU where he played in only three games last year because of an injury. Kevin Kennedy rounds out the list of transfers. The 6-8, 220 lb. forward comes to Canyon after two years at the University of Rhode Island. A part time player who started on many occasions, he should help out the situation on the front line.

Canyon also returns a pair of players who have lettered previously for the 'Lopes but did not play last season. Randy Mead, a 6-5 forward, played for Jay Arnote at Canyon during the 1982-83 season. Ray Jackson, a 6-10 center, returns for his final year of eligibility after sitting out after the 82-83 season also.

On the junior college front, Shumate gathered in a trio of players. From Pima College comes Reggie Henderson (6-3, forward) and James Stoglin (6-0, guard). Both were starters, Stoglin at point guard while Henderson was the team's outstanding defender at forward. From Cochise College in Douglas comes Rod Monteverde (6-3, guard). Monteverde scored 52 points in a single game last year against South Mountain Community College, and provided explosive scoring potential.

Add to this list the freshmen. From local high schools, Shumate plucked some fine prospects. Greenway High's Kris Treat is a sharpshooting guard who averaged 17.5 points per game over his last two years in high school. Dan Ryan is the tallest of the underclassmen with his 6-7 frame and hails from St. Mary's High School. Marcos de Niza's Jeff Oats, while only 6-4, could be one of the best overall athletes on the team. Darrell James will switch to the guard slot in college after playing inside for Dobson High School. Also add to the list David James, who is a transfer from Mesa Community College and could be the season's biggest surprise.

Potential exists for the 'Lopes to do well, even though John Shumate isn't predicting any National Titles yet. They do have a good core to build around, and as the season progresses, they could develop into one of Canyon's finest teams in the last few years.

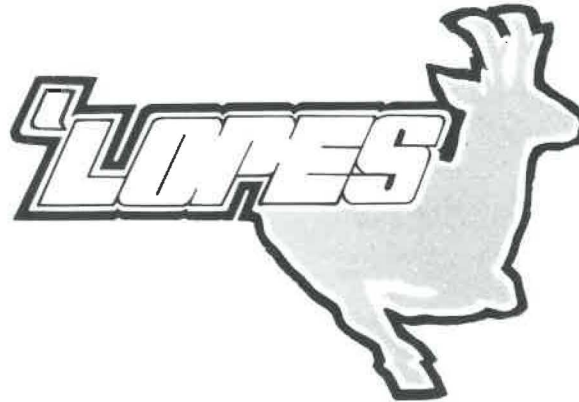

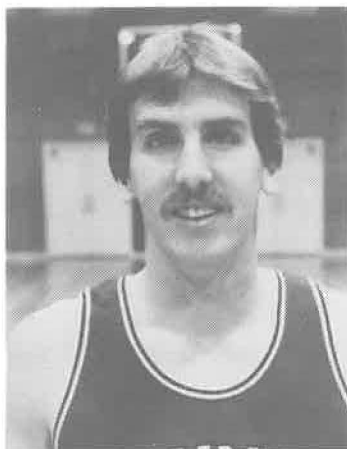

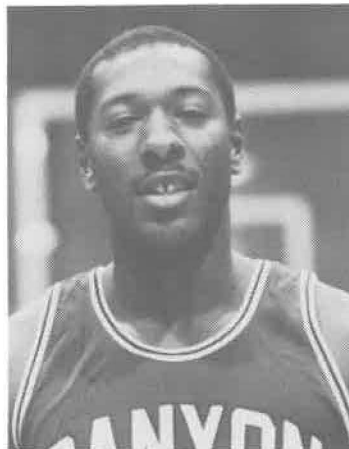
AT CANYON . . . Dave Cecil entered the picture at Grand Canyon in the fall semester of 1983. Initially, Dave was slated to sit out 16 weeks (to fulfill transfer rules) and play last season. A complication arose and if Dave was to play, it would've been only after the second semester began, leaving only 6 regular season games for him to play. As a result, Cecil red-shirted last season and will play the entire season in 1984-85. Dave gives Grand Canyon the big man that has been missing in the past.

COLLEGIATE CAREER . . . Dave has had a much traveled collegiate history. In his first season of college ball, Dave saw limited action with Georgia Southern College. He transferred to Nebraska Western Junior College the following year and averaged 14 points and 8 rebounds for a team that was 29-8, winning the NJCAA Region IX title. Cecil was selected All-Region and played in the NJCAA National Tournament. Cecil then transferred to the University of Utah. In his final year of NCAA eligibility, Dave started 12 of 31 games, averaging about 2 points and 3 rebounds per game. Cecil has played against such superstars as Ralph Sampson and Akeem Olajuwon during his career.

HIGH SCHOOL . . . Unlike most other collegiate athletes, Cecil did not play high school sports, choosing instead to work during his prep days. In fact, it wasn't until Dave was spotted during a city league game in the Oakland area that he was persuaded to play in college. Only 6'6" tall as a high school senior, he grew to 6'11" in his sophomore year in college. Graduated from Bishop O'Dowd High in Oakland, CA.

PERSONAL . . . born 5-20-60 in Oakland, CA. Majoring in Accounting with a minor in Business Administration. The son of Jean Cecil of Oakland, CA.

QUOTES FROM THE COACH . . . "Having a championship team starts in the middle. Dave has the potential to be a huge threat at the post position. He can be dominant both offensively and defensively. Has shown a lot of development."

AT CANYON . . . After sitting out the first 16 weeks of the fall semester last year to fulfill eligibility transfer regulations, Ricky came on to play in 15 games, starting in the last 8 of the season. One of three lettermen returning from last season's 21-9 team that finished the regular season ranked #2 in District 7. Averaged about 5 points and 4 rebounds per game last season while playing 22 minutes per game.

COLLEGIATE CAREER . . . Rick spent his freshman and sophomore seasons at a pair of institutions. His freshman year was spent at the University of Texas in Arlington, Texas. In 7 games, Rick averaged 3 points and 1 rebound per game. Rick did see action in the regional qualifying of the National Invitational Tournament as Arlington fell to South Alabama. As a sophomore, Ricky attended Oklahoma Baptist University where he averaged 10 points and 4 rebounds per game over the season.

HIGH SCHOOL . . . Ricky attended St. Mary's High here in Phoenix and played for Head Coach Ron Gray. Lettered for four years on the varsity at St. Mary's while starting for three years. Averaged 20 points per game his final year while the Knights went 24-2. Finished the season as the state's fourth leading scorer in AAA. A second team selection to the Arizona Republic's All-State Team.

PERSONAL . . . born 10-2-61 in Phoenix, Arizona. Majoring in Sociology, minoring in Communications. Mother is Mrs. Arlean Davis of Phoenix.

QUOTES FROM THE COACH . . . "Rick brings experience back. An extremely hard worker. Character-wise, he is truly an outstanding individual. Very unselfish."

AT CANYON . . . The 21 year old native of Switzerland begins his second year at Grand Canyon College with the hope of continuing to improve. Grindatto adapted well to the American game of basketball last season which differs from the international style of his homeland. A starter in 8 games last season as a freshman, Jami could be a very important player for Canyon this season. One of the high points of his first season was being selected to the Grand Canyon Classic All-Tournament team.

HIGH SCHOOL . . . With the European high school system differing from the American system, Jami was 19 years old when he graduated from high school. Intercollegiate sports do not get much emphasis on this level, so much of his play was on the club level, which is very common in all of Europe. Played for Wetzikon, which is a first division team in Switzerland. Jami helped guide his team to their first ever Cup Championship while playing for Vevey, before deciding to come to America. Jami also played for the Swiss Junior National Team which is made of athletes under 21 years of age, Grindatto also played last summer for the Swiss National team that played in the qualifying rounds for the 1984 Summer Olympics.

PERSONAL . . . born 1-11-63 in Geneva, Switzerland. Grindatto is a Pre-Med student with a double major, Computer Science and Biology. Parents are Jo and Raymonde Grindatto of Ruti, Switzerland.

COLLEGIATE CAREER . . . A transfer from Pima College in Tucson where he played for Head Coach Dwight Reese for two seasons. An All-City selection as a sophomore, his team won the CIF Championship. His senior season Inglewood participated in the California State Championships. Also a track and field letterman for all four years of high school, Reggie finished with the second best 440 yd. dash in the state his junior year with a 47.6 clocking.

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS

The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) is a completely autonomous association, currently administering programs of intercollegiate athletics at over 500 fully-accredited colleges and universities of moderate enrollment. The fundamental tenet of the NAIA is that intercollegiate athletics is an integral part of the total educational program of the institution. This belief is strongly reflected in the governing documents, activities and organizational structure of the Association.

HISTORY AND PURPOSE

Established in 1940 as the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball (NAIB), the NAIA emanated from a "National Small College Basketball Tournament" inaugurated in 1937 in Kansas City, Missouri. The conversion of the NAIB to the NAIA came in 1952 when the organization expanded beyond basketball and added national championship events in golf, outdoor track and field and tennis. Football, cross country, baseball and swimming were added to the championship event calendar in 1956, and wrestling (1958), soccer (1959), bowling (1962-78), gymnastics (1964), indoor track and field (1966), ice hockey (1968) and volleyball (1969-1980) were later additions.

Of major significance to the NAIA, was the establishment of the women's division within the Association on August 1, 1980. The NAIA decision to offer competitive opportunities and championships in women's athletics was passed by the membership following two years of study and proposals by an ad hoc committee on the implementation of a women's division into the NAIA structure. Currently, the Association conducts ten championship event programs for women in the sports of basketball, cross country, gymnastics, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, softball (fast pitch), soccer, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The initial purpose of the NAIA — to provide national championship athletic opportunities to institutions below the so-called "major" level — has indeed been well served. The Association clearly outlines its own responsibilities and those of its members: a sound athletics program, administered and controlled by those responsible for the administration of the institution. This means direct supervision in caliber of competition, financing of the program and taking steps to assure that financial assistance is made available only through the institution and under the same general policies as aid to all students. In short, the basic premise is that the athletics program is a basic component of the overall educational process and not an entity part.

ADMINISTRATION

The governing body of the NAIA is the National Executive Committee, composed of 10 persons elected by the membership. The Executive Committee is responsible for establishing the policies and determining the overall direction of the Association. The Executive Committee hires the Executive Director, who conducts the business and day-to-day operation of the National Office headquartered in Kansas City, Missouri.

The District is the basic unit of the NAIA. The Association is organized into 31 geographical districts spread over the 50 states and a part of Canada. Each District is governed by a District Executive Committee, the chief officer of which is the District Chair. The District Executive Committee establishes a program of championship events in various sports and individual/team champions of those district events are qualified to compete in NAIA Area and National Championship competition.

Eligibility rules within the NAIA govern all play in all sports recognized by the Association, not just post-season play. All eligibility guidelines must be adhered to by all members, including those holding dual affiliation with other associations. Certification of eligibility of all NAIA student/athletes is accomplished through a network of individuals which includes the faculty athletic representative of each institution, the District Eligibility Chair and the National Eligibility Committee.

MEMBERSHIP

Any four-year college or university and upper level two-year institution in the United States and Canada which awards the bachelor's degree or equivalent, may hold active NAIA membership. Active member institutions must be fully accredited by an appropriate accrediting agency or commission.

OBLIGATION OR MEMBERSHIP

Member institutions must conduct their intercollegiate athletic programs with the standards of the regulatory Associations in which they hold membership, and the NAIA. They must pay their annual membership dues and be in support of the policies of the NAIA. Where institutional rules and standards are stricter than those of the regulatory group or the NAIA, those rules and standards of the institution are recognized and supported by the NAIA.
