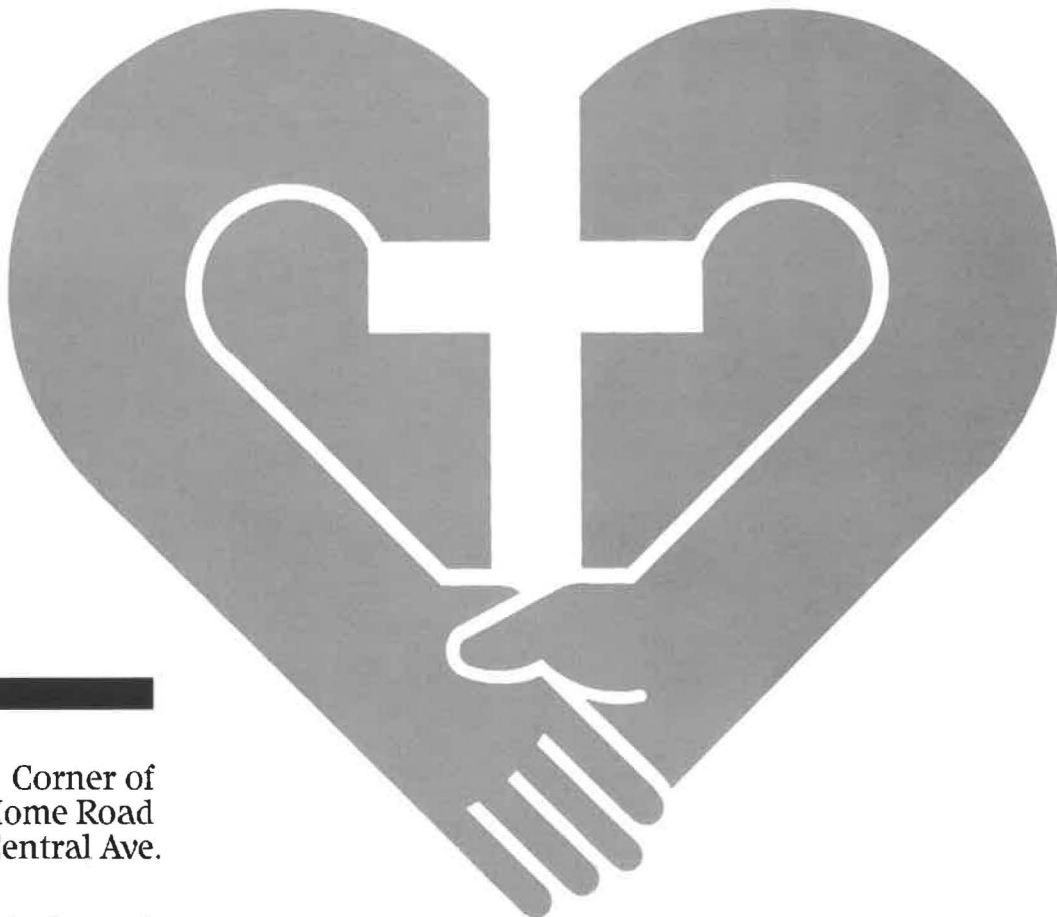

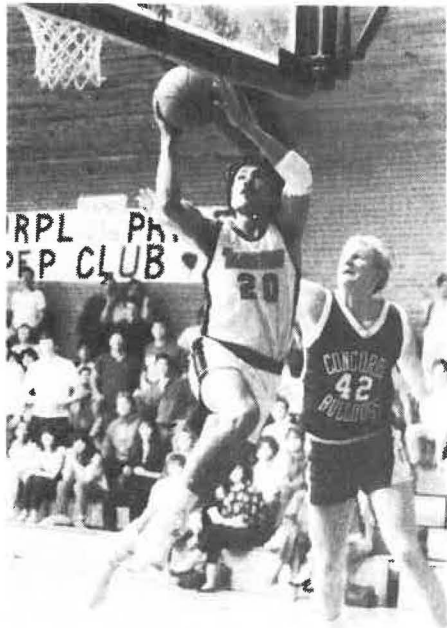

ROD MONTEVERDE

Grand Canyon College and the Golden Corral Family Restaurant are proud to present Rod Monteverde as the Grand Canyon/Golden Corral Player of the Week. Rod is a senior Business Administration major at Grand Canyon with a B- average for work completed here at Grand Canyon. Rod spent his first collegiate years at Cochise College in Douglas, AZ before transferring to Canyon in the fall of 1984.

Last week, Rod helped the 'Lopes split a pair of games in New Mexico. Rod led Canyon in scoring in both games, scoring 20 points in a 92-86 loss at the College of Santa Fe while scoring 21 in a 70-65 win at New Mexico Highlands University.

Rod is currently the team's leading scorer with an 18.6 ppg

average. He also leads the team in steals with 63 (just six shy of his own single season record). Since Kevin Warren completed his eligibility after the first semester, Rod has been called upon to be the leader of the 'Lopes. His total of 124 rebounds for the second season is second only to 6-6 forward Bob Gallagher's total of 136. Rod also leads in total assists with 80 and is second in total points to Warren with 489. Rod needs only 11 points to become the eighth player in Grand Canyon history to score 500 points in one season and needs 43 points to become the 16th player to score 1,000 or more points in a career.

Rod set career highs this year in scoring (34 vs. New Mexico Highlands University), assists (7 vs. Westmont), steals (8 vs. Master's College) and rebounds (13 vs. Southern Utah State College).

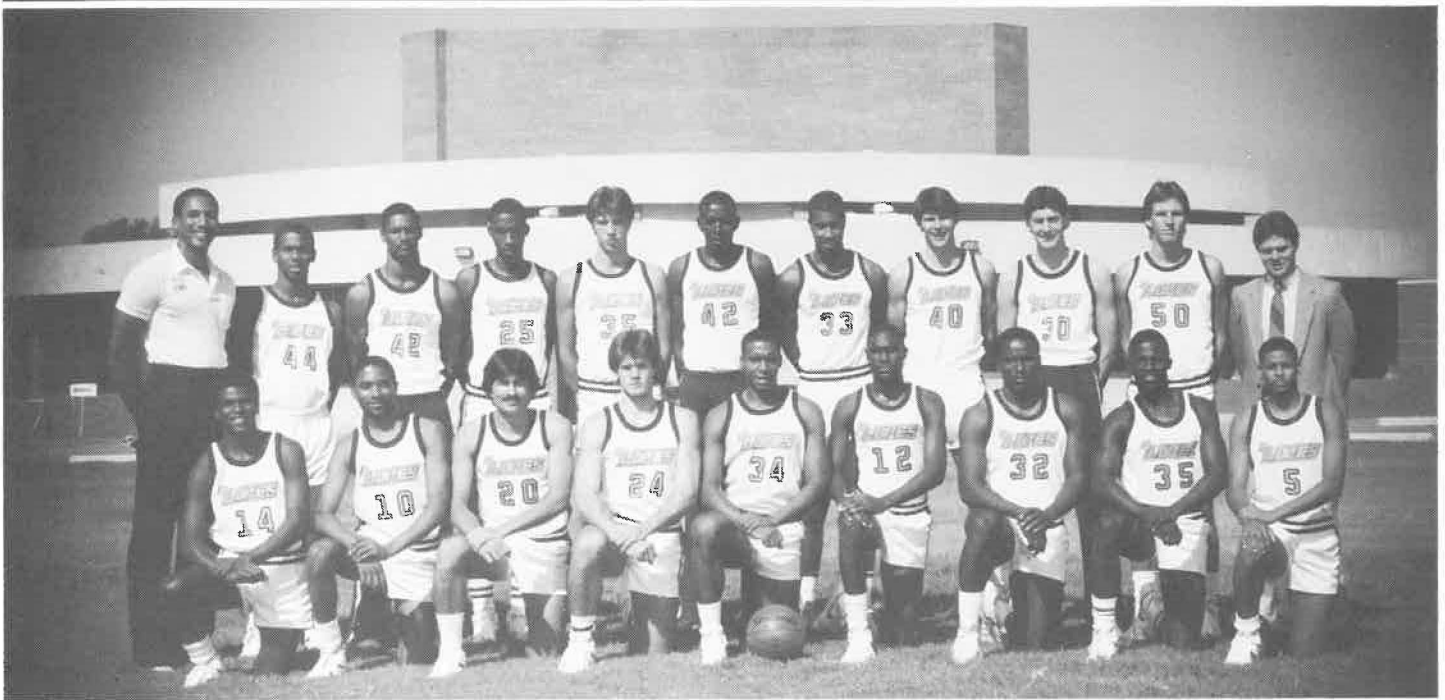

The 1985 - 86 basketball season at Grand Canyon College should be and interesting one for Antelope fans, as the 'Lopes cagers prepare to play an exciting brand of basketball. With much of the size gone from last year's 18-16 team that lost in the NAIA District 7 finals, the new-look 'Lopes will center on speed and quickness to develop a running game this year.

In what Head Coach John Shumate calls, "for all practical purposes, a rebuilding year," Canyon welcomes only three returners and 16 new faces for their 1985 - 86 campaign. The pre-season roster is composed of six freshmen, three sophomores, six juniors and four seniors.

The familiar faces will include last year's one-two scoring tandem of Kevin Warren (17.6 ppg) and Rod Monteverde (14.2 ppg). Also returning is part-time starter at season's end, Darrell James. At this point, it is still difficult for Shumate and his staff to say who will be starting when the 'Lopes open the season at home on November 16 against the Master's College (formerly Los Angeles Baptist College). The only absolutes right now seen to be Warren and Monteverde said Shumate. Everything else still seems to be wide open.

For Shumate, starting his third year at Canyon, the goal still is to establish a tradition. "Once we have the tradition, a chemistry, it will be easier to get the proper kind of athletes . . . athletes who are serious about their education and obtaining a degree, and who also want to refine their athletic abilities," said Shumate. The '85 - '86 'Lopes seem to have the athletes to be successful. Their ability to put their ability to use on the basketball floor is still a concern to Shumate.

"It's a new situation for all involved. It will take a lot of patience and discipline to play the type of game we want to play," said Shumate. "We have a bunch of good athletes and we're committed to the running game both offensively and defensively. The type of game we're planning to play, especially with our young players, could mean we'll turn the ball over alot. We must improve game by game if we hope to be successful."

Shumate noted that Canyon will utilize overall team quickness to apply pressure on opponents in '85 - '86. Man-to-man pressure, trapping defenses and fast breaks should be the tone of Canyon play this year. In order to do this, the 'Lopes will count heavily on the newcomers to back up Warren, Monteverde and Darrell James. Although there has been inconsistency in early workouts, the coaching staff has been impressed with certain factors. The common factor among all of the athletes at this time, according to Shumate, is hard work. Shumate preaches the work-ethic to his players, and so far they have responded with good efforts. Shumate had words of praise for all the newcomers.

One thing that could put a dent in the 'Lope's playoff hopes is the fact that returning guard Kevin Warren runs out of eligibility at the end

of the first semester. Warren will be able to play up to the end of January Term, at which time he will graduate and no longer be able to participate. Warren was an academic All America selection last year.

Problems have hit the 'Lopes early this year. Seven players have been injured or ill, causing them to miss conditioning drills or early season practice. Darrell James suffered a stress fracture last summer and is still feeling the effects. Bob Henige suffered from back problems and missed conditioning drills. Bob Gallagher had surgery this fall for a hernia problem. Bobby Gantt had an appendectomy this fall. Richard Gano underwent back surgery in mid October. Michael Greene had an aggravating back injury limiting his play. And John Sheatham had a groin pull. If the pre-season injury list is any indication of what might happen during the season, the 'Lopes will have to depend heavily on their underclassmen to step in and perform.

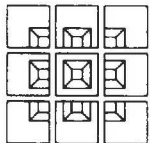
This season's freshman class includes three players from the Dallas area in Texas. Two of the players, Gary Ward and Maurice Woods, played for former Canyon Guard Richard Bacon, now coaching at Seagoville High School in Dallas. A third Texan, Jeff Fudge is a lightning quick point guard that could develop into a fine team leader. Bob Henige is the tallest of the frosh at 6-8. A standout from Cactus High School, his hard work will be valuable to his development. Leland King is 6-7 and from Banning High School in Los Angeles. The final freshman is Richard Gano. Gano is doubtful for this season as he underwent back surgery to repair a ruptured disc this fall.

Sophomores include Darrell James, transfers Bob Gallagher (U. of St. Thomas, Houston, Texas) and Tom Motsinger (Bethany Nazarene). Both Gallagher and Motsinger are listed at 6-6, and are key factors for this year.

All of the juniors are transfer students. Included in the list are Bobby Gantt (Bethany Nazarene), Ken Lebeck (Phoenix College), George Rucker (Navajo CC), Cecil Scroggins (Scottsdale CC) and Danny Young (Northern Arizona redshirt). All are still contenders for playing time and possible starting positions. Also include in the list of juniors, John Cheatham. A Phoenix native, Cheatham is currently enrolled at Mesa CC, finishing requirements for his A.A. degree and plans to join the team after first semester.

The seniors include, of course, Kevin Warren and Rod Monteverde. To help them are two transfers. Cleveland Mitchell (College of Santa Fe) returns to Phoenix after one season away from home. Michael Greene (U. of St. Thomas, Houston, Texas) could be the most talented player on the roster.

As you can see, new players abound in the listing. If Canyon can gel these new players into a unit, the 'Lopes look to continue their trip to the NAIA District 7 Tournament in March.

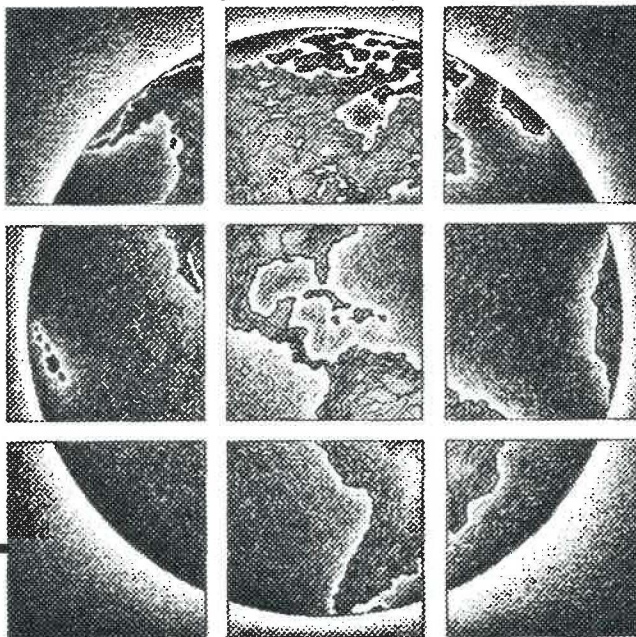

As John Shumate enters his third season at the helm of the Grand Canyon College Antelopes, he has certainly had his share of ups and downs. In his first season, the 'Lopes recorded a 21 - 9 record for the former Phoenix Sun. Last year, the 'Lopes struggled home for a 17 - 16 on court record, but did manage to make the finals of the NAIA District VIII Playoffs.

Shumate came to Grand Canyon in the summer of 1983 after spending two and one-half years at the University of Notre Dame, where he served as a volunteer assistant coach to Digger Phelps as was the school's Assistant Minority Placement Director.

Shumate first hit the limelight as a player at the University of Notre Dame. A consensus NCAA All American for the Irish, Shumate was selected in the first round of the 1974 NBA Draft by the Phoenix Suns. His professional playing career was shortened because of health problems, but he did log seven years on NBA hardwoods. During his playing days, Shumate spent time with the San Antonio Spurs, Buffalo Braves, and Detroit Pistons in addition to playing with the Suns.

A 1974 graduate of the University of Notre Dame with a B. A. in Sociology. Shumate has been honored as an athlete in being selected to both the A.P. and U.P.I. Basketball All America Teams his final year at Notre Dame. He was also selected to the NBA All Rookie team.

Married to the former Marilyn Warren of Phoenix, they have two children, Brittany and John.

GIL STAFFORD DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



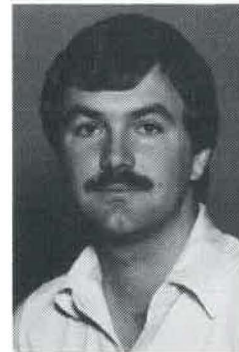

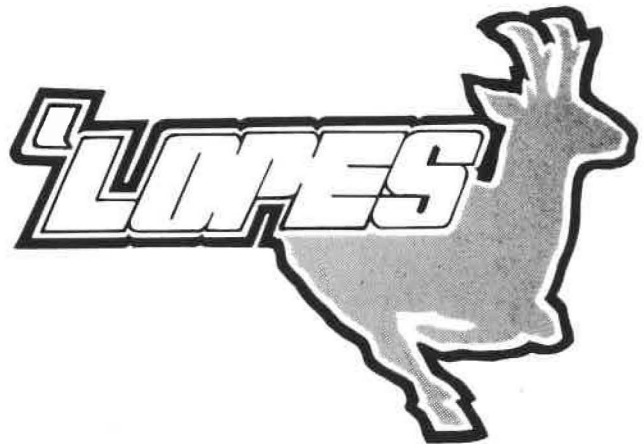

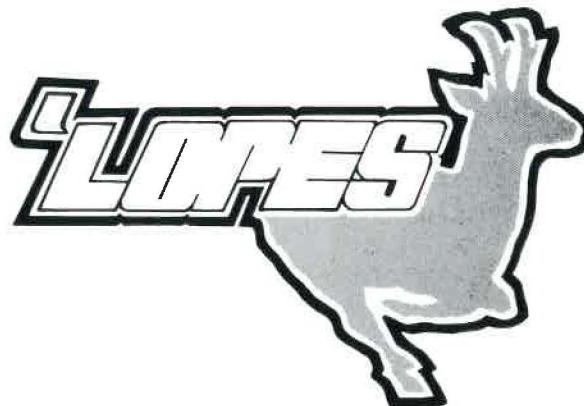

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS

The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) is a completely autonomous association, currently administering programs of intercollegiate athletics at over 500 fully-accredited colleges and universities of moderate enrollment. The fundamental tenet of the NAIA is that intercollegiate athletics is an integral part of the total educational program of the institution. This belief is strongly reflected in the governing documents, activities and organizational structure of the Association.

HISTORY AND PURPOSE

Established in 1940 as the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball (NAIB), the NAIA emanated from a "National Small College Basketball Tournament" inaugurated in 1937 in Kansas City, Missouri. The conversion of the NAIB to the NAIA came in 1952 when the organization expanded beyond basketball and added national championship events in golf, outdoor track and field and tennis. Football, cross country, baseball and swimming were added to the championship event calendar in 1956, and wrestling (1958), soccer (1959), bowling (1962-78), gymnastics (1964), indoor track and field (1966), ice hockey (1968) and volleyball (1969-1980) were later additions.

Of major significance to the NAIA, was the establishment of the women's division within the Association on August 1, 1980. The NAIA decision to offer competitive opportunities and championships in women's athletics was passed by the membership following two years of study and proposals by an ad hoc committee on the implementation of a women's division into the NAIA structure. Currently, the Association conducts ten championship event programs for women in the sports of basketball, cross country, gymnastics, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, softball (fast pitch), soccer, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The initial purpose of the NAIA — to provide national championship athletic opportunities to institutions below the so-called "major" level — has indeed been well served. The Association clearly outlines its own responsibilities and those of its members: a sound athletics program, administered and controlled by those responsible for the administration of the institution. This means direct supervision in caliber of competition, financing of the program and taking steps to assure that financial assistance is made available only through the institution and under the same general policies as aid to all students. In short, the basic premise is that the athletics program is a basic component of the overall educational process and not an entity part.

ADMINISTRATION

The governing body of the NAIA is the National Executive Committee, composed of 10 persons elected by the membership. The Executive Committee is responsible for establishing the policies and determining the overall direction of the Association. The Executive Committee hires the Executive Director, who conducts the business and day-to-day operation of the National Office headquartered in Kansas City, Missouri.

The District is the basic unit of the NAIA. The Association is organized into 31 geographical districts spread over the 50 states and a part of Canada. Each District is governed by a District Executive Committee, the chief officer of which is the District Chair. The District Executive Committee establishes a program of championship events in various sports and individual/team champions of those district events are qualified to compete in NAIA Area and National Championship competition.

Eligibility rules within the NAIA govern all play in all sports recognized by the Association, not just post-season play. All eligibility guidelines must be adhered to by all members, including those holding dual affiliation with other associations. Certification of eligibility of all NAIA student/athletes is accomplished through a network of individuals which includes the faculty athletic representative of each institution, the District Eligibility Chair and the National Eligibility Committee.

MEMBERSHIP

Any four-year college or university and upper level two-year institution in the United States and Canada which awards the bachelor's degree or equivalent, may hold active NAIA membership. Active member institutions must be fully accredited by an appropriate accrediting agency or commission.

OBLIGATION OR MEMBERSHIP

Member institutions must conduct their intercollegiate athletic programs with the standards of the regulatory Associations in which they hold membership, and the NAIA. They must pay their annual membership dues and be in support of the policies of the NAIA. Where institutional rules and standards are stricter than those of the regulatory group or the NAIA, those rules and standards of the institution are recognized and supported by the NAIA.

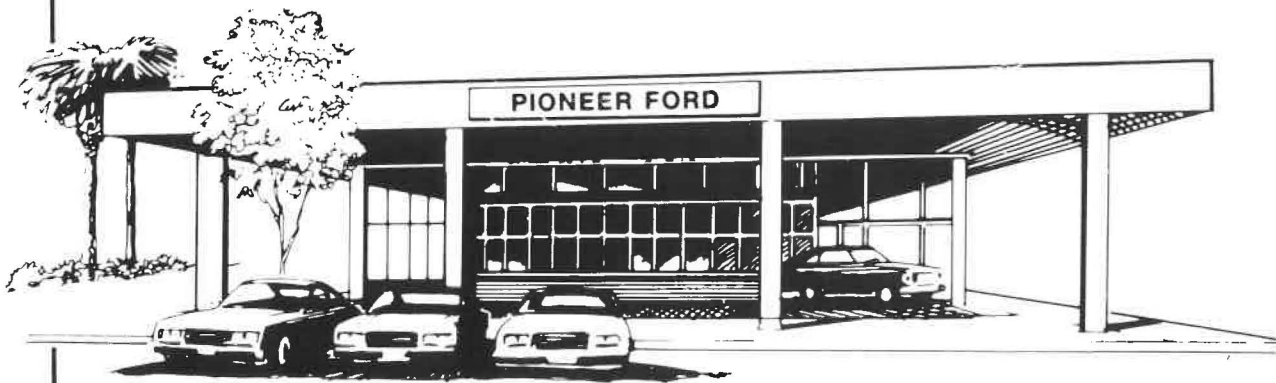

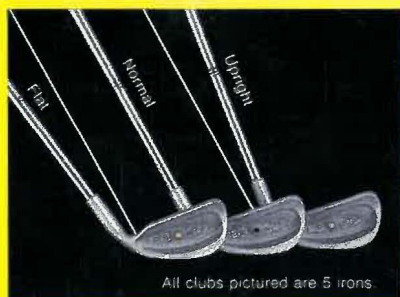
